Government Resident's Office, Wyndham, 10th December, 1886.

Having held the appointment of Acting Government Resident for this district during the past six months, I think it may be of interest to His Excellency were I to forward to you a report giving my ideas of the district, and also an epitome of the requirements here.

GENERAL REMARKS.—When I arrived here I found that the rush back from the fields had commenced, and that there were some hundreds of men returning. I am happy to say that this appears to be over, and what men remain have determined to stay over the wet season and try their fortunes. There is nothing to be alarmed at when you consider the number of men who have left the fields, for the same thing has happened on, I may say, all the goldfields throughout the colonies. So many men, on the report of a new goldfield, get what is termed the gold fever, and leave their homes and occupations, without a thought for the future; men who have never been on a goldfield in their lives, and who have never known what it is to do manual labor. Is it to be surprised at that on their arrival here, under a tropical sun, provisions of a rough description, a great distance to the fields and other difficulties,—is it to be surprised at, I say, that numbers of men lose heart at once, and return to their homes without even giving the fields a trial. Again, the season that the rush to the fields took place was at the worst time of year. Looking at all these facts, a rush from the fields was to be expected, and does not in any way warrant the opinion that the Kimberley goldfields are a failure.

ROAD.—With reference to the road from Wyndham to the fields, I have made it my business to obtain information from all reliable sources on this subject, and I find that the above track is passable for pack horses during all seasons. For the first twenty miles a marsh has to be traversed, but as this marsh is bounded on each side by ranges of hills, pack horses can travel along the edges during the rains without any difficulty; a fact which is of the greatest importance, as otherwise communication with Wyndham and Derby would be stopped for fully three months during the year, as it is well known that the Derby track is impassable for over 100 miles. The Wyndham road is also suitable for wheel traffic, and is generally preferred to any other. Some money will have to be spent upon it during the ensuing year, as, in the event of quartz reefs turning out payable, all machinery will be sent up from here, and means should be taken to give pioneers every facility in opening up the country.

RESERVES.—Reserves for camps should also be made along the road at easy stages.

POLICE PROTECTION—NATIVE POLICE.—Police protection is greatly required along the road. I should suggest a Station at the 20-Mile Camp, and another at the Denham River, and I also recommend the formation of a Native Police Force, under the charge of a smart officer. There will be serious trouble with the natives here before long. At present they are spearing horses and otherwise committing depredations, and I think a force of native troopers would be of great advantage, and be of far more service than Europeans. The Queensland Native Police do good service in that colony, and I see no reason why quite as efficient a force could not be established here.

NEW TOWNSITE AT PARRY'S LAGOONS.—With regard to the 20-Mile Camp (or Parry's Lagoons), I think that a townsite should be marked out in that locality. Merchants have already opened branch stores there, and licenses for wayside houses have also been granted. The spot chosen has every advantage, plenty of permanent water, and quantities of feed for horses. Storekeepers, by sending their goods out there during the dry weather, do away with the necessity for diggers coming in here during the rains, and it also shortens the distance to the fields by 20 miles. The main town eventually must, I am of opinion, be there.

ROAD OR TRAMWAY.—A road, or, as I have before recommended, a tramway, should be made from Wyndham to the before-mentioned site; the cost of the latter may be heavier, but the advantages gained will be greater, and it will be, if the result of the fields be favorable, the commencement of a line of railway to Hall's Gully, viá the Denham River.

MINERALS.—Time will show the richness of this part of the country in minerals of all descriptions. Tin, silver, and copper abound on the Bow and Denham, and, in course of time, easy and cheap transit must be made to open up this line of country. The District of East Kimberley is very rich in minerals, and means of opening up the country is a matter of serious import, and a matter that it behoves the Government to take under their most serious consideration.

JETTY.—A Jetty should be built without delay at Wyndham. The means of landing and shipping cargo are at present very unsatisfactory; but on this subject several reports have already been written. With respect to public buildings, I think that temporary arrangements can be made for the present.

