On behalf of His Excellency Lieut.-Colonel Sir Gerard Smith, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Western Australia and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

THEREAS by "The Stock Diseases Act, 1895," it is provided that it shall be lawful for the Governor to acquire and set apart, by Proclamation in the Government Gazette, such ground as may be required for one or more Quarantine Stations on which the necessary sheds and appurtenances may be erected for the purpose of the said Act: AND WHEREAS it is deemed expedient by me, Sir Alexander Campbell Onslow, Knight, Chief Justice of Western Australia, Governor's Deputy, to set apart a Quarantine Station for camels arriving by sea at Fremantle: Now therefore I, the said Governor's Deputy, in exercise of the powers in me vested as aforesaid, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby set apart, as a Quarantine Station for camels arriving by sea at Fremantle, for the purposes of the said Act, the locality known as "Hamersley's North Beach Paddocks," consisting of S.O.L.  $\frac{7}{1392}$ , Pastoral Lease  $\frac{66}{293}$ , Locations 548, 564, 1155, with Reserve No. 2445 adjoining.

List of Explosives authorised to be Imported and Manufactured in Western Australia.

# Order in Council.

At the Executive Council Chamber, at Perth, this 11th day of November, 1896.

#### Present:

His Honour the Chief Justice (Governor's Deputy).
The Honourables—

The Colonial Treasurer, The Attorney General, The Commissioner of Crown Lands, The Commissioner of Railways.

WHEREAS under the provisions of "The Explosives Act, 1895," the Governor in Council is empowered, from time to time, by Order, to define the composition, quality, and character of any Explosive, and to classify Explosives, and to prohibit the manufacture, keeping, importation, and sale of any Explosive when considered expedient for the public safety: Now Therefore I, Sir Alexander Campbell Onslow, Knight, Chief Justice of Western Australia, Governor's Deputy, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby define the composition, quality, and character of Explosives, and do classify Explosives, as follows, and do prohibit the manufacture, keeping, importation, and sale of Explosives other than those mentioned in this Order.

# CLASS I.-Gunpowder.

Gunpowder, ordinarily so called—Consisting of a mixture of nitrates, carbon, and sulphur.

#### CLASS II.—Nitrate Mixtures.

Safety Blasting Powder—Consisting of a mechanical mixture of nitrate of potash, sulphur, lamp-black, sawdust, and sulphate of iron.

Fortis Explosive—Consisting of a mixture of two or more of the following substances, viz., tan, lamp-black, and sulphur, such mixture being thoroughly impregnated with a mixture of nitrate of potash and proto-sulphate of iron, and with or without the addition to such impregnated mixture of glycerine. Provided that all such explosives shall be imported and stored only in the form of compressed cartridges, such cartridges being rendered thoroughly waterproof (a) by waterproofing the naked compressed cartridges, and (b) by enclosing such waterproofed compressed cartridges in thoroughly waterproof cartridge-cases.

Chilworth Special Powder—Consisting of a mechanical mixture of nitrate of potash, nitrate of ammonium, and charcoal, with or without the addition of sulphur.

Dahmenite—Consisting of a mixture of nitrate of potassium, nitrate of ammonium, and naphthalene.

Excelsior—Consisting of a mixture of potassiumnitrate, and xanthorrhea balsam.

# CLASS III.—Nitro-Compounds.

#### Division 1.

Dynamite, No. 1—Consisting of not more than 75 parts by weight of thoroughly purified nitroglycerine, uniformly mixed with 25 parts by weight of—

- (a) An infusorial earth known as "kieselguhr," or
- (b) A non-explosive mixture of "kieselguhr" with such other ingredients and in such proportions as may for the time being be sanctioned by the Minister, e.g.:—

Carbonate of Sodium
Sulphate of barium
Mica ... ...
Talc ... ...
Ochre ... ...

8 parts (or less)
by weight in substitution for an
amount by weight
of kieselguhr.

#### Provided:

- (1) That the said (a) kieselguhr or (b) nonexplosive mixture shall be sufficiently absorbent in quality, when mixed in the above proportions, to prevent exudation of nitro-glycerine; and
- (2) That there may be added to the kiesel-guhr or non-explosive mixture an amount of carbonate of ammonium not exceeding 1½ parts by weight in every 100 parts by weight of the finished dynamite.

Amberite—Consisting of thoroughly purified nitro-cellulose, mixed or combined with the following substances:—Thoroughly purified nitro-glycerine, paraffin free from mineral acid, shellac. The whole to be of such character and consistency as not to be liable to liquefaction or exudation.

Dynamite, No. 2—Consisting of not more than 18 parts by weight of thoroughly purified nitroglycerine, uniformly mixed with 82 parts by weight of a pulverised preparation composed of nitrate of potash, 71 parts, charcoal, not less than 10 parts, and purified paraffin (or ozokerite), 1 part (or nitrate of potash, 72 parts, and charcoal not less than 10 parts) by weight, and sufficiently absorbent in quality when mixed in the above proportions to prevent exudation of nitro-glycerine.

Carbo-Dynamite — Consisting of not more than 90 parts by weight of thoroughly purified nitro-glycerine, uniformly mixed with 10 parts by weight of charcoal, sufficiently absorbent in quality when mixed in the above proportions to prevent exudation of nitro-glycerine, whether with or without the addition of one or more of the following substances, viz.:—Nitrate of potash, nitrate of barium, carbonate of sodium, and carbonate of ammonium, provided that the proportion of carbonate present shall not exceed  $1\frac{1}{2}$  parts by weight in every 100 parts by weight of the finished explosive.

Blasting Gelatine, No. 1—Consisting of nitrocellulose carefully washed and purified, combined with thoroughly purified nitro-glycerine in such proportions that the whole shall be of such character and consistency as not to be liable to liquefaction or exudation.

Blasting Gelatine, No. 2 — Consisting of Blasting Gelatine, No. 1, as above defined, mixed or incorporated with nitrate of potash (with or without charcoal), or such other nitrate as may for the time being be sanctioned by the Minister.

Camphorated Gelatine—Consisting of Blasting Gelatine, No. 1, as above defined, mixed or incorporated with camphor.

Ballistite—Consisting of nitro-cotton, as hereinafter defined, combined with thoroughly purified nitro-glycerine, with or without camphor or aniline, in such proportions that the whole shall be of such character and consistency as not to be liable to liquefaction or exudation; nitro-cotton consisting of nitro-cellulose carefully washed and purified.

Gelatine-Dynamite, No. 1—Consisting of thoroughly purified nitro-glycerine, thickened by being combined with nitro-cellulose carefully washed and purified, and mixed or incorporated with one or more of the following non-explosive ingredients, viz.:—Cotton, charcoal, or such other ingredients as may for the time being be sanctioned by the Minister, and in such proportions that the whole shall be of such character and consistency as not to be liable to liquefaction or exudation.

Gelatine-Dynamite, No. 2 (Gelignite)—Consisting of gelatine-dynamite, No. 1, as above defined, mixed, or incorporated with nitrate of potash, or such other nitrate as may for the time being be sanctioned by the Minister.

Carbonite—Consisting of not more than 25 parts by weight of thoroughly purified nitroglycerine (with or without the addition of not more than half a part of sulphuretted benzole), uniformly mixed with 75 parts by weight of a pulverised preparation, consisting of wood-meal not less than 40 parts, nitrate of potash and nitrate of sodium (or either of them), not more than 34 parts, and carbonate of sodium not more than half a part; such preparation to be sufficiently absorbent when mixed in the above proportions to prevent exudation of nitro-glycerine.

Lithofracteur—Consisting of not more than 55 parts by weight of thoroughly purified nitro-glycerine, uniformly mixed with 45 parts by weight of a pulverised preparation, consisting of one part by weight of charcoal, bran, and sawdust (or of any one or more of the same),  $3\frac{1}{2}$  parts by weight of an infusorial earth known as kieselguhr,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  parts by weight of nitrate of baryta and bi-carbonate of soda (or of either of them),  $\frac{1}{2}$  part by weight of sulphur and manganese (or of either of them), and sufficiently absorbent in quality when mixed in the above proportions to prevent exudation of nitro-glycerine.

Stonite—Consisting of not more than 68 parts by weight of thoroughly purified nitro-glycerine uniformly mixed with 32 parts by weight of a preparation consisting of nitrate of barium, nitrate of potash (or either of them), kieselguhr (not less than 20 parts by weight), wood-meal (not less than 4 parts by weight), and carbonate of magnesia, with or without the addition of sulphuretted oil and soot (or either of them); such preparation to be sufficiently absorbent when mixed in the above proportions to prevent exudation of nitro-glycerine.

Lithofracteur, No. 2—Consisting of 36 parts by weight of a mixture of kieselguhr, nitrate of potash, or nitrate of baryta, charcoal, wood-meal, manganese, and carbonate of magnesia, in such proportions as may be approved of by the Minister, and 64 parts by weight of nitro-glycerine.

Jones' Dynamite No. 2—Consisting of 35 parts by weight of nitro-glycerine, and 65 parts by weight of a mixture of kieselguhr and sulphate of

lime, or other suitable material, in such proportions that the whole may be sufficiently absorbent in quality to prevent exudation of nitro-glycerine.

#### Division 2.

Gun-cotton—Consisting of gun-cotton thoroughly purified.

Nitrated Gun-cotton—Consisting of thoroughly purified gun-cotton mixed or impregnated with a nitrate or nitrates other than nitrate of lead.

Tonite or Cotton Powder, No. 1—Consisting of gun-cotton thoroughly purified, mixed or impregnated with a nitrate or nitrates.

Tonite or Cotton Powder, No. 2—Consisting of gun-cotton thoroughly purified, mixed or impregnated with a nitrate or nitrates and charcoal.

Tonite or Cotton Powder, No. 3—Consisting of a mixture of thoroughly purified meta-dinitro-benzole and thoroughly purified gun-cotton, mixed or incorporated with one or more of the following ingredients, namely—Nitrate of potash, nitrate of sodium, nitrate of barium, and chalk.

Potentite—Consisting of gun-cotton thoroughly purified, mixed or impregnated with a nitrate or nitrates.

Di-flamyr—Consisting of nitro-cellulose thoroughly purified, mixed or impregnated with a nitrate or nitrates other than nitrate of lead.

Rifle Gun-cotton—Consisting of thoroughly purified gun-cotton, whether or not mixed with a nitrate or nitrates other than nitrate of lead, mixed with any one or more of the following substances, viz.: Pure beeswax, paraffin, shellac, gum or resin, dissolved in a solvent composed of ether, alcohol, and benzoline, such substances to be free from free mineral acid.

Schultze Gunpowder—Consisting of nitrolignin carefully purified and mixed or impregnated with a nitrate or nitrates other than nitrate of lead, and with or without starch or collodion (such collodion to consist of carefully purified nitro-lignin dissolved in commercially pure ether and alcohol), or pure solid paraffin, provided that such paraffin shall be free from mineral acid.

Schultze Blasting Powder—Consisting of Schultze gunpowder as above defined, mixed with charcoal or sugar.

Sawdust and Gun-cotton Powder—Consisting of a mixture of two or more of the following explosives, viz.:—Sawdust gunpowder, gun-cotton, and cotton-powder.

Cooppal's Powder — Consisting of nitrolignin, carefully purified with or without admixture of a nitrate or nitrates (other than nitrate of lead), and starch.

E.C. Sporting Powder—Consisting of rifle gun-cotton as hereinbefore defined, with the addition of colouring matter, consisting of aurine (free from mineral acid) dissolved in a solvent composed of ether, alcohol, and benzoline.

E.C. Rifle Powder—Consisting of rifle guncotton as above defined, with the addition of colouring matter, consisting of picric acid (free from mineral acid), dissolved in a solvent composed of ether, alcohol, and benzoline.

E.C. Powder Company's Sporting Powder, J.B. Patent—Consisting of thoroughly purified nitro-cellulose mixed or impregnated with a nitrate or nitrates (other than nitrate of lead), with the addition of colouring matter consisting of ultramarine free from mineral acid, and with or without the addition of camphor dissolved in benzoline or other volatile solvent.

E.C. Powder Company's Rifle Powder, J.B. Patent—Consisting of thoroughly purified nitro-cellulose, mixed or impregnated with a nitrate or nitrates (other than nitrate of lead), with the addition of lamp-black free from mineral acid or charcoal, and with or without the addition of camphor dissolved in benzoline or other volatile solvent.

Smokeless Powder — Consisting of nitrolignin carefully purified, and mixed or impregnated with a nitrate or nitrates (other than nitrate of lead), and with or without starch, or collodion, or turmeric, or similar vegetable colouring matter; provided that such collodion shall consist of carefully purified nitro-lignin dissolved in commercially pure ether and alcohol, and with or without such other substance as may from time to time be approved by the Minister.

Roburite—Consisting of (a) nitrate of ammonium, with or without an admixture of nitrate of sodium and neutral sulphate of ammonium, or either of them; provided that the amount of nitrate of sodium shall in no case exceed 50 per cent. of the total amount of nitrates present, and (b) thoroughly purified chlorinated di-nitro-benzole, with or without the addition of thoroughly purified chloro-nitronaphthalene and chloro-nitro-benzole; provided (1) that such chlorinated di-nitro-benzole shall not contain more than four (4) parts by weight of chlorine to every one hundred (100) parts by weight of chlorinated di-nitro-benzole, and (2) that the proportions of chloro-nitro-naphthalene and chloronitro-benzole shall not amount to more than 2 per cent. and 5 per cent. respectively of the finished explosive.

