BY-LAW FOR THE REGULATION OF TENTS, ETC., WITHIN THE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF PERTH.

Preamble.

Whereas it is expedient to regulate the erection of tents, pavilions, sheds, and structures of calico, canvas, and other inflammable material within the Municipality of the City of Perth, and to confine the erection of the same within prescribed limits, and to provide for the cleanliness of such tents, &c., in pursuance of the Statute 59 Victoria, No. 10, the following By-law has been passed by the Council of the City of Perth.

No tents, &c., to be erected without License.

1. No tent, pavilion, shed, or other structure of calico, canvas, or other inflammable material shall be erected or re-erected or be allowed to remain if already erected by any person or persons within the limits of the Municipality of the City of Perth without obtaining the consent thereto of the Council, by its Town Clerk, for such time and upon such terms as the Council may decide; and any person offending against this By-law shall, upon conviction of every such against this By-law shall, upon conviction of every such offence, forfeit and pay a sum of not less than Five shillings nor more than Two pounds: Provided that nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the erection by the Council of the said City on the public lands thereof or by the Government on any Government reserve, for temporary purposes, of any such tent, pavilion, shed, or structure aforesaid. Conditions.

2. All persons having obtained permission to erect tents on the Reserves set apart by the City Council must conform to the following conditions:—To pay a sum of Five shillings a month, in advance, as a license fee and rate for sanitary services in respect of any closet which may be erected by themselves, and in cases where such closet is supplied by the City Council, then a fee of Seven shillings and sixpence, payable as aforesaid.

Position of Tents.

3. All tents erected on such Reserves must be placed in such positions as the Health Inspector or other officer may direct.

Revoke License.

4. The City Council retains to itself the right to cancel any license granted, and remove any tent erected on any of

Latrines.

5. Latrines may be erected by the Council, and attended to by the Sanitary Department, for the use of all occupiers of tents on the said Reserves.

By-Laws.

For the Regulation of the Construction of Buildings in the Municipality of Geraldton, under the provisions of "The Building Act, 1884," and "The Building Act Amendment Act, 1887."

Interpretation Clause.

1. The several words mentioned in the second Section of the Building Act, 1884, shall, where used in these By-laws, have the same construction as is provided for by such section, except that the words "Council," "Mayor," "Town Clerk" and "Surveyor" shall mean the Council, Mayor, Town Clerk or Surveyor, respectively, of the Municipality of Geraldton.

Notice of intention to build.

2. Every person intending to commence to build, take down, alter, add to, or repair any building, or do any act whereby any public street may be obstructed or rendered dangerous or inconvenient to persons passing over or near thereto shall give three clear days' notice, in writing, to the Town Surveyor of his intention so to do. Such notice shall be delivered at the Town Surveyor's office, and shall contain particulars of the site and nature of such intended building, work, or other act, and shall be in form "A" of the Schedule hereto. The Surveyor shall thereupon give such directions as he shall think fit for the erection of hoardings or fences, and a platform and handrail for the protection of passengers, and such directions shall be complied with to the satisfaction of the Surveyor before the commencement of such building, work, or act. Every breach of this By-law shall subject the person guilty of such breach to a penalty of £5, and a further penalty of £1 for each day the same continues, recoverable in a summary manner before Justices.

Notice of intention to use area in public street, &c., for deposit of materials.

3. Every person wishing to deposit any stones, bricks, lime, rubbish, timber, iron, or other materials on any public street, or to make any excavation on any land abutting on or adjoining or contiguous to any public street shall first make application for and obtain from the Surveyor a license so to do. Such application and license shall be made in the form "B" in the Schedule hereto; and in such application he shall state the place and extent of the site he wishes to so occupy, and shall pay the fees for such site according to the scale marked "C" in the Schedule, and shall then occupy the site subject to the conditions stated in such license. Any infringement of this By-law shall subject the person guilty of such infringement to a fine of £5 for every day such infringement continues, to be recovered in a summary manner before Justices.

$Hoardings\ to\ be\ kept\ in\ repair.$

4. Every person who shall be required to erect any hoarding, fence, platform, or handrail under the two last preceding By-laws shall keep the same in good and sufficient repair to the satisfaction of the Surveyor so long as it shall, in his opinion, be necessary for the public safety; and every such person shall, immediately upon receipt of notice from the Surveyor that such hoarding, fence, platform, or handrail is out of repair and requiring him to repair same, repair the same to the satisfaction of the Surveyor, and shall be liable to a penalty of £1 for every day the same shall continue in disrepair after the receipt by him of such notice.

Hoardings, &c., to be lighted.

5. Every person erecting such hoarding, fence, platform, or handrail, or obstruction of any kind in the public street, or any excavation as aforesaid, shall cause the same to be well and sufficiently lighted at night, and shall be liable to a penalty of £1 for every night on which the same is not so lighted.

Deposit to be made to cover cost of removing deposits, &c.

6. Every person erecting such hoarding, fence, platform, or handrail, or obstruction of any kind in the public street, shall pay to the Council, before the commencement of such

erection or work, such sum as in the opinion of the Surveyor will be sufficient to remove the same, and fill up any excavation, and repair any damage done to the public street, and if any person shall, within a reasonable time, fail to remove the same, or fill up such excavation, and repair any damage done to the street, the sum so paid by him shall be forfeited to the Council, who may thereupon proceed to remove the same, and fill up any excavation and repair any damage done to the public street.

Power to Surveyor to enforce preceding By-laws.

7. It shall be lawful for the Surveyor, without reference to the Council, to take immediate steps to enforce any of the preceding By-laws, and he may cause any such hoarding, or other obstruction that has been erected without his license, or which has been erected, or continued in breach of the conditions of any such license, to be removed, or any such excavation to be filled in, or injuries to the public street repaired at the cost and expense of the person erecting or making the same, and such costs and expenses shall be recoverable from the person so making the same, as well as the penaltics hereinbefore imposed.

Notice of intention to build, &c.

8. Every person intending to erect any building or to alter or add to any building now erected within the city boundaries shall, one week before commencing to erect or alter or add to the same, deposit with the Surveyor drawings showing the plan, elevation, and section of such proposed building, together with full and complete specifications thereof, and also a plan of the locality showing the position of such building as provided for by Section 5 of the Building Act Amendment Act, 1887, and shall also therewith pay to the Surveyor fees provided therefor in the Schedule hereto: And no buildings shall hereafter be erected or re-erected and built within the city so far as regards putting walls, height and thickness of parapets, external walls, and flues and fireplaces in any such buildings, except upon the terms and conditions of these By-laws and the Schedule hereto, which Schedule shall be read as part of these By-laws, and any person offending herein shall forfeit and pay for each offence, a sum not less than £5 nor more than £10.

Buildings to be divided into three classes.

9. All buildings of whatever kind, subject to the provisions of these By-laws, shall be deemed to belong to one or other of the three following classes, that is to say:—

FIRST CLASS.

If building be built originally as a dwelling house, or for an office, or suits, or sets of chambers, or offices, or be occupied or intended to be occupied as such, then it is to be deemed to belong to the first or dwelling house class.

SECOND CLASS.

If a building be built originally as a warehouse, storehouse, granary, brewery, distillery, manufactory, workshop, or public stable, or be occupied or intended to be occupied as such or for a similar purpose, then it is to be deemed to belong to the second or warehouse class.

THIRD CLASS.

If a building be built originally as a church, chapel, or other place of public worship, college, hall, hospital, theatre, public concert room, public ball room, public lecture room, public exhibition room, or occupied or intended to be occupied as such, or for a similar purpose, or otherwise used or intended to be used, either temporarily or permanently, for the assemblage of persons in large numbers, whether for purposes of public worship, business, instruction, debate, diversion, or resort, then it is to be deemed to belong to the third or public building class.

ALTERATION OF CLASS.

And if any room, whether constructed within any building or not, and whether included in the aforesaid classes or not, to be used at any time for the public or general congregation of persons, then the building containing such room is to be deemed a building of the third or public building class. Or if a building, originally built or subsequently altered so as to bring it within any one class, be subsequently converted into or used as a building of another class, then it is to be deemed to belong to such other class, and as to it all the conditions prescribed with regard to buildings of the same rate of such other class must be fulfilled as if it had been originally built of such class, subject nevertheless to such modifications as shall be sanctioned by the surveyor on supervision thereof. Or if a building be used partly as a dwelling house and partly for any purpose which would bring it within the second or warehouse class, then it is to

be deemed to belong to the said second or warehouse class, and as to it all the conditions prescribed with regard to buildings of the same rate of such class must be fulfilled as if it had been originally built of such class, subject nevertheless to such modifications as shall be sanctioned by the surveyor on supervision thereof.

Rates in different classes.

10. The buildings included in the said classes are to be deemed to belong to the rates of those classes, and shall be built in manner according to the conditions of height, area, and number of stories set forth in the tables set out in the Schedule hereto, which conditions are to be determined according to the following rules:—

RULES FOR ASCERTAINING HEIGHT.

(a.) The height of every building is to be ascertained by measuring from the surface of the lowest floor of the building up to the top of the wall plate for receiving the roof.