HARBOR.—During the past year five buoys have been laid in the harbor, and prove of very great service; but still a good deal of improvement is necessary. Two buoys should be laid on the outside of Adolphus Island,—one on Nichol's Point and the other off Islet Point. A beacon should be placed on a sunken rock in the channel near View Hill; and two buoys or beacons should be placed at the entrance of the harbor, namely, on Medusa Bank and King's Shoal. With these, I consider Cambridge Gulf could be navigated by vessels of any tonnage.

WATER SUPPLY.—Water supply is a matter that requires serious consideration. Now that a good supply has been obtained at Anthon's Landing, I think that, as the lay of the strata is the same at Wyndham, good water can be struck by sinking a sufficient depth; but, in the event of this failing, a reservoir will have to be made, and this can be done with ease, as Nature appears to have formed a spot suitable, and the cost will be trifling compared to the vast importance of the work. The spot chosen by myself lies between Anthon's Landing and Wyndham, and with the aid of pipes an unlimited supply of water could be laid on to the town.

COAL.—The advantage of ascertaining whether coal exists in this district is of paramount importance, and I strongly urge on the Government to allow a Geologist to come up and prospect. In the opinion of many experienced men, the class of country is of such a description as would almost make it necessary that steps should be taken to test it. The result of finding coal would be of incalculable advantage to the Colony at large. The position of this harbor is such that it would be difficult to calculate the benefits that would accrue, and I trust that before long an opportunity will occur when an experienced man may be sent here for the purpose of ascertaining the wealth of this portion of the Colony.

GOLDFIELDS.—In conclusion, I wish to make a few remarks relative to the present state of affairs on the goldfields. Several rich leaders have lately been discovered. One man obtained specimens weighing 9lbs. and 3lbs. respectively, and reports reaching here are encouraging. Mr. Carr-Boyd's reef is showing up splendidly, and a shaft is now sunk to a depth of 40 feet. The stone is five feet in width, showing gold all through. Men are prospecting the district thoroughly, their attention being mainly directed to the Ord and Panton. Later on I shall be in a better position to report more fully as to the future prospects of the field. Now that rain is plentiful, news may be expected at any moment of a favorable character.

PASTORAL.—There are at present three stations on which stock have been placed, namely, Messrs. Panton & Osmond, with 4,000 head of cattle; the Messrs. Durack, with 6,000 head; and the Victorian Squatting Co., with 2,600 sheep. This latter company, I hear, are bringing over 6,000 head of cattle to put on their runs. The stock thrive well in this district, and I hope soon to see enterprising capitalists taking up country and stocking it with cattle, sheep, and horses. The country is well adapted for the latter, and the position of Cambridge Gulf gives every facility for shipment to India. I am told that the runs in the hands of the Cambridge Downs Pastoral Co.—at present unstocked consist of magnificent country.

TROPICAL PRODUCE.—During the present year Mr. Smith has taken up 100,000 acres on the Ord River for sugar growing. This is a concession granted to him by the Government for the purpose. He commences operations in April next. This industry alone will be of great advantage to the district. There is a quantity of land in this part of the Colony suitable for sugar, tobacco, and other produce which only needs capital to open up. I have myself seen land well adapted for these purposes and within easy distance of the port.

IS Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified that he has received from the Right Honorable Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies a Circular Despatch, dated the 11th December, 1886, transmitting for publication in this Colony a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, dated the 26th day of November, 1886, for giving effect to the Treaty between Her Majesty and the President of the Republic of Guatemala for the Mutual Extradition of Fugitive Criminals, signed at Guatemala on the 4th of July last.

THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

Lord President. Earl of Rosslyn. Viscount Cross. Lord Stanley of Preston.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals. Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient; and that if by any law made after the passing of the Act of 1870 by the Legislature of any British possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the past by the Order in Council applying the said Acts in the case of any foreign State; or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Acts in the case of any foreign State; or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Acts in the case of any foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Acts, or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to such foreign State, and so long as such law continues in force there and no longer:

And whereas in accordance with section 18 of "The Extradition Act, 1870," the Legislature of the Dominion of Canada has, by laws passed in the years 1877 and 1882, and respectively styled "The Extradition Act, 1877," and "An Act to Amend the Extradition Act, 1877," made provision for carrying into effect within the Dominion the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in, or are suspected of being in, the Dominion : And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the fourth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, between Her Majesty and the President of the Republic of Guatemala, for the Mutual Extradition of Fugitive Criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following :--

