W HEREAS by "The Municipal Institutions Act, 1895," the Governor may divide a Municipality into Wards and define the boundaries of such Wards: AND WHEREAS it is deemed expedient to divide the Municipality of Helena Vale into Three Wards: Now, THEREFORE I, Lieut.-Colonel Sir GERARD SMITH, K.C.M.G., Governor of the said Colony, with the advice of the Executive Council, do divide the said Municipality into Three Wards, to be called "The North Ward," "The East Ward," and "The West Ward," and define the boundaries of the said Wards to be as follows :--

### MUNICIPALITY OF HELENA VALE—BOUNDARIES OF WARDS.

### NORTH WARD.

Bounded on the North by part of the South boundary of Swan Location 14A; on the Eastward and Southward by the Midland Railway line and part of the North side of the York Road, and on the Westward by the East side of the Guildford-Newcastle Road.

### EAST WARD.

Bounded on the Northward and North by the Midland Railway line and the North side of Boundary Road; on the East by the East side of Blackboy Flat Road (Helena Vale), the South side of the York Road, and the East side of Robinson Road; on the Southward by the North side of the Eastern Railway Reserve, and on the West by the West side of Helena Street.

### WEST WARD.

Bounded by lines starting from a point on the South boundary of Swan Location 15, situate 4 chains 49 links West from the North-West corner of Swan Location 7, and extending South-West 26 chains 66 links along the North-West boundaries of Woodbridge Lots 43 to 68 inclusive; thence South-East 2 chains  $89_{10}^{-3}$  links; thence Southward to the South side of the Eastern Railway Reserve, and along it Westward to the East side of High Street; thence South-Eastward along said side of street and the Western boundaries of Montreal Lots 170 and 169 to the right bank of Helena River; thence upwards along said bank

HEREAS by Section five of "The Early Closing Act" the Governor may, from time to time, by Proclamation in the Government Gazette, define and declare the boundaries of places or districts other than the Metropolitan, Geraldton, Coolgardie, Kalgoorlie, Boulder, Kanowna, Bulong, Menzies, and Broad Arrow Districts, and declare such places or districts to be, or to cease to be, districts for the purposes of this Act, and shall, by the Proclamation proclaiming a district, fix the time (such time being not earlier than 6 a.m. nor later than 7.30 p.m.) for the opening and closing of shops within such district on every day of the week excepting on Sundays and public holidays, and (as to the hour for closing shops) excepting on days whereon a later hour than 730 p.m. is provided by this Act for the closing of shops: Now THEREFORE I, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare the area comprised within the following boundaries to be a District within the meaning and for the purposes of "The Early Closing Act, 1898," and to be known as the Cottesloe District :-

Bounded by lines starting from the sea coast at the North-West corner of North Fremantle Townsite, and extending along part of its North boundary East to the East side of the Perth-Fremantle Road, and along said side of the road North-North-Easterly to the level crossing near the South end of Marmion Street; thence along the West side of said road to the East side of Parry Street; thence North along said side of street to the North side of Railway Street; thence West-South-Westerly along said side of street to the North-East corner of Cottesloe Suburban Lot 7; thence West along its North boundary to the East side of Griver Street; thence North along said side of street to the North side of North Street, and West along said side of street to the sea coast, and along it Southerly to the starting point.

And do fix 8 o'clock a.m. as the time for opening, and 6 o'clock p.m. as the time for the closing of shops within said district, except as in the said Act is provided.

W HEREAS by the provisions of "The Cemeteries Act, 1897," it is made lawful (in case it should appear to the Governor that burials in any cemetery under any law relating to cemeteries or other burial ground or place of burial whatsoever should be wholly discontinued or discontinued subject to any exception or qualification) for the Governor, by order to be published in the Government Gazette, to direct that after a time mentioned in such order (not being less than three months from the date thereof) burials in such cemetery or burial place, ground, or place of burial shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exception or qualification mentioned in the same or any subsequent order: AND WHEREAS it has been made to appear to the said Governor that it is advisable that, except in vaults at present owned by private persons, all burials should be discontinued in the Public Cemeteries, East Perth: Now, THEREFORE, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby direct that from and after the first day of November, 1899, burials within the limits of the Public Cemeteries, East Perth, shall be wholly discontinued, except in cases where the special permission of the said Governor be first obtained.