RULE FOR ASCERTAINING AREA.

(b.) The area of every building (except the second or warehouse class) is to be determined by the number of squares contained in the surface of any floor which shall contain the greatest number of squares at or above the principal entrance to such building, including in such surface the area of all the external walls and such portions of the party walls as belong to such building; but excluding from such surface the area of any attached building or office, area, balcony, or open portice.

RULE FOR ASCERTAINING THE CAPACITY OF ANY BUILDING OF THE SECOND CLASS.

(c.) The capacity or cubical contents of any such building is to be ascertained by measuring within the walls at the surface of the floor at the principal entrance of such building and from the surface of the lowest floor to the top of the wall plate for receiving the roof.

RULE FOR ASCERTAINING NUMBER OF STORIES.

(d.) The stories of every building are to be counted from the foundation upwards: And if the space in height between the top of the footing and the level of the lowest floor does not exceed 5ft, then the story nearest the foundation is to be considered the lowest or first story, and in that case the top of the footing is to be considered the level of the lowest floor.

RULE FOR ASCERTAINING THICKNESS OF WALLS.

(e.) The thickness or width of every wall, and of the footing thereof is to be ascertained by measuring only the thickness or width of such walls or footings as shall have been originally built.

Capacity of Buildings of Second Class.

11. With regard to any building of the second class hereafter built or re-built in reference to the capacity or contents thereof within the same enclosing walls.—Such building shall not contain more than 400,000 cubic feet between the enclosing walls of such building, and where such building exceeds 200,000 cubic feet the walls thereof shall be increased 4 inches in thickness from the foundation upward beyond the thickness prescribed in the conditions in the Schedule hereto, part 3 for buildings not containing more than 200,000 cubic feet.

Buildings of Third Class.

12. If any building of the third or public building class correspond in form or structure or disposition with a dwelling-house then the rate thereof is to be determined by the same rule as the rates of the first or dwelling-house class, and the thickness of the external and party walls, and the width of the footings thereof are to be at the least four inches more than is required for the external and party walls, and the footings thereof of buildings of the same rate of the first or dwelling-house class unless the Surveyor in each case shall otherwise appoint: But if it correspond in form or structure or disposition with a warehouse or any building of the second class, then the rate thereof is to be determined by the same rules as the rates of the second or warehouse class, and the thickness of the external and party walls and the width of the footings thereof are to be at the least 4 inches more than is hereby registered for the external and party walls and the footings thereof of buildings of the same rate of the second or warehouse class, unless the Surveyor in each case shall otherwise appoint: But if it do not correspond in form and structure, or in either with buildings of the first or second class or any of them, then

such building is to be subject, as to its walls or other construction, to the special approval of the Surveyor, and every building of the third class shall be constructed with proper and sufficient escape doors to afford egress therefrom in case of fire, such doors, and the approaches thereto, to be so constructed to the satisfaction of the Surveyor in each case, and such doors shall, during the use of such building for the purpose of any assembly of people, be kept unfastened and so that they may be readily opened from the inside, and such doors shall in all cases be constructed so as to open outward.

Foundations of Walls.

- 13. With regard to the foundations of walls.—Every external wall and every party wall and every party fence wall must be built upon a constructed footing based upon solid ground or upon other sufficient foundation.
 - (a.) With regard to footings of walls in reference to the materials thereof, every footing must be built of brick or stone or artificial stone, or of such bricks and stone together laid in with mortar or cement in such manner as to produce solid work.
 - (b.) In reference to the width thereof, the bottom of the footing of every external wall and party wall of the first rate must be at the least Sin. wider than the wall standing thereon; and the bottom of every footing of every external wall and party wall of the second and third rates must be at the least 6in. wider than the wall standing thereon; and the bottom of the footing of every external wall and party wall of the fourth rate, and of every party fence wall, must be at the least 4in. wider than the wall standing thereon; and the top of the footing of every party fence wall and of every external wall and party wall must be at least 4in. wider than the wall standing thereon; and no footing of any external wall shall be built more than 2in. on the ground of the adjoining owner.
 - (c.) In reference to the height above the foundation the footing of every external wall and party wall must not be brought up nearer to the surface of the ground area or footway adjoining thereto than 3in. The footing of every external wall and party wall of the first rate must be at the least 11in. high above the foundation. The footing of every external wall and party wall of the second and third rates must be at the least 8in. high above the foundation. The footing of every party fence wall, and of every external wall and party wall of the fourth rate, must be at least 5in. high above the foundation.
 - (d.) In reference to the depth thereof below the surface of the lowest floor adjoining or intended to adjoin thereto, the top of the footing of every external wall must be at the least 6in. below such surface, and in any buildings of the first class the surface of the earth or of any paving on the outside, except the pavement of any public way, must not at any time be raised to within 6in. of the surface of the lowest or first floor of such building.

Enclosing Walls of Buildings of first and second class.

14. With regard to the enclosing walls to stories of buildings of the first and second classes.—Each of the enclosing walls of any such story throughout the whole height thereof, from the top of the footing up to the top of such story, and with all the sets off in addition required for such wall to whatever rate or whichever class it may belong, and throughout at least one-third of the whole length of such wall in piers properly distributed, must be of the following dimensions (unless cross or return walls, coursed and bonded with the enclosing walls, shall, in the opinion of the Surveyor, upon application to him in each particular case, give sufficient strength with less thickness in such enclosing walls), that is to say:—As to first class buildings, if the height of the story be more than 11ft., then the thickness of its enclosing walls must be at the least 14in.; or if the story be in height more than 15ft., then the thickness of its enclosing walls must be at the least 17½in. As to second class buildings, if the story be in height more than 12ft., then the thickness of its enclosing walls must be at the least 17½in.; or if the story be in height more than 12ft., then the thickness of its enclosing walls must be at the least 17½in.; or if the story be in height more than 20ft., then the thickness of its enclosing walls must be at the least 21½in. Nevertheless, as to any external wall of any building of the first class in which there are no apertures or recesses, if there be another external wall and a cross wall of not less than 8½in. thick coursing and bonding with such external wall, or if two such cross walls occur within 24ft. of such wall, then such

external wall may be built of the thickness of 13in. of any height not exceeding 18ft. within any story, although the rate of the wall may require a greater thickness, but always upon the condition that the substructure of such wall is 4in. thicker at the least than such superstructure and vertically under it: And also, if any such wall be abutted by cross or return walls within a length of 12ft., and not more than one aperture or recess occur in such 12ft., and not more than one-half the quantity in length be taken out of such compartment of a wall by such aperture or recess, then such external wall may be built of any thickness not less than 13in., notwithstanding the rate of such wall may require a greater thickness.

Materials of external walls.

15. With regard to the component materials of external walls to buildings of whatever class.—Every such wall must be built of brick or stone or artificial stone, or such brick or stone or artificial stone together laid in and with mortar or cement in such manner as to produce solid work, and every such wall must be carried up of its full thickness to the underside of the plate under the roof. Nevertheless, in such walls recesses may be formed so that the back thereof be of the thickness of 8½in., and so that the stability and sufficiency of the wall be not injuriously affected by making such recesses.

Wood, &c., in external walls.

16. With regard to other substances than the component materials of external walls.—There may be such wood and iron as shall be necessary, and every plate, lentel, bond, corbel, being of wood, and every wood brick laid into any external wall, and all the ends of joists, of girders, and of the heads of sills and partitions running into any external walls must be fixed at a distance from the external face of the wall of 4in. at the least, except ceiling joists, which may go through the wall provided a sufficient corbel be formed to separate one building from another at the line of the party and external walls: And the frames of doors and windows must be fixed in reveals at a distance from the external face of the wall of 4in. at the least: And shop fronts must be built in such manner as is herein specially directed: And the tiers of door cases to warehouses must be fixed in the opening left in such wall, at a distance from the external face of the wall of 2in. at least: But no timber must be laid into any external wall in such manner or of such length as to render the part of the wall above it wholly or in great part dependent upon the wood for support, or so that any such wood might not be withdrawn without endangering the safety of the superincumbent structure, except in the case of brestsummers.

${\it Height and thickness of parapets.}$

17. With regard to external walls in reference to the height and thickness of any parapet thereon.—If an external wall adjoin a gutter, then such external wall must be carried up and remain 1ft. at the least above the highest part of such gutter, and the thickness of an external wall so carried up above the level of the underside of the gutter plate, and forming a parapet, must be at the least in every such wall of the first rate of the second class 13in. thick, and in every other external wall, of whatever rate or whichever class, 8½in. thick.

Materials to be used in re-building.

18. With regard to old external walls or other external enclosures of any buildings already built in reference to the materials used in the repair thereof.—If any such wall or enclosure be not built of the materials required by this Act for external walls or other external enclosures hereafter to be built, then every part of such wall or other external enclosure (except the enclosure of roofs and the flats, gutters, dormers, turrets, lantern lights, and other erections thereon) may be at all times thereafter repaired with materials of the same sort as those of which such external wall or enclosure has been already built.

Materials to be used in repair.

