SIR,—With reference to my Circular Despatch of the 15th March last, enclosing copies of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, dated the 7th March, 1898, for giving effect to the Additional Act of Paris modifying the International Copyright Convention of the 9th September, 1886, I have the honour to transmit to you, for information and publication in the Colony under your Government, copies of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, dated 19th May, 1898, extending the operation of the Order in Council of the 7th March, 1898, to the Republic of Hayti.

WHEREAS on the 9th day of September, 1886, a Convention (hereinafter called the Berne Convention) with respect to the protection to be given by way of copyright to the authors of literary and artistic works was concluded between Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the foreign countries following, that is to say:—

Belgium,	Hayti,	Switzerland,
France,	Italy,	and
Germany,	Spain,	Tunis;

And whereas on the 5th day of September, 1887, the ratifications of the said Convention were duly exchanged between Her Majesty the Queen and the aforesaid countries:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 28th day of November, 1887, and made under the authority committed to Her Majesty by the International Copyright Acts, 1844 to 1886, Her Majesty was pleased to make provision for giving rights of copyright throughout Her Majesty's dominions to the authors of literary and artistic works first produced in any of the said foreign countries (therein referred to as the foreign countries of the Copyright Union), and otherwise giving effect throughout Her Majesty's dominions to the terms of the said Berne Convention, and an English translation of the said Convention was set out in the First Schedule to the Order in Council now in recital:

And whereas since the date of the said Order in Council hereinbefore recited, the foreign countries following, namely, Luxembourg, Monaco, Montenegro, and Norway have acceded to the said Berne Convention, and by Orders in Council dated respectively the 10th day of August, 1888, the 15th day of October, 1889, the 16th day of May, 1893, and the 1st day of August, 1896, and made under the authority aforesaid, the provisions of the hereinbefore recited Order in Council of the 28th day of November, 1887, have been extended to the last-mentioned foreign countries respectively, and the last-mentioned foreign countries, together with the foreign countries comprised in the said Order in Council of the 28th day of November, 1887, now constitute the foreign countries of the Copyright Union within the meaning of the said Order in Council.

And whereas an additional Act to the said Berne Convention, of which additional Act an English translation is set out in the Schedule to this Order, was agreed upon between Her Majesty and the following foreign countries for the purpose of varying the provisions of the said Berne Convention, namely:—

Germany,	Italy,	Switzerland,
Belgium,	Luxembourg	and
Spain,	Monaco,	Tunis;
France,	Montenegro,	

and the ratifications of the said additional Act were, on the 9th day of September, 1897, exchanged between Her Majesty and the said foreign countries:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 7th day of March, 1898, and made under the authority aforesaid, Her Majesty was pleased to make provision for varying the hereinbefore recited Order in Council of the 28th day of November, 1887, and otherwise giving effect to the said additional Act throughout Her Majesty's dominions, so far as regards the foreign countries hereinbefore named as parties to the said additional Act, and an English translation of the said Additional Act is set forth in the Schedule to the Order in Council now in recital:

And whereas it is provided by Article III. of the said Additional Act, that countries of the Union not parties to the said Additional Act should at any time be allowed to accede thereto:

And whereas the Republic of Hayti has duly acceded to the said Additional Act:

And whereas Her Majesty in Council is satisfied that the Republic of Hayti has made such provisions as it appears to Her Majesty expedient to require for the protection of authors of works first produced in Her Majesty's dominions:

NOW, THEREFORE, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the International Copyright Acts, 1844 to 1886, doth order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. From and after the commencement of this Order the hereinbefore recited Order in Council of the 7th day of March, 1898, shall extend to the Republic of Hayti.

2. Nothing contained in this Order shall prejudicially affect any right acquired or accrued before the commencement of this Order by virtue of the said Order in Council of the 28th day of November, 1887, or otherwise, and any person entitled to such right shall continue entitled thereto, and to the remedies for the same in like manner as if this Order had not been made.