"All vessels calling at any Port in Western Australia for Coal or Supplies (but not broaching or shipping cargo, or landing or embarking passengers) shall be charged a fixed sum of Five pounds (£5) only, such charge to cover all tonnage, light, and pilotage dues, both inwards and outwards. Such vessels desirous of embarking passengers will be permitted to do so on payment of One pound for each passenger, the minimum payment therefor being Five pounds. Steamers calling at Albany on their way to South African Ports will be allowed to ship cargo (not exceeding in amount one-fourth of registered tonnage of vessel) on the scale formerly in force, i.e., Thirty pounds (£30) to include all Port Dues.

# NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Light for Cape Sorell. With reference to the Preliminary Notice issued by this Board, dated 7th March 1899, it is hereby notified that, on and after the 2nd day of October, 1899, a Light will be exhibited from a Lighthouse creeted on Cape Sorell at the entrance to Macquarie Hurbour, the position and characteristics of such Light being as follows :--The Lighthouse is situated on the outer end of Cape Sorell in latitude 42° 11' S. and longitude 145° 10' 30" E., approximately. It is a Second Order Dioptric Light showing white and red flashes with eclipses. White fash visible 3 seconds, and eclipse 19<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> seconds. Red flash visible 3 seconds, and eclipses in a complete revolution of three minur es. The Light is fixed in a circular brick tower, painted white, the height of which to base i hantern is 100 feet. Height of focal plane of Light above sea level 185 feet; and allowing 15 feet for the height of the eye of mariner above sea level, the Light will be visible as follows :--White, 20 miles; red, 12 miles in clear weather, and at a lesser distance according to the state of the atmosphere. # Coolgardie Roads Board.

### By-Laws.

Department of Lands and Surveys, Perth, 6th September, 1899.

THE following By-Laws are published in accord-ance with the provisions of Section 64 of "The Roads Act, 1888, Amendment Act, 1894.

# The Roads Act, 1888, and Amendments thereof.

### BY-LAWS OF THE COOLGARDIE ROADS BOARD.

WHEREAS by "The Roads Act, 1888," and "The Roads Act, 1888, Amendment Act, 1894," the Road Board of any district is empowered to make By-Laws for all or any purposes in the said Acts mentioned :-

The Coolgardie Roads Board, being the Roads Board for the District of Coolgardie, in pursuance of the powers vested in the said Board, under and by virtue of the said Acts, and of every other authority enabling it in that behalf, doth hereby make and publish the following By-Laws :-

#### INTERPRETATION.

In these By-Laws the following terms shall, unless the context otherwise indicates, bear the meanings set against them respectively, that is to say :-

- "District."—The locality or area for the time being under the control of the Coolgardie Roads Board.
- "Board."-The Coolgardie Roads Board.
- "Chairman."—The member acting for the time being as Chairman of the Board.
- "Member."---A Member of the Board.
- "Secretary."—The Secretary of the Board. "The Act."—The Roads Act of 1888, and all amendments thereto, or which may come into force hereafter, as far as the Act allows.
- "Road" or "Reserve."-A road or reserve, as the case may be, under the control of the Board.
- The word "Street" shall mean and include every public street, road, square, thoroughfare, or other place within the district, which the public are permitted to use.
- "Footpath," or "Footway," shall include any part of a street set apart for the sole use of foot passengers, and whether the same be made, or kerbed, or otherwise.
- The word "Person" shall include the plural and also a body corporate.

### DUTIES OF SECRETARY.

- 1. To attend all Board meetings.
- $\mathbf{2}$ . To attend all Committees.