19. But if any such external wall or enclosure be at any time hereafter taken down or otherwise demolished for the height of one story, or for a space equal to one-fourth of the whole surface of such external wall, then every part thereof not built in the manner and of the several materials by these By-laws directed for external walls must be taken down, and the same must be re-built in such manner and of such materials for and in all respects as by these By-laws directed for external walls hereafter to be built, according to the class and rate of the building to which such external wall or enclosure shall belong.

External wall used as party wall.

20. With regard to external walls used as party walls to any building adjoining thereto (except an attached building or office, as is hereafter described.—If the external wall of any building have not such footings, and be not of such height and thicknesses, or be not built of such manner and of such materials as are herein directed for party walls of buildings

of the highest rate to which such wall shall adjoin, then such external wall must not be used as a party wall for any such building, but there must be a distinct external wall built as herein described for external walls of the rate to which it shall belong: But if such external walls to any building already built be at the least 13in. in thickness in every part, and be of sound and proper materials and in good condition, then such wall may be used as a party wall; but if the house of which such wall forms a part be re-built within five years from the time at which such wall shall have been so first used as a party wall, then such wall must become subject to the provisions of these By-laws in respect of party walls, according to the class and rate to which the said wall did first belong.

Dividing walls.

21. With regard to walls used to divide single buildings into two or more.—If it be intended to divide any building into two or more distinct parts, then every wall for that purpose must be built as a party wall in the manner and of the materials and of the several heights and thicknesses for party walls of the highest rate of building to which such party wall shall belong or adjoin, as prescribed in reference to the thickness of party walls in the conditions set forth in the Schedule hereto: And if any building already built, or which shall be hereafter built, be converted, used, or occupied as two or more separate buildings, each having a separate entrance or staircase, such conversion, use, or occupation not having been made or not having taken place prior to this By-law coming into operation, then every such building shall be deemed to be two or more separate houses, and such separate houses must be divided from each other by a party wall or party arch or arches, built in the manner and of the materials required for party walls or for party arches for the class and rate to which the largest of the buildings so divided shall belong.

Party walls, with reference to site thereof.

21a. With regard to party walls, with reference to the site thereof.—If the buildings be of equal rate, then such party walls must be built on the line of junction of such buildings—one half on the ground of the owner of one of such buildings and one half on the ground of the owner of the other of such buildings. If such buildings be of different rates, then such wall must be built on the line of junction thereof as follows:—That is to say, one-half of the thickness of the wall required for the building of the lower rate on the ground of each of the adjoining owners, and the whole of the additional thickness of the wall required for the building of the higher rate on the ground of the owner of such building of the higher rate; And if such building of the lower rate be thereafter enlarged or altered so as to become a building of the higher rate, then the owner of such firstmentioned building of the higher rate for the time being shall be entitled to receive from the owner of such building of the lower rate such sum of money as shall be sufficient compensation for the ground occupied by that portion of the party wall which, according to the rate of the building enlarged, ought to have been built by its owner on his own ground as well as the value of so much of the wall itself as may be more than the owner of such building of the lower rate had already paid for.

${\it Materials~of~party~walls.}$

22. Party walls in reference to the component materials thereof.—Every part of such party wall must be built of sound bricks or stone or artificial stone, or of such bricks or stone or artificial stone together laid in and with mortar or cement, and in such manner as to produce solid work: And as to the woodwork which it may be desired to connect with the party walls of any building, the bearing ends of wooden beams, brestsummers, girders, trimming joists, and the ends of partitions, heads and sills, and the bearing ends of the main timbers of any roof and wood bricks may be laid into the substance of a party wall; but no such beam, brestsummer, girder, joist, partition, head, or sill, nor any part of a roof being wood, nor any wood bricks, must be laid or placed within 2in. of the centre of any party wall; and no other woodwork of any kind must be laid into, placed upon, or be run or driven into any part of the substance of any party wall: But if the ends of timbers be carried in iron shoes or stone corbels, then such iron shoes or stone corbels must be built into the wall at least one-half the thickness of such wall; and the top of every such party wall must be finished with one course of sound, hard bricks, set on edge in good mortar or cement, or by a coping of any other properly secured and sufficiently water-proof and fire-proof covering.

Height of party walls.

23. With regard to the party walls, with reference to the height thereof.—If a party wall adjoin any roof, then such party wall must be carried up and remain 1ft. 6in. at the least above the part where the party wall and roof adjoin, measured at a right angle with the back of the rafters of such roof: And if any party wall in any building of the first

class adjoin a gutter, then such party wall must be carried up and remain 2ft. at the least above the highest part of any such gutter: And if any party wall in any building of the second class adjoin a gutter, then such party wall must be carried up and remain 3ft. at least above the highest part of any such gutter. If there be fixed within 5ft. of a party wall, upon the flat or roof of a building, any turret, dormer, lantern light, or other erection of combustible materials, then every such party wall must be carried up next to every such turret, dormer, lantern light, or other erection, and must extend 1ft. 6in. higher and 1ft. 6in. wider than any such erection on each side thereof.

Openings in party walls.

24. For the purpose of regulating the making of openings through any party wall between one dwelling-house and another, whereby two or more dwelling-houses shall be united with regard to any dwelling-houses of any rate, such dwelling-houses may be united by openings in the party walls, and with regard to any such dwelling-houses which, when so united, shall be and continue to be in the same occupation, then, upon its being declared by the Surveyor that, in his opinion, the stability of any or either of such dwelling-houses will not be endangered by such opening, they may be made accordingly.

Recesses, &c., in party walls.

- 25. With regard to recesses and chases in any party wall. In every story recesses may be formed, but only with the consent and authority of the Surveyor first had been obtained, and so that such recesses be arched over, and so that the back of any such recess be not nearer than 7 inches to the centre of the party wall in the 1st or lowest story, or nearer than 4 inches to the centre of the party wall in any other story, and so that the stability and sufficiency of such party wall be not injuriously affected thereby. If any chases be required for the insertion of ends of walls, of piers, of chimney jambs, of withes, of flues, of metal pipes, or of iron story posts, then every chase for any such purpose must not be left or cut nearer than 4 inches at the least to the centre of a party wall, nor within a distance of 9 inches at the least from any front or back wall, and no such chases must be made within a distance of 7ft. 6in. at the least from each other on the same side of a wall, and no such chase must be formed wider than 9 inches.
- 26. With regard to any building already built having rooms, the property of different owners, which lie intermixed without being separated by any party wall.—If any such building be altogether rebuilt, or to the extent of quarter of the cubical contents thereof, then such intermixed properties must be separated from each other by a party wall constructed in conformity to these By-laws.

$Projections\ from\ Buildings.$

With regard to buildings hereafter to be built or re--In reference to projections therefrom as to copings, parapets, cornices to overhanging roofs, blocking courses, parapers, columns, pilasters, entablatures, facias, door and window dressings, or other architectural decorations, forming part of an external wall; all such must be built of the same materials as are by these By-laws directed to be used for building external walls, to which such projections belong or of such other proper and sufficient materials as the Surveyor may approve and permit, and as to all verandahs, porches, porticoes, shop fronts, open enclosures of open areas, and steps and waterpipes, and to all other projections from external walls, not forming part thereof, every such projection must be built of brick tile, stone, artificial stone, slate, cement, or metal, or other fireproof material, and such projections must be so built as not to overhang the ground belonging to any other owner nor to obstruct the light or air, or to be otherwise injurious to the owner or occupier of the buildings adjoining thereto on any side thereof, nor shall any such projections extend beyond the building line at any height less than 10ft. from the level of the public footway, nor encroach upon the building line of any public footway, except that the base or plinth thereof may project beyond the building line to an extent of 4in. in streets of 99ft. width, and 2½in. in streets of less width, and no projections, including steps, cellar doors, and area enclosure, are to encroach upon the building line of any public footway, and no verandah must approach nearer to the end of the house to which it belongs than 2 feet, unless built wholly of fireproof material or separated from any adjoining verandah or premises by putting walls at least Sin. in thickness, and with regard to the projecting caves of any building built of brick or stone, such eaves may project beyond the face of the external wall, provided such eaves be at least 5ft. from the ground, not in the same occupation, and be at least 10 feet clear from the eaves of any other building built of brick or stone, and 18 feet from the eaves and walls of any wooden building.

Projections from buildings.

And with regard to buildings already built or hereafter to be built as to bow windows or other projections of any kind.

Such projections must neither be built with or added to any building or any face of an external wall thereof so as to extend beyond the building line in any street, except so far as is hereinbefore provided with regard to projections from face wall and shop fronts, nor so as to overhang the from face wall and shop fronts, nor so as to overhang the ground belonging to any other owner, nor so as to obstruct the light and air, or be otherwise injurious to the owners or occupiers of the buildings adjoining thereto on any side thereof: Provided, however, with regard to any insulated buildings that if the projections be at the least 8ft. from any public way, and if they be at the least 30 feet from any other building not in the same occupation, then such projections are excepted from the rules and directions of this By-law. By-law.

Shop fronts, &c.