Securite—Consisting of a mixture of potassium or nitrate of ammonium with thoroughly purified meta-di-nitro-benzole.

Flameless Securite—Consisting of securite as above defined, with the addition of oxalate of ammonium.

Bellite—Consisting of a mixture of nitrate of ammonium and thoroughly purified meta-di-nitrobenzole.

Picric Acid—Consisting of tri-nitro-phenol, containing no more than 0.5 per cent. of mineral matter or ash.

Nico—Consisting of a mixture of thoroughly purified picric acid, nitrate of potash, glycerine, sulphur (free from acid), and sawdust.

Amberite No. 2—Consisting of thoroughly purified nitro-cellulose, whether or not mixed or impregnated with nitrate of barium and nitrate of potassium, or either of them, and with or without the addition of purified paraffin, vaseline, and graphite, or such other substances as may from time to time be approved of by the Governor in Council.

Dynamo—Consisting of potassium perchlorate, potassium nitrate, potassium picrate, prepared tar, and prepared sawdust, in such proportions as may be desired, provided that the finished explosive shall be free from acid reaction.

Rifleite—Consisting of thoroughly purified nitrolignin dissolved in a safe and suitable solvent with or without nitro-benzine and di-nitro-benzine, mixed or impregnated with a nitrate or nitrates (other than nitrate of lead and ammonium-nitrate), or not so mixed or impregnated, and with or without the addition of graphite.

Walsrode Powder—Consisting of thoroughly purified nitro-cellulose mixed with carbonate of calcium, and gelatinised by a suitable process.

Cannonite No. 1—Consisting of gun-cotton (consisting of thoroughly purified nitro-cellulose), mixed or impregnated with a nitrate or nitrates (other than nitrates of lead or nitrate of ammonium), and resin, and with or without the addition of graphite.

Cannonite No. 2—Consisting of gun-cotton (consisting of thoroughly purified nitro-cellulose), mixed or impregnated with resin, and with or without the addition of graphite.

Life Safe—Consisting of a mixture of potassium nitrate, sulphur, pieric acid, and wood meal. Provided that (1.) the amount of pieric acid shall not exceed one per cent. of the finished explosive; (2.) all the ingredients shall be thoroughly purified.

Bellona—Consisting of a mixture of nitrate of ammonium and thoroughly purified meta-de-nitrobenzole.

I.X.L. Blasting Powder—Consisting of a mixture of potassium nitrate, sodium nitrate, sulphur, pieric acid, charcoal, and coal dust. Provided that (1.) the amount of pieric acid shall not exceed two per cent. of the finished explosive; and (2.) that all the ingredients shall be thoroughly purified.

#### CLASS IV.—Chlorate Mixture.

Rackarock—Consisting of chlorate of potash and nitro-benzole. (Manufacture only.)

#### CLASS V.—Fulminate.

Fulminate of Mercury.

Cap Composition—Consisting of chlorate of potash and sulphide of antimony or sulphur, with or without fulminate of mercury and ground glass.

#### CLASS VI.—Ammunition.

Division 1.

Safety Cartridges—Consisting of cartridges for small arms, of which the cases can be extracted from the small-arm after firing, and which are so closed as to prevent any explosion in one cartridge being communicated to other cartridges.

Safety Fuse—Consisting of a fuse for blasting which burns and does not explode, and which does not contain its own means of ignition, and which is of such strength and construction and contains an explosive in such quantity that the burning of such fuse will not communicate laterally with other like fuses.

Tube Safety Fuse—Consisting of a pipe or tube of pewter, coated externally with tarred yarns, tapes, or other suitable covering, and containing gunpowder in the proportion of not more than one and a half  $(1\frac{1}{2})$  ounces to every twenty-four (24) feet of fuse.

Railway Fog-Signals—Of such strength and construction and containing an explosive in such quantity that the explosion of one such railway fogsignal will not communicate the explosion to other like railway fog-signals.

#### Percussion Caps.

Safety Firing Tubes, No. 1—Consisting of a tube of metal or other suitable material, containing a percussion cap and suitable mechanical appliances for firing the same.

# Division 2.

Cartridges for Small Arms (which are not safety cartridges).

Cartridges for Cannon Shells, Mines Blasting, or other like purposes.

Tubes for Firing Explosives — Consisting of cases of quill, metal, or paper charged with mealed powder or other suitable explosive, and not containing their own means of ignition.

Abel's Electric Tubes—Consisting of a case of wood or other suitable material, containing two insulated wires, the terminals of which are (a) embedded in a charge not exceeding two grains of the priming composition No. 1, consisting of sulphide of copper, phosphide of copper, and chlorate of potash intimately mixed together; or (b) connected by a bridge of fine wire, composed of a platinum alloy, steel, or other suitable material, the said bridge being embedded in a charge not exceeding ten grains of the priming composition No. 2, consisting of gunpowder and thoroughly purified gun-cotton, the case being fitted to a small cylindrical tube of quill, metal, or paper, or other suitable material, charged with gunpowder, and having a hollow up the centre of the same.

Abel's Electric Fuses—Consisting of a case of wood or other suitable material, containing two insulated wires the terminals of which are (a) embedded in a charge not exceeding two grains of the priming composition No. 1 hereinafter specified, or (b) connected by a bridge of fine wire, composed of a platinum alloy, steel, or other suitable material, the said bridge being embedded in a charge not exceeding ten grains of the priming composition No. 2, hereinafter specified; the case being either (a) filled with a charge not exceeding twenty grains of gunpowder, and closed at the end, or (b) empty and open at the end, or (c) fitted with a small hollow cylinder of copper, sheet-tin, or other material suitable for conversion into a detonator.

Priming Composition, No. 1.—Consisting of sulphide of copper, phosphide of copper, and chlorate of potash intimately mixed together.

Priming Composition, No. 2.—Consisting of gunpowder and thoroughly purified gun-cotton.

Elswick Electric Tubes—Consisting of a case of metal, wood, paper, or other suitable material, containing (a) two or more insulated wires, the terminals of which are connected by a fine wire of platinum or other suitable material, embedded in a charge not exceeding ten grains of gun-cotton thoroughly purified, and (b) a charge not exceeding one ounce of gunpowder, the said case being completely closed by means of a cork, disc, or other suitable material.

Elswick Mechanical Tubes—Consisting of a case of metal, wood, paper, or other suitable material, containing its own means of ignition and a charge not exceeding one ounce of gunpowder.

Fuses for Shells—Consisting of cases of wood, metal, or other suitable material, charged or primed with fuse or other suitable composition not containing their own means of ignition, and of such strength and construction that the explosion of one fuse will not communicate the explosion to other like fuses.

Gunpowder Fuses—Consisting of cases of metal, wood, or other suitable material, containing a charge of gunpowder not exceeding two drams in each fuse.

Gun-cotton Fuses—Consisting of cases of metal, wood, or other suitable material, containing a charge of thoroughly purified gun-cotton not exceeding two drams in each fuse.

War Rockets—Consisting of cases of iron or other suitable material, containing rocket composition, consisting of an intimate mixture of saltpetre, sulphur, and charcoal, and not containing their own means of ignition.

Instantaneous Fuses—Consisting of a preparation of gunpowder, yarn, and a protective coating, which is not a safety fuse, and does not contain its own means of ignition.

Pain's Instantaneous Pyrotechnic Fuses—Consisting of a closed case of paper, wood, or other suitable material, having affixed therein, by means of a plug of sulphur, two insulated copper wires, the terminals of which are connected by a bridge of fine wire, consisting of plantinum, platinum alloy, steel, or other suitable material, such bridge being embedded in a charge of gunpowder not exceeding twenty grains.

Patent Igniters—Consisting of a small cylinder of tin-plate, zinc, wood, card-board, or other suitable material, into one end of which is placed a socket or block of wood or other suitable material, with a hole through the centre, and with a disc, wad, or cap, made of, containing, or saturated with a priming paste of mealed powder at the base of the same, the said cylinder and socket or block being fitted with safety fuse or instantaneous fuse, or not so fitted.

Brain's Electric Fuses.—Consisting of a case of wood, or other suitable material, containing two insulated copper wires the terminals of which are embedded in a priming composition, consisting of an intimate mixture of chlorate of potash, native sulphide of antimony and sub-phosphide of copper.

High Tension Electric Fuses—Consisting of a case of wood, or other suitable material, containing two insulated wires the terminals of which are embedded in a charge not exceeding two grains of a priming composition, consisting of sulphide of copper, phosphide of copper, and chlorate of potash intimately mixed together, the case being filled with a charge not exceeding twenty grains of gunpowder, or carefully purified collodion cotton, and closed at the end.

Low Tension Electric Fuses—Consisting of a case of glass or other suitable material, containing two insulated wires the terminals of which are connected by a bridge of fine wire composed of a platinum alloy.

Spon's Electric Fuses—Consisting of a case of metal, wood, paper, or other suitable material, containing two or more insulated wires the terminals of which are (a) embedded in a charge not exceeding five (5) grains of one or the other of the priming compositions (1) (2) (3) hereinafter specified, or (b) connected by a bridge of fine wire composed of a platinum alloy, steel, or other suitable material; the said bridge being embedded in a charge not exceeding ten grains of one or other of the priming compositions (4) (5) hereinafter mentioned:—

Priming Composition (1)—Chlorate of potash and sulphide of antimony, with or without powdered carbon.

Priming Composition (2)—Chlorate of potash, sulphide of antimony, and phosphide of copper.

Priming Composition (3)—Chlorate of potash, sulphide of copper, and phosphide of copper.

Priming Composition (4)—Gun-cotton thoroughly purified.

Priming Composition (5)—Gun-cotton thoroughly purified, chlorate of potash, and powdered galls.

Electric Fuses (Smith's Patent)—Consisting of a plug of sulphur containing two copper wires connected by a bridge of fine platinum or other suitable wire, surrounded by a priming charge of fulminate of mercury not exceeding one-fifth of a grain in any one fuse.

German Spills—Consisting of cylindrical cases of paper, containing a charge of gunpowder not exceeding one pound per gross, and primed at one end with touch paper, and at the other with mealed gunpowder or primed at both ends with mealed gunpowder.

Miners' Squibs—Consisting of a tube of paper or other suitable material, partly filled with gunpowder in the proportion of not more than one pound of gunpowder to every 500 squibs, and having one end closed with a plug of wax or other suitable material, and the other end closed by being twisted, and such twisted end being coated with sulphur, or not so coated.

Ammonite (or Miners' Safety Explosive) —Consisting of a mixture of nitrate of ammonia and thoroughly purified mono-nitro-naphthalene, made up into cartridges for blasting, not containing their own means of ignition, contained or enclosed in thoroughly waterproof cartridge-cases.

#### Division 3.

Safety Firing Tubes, No. 2—Consisting of safety firing tubes, No. 1 (see above in Division 1), with the addition of a priming charge of meal powder not exceeding 40 grains, the whole to be of such construction that the explosion of one will not communicate to others in close contact.

Detonators—Consisting of a capsule or case of such strength and construction and containing an explosive of the fulminate class in such quantity that the explosion of one capsule or case will communicate the explosion to other like capsules or cases.

Abel's Electric Detonator Fuses—Consisting of a case of wood or other suitable material, containing two insulated wires the terminals of which are (a) embedded in a charge not exceeding two grains of the priming composition No. 1 hereinafter specified, or (b) connected by a bridge of fine wire composed of a platinum alloy, steel, or other suitable material, the said bridge being embedded in a charge not exceeding ten grains of the priming material No. 2, hereinafter specified, the case being fitted with a detonator.

Priming Composition No. 1—Consisting of sulphide of copper, phosphide of copper, and chlorate of potash intimately mixed together.

Priming Composition, No. 2—Consisting of gunpowder and thoroughly purified gun-cotton.

Cartridges for Small Arms (which are not safety cartridges).

Tubes for firing Explosives—Consisting of cases of quill, metal, or paper, charged with mealed powder or other suitable explosive, and containing their own means of ignition.

Fuses for Shell—Consisting of cases of wood or metal, or other suitable material, containing their own means of ignition, and of such strength and construction that the explosion of one fuse will not communicate the explosion to other like fuses.

Bornhardt's Electric Detonator Fuses—Consisting of a detonator as above defined, such detonator having inserted therein two insulated wires, the terminals of which are embedded in a priming composition composed of chlorate of potash and native sulphide of antimony, and the detonator being so constructed, and the wires so adjusted and secured, that the terminals of the said wires cannot come into contact with the fulminate in the said detonators.

Brain's Electric Detonator Fuses—Consisting of Brain's electric fuses, as above described (see Division 2), and having attached thereto a detonator as above defined.

Spon's Electric Detonator Fuses—Consisting of Spon's electric fuses, as above described (see above in Division 2), and having attached thereto a detonator as above defined.

Electric Detonator Fuses (Smith's Patent)—Consisting of electric fuses, as above described (see above in Division 2), and having attached thereto a detonator as above defined.

Provided that no one such electric detonator fuse shall contain more than thirty (30) grains of explosive of the fifth (fulminate) class.