To take notes of all minutes and prepare reports of 3. Committees.

4. To conduct all correspondence and to give the other officers instructions as directed by the minutes.

5. To answer all questions on the Board's business.

To see that the accounts are audited once a year, and the balance sheets prepared and published yearly in the Government Gazette and at least one newspaper circulating in the district.

To supervise the preparation of the rate books and 7.Board's electoral lists, examine proofs of latter and arrange for distribution of copies prior to elections; also to attend all courts of revision or appeal, making the necessary arrangements for the elections and preparing papers, &c., for the clerks.

To summon the members to Board and Committee 8. meetings.

The secretary shall keep the cash book as well as any 9. and all other books required to show the receipts and expenditure made by the Board; the said books shall be written up every fortnight ready for inspection of the Board or any member of the Board who may at any time during office hours desire to see them.

10. He shall check all accounts sent in to the Board and see that all accounts for works (exceeding £5 in amount) have stated on them the authority under which such works have been done, and shall check all returns made by the collectors or other of the Board's officers, and shall see that, with all returns made, the heels of the receipts book accompany the returns; he shall supervise and attend to the due payment of all money coming through the hands of the Board's officers and payable to the credit of the corporation; he shall report to the Board at their next meeting any officer neglecting to make his returns, as provided, with the necessary vouchers attached thereto.

11. He shall pay into the bank within 48 hours after receipt, to the credit of the Board, any sum or sums of money that may be received by him (amounting in the aggregate to £10 or upwards) on behalf of the Board.

12. He shall have the bank pass-book made up in readi-12. He shall have the bank pass-book made up in readi-ness for the meetings of the Board, and shall produce it at each meeting thereof; or should any member of the Board desire to see it at any time during office hours the secretary shall produce it for his inspection. No money shall be paid into the bank to the credit of the Board by any officer of the Board except by or through the secretary. The secre-tary shall give all accepted are accepted. the Board except by or through the secretary. The secretary shall give all receipts on printed forms. The secretary shall readily and cheerfully obey all lawful commands or orders of the Board, and shall attend to all other matters affecting the finances of the Board and not herein specified.

13. The office hours of the Board shall be from 10 o'clock a.m. to 4 o'clock p.m. on week days, and from 10 a.m. to 12 o'clock noon Saturdays, during which time the office shall be kept open.

#### MEETINGS AND PROCEEDINGS.

### Notice of Meetings.

14. Notice shall be given by the chairman or secretary of ordinary or special meetings at least twenty-four hours before such meeting, and also of every meeting adjourned for a term exceeding two days. The chairman, if present, shall preside at all meetings of ratepayers and of the Board, and in his absence, or after being present he shall retire, one of the members of the Board chosen by the ratepayers or members present (as the case may be) shall preside.

Meetings of the Board shall be of two kinds, ordin-15. Meetings of the Board shall be of two kinds, ordin-ary and special. Ordinary meetings are those called by the chairman or secretary as often as seems proper for the transaction of the ordinary business of the Board. Special meetings are those called to consider special business, the nature of which shall be notified on the notice paper sum-moning the meeting. No business shall be transacted at a special meeting other than that for which the special meeting was called.

16. A special meeting may, on the requisition of three members of the Board, be called at any time in the manner prescribed by the 9th section of the Act, but the chairman may call a special meeting of the Board as often as he may think proper. No business shall be transacted at any ordinary or special meeting unless at least three of the Board, inclusive of the chairman or member of the Board chosen to preside in his absence, shall be present.

Any three members may require the Board room to be cleared of strangers, and the chairman, or other presid-ing chairman, shall immediately give directions to have the order executed.

At all meetings of the Board, when there is not a quorum present, or when the Board is counted out, which counting out shall take place whenever there shall be less than a quorum present, such circumstance, together with the names of the members then present, shall be recorded in the minute book.

19. The first business of all meetings of the Board shall be the reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting aloud, with a view to their confirmation.