3. The author of any literary or artistic work first produced before the commencement of this Order shall have the rights and remedies to which he is entitled under Section 6 of the International Copyright Act, 1886.

4. This Order shall be construed as if it formed part of the International Copyright Act, 1886.

5. This Order shall come into operation on the date hereof, which day is in this Order referred to as the commencement of this Order.

And the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary orders herein accordingly.

SCHEDULE.

ADDITIONAL ACT.

The following is an English translation of the Additional Act, with the omission of the formal beginning and end:—

Article I.

The International Convention of the 9th September, 1886, is modified as follows:—

1. Article II.—The first paragraph of Article II. shall run as follows:—

“Authors belonging to any one of the countries of the Union, or their lawful representatives, shall enjoy in the other countries for their works, whether unpublished, or published for the first time in one of those countries, the rights which the respective laws do now or shall hereafter grant to nationals.”

A fifth paragraph is added in these terms:—

“Posthumous works are included among those to be protected.”

2. Article III.—Article III. shall run as follows:—

“Authors not belonging to one of the countries of the Union, who shall have published, or caused to be published for the first time, their literary or artistic works in a country which is a party to the Union, shall enjoy, in respect of such works, the protection accorded by the Berne Convention, and by the present Additional Act.”

3. Article V.—The first paragraph of Article V. shall run as follows:—

“Authors belonging to any one of the countries of the Union, or their lawful representatives, shall enjoy in the other countries the exclusive right of making or authorising the translation of their works during the entire period of their right over the original work. Nevertheless, the exclusive right of translation shall cease to exist if the author shall not have availed himself of it during a period of ten years from the date of the first publication of the original work, by publishing, or causing to be published, in one of the countries of the Union, a translation in the language for which protection is to be claimed.”

4. Article VII.—Article VII. shall run as follows:—

“Serial stories, including tales, published in the newspapers or periodicals of one of the countries of the Union, may not be reproduced, in original or translation, in the other countries without the sanction of the authors or of their lawful representatives.

“This stipulation shall apply equally to other articles in newspapers or periodicals, when the authors or editors shall have expressly declared in the newspaper or periodical itself in which they shall have been published that the right of reproduction is prohibited. In the case of periodicals it shall suffice if such prohibition be indicated in general terms at the beginning of each number.

“In the absence of prohibition such articles may be reproduced on condition that the source is acknowledged.

“In any case the prohibition shall not apply to articles on political questions, to the news of the day, or to miscellaneous information.”

5. Article XII.—Article XII. shall run as follows:—

“Pirated works may be seized by the competent authorities of the countries of the Union where the original work is entitled to legal protection.

“The seizure shall take place conformably to the domestic law of each State.”

6. Article XX.—The second paragraph of Article XX. shall run as follows:—

“Such denunciation shall be made to the Government of the Swiss Confederation. It shall only be effective as regards the country making it, the Convention remaining in full force and effect for the other countries of the Union.”

ARTICLE II.

The Final Protocol annexed to the Convention of the 9th September, 1886, is modified, as follows:—

1. No. 1.—This clause shall run as follows:—

“As regards Article IV., it is agreed as follows:—

“(A.) In countries of the Union where protection is accorded not only to architectural plans, but also to the architectural works themselves, these works shall be admitted to the benefits of the Berne Convention and of the present Additional Act.

“(B.) Photographic works and works produced by an analogous process shall be admitted to the benefits of these engagements in so far as the laws of each State may permit, and to the extent of the protection accorded by such laws to similar national works.

“It is understood that an authorised photograph of a work of art shall enjoy legal protection in all the countries of the Union, as contemplated by the Berne Convention and by the present Additional Act, for the same period as the principal right of reproduction of the work itself subsists, and within the limits of private arrangements between those who have legal rights.”

