PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency CHARLES FITZGERALD, Esquire, Commander in the Royal Navy, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Territory of Western Australia and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Local Legislature, intituled "An Act to regulate the Establishment and Management of Ferries, and the collection of Tolls thereat," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, or other officer administering the Government of this Colony, by any Proclamation under his hand and seal, to establish any ferry or ferries at such place or places as to him shall seem expedient, and to cause the collection at such ferry or ferries of any tolls not exceeding certain tolls specified in the said recited Act:—Now, therefore, I, the Governor, by virtue and in exercise of the authority conferred upon me by the said recited Act, do hereby order, appoint, and direct, that there shall be a ferry at the Narrows near the mouth of the Canning River, between the land of Point Heathcoat and the opposite eastern shore of the Canning, to be designated the Canning Ferry, instead of the ferry hitherto existing at Preston Point; and from and after the date of this my Proclamation, the following tolls shall be demanded and paid:—

Two-thirds of the above rate only to be levied on fillies, geldings, and other species of quadruped under the age of twelve months.

Double fare to be charged on Sundays. An additional charge of one half the above scale to be made between the hours of nine P.M. and five A.M. from the 1st day of October to the 31st day

of March, and seven P.M. and six A.M. from the 1st day of April to the 30th day of September.

No tolls shall be demanded for any horse or carriage conveying the person of the Governor or other officer for the time being administering the Government of the said Colony, or any person in actual attendance on him; or for horses, beasts, carts, carriages or other vehicles belonging to the Government and employed at the time of passing the ferry in the Government service; or any stores or property of Government conveyed by such horses, beasts, or vehicles; or for any horse, beast, carriage, or vehicle conveying any clergyman in the discharge of his duty, or conveying the Post-office Mails, and all Her Majesty's officers and soldiers *en route*, and being in proper staff or regimental or military uniform dress or undress, and their horses, and all carriages and horses belonging to Her Majesty or employed in her service when conveying persons, baggage, arms, or ammunition, or returning therefrom; and all such baggage, arms, or ammunition, shall be exempted on passing this Ferry from the payment of any tolls.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency CHARLES FITZGERALD,
Esquire, Commander in the Royal Navy, Governor and Commander-in-chief in and over the Territory of Western Australia and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Local Legislature, passed in the fourth and fifth years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen

Victoria, No. 17, intituled "An Act to provide for the construction and management of Roads and other Internal Communications in the colony of Western Australia," the Governor is empowered to establish, by proclamation, all tolls, rates, dues, or charges, which may hereafter become payable at, or by reason of the use of, any lines or modes of communication within the said colony; and whereas the Central Board of Works have recommended the establishment of a toll at the Twelve (12) Mile Spring on the Toodyay Road, for the purpose of raising funds for the repairs of the same;—Now, therefore, I, the Governor, by virtue and in exercise of the authority given to me in and by the said recited Act, do hereby establish the following tolls and charges, and do order that the same shall and may be demanded and paid at the Twelve (12) Mile Spring on the Toodyay Road, and be applied towards the repairs of the same:—

For each score of sheep, lambs, pigs, or goats,	3
For each gig, chaise, cart, dray, or other vehicle, drawn by one horse, ass, or mule, or by one pair of oxen.....	6

Unweaned stock following their mothers....	exempt.

Except, nevertheless, His Excellency the Governor and his Private Secretary, the Protectors of Natives and Guardian of Govt. Juvenile Immigrants, when on duty; all Her Majesty's officers and soldiers, being in proper staff or regimental or military uniform dress or undress (but not when passing in any private or hired vehicle), and all recruits marching by route, and all carriages and horses belonging to Her Majesty and employed in her service, under the provisions of the Mutiny Act, when conveying persons or baggage, or returning therefrom; all persons in the employ of the Survey Department, including their horses and carts, when actually on duty; the police and mail carriers, when on duty; who are respectively to be exempted from any toll or charge whatsoever.

An additional charge of one-half the above scale to be made between the hours of 9 P.M. and 5 A.M.

HIS Excellency the Governor directs the publication of the following Rules and Regulations under which the Government Juvenile Immigrants will be henceforth apprenticed.

1.—On the arrival of a draft of these immigrants, parties desirous of engaging them as apprentices, are requested to make early application, either in person or by an authorised agent, to the Guardian at Perth, who will afford opportunity for the lads being inspected, and the applicant or his agent making a selection. A preference will, however, be given to such applicant as resides in the country districts. No lad will be assigned to any person holding a publican's license.

2.—Master is not at liberty to transfer or dismiss an apprentice without permission to do so being previously obtained in writing from the Guardian.

3.—Complaints by masters against their apprentices, or by apprentices against their masters, are to be made to the nearest Resident Magistrate—but on such occasions the Guardian should be communicated with as early as possible.

4.—Masters are enjoined to enforce the attendance of their apprentices at divine worship on the Lord's Day, whenever practicable.

5.—To obviate uncertainty as to the quantity of clothing to be supplied by the master, the following annual allowance to each lad has been fixed as a minimum, in case of dispute, if thought necessary by the Guardian:—2 pair fustian trousers, 2 pair duck ditto, 4 cotton shirts, 3 blue ditto (serge), 2 pair boots, 1 pair extra to stock-keepers, 1 hat or cap, and 1 pair blankets at commencement of second year of apprenticeship.

6.—The following scale of rations has been fixed as a minimum to be furnished weekly to apprentices in cases of dispute:—10½ lbs. meat, 10½ lbs. flour, 2 oz. salt, 3 oz. tea, ½ lb. sugar, ¼ oz. soap.

7.—The wages payable for the juvenile immigrants not already under indenture will be—£2 for the first year the lads are in the colony, £2 10s. for the second, £3 10s. for the third, £4 for the fourth, and £4 10s. for the fifth; which wages are to be paid *half-yearly* to the Guardian, after deducting such weekly allowance as may have been made by the master to the apprentice by sanction of the Guardian.

8.—Should an apprentice abscond, the master is expected to use every endeavour to have him arrested and taken before a magistrate.

9.—Any person engaging, harbouring, or facilitating the escape of an apprentice, will render himself liable to a penalty not exceeding (£50) fifty pounds.