20. Immediately after the confirmation of the minutes the chairman may make any communication to the Board which he may deem advisable, or bring under consideration any business he may think necessary, and it shall be compe-tent for any member of the Board to ask a question or questions, but he shall confine himself to the question simply, and no debate shall ensue thereon at any time.

#### Voting.

21. Each member, including the chairman, shall have one vote, and such chairman shall in case of equality of votes have a casting vote in addition to his ordinary vote, and all questions at such meetings shall be decided by a majority of the votes of the members present.

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# Minutes of Meeting.

22. In addition to the minute-book prescribed to be kept by the 10th section of the Act, a rough minute-book shall be kept in which any item of business transacted by the Board at a meeting shall be then and there entered by the secretary and subsequently re-entered by him in the manner prescribed by the Act in the minute-book. Minutes of special or ordinary meetings shall be confirmed at the next ordinary subsequent meeting.

#### Order of Business.

23. The order of business at all ordinary meetings shall be as follows, that is to say :—

- (a.) Reading and confirmation of minutes of last ordinary and special meetings, if any.
- (b.) Consideration of business arising out of minutes. (c.) Reading of correspondence (in and out), and
- taking such immediate action as may be deemed expedient in regard thereto.
- (d.) Passing of accounts for payment.
- (e.) Presentation of petitions or memorials and committee reports, and consideration thereof.
- (f.) Consideration of tenders and ratification of contracts.

### Petitions.

24. Every petition or memorial shall be respectful and temperate in its language, and shall be presented t, the Board by a member only; and any member presenting a petition or memorial to the Board shall affix his name to the beginning thereof, with the number of signatures; and any member presenting a petition or memorial shall acquaint himself with the contents thereof, and ascertain that it does not contain language disrespectful to the Board. The nature and prayer of every petition or memorial shall be stated to the Board by the member presenting the same.

#### Tenders.

25. Tenders for work shall be opened and dealt with when the subject matters of the tenders come on to be considered at the meeting of the Board or by a committee appointed for the purpose.

#### Speaker must not digress.

26. A member having audience shall not digress from the subject of debate.

#### Motions and Amendments.

27. A motion once moved at a meeting cannot be withdrawn unless by the consent of the Board.

28. One or more amendments may be proposed on a motion before the Board. When more than one amendment is moved, the question shall be first put on the last amendment, then on the next in succession, and then on the original motion, in the reverse order in which they are moved.

29. A motion or amendment not seconded cannot be discussed by any member except the mover, nor put by the chairman.

30. In submitting a motion or amendment, the chairman must put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative.

31. When an amendment is carried, the motion amended thereby becomes a substantive motion, upon which further amendment may be moved before it is finally dealt with.

#### APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEE.

32. The Board may at any time appoint three or more members as a committee to inquire into any matter and make a report and recommendation thereon, but no committee shall incur any financial liability or in any way commit the Board to any responsibility whatever without express and specific authority conferred by the By-Laws or by a resolution of the Board. The quorum of a committee of three shall comprise two members.

### FINANCE ACCOUNTS.

33. All accounts, bills, and vouchers shall be submitted to the Board by the chairman at the ordinary meetings, and after being certified as correct shall be paid by cheque.

34. An account shall be opened with such bank as the Board may direct, and all money received from whatever source (with the exception of money granted by the Government) shall be paid into such bank to the credit of the Board, and no account shall be paid except by cheque signed by the chairman and one or more members of the Board, together with the signature of the secretary. All moneys belonging to the Board shall, within two days after they come into the hands of any officer, servant, or clerk, be paid to the secretary. 35. Moneys granted by the Government shall be paid to the Board's credit at Treasury, and shall only be operated upon to pay actual creditors for work executed in accordance with Government regulations.

#### URGENT WORK.

36. The chairman with one member may in case of urgency authorise the expenditure of a sum not exceeding Ten pounds ( $\pounds$ 10), but shall in every case report the same at the next meeting of the Board.