2. No. 4.—This clause shall run as follows:—

“The common agreement contemplated in Article XIV. of the Convention is established as follows:—

“The application of the Berne Convention, and of the present Additional Act, to works which have not fallen into the public domain within the country of origin at the time when these engagements come into force, shall operate according to such stipulations on this head as may be contained in special Conventions either actually existing or to be concluded hereafter.

“In the absence of such stipulations between any of the countries of the Union, the respective countries shall regulate, each for itself, by its domestic legislation, the manner in which the principle contained in Article XIV. is to be applied.

“The stipulations of Article XIV. of the Berne Convention and of the present clause of the Final Protocol shall apply equally to the exclusive right of translation, in so far as such right is established by the present Additional Act.

“The temporary stipulations noted above shall be applicable to countries which may hereafter accede to the Union.”

ARTICLE III.

The countries of the Union which are not parties to the present Additional Act shall at any time be allowed to accede thereto on their request to that effect. This stipulation shall apply equally to countries which may hereafter accede to the Convention of the 9th September, 1886. It will suffice for this purpose that such accession should be notified in writing to the Swiss Federal Council, who shall in turn communicate it to the other Governments.

ARTICLE IV.

The present Additional Act shall have the same force and duration as the Convention of the 9th September, 1886.

It shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Paris in the manner adopted in the case of that Convention, as soon as possible, and within the space of one year at the latest.

It shall come into force as regards those countries which shall have ratified it three months after such exchange of ratifications.

### Western Australian Government Railways.

#### Regulations for the Organisation, Classification and Payment of the Traffic Branch, Government Railways Service.

IN THE MATTER OF "The Railways Amendment Act, 1879" (43 VICT., No. 10), AND THE 55 VICT., 34.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by "The Railways Amendment Act, 1879 (43 Vict., No. 10)," and an Act intituled "An Act to Further Amend the Railways Act, 1878" (55 Vict., No. 34), and of every other power and authority enabling me in that behalf, I, Frederick Henry Piesse, Commissioner of Railways for the Colony of Western Australia, with the approval of the Governor in Executive Council, hereby make the following Regulations, which shall supersede the Traffic Regulations issued on the 20th August, 1896.

#### CONDITIONS OF SERVICE APPLICABLE TO THE TRAFFIC STAFF.

Whenever the undermentioned designations are mentioned in the following rules they are intended to be applied as under:—

"Officer": Any member of the staff in receipt of a salary.

"Employé": Any permanent member of the staff paid on the fortnightly wages pay sheets.

"Casual hands": All other employés engaged temporarily.

1. No person over the age of thirty-five (35) years shall be permanently appointed to any grade in the Railway Service without the special authority of the Commissioner of Railways; and no one having once left the Service (otherwise than in consequence of reduction in Staff) will be re-admitted except upon similar authority.

2. Applicants should send their applications to the head of the branch in which they desire employment.

The applications to be accompanied by not less than three testimonials of character, one of which should be from the last employer, if applicants have been previously employed.

3. Candidates may be required, by a Board of Examiners, to undergo an examination such as may from time to time be prescribed by the Commissioner of Railways for the class of service for which the candidates apply.

4. All appointments will be made on probation only. After a period of probation, and upon the recommendation of the Chief Traffic Manager and General Manager, the Commissioner of Railways may make the appointments permanent.

5. It will be necessary that every probationer, before being permanently appointed, shall produce a certificate from the Railway Medical Officer that he is in sound bodily health and free from mental infirmity, and that his eyesight and hearing are perfect; the cost of such application to be borne by the applicant.

6. Every officer and employé in the Traffic Department will hold his appointment conditionally on his being subject to and strictly observing the Rules and Regulations established from time to time for his guidance, whether published with the General Rules and Regulations or otherwise.

7. Promotion and increases of pay in all grades of the Traffic Branch will be made, except where scales are in operation, according to merit and subject to the approval of the Commissioner of Railways, on the recommendation of the Chief Traffic Manager and General Manager.

