

PLANT DISEASES.

AN ACT to amend the Plant Diseases Act, 1914-1973.

[Assented to 19th September, 1974.]

BE it enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly of Western Australia, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. (1) This Act may be cited as the *Plant Diseases Act Amendment Act, 1974.* Short title and citation.

(2) In this Act the Plant Diseases Act, 1914-1973 is referred to as the principal Act. Reprinted as approved for reprint 8th July, 1971 and as amended by Act No. 19 of 1973.

(3) The principal Act as amended by this Act may be cited as the Plant Diseases Act, 1914-1974.

2. This Act shall come into operation on a date to be fixed by proclamation.

Section 4
amended.

3. Section 4 of the principal Act is amended by deleting the interpretation "Under Secretary".

Section 12C
amended.

4. Subsection (1) of section 12C of the principal Act is amended by deleting item (I) of subparagraph (v) of paragraph (d) and substituting the following item—

(I) fix the scale of charges for the baiting or spraying carried out by or on behalf of the Committee, which charges shall not exceed the amounts prescribed in the Schedule to this Act;