#### UNAUTHORISED EXPENDITURE.

37. Every item of expenditure and every liability incurred by any committee or member of the Board otherwise than under the authority of the Act, or of these By-Laws, shall be deemed unlawful expenditure and a breach of this By-Law by such person.

### APPOINTMENTS.

38. No permanent appointment shall be made to an office under the Board until an advertisement has been published in one or more local newspapers calling applications from persons competent to fill such appointment. All appointments shall be made by resolution passed by the Board.

### For the Prevention and Abatement of Nuisances.

39. "Abatteirs" or "slaughter-house" shall mean and include the buildings and places commonly called abatteirs or slaughter-houses and every building or place used for slaughtering cattle or animals of any description.

40. No person shall establish or carry on within the district of the Board, without its consent in writing, any of the under-mentioned trades, businesses or occupations, viz. :---

Manure works;

Works for boiling down meat, bones or offal;

Bone mills and bone manure depôts;

Fellmongeries, tanneries, and wool-scouring establishments;

Glue factories;

Piggeries;

Soap or candle works or factories;

Fish-curing establishments;

and anyone so doing shall be guilty of an offence under these By-laws.

41. No owner or occupier of any house, land, or premises within the district shall allow any impure water or any foul liquid matter of any description to flow from such land or premises into or upon the street, footway or gutter; and no person shall throw or place thereon or therein any impure water or any foul liquid matter of any description, and any person so doing shall be guilty of an offence against this Ey-Law and upon conviction shall pay a penalty not exceeding £5.

42. No owner, occupier, manager, or other person in charge of any land or premises shall allow water from any shaft to flow into, upon or across any road, footway or gutter without the permission of the Board first had and has been obtained, and any person so doing shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5, and to the cost of repairing any such road, footway or gutter damaged by reason of allowing water to flow as aforesaid.

43. No person shall burn any rubbish in the open air within a radius of two miles of the town of Coolgardie, or light a fire of any description except for domestic purposes without having given 24 hours' notice in writing to the Captain of the Coolgardie Fire Brigade thereof, as the case may be.

44. Any officer or member of the Board may from time to time visit and inspect any butcher's shambles, slaughterhouse or yard or other place for the purpose of ascertaining if the same be kept cleansed, and the same must be kept thorougly clean to the satisfaction of such officer or member of the Board.

45. The occupier of any house outside the limit of the urisdiction and control of the Local Board of Health shall have upon the premises a pit for the purpose of containing deposits of nightsoil, urine, and household refuse matter; such pit to be of not less than eight feet deep and of not less than two feet by three feet section, and such pits shall be filled in before the accumulations of deposits reach within two feet of the surface.

46. No person shall poison, kill, or maim any horse, camel, cow, bullock, dog, or other animal and leave the same in any part of the district without making proper provision for the burial or burning of the carcass, and any

person so doing shall commit an offence against this By-Law and upon conviction shall pay a penalty of not more than £10 and shall pay all expenses attending on the proper burial of any such animal.

47. The following acts, omissions, or neglects are hereby forbidden to be done or allowed to be done, and any person guilty of any of the following offences, shall, on conviction, pay a penalty not exceeding  $\pounds 20 :=$ 