Socket Sound Signals—Consisting of a case of tinned iron, containing one or more charges of tonite or cotton powder as hereinafter described, such charges not exceeding together eight (8) ounces, and having inside the base of the said case or attached to the exterior thereof in a case or bag of india-rubber, canvas, or other suitable material, a charge of gunpowder not exceeding two and a half  $(2\frac{1}{2})$  ounces, the charges of tonite and gunpowder being connected by means of a suitable time-fuse of wood, copper, or tinned iron in communication or connection with a detonator as above defined, such detonator to contain above the fulminate a substantial layer of strongly compressed mealed gunpowder, and being itself embedded in tonite, the said tonite to consist of gun-cotton thoroughly purified, mixed or impregnated with a nitrate or nitrates.

High Tension Electric Detonator Fuses—Consisting of high tension electric fuses (see above in Division 2), and having attached thereto a detonator.

Low Tension Electric Detonator Fuses—Consisting of low tension electric fuses as above described, and having the platinum wire embedded in a charge not exceeding two (2) grains of a priming composition, consisting of (a) carefully purified gun-cotton, or (b) carefully purified collodion cotton, and the case being fitted with a detonator.

Colliery Safety Lighters—Consisting of a tube of metal, millboard, or other suitable material, closed at one end, and containing sulphuric acid, enclosed in a glass globule or tube embedded in or contiguous to a mixture of chlorate of potassium and sugar (whether or not contained in an inner metallic tube containing or not containing gunpowder), and with or without the addition of a piece of safety-fuse. Provided that the amount of the mixture aforesaid contained in any one of the said colliery safety lighters shall not exceed five (5) grains. Provided also that the said colliery safety lighters shall be of such strength and construction that the ignition of one such colliery safety lighter will not communicate laterally with others.

# CLASS VII.—Fireworks.

Division 1.

Firework Composition—Consisting of any chemical compound or mechanically mixed preparation of any explosive of inflammable nature which is used for the purpose of making manufactured fireworks, and is not included in the former classes of explosives, and also any coloured fire composition.

# Division 2.

Manufactured Fireworks—Consisting of any explosive of the foregoing classes, and any firework composition, when such explosive or composition is enclosed in any case or contrivance, or is otherwise manufactured so as to form a squib, cracker, serpent, rocket (other than a war rocket), maroon star, lance, wheel, Chinese fire, Roman candle, or other article adapted for the production of pyrotechnic effects or pyrotechnic signals.

Oriental Fireworks—Consisting of a mixture of nitrate of potash, sulphur, and charcoal, enclosed in a paper or bamboo case, with or without the addition of a mixture of realgar and chlorate of potash; provided that the amount of such mixture of realgar and chlorate of potash shall not exceed two (2) grains in any one firework.

Socket Distress Signals-Consisting of a socket sound signal, as above described (see Class VI., Division 3) in the upper part thereof a star or stars, composed of two or more of the following ingredients, viz., nitrate of potash, sulphur (carefully washed), realgar, antimony, gunpowder, or one or more stars of the following composition, viz.: Red stars, consisting of nitrate of strontia, chlorate of potash, charcoal, and shellac, incorporated with shellac solution, and with or without the addition of gun-cotton thoroughly purified, not exceeding 10 per cent. by weight of the finished stars. Green stars, consisting of nitrate of baryta, chlorate of potash, harcoal, and shellac, incorporated with shellac solution, and with or without the addition of guncotton thoroughly purified, not exceeding 10 per ent. by weight of the finished stars. White stars, onsisting of nitrate of potash, sulphur (carefully washed), sulphide of antimony, realgar, gunpowder, and magnesium, incorporated with shellac solution, and with or without the addition of gun-cotton thoroughly purified, not exceeding 10 per cent. by weight of the finished stars. Provided that each star may have a strand not exceeding five (5) grains in weight of thoroughly purified nitro-cellulose attached to and passing through it.

Sound Signal Rockets—Consisting of a signal rocket, having fitted in the head thereof one or more charges of tonite or cotton powder as hereinafter described, and with or without a layer of compressed gunpowder made of sulphur, free from acid, saltpetre, and charcoal between the said charges, and having embedded in the said charges one or more detonators as above defined, such detonators to contain above the fulminate a substantial layer either of strongly compressed mealed gunpowder, or of a composition made of two or more of the following ingredients, viz.—Nitrate of potash, sulphur (carefully washed), realgar, antimony, gunpowder, the said tonite to consist of gun-cotton thoroughly purified, mixed or impregnated with a nitrate or nitrates.

Socket Light Signals—Consisting of a case of tin or other suitable material containing one or more white or coloured stars of the compositions hereinafter specified, and having attached to the base of the said case, in a case or bag of indiarubber, canvas, or other suitable material, a charge of gunpowder not exceeding  $2\frac{1}{2}$  ounces, the said stars and gunpowder being connected by means of a suitable time fuse of wood, copper, tinned iron, or other suitable material; provided that the total weight of the star or stars contained in any one signal shall not exceed 8 ounces. Red stars, consisting of nitrate of strontia, chlorate of potash, charcoal, and shellac incorporated with shellac solution, with or without the addition of gun-cotton thoroughly purified, not exceeding 10 per cent. by weight of the finished stars. Green stars, consisting of nitrate of baryta, chlorate of potash, charcoal and shellac, incorporated with shellac solution, with or without the addition of gun-cotton thoroughly purified, not exceeding 10 per cent. by weight of the finished stars. White stars, consisting of nitrate of potash, sulphur (carefully washed), sulphide of antimony, realgar, gun-powder, and magnesium, incorporated with shellac solution, with or without the addition of gun-cotton thoroughly purified, not exceeding 10 per cent. by weight of the finished stars. Provided that each

star may have a strand not exceeding five (5) grains in weight of thoroughly purified nitro-cellulose attached to or passing through it.

Distress Signal Rockets—Consisting of sound signal rockets, as above described (see Class VI., Division 3), with the addition in the head of the rocket of one or more stars, composed of two or more of the following ingredients, viz.:—Nitrate of potash, sulphur (carefully washed), realgar, antimony, gunpowder.

Amorces or Toy Caps—Consisting of a mixture of chlorate of potash and amorphous phosphorus, with or without the addition of nitrate of potash, sulphide of antimony, and powdered sulphur (free from acid), enclosed between two pieces of paper, in a proportion not exceeding seventy (70) grains of the mixture to every one thousand (1,000) caps; provided that the amount of amorphous phosphorus present in the mixture shall not exceed the proportion of ten (10) grains in one thousand (1,000) caps.

Crack Shots—Consisting of an amorce, composed of a patch of thoroughly purified fulminate of silver enclosed between two pieces of paper, in a proportion not exceeding fifteen (15) grains of such fulminate of silver to every one thousand (1,000) amorces, such amorce to be gummed to or form part of a sheet of paper not less than four (4) inches square, and having a strip impregnated with nitrate of potash.

Explosives Act, 1895.

Order in Council.

At the Executive Council Chamber, at Perth, this 11th day of November, 1896.

W HEREAS it is, by "The Explosives Act, 1895," amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may make Regulations with regard to certain matters in the said Act mentioned: Now THEREFORE I, Sir ALEXANDER CAMPBELL ONSLOW, Knight, Chief Justice of Western Australia, Governor's Deputy, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby make the following Regulations.

#### REGULATIONS.

1. No vessel having more than twenty pounds of explosives on board, arriving in or off, or being or remaining in, any of the undermentioned Ports or Harbours of Western Australia, shall be permitted to anchor within the limits hereinafter specified, viz.:—

Port of Fremantle Port of Albany Port of Geraldton Port of Esperance Port of Carnarvon Port of Cossack Port of Wyndham

Within a quarter of a mile of any ship, or within one mile of any public wharf or landing place.

- 2. The master or person in charge of every ship, boat, barge, lighter, or other craft, having explosives on board, shall keep conspicuously exhibited at the foremast, from sunrise to sunset, a red flag of an area of at least four superficial feet; and from sunset to sunrise, in addition to the lights ordinarily required, a red light in such a position as to be above such ordinary lights, and to show a clear, uniform, and unbroken light all round the horizon, visible on a clear night at a distance of half a mile from such light; and ships or boats shall not approach any such vessel having explosives on board nearer than 200 yards unless duly authorised, and every person in charge of a ship or boat shall observe due caution when approaching any vessel or craft having the gunpowder flag or lamp hoisted.
- 3. All explosives retained on board any ship as stores shall, during the time such ship is in port, be securely kept in a suitable magazine to be approved of by the Inspector of Explosives.
- 4. No explosive shall be shipped on board any vessel as cargo within any port in Western Australia (unless such vessel shall be lying within the anchorage provided for incoming vessels having more than twenty pounds of explosives on board), and no explosives shall be shipped on any vessel as stores within the limits of any port in Western Australia, except in the quantities and according to the manner approved of or prescribed by the Inspector of Explosives, and all explosives shipped as stores shall be placed in properly constructed magazines to be approved of by the Inspector of Explosives.
- 5. All boats conveying explosives, either to or from ships, wharves, or other places, shall be duly licensed as floating magazines, and shall be subject to all the regulations, as far as the same may be applicable, in force for the time being, for the management of magazines, as regards the wearing inflammable clothing by those on board, and the precautions to be observed to prevent accident by fire or explosion.
- 6. No boat having explosives on board shall be towed by a high pressure, open-decked steamboat whose furnaces are exposed, nor shall any such boat be towed by any other steamer with less tow-line between her and the steamer than 60ft.
- 7. All carriages and boats used in the conveyance of explosives in or upon any public highway, street, road, thoroughfare, river, harbour, or public place, and containing more than 100lbs. of gunpowder, or more than 100lbs. of fireworks, or more than 25lbs. of explosives, other than gunpowder and fireworks, shall be of good and substantial construction, roofed with wood or other material approved of by the Inspector of Explosives, and capable of being closed by means of doors and locks, and shall have the word "Explosives" painted in plain and conspicuous characters on both sides thereof; and no explosive shall be conveyed in or upon any public highway, street, road, thoroughfare, river, harbour, or any public place after sunset or before sunrise.
- 8. Explosives shall not be conveyed in a carriage, boat, or ship, whilst carrying or plying for passengers, unless the quantity be less than 5lbs., and

- the same be securely covered, and all due precaution be taken for the prevention of accidents by fire or explosion; but in no case shall there be conveyed in any carriage or boat, whilst carrying or plying for passengers, any explosive of the 5th (Fulminate) Class, or any explosive of the 3rd division of the 6th (Ammunition) Class, or any explosive of the 1st division of the 7th (Firework) Class.
- 9. No explosive of the 5th (Fulminate) Class, and no explosive of the 6th (Ammunition) Class, which contains its own means of ignition, and no explosive of the 7th (Firework) Class, shall be conveyed in the same carriage or boat with any explosive not of the class and division to which it belongs, unless it be sufficiently separated therefrom, to prevent any fire or explosion which may take place in one such explosive being communicated to another.
- 10. If the explosive is not effectually protected from accident by fire from without, by being conveyed in the interior of a carriage which is enclosed on all sides with wood or metal, or by being conveyed in the hold of a boat having a close deck securely closed, then the explosive shall be completely covered with a painted cloth, tarpaulin, wadmill-tilts, or other suitable material, so as to effectually protect it against communication of fire.
- 11. There shall not be any iron or steel in the interior of the portion of the carriage or boat where the explosive is deposited, unless the same be covered, either permanently or temporarily, with leather, wool, cloth, or wadmill-tilts, or other suitable material.
- 12. In any carriage or boat containing explosives, no matches, other than safety matches, shall be carried for the use of such carriage or boat, and such safety matches shall be kept in a safe place apart from the explosive.
- 13. In the stowing of explosives in any carriage or boat, due precaution shall be taken, by means of a partition or otherwise, and by careful stowing, to secure such explosive from being brought into contact with, or endangered by, any other article or substance conveyed in such a carriage or boat which is liable to cause fire or explosion.
- 14. No person whilst on, in, or attending any carriage or boat containing any explosive shall smoke when within any city, town, township, or settlement.
- 15. No person in charge of any carriage or boat containing explosives shall drive or conduct the same in a dangerous or reckless manner; and no person who is intoxicated shall be permitted to have or continue in charge of any carriage or boat, nor shall any such person last mentioned be permitted to be in, on, or attending the same.
- 16. While the loading, unloading, or conveyance of explosives is going on, all persons engaged in such loading, unloading, or conveyance shall observe all due precautions for the prevention of accidents by fire or explosion, and from preventing unauthorised persons having access to the explosive so being loaded, unloaded, or conveyed, and shall abstain from any act whatever which tends to cause fire or explosion, and is not reasonably necessary for the purpose of the loading, unloading, or conveyance of such explosive, or of any other article carried therewith, and for preventing any other person from committing any such act.
- 17. After the loading or unloading of explosive on or out of any carriage or boat is begun, no longer time shall be suffered to pass than with the use of all due diligence is reasonably necessary for the purpose of such loading or unloading.

- 18. No explosive shall be loaded or unloaded from any carriage or boat in or upon any public highway, street, road, thoroughfare, or public place, or at any public wharf or landing place, except with the consent of and under conditions approved by the Inspector of Explosives.
- 19. Explosives shall not be conveyed in a carriage or boat which is carrying as merchandise any article liable to cause fire or explosion, or to communicate fire, such as charcoal, lucifer matches, articles for striking a light, or petroleum.
- 20. No person in charge of any carriage or boat conveying explosive shall delay for a longer time than may be reasonably necessary, nor stop unnecessarily, at any place where such stopping would be attended with special public danger.
- 21. In the case of a carriage or boat conveying explosive, due provision shall be made for preventing the introduction, into such carriage or boat, of fire, lucifer matches, or any substance or article likely to cause explosion or fire, or the introduction of any iron, steel, or grit, so as to come in contact with such explosive; and if the explosive carried in any such carriage or boat is liable to be dangerously affected by water, due precautions shall be taken to exclude water from coming into contact with such explosive.