29. With regard to shop fronts and their entablatures, their shutters and stall boards made of wood.—If the street or alley in which such front is situate be of less width than 33ft., then no such shop front must be higher in any part thereof than 15ft.; nor must any part, except the cornice, project from the face of the wall, whether there be an area of or not more than 2in.; nor must the cornice project therefore more than 8in. If the street or alley be of greater width than 33ft., then no part of such shop front, except the cornice, must project from the face of the wall, whether there be an area or not, more than 4in.; nor must the cornice project therefrom more than 12in.: And the woodwork of any shop front must not be fixed nearer than 9in. to the face of an external wall, or nearer than 4½in. to the centre line of a party wall: And with regard to such woodwork, if it be put up at such distance of 4½in., then a pier or corbel, built of stone or brick or incombustible material to commence at the level of the underside of the material, to commence at the level of the underside of the plinth or bottom of the wood pilaster, and to be of the width of 8½in. at the least, must be fixed in the line of the party wall so as to be as high as such woodwork, and so as to project lin. at the least in front of the face thereof: And the height of every shop front must be ascertained by measuring from the level of the public footway or pavement in front of the building: And no showboard or signboard shall be affixed to the front of any building so as to extend over any public footway or nearer than 2ft. to the end of such building, unless such showboard or signboard abut against a brick or stone corbel, pier, or pilaster, 9in. in thickness and projecting lin. beyond the face of such showmaterial, to commence at the level of the underside of the thickness and projecting lin. beyond the face of such show-board or signboard and carried up to the full height of the

Chimneys.

With regard to chimneys and chimney stacks (except angle chimneys) with reference to the construction foundation and footings of every such chimney and chimney stack must be built similar to those of the wall in or adjoining to which it shall be, and every such chimney and chimney stack must be built from the foundation to the top thereof without any corbelling over, whereby any upper part of the brickwork of such chimney or chimney stack shall overhang any lower part of the brickwork on the front shall overhang any lower part of the brickwork on the front thereof. Nevertheless, with regard to buildings of the first or dwelling-house class, the jambs, breast, and flue in any single chimney may be built upon stone or iron corbels above the ceiling of the 2nd story of every such building; but the projection of both of such jambs and breasts must not in any case exceed 14in. before the face of the wall or tack to which the came shell adiging. And with prograd to stack to which the same shall adjoin: And with regard to angle chimneys, such chimneys may be built in the internal angle of any building, so that the width of the breast thereof do not exceed 8ft., and so that it be properly supported on iron girders with brick arches, or on strong stone landings not less than 4in. thick, and tailed at least 9in. into each of the two walls forming such angle.

Chimney Jambs.

31. In regard to chimneys with reference to the dimensions of the jambs thereof.—The jambs of every chimney shall not be less than 8½in. wide on each side of such opening: And with regard to chimneys and flues in reference to the thickness of the brickwork thereof, the breast of every chimney and the front, back, width, or partition of every flue must be at least 4in. in thickness of bricks, and the joints of the work must be filled in with good mortar or cement, and all the inside thereof, and also the outside or face thereof next the interior of any building, must be rendered or pargetted: And with regard to flues in reference to the dimensions thereof, no flue may be used for a smoke flue which is of less internal diameter in any section than 8½in.

Timber in Chimneys.

32. With regard to chimneys in reference to timber .- No timber must be placed over any opening for supporting the breast of any chimney; but there must be an arch of brick

or stone over the opening of every such chimney to support the breast thereof; and an iron bar must be built into the jambs at the least 9in. on each side, to tie in the abutments whenever the breast projects more than 4½in. from the face of the wall, and the jamb on either side is of less width than two-thirds of the opening: And no timber or wood-work must be placed or laid in any wall under any chimneyopening within 18in. at least of the surface of the hearth to the fire-place of such chimney-opening: And as to the timber or woodwork in reference to the fixing thereof in or against any wall containing flues, or against any chimney breast or chimney jamb, if timber or woodwork be affixed to the front of any jamb or mantel, or to the front or back of any chimney or flue, then it must be fixed by iron nails or holdfasts, or other iron fastenings, which must not be or be driven nearer than 4in. to the inside of any flue or to the opening of any chimney, and such timber or woodwork must not be nearer than 2in. to the opening or any chimney, and no timber must be laid or placed within 3in. of the face or breast, back, side, or jamb of any flue, or of any chimney-opening where the substance of brickwork or stonework shall be less than 8½ in. thick; nor must any flooring, batten, ground skirting or other lining or fitting of wood, nor any wood staircase or anything else of wood, be fixed or placed against or near to the face or breast, back, side, or jamb of any flue, fire-place, or chimney-opening unless and until the brick or stone work constituting the same shall have been well and sufficiently rendered or pargetted with proper mortar or stucco, and such rendering must be in every case in addition to 4in. at least of solid fire-proof structure.

Hearthstone.

33. A slab or slabs of brick, tile, stone, slate, marble, or other proper and sufficient substance at the least 12in. longer than the opening of every chimney when finished, and at the least 18in, in front of the arch over the same must be laid before the opening of every chimney: And in every floor, except the lowest floor, such slab or slabs must be laid wholly upon stone or iron bearers or upon brick frimmers; but in the lowest floor they may be laid on a brick fender or bedded on the solid ground: And the hearth of every chimney must be laid and bedded wholly on brick or stone or other incombustible substance, which must be solid for a thickness of 9in, at least beneath the surface of any such hearth.

Backs of Chimneys.

34. As to the back of any chimney-opening of every building (except backs of chimneys of the lowest story of buildings of the 4th rate).—Every such back in the lowest story must be at the least 13in, thick from the hearth to the height of 12in, above the mantel, and in every other story at the least 8½in, thick up to the same relative height: And as to the backs of chimney-openings in the lowest story of buildings of the fourth rate, such backs must be at the least 8½in, thick to the height of 12in, at the least above the level of the mantel. If two chimneys be built back to back, then the thickness between the same must be at the least of the thickness hereinbefore described for the back of one chimney-opening.

Flues in Chimneys.

35. As to flues in reference to the angles thereof.—If any flue be built with sufficient openings in it of not less size than 9in. square, and proper close iron doors and frames inserted in such openings, so that every part of such flue may be swept by machinery, then every angle of such flue may be of any degree; but if it is not so built, then every such angle must be 135 degrees at the least: And every salient or projecting angle within a flue must be rounded off 4in. at the least, and protected by a rounded stone or iron bar.

Ovens, furnaces, &c.

36. As to every oven, furnace, cokel, or close fire used for the purpose of trade or manufacture.—It must be at the least 6in. distant from any party wall, and must not be upon or within a distance of 18in. of any timber or woodwork; and the floor on or above which such oven, furnace, cokel, or close fire shall be built or fixed, must be formed and paved under and for a distance of 2ft. all round the same with stone, brick, tile, or slate at the least 2in. thick, or other proper incombustible and non-conducting materials.

Height of chimneys, &c.

37. Every chimney, shaft, or flue hereafter built, raised or repaired, must be carried up in brick or stonework all round at the least 4in, thick, to a height of not less than 3ft. above the highest part of such portion of the roof, flat, or gutter adjoining thereto, measured at the point of junction: And as to any chimney, shaft (except that of a steam engine, brewery, distillery or manufactory), the brick or stonework of such shaft or flue must not be built higher than 8ft. above the slope, flat, or gutter of the roof which it adjoins, measured from the highest point of junction,

unless such chimney shaft shall be built of increased thickness, or be built with and bonded to another chimney shaft, or be otherwise rendered secure: And as to the chimney shaft for the boiler furnace of any steam engine, or for any brewery, distillery or manufactory, such shaft may be erected of any height so that it be built in such manner and of such strength and dimensions as shall be satisfactory to the surveyor upon special application in each case.

Chimney Pots.

38. As to earthern or metal chimney pots, tubes, funnels, or cowls of any description whatsoever.—If such pot, tube, funnel, or cowl be higher than 4ft. above the brick or stone work of the flue upon which the same shall be placed then it must be fixed 2ft. at the least into the brick or stone work of the flue on which it shall be placed.

Metal, Steam, &c., Pipes.

39. As to any metal or other pipe or funnel for conveying smoke, heated air, or steam.—Such pipe or funnel must not be fixed against or in front of any face of any building in any street or alley, nor on the inside of any building nearer than 14in. to any timber or other combustible material.

Cutting Chimney Shafts, &c.

40. As to every chimney shaft, jamb, breast, or flue already built, or which shall be hereafter built, in reference to cutting the same.—No such erection shall be cut into for any other purpose than the repair thereof, or for the formation of soot doors, or for letting in, removing, or altering stove pipes or smoke jacks, except as directed for building an external wall against an old sound party wall, and except for inserting a ventilating valve, such cutting not to be nearer than 6in. to any timber or other combustible substance, and that every part of such valve be made and fixed with incombustible materials.

Roof Coverings, &c.

41. With regard to roof coverings in reference to the materials thereof.—If the external parts of any roof, flat, or gutter of any building, or of any projection therefrom, or of any projection therefrom, or of any dormer, turret, lantern light, or other erection on the roof or flat of any building be hereafter built or rebuilt, stripped, ripped, or uncovered, then every such part (except the door frames and doors, window frames and sashes of such turrets, dormers, lantern lights, or other erections) must be covered with slates, tiles, or hardwood, shingles, metal, glass, artificial stone, or cement, and such excepted parts shall be made of such wood as shall be necessary.