- (g.) Riding or driving cattle, horses, or other animals, or wheeling any barrow, or driving any carriage upon or along any footpath.
- (h.) Placing any timber, bricks, or other materials upon any footway, channel, surface drain or road without the permission of the Board having first been obtained.
- (i.) Burning any shavings or other materials or matter in any footway, carriage road, or open or public place.
- (j.) Leaving any inflammable materials or matter in any public shed or place, or on any open space near any building, without having first obtained the permission of the Board.
- (k.) Emptying any privy or cesspool, or carting away any nightsoil or other offensive matter outside the limits of the control exercised by the Local Board of Health, without permission or a license from, and without having given such security as is required by the Board.
- (1.) Allowing any nightsoil or other offensive matter to be spilt or otherwise cast into or upon any road, street, footway, or public place.
- (m.) Allowing the dripping of the eaves of any house to fall upon any public footway.
- (n.) Placing any placard or other document, writing, painting on or otherwise defacing any house or building, or any wall, fence, lamp-post or gate without the consent of the occupier or owner thereof.
- (o.) Opening any drain or sewer, or removing the surface of any footway or carriage road, without the permission of the Board having been first obtained.
- (p.) Neglecting to clean all private yards, ways, passages or avenues, by which neglect a nuisance, by offensive smells or otherwise, is caused.
- (q.) Rolling any cask, beating any carpet, breaking in any horse, flying any kite, using any bows and arrows, or playing at any game to the annoyance of any person, in any public place, or obstructing any footpath or carriage road, whether by allowing any cart or animal to remain across footpath or carriage road or by placing goods thereon or otherwise.
- (r.) Throwing or discharging any stones or other missles to the damage or danger of any person.
- (s.) Having any awning on any footpath in any public street or thoroughfare not being eight feet clear above the footway or hanging any goods on or under such awning over the footway.
- (t.) Blasting any rock, stone or timber in or near any public place without the permission of the Board and not attending to any direction in regard thereto given by such Board.
- (*u.*) Furiously or negligently riding or driving through any public place.
- (v.) Exposing in any public street or thoroughfare (except in any fair or market lawfully appointed for that purpose) any entire horse for show, hire or sale.
- (w.) Making cellar door or other opening from the footway of any street or public thoroughfare without the consent of the Board.
- (x.) The plying for hire by any carts or vehicles without a license.

#### SIGNBOARDS, &C.

48. Any person who shall erect or place any signboard, signs, awnings, blinds, overhanging lamps, or other things over or near any footway or roadway without obtaining the consent of the Board in writing, shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction a penalty, not exceeding  $\pounds 2$  for every such offence.

### GENERAL REGULATION OF TRAFFIC.

49. Every person having the care or conduct of any carriage shall keep the same on the left side or near side of the road, except in case of actual necessity or other sufficient

reason for deviation, and shall not interrupt or interfere with any person or carriage passing or attempting to pass his carriage.

50. Any person who between sunset and the following sunrise shall, in, upon, or along any road within the district, drive any vehicle without having a lamp or lantern securely fixed and lighted at the off side of the front of such vehicle, shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty no exceeding 25 for every such offence.

51. The driver of every vehicle or the rider of every horse or other animal turning for the purpose of proceeding in an opposite direction, or turning the corner of any road in the district, shall bring the horse or other animal to a walking pace before commencing to turn.

52. No person having the care or control of a horse or other animal, or of any vehicle, shall allow the same to remain in any street of the district, or to obstruct any portion of such street, for a longer period than necessary for loading or unloading the vehicle. Provided that where suitable bridle posts are provided the horses may be securely fastened thereto for any period not exceeding thirty minutes, but immediately upon the request of any officer or member of the Board or police constable such horse shall be removed

52A. Any driver of a camel or camels on any street neglecting to draw off on the approach of a vehicle shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding £5.

53. Any officer or member of the Board may at any time direct the owner or driver of any waggon, cart or dray, the manner in which oxen or horses shall be driven, yoked, or harnessed upon a road.

# TO PREVENT TREES FROM FALLING ACROSS ANY ROAD OF TRACK.

54. No person shall make or leave a fire by the road or track side without taking proper precautions against such fire spreading, and any person offending against this By-Law shall, upon conviction, pay a penalty not exceeding £5.

55. No person shall set fire to standing trees on the road or track side, and any such offender shall, upon conviction, pay a penalty not exceeding £5.

#### STALL LICENSES.

56. No person shall keep, manage or conduct any movable or temporarily fixed stall in or near any street for the sale of any meat, fruit, vegetables, drinks, eatables, or articles of merchandise, unless such persons be licensed by the Board.