8. No officer or employé will be permitted, unless under very exceptional circumstances, and then only on special authority from the Commissioner of Railways, to engage in any business or employment outside the duties of his office.

9. All officers and employés in the Traffic Branch shall retire from the service at the age of sixty years. The Commissioner of Railways may, however, if he thinks fit, and with the consent of the parties interested, require any of the employés to continue in the service after the age of sixty years, if it appears that their retention would be of advantage to the service.

10. The Commissioner of Railways may transfer any officer or employé from one branch of the service to another.

11. Each officer or employé must reside at whatever place appointed, and must apply himself solely to the service of the Commissioner, and he must repair to any part of the line as ordered, and also pay prompt obedience to all persons placed in authority over him.

12. Officers will not be allowed to leave the service until the expiration of 28 days' notice, and no employé will be allowed to leave the service until the expiration of fourteen days' notice, unless with the consent of the Chief Traffic Manager. Notice of resignation must be given in writing; and similar notice will be given to those whose services are no longer required, except in the case of any employé dismissed for breach or neglect of duty.

13. No permanent officer or employé shall be dismissed without the approval of the Commissioner.

In the event, however, of gross neglect of duty of insubordination, or drunkenness, or such like, such employé can be suspended as hitherto, pending the Commissioner's decision as to whether he be finally dismissed or not.

14. The term "employé" herein is to be understood to mean any employé whose appointment has been approved by the Commissioner, as distinct from "casual hands." The latter can be discharged or dismissed at any time by the officer who engaged them, without reference to the Minister.

15. Notwithstanding anything herein contained, the Commissioner of Railways shall have power to appoint to any position or grade, if he thinks fit, and without the examination herein mentioned, any person of known ability or possessing special qualifications.

#### LEAVE.

16. Every Traffic employé will be entitled to a day's leave on full pay for each proclaimed general public holiday and Annual Picnic Day. Those employés who cannot take such leave on the proclaimed holidays, in consequence of being required to work, will, on making application, be allowed the same number of days at a future time, provided the Chief Traffic Manager decides that they can be conveniently spared. Should, however, the exigencies of the service not admit of the whole or any of the holidays being taken before the 31st of July of the year following that for which they are due, an equivalent in money will be paid.

In addition to the above, Foremen, Guards, Signalmen, and Shunters may be allowed four days' leave of absence in each year, on full pay, if their general conduct has been satisfactory. This leave will only be granted at times most convenient to the Department, and the Chief Traffic Manager will have the power to disallow it altogether, or reduce the time, in cases where it is considered the employé is not entitled to the full leave.

Officers will, if they can be conveniently spared, be allowed two weeks' leave of absence in each year. Leave not taken when due will lapse.

FREE PASSES.

17. Every person on the permanent staff will be entitled to two free passes per annum, in addition to annual pass when on leave, and these may be available for himself, his wife, and family, if dependent upon him for support and under the age of 18 years.

At places remote from trade centres, each officer or employé, or his wife, or his housekeeper, may be furnished with a free pass once a month to the nearest convenient township, with a view to the purchase of necessary household supplies, and in each case such supplies, not to exceed two cwt., may be carried free.

Holiday free passes will not be granted to officers or employés who, through misconduct, are not deserving of such indulgence, nor at times when there is likely to be any difficulty in providing sufficient accommodation for the public.

PRIVILEGE TICKETS.

18. Privilege tickets will be issued to the staff, their wives and family, if dependent upon them for support and under the age of 18 years, at one half of the single fare, available for return journey, on presentation of a certificate signed by the Chief Traffic Manager, or by an officer duly appointed by him. Children of employés under the age of 12 years will be charged one half of the present rates. No ticket will be issued at a less fare than one shilling for an adult, and sixpence for a child. The class of such ticket will be issued according to the grade of the applicant.

SEASON TICKETS.