This clause shall not be construed to prevent the introduction of an artificial light of such construction, position, or character, or of safety matches of such character as not to cause any danger of fire or explosion.

- 22. The owner of every carriage or boat on, from, or in which explosive exceeding 100lbs. is loaded, unloaded, or conveyed, who employs others in such loading, unloading, or conveyance shall, by furnishing copies of the regulations and orders relating to conveyance, or by affixing copies of the same in some place where they can be conveniently read, or otherwise take such measures as may be necessary in order that the persons so employed may be acquainted with the provisions of the regulations and orders relating to conveyance.
- 23. Each carriage or boat conveying explosives in any city, town, township, or settlement shall be in the exclusive charge of, and constantly attended by some competent person, and such person shall not have charge of more than one such carriage or boat. This clause shall not apply in the case of a carriage forming part of a continuous train on a railway or tramway, if such train is in the charge of and constantly attended by some competent person.
- 24. The quantity of explosives to be conveyed in any one carriage or boat shall not exceed 2,000 lbs. unless the carriage be so enclosed on all sides with wood or metal, or the boat have a close deck so closed as effectually to protect the explosives against accident by fire from without, in which case the amount of explosives conveyed shall not exceed the following:—

In any one carriage on a railway or tramway (whether worked by steam or otherwise) ... ... 12,000lbs.

In any other carriage ... ... 4,000lbs.
In any one boat ... ... 50,000lbs.

25. When two or more carriages or boats conveying explosives exceeding in the aggregate the amount allowed by the preceding clause to be conveyed in one such carriage or boat are travelling together, a space of at least 50 yards shall be kept between each carriage or boat and every other carriage or boat, unless circumstances render it impracticable, or unless, in the case of a train on a railway or tramway, three or more vans not con-

- taining inflammable or explosive goods intervene between each such carriage and every other such carriage.
- 26. Nothing in Clauses 10 to 24, inclusive, shall apply to any explosive of the first division of the 6th (Ammunition) Class, provided all due precautions are taken for the prevention of accidents.
- 27. In the case of every ship and boat loading or discharging explosives within any port in Western Australia:—
  - (a.) An officer of the vessel shall be constantly and exclusively in charge of the shipment, stowage, or discharge of such explosives.
  - (b.) All fires and lights shall be completely put out (except engine-room fires, which must be carefully banked with damp ashes). No smoking shall be allowed on board. This rule will apply to every vessel alongside of or attached to any ship or boat loading or discharging any kind of explosive.
  - (c.) Men selected to work in the magazine of the ship or boat must not have any matches, fusees, or knives about their persons, nor wear boots or shoes with any iron or steel on them.
  - (d.) All exposed iron or steel in or near the place where any explosive is being passed or handled must be covered over with tarpaulins or other suitable covering.
  - (e.) All explosives must be passed from man to man, or rolled, but on no account shall any explosives be pitched, thrown, slung, or slid.
  - (f.) No person shall be allowed to work aloft, or in those parts of the rigging which may be near to the magazine.
  - (g.) Special care must be exercised in selecting the men to work the explosives, to see that they are perfectly sober.
  - (h.) In the event of any necessity arising for the stoppage of the loading or discharging of any kind of explosive for any purpose or from any cause whatever, it will devolve upon the officer in charge to take precautions that the hatches of the vessel, as well as those of the licensed boat delivering or receiving, are put on and covered with tarpaulins, and that no person is allowed to remain below in the magazines or hold during such stoppage.
  - (i.) Paraffin, naphtha, petroleum, or other volatile oil must not be used for any purpose or upon any pretence whatever on board a vessel after such vessel has on board more than 1,000lbs. of any explosive, other than of ammunition, whilst the ship is within the limits of any port in Western Australia.
- 28. Every case containing explosives imported into Western Australia shall be marked in legible and indelible characters, showing the date of its manufacture, the name of the explosive, and the word "explosive."
- 29. No explosive shall be landed in any port in Western Australia, unless such explosive shall have been previously inspected by the Inspector of Explosives, or unless permission shall have been given by the Inspector.
- 30. Explosives in course of transit by a boat may, by permission of the Inspector of Explosives, be stored temporarily only upon a hulk approved by

him, and all such explosives shall be removed from any such hulk, with all due diligence, to some duly licensed magazine or other place where the same may be legally kept.

- 31. The provisions of these regulations shall be observed by persons in the employment of the Government in the same manner as by persons not so employed, and the officers of the Customs Department or harbour authority shall endeavour, as far as practicable, to see that these regulations are observed on board any ship or boat of which they may be in charge, and no explosives shall be discharged from any vessel unless such officer shall be present.
- 32. No explosives shall be put on board of or discharged from any carriage, boat, or ship, or placed in or removed from any magazine, except between the hours of sunrise and sunset.
- In the case of stores licensed for keeping and selling gunpowder or other explosives, in lieu of the maximum amount of gunpowder limited by Section 18 of "The Explosives Act, 1895," there shall be substituted the following amounts of other explosives, viz.:
  - If stored in mode (a)—In lieu of each pound of gunpowder, 1lb. of fireworks, or 1lb. of any explosive other than gunpowder or fireworks.
  - If stored in mode (b)—In lieu of each pound of gunpowder, 1lb. of fireworks or \( \frac{1}{4} \) lb. of any explosive other than gunpowder or fireworks.

- 2. The purchases will be made in Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay by Remount Agents under the orders of the Director, Army Remount Department.
- 3. The Remount Depôts will be open for the reception of horses from the 1st of November, 1897, to the end of the purchasing season.
- 4. Horses and mares of all breeds will be received: but they must be within the prescribed age, 4 to 6 years, and, in the case of Australian horses, 15 hands 1 inch to 16 hands high.
- 5. Greys will not be purchased for Horse and Field Artillery.

The average price for Arabs and Persians is Rs. 700, and horses of this class should be not less than 14 bands 2 inches in height. # By-Laws of the Leederville Municipal Council.

HEREAS by "The Municipal Institutions Act, 1895," Section 99, it is enacted that "every Council may make, publish, alter, modify, amend, or repeal By-laws," for the purposes in the said section particularly named; and by the said Act it is further enacted that "such By-laws shall not be inconsistent with or repugnant to any of the provisions of that Act or to any law in force, and when confirmed by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, and published in the Government Gazette, but not sooner or otherwise, should have the force of law": Now therefore, pursuant to the powers contained in the said Act, it is ordered and directed by the Council of the Municipality of Leederville that the following By-laws shall, from and after confirmation and publication as aforesaid, be By-laws of the Leederville Municipal Council, and all previously existing By-laws be null and void.

#### By-Law No. 1,-Interpretation.

In these By-laws, unless the context otherwise requires-

- 1. The word "Council" shall mean the Mayor and Councillors of Leederville.
- 2. The word "Municipality" shall mean the town of Leederville.
- 3. The word "Mayor" shall mean the Mayor of the Municipality.
- 4. The words "public street" shall mean and include every public street, road, footway, square, thoroughfare, or other place within the Municipality which the public are allowed to use.
  - 5. The word "person" shall include a body corporate.
- 6. The word "owner" shall apply to every person in possession or receipt either of the whole or any part of the rents or profits of any house, building, land, or tenement.

#### By-Law No. 2.—Standing Orders.—Order of Proceedings.

- 1. The Council shall meet at the Council Chambers on the first Thursday in every month, at the hour of eight p.m., for the transaction of their ordinary business, and the business of the Council shall be conducted with open doors, and shall close or adjourn at 10 p.m.; but it shall be competent for the Council to sit with closed doors and deal with any question if, in their opinion, they deem it necessary.
- 2. The Council shall commence business so soon after the above-mentioned hour as there is a sufficient number of members in attendance to constitute a quorum; but if at the expiration of thirty minutes from the above-mentioned hour there is not a quorum present, no business shall be transacted by the Council at that meeting.
- 3. Should the Mayor not be present, the meeting shall elect a Chairman from the councillors present, who shall preside during the absence of the Mayor.
- 4. At all meetings of the Council when there is not a quorum present, or when the Council is counted out (which counting out shall take place whenever there shall be less than one-third of the members of the Council present, exclusive of the Mayor or Councillor chosen to preside in his absence) such circumstance, together with the names of the members present, shall be recorded in the minute book.

- 5. At all meetings of the Council the minutes of any preceding meeting, not previously confirmed, shall be read as the first business, in order to their confirmation, and no discussion shall be permitted thereupon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings.
- 6. Immediately after the confirmation of the minutes the Mayor may make any communication to the Council which he may deem advisable, or bring under consideration any business he may think necessary, and it shall be competent for any member of the Council to ask a question or questions, but he shall confine himself to the question simply, and no debate shall ensue thereon at that time.
  - 7. The ordinary business shall then be proceeded with.

#### Orders of Debate.

- 8. Any member proposing a motion or an amendment shall, if the Mayor so desire it, put it in writing, and sign and deliver it to the Mayor or other presiding Chairman for the time being, after it has been duly seconded, and the Mayor or other presiding Chairman shall read the same before being discussed, and no motion or amendment so made shall be withdrawn without leave of the Council.
- 9. No member shall speak twice upon the same question, except by way of explanation or in reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment last carried. Nevertheless, any member who may have been misrepresented or misunderstood shall be allowed to explain immediately before the mover rises to reply. The amendment of the original motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to the vote.
- 10. The Mayor or other presiding Chairman shall, without waiting for the interposition of the Council, call to order any member proceeding to speak a second time on the same question, unless entitled to reply, or in explanation where he has been misrepresented or misunderstood.
- 11. Any member moving a motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken on that question.
- 12. No member shall digress from the subject matter of the question under discussion, or impute improper motives to any other member.
- 13. The Mayor or other presiding Chairman, when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule or precedent applicable to the case, without argument or comment, and his decision shall be final in that particular case.
- 14. Whenever an amendment is moved upon an original proposition no second amendment shall be taken into consideration until the first amendment has been disposed of; it shall displace the original question and become itself the question. If the first amendment be negatived then a second amendment may be moved upon the original question under consideration, but only one amendment shall be submitted to the Council for discussion at one time.
- 15. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the Council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year unless by consent of at least four members of the Council.
- 16. In case of an equality of votes the Mayor or other presiding Chairman shall give a casting vote, and any reasons stated by him shall be entered in the minutes and proceedings.
- 17. No By-law shall be finally passed or rescinded at the meeting at which it shall have been first proposed nor until the next or some subsequent meeting of the Council duly convened.

# By-Law No. 3.—Suspension of Standing Orders.

In cases of urgent necessity, any Standing Order or Orders of the Council may be suspended on motion duly made and seconded without notice, provided that such motion has the concurrence of at least four members of the Council.

# BY-LAW No. 4.—Election of Officers.

- 1. When any office is at the disposal of the Council, at least ten clear days' notice shall be given by advertisement in one or more of the local newspapers of the intention of the Council to fill such vacancy, and the same notice shall invite applications for the office to be sent in to the next meeting of the Council.
- 2. The salary or allowance attached to all offices at the disposal of the Council shall be fixed for the municipal year, and in all cases before proceeding to the election.
- 3. At the next meeting of the Council, after the notice as before-mentioned has been given, all letters of application for the office shall be opened, and the names read aloud, and the appointment may then be made.
- 4. All elections for offices at the disposal of the Council shall be effected by voting by ballot, and it shall be a

general rule that the two candidates polling the largest number of votes be again put to the ballot until one of such candidates shall have polled the majority of the votes of the members present, every member present being required to record his vote.

5. No member of the Council, nor any auditor of the Municipality, nor any officer thereof, shall be received as surety for any officer appointed by the Council or for any work to be done for the Council.

#### By-Law No. 5 .- Municipal Rates.

All municipal rates shall be payable half-yearly, and the Collector for the time being duly appointed by the Council shall, at the commencement of each half-year, leave with the person liable to pay the same, or at his residence, or post to his last known address, or affix upon the property rated, a notice of the amount due by such person and requiring payment thereof within fourteen days, and if the amount be not paid at the expiration of fourteen days after such application, shall take legal proceedings for its recovery.

### BY-LAW No. 6.—Officers of the Council.

#### THE COLLECTOR.

1. The Collector for the time being duly appointed by the Council shall demand, collect, and receive all rates, assessments, license fees, fines, forfeitures, rents, tolls, and other sums due to the Council, and his receipt shall be a full and sufficient discharge for any sums paid to him. And all sums so received by the Collector shall by him be paid to the Treasurer of the Council weekly.