(Licenses for Stalls shall be in the form "A" in the Schedule).

57. No licensed stall shall be placed or allowed to stand in any street or position other than that mentioned in the license, or between the hours the Board may decide from time to time.

58. The following fees shall be paid for licenses for stalls, and shall be paid in advance on the first Monday in every month, and if payment be not made when due, the license shall be void :--For every stall, 20s. per month.

59. Every licensed stall holder shall at all times obey the lawful directions of the traffic inspector or other authorised officer or member of the Board.

60. No person to whom a stall holder's license is granted shall lend, transfer, or assign his license, and no person shall borrow or make use of such license granted to a person other than himself.

# TO PREVENT ACCIDENTS FROM RIDING, &C., OF BICYCLES &C.

61. Throughout this By-law the expression "cycle" means a bicycle, tricycle, or other velocipede, and the expression "cyclist" means a person riding a bicycle, tricycle, or other velocipede.

62. No person shall ride or impel a cycle upon any footpath within the district.

63. No person shall, within the hours of sunset and sunrise, ride a cycle within the district unless there is attached thereto a lamp which shall exhibit a white light in the direction in which he is proceeding, and at all times to be kept lighted.

64. Every cyclist shall carry a bell, which shall be rung as a signal whenever any person on foot, or on horseback, or vehicle is being approached or passed.

65. No person shall leave any cycle in or on any street or footway so as to become an obstruction, and every person shall remove his cycle immediately upon being requested to do so by any constable, or officer, or member of the Board.

66. No person shall pass at a speed exceeding eight miles an hour any person who shall be riding or driving any horse or any animal.

 $7\frac{3}{9}\frac{4}{6}3$ 

67. When a cyclist meets any horse or animal and such horse or animal becomes restless or appears likely to get beyond the control of the person in charge thereof, such cyclist shall dismount and shall remain dismounted until such horse or animal has been passed.

68. No person shall ride any cycle round the corner formed by the junction of any streets in the district, or across the intersection of any of the said streets at a pace exceeding six miles an hour.

# TO PREVENT OBSTRUCTION ON THE FOOTPATHS OF THE

STREETS. 69. No person shall permit any boxes, cases, coal, sand, firewood, goods, ware, merchandise, or other articles or effects to remain on any part of the street, or on any part of the footpath within the district after sunset, nor in any case for a longer period than shall be necessary for housing and removing same.

# To prevent Damages to Footpaths and other Board Property.

70. No person, without having first obtained the written sanction of the Board, shall break up, cut down, damage, destroy, or injure any footpath, gutter, drain, culvert, bridge, road, public way, tree, plant, gate, fence, post, lantern, lamp-post, implements, materials, buildings, or other properties of the said Board, or under the control thereof

71. No person shall damage or destroy, by means of horse team, waggon, dray, or any other means, any road or portion of road under construction or repair. Any person found guilty of such damage or destruction shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding  $\pounds 20$ .

### REMOVAL OF GRAVEL.

72. No person shall dig for or remove any gravel within the district without first obtaining permission from the Board and also paying any fee or license that may be decided on.

### PENALTIES.

73. Where any person by these By-laws or any of them is required to do or perform any act, and such act is not done or remains undone or unperformed, it shall be lawful for the Board to perform the same, and charge the costs and expenses against such person, and the amount thereof may be recovered summarily.

74. Every person who does, permits, or suffers any act, matter, or thing contrary to any of these By-laws, or commits or permits any breach or neglect thereof, shall be deemed guilty of an offence against these By-laws, and where not otherwise provided, shall be liable to a fine or penalty not exceeding £20 for every such offence.

It is hereby resolved by the Roads Board of the Coolgardie District, subject to and by and with the approval and confirmation of His Excellency the Governor in Council, that the above By-laws shall be in force within the said Coolgardie District from the date of publication thereof in the Government Gazette.