19. Season tickets will be issued to the staff when necessary to enable them to travel between their homes and places of occupation at half the ordinary season ticket rates, and will be issued on the certificate of the Chief Traffic Manager or any officer whom he may appoint.

Season tickets at quarter rates will be issued to cadets not in receipt of more than £75 per annum.

SICK LEAVE.

20. One week's sick leave will be granted, during any year, to any officer or employé who has been in the service for twelve months and upwards, but such leave will count against the authorised leave referred to in Regulation No. 16.

Applications for leave on account of illness will only be considered when accompanied by a certificate from a properly registered medical practitioner. Should the illness be of long duration, a second certificate must be forthcoming, if requested; but should it not be of a sufficiently serious character to need the services of a doctor, and the absence only extends over one day, a medical certificate will not be required. Employés not observing this regulation will be treated as absent without leave, and have their pay stopped.

ALLOWANCES TO INJURED EMPLOYEES.

21. Any employé injured while in the execution of his duty, and incapacitated for work by any cause other than his own want of care, shall receive not less than three-fourths of his pay, if his rate is six shillings per day or under, and five-eighths pay if above that rate, from the date of the accident, for any period not exceeding four weeks, provided he sends a report of the accident to his superior officer within twelve hours of the occurrence, and a medical certificate within three days, which must be renewed weekly during absence.

TRANSFER ALLOWANCE.

22. All employés who are married will be allowed transfer allowance up to and not exceeding £2, and the free transport of their effects when transferred permanently from one station to another; unmarried employés will be allowed up to and not exceeding

15s. and free transport of their effects, on production of the necessary receipts for out-of-pocket expenses. Officers will be paid actual reasonable expenses on production of similar receipts.

ALLOWANCES FOR TRAVELLING EXPENSES.

23. The following will be the allowances, subject to the conditions named below:—

24. The whole daily allowance will be granted when an officer is travelling, or absent from his usual location a day and a night. Portions of a whole daily allowance to be computed as under:—

- If leaving home station before 8 a.m., to entitle breakfast allowance.
- If arriving at home station after 1 p.m., to entitle luncheon allowance.
- If leaving home station before 1 p.m., to entitle luncheon allowance.
- If arriving at home station after 6 p.m., to entitle tea allowance.
- If leaving home station (for all night) before 6 p.m., to entitle tea allowance.
- If arriving at home station after 8 a.m. (after travelling during night), to entitle breakfast allowance.

Officers or employés leaving home station regularly, at or near the times mentioned, must arrange for their meals prior to leaving or after arrival at home station.

The Chief Traffic Manager has the power to exceed the above allowances to any reasonable extent when satisfied that actual out-of-pocket expenses exceeds amount provided.

Employees.

25. 2s. 6d. per night when absent from home station for a night, and sleeping accommodation is provided by the Department; 4s. per night when sleeping accommodation is not provided by the Department.

26. The following clothing will be supplied by the Commissioner of Railways:—

## APPEALS.

27. In any case where an officer or employé considers he has been unjustly dealt with, he must in the first instance appeal to the Chief Traffic Manager for redress, and then, if he still considers he has not been redressed after such appeal, he has the right of appealing to the General Manager and Commissioner of Railways, such appeal to pass through the proper Departmental Channel.

The decision of the Commissioner of Railways shall be final.

28. Officers and employés must not, under any circumstances, make their appeals to any of the members of the Assembly or the Council. To take such a course will tend to defeat the object which the appellant may have in view, and lead to disorganisation and disloyalty. Appellants are therefore warned that appeals so made will be followed with suspension from duty.

## STATION MASTERS, GOODS AGENTS, ETC.

30. Only persons having a thorough Railway experience, and who are able to compile the various returns and accounts required by the Department, will be eligible for promotion to the position of Station Master. The officers must possess a knowledge of all the outside duties, such as signalling, shunting, and general yard work, loading and unloading of all descriptions of traffic, and the working of trains, etc., as well as be able to perform the inside or office work. The position of Station Master is therefore one which any member of the Staff can obtain by making himself thoroughly conversant with the duties of the office. Good conduct will always be indispensable.

