Register Chambers,
Adelaide, June 16th, 1885.

SIR,—I have the honor to inform you that I am prepared to enter into a contract with your Government for the supply of Camels in your Public Works Departments, such as Survey, Water, and Engineering.

I made it a special business, during my visit to India, to obtain an animal from a district and part most suitable to the climatic conditions of some parts of our and your countries, where their employment is a saving to the public estimates and a blessing to the men engaged on such work. They are in use in our (1) Survey, (2) Engineer, (3) Water Conservation, (4) Geological, (5) Telegraph, and (6) Police Departments; and now that we have succeeded in getting Camels properly acclimatised, suitable for country such as parts of yours, they earn about their total cost during the first year.

In the event of your requiring a small number, they might be landed at Albany, or, if preferred, could be marched from Port Augusta, S.A., insured against death or accident, and under the charge of competent drivers. The Hon. Jno. Forrest, during his visit to Adelaide, mentioned that you would, no doubt, insert this notice in the *Gazette*, so that squatters in the interior might be enabled, if they desired, to communicate with me, and obtain estimates. The cost varies from £45 for an ordinary bull pack to £60 for a riding Camel, not more than 8 nor less than 5 years of age. *The average life of a Camel is 100 years.* They breed well in Australia. Cows are more valuable, if they are for breeding, ranging about £60 each, and working about 10 months of the year; the other 2 months they are not fit for carrying, as they are in the calving state.

There is no need for Afghans or natives of India, the ordinary European being perfectly competent to manage them well.

From S. A. Advertiser, April 25, 1885.

By the s.s. *Bucephalus*, which arrived from Calcutta on Friday, a consignment of camels to the order of Mr. H. J. Scott, late commissioner at the Calcutta Exhibition, was received for service in the Engineer-in-Chief's department. In the opinion of those competent to judge these are the finest and most servicable lot of animals imported into South Australia. Mr. Scott had special facilities during his visit to India of obtaining camels which were from climatic conditions most suitable for use in our far north. In view of the opinions expressed by the deputation which waited on the Commissioner of Crown Lands a few days ago, it was considered advisable for the Inspector of Stock to make a careful examination. Consequently Mr. McLeod (the acting-inspector of stock) accompanied by Mr. Chalwin, M.R.C.V.S., were in attendance when the *Bucephalus* arrived at the wharf, and after making a most careful and minute inspection of the camels on board they gave an order for landing them. We understand that a further consignment is expected to Mr. Scott's order for the use of the Government in the Engineer-in-Chief's, water conservation, and survey departments, and as they are specially selected by competent officers in India, no doubt they will fulfil all the conditions laid down, but in the event of war with Russia the Government of India will not allow their best animals to leave the country.

MY LORD, May 6, 1885.

I HAVE the honour to forward your Lordship the following information of the result of the recent appeal to the people of the United Kingdom to join in a letter of thanks to our countrymen and kindred beyond the seas, who have offered men for active service.

A few weeks since copies of a memorial were forwarded from the Royal Colonial Institute to various public bodies throughout the United Kingdom, including the mayors and provosts of the principal towns of England, Ireland, and Scotland, requesting them to use their influence in obtaining signatures to it in their various localities, and to return it to me not later than the 1st of May.

The memorial was as follows:—

"We, the undersigned subjects of the Queen resident in the old country, desire to express our gratitude to our countrymen and kindred beyond the sea for the generous offer they have made to send troops for active service. We have always believed that our ties of blood and common love of freedom would keep the Empire one and indivisible. We thank you for this proof that our faith is founded on truth."

To this appeal a most gratifying and remarkable response has been returned. I have received a total of more than 20,000 signatures to the memorial, "from all sorts and conditions of men." These include the names of men of all parties in politics and all classes in society. Animated by the desire to let it be known how warmly they recognise this splendid and disinterested act on the part of the Colonies of Great Britain towards the mother country in her hour of need, peers, members of Parliament, judges of the Supreme Court, justices of the peace, mayors of towns and members of town councils and corporations, masters of city companies, professors of universities and men of science and literature, barristers, poets, authors, artists, clergy of all denominations, merchants, bankers, traders, artisans, labourers, and others have signed it. In many cases the mayors of provincial towns have affixed the corporate seal and signed the memorial "on behalf of the inhabitants."

It is evident from the readiness with which the signatures have everywhere been attached to this "Letter of Thanks," that large and representative as has been the number of names obtained, want of opportunity alone has prevented tens of thousands more of the people of the United Kingdom signing it, in order to express their warm appreciation of the noble, generous, and patriotic conduct of our countrymen and kindred beyond the sea which has evoked it.

Minor Roads.