Roofs to Buildings.

42. With regard to the roof, flat, and autter of any building, and of any projection therefrom, and also balconics, verandahs, and shop fronts.—They must be so arranged and constructed, and so supplied with gutters and pipes as to prevent the water therefrom dropping on, out, or running over any public way, and all such rain pipes, caves, and gutters are to be made of metal.

Drains to Buildings.

43. With regard to the drains of buildings of any class, and of every addition thereto.—Before the several walls of any such buildings shall have been built to the height of 10ft. from their foundations, the drains thereof must have been properly built and made good; that is to say, if there be within 100ft. from any front of the building a common sewer into which it is lawful and practicable to drain, then into such common sewer, and if there be not in such situation and within such distance any such common sewer, then to the best outlet that can be obtained so as to render, in either case, drains available for the drainage of the lowest floor of such building or addition thereto, and also of its areas, water closets, privies, and offices, if any, and the inside of the main drains under and from every building for carrying off soil must be in a transverse section at the least equal to a circular area of 9in. in diameter, and every such drain must be laid to a sufficient fall or current, so as that the whole of every such drain within the walls of such building shall be wholly covered over under the lowest floor independently thereof, and every such drain within the walls of such building must be built and covered over with bricks, stone, or slate, and so as to render the drain air tight, and generally all drains shall be laid and built to the approval of the Surveyor.

Covering footpaths, &c.

44. In the case of any building being erected abutting on the footpath of a public street or of any plastering operations being intended to be performed above the first story of any building, the builder or other persons having charge of such building, or the plasterer shall, before proceeding to build further than the first story of such building so being erected, or with any plastering as aforesaid, give notice thereof in writing to the Town Sur-

veyor in form C in the Schedule hereto, who shall thereupon give directions to such builder, person, or plasterer for the covering of such footpath as he shall think fit, and any builder, person, or plasterer who shall fail to give such notice or shall proceed with such building or plastering without having complied in all respects with the directions of the Town Surveyor, or without keeping such covering or other erection directed by him in an efficient state of repair to the satisfaction of such Surveyor, shall incur a penalty of £5 for each day in which such default shall occur or continue.

Back yards.

45. With regard to back yards or open spaces attached to dwelling houses.—Every house hereafter built or rebuilt must have an enclosed back yard or open space of at least two squares, exclusive of any building thereon unless all the rooms of such house can be lighted and ventilated from the street.

Lowermost Rooms.

46. And with regard to the lowermost rooms of houses, being 46. And with regard to the lowermost rooms of houses, being rooms of which the surface of the floor is more than 3ft. below the surface of the footway of the nearest street or alley, and to cellars or buildings hereafter to be built or rebuilt.—If any such room or cellar cannot be otherwise lighted, the same may be lighted by means of appertures or areas extending under the footway: Provided such appertures or areas be enclosed by solid masonry to the satisfaction of the Surveyor, and be covered with an horizontal iron grating level with the surface of such footway: Provided that no such apperture, area, or grating do not extend from the line of building under the footway more than 4ft., nor be more 6ft. in width.

Privies.

47. Every privy, whether already built or hereafter to be built, in the yard or area of any building or under any street or alley must have a door, and be properly enclosed, screened and fenced from public view.

Attic Rooms.

And with regard to rooms in the roof of any building hereafter built or re-built in reference to the number of floors of rooms in the roof, and to the height of such rooms.—There must not be more than one floor of such rooms, and such rooms must not be of a less height than 7ft., except the sloping part thereof, if any, of such roof, which sloping part must not begin less than 3ft. 6in. above the floor, or extend more than 3ft. 6in. on the ceiling of such room.

Rooms in regard to height.

49. With regard to rooms in other parts of the building in reference to the height thereof.—Every room used or intended to be used for the purposes of habitation must be at the least the height of 7ft. from floor to ceiling.

Ventilation of rooms.

Every room used for the purposes of habitation or for the assemblage of people for any purpose whatever, shall be well and properly ventilated to the satisfaction of the Surveyor by the insertion of air bricks below the floor and by openings in the sleeper walls, also by ventilators in the ceilings or at the top of the walls thereof, according to the size of such rooms.

Verandahs.

51. Awnings or verandahs to be erected in the said city are to be in accordance with specifications approved of by the Town Surveyor and accordingly adopted by the Council, to be wholly composed of iron, the pillars and frieze to be of the pattern shown on a plan deposited in the office of the Town Surveyor, the minimum height to be roof to be of 24 Birmingham wire gauge corrugated galvanised iron, to be painted and kept in repair to the satisfaction of the Town Surveyor, who shall have power to order such repairs to the verandahs generally as he may order such repairs to the verandahs generally as he may deem necessary. In the event of neglect or of the Town Surveyor observing the necessity for removal or repair, it must be commenced within seven days from the receipt of notice from the Town Surveyor, and must be completed within fourteen days from such notice, or otherwise the verandahs will be removed as nuisances, the cost of such removal to be borne by the owner or occupier and to be recoverable from him in a summary manner before justices.

Brestsummers.

52. With regard to every brestsummer fixed to carry any front wall of a building—The same shall be of jarrah timber or iron. If such brestsummer have a bearing at one end upon a party wall, then it must be laid upon a template or corbel of stone or wood or iron, which template or corbel must be tailed through such wall at least two-thirds of the thickness thereof; and the end of such breastsummer must not be fixed into and must not have its bearing solely upon such party wall, but must be supported by a sufficient pier built of brick or stone or by an iron column or iron or timber story posts, fixed on a solid foundation: And if any such brestsummer have its bearing at each end upon a party wall, then it must be supported by at least two sufficient piers built of brick or stone, or by iron columns, or by iron or timber story posts fixed on solid foundations, and standing within and clear of the party walls. Or any such brestsummer may bear on constructed returns in the direction of the length of the brestsummer of 4in. at the least, coursed and bounded with the substance of the party wall or party walls, and such constructed returns must be increased lin. at the least for every 6ft. in length that the brestsummer may be otherwise supported; and the ends of every such brestsummer must not be fixed at a less distance than 4½in. from the centre line of the party wall nor less than 9in. from the face of an external wall: And if the height of the underside of any brestsummer, laid from party wall to party wall to carry any external wall, exceed 15ft. want to party want to carry any external want, exceed 1510. from the surface of the public foot pavement in front of the building, then there must be constructed returns in the direction of the length of the brestsummer from the inside of each party wall of 8½in. at the least, and at the least of the full thickness of such brestsummer: And every such return must be increased lin. at the least for every foot or part of a foot the brestsummer may be in height from the surface of the public foot pavement more than 16ft., whether the brestsummer be otherwise supported or not.

Builder to keep responsible man in charge.

Builder to keep responsible man in charge.

53. Any builder or other person erecting any building under these By-laws shall at all times during working hours during the progress of such work be himself or keep a responsible man on the scene of such work to take any orders from the Town Surveyor relative to such building, and the plans and specifications of such building shall at all such times be thereon in the custody building shall at all such times be thereon in the custody of such person for production to such Surveyor, and any infringement of this By-law shall subject the person guilty thereof to a penalty of £5 for every such offence.

Building line.

54. The building line in any street within the Municipality to which all buildings hereafter to be erected shall be built shall be 6 inches outside of the alignment of the said street on either side thereof and parallel thereto.

Affixing Nos. to houses.

Every owner or occupier of any building within the city shall, immediately upon being so required to do by the Council, affix or cause to be affixed the number of such building in the street where the same is, such number to be notified to such owner or occupier by the Council, and such number shall be affixed or painted on some conspicuous place on the front of such building, and shall be not less than 2 inches in height.

Crossing places.

56. Wherever it shall be necessary to make any crossing over a public footpath in any street into any private premises, such crossing place shall be made by the Council, and shall be properly laid and channelled with wood, stone sets, or other suitable material as the Council may deem fitting, and half the cost of such making shall be borne by the owner of such premises, and shall be paid by him within one month from the completion of the work, and in case of any repairs being necessary to such crossing the same shall be made by the Council, and the cost of same shall be borne and paid by such owner.

Survey Marks,

57. All survey levels and the marks denoting same shall be carefully preserved, and any person removing or obliterating, or causing or permitting same to be removed or obliterated, shall be liable to a penalty of £10, and to pay all costs incurred in replacing same.

Notice to remove dangerous buildings.

58. Where any building shall, in the opinion of the Town Surveyor, be ruinous or dangerous under the meaning of Clause 16 of "The Building Act, 1884," the Town Surveyor shall or may give notice to the owner thereof to remove or renovate the same, such notice to be in form "D" in the Schedule hereto: And every such owner shall forthwith comply with such order under a penalty of £10.

To regulate ashvits.

59. Every house hereafter built or re-built to have ashpits of the following dimensions erected above ground, and built of brick, stone, cement, or concrete. For cottages of three rooms and under 3ft. by 2ft. by 4ft. deep. For villas three rooms and under 3ft. by 2ft. by 4ft. deep. For villas of four to six rooms, 4ft. by 3ft. by 4ft. deep. For houses of 6 to 10 rooms, 6ft. by 4ft. by 4ft. deep. For houses of 10 to 18 rooms, 8ft. by 5ft. by 4ft. deep. Such ashpits to have a wooden cover on top and a sliding door in front on the ground level. If such ashpits are not constructed, the Council will construct them at the expense of the owner as provided by the Act.