#### THE CLERK OF THE COUNCIL.

- 2. The Clerk of the Council shall keep the books of the Council, and shall duly keep and enter in a proper minute book minutes of all proceedings of the Council. He shall attend all meetings of the Council, issue notices of all meetings, and shall prepare for the Council or Mayor thereof, and in due time, the voters' lists for the Municipality, and cause them to be affixed as by "The Municipal Institutions Act, 1895," required, and shall supply copies thereof as by the said Act required, and shall make up and complete, under the direction of the Council, the rate book, and shall, under the like direction, prepare the annual estimates as by the said Act required. He shall also keep all such books of account as required by the said Act. He shall also, under the like direction of the said Council, cause the accounts of the said Council to be balanced half-yearly as required by the said Act. He shall also, under the direction of the Council, prepare the annual financial statement or summary, and shall do and perform all such other acts as the Council or Mayor thereof may lawfully require him to do under or by virtue of the said Act, and shall attend the Council office during such hours as the Council may determine.
- 3. The eustody of the journals, and all documents whatsoever (except such documents as are hereinafter expressed to be kept by the Mayor), laid before the Council shall be in care of the Clerk, who shall neither take, nor permit to be taken, any such journals or documents from the Mayor's or Council office, without the express leave or order of the Council.

#### The Mayor,

4. The Mayor shall have the custody of the common seal, and of all deeds and records of the Council, but he shall not affix the common seal to any corporate document without the express order of the Council.

#### The Treasurer.

- 5. The Treasurer shall receive weekly from the Collector all sums stated to be received by him under By-law No. 6, Section 1, and give the Collector a receipt for such moneys.
- 6. The Treasurer shall (if required by the Council at any time so to do) give a bond, with two sureties, in a sum to be named by the Council, conditioned for the fair and diligent discharge of his duties.
- 7. The Treasurer shall, out of the moneys received by him as the Treasurer of the Council, pay all accounts duly and lawfully passed by the Council at its ordinary monthly meetings, and shall make all other payments which the Council may lawfully pass and order for payment.
- 8. The Treasurer shall pay all sums of money received by him into the credit of the Council's general account at a bank to be named by the Council, once at least in every week.

#### Supervisor and Surveyor.

9. The Supervisor and Surveyor for the time being duly appointed by the Council shall have the immediate care, management, and direction of all buildings, lands, streets, paths, jetties, wharves, markets, posts, fences, works, drains, culverts, and all other property belonging to, or in charge

of, or under the possession, control, or power of the Council, and he shall, from time to time, report to the Council the state of, condition, or repair of the same, and the progress of any works going on therein or thereon, and the breach or violation of any By-law in connection therewith.

#### Ranger.

10. The Ranger for the time being duly appointed by the Council shall have the immediate care and management of all parks, recreation grounds, commonages, trees, and plants, and is hereby authorised to impound any stray stock unlawfully being on any street or property of the Council, and to report the breach or violation of any By-law in connection therewith.

#### By-Law No. 7 .- Slaughter Houses.

No slaughter house shall be erected or used within the boundaries of the Municipality without the previous sanction in writing of the Council, and any person offending against this By-law shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £20.

#### By-Law No. 8.—Pigs.

No person shall keep any kind of living swine within 100 feet of any inhabited dwelling house, public street, or roadway within the Municipality, and shall not, in any case, keep such swine so as to be a nuisance to any person, or injurious to public health, and any person offending against this By-law shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty not exceeding £2 for every such offence.

#### By-Law No. 9.—Noxious Trades.

- 1. Any person who shall establish, or carry on, within the Municipality, without the consent (in writing) of the Council, any of the undermentioned trades, businesses, or occupations, viz.:—
  - (a.) Manure works.
  - (b.) Works for boiling down meat, bones, or offal.
  - (c.) Bone mills or bone manure depôts.
  - (d.) Fellmongers, tanneries or wool scouring establishments
  - (e.) Glue factories.
  - (f.) Fish curing establishments.
  - (g.) Places for storing, drying, or preserving of bones, hides, hoofs, or skins, or any noxious or offensive trade, business, or manufacture

shall be guilty of an offence, and shall, upon conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding £20, and shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5 for each and every day during which such trade, business, or manufacture is convicted on

2. Any person intending to apply to the Council for consent to establish any of the said trades, establishments, or store houses must publish notice of such intention, by advertising in two newspapers circulating in the Municipality, for one calendar month, and if any ratepayer or resident within the Municipality objects to the establishment of such business he may state such objections to the Council.

# BY-LAW No. 10.—Fires in Chimney Flues.

The occupier of any premises within the Municipality whereof any chimney flues shall take fire from having been suffered to become foul shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty not exceeding  $\pounds 1$ : Provided that if any defendant shall plead that such chimney flue did not take fire in consequence of being foul, the onus of proof shall lie on such defendant.

By-Law No. 11.—Damaging Property, etc., of Municipality. Any person who shall (without first having obtained the sanction in writing of the Council) break up, cut down, damage, destroy, or injure, or remove or carry away any footpath, tree, plant, post, fence, gate, drain, watercourse, culvert, jetty, wharf, building, dead bush in use for the purpose of arresting drift sand, or other property belonging to or in charge of or under the possession, control, or power of the Council shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty not exceeding £10 for every such offence.

#### By-Law No. 12 .- To prevent Danger from Fire.

Any person who shall (without first obtaining the permission in writing of the Mayor), anywhere within the limits of the Municipality, light any unguarded fire, or set fire to any straw, wood, or rubbish, or make any bonfire, or let off any fireworks within the Municipality, shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty not exceeding £5 for every such offence.

# BY-LAW No. 13. -To prevent Danger from Firearms.

Any person who shall wantonly or without lawful excuse discharge any firearm in, near to, or across any public street within the limits of the Municipality shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty not exceeding  $\pounds 2$  for every such offence.

By-Law No. 14.—To prevent Danger from Inflammable Materials.

- 1. Any person who shall stack any hay, straw, or other inflammable material within 75 feet of any house or other building, and who shall not remove the same within 48 hours after due notice by the Mayor, shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £10 for every such offence.
- 2. Any person who (without the consent in writing of the Council) shall stack more than 20 cords of firewood in one open or uncovered spot, within the limits of the Municipality, shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty of £5 for every such offence.
- 3. And whereas great danger to life and property, by reason of fire, arises from the practice of allowing the accumulation of dangerous quantities of shavings, sawdust straw, paper, and other inflammable materials in and upon the yards, ways, and other premises within the Municipality: Be it ordered and directed by the Council of the Municipality of Leederville that, if after one week's notice given by the Supervisor served upon the occupier, owner, or agent of the premises, such inflammable materials (being in dangerous quantities as aforesaid) shall not be removed, then the said occupier, owner, or agent shall be guilty of an offence against this By-law, and, on conviction, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding £5.
- 4. And whereas it is necessary that proper means be adopted for extinguishing fires that may occur within the Municipality, and to facilitate the extinguishing of such fires: Be it further ordered and directed that the captain for the time being of the fire brigade shall, at any fire, have the command of the brigade engaged, and also of all appliances employed in extinguishing such fire. That the said captain, or officer in command of the brigade, shall be empowered to enter upon or through any premises whilst in the execution of his duties, and to direct the action of the brigade through or upon such premises. The captain shall be empowered further to take water, either from tanks, reservoirs, or wells nearest or most convenient to the fire, and otherwise to do any other matter or thing which he shall deem expedient for the purposes aforesaid.
- 5. That the said captain, or officer in command, or the Mayor, shall be authorised to employ such persons to assist the brigade in extinguishing fires as he may deem necessary.

BY-LAW No. 15 .- To prevent Danger to Passengers.

Any house or building the roof whereof shall overhang or project over any public street without having a proper gutter and pipe to carry off the rain, or which shall have any cornice, crane, or hoist, or any other fixtures or projection overhanging or projecting over any public street, without the sanction in writing of the Council therefor, shall be deemed to be a nuisance, and any owner of any such house or building who shall neglect or refuse to remove or abate such nuisance, within seven days after due notice by the Mayor, shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty not exceeding £5 for every such offence.

Bx-Law No. 16.—To prevent the Danger of Rapid Driving and Riding round Corners.

Any person who shall ride or drive any animal or animals, whether attached to any vehicle or not, round the corners formed by the junction of any street in the Municipality with any other street in the Municipality at a pace exceeding a walking pace, shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty not exceeding £10 for every such offence.

By-Law No. 17.—To prevent the Danger from the Driving of Vehicles at Night.

Any person who, between any sunset and the following sunrise, shall in, upon, or along any of the public streets within the Municipality, drive any vehicle constructed for the conveyance of goods, wares, or merchandise, without having a lamp or lanthorn securely fixed and lighted at the off side of the front of such vehicle, or any vehicle constructed for the conveyance of persons as well as goods, wares, and merchandise, or of persons only, without having a lamp or lanthorn securely fixed on each side of the front of such vehicle, shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty not exceeding £5 for every such offence.

#### By-Law No. 18.—To ensure control over Vehicles and Horses.

Any person who, having the care of any vehicle in the public streets, shall be at such a distance from such vehicle as not to have the complete control over every horse drawing the same, and shall not have one wheel of such

vehicle chained, or the horse securely tied, shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty not exceeding £5 for every such offence.

#### By-Law No. 19.—Quarries and Timber.

- 1. Any person who shall quarry stone on the lands belonging to, or in charge of, or under the possession, control, or power of the Council, without a license therefor, shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, for every such offence a penalty not exceeding 40s.
- By-Law No. 20.—Schedule of Licenses and Fees to be paid yearly in advance on or before 31st January, or immediately on such live stock or carriages being kept within the Municipality, or hand-carts being used in the streets thereof, or slaughter-houses or bathing places being opened therein.

For goats, 2s. 6d. per head.

For sheep, 25s. per 100 head.

For every carriage of two wheels, 10s. each.

For every carriage of four wheels, 20s. each. Handcarts employed, if on the streets, 5s. each.

For a Slaughter-house License, £5.

For a Bathing House, Shed, or Machine License, £5.

Provided that if any such Slaughter-house, Bathing House, Shed, or Machine shall not be opened before the 1st day of July in any year, then the License Fee in respect thereof for that year shall be £2 10s. only.

Any person failing to pay the License as stated in the above Schedule shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a a penalty not exceeding £2 for each offence.

#### By-Law No. 21.—Bathing.

- 1. No person shall bathe in Lakes adjoining the Municipality, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., nor at any time unless dressed in proper bathing costume, that is, suitable bathing clothes or bathing drawers.
- 2. Provided that any person may bathe within any bathing house duly licensed by the Council. Any person offending against this By-law shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty not exceeding £2 for every such offence.

#### By-Law No. 22.—Baths.

- 1. No person shall erect or use, on or near the Lakes adjoining the Municipality, any bathing house, shed, or machine, without first having received the consent, in writing, of the Council.
- 2. All rules and regulations for the management of baths licensed under these By-laws, and the fees to be paid for the use thereof, and for the division of such baths so as to afford sufficient separate accommodation for the sexes and private baths for either sex, must be submitted to the Council for approval. Any person offending against this By-law shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £10 for every such offence.

By-Law No. 23.—Erection of Tents, Pavilions, etc.

Any person who shall erect a tent, pavilion, shed, or other structure of canvas or inflammable material within the Municipality, without first receiving the consent of the Mayor or Council, in writing, shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £2 for every such offence.

#### By-Law No. 24.—Horses.

- 1. No person shall break in any horse in the main streets, either by leading, riding, or driving.
- 2. No entire horse shall be led or exhibited through or in the streets or public places within the Municipality within the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., and further, no person shall allow any mare to be covered by an entire horse, except in yards properly enclosed, without the consent of the Council in writing. Any person offending against any portion of this By-law shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £5 for every such offence.

#### By-Law No. 25.—Sign Boards, etc.

- 1. Any person who shall erect or place any sign boards, signs, awnings, blinds, overhanging lamps, or other things over or near any footway or roadway without first obtaining the consent of the Council in writing, shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £2 for every such offence.
- 2. Any person wishing to erect any balcony, verandah, or signboard over any part of a street or footway shall obtain permission of the Council, in writing, before so doing; and any balcony, verandah, or signboard so erected by the consent of the Council shall be at least eight feet clear above the street or footway over which it is erected, and shall be built in a substantial manner, and shall be subject to the approval of the Council, both with respect to its strength and appearance; and further, the Council

will have power to remove, or cause to be removed any balcony, verandah, or signboard now erected, or that may be hereafter erected, over any street in the Municipality, not being erected in conformity with this By-law, provided that the owner or occupier of the premises to which any such balcony, verandah, or signboard is, or may be attached, shall have received 14 days' notice, in writing, from the Council, to remove such balcony, verandah, or signboard, and any owner, or occupier failing to remove such balcony, verandah, or signboard, after having received the said notice, shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty not exceeding £10 together with all expenses (if any) incurred by the Council in removing any such balcony, verandah, or signboard.

#### BY-LAW No. 26-Obstruction of Streets and Footpaths.

- 1. Any person who shall obstruct any street or footway within the Municipality, by placing any stone, bricks, timber, or any other building material, packing cases, or any other things, without first obtaining permission of the Council, shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £2 for every such offence.
- 2. And any person using any footpath or roadway by placing any stone, bricks, timber, or any other building material thereon, and thereby cause any damage to the said footpath or roadway, shall be liable to pay the cost of the said footpath or roadway so damaged.
- 3. And any person placing any stone, bricks, timber, or any other building material on any footway or roadway without keeping sufficient light or lights affixed thereto, from sunset to sunrise, shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £2 for every such offence.

