Victoria, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, &c., &c.

A Regulation (made in the name and on behalf of Her Majesty under the provisions of the Western Pacific Order in Council, 1879) to prohibit the supply of intoxicating liquors to Natives of Tonga, and others resident in the Friendly Islands.

I. If any British subject, in Tonga, sells or gives, or otherwise supplies to any native Tongan, or any native of any island in the Pacific Ocean resident in Tonga, any wine, spirits, or

any other intoxicating liquor, he shall, on conviction thereof before the Court of Her Majesty's High Commissioner, be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds, and in default of payment shall be liable to imprisonment for a period not exceeding one month.

II. If it shall appear to the Court that such wine or spirits have been given *bona fide* for medicinal purposes, or other cause which shall, in the judgment of the Court, be reasonable and sufficient, it shall be lawful for the Court to dismiss the charge.

Victoria, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, &c., &c.

A Regulation (made in the name and on behalf of Her Majesty under the provisions of the Western Pacific Order in Council, 1879) to prohibit the supply of intoxicating liquors to Natives of Samoa, and others resident in the Navigator's Islands.

I. If any British subject, in Samoa, sells, gives, or otherwise supplies to any native Samoan, or any native of any island in the Pacific Ocean resident in Samoa, any wine, spirits, or any other intoxicating liquor, he shall, on conviction thereof before the Court of Her Majesty's High Commissioner, be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds, and in default of payment shall be liable to imprisonment for a period not exceeding one month.

II. If it shall appear to the Court that such wine or spirits have been given *bona fide* for medicinal purposes, or other cause which shall, in the judgment of the Court, be reasonable and sufficient, it shall be lawful for the Court to dismiss the charge.

A Regulation (made in the name and on behalf of Her Majesty under the provisions of the Western Pacific Order in Council, 1879) to prohibit the supply of intoxicating liquors to Natives of Rotumah, and others resident in Rotumah.

I. If any British subject, in Rotumah, sells, gives, or otherwise supplies to any native Rotuman, or any native of any island in the Pacific Ocean resident in Rotumah, any wine, spirits, or any other intoxicating liquor, he shall, on conviction thereof before the Court of Her Majesty's High Commissioner, be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds, and in default of payment shall be liable to imprisonment for a period not exceeding one month.

II. If it shall appear to the Court that such wine or spirits have been given *bona fide* for medicinal purposes, or other cause which shall, in the judgment of the Court, be reasonable and sufficient, it shall be lawful for the Court to dismiss the charge.

Victoria, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, &c., &c.

A Regulation (made in the name and on behalf of Her Majesty under the provisions of the Western Pacific Order in Council, 1879) to prohibit the supply of intoxicating liquors to Natives of Savage Island, and others resident therein.

I. If any British subject in Savage Island, sells, gives, or otherwise supplies to any native of Savage Island, or any native of any island in the Pacific Ocean resident in Savage Island, any wine, spirits, or any other intoxicating liquor, he shall, on conviction thereof before the Court of Her Majesty's High Commissioner, be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds, and in default of payment shall be liable to imprisonment for a period not exceeding one month.

II. If it shall appear to the Court that such wine or spirits have been given *bona fide* for medicinal purposes, or other cause which shall, in the judgment of the Court, be reasonable and sufficient, it shall be lawful for the Court to dismiss the charge.

No. 5, 1879.

Victoria, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, &c., &c.

A Regulation (made in the name and on behalf of Her Majesty under the provisions of the Western Pacific Order in Council, 1879) to regulate the sale of Arms and Ammunition in Samoa.

(L.S.) ARTHUR GORDON,
H.C.

I. No British subject resident in Samoa shall sell arms or ammunition without a license to that effect under the hand of the Deputy Commissioner or Consul, which license such Deputy Commissioner or Consul is hereby authorized, if he see fit, to issue subject to the following provisions:—

II. Every British subject selling arms and ammunition without such license shall be guilty of an offence against the Western Pacific Orders in Council of 1877 and 1879, and shall be liable, on conviction before the Court of the High Commissioner to imprisonment with hard labour for a period not exceeding three months, as the Court may direct.

III. Every license issued under this regulation shall specify the name of the party to whom it is issued, and his residence, and the number of arms and amount of ammunition which he is licensed to sell; and every such license shall remain in force until the 31st day of December, in the year in which it is issued, and no longer.

IV. A fee of one shilling shall be payable on the issue of every such license.

V. No such license shall be issued to any British subject unless he have previously entered into a Bond conditioned for the payment to Her Majesty of the sum of fifty pounds sterling, should he sell any arms or ammunition to any native of Samoa, or any native of any island in the Pacific Ocean resident in Samoa, and every such bond shall have two good and sufficient sureties to the satisfaction of such Deputy Commissioner or Consul.

VI. Every license to sell arms or ammunition shall be *ipso facto* cancelled on proof before the Court of the High Commissioner, that the holder of it has sold any arms or ammunition to any native of Samoa or of any island in the Pacific Ocean resident in Samoa, and the holder thereof shall be liable to the same penalties as if he had sold arms or ammunition without license.

Victoria, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, &c., &c.

A Regulation (made in the name and on behalf of Her Majesty under the provisions of the Western Pacific Order in Council, 1879) to prohibit the supply of Dynamite to Natives of Polynesia.

I. Any British subject who sells or gives to any native of the Groups of Islands named in the Schedule hereto annexed, or to any other natives of Polynesia resident in any such islands, any dynamite, shall be guilty of an offence against the Western Pacific Orders in Council, of 1877 and 1879, and shall, on conviction before the Court of Her Majesty's High Commissioner, be liable to a fine not exceeding ten pounds and to imprisonment not exceeding three months, as the Court may determine.