Power to City Surveyor to enter and remove.

60. And generally where anything shall have been done or omitted to be done in contravention to these By-laws it shall be lawful for the Town Surveyor at his discretion to enter on the premises and to remove or cause to be removed any building or other thing which has been erected in contravention thereof, or to do or cause to be done any act or thing which should have been done in pursuance thereof, and the costs of so doing shall be borne and paid by such owner or other person in addition to any penalty to which he may be liable in respect thereof under these By-laws.

BY-LAW No. 1.

CHAPTER I.—ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS.

Council to sit with open doors.

1. The business of the Council shall be conducted on all occasions with open doors.

Withdrawal of Strangers.

2. Any two members may require the Council Chamber to be cleared of strangers, and the Mayor or other presiding Chairman shall immediately give directions to have the order executed.

Commencement of Business.

3. The Council shall commence business so soon after the time stated in the summons as there is a sufficient number of members in attendance to form a quorum, which quorum shall consist of not less than three members; but if, at the expiry of fifteen minutes from the time specified in the summons there is not a quorum present, the Council shall stand adjourned.

When a Quorum not present.

4. At all meetings of the Council when there are not three members present, or when the Council is counted out, which counting out shall take place whenever there shall be less than three members present, such circumstance, together with the names of the members then present, shall be recorded in the minute book.

Minutes to be read and confirmed.

5. The minutes of the preceding meeting having been fairly entered in the minute book shall in all cases be read aloud previous to their confirmation, unless a majority of the members of the Council then present shall resolve that the minutes be taken as read.

Mayor may make Communications.

6. Immediately after confirmation of the minutes the Mayor may make any communication to the Council which he may deem advisable, or bring under consideration any business he may think necessary.

Questions may be asked.

7. It shall be competent for any member of the Council to ask a question or questions, but he shall confine himself to the question simply, and no debate shall ensue thereon at that time.

Notice of Questions shall be given.

8. Questions for next meeting require four days' notice. Notices of questions to be asked at the next ensuing meeting of the Council shall be given to the Town Clerk in writing at least four clear days previous to the meeting at which it is intended to ask the same.

$When\ entered\ on\ Council\ Paper.$

9. When notices of question are given the Town Clerk shall place them on the council paper at the commencement of the day's business, and the questions and replies shall be entered in the minute book of the Council.

Personal explanation.

Members may explain matters of personal nature, but no debate shall take place on such matters.

10. By the indulgence of the Council a member may explain matters of a personal nature, although there be no question before the Council, but such matters shall not be debated.

$Letters,\ Petitions,\ Memorials.$

Letters shall be read.

 Letters, petitions, and memorials shall then be read. Letitions or Memorials to be respectful.

Peritiess, etc., must be presented by member, perused and signed by him, stating number of signatures are nature of memorials.

12. Ivere y time a manorial shall be respectful and emperate in its language, and shall be presented to the

Council by a member only; and any member presenting a petition to the Council shall affix his name at the beginning thereof, with the number of signatures, and any member presenting a petition or memorial shall acquaint himself with the contents thereof, and ascertain that it does not contain language disrespectful to the Council. The nature and prayer of every petition or memorial shall be stated to the Council by the member presenting the same.

Tenders when to be opened.

Tenders to be opened half an hour after meeting of Council, or as Mayor may appoint.

13. Tenders shall be opened, considered, and dealt with half an hour after the time appointed for the meeting of the Council, or at any time subsequent thereto which the Mayor may appoint.

Chapter II.—Orders of the Day.

Meaning of " Order of the Day."

14. "An Order of the Day" shall be taken to mean the report of a committee, a notice of motion, or any matter which the Council may have postponed or directed to be considered at the next or any subsequent meeting of the Council.

Order of Business.

15. The Orders of the Day shall be numbered, brought on, and disposed of in the order in which they appear on the paper, reports of committees being numbered as the first Orders of the Day.

Notice of Motion may be brought forward.

Notices of motion to be given in writing four days previous to meeting, and to be considered Orders of the Day.

- 16. Any member of the Council may bring forward such business as he may consider advisable in the form of a notice of motion, such notice to be given in writing to the Town Clerk at least four clear days previous to the meeting at which it is intended to consider the same, and the substance of such notice shall be communicated by the Town Clerk to the members of the Council in the notice paper for such meeting, and all such notices of motion shall be considered the Orders of the Day.
- 17. No resolution or motion affecting the receipt or expenditure of any portion of the Municipal funds exceeding in amount the sum of Ten pounds shall be considered by the Council unless the same shall have been first notified on the notice paper.

Unbecoming Notices of Motion.

18. If any notice of motion contains unbecoming expressions the Council may order that it be expunged from the Council paper.

Orders of the Day, how called on. To Lapse.

Orders of the Day, how called on.

19. No Order of the Day shall be proceeded with when called on unless the member who gave the notice, or some member authorised by him to proceed thereon, be present, but it, as well as any notice of motion on the notice paper not moved when called on, shall lapse.

Adjournment of Debate.

Adjourned Debate on Motion to have precedence.

20. Any adjourned debate on a motion before the Council on any motion of which the Council may postpone consideration and direct to be considered at the next meeting or any subsequent meeting of the Council, shall be set down on the notice paper before and have precedence over any other notices of motion set down for that particular day.

Business not disposed of at adjournment.

Orders of the Day not called on to be set down for next sitting at the end of regular business.

21. If, at the adjournment of any Council, any Orders of the Day on the notice paper have not been called on, such Orders of the Day shall be set down on the notice paper for the next sitting day, and shall take precedence of any subsequent notice of motion.

Call of Council for Certain Purposes.

22. For the consideration of any By-law, or for the raising or appropriating of money, or for any other purpose, it shall be competent for any member, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole Council for the consideration of any such subject at the next or any subsequent meeting; and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof shall be given in the notice paper for the day when the Order of the Day or notice of motion for which such call was made is set down for consideration.

Call of Council, Notice of.

23. For the objects contemplated in Orders Nos. 22 and 24, it shall be necessary to lodge with the Town Clerk, at least four clear days previous to the meeting of Council, a notice of motion for the call of the Council to be made at a fixed hour on some subsequent day, and such notice of motion shall appear on the notice paper for the first ordinary meeting of Council as an Order of the Day for consideration.

Call of Council, when made.

Call of the Council to be the first Order of the Day after reports of committees, except time mentioned.

24. The Order for calling over the Council on a future day shall be set down as the first Order of the Day so appointed, after the reports of committees have been read, unless the call shall be made for a fixed time, in which case the call shall be made at such a time or as soon after as the Mayor may appoint.

Call of Council, how notified.

Call of the Council to be made on a subsequent date.

25. On an Order of the Day for the call of the Council to be made on some subsequent date being affirmed, the Town Clerk shall, by means of the ordinary notice paper, cause notice thereof to be given to each member of the Council.

Call of Council, Special Order.

The order for a call of Council to be a special order—other business to remain in abeyance.

26. The Order of the Day for calling over the Council shall be set down on the notice paper of the day of meeting on which such a call is to be made as a Special Order of the Day, and at the time fixed in such Order the Council shall proceed with such call. Any matter or thing then under consideration, and all other business of the Council, shall be held to be and shall remain in abeyance until after such call, and any motion appertaining thereto, has been disposed of.

Call of Council, Consideration of Motion for.

Motion necessitating call to be considered. Every member present to remain until disposed of.

27. On the call of the Council being completed, the motion necessitating such call shall forthwith be considered; and every member present when such call is made will be required to remain until such motion has been affirmed, rejected, or otherwise disposed of.

Call of Council, how made.

Names of Councillors to be called alphabetically.

28. When the Order of the Day for calling over the Council is read, unless the same be discharged or postponed, the names of Councillors shall be called over by the Town Clerk alphabetically.

Councillors not answering, names to be taken down.

29. The names of any Councillors who do not answer when called, shall be put down by the Town Clerk and recorded in the minutes of the proceedings of the day.

CHAPTER III.—ORDER OF DEBATE.

Motions and Amendments, how proposed.

Members proposing motion or amendment not to be interrupted unless called to order, then to sit down. Question of order how disposed of.

30. Any member desirous of proposing a motion or amendment, or of discussing any matter under consideration, must rise in his place, uncovered, and address the Mayor or other presiding chairman; and no member when speaking shall be interrupted, unless called to order, in which case he shall sit down, and the member calling to order shall, in the first place, name the standing order on the strength of which he rises, and if found to be correct by the Mayor or other presiding chairman, shall be heard in preference to any other speaker, and the question of order shall be disposed of before the subject is resumed or any other subject entered upon.

Motions and Amendments to be in writing.

Members to state nature of motion or amendment before addressing Council thereon. Motion or amendment not to be withdrawn without the leave of Council.