#### By-Law No. 27.-Hoardings.

- 1. The Council may grant permission to any person to erect and use hoardings over or upon any street or footway, and any person obtaining such permission shall pay to the Council the following fees, viz.:—One penny per lineal foot of street or pathway over or upon which such hoarding may be erected or used per month, or any part of a month, or a minimum fee of 2s. 6d. per month; and any person erecting or using any such hoarding shall keep a sufficient light or lights affixed thereto, in a conspicuous place from sunset to sunrise; and any person who shall make any excavation on or near any foctway or roadway shall erect a sufficient hoarding for the safety of the public, and shall affix sufficient light or lights thereto from sunset to sunrise.
- 2. Any excavation cellar, opening, or gutter made under any footway shall be made secure from danger to the public, or filled in, as may be directed by the Council, by the person making any such excavation, opening, or gutter. Any person offending against this By-law shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £2 for every such offence.

#### By-Law No. 28.—Lamp-Posts, etc.

All lamp posts, bridle posts, telegraph, telephone, and electric-lighting poles and flagstaffs shall not be erected by any person in any street without the written consent of the Council, and shall be placed in such position, and shall be painted at least once in every three years, as may be directed by the Council, and the Council may order the removal by the owners of all bent, dangerous, or unsightly posts or poles. Any person offending against this By-law shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £2 for every such offence.

# By-Law No. 29.—Processions and Bands.

- 1. No procession, other than a funeral procession, shall pass through any street within the Municipality without first having obtained the written permission of the Mayor or Council
- 2. No band or person shall be allowed to play any musical instrument in any of the streets within the Municipality without first obtaining permission of the Mayor or Council. Any person offending against this By-law shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £5 for every such offence.

# By-Law No. 30 .- Walls and Fences.

- 1. No person shall erect any fence with bush, or other dangerous or inflammable substance, abutting on any public street, without first obtaining permission of the Council in writing.
- 2. Any fence or wall erected and abutting on any public street will be subject to the approval of the Council, and the owner of any such fence or wall shall keep and maintain such fence or wall in good order and repair, and shall remove the same if not so approved, and upon the Council ordering the removal of the same.

3. No person shall erect a fence of barbed wire abutting on any public street within the Municipality.

Any person offending against this By-law shall forfeit any pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding  $\pounds 5$  for every such offence.

#### By-Law No. 31.-Velocipedes, etc.

A person who shall ride or place a bicycle or other velocipede upon any footpath, and any person riding or placing a bicycle or velocipede upon any street, between sunset and sunrise, without carrying a lighted lamp and an alarm bell attached to the front part of such bicycle or velocipede, and sounding the bell in ample time to allow foot passengers and others to protect themselves from danger, and any person riding a bicycle or other velocipede in or upon any street or roadway in a furious manner shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £2 for every such offence.

By-Law No. 32.—Unyoked Cattle and Unbroken Horses.

Any person who shall drive any unyoked cattle or unbroken horses through the streets between the hours of 8 a.m. and 6 p.m., without the permission of the Mayor or Council in writing, shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £2 for every such offence.

# By-Law No. 33.—Throwing Dangerous Substances on Footpaths,

Any person who shall throw any orange-peel, vegetable substances, or any offensive, noxious, or dangerous substance upon any footpath within the Municipality, shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £1 for every such offence.

#### By-Law No. 34.—Vehicles not having Springs.

Any person who shall cause any wagon, cart, or other carriage not having springs or drive any animal attached thereto, at any faster rate, speed, or pace, than a common walk, shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £2.

#### By-Law No. 35 .- Goods left in the Streets.

Any person who shall allow any goods, merchandise, coal, or firewood to remain in any street for a longer period than necessary for housing or removing the same, shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £2.

#### By-Law No. 36.—Removal of Vehicles or Animals left on the Street.

Any officer of the Council or any police constable may seize and remove any animals or vehicles left unattended in any street, or obstructing any portion of any street, and the owners of any animals so seized or removed shall be liable, and, upon conviction, shall pay any expenses incurred in such seizure or removal, and shall also pay all expenses incurred in the care and keep of any such animals or vehicles after such seizure or removal, and shall pay a penalty not exceeding £2.

# By-Law No. 37.—Impure water or liquid matter not to flow on any street.

Any owner or occupier of any house, land, or premises within the Municipality, who shall allow any impure water or any liquid matter of any description to flow from such house, land, or premises, into or upon any street, footway, or gutter, and any person who shall throw or place thereon or therein any impure water or any liquid matter of any description, shall be guilty of an offence against this By-law and, upon conviction, shall pay a penalty not exceeding £5'

#### By-Law No. 38.—Temporary Stalls.

The Council may grant permission to any person to fix and use temporary stalls in or near any street for the sale of any meat, fruit, vegetables, drink, eatables, or articles of merchandise, for such time and such places as the Council may think fit, provided that the general traffic is not obstructed by any such stalls, and that such permission may be withdrawn by the Mayor or Council at any time by written notice: And the Council shall charge the person using a fee not exceeding £5, and any person erecting or using any such stall in or near any street for the above purposes, without first obtaining such permission of the Council, shall be guilty of an offence against this By-law, and be subject to a penalty of £5 for each offence.

#### By-Law No. 39 -No glass, etc., to be affixed to walls.

No person shall affix any broken glass, glass bottles, iron spikes, or barbed wire to any wall, fence, or building, abutting on any street or roadway within the municipality, unless at a height of five feet above such street or roadway, and

the owner of any spikes placed in any fence, wall, or building, at a lower height, shall so protect the same as to prevent danger to the public. Any person offending against this By-Law shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £2 for every such offence.

By-Law No. 40.—Regulation of Street Traffic on special occasions.

The Council may, in its discretion, regulate or prohibit the traffic in or along all or any of the foot and carriage ways of any street during times of public interest, amusement, or excitement.

#### By-Law No. 41.—Park Lands, Reserves, and Recreation Grounds.

- 1. All park lands and recreation grounds shall be open to the public daily for recreation purposes, excepting as otherwise provided for in these By-laws.
- 2. The Council shall have the power to grant the exclusive right to use and occupy any park lands, recreation grounds, or reserves within the Municipality, for holding public sports or amusements, to any responsible person or persons, for any time not exceeding three days, and any person or persons obtaining such right shall be responsible for the proper care of all fences, buildings, and trees upon or enclosing such park lands, recreation grounds, and reserves, and shall pay to the Council a fee to be fixed; but the public will have the right to enter upon such lands, provided they do not in any way interfere with sports or amusements being carried on.
- 3. No horses, cattle, or vehicles shall be allowed upon any park land or recreation ground without the written permission of the Mayor or Council.
- 4. All persons using or being upon any park lands, recreation grounds, or reserves shall at all times conduct themselves in a becoming manner, and any person creating any disturbance or annoyance to the public shall be liable to be expelled from such lands by any police constable or officer of the corporation.
- 5. The Council may, in its discretion, prohibit any games or gymnastics from being played or carried on by any person or persons upon any park lands, recreation grounds, or reserves, on any Sunday, Christmas Day, or Good Friday.
- 6. No person shall sell, or expose for sale, any goods, wares, fruit, or merchandise in any park lands, recreation grounds, or reserves, without first having obtained the written consent of the Mayor or Council, and shall pay a fee; the amount of such fee not to exceed £10.
- 7. No person shall damage or injure any tree, shrub, or plant in any park lands, recreation grounds, or reserves. Any person offending against this By-law shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £10 for every such offence.

#### By-Law No. 42.—Dairies.

- 1. Any person or persons carrying on the trade of cow keepers, dairymen, or purveyors of milk within the Municipality shall register their names and addresses with the Town Clerk, and shall keep their milk stores, shops, or dairies, or milk vessels used for containing milk for sale, and every place used in connection therewith, in a thoroughly clean condition, to the satisfaction of an officer appointed by the Council.
- 2. No person shall contaminate or adulterate in any way any milk offered for sale within the Municipality. Any person offending against this By-law shall forfeit and pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £20 for every such offence.

#### By-Law No. 43.—Camels.

Any person who shall, in, upon, or along any of the public streets within the Municipality, ride, drive, or lead any camel or dromedary, without the sanction of the Council in writing, shall pay, upon conviction, a penalty not exceeding £5 for every such offence, and any person depasturing camels or dromedaries on the park lands, commonage, or other lands within the boundaries or under the control of the Municipality, without the sanction of the Council in writing, shall pay, on conviction, a penalty not exceeding £1 for every animal so depastured.

- By-Law No. 44.—A By-law for Regulating Hackney Carriages, and Vehicles Licensed to carry Passengers and Plying for Hire, and the Owners and Drivers thereof, within the Municipality of Leederville.
- 1. The Licensing Officer of the Municipality shall issue licenses only to such owners, conductors, and drivers of hackney carriages, vehicles, and cabs as, in his discretion, are fit to be intrusted therewith, and such licenses may be on the forms contained in Schedules C and D respectively.

- A driver's license shall entitle the owner thereof, during the existence of license, to drive any licensed carriage, vehicle, or cab within the Municipality of Leederville. A carriage license shall permit and allow the carriage, vehicle, or cab therein referred to, during the existence of the license, to be used for the carriage of the number of passengers mentioned in such license in the Municipality of Leederville, when driven by a licensed driver; but such license shall not entitle the owner to become the driver unless he is a licensed driver under the preceding section.
- 2. The Licensing Officer shall not license any person as driver of any licensed vehicle, unless and until he is satisfied the person so offering himself as a driver is fit and competent for the duties of a licensed driver, but he may, at his option, grant to such applicant a temporary license for a term not exceeding seven days by the way of testing his competency for the position of licensed driver.
- 3. The Licensing Officer shall not license any carriage or vehicle to ply for hire unless he is satisfied that it is a vehicle fit for the purpose for which it is sought to be licensed.
- 4. Licensed vehicles known as "hansom cabs," when plying for hire within the Municipality, shall not be allowed to carry more than two passengers at one time.
- 5. Every passenger vehicle plying for hire, or engaged after sunset and before sunrise, shall be provided with a lamp or lamps inside such vehicle, so placed as to give a convenient and sufficient light inside, and the driver shall keep the same lighted while so plying or engaged for hire.
- 6. The number of the license, and the number of persons to be carried inside and outside, shall be painted on the outside of every carriage in figures of not less than two inches in length and of proportionate breadth, in such position as the Licensing Officer may direct, and such number shall be kept legible and undefaced during all the time the carriage shall ply and be used for hire.
- 7. The number of the license of every licensed carriage on a plate eight inches by four inches, painted in clear legible figures, together with the number of passengers which such carriage is licensed to carry inside and outside, and a printed card, to be provided by the Council, showing a table of fares fixed for time or distance, shall be affixed at the upper part of the front pannel, or in such place as the Inspector may direct inside of such carriage, and such plate and such card respectively shall be kept so affixed, conspicuous, legible, and undefaced, during all the time the carriage shall ply or be used for hire.
- 8. No licensed carriage shall ply for hire or carry passengers unless at the time of such plying or carrying, such carriage be drawn by at least the number of horses proportioned to the number of passengers which such carriage or omnibus shall have been licensed to carry, as follows, that is to say:—If licensed to carry six, or any less number of persons, one horse; if licensed to carry more than six, and not more than fifteen persons, two horses; if licensed to carry more than tifteen, and not more than twenty-seven persons, three horses; if licensed to carry more than twenty-seven, and not more than thirty-nine persons, four horses; and so on in the same proportion for any greater number of persons.
- 9. (a.) Omnibuses shall ply for hire along the several routes named on their respective licenses.
  - (b.) No omnibus will be allowed to carry more than the number of passengers for which it is licensed.
  - (c.) Omnibuses must run according to time-tables approved by the Council.
  - (d.) The charge for each passenger shall in no case exceed threepence (children in arms not included). This payment shall be inclusive of all charges for luggage, not exceeding 14lbs. weight for each passenger.
  - (c.) No vehicles, other than omnibuses, shall be allowed to ply for hire off the stands as published.
  - (f.) The number of passengers to be carried shall be clearly painted both on the outside and inside of each omnibus.
  - (g.) In all other respects omnibuses will be subject to the regulations contained in this By-law and to the penalties set forth herein.
  - (h.) Any infringement of Clause (e.) of this Section shall subject the driver to a penalty of £1 for the first offence, and cancellation of his license as driver for 12 months for a repetition of such offence.