HER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and His Excellency the President of the Republic of Gratemala, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice and to the prevention of crime within the two countries and their jurisdictions, that persons charged with or convicted of the crimes or offences hereinafter enumerated, and being fugitives from justice, should, under certain circumstances, be recipro-cally delivered up, have named as their Plenipotentiaries to conclude a Treaty (that is to say): Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Pritain and

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, James Plaister Harriss-Gastrell, Esquire, Her Britannic Majesty's Minister Resident and Consul-General to the Republic of Guatemala;

And his Excellency the President of the Republic of Guatemala, his Excellency Señor Don Manuel J. Dardon, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Guatemala;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles :--

ARTICLE I.

The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other, under the circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty, those persons who, being accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences enumerated in Article II committed in the territory of the one party, shall be found within the territory of the other party.

ARTICLE II.

The extradition shall be reciprocally granted for the following crimes or offences

1. Murder (including assassination, parricide, infanticide, poisoning, or attempt to murder).

2. Manslaughter.

3. Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of women.

4. Rape. 5. Aggravated or indecent assault. Carnal knowledge of a girl under the age of 10 years; carnal knowledge of a girl above the age of 10 years and under the age of 12 years; indecent assault upon any female, or any attempt to have carnal knowledge of a girl under 12 years of age.

6. Kichapping and false imprisonment, child-stealing, abandoning, exposing, or unlawfully detaining children.

7. Abduction of minors.

8. Bigamy.

9. Wounding, or inflicting grievous bodily harm.

10. Assaulting a Magistrate, or peace or public officer.

11. Threats, by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort money or other things of value.

12. Perjury or subornation of perjury.

13. Arson. 14. Burglary or housebreaking, robbery with violence, larceny or embezzlement.

15. Frand by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, director, member, or public officer of any company, made criminal by any law for the time being in force.

for the time being in force.
16. Obtaining money, valuable security, or goods by false pretences; receiving any money, valuable security, or other property knowing the same to have been stolen or unlawfully obtained.
17. (a.) Counterfeiting or altering money, or bringing into circulation counterfeited or altered money;
(b.) Forgery, or counterfeiting, or altering or uttering what is forged, counterfeited, or altered;
(c.) Knowingly making without lawful authority any instrument, tool, or engine adapted and intended for the counterfeiting of coin of the realm or national coin.
18. Crimes against Rentrumter Law

18. Crimes against Bankruptcy Law.

19. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger persons in a railway train.

20. Malicious injury to property if such offence be indictable.

21. Crimes committed at sea :-

(a.) Piracy by the law of nations;

(b.) Sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting or con-spiring to do so;

(c.) Revolt or conspiracy to revolt by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas against the authority of the master; (d.) Assault on board a ship on the high seas with intent to destroy life, or to do grievous bodily harm.

22. Dealing in slaves in such manner as to constitute an offence against the laws of both countries.

The extradition is also to take place for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes as an accessory before or after the fact, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both Contracting Parties.

ARTICLE III.

No Guatemalan shall be delivered up by the Government of Guatemala to the Government of the United Kingdom, and no subject of the United Kingdom shall be delivered up by the Government thereof to the Government of Guatemala.

ARTICLE IV.

The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed on the part of the Government of the United Kingdom, or the person claimed on the part of the Government of Guatemala, has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is still under trial in the territory of Guatemala or in the United Kingdom respectively for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

Which his extrantion is demanded. If the person claimed on the part of the Government of the United Kingdom, or on the part of the Government of Guatemala, should be under examination for any other crime in the territory of Guatemala or in the United Kingdom respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until the conclusion of the trial and the full execution of any punishment awarded to him.

ARTICLE V.

AKTICLE V. The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commis-sion of the crime, or the institution of the penal prosecution or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applied to.

ARTICLE VI.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact, been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

ARTICLE VII.

A person surrendered can in no case be kept in prison or be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made, for any other crime, or on account of any other matters, than those for which the extradition shall have taken place. This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition.