31. Any member desirous of proposing a motion shall state the nature of such motion before addressing the Council thereon, and for the purpose of record shall put it in writing, and sign and deliver it to the Town Clerk, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder, and the Mayor or other presiding chairman shall read the same to the Council before being discussed, and no motion shall be withdrawn without the leave of the Council.

Division of complicated question.

32. The Council may order a complicated question to be divided.

Speaking twice.

Members not to speak twice on the same question except to explain.

33. No member shall speak twice on the same question except by way of explanation or in reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment last carried; nevertheless, any member who may have been misrepresented or misunderstood shall be allowed to explain immediately before the mover rises to reply, but not after, and after the reply the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall immediately be put to the vote.

Amendments,

No second amendment to be considered until first has been disposed of. First amendment carried to displace original question, on which one further amendment only may be moved.

34. Whenever an amendment is moved upon an original proposition, no second amendment shall be taken into consideration until the first amendment has been disposed of. If the first amendment be carried, it shall displace the original question, and become itself the question; if the first amendment be negatived, then a second amendment may be moved upon the original question under consideration, but only one amendment shall be submitted to the Council for discussion at one time.

Regulations as to speaking on amendments.

Members who have spoken on original question not to speak on amendment unless amendment carried.

35. On an amendment being moved, no member of the Council who has spoken to the original question shall speak again (except in explanation, or as the mover of the original question in reply) until the amendment has been put, and has become the amended proposition before the Council.

Moving or seconding of motions or amendments.

36. Any member moving or seconding a motion or amendment in the terms "I move," &c., or "I second," &c., as the case may be, shall be held to have spoken on that question.

Moving or Seconding Proposition Paper for passing Committee's Reports.

Members signing reports of committees as proposer or seconder may address Council on such reports.

37. Any member who may have signed the proposition paper, either as proposer or seconder, to enable the reports of the committees of Council to be put to the vote for adoption or otherwise by the Council, shall not be held to have spoken thereon by such act, but may address the Council on matters contained in such reports.

Motion for Suspension of Standing Orders.

No discussion to take place on motion suspending standing orders.

38. Any member moving a suspension of the standing orders, or any of them, shall be required simply to state the grounds of such motion, and the nature and objects of the motion which he may seek to make thereon, but no discussion shall take place upon any such motion.

Indulgence to Members not able to stand.

39. By the special indulgence of the Council a member unable conveniently to stand, by reason of sickness or infirmity, will be permitted to speak sitting and uncovered.

Enforcement of Standing Orders.

40. Any member may require the enforcement of any standing order of the Council by simply noticing that such order is disobeyed.

Members to be addressed by Titles.

41. The members in speaking shall designate each other by their respective titles of Mayor or Councillor, as the case may be.

Pre-audience.

Mayor to decide pre-audience.

42. If two or more members rise to speak at the same time, the Mayor or other presiding chairman shall decide which is entitled to pre-audience.

Mayor to call to order in certain cases.

Mayor to call to order for speaking twice on same question.

43. The Mayor or other presiding chairman shall, without waiting for the interposition of the Council, call to order any member proceeding to speak a second time on the same question, unless entitled to reply, or in explanation, where he has been misrepresented or misunderstood.

Digression, Imputation of Motives, &c.

Digression, imputing improper motives, and personal reflections highly disorderly, words to be taken down at once.

44. No member shall digress from the subject-matter under discussion, nor impute improper motives to any other member; and all personal reflections upon any member shall be considered highly disorderly. Any member may require the Town Clerk to take down any particular word or words used by a member immediately upon the same being used, provided that every such demand shall be made at the time such word or words are used, and not after any other member has spoken.

$Of fensive \ Expressions.$

Offensive expressions to be withdrawn: members not explaining or retracting with satisfactory apology to be censured and fined.

45. Any member who shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other member shall, if required by the Council, withdraw such expression and make a satisfactory apology to the Council: and any member having used objectionable words and not retracting the same and offering suitable apologies for the use thereof to the satisfaction of the Council, shall be censured and fined not less than One pound nor more than Ten pounds; and any member called to order shall forthwith sit down unless permitted to explain.

Member to withdraw when his conduct is under debate.

Disorderly conduct, Mayor to call upon member guilty of, by name. After explanation member to withdraw.

46. When, in consequence of disorderly conduct, the Mayor shall call upon any member by name, such member shall withdraw as soon as he has been heard in explanation, and after such member's withdrawal the Council shall at once take the case into consideration.

Members disobedient or interrupting business guilty of disorderly conduct.

Members disobeying call to order deemed guilty of disorderly conduct, and on motion of censure passed to be fined.

47. Any member who shall wilfully disobey any call to order, or who shall wilfully or vexatiously interrupt the orderly conduct of the business of the Council, shall be deemed to be guilty of disorderly conduct, and on the passing of a motion censuring such member he shall be fined not less than One pound nor more than Ten pounds.

Member not paying fine ceases to act.

Member not paying fine shall cease to be a member of the Council until fine is paid.

48. Should any member upon whom a fine has been inflicted neglect or refuse to pay the fine so imposed before the rising of the Council or committee then sitting, such member shall cease to have any status or position at any meeting of the Council or committees, nor shall he be allowed to sit at the Council table or at the committee table, or take any part or act in any of the proceedings of the Council or committee, unless and until after the said fine, and all costs, charges, and expenses connected therewith are fully paid and discharged.

Member obstructing business may be amoved from the Council.

Member wilfully obstructing business of the Council may be amoved, and shall cease to be a member of the Council.

49. Any member of the Council who shall wilfully and without just cause obstruct or impede the transaction of business at any meeting of the said Council, or of any committee appointed by the Council, shall, if it be resolved by two-thirds of the members present at such meeting that such member has wilfully and without just cause obstructed or impeded the transaction of business thereat, be deemed to have failed duly and faithfully to fulfil the duties of his office, and thereupon it shall be lawful for the Mayor to summon a special meeting of the whole Council and to give notice to the said member to show cause at such meeting why he should not be amoved from his office, and unless cause sufficient be shown to such meeting, such member may be amoved by a resolution of the members attending such meeting; and after such amoval such member shall cease to be a member of the said Council and his office shall be deemed to have become and shall be vacant.

To whom Fines, Charges, etc., are to be paid.

50. Any fine inflicted on any member of the Council for any breach of this By-law, together with all other costs, charges, and expenses incidental thereto, shall forthwith be paid to the Town Clerk, to become corporation funds.

Decision on Points of Order.

Mayor to decide point of order without comment, and his decision to be final.

51. The Mayor or other presiding chairman, when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule or precedent applicable to the case, without argument or comment, and his decision shall be final in that particular case.

Objection to the Ruling of the Mayor.

Objection to ruling to be taken at once.

52. If any objection be taken to the ruling of the Mayor, such objection must be taken at once.

Motions as to Mayor's Ruling to be Seconded.

Member may move that the ruling is not in accordance with standing orders. Result of vote to guide Council.

53. Objection having been taken to the ruling of the Mayor, the member so objecting may forthwith move that the ruling on the point then raised is not in accordance with the standing orders, specifying the number of such standing order or orders. Should the motion not be seconded, then the business shall be proceeded with at the point where it was interrupted; but, if the motion be seconded, it shall be put to the vote, and the result of the vote, whether in support of the ruling or otherwise, shall guide the Council.

Members not to converse aloud.

Members not to converse aloud, or cause disturbance; if persisted in, Mayor to call member by name, and such member will incur censure of Council.

54. No member shall converse aloud, except to call to order, or make any disturbance or noise whilst any member is speaking, or any matter is being considered; and in case of such noise or disturbance being persisted in after the Mayor has called to order, the Mayor shall call upon the member making such disturbance, by name, and every such member will incur the displeasure and censure of the Council.

$Interruption\ not\ allowed.$

How member may rise whilst another member is speaking.

55. When a question is being put to the vote, or when the Mayor is speaking, or any member is addressing the chair, no member shall walk out of or across the chamber so as to interrupt him, nor shall any member interrupt another whilst speaking, except (1) To request that his words be taken down; (2) To call attention to a point of order; or (3) To call attention to the want of a quorum.

Speaking "to Order."

56. Any member may rise to speak "to order" upon a matter suddenly arising.

Precedence to Question of Order.

57. All questions of order at any time arising shall, until decided, suspend the consideration and decision of every other question.

Production of Documents.

58. Any member may, of right, require the production of any of the documents of the corporation relating to the question or matter under discussion.

Vote, how taken.

Vote to be taken by show of hands.

59. The Council shall vote by show of hands, and the Mayor, or other presiding chairman shall, in taking the vote on any motion or amendment, put the question, first in the affirmative, and then in the negative; and he may do so as often as it is necessary to enable him to form and declare his opinion, from the show of hands, as to which party has the majority; and every member present shall, at the call of the Mayor or Chairman, vote thereon.

Member not in his seat.

60. No member, when absent from his seat, shall be permitted to vote on any question when being put to the vote by the Mayor or Chairman.

Members may "pair off."

Notice of pairing to be in writing.

61. Two members of the Council, who intend to vote on opposite sides on the matter before the Council, may "pair off," provided that a note, signed by such members having so "paired off," shall be lodged with the Town Clerk and recorded by him.

