**Proclamation.**

By His Excellency CHARLES FITZGERALD, Esquire, Commander in the Royal Navy, Governor and Commander-in-Chief, in and over the Territory of Western Australia, and its Dependencies and Vice-Admiral of the same.

IN pursuance of the authority in me vested by a certain Act of the Imperial Parliament, passed in the 5th and 6th years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act for regulating the sale of Waste Lands belonging to the crown in the Australian Colonies;" I do hereby notify and proclaim that the following portions of land will be offered for Sale by Public Auction, by the Collector and Sub-Collectors of Revenue, at the places and on the days hereinafter mentioned, at one o'clock at the upset price affixed to each lot respectively, on the terms and condition set forth in certain Land Regulations, dated 14th June, 1843

At Perth, on Wednesday, the 7th April next:—

**Proclamation.**

By His Excellency CHARLES FITZGERALD Esquire, Commander in the Royal Navy, Governor and Commander-in-Chief, in and over the Territory of Western Australia and its Dependencies and Vice-Admiral of the same.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Imperial Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, passed in the 12th and 13th

Years of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for regulating the carriage of Passengers in Merchant Vessels," it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor of any of Her Majesty's Possessions abroad, by any Proclamation to be by him from time to time issued for that purpose (which shall take effect from the issuing thereof), to declare the rule of computation by which the length of the voyage of any ship carrying Passengers from such possessions to any other place whatever, shall be computed for the purposes of the said Act, and to substitute for the articles of food and provisions specified in the said Act, such other articles of food and provisions as shall be a full equivalent for the same; and also to declare what medicines, medical instruments, and other matters shall be deemed necessary for the medical treatment of the Passengers during such colonial voyage. Now, therefore, I Charles FitzGerald, Esquire, the Governor aforesaid, by this my Proclamation issued for that purpose, do declare that the following shall be the rule of computation by which the length of the voyage of any ship carrying Passengers from Western Australia to the several places hereinafter named shall be computed, for the purposes of the said recited Act, that is to say—

And I do further declare that in addition to and irrespective of any provisions of their own, which any Passenger may have on board, the Master of every such ship shall make to each Passenger during the voyage, including the time of detention, if any, at any port or place before the termination of such voyage, the following issues of pure water, and sweet and wholesome provisions, being in accordance with the dietary scale fixed in the said recited Act (that is to say), of sweet and wholesome water at least three quarts daily, and of provisions after the rate per week of two and a half pounds of bread or biscuit, not inferior in quality to what is usually called Navy biscuit, one pound of wheaten flour, five pounds of oatmeal, two pounds of rice, two ounces and a half of tea, one pound of sugar. Provided always, that

such issues of provisions shall be made in advance and not less than twice in a week, the first of such issues to be made on the day of embarkation; provided also that twenty-five pounds of sound potatoes may be substituted for the five pounds of oatmeal; or wheaten bread or flour may be substituted for the rice and oatmeal weight for weight.

#### Proclamation.

*By His Excellency CHARLES FITZGERALD, Esquire, Commander in the Royal Navy, Governor and Commander-in-chief, in and over the Territory of Western Australia and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same.*

WHEREAS by an Act of the Legislative Council of the colony of Western Australia aforesaid, made and passed in the 6th year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, No. 13, intituled "An Act to establish and regulate Courts of Requests," it is enacted that Courts of Requests shall be holden at Perth and such other towns and places as the Governor of the said colony for the time being shall or may from time to time appoint by Proclamation; and the said Courts respectively shall be holden at such times as the said Governor shall in like manner appoint. And whereas it is desirable to establish a Court of Requests at and for the town of Fremantle in the said colony: Now know Ye that I, the Governor aforesaid, do by virtue and in exercise of the power so vested in me by the said recited Act, hereby proclaim that a Court of Requests shall from and after the date of this my Proclamation, be holden at the town of Fremantle aforesaid, on Saturday in each and every week at the hour of noon.

NOTICE is hereby given, by the authority of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, that on and after the 10th January, 1852, the Light in the Sturt Light-house, lately erected on Cape Willoughby, Kangaroo Island, will be exhibited from sunset to sunrise.

This Lighthouse is situated on the eastern extremity of Kangaroo Island, in lat. 35° 49' 20" S., long. 138° 12' 30" E.,

and is a Revolving Light, appearing at regular intervals of one and a half a-minute. This light is elevated 241 feet above the level of the sea, and can be seen 24 nautical miles, illuminating 259 degrees of a circle, from N. by W. half W., round to S.W. by W. half W.

#### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

##### **HORSBURGH LIGHT-HOUSE.**

**N**OTICE is hereby given, that a Light-house bearing the above designation in commemoration of the celebrated Hydrographer, has been erected on Pedra Branca, a rock which lies off the eastern entrance of the Straits of Singapore. The Light will be exhibited on the night of the 15th of October, 1851, and every night thereafter from sunset to sunrise.

The following is a specification of the position of the Light-house; the dangers which come within the influence of its Light, and the appearance of the Light—by Mr J. T. Thomson, Government Surveyor.

The Light-house is situated according to the Admiralty Chart in Lat. 1°20'20"

N., and Long. 104°25' East of Greenwich and by Compass bears from Barbucoet Point—East distant 12½ Nautical miles, and from the N.E. point of Bintang N. W. by W. ¾ W. distant 12 miles.

The following rocks and shoals lying in the way of vessels—and coming within the influence of the Light, bear from the Light-house:—

The Light will be known to mariners as a revolving bright Light which gradually attains its brightest period once every minute and as gradually declines until it totally disappears to the distant observer, —whilst, when viewed from a short distance, it is never entirely invisible.

The lantern, which is open all round, elevated 95 feet above the level of the sea at High Water Spring Tides, will be seen from the deck of a vessel at a distance of 15 Nautical miles.

As a beacon during the day the Light-house will be known by the following description. It stands on a rock which measures 150 feet long and 100 broad and is 24 feet high at its highest point above the level of H. W. Sp. Tides. The Light House is a Pillar of dressed granite and the Lantern covered by a Spherical dome which is painted white.
