An Ordinance to amend the "Public House Ordinance, 1856".

WHEREAS an Ordinance was passed in the 20th year of the reign of Her present Majesty, entitled "An Ordinance for consolidating and amending the laws relating to the licensing of Public Houses, and for further regulating the sale and consumption of Fermented and Spirituous Liquors in the colony of Western Australia; and also for extending the powers of Justices with respect to drunkenness," in which persons holding a Conditional Pardon for any criminal offence are excluded from the possession of Publicans' and other licenses; and whereas it is found expedient to extend to conditional-pardon men the same privileges as are enjoyed by free persons in this respect, and to amend the said Ordinance: Be it therefore enacted, by His Excellency the Governor of Western Australia and its Dependencies, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof:—

Preamble.

I. THAT the 10th section of the said recited Ordinance shall

Three Justices of the
Peace at licensing
board. II. THAT the 15th section of the said recited Ordinance shall and may be read and applied as if the word "three" had been inserted therein instead of the word "two."

Justices selling wine
may sit on licensing
bench. III. THAT the 11th section of the said recited Ordinance shall and may be read and applied as if the words "(not being the produce of any vineyard belonging to him or being in his possession)" had been inserted therein after the word "wine" in the said section.

43rd section not to
apply to conditional-
pardon man. IV. THAT so much of the 43rd section of the said recited Ordinance as relates to any person holding a conditional-pardon for any criminal offence shall be and is hereby repealed.