No person will be appointed Station Master until the Chief Traffic Manager and Chief Accountant have reported to the General Manager that he is thoroughly conversant with the general working of a railway, and also the mode of keeping the accounts.

In all cases the salaries are to be obtained by merit and the importance of the position filled.

Minimum salary, £150, with house.
Maximum salary, £400, with house, or £50 per annum in lieu thereof.

## OFFICERS IN CHARGE.

Minimum salary, £130 per annum; maximum salary, £140, with house; or £26 per annum in lieu thereof.

Minimum salary, £120 per annum.

Ticket Collectors, 7s. to 8s.; increase of 6d. per day per annum.

## SUBURBAN PASSENGER GUARDS.

8s. 6d. per day for two years; 9s. two to five years; 10s. five to ten years. If promoted to Through Passenger Guards, to take up pay applicable to length of service as Guards.

## MIXED, THROUGH PASSENGER AND GOODS GUARDS.

9s. per day first year.
9s. 6d. after 1 year and up to 2 years.
10s. " 2 years " 5 years.
10s. 6d. " 5 years " 10 years.
11s. " 10 years.

## COAL, BALLAST, AND ASSISTANT GOODS GUARDS.

8s. per day for first six months, 8s. 6d. per day after.

## HEAD SHUNTERS.

8s. 6d. to 9s. 6d.; increase of 6d. per day per annum.

## SHUNTERS.

7s. per day for six months, 7s. 6d. per day up to 12 months. 8s. after.

## SIGNALMEN.

4th Class, 7s. per day first year, 7s. 6d. after one year.

3rd Class, 8s. per day first year, 8s. 6d. after one year's service.

2nd Class, 9s. per day for first year, 6d. per day per annum until maximum of 10s. is reached.

1st Class, 10s. 6d. per day for first year, 11s. per day after first year.

All men appointed as Signalmen must have had twelve months' railway experience.

## HEAD PORTERS.

8s. 6d. to 9s. 6d., according to importance of position.

## PORTERS (GOODS AND COACHING) AND CONDUCTORS.

3rd Class, 6s. per day for first six months, 6s. 6d. for second six months, 7s. after twelve months.

2nd Class, 7s. 6d. per day.

1st Class and leading Porters, 8s. per day.

Car Conductors to rate as 3rd Class Porters.

## LAD PORTERS

Will be taken on from 16 to 18 years of age.

2s. 6d. per day up to 18 years of age; 3s. 4d. per day, 18 to 19; 4s. 2d. per day, 19 to 20; 5s. per day, 20 to 21; over 21 to be appointed to first vacancy for 3rd Class Porters.

Exceptions may be made to the foregoing if the Chief Traffic Manager considers it advisable.

VACANCIES FOR GUARDS.

Vacancies for Guards will be filled by promoting the most suitable men from the other grades. Every Guard must have had at least two years Railway experience before being allowed to take independent charge of a train. Every man must also pass an examination in the duties, &c., before being appointed Assistant Guard, and also before being promoted to Guard. The chief subjects of the examination will be as follows:—

*Assistant Guards.*

- Knowledge of Rules and Regulations, especially those relating to train working.
- Shunting.
- Signalling.
- Working of brakes.
- Securing of loading.
- Single and double line working under the different systems.
- Protection of trains.
- Steep gradient working.

*Guards*

will be carefully re-examined on the subjects for Assistant Guards.

- Knowledge of road, gradients, &c.
- Positions and descriptions of signals.
- Approaches to stations and sidings.
- Station yards.
- General Railway working.

Men who have not previously undergone a medical examination—such as those who joined the Service before these conditions came into operation—must be examined as to their eye-sight before being allowed to run as Assistant Guard or Guard.