HIS Excellency the Governor, on the recommendation of the Swan Roads Board, has been pleased to declare the following Roads to be Minor Roads, viz:—

A Minor Road, 50 links wide, leaving Cruse's Mill Road at the North gate of Ferguson's Paddock, about 45 chains West from its junction with the Upper Swan Road, and extending in a South-westerly direction crossing Ellen's Brook Ford; and thence along the old track West of Herbert's field to the Upper Swan Church Road, at a spot known as the "point of obstruction." Excepting the Main Road from Guildford to Upper Swan Bridge, *via* Cruse's Mill, gazetted on the 26th April, 1884, and the Minor Road from the Upper Swan Church, gazetted 2nd October, 1884, all other tracks or roads in Swan Locations A, B, and the southern division of Location I, are hereby closed.

A Minor Road, 1 chain wide, starting from the junction of Brockman River with the right bank of the Swan River, and extending in a westerly direction along the South boundary of Location 430, to the North-east corner of Special Occupation Lease 2198; thence West along its North boundary to the Upper Swan Road; from thence West along the South boundary of Special Occupation Lease 2136, and along part of the Southern boundary of Location 91; and from thence in a westerly direction to the West boundary of the Swan Roads Board District.

FROM THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF YORK.

To His Excellency Sir Frederick Napier Broome, K.C.M.G., Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Western Australia.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,—

We, the Chairman and Councillors of the Municipality of York, on behalf of the inhabitants of the town and district, hereby tender to Your Excellency a right hearty welcome on your return to the Colony.

Having watched with interest the career of Your Excellency during your sojourn in the Mother Country, we are cognizant of the efforts you have made to bring the Colony into notice, and we are convinced that such efforts can alone result in advantage to us. A BILL to amend the Colonial Passengers Ordinances and Acts.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the law relating to the carrying of Certificated Mates in Coasting Vessels, between certain ports and places within the Colony: Be it enacted by His Excellency the Governor of Western Australia and its Dependencies, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Coasting vessel to carry certificated mate, except in certain cases.

1. EVERY Colonial ship or vessel to which "The Colonial Passengers Ordinance, 1861," or the Acts amending, rectifying, or explaining the same are applicable, which shall carry passengers on any coasting voyage shall, in addition to a competent master and an efficient crew, also carry a mate possessing a mate's certificate from the Board of Trade, or, in the absence of such a certificate, a certificate from the Local Board as defined by the said Acts, unless and except such voyage shall be between Cape Naturaliste and the North-West Cape, or between Albany and Eucla, or between any intermediate ports between Cape Naturaliste and the North-West Cape, or Albany and Eucla, in which such excepted cases it shall not be necessary for such ship or vessel to carry a mate as aforesaid; Provided that such ship or vessel shall in other respects satisfy and conform to all the conditions required by the provisions of the said Acts.

Penalty for not carrying mates as required by law.

2. ANY master of such Colonial ship or vessel who shall go to sea on any coasting voyage without having on board a mate holding a certificate as aforesaid, and the owner or owners of any such ship or vessel, unless such voyage shall be between the capes, ports, and places in the first section of this Act mentioned, shall be guilty of an offence, and shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

Repeal of 2nd section of 39 Vic., No. 5.

3. THE second section of "The Colonial Passengers Ordinance Amendment Act, 1875," is hereby repealed; provided that this repeal shall not affect any liability incurred or the validity of any proceedings commenced or taken in respect of any offence committed before the commencement of this Act, but such liability may be enforced, and such proceedings may be carried on, as if this Act had not passed.

Incorporation with other Acts.

4. THIS Act shall be read and construed together with and shall be taken to form part of the aforesaid Acts.

Short title, and commencement of Act.

5. THIS Act may be cited for all purposes as "The Colonial Passengers Amendment Act, 1885," and shall come into force on the day of 188 .

A BILL to amend the law relating to the Branding of Live Stock.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Brands Acts of 1881 and 1882, so as to include camels, goats, and pigs within their provisions: Be it therefore enacted by His Excellency the Governor of Western Australia and its Dependencies, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. THIS Act may be cited as "The Brands Act, 1881, Amendment Act, 1885." Short Title.
2. THIS Act shall come into force on the _____ day of _____ 188 , hereinafter called the commencement of this Act. Commencement of Act.
3. FROM and after the commencement of this Act the word "cattle" in the third section of "The Brands Act, 1881," shall include camels in addition to the animals in the said Act defined as cattle, and all the provisions of the said Act shall apply to camels in as full and ample a manner as if camels had been included by the said Act within the definition of the word "cattle." Act to apply to camels.
4. FROM and after the commencement of this Act all the provisions of "The Brands Act, 1881," and "The Brands Act, 1881, Amendment Act, 1882," relating to earmarks for sheep shall apply to goats and pigs in as full and ample a manner as if the words "goats and pigs" or the words "goats or pigs," as the context may require, were inserted after the word "sheep" in the said Acts. Acts to apply to goats and pigs.
5. ALL the forms set forth in the schedules to "The Brands Act, 1881," may be altered (if necessary) so as to make them applicable to camels, goats, or pigs. Alteration of forms.