Voting on Division.

How vote on division is taken.

62. No member shall speak to any question after the same has been put by the Mayor, except to call for a division upon the question, in which case the members voting in the affirmative shall, until the vote is recorded, stand up, and those in the negative retain their seats.

Motion for division shall have precedence.

Motion to divide to take precedence of other business, but not to be made to interrupt members speaking.

63. A motion "That the Council do now divide" moved and seconded, shall take precedence of all other business, and shall be put by the Mayor without any discussion taking place; provided that no such motion shall be made so as to interrupt a member while speaking.

Motion for division.

If motion for division lost, debate to be resumed.

64. If the motion to divide be lost, the discussion on the original question shall be resumed where it was interrupted, and no motion to divide on the same subject shall again be entertained until one or more members at least have addressed the chair upon the question.

Division Bell to be rung.

Division Bell to be rung, doors to be closed, and no member of the Council to leave until division is taken.

65. So soon as the vote for a division shall have been carried, the Town Clerk shall cause the division bell to be rung, turn a two-minute sand-glass, kept on the table for that purpose, and after the lapse of two minutes, as indicated by such sand-glass, the doors shall be closed, and vo member of the Council shall enter or leave the Council chamber until after a division has been recorded.

Member Moving for a Division.

Member calling for a division to vote with the minority.

66. A member moving a motion for division shall not leave the Council chamber until the division has taken place, and he shall vote with those who, in the opinion of the Mayor, were in a minority.

Reflecting upon Vote of Council.

67. No member shall reflect upon any vote of the Council except for the purpose of moving that such vote be rescinded.

Adjournment of the Council.

Motion for the adjournment of the Council not to be discussed.

68. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the Council, but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, no further motion for such adjournment shall be entertained until one or more members shall have addressed the chair on the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, or any other that may be allowed precedence.

Withdrawal of Motion, etc.

No discussion.

69. No discussion shall be allowed on a motion for leave to be given to withdraw a motion or amendment then before the Council.

Resolutions, how Rescinded.

Motion to rescind any resolution not to be entertained during year unless call of Council be made to consider such motion.

70. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the Council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole Council has been duly made expressly to consider such motion.

Four Members required to Rescind

71. No motion to rescind shall be deemed to be carried unless upon a division; at least four members of the Council shall record their votes in the affirmative.

Adjournment of Debate.

72. A debate may be adjourned on motion, without any previous notice of motion, duly seconded, and without discussion, either to a later hour of the same day, or to another day

Resumption of Debate.

73. The member upon whose motion any debate shall be adjourned by the Council, shall be entitled to preaudience on the resumption of the debate.

$Interruption\ of\ Debate.$

74. If any debate on any motion, moved and seconded, be interrupted by the Council being counted out, such debate may be resumed at the point where it was so interrupted.

Mayor to give a Casting Vote.

75. In cases of an equality of votes, the Mayor or the Chairman shall give a casting vote, and any reason stated by him shall be inserted in the minutes and proceedings.

Usage of Parliament to be observed unless other provision is made.

76. In all cases not herein provided for, resort shall be had to the rules, forms, and practice of the West Australian House of Parliament, which shall be followed as far as they can be applied to the proceedings of the Council.

Records of Attendance.

77. The Town Clerk shall keep a record of the attendance of the members at the Council, and at each committee meeting, and special, and sub-committee meetings, and such record shall be presented to the Council at the first Council meeting held in the months of June and December.

CHAPTER IV .-- COMMITTEES.

Appointment of Committees.

78. There shall be two permanent committees of the Council, to be called the "Finance and Public Works" and the "Health and By-laws" committees, which shall be annually appointed. Such committees shall respectively consist of the Mayor and three councillors; and the quorum of each committee shall be three.

Chairmanship of Committees.

79. In all committees the committee shall, at their first meeting, appoint a permanent chairman thereof, and, in the absence of such chairman at any meeting the committee shall elect a chairman for such meeting.

Chairman of Committees.

80. In all special committees where the Mayor is a member thereof, he shall be the Chairman of such committee.

81. On the acceptance by the Council of a final report from a special committee, the said committee shall be considered discharged.

Attendance at Committees.

82. No person, except a member of committee, shall be admitted to any meeting of such committee without the consent of the members then present.

Mayor, Special Committees, or Members appointed to inquire may be authorised to act.

83. The Mayor, or special committee, or any number of the members of the Council, may be appointed to inquire into and report to the next or any subsequent meeting of the Council on any matter referred to the Mayor or such committee, and it shall be competent for the Council to authorise the Mayor or such special committee to act and deal finally in any or all cases remitted to him or them prior to his or their report being presented to the Council. Provided that no Councillor shall, of his own motion, take any action by speaking, writing, or otherwise, outside of the Council, upon any matter or thing concerning the proceedings or business of the Mayor or the Council, and any Councillor so offending shall incur the displeasure and censure of the Council.

Permanent Committee may be authorised to act.

84. Any one or more of the permanent committees, acting severally or jointly, to which questions may be referred by the Council for consideration, may be authorised to act in and deal finally with such questions prior to the report of such committee or committees thereon being presented to the Council.

How Convened—Mayor or Two Members may Convene Meeting.

85. The Town Clerk shall convene each committee whenever there is business to report or to act upon, and also when requested by the Mayor or any two members of the committee.

Chairman to give Casting Vote.

86. In case of an equality of votes in any committee the Chairman shall give a casting vote only.

Standing Orders to be Observed.

Standing Orders to be observed in Committee, except rule limiting speaking.

87. The standing orders of the Council shall be observed in committees, except the rule limiting the number of times of speaking, but no member shallb e permitted to speak more than twice on any subject; except the rule as to divisions, which shall not be taken in committee unless of the whole Council; and except as to the business of committees being conducted with open doors.

CHAPTER V.—ELECTION TO OFFICES.

Election of Officers.

Election of officers to be by ballot. Every member present to vote.

All elections for offices at the disposal of the Council shall be effected by voting by ballot, and it shall be a general rule that the three, if not three, then that the two, candidates polling the largest number of votes be again put to the ballot (except one of such candidates shall poll a majority of the votes of the members present on their first going to the vote) until one of such candidates shall have polled the majority of votes of the members present, every member present being required to record his vote.

Notice of Election.

89. When any office is at the disposal of the Council five clear days notice shall be given, by advertisement in one or more of the local newspapers, of the intention of the Council to fill such vacancy, and the same notice shall invite application for the office, to be sent in to the next meeting of the Council. meeting of the Council.

Fixing Salary.

Salary to be fixed before election, unless otherwise decided.

90. The salary or allowance attached to the office under the consideration of the Council shall be fixed in all cases before proceeding to the election, unless otherwise decided by resolution of the Council, and the salary of any officer, when fixed, shall not, at any time, be considered with a view to its reduction or increase, unless specially sanctioned by and at a meeting of the Council at which two-thirds, at least, of the members are present.

Leave of Absence.

Leave of absence for two weeks annually.

91. Each and every officer in the Corporation Service shall be entitled to a period of two weeks in every year as leave of absence, in connection with which the time of departure from and return to duty shall be decided by the Mayor and the Town Clerk: Provided that, as regards officers filling subordinate positions, such leave of absence shall be subject to arrangement by the head of each respective department, who shall report thereon to the Mayor.

Letters of Application to be opened.

92. At the next meeting of the Council, after the notice as before-mentioned has been given, all letters of application for the office shall be opened, and the names read aloud.

Applications, etc., to lie on Council Table.

Applications to lie on table until next meeting, except majority of Council decide otherwise.

The letters of application, together with any testimonials accompanying the letters of application, shall lie on the Council table until the next meeting of the Council, when the appointment may be made or otherwise deter-

Officers' Surcties.

No member of the Council can be surety for officer.

94. No member of the Council, nor any auditor for the Municipality, nor any officer of the Corporation, shall be received as surety for any officer appointed by the Council, and in all cases in which security for the due and faithful performance of any duty or contract is required, the expense of preparing such security shall be borne by the Council.

CHAPTER VI.—Suspension of Standing Orders.

Suspension of Standing Orders.

95. In case of urgent necessity any standing order or orders of the Council may be suspended on motion, duly made and seconded, without notice, provided that such motion has the concurrence of at least four members of the Council

Suspension of Standing Orders carried by a majority.

96. When a motion for the suspension of any standing orders or order appear on the notice paper, such motion may be carried by a majority of the whole Council.

Duration of Standing Orders.

97. The whole of these standing orders shall continue in force until altered, amended, or repealed.

- 35. Any person damaging the public roads within the Municipality by digging or by dragging any heavy material along or across any such road without the permission in writing of the Chairman of the Municipal Council shall pay the cost of repair caused by such damage, and in addition shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a sum not exceeding
- 36. Any person who shall wantonly or without lawful excuse discharge any firearms in, near to, or across any public street within the Municipality shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty not exceeding £2 for every such offence.
- 37. Any person who shall, without first obtaining the permission of the Chairman of the Council in writing, anywhere within the limits of the Municipality, light any unguarded fire, or let off any fireworks within the Municipality, shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty not exceeding £5.