- (i.) Omnibuses must have the name of the street or town painted on either side, as the case may demand, in letters not less than 6in., and have such coloured light as the Council may require affixed from sunset to sunrise.
- 10. It shall not be necessary, except upon request, and at the first licensing of any vehicle, to deliver to the owners of licensed carriages or vehicles a printed copy of the By-law regulating licensed hackney carriages and vehicles.
- 11. No hackney carriage of any description whatsoever shall ply for hire within the Municipality until and unless the same be duly licensed by the said Licensing Officer.
- 12. No driver or conductor of a licensed vehicle shall lend or part with his license, nor shall the proprietor of any such vehicle employ an unlicensed person as driver or conductor thereof.
- 13. No person shall act as driver of any licensed vehicle who shall not be of the full age of 17 years, neither shall any person act as conductor of any licensed vehicle who is not of the full age of 13 years.
- 14. The driver of every licensed carriage shall be constantly attendant on the same when plying for hire, and shall remain with it, and shall not stand on the footways near the stands, and shall not place any carriage, or stand, or ply for hire in any part of the streets or roadways within the Municipality other than on one of the stands; and shall not be drunk whilst driving or plying for hire; and shall not use any abusive language to any other driver, or to any person hiring or applying to hire any carriage, or conveyed in the same; and shall not loiter with any carriage in any of such streets or roadways.
- 15. No driver of any hackney carriage shall suffer the same to stand for hire across any street or alongside of any other hackney carriage, nor obstruct the driver of any other carriage in taking up or setting down any person, nor wilfully, wrongfully, or forcibly prevent or endeavour to prevent the driver of any other carriage from taking a fare.
- 16. No driver or conductor shall, at any time, whilst loading, unloading, or attending any licensed carriage, wilfully or negligently do, or cause or suffer to be done, any damage to the person or property of anyone, or be guilty of any breach of the peace, misconduct, or behaviour whereby a breach of the peace may be occasioned in any respect in such employment.
- 17. Every person having the care or conduct of any carriage shall keep the same on the left or near side of the road, except in case of actual necessity or other sufficient reason for deviation, and shall not interrupt or interfere with any person or carriage passing or attempting to pass his carriage.
- 18. Every driver, whilst engaged in taking up or setting down any passenger, shall, during such taking up or setting down, place his carriage as near as conveniently may be to the kerb at that side of the street at which the taking up or setting down is required.
- 19. No owner or driver shall, while having the care of, or being attendant upon, any licensed carriage, drive the same furiously, wantonly, or carelessly.
- 20. No owner or driver of any licensed carriage shall refuse or delay to admit and carry in and by his carriage the number of persons painted or marked thereon, or specified in the license granted in respect thereof.
- 21. No owner or driver of any licensed carriage, or other licensed vehicle, having agreed to take any fare at any time, or from any place, shall delay, neglect, or refuse to fulfil such agreement.
- 22. No driver shall carry, or knowingly permit to be carried, in any licensed carriage, except to some police office or watchhouse, any drunken or intoxicated person, or any person so violently or noisily conducting himself, or otherwise so misbehaving as to occasion any public annoyance, or annoyance to the passengers of such vehicle, or disturb the public peace.
- 23. No driver shall smoke any pipe or cigar whilst driving any licensed carriage; nor shall any passenger smoke inside any hackney carriage or whilst a passenger therein; nor shall any passenger smoke if he is an outside passenger of any vehicle, should any passenger by such vehicle object to such smoking.
- 24. Any driver found asleep in his vehicle while such vehicle is on the stand and plying for hire, shall be deemed not to be in attendance thereon.
- 25. No owner or driver of any licensed carriage shall carry, or permit to be carried, in or upon any such carriage, any coffin containing the deceased body of any person.

- 26. The driver of every hackney carriage shall place a muzzle upon the head of any vicious horse employed by him and harnessed to such carriage, and keep the same thereon whilst on the stand waiting for hire.
- 27. Every driver who shall feed any horse whilst on the stand waiting for hire shall use a nosebag to contain the forage, and shall not remove such horse's winkers during the time of feeding.
- 28. No driver of any hackney carriage shall allow any person to ride on the box or in or upon any part of such carriage, without the permission of the person hiring the same.
- 29. No owner or driver of any carriage, or any other person, shall obstruct any officer of the Corporation in the execution of his duties.
- 30. The driver of every licensed carriage driving the same by any place of public worship during the hours of divine service therein, on any Sunday, shall drive such carriage whilst passing such place of public worship at a walking pace.
- 31. The driver of any carriage or licensed vehicle shall, on being requested by an officer of the Corporation, police constable, or any passenger or intended passenger, give to such officer, police constable, passenger, or intended passenger, his name and number of licensed carriage or vehicle.
- 32. No driver shall, except whilst standing on an appointed stand, permit his vehicle, with or without horses, to stand in any part of the Municipality longer than may be absolutely necessary for loading or unloading, or for taking up or putting down passengers, nor shall cause any obstruction in any part of the Municipality.
- 33. No driver or conductor of any licensed carriage shall wilfully deceive any person in respect to the route of destination thereof, or for the purpose of taking up or setting down a passenger, or except, in case of accident, or other unavoidable necessity, stop such a carriage upon any place where foot passengers usually cross the carriage way.
- 34. No proprietor shall be at liberty to lend his license to any person.
- 35. No proprietor shall be at liberty to part with his licensed vehicle without registering the name of the purchaser in the books of the Licensing Officer, and on the license granted for such vehicle; and any proprietor who shall part with his vehicle without such registry shall still be deemed the proprietor thereof, and subject as such to all the provisions of this By-law as fully as if no change of ownership had taken place; and the purchaser of such vehicle who shall allow the same to be used or to ply for hire without such registry, shall be subject to the same penalty as is imposed by this By-law on a person for plying without a license; and the person or persons in whose name or names a license shall appear to have been obtained, shall be deemed the owner of the vehicle in respect of which the same shall be taken out, until the transfer shall have been duly made.
- 36. Whenever any person named as the proprietor, or one of the proprietors of a licensed vehicle, shall change his place of abode, he shall, within seven days next after any such change, give notice thereof in writing, signed by him, to the Licensing Officer, specifying his new place of abode, and the same shall be duly indorsed upon the license granted to such proprietor.
- 37. Every owner licensed under the provisions hereof shall, at the time of his first obtaining a license, have delivered to him, without any charge, a printed copy of this By-law; and every such owner or driver, respectively, shall, at all times, have such copy of this By-law ready to produce, and shall, upon request, produce the same for perusal to any person using or hiring such carriage.
- 38. The owner of every licensed carriage shall at all times, when plying or employing such carriage for hire, have the same in good order with the harness sufficient, perfect, and in good condition, and the whole ready and sufficient for duty, with the driver and horse or horses competent to perform any drive or distance that may be reasonably required.
- 39. Every licensed carriage applying for hire, or engaged after sunset and before sunrise, shall be provided with two proper carriage lamps, and the driver shall keep the same lighted while so plying or engaged for hire.
- 40. Every owner or driver of a hackney carriage standing or plying for hire at any public stand appointed by the said Council shall, unless previously engaged (the proof of which engagement shall be on such owner or driver), be bound to take immediately any fare not exceeding the number of persons which his carriage is licensed to carry; and no owner or driver of any hackney carriage shall refuse to carry thereby a reasonable quantity of luggage for any

person hiring or desiring to hire such carriage, nor shall refuse to drive the same to any place within the Municipality, nor for any time not exceeding six hours, if so required by any person hiring or intending to hire such carriage, nor shall fail to drive the same at a reasonable speed, not less than six miles an hour, unless unavoidably delayed or required by the hirer to drive at any slower pace, reasonable time being allowed for food or bate for the horses.

- 41. Every owner or driver of a hackney carriage or other licensed vehicle, or of a waggon, dray, cart, or other vehicle carrying goods or merchandise, standing or plying for hire at any appointed public stand shall, on engaging to take a fare, either by time or distance, perform such engagement, whether the distance to be travelled shall be within or without the bounds of the Municipality. And every owner or driver of a licensed vehicle, or of a waggon, dray, cart, or other vehicle aforesaid, standing or plying for hire as aforesaid shall, unless previously engaged (the proof of which engagement shall be on such owner or driver), be bound to take immediately (or provide a substitute for) any employment tendered to him for the hire of and suitable for his vehicle.
- 42. The owner of any hackney carriage shall, upon request made by any person, or by the Inspector, or by any police constable, declare to the person, Inspector, or constable requiring the same, the name and place of abode of the conductor or driver thereof.
- 43. The owner or driver of any hackney carriage, wherein any property whatever shall be left by any person hiring or using such carriage, shall, within eighteen hours next after the same shall have so left, restore such property, in the state in which the same shall have been found, to the owner thereof, or if the owner cannot be traced, shall deposit such property in the office of the Licensing Officer, and if any owner or driver shall make default herein, he shall forfeit such sum, not exceeding Five pounds, as the justice or justices before whom such complaint shall be made shall award for an offence against the provisions of this By-law, and when any such property shall be deposited as aforesaid, the officer receiving the same shall give an acknowledgment to the depositor, and make an entry and record thereof, and the property so deposited shall be returned to the person who shall prove ownership to the satisfaction of the said Council, such person previously paying all expenses incurred. And if any property so found and deposited shall not be claimed by the owner thereof within one year after the date of deposit, the property having been advertised in such manner as the said Council may direct, such property shall be sold by public auction, and the proceeds thereof disposed of according to law.
- 44. All owners of carriages, or drivers, or other persons attending any such carriages, shall bring his or their carriage for inspection when the same shall be ordered.
- 45. If by any unavoidable accident any carriage shall become unfit for use, and also during such reasonable time as any such carriage may be undergoing repair, it shall be lawful for the owner, subject to the approval of the Inspector, to use a spare carriage; but the same shall, in all respects, except as to a license, be subject to these By-laws in the same manner as if a license had been granted for the same; and the person using such spare carriage shall be liable in the same manner for any non-compliance with these By-laws in respect thereof, as if the same had been licensed. Before using such spare carriage the owner shall give notice thereof in writing at the office of the Inspector, stating the true cause of the carriage being disused, and the period during which such spare carriage will be required, and no such spare carriage will be used until it has been inspected and approved of by the Inspector, nor for a longer period than that stated in a certificate to be signed by the Inspector and delivered to the owner; but any carriage may be used for the purpose of finishing a journey which may have been interrupted by accident.
- 46. The license of any owner, driver, or conductor may, for any misconduct, be revoked, cancelled, or suspended by the Licensing Officer as he shall deem right after notice given to such owner, driver, or conductor to show cause why the same should not be revoked, cancelled, or suspended, and opportunity thereupon given to him to show such cause.
- 47. The Licensing Officer may refuse to issue a license to any person he shall think disqualified therefor; and he shall refuse to issue a license to any person against whom several complaints may have been made to the Licensing Officer, or to the Council, or informations laid before a Justice.

- 48. In the event of any license being refused, revoked cancelled, or suspended, it shall be lawful for the person affected to appeal to the Mayor and Council against the decision of the Licensing Officer, who shall inquire into the matter of such appeal, and, at their discretion, confirm the decision of the Licensing Officer or direct the issue or continuance of a license, and their decision shall be final.
- 49. No licensed vehicle shall pass any other licensed vehicle in the Municipality proceeding in the same direction to or from the stand if the latter be proceeding on its journey at the rate of six miles an hour, and no licensed vehicle shall immediately precede or follow another licensed vehicle, or nurse or shepherd the same to the danger or annoyance of the passengers of either vehicle.
- 50. No agreement whatever made with the owner or driver of any hackney carriage for the payment of any more than his proper fare, as fixed or limited by law, shall be binding or held to authorise any overcharge whatever where such vehicle is engaged on and removed from the stand under such agreement; and in case any person shall be required to pay, and shall pay, to such owner or driver, whether in pursuance of any agreement or not, any sum exceeding the proper fare, the person paying the same shall be entitled, on complaint made against such owner or driver before any Justice, to recover back the sum paid beyond the proper fare: And such owner or driver shall further, for such exaction, be liable to a penalty for an offence against the provisions hereof.
- 51. The rates and fares to be charged by the owners and drivers of hackney carriages and all licensed public vehicles plying for hire within the Municipality shall be as set forth in the Schedule hereto, marked A, and shall be deemed to be the rates and fares which may be lawfully demanded, received, or taken by any hackney carriage or public vehicle, owner or driver, as aforesaid: Provided that such rates and fares shall be inclusive of all charges for luggage not exceeding twenty-five pounds weight for each passenger.
- 52. No child under four years of age shall be counted as a passenger unless there shall be more than one, in which case two of such children shall be considered as one passenger, and so on in respect of every two such children. Children at the breast shall not be considered as passengers in any case.
- 53. Any person having hired or used a licensed carriage, and refusing to pay the legal fare at the termination of the journey or engagement, or when demanded, shall on conviction before any Justice or Justices of the Peace, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding £5.
- 54. The places set forth and described in the Schedule hereto, marked B, are public stands, where all hackney carriages and vehicles shall ply for hire, and such stands or such other stands in such other places as the Council of the Municipality may from time to time appoint (due notice of which shall be given by public advertisement in the Government Gazette, or in one or more of the local newspapers), shall be and continue the public stands of the Municipality for the purpose aforesaid; and no person shall draw up or station his carriage or vehicle at any other place to ply for hire, and all carriages and vehicles shall be considered plying for hire if on any appointed stand.
- 55. Hackney carriages shall take their station on the stand in the order of their arrival, and when any carriage shall be called or driven off any stand, the carriage immediately behind shall draw up to the place vacated, and all other carriages behind shall draw up in the like order.
- 56. The Council or the Mayor for the time being of the said Municipality may appoint such and so many places in the Municipality as from time to time they or he shall deem necessary as temporary stands, where hackney carriages and vehicles may ply for hire in addition to the usual and published stands; but such additional places shall be public stands only for such time as shall be set forth in an advertisement in one or more newspapers published in the said Municipality.
- 57. At every fourth vehicle on every stand there shall be left a space of eight feet at least for foot passengers to pass through.
- 58. The distance for which any charge shall be made shall be computed from the stand or place where the carriage was hired, but in case the carriage shall be taken from any place of public anusement or public building the distance shall be computed from such last-mentioned place or building, and not from the stand where the carriage may usually ply.

