£20 REWARD.

WHEREAS on the night of Monday, the 28th day of December, some evil disposed person or persons did feloniously steal from the premises of the Honorable Major Irwin, of Henley Park, a certain part of a Reaping-Machine, called a "comb," with intent to render the said machine useless, and whereas it is of the utmost importance to bring the perpetrator of such a wanton offence to justice:—NOW therefore I the Governor, do hereby offer a reward of TWENTY POUNDS and a free pardon to any person, not being the actual principal, who will give such information as may lead to the prosecution and conviction of the offender or offenders.

His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to direct the publication, for the information of all whom it may concern, of the following description of an intended Road to be run between the East end of the Perth Causeway and a Bridge over the Helena River, at Guildford.

Description of a Public Road between the East end of the Perth Causeway and a Bridge over the Helena River, at Guildford, for adoption by the Road Trust at their General Quarterly Meeting, on 20th January, 1847.

Road to be 1 chain or 66 feet wide, on the Northern and Western sides of the following lines, which are described with reference to the true meridian, and are marked at their respective angles and elsewhere by good stout posts 3 to 4 feet out of the ground, mostly squared and pointed at top, and all marked R.T.

Commencing at East end of the Causeway the road to run 5 chains 80 links in direction S. 55 degrees E., then 29 chains 70 links N. 87 degrees E., then 162 chains 74 links N. 59 degrees 45 minutes E., then 12 chains 99 links N. 38 degrees E., then 47 chains 77 links N. 24 degrees E. to a squared and pointed post 4 feet high on the

N.E. boundary line of Swan location, No. 33, then 79 chains 35 links N. 41½ degrees E. to a similar post on the N.E. boundary of location No. 30, then 34 chains 73 links N. 50½ degrees E. to another similar post on N.E. boundary of location No. 29, then 36 chains 56 links N. 53½ degrees E., then 41 chains 82 links N. 44½ degrees E. to a squared and pointed post 3½ feet high on on N.E. boundary of location No. 26, then 67 chains 4 links N. 31 degrees 40 minutes E. and 13 chains 23 links N. 27 degrees 35 minutes E. to a large squared and pointed post at commencement of the N.E. boundary of location No. 20 on the Helena River, and on the S.E. side of the public bridge across said River.

Also the public road to include a small triangle of land near the causeway aforesaid bounded on the N. by the E. portion of the second line hereinbefore described, on the W. by the second line of a public road, gazetted as such on 7th Dec. 1846, and extending S. 5 degrees E. 7 chains 90 links, and on the S. by a line extending N. 60 degrees E. 17 chains 32 links between two large squared and pointed posts.

Dear Sir,—I had occasion to visit Rottnest this day, "Nowal" was taken much worse last evening and died during the night, I examined his body and found the heart very much enlarged, and the lungs a perfect mass of corruption, showing not only strong symptoms of recent Inflammation, but evident signs of disease of long standing.

By His Excellency, ANDREW CLARKE Esq. K. H. Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Territory of Western Australia and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same.

In pursuance of the authority in me vested, by a certain act of the Imperial Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, and passed in the fourth and fifth year of her Majesty's reign, intituled 'an act for regulating the sale of waste lands belonging to the Crown in the Australian colonies, I do hereby notify and proclaim, that the following portion of Land, in the district of Perthshire, will be offered for sale by Public Auction, by the Collector of Revenue at Perth, on Wednesday the 13th day of January, 1847, at the upset price affixed thereto, on the terms and conditions set forth in certain land regulations dated the 14th June, 1843.
