ARTHUR'S HEAD LIGHTHOUSE,

Lat. 32° 03' 14" S., long. 115° 45' 12" E.

On and after the 1st proximo, the new Lighthouse, which has been erected on Arthur's Head, at the South side of entrance of Swan River, will be illuminated.

The new structure is situated some 10 yards North of the old building. The tower (stone) is round, with a base of 22 feet diameter. Height above high water mark to centre of lantern, 92 feet; and the building from base to vane is 71 feet. Level of site above high water, 32ft. 1½in. It has a Third Order fixed dioptric light (white) for 190°, and is visible for about 16 miles from the deck of a vessel.

The flour to be warranted to keep good for six months after delivery.

Fresh Meat to be delivered daily, when the Government or its representative may consider it practicable, and in proportion of three days' supply of Mutton to four days' supply of Beef per week, or alternate days of each. When Beef is issued, fore and hind quarters, or portions thereof, are to be delivered alternately; six inches at least to be cut off the hough and neck bones. Mutton to be delivered in carcasses, excluding heads, necks, shanks below the knee, and hough joints.

The supplies to be delivered at such places and times as may be required by the Government or persons deputed by it.

The ordinary ration of Vegetables to consist of 1lb. of Potatoes; but when demanded by the Government, and in season, the following equivalents must be supplied twice a week: Pumpkins, 2lbs.; or Turnips, Carrots, or Cabbage, 1½lbs.; or Onions, ¼lb., for every pound of Potatoes.

All supplies must be delivered in good and sound packages; Corn and Flour sacks, and Oil casks, will be returned to the Contractors; other packages will be retained free of charge.

The Contractors will be liable for any expense which may be incurred by the Government in consequence of the non-performance of their contracts.

Payments to be made monthly, and for general supplies for the quantities actually consumed in the month.

No transfer of any Contract will be permitted, without the *previous consent* of the Government.

Each Tender must bear the bonâ fide signatures of two responsible and approved sureties, who will be required to be bound for the due performance of the Contract, under a penalty of about one-fourth of the estimated sum to be paid under each Contract. Parties are requested to be careful in drawing up their Tenders, which should be in strict conformity with this Notice.

RULES TO BE OBSERVED BY EXHIBITORS.

1.—All articles for competition must be in the Hall by 9 o'clock a.m., except such as are brought from a distance of nine miles, which will be received until 11 o'clock, provided they are entered previous to the Show.

2.—Printed numbers will be provided for the articles exhibited, and exhibitors are requested to see that all articles have these attached, otherwise they will not be noticed by the Judges.

3.—Exhibitors will be required as they enter the Hall to deliver to the Secretary, in writing, a statement of all articles they forward, either for exhibition or competition; if for competition, specifying the class in which they compete. After being placed in the Secretary's hands on no account will any alteration be allowed.

4.—Necessary assistants will be admitted with the exhibitors until 9 a.m.; but no persons whose services are not required in that capacity will be allowed to enter.

5.—All parties must leave the Hall by 10 a.m., excepting members of committee and those especially engaged by the committee only.

6.—Each lot of fruit, flowers, or vegetables to be the produce of one garden, and to be exhibited in the name of the grower.

7.—All the exhibits to be considered the property of the committee for the time being, and to remain untouched until the close of the Exhibition, without the written order of the Secretary.

8.—The Judges shall have the power of withholding prizes from any article not considered worthy; awarding or reducing the amount of prizes according to merit.

9.—No exhibitor shall be allowed to compete for more than one prize in the same number.

10.—No person exhibiting shall in any case attach his name or any other mark, other than the number furnished by the Secretary, to any article he may exhibit, previous to the decision of the Judges.

11.—No bouquets or ornaments of any description to be made up in the showroom.

12.—Boxes for cut flowers will be provided suitable for holding six or more specimens, and application must be made to the Secretary for them at least one day previous to the Exhibition.

13.—The Exhibition will be open to the public from 3 o'clock p.m. to 5:30 p.m., and re-opened from 7:30 p.m. to 10 p.m.

14.—Subscribers, only, admitted free. Non-subscribers will be charged 1s. admittance at 3 o'clock, and 6d. at 7:30 p.m. Children only admitted at 3 o'clock, for half-price.