59. Every licensed vehicle plying from and to fixed places without the Municipality shall have painted in letters at least four inches in length and of proportionate breadth, and in a colour different from and opposite to the colour of the ground on which such letters shall be painted, upon some conspicuous part of such vehicle, so that the same shall be at all times plainly and distinctly visible and legible, the name or names of the extreme place or places from which and to which such licensed vehicle shall be licensed to travel and go.

licensed to travel and go.

60. The words "Town Clerk," where used in this By-law, shall be understood to mean the Town Clerk of the Municipality of Leederville; the words "Inspector of Vehicles," or "Licensing Officer," shall be understood to mean the Inspector of Vehicles or Licensing Officer for the Municipality; the word "Owner" shall signify every person possessed of a beneficial interest in any hackney carriage; the words "hackney carriage," when used in this By-law, shall signify and mean every description of public vehicle plying for hire within the Municipality, and licensed to carry passengers; "Conductor" shall mean and include every director or other person, except the driver, who shall attend upon the passengers in any licensed carriage. And whenever in this By-law, with references to any person, animal, matter, or thing, any word or words is or are used importing the singular number or the masculine gender only, such word or words shall be understood to include several persons or animals as well as one person or animal, females as well as males, bodies corporate or politic as well as individuals, and several matters or things as well as one matter or thing, unless it be otherwise specially provided, or there be something in the subject or context repugnant thereto.

- 61. Nothing in this By-law contained shall apply or be held to apply to carriages which shall be let for hire only when previously ordered or bespoken at the residence of their owners, and which shall never be permitted to apply for hire in any street or place off the premises of their respective owners, or the owners or drivers of such carriages.
- 62. For every offence against any provision of this Bylaw, except wherein a penalty is provided for, the offender shall, upon conviction, be liable to and shall pay a penalty not exceeding £5, to be recovered in a summary way before any Justice of the Peace: Provided that, where by this Bylaw any penalty is imposed upon the owner and driver of any licensed carriage for one and the same offence, only one prosecution shall be had or maintained for the recovery of such penalty against such owner or driver at the option of the person prosecuting the same.

# Municipality of Geraldton.

# By-Laws.

For the Regulation of the Construction of Buildings in the Municipality of Geraldton, under the provisions of "The Building Act, 1884," and "The Building Act Amendment Acts, 1887 and 1895."

Interpretation Clause.

1. The several words mentioned in the second section of "The Building Act, 1884" shall, where used in these Bylaws, have the same construction as is provided for by such section, except that the words "Council," "Mayor," "Town Clerk," and "Surveyor" shall mean the Council, Mayor, Town Clerk or Surveyor, respectively, of the Municipality of Geraldton.

Notice of intention to build.

2. Every person intending to commence to build, take down, alter, add to, or repair any building, or to do any act whereby any public street may be obstructed or rendered dangerous or inconvenient to persons passing over or near thereto, shall give three clear days' notice, in writing, to the Surveyor of his intention so to do, and shall deposit drawings and specifications of the proposed works. Such notice shall be delivered at the Surveyor's office, and shall contain particulars of the site and nature of such intended building, work, or other act. The Surveyor shall thereupon gant a license in the form "A" of the schedule hereto, and also give such directions as he shall think fit for the erection of hoardings or fences, and a platform and handrail for the protection of passengers, and such directions shall be complied with to the satisfaction of the Surveyor before the commencement of such building, work, or act. Every breach of this By-law shall subject the person guilty of such breach to a penalty of £5, and a further penalty of £1 for each day the same continues, recoverable in a summary manner before Justices.

Notice of intention to use area in public street, &c., for deposit of materials.

3. Every person wishing to deposit any stones, bricks, lime, rubbish, timber, iron, or other materials on any public street, or to make any excavation on any land abutting on or adjoining or contiguous to any public street, shall first make application for and obtain from the Surveyor a license so to do. Such license shall be given in the form "A" in the schedule hereto. Having paid the fees and the deposit stated in the said form, he may then occupy the site subject to the conditions stated in such license. Any infringement of this By-law shall subject the person guilty of such infringement to a fine of £5 for every day such infringement continues, to be recovered in a summary manner before Justices

#### Hoardings to be kept in repair.

4. Every person who shall be required to erect any hoarding, fence, platform, or handrail under the two last preceding By-laws shall keep the same in good and sufficient repair to the satisfaction of the Surveyor so long as it shall, in his opinion, be necessary for the public safety; and every such person shall, immediately upon receipt of notice from the Surveyor that such hoarding, fence, platform, or handrail is out of repair, and requiring him to repair same, forthwith repair the same to the satisfaction of the Surveyor, and shall be liable to a penalty of £1 for every day the same shall continue in disrepair after the receipt by him of such notice.

#### Hoardings, &c., to be lighted.

5. Every person erecting such hoarding, fence, platform or handrail, or obstruction of any kind in the public street, or any excavation as aforesaid, shall cause the same to be well and sufficiently lighted at night, and shall be liable to a penalty of £1 for every night on which the same is not so lighted.

#### Power to Surveyor to enforce preceding By-laws.

6. It shall be lawful for the Surveyor, without reference to the Council, to take immediate steps to enforce any of the preceding By-laws, and he may cause any such hoarding, or other obstruction that has been erected without his license, or which has been erected or continued in breach of the conditions of any such license, to be removed, or any such excavation to be filled in, or injuries to the public street repaired at the cost and expense of the person erecting or making the same, and such costs and expenses shall be recoverable from the person so making the same, as well as the penalties hereinbefore imposed.

#### Materials of external walls facing any public street.

7. With regard to the component materials of external walls that front upon or face towards any public street.— Every such wall must be built of brick or stone or artificial stone, or such brick or stone or artificial stone together laid in, and with mortar or cement in such manner as to produce solid work.

#### Materials to be used in repair.

8. If any external wall or enclosure be at any time hereafter taken down or otherwise demolished for the height of one story, or for a space equal to one fourth of the whole surface of such external wall, then every part thereof not built in the manner and of the several materials by these By-laws directed for external walls must be taken down, and the same must be rebuilt in such manner, and of such materials for, and in all respects as by these By-laws directed for external walls hereafter to be built, according to the class and rate of the building to which such external wall or enclosure shall belong.

### ${\it Materials~of~party~walls.}$

9. Party walls in reference to the component materials thereof.—Every part of such party wall must be built of sound bricks or stone or artificial stone, or of such bricks or stone or artificial stone together laid in, and with mortar or cement, and in such manner as to produce solid work: And as to the woodwork which it may be desired to connect with the party walls of any building, the bearing ends of wooden beams, brestsummers, girders, trimming joists, and the ends of partitions, heads and sills, and the bearing ends of the main timbers of any roof, and wood bricks may be laid into the substance of a party wall; but no such beam, brestsummer, girder, joist, partition, head, or sill, nor any part of a roof being wood, nor any wood bricks, must be laid or placed within 2in. of the centre of any party wall; and no other woodwork of any kind must be laid into, placed upon, or be run or driven into any part of the substance of any party wall. But if the ends of timber be carried in iron shoes or stone corbels, then such iron shoes or stone corbels must be built into the wall at least one-half the thickness of such wall; and the top of every such party wall must be finished with one course of sound, hard bricks, set on edge in good mortar or cement, or by a coping of any other properly secured and sufficiently waterproof and fireproof covering.

#### Roofs to buildings.

10. With regard to the roof, flat, and gutter of any building, and of any projection therefrom, and also balconies, verandahs, and shop fronts.—They must be so arranged and constructed, and so supplied with gutters and pipes as to prevent the water therefrom dripping on to or running over any public way, and all such rain pipes, eaves, and gutters are to be made of metal.

#### Drains to buildings.

11. With regard to the drains of buildings of any class, and of every addition thereto.—Before the several walls of any such buildings shall have been built to the height of 10ft. from their foundations, the drains thereof must have been properly built and made good; that is to say, if there be within 100ft. from any front of the building a common sewer into which it is lawful and practicable to drain, then into such common sewer, and if there be not in such situation and within such distance any such common sewer, then to the best outlet that can be obtained, so as to render in either case drains available for the drainage of the lowest floor of such building or addition thereto, and also of its areas, privies, and offices; and every such drain must be laid to a sufficient fall or current, so as that the whole of every such drain within the walls of such building shall be wholly covered over under the lowest floor independently thereof, and every such drain within the walls of such building must be built and covered over with bricks, stone, or slate, and so as to render the drain air tight, and generally all drains shall be laid and built to the approval of the Surveyor.

#### Covering footpaths, &c.

12. In the case of any building being erected abutting on the footpath of a public street, or of any plastering operations being intended to be performed above the first story of any building, the builder or other persons having charge of such building or the plasterer shall, before proceeding to build further than the first story of such building so being erected, or with any plastering as aforesaid, give notice thereof in writing to the Surveyor, who shall thereupon give directions to such builder, person, or plasterer, for the covering of such footpath as he shall think fit, and any builder, person, or plasterer who shall fail to give such notice or shall proceed with such building or plastering without having complied in all respects with the directions of the Surveyor, or without keeping such covering or other erection directed by him in an efficient state of repair to the satisfaction of such Surveyor, shall incur a penalty of £5 for each day in which such default shall occur or continue.

#### Back yards.

13. With regard to back yards or open spaces attached to dwelling houses.—Every house hereafter built or rebuilt must have an enclosed back yard or open space of at least two squares, exclusive of any building thereon, unless all the rooms of such house can be lighted and ventilated from the street.

#### Privies.

14. Privies at present built or hereafter to be built.—Every privy as to situation, size, and construction, is to be to the satisfaction of the Surveyor. It shall be sufficiently ventilated, and shall not be erected nearer than 3ft. to an adjoining boundary or to a public street. Under the seat the floor is to have a metal tray, or to be composed of concrete, stone, or some non-absorbent material, with a proper fall

#### $Rooms,\ in\ regard\ to\ height.$

15. With regard to rooms in other parts of the building in reference to the height thereof.—Every room used, or intended to be used, for the purposes of habitation must be at the least the height of 9ft. from floor to ceiling.

#### Ventilation of rooms.

16. Every room used for the purposes of habitation, or for the assemblage of people for any purpose whatever, shall be well and properly ventilated to the satisfaction of the Surveyor by the insertion of air bricks below the floor, and by openings in the sleeper walls, also by ventilators in the ceilings or at the top of the walls thereof, according to the size of such rooms.

#### Verandahs.

17. Awnings or verandahs to be erected over footpaths are to be in accordance with drawings and specifications approved of by the Surveyor, and accordingly adopted by the Council. The minimum height to be 8ft.; the verandah to be painted and kept in repair, to the satisfaction of the Surveyor, who shall have power to order such repairs to the

verandahs generally as he may deem necessary. In the event of neglect or of the Surveyor observing the necessity for removal or repair, it must be commenced within seven days from the receipt of notice from the Surveyor, and must be completed within fourteen days from such notice, or otherwise the verandahs will be removed as nuisances, the cost of such removal to be borne by the owner or occupier, and to be recoverable from him in a summary manner before Justices.

#### Brestsummers.

18. All brestsummers to be either of iron or jarrah wood.

#### Factory Chimneus

19. As to the chimney shaft for the boiler furnace of any steam engine, or for any brewery, distillery, or manufactory, such shaft may be erected of any height, so that it be built in such manner and of such strength and dimensions as shall be satisfactory to the Surveyor upon special application in each case.

#### To regulate ashpits.

Every house hereafter built or rebuilt to have ashpits of the following dimensions erected above ground, and built of brick, stone, cement, or concrete:—For cottages of three rooms and under, 3ft. by 2ft. by 4ft. deep; for villas of four to six rooms, 4ft. by 3ft. by 4ft. deep; for houses of six to ten rooms, 6ft. by 4ft. by 4ft. deep; for houses of 10 to 18 rooms, 8ft. by 5ft. by 4ft. deep. Such ashpits to have a wood or iron sloping cover on top and a sliding door in front, on the ground level. If such ashpits are not constructed, the Council will construct them at the expense of the owner, as provided by the Act.

#### Notice to remove dangerous buildings.

21. Where any building shall, in the opinion of the Surveyor, be ruinous or dangerous, under the meaning of Clause 16 of "The Building Act, 1884," the Surveyor shall give notice to the owner thereof to remove or renovate the same, and every such owner shall forthwith comply with such order under a penalty of £10.

#### Temporary buildings.

22. With regard to the granting of permission for the erection of temporary buildings.—Special permission may be granted by the Council, for a period to be stated, for the erection of temporary buildings for special purposes, all the walls of which may be of wood or iron.

#### Power to Surveyor to enter and remove.

23. And generally, where anything shall have been done or omitted to be done in contravention to these By-laws, it shall be lawful for the Surveyor, at his discretion, to enter on the premises and to remove or cause to be removed any building or other thing which has been erected in contra-vention thereof, or to do or cause to be done any act or thing which should have been done in pursuance thereof, and the costs of so doing shall be borne and paid by such owner or other person in addition to any penalty to which he may be liable in respect thereof under these By-laws.

WHEREAS by Section 6 of "The Fishery Act, 1889," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time, by Regulations to be published in the Government Gazette, amongst other things "to regulate the size of the meshes of nets to be used for the capture of any species of fish, and to impose such reasonable penalties, not exceeding £20, and forfeitures as the Governor in Council may think fit," for any breach of such regulations.

Every person committing a breach of this Regulation shall be liable, on conviction, to a penalty of not more than £20, and shall forfeit the net used and all fish which he shall have taken.