The minimum height for Out-door Staff will be 5ft. 6in.

CASUAL HANDS.

32. The pay of "casual hands" over 20 years will be from 6s. to 8s. per day, according to the nature of the work performed and the prevailing pay given for casual labour in the various districts served by railways in which casual labourers are required.

SUNDAY DUTY.

33. The exact time on duty will be paid for at the rate of 50 per cent. more than the rate for week day duty.

ORDINARY DUTY.

34. Fifty-four hours actual work will be considered a week's duty for Foremen, Shunters, Signalmen, Porters, and Casual Hands, with the exception of 1st and 2nd class Signalmen, and overtime at the ordinary rate of pay will be paid for work beyond that time; but the Chief Traffic Manager reserves the right to book a man off, provided such "booking off" can be arranged in the same week.

Signalmen in first and second class boxes shall work eight hours per diem. In all other signal boxes men must work 54 hours per week in the following order:—1st shift, week days, 7 hours; 2nd shift, week days, 8 hours; 3rd shift, week days, 9 hours.

35. Fifty-four hours work will be considered a week's duty for a Guard, Brakesman, and Assistant Guard and Conductor; and overtime will only be allowed if more than fifty-four hours work is performed in the week. Half time will be allowed for detention at stations, up to five hours—i.e., if a Guard runs a trip of four hours, waits five hours, and then returns, running four hours more, he will be paid for 10½ hours. Less than 30 minutes overtime will not be reckoned, but over 30 minutes will be reckoned one hour.

36. The foregoing Regulations will take effect from 1st July, 1898.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

The Legal Practitioners Act, 1893.

WHEREAS by "The Legal Practitioners' Act, 1893" (hereinafter called the Act), the Barristers' Board thereby constituted is empowered to make and prescribe such rules as to the Board may seem meet for the matters and purposes in the Act mentioned. AND WHEREAS it is desirable to make and prescribe additional rules with respect to the admission and qualification and examination of candidates for admission as Practitioners. AND WHEREAS the said Board now consists of RICHARD WILLIAM PENNEFATHER, the Attorney General of the Colony of Western Australia; ROBERT BRUCE BURNSIDE, the Crown Solicitor of the said Colony; and SEPTIMUS BURT and STEPHEN HENRY PARKER and GEORGE LEAKE, Her Majesty's Counsel learned in the law, residing and practising in the said Colony; and MESSRS. RICHARD SEPTIMUS HAYNES, ALFRED BOWMAN KIDSON, BENJAMIN HARVIE DARBYSHIRE, MATTHEW LEWIS MOSS, and JAMES MONTGOMERY SPEED, duly elected members of the said Board: NOW THEREFORE the said Board, by virtue of the powers vested in them by and under the Act, do hereby, at a meeting held at the office of the Attorney General, at Perth, this 22nd day of July, 1898, make and prescribe the following rules:—

1. Every applicant for admission as a Practitioner by virtue of any one or more of the qualifications enumerated in Sub-sections a, b, c, or d of Section 14 of "The Legal Practitioners' Act, 1893," shall, prior to his becoming entitled to a certificate in Form L to the rules made and prescribed by the Barristers' Board on the 5th day of March, 1894, pass an examination in the Statute Law of Western Australia, and shall produce to the Board a certificate on Form B in the Schedule to these rules.

2. Every person shall, 14 days prior to undergoing such examination, lodge with the Secretary to the Board an application in Form A in the said Schedule, and pay to the Board the sum of £5 5s. for each such examination.

3. Every such examination shall be conducted by such person or persons, being legal practitioners, at such times and places as the Board may from time to time appoint or direct. No fee paid for any examination at which the candidate fails to present himself, or which he shall fail to pass to the satisfaction of the Board, shall be available for any subsequent examination, nor shall any such fee be returned.

4. These rules shall be read and construed with the rules of the Board made and prescribed on the 5th day of March, 1894.