ARTICLE VIII.

The requisition for extradition shall be made through the Diplomatic Agents of the High Contracting Parties respectively.

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, accord-ing to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the erime had been committed there.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

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A requisition for extradition cannot be founded solely on sentences passed in contumaciam, but persons convicted for contumacy shall be deemed to be accused persons.

ARTICLE IX.

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive. The prisoner is then to be brought before a competent Magistrate, who is to examine him, and to conduct the preliminary investigation of the case, just as if the apprehension had taken place for a crime committed in the same country.

ARTICLE X.

ARTICLE X. A fugitive criminal may be apprehended under a warrant issued by any Police Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, or other competent authority in either country, on such information or complaint, and such evidence, or after such proceedings as would, in the opinion of the authority issuing the warrant, justify the issue of a warrant if the crime had been committed or the person convicted in that part of the dominions of the two Contracting Parties in which the Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, or other competent authority exercises juris-diction: provided, however, that in the United Kingdom the accursed shall, in such case, be sent as speedily as possible before a Police Magistrate in London. He shall, in accordance with this Article, be discharged, as well in Guatemala as in the United Kingdom, if within the term of thirty days a requisition for extradition shall not have been made by the Diplomatic Agent of his country in accordance with the stipulations of this Treaty. The same rule shall apply to the cases of persons accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences specified in this Treaty, and committed on the high seas on board any vessel of either country which may come into a port of the other.

ARTICLE XI.

ARTICLE XI. The extradition shall take place only if the evidence be found sufficient, according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committed of the prisoner for trial, in case the erime had been committed in the territory of the same State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition, and no criminal shall be surrendered until after the expiration of fifteen days from the date of his committed to prison to await the warrant for his surrender.

ARTICLE XII.

In the examinations which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the State applied to shall admit as entirely valid evidence the sworn depositions or statements of witnesses taken in the other State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, provided such documents purport to be signed or certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or Officer of such State, and are authenticated by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other Minister of State.

ARTICLE XIII.

If the individual claimed by one of the two High Contracting Parties, in pursuance of the present Treaty, should be also claimed by one or several other Powers, on account of other crimes or offences committed upon their respective territories, his extradition shall be granted to that State whose demand is earliest in date; unless any other arrange-ment should have been made between the different Governments to

determine the preference, either on account of the gravity of the crime or offence, or for any other reason. ARTICLE XIV.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within three months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, he shall be set at liberty.

ARTICLE XV.

All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery of such articles, be given up when the extradition takes place; and the said delivery shall extend, not merely to the stolen articles, but to everything that may serve as a proof of the crime.

ARTICLE XVI.

The High Contracting Parties renounce any claim for the reimburse-ment of the expenses incurred by them in the arrest and maintenance of the person to be surrendered, and his conveyance till placed on board ship; they reciprocally agree to bear such expenses themselves.

ARTICLE XVII.

The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the Colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any of such Colonies or foreign possessions shall be made to the Governor or chief authority of such Colony or possession by the Chief Consular Officer of the Republic of Guatemala in such Colony or possession.

Colony or possession. Such requisition may be disposed of, subject always, as nearly as may be, to the provisions of this Treaty, by the said Governor or chief authority, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender or to refer the matter to his Government. Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British Colonies and foreign possessions for the surrender of Gnatemalan criminals who may take refuge within such Colonies and foreign possessions, on the basis, as nearly as may be, of the provisions of the present Treaty.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal from any Colony or foreign possession of Her Britannic Majesty shall be governed by the rules laid down in the preceding Articles of the present Treaty.

ARTICLE XVIII.

The present Treaty shall come into force ten days after its publica-tion, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties, but shall remain in force for six months after notice has been given for its termination.

The Treaty, after receiving the approval of the Congress of Guate-mala, shall be ratified, and the ratification shall be exchanged at London as soon as possible.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seals of their arms.

Done at Guatemala, the fourth day of July, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

Provided always, and it is hereby further ordered that the operation of the said Acts shall be suspended within the Dominion of Canada, so far as relates to the Republic of Guatemala and to the said Treaty, and so long as the provisions of the Canadian Acts aforesaid continue in force, and no horder

Roads Board Districts.

EAST KIMBERLEY ROADS BOARD DISTRICT. All that portion of the Colony North of the 16th parallel of South Latitude.

WEST KIMBERLEY ROADS BOARD DISTRICT.

Bounded on the North by the 16th parallel of South Latitude. On the East by the 126th meridian of East Longitude. On the South by the parallel of 19° 30' South Latitude; and on the Westward by the Sea Coast, including the islands adjacent.

KIMBERLEY GOLDFIELD ROADS BOARD DIS-TRICT.

Bounded on the North by the 16th parallel of South Latitude. On the East by the Eastern boundary of the Colony (Longitude 129° East). On the South by the parallel of 19° 30' South Latitude; and on the West by the 126th meridian of East Longitude.

ROEBOURNE ROADS BOARD DISTRICT.

Bounded on the North by the parallel of 19° 30' South Latitude. On the West by the Sea Coast, including the islands adjacent to it. DARCELS POST between Western Australia and the United Kingdom, to come into force 21st February, 1887.

The following are the Regulations under which Parcels will be transmitted to, and received from the United Kingdom:—

1. Limit of weight of parcel, 11 lbs.

2. Limit of size of parcel-maximum, 3 feet 6 inches in length, or 6 feet in girth and length combined.

Maximum, 2 x 1 x 1 feet.

Minimum, 3 x 2 x 2 inches.

3. Postage:-

2 lbs. or under - - - - 2s.

Each additional 1 lb. or under - 1s.

The above rates must be fully prepaid by stamps affixed to the parcels.

4. The sender of any parcel will be required to sign a declaration, stating its contents and the value thereof, and a Registration fee of fourpence will be charged in addition to above rates on all parcels containing articles of value. Parcels with regard to which a false declaration is made may be confiscated. Parcels will only be forwarded at the risk of the owners.

5. Articles of a dangerous, damaging, or offensive character will not be received or delivered. All such prohibited articles may be forthwith confiscated.

6. No parcel may consist of, or contain two or more parcels, or other postal packets (of the same or of different descriptions) addressed to different persons, at different addresses. If such a parcel be discovered it will be sent forward charged with postage, at the unpaid rate, applicable to such contents.

7. Parcels will be received and delivered only at Post Offices accessible to Perth by rail or coach, and parcels received must be claimed at such offices.

8. Parcels on arrival in Western Australia will be sent to the officer at the Parcels Office, General Post Office, Perth, who will advise the addressees of their receipt, and that their contents will be examined (if desired, in the presence of the addressees or their agents).

9. In cases where Customs Dutics are payable, the same must be paid or remitted to the Parcels Officer as above, before the parcels are delivered or forwarded to any office in the Colony for delivery.

10. The necessary Customs entries will be passed free of cost to the addressees of parcels received.

11. Should any writing in the nature of a letter be found in any parcel, such parcel will be charged as an insufficiently paid letter.

12. When parcels are ready for delivery from the Parcels Office, Perth, or are forwarded for delivery from a Post Office, the addressees will be advised of the fact.

13. Parcels will be retained at the Post Offices to which they may be sent for delivery one month, when, if unclaimed, they will be re-transmitted to the Parcels Office, Perth. But such as may be refused by the addressees will be at once forwarded to that office.

14. If a parcel cannot be delivered, the sender will be advised and asked as to its disposal.

15. Parcels re-directed to another country will be surcharged with the ordinary parcel postage. Such surcharge, with any other charges to which the parcel has become liable, will be collected upon delivery, unless remitted by the sender or addressee to the country returning the parcel.

16. Parcels re-directed to another country with which arrangements have been made for the exchange of postal parcels, if the charges be not previously paid, are subjected by the delivering office to a charge to be paid by the addressees, representing the rate of postage from the office of re-direction to the place of delivery.

17. Parcels which cannot be delivered, or redirected, or returned to the sender (under regulation 15), will be sent back to the country whence they came.

18. Parcels must be booked one hour before the closing of the mail by which they are intended to be forwarded.
