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W HEREAS by the provisions of "The Cemeteries Act, 1897," it is made lawful (in case it should appear to the Governor that burials in any cemetery under any law relating to cemeteries or other burial ground or place of burial whatsoever should be wholly discontinued or discontinued subject to any exception or qualification) for the Governor, by order to be published in the Government Gazette, to direct that after a time mentioned in such order (not being less than three months from the date thereof) burials in such cemetery or burial place, ground, or place of burial shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exception or qualification mentioned in the same or any subsequent order: And whereas it has been made to appear to the said Governor that it is advisable that, except in vaults at present owned by private persons, all burials should be discontinued in the Public Cemeteries, East Perth: Now, THEREFORE, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby direct that from and after the first day of November, 1899, burials within the limits of the Public Cemeteries, East Perth, shall be wholly discontinued, except in cases where the special permission of the said Governor be first obtained.

THE following Report of the Government Astronomer on the Latitude and Longitude of the Perth Observatory is published for general information.

Report on the Latitude and Longitude of the Perth Observatory, Western Australia.

From the Government Astronomer to the Under Secretary.

SIR.

I have the honour to submit, for the information of the Government, the accompanying Report on the Latitude and Longitude of the Perth Observatory:—

Latitude, being an absolute quantity, depends upon my own observations only. The value obtained requires a correction for the errors of division of the transit circle. These have not yet been determined, but the correction will not probably be more than a fraction of a second of arc. Longitude, being a relative quantity, required the co-operation of an observer in a locality the position of which has been already determined. Sir Charles Todd, Government Astronomer of Adelaide, kindly came to my assistance, and exchanged signals with me on five nights. The resulting difference of longitude between here and Adelaide is probably very correct. Unfortunately, however, all Australian longitudes depend upon that of Madras, and there is some doubt about the exact position of that locality. The value adopted by the Government Astronomers of New South Wales, Victoria, and Adelaide is—

5h. 20m. 59·42s.

A new determination was made by officers of the Indian Survey in 1895, which makes the longitude—

5h. 20m. 59·11s.

I have, of course, adopted the former value, so as to be in line with the other colonies, and make the position of the Perth Observatory—

Latitude 31° 57′ 09.63″ S. Longitude 7h. 43m. 21.74s. E.

LONGITUDE.

A 6-inch transit circle, by Troughton & Simms, was mounted at the Observatory on Mount Eliza early in 1899. With the co-operation of Sir Charles Todd, Government Astronomer of South Australia, and through the courtesy of Mr. Sholl, Postmaster General of Western Australia, clock signals were transmitted along the telegraph line from Perth to Adelaide and vice versa on the nights of 30th March, 8th April, 10th April, 27th July, and 2nd August. Clock errors were determined by Mr. Griffiths at Adelaide and by myself at Perth, and I also observed at Adelaide for personal equation with Mr. Griffiths on 21st April, 1st May, and 8th May with a transit circle, and on 9th May and 10th May with a personal equation machine. The resulting difference was

0.06 second,

to be subtracted from "clock slow" G to reduce to C.

The clock beats were transmitted automatically from the sidereal clock at Perth to the General Post Office, thence via Albany, Eucla, and Port Augusta to Adelaide. Repeaters were placed at the Perth General Post Office, Albany, Eucla, Yardea, Adelaide General Post Office, and Adelaide Observatory.

On 27th July and 2nd August an additional relay was introduced into the circuit at the Perth Observatory, the signals being transmitted thence to the chronograph through a local battery.

On each observing night two sets of beats, each lasting for a little over two minutes, were transmitted from each end, and registered on the chronographs at each Observatory. Of these some 50 or more were measured, and the arithmetical mean adopted. The signals came through very clearly, the extreme differences amongst the several measures in any one set amounting, at the outside, to only 0.05 second.

Clock errors were determined in the usual manner, adopting the positions of clock stars given in the *British Nautical Almanac*, the level and azimuth errors being determined on each night as accurately as possible from mercury reflections and circumpolars.

The details are given in the accompanying joint report, the resulting difference of longitude being 1 hour 30 minutes 58:56 seconds. Adopting for the longitude of Adelaide 9 hours 14 minutes 20:30 seconds, given in a "Report on the Telegraphic Determination of Australian Longitudes, 1886," this makes

Perth 7 hours 43 minutes 21.74 seconds East of Greenwich.

Wave and Armature Time.—The mean result for this quantity, from the five nights observations, is—

0.27 second.

An interesting experiment was carried out with the co-operation of the Superintendent of Telegraphs. The circuit from the sidereal clock passes directly through the coils of a multiple relay, whence six simultaneous sets of clock beats issue. One of these goes to the chronograph through a local battery, another was sent along the line to the G.P.O., thence via Albany to Eucla, and back again to the Observatory chronograph via Coolgardie. This circuit corresponds approximately in distance to the line over which the clock beats were sent to Adelaide, and the same number of repeaters were used. The two sets of beats, one direct from the multiple relay and the other via Eucla, were recorded clearly on the chronograph, and the mean difference amounted to

0.26 second,

agreeing almost identically with that obtained between here and Adelaide.

LATITUDE.

The latitude was obtained from meridian zenith distances of circumpolars. A working list was prepared, which included some stars having their upper and some their lower transit between 5 and 7 p.m. As many of these as circumstances would permit were observed in the evening and the same set was taken on the following morning. The zenith distances were corrected for refraction by Bessel's refraction tables, as published in the Greenwich Observations, 1853. They have not been corrected for flexure or errors of division. A few determinations of the horizontal flexure co-efficient have been made, the mean of which is

0.76'

to be added to zenith distances of South stars. This quantity would give an approximate correction to the latitude of—0.64".

The errors of division have not yet been determined. The transit room is built somewhat after the plan suggested by Dr. Gill, in Cape Catalogue, 1885, introduction page xxviii., paragraph four. The roof was opened to leave an observing slit about six feet wide at least half-an-hour prior to the commencement of observations, and a nadir point determination was made both before and after each set, morning and evening. The following table gives the individual results from upper and lower transits of each star:—

Cookernup Local Board of Health.

AMENDED BY-LAWS.

The Cookernup Local Board of Health, under and by "The Cookernup Local Board of Health, under and by virtue of the powers and authorities conferred upon it by "The Health Act, 1898," and of all other powers and authorities enabling it in this behalf, doth hereby make and proclaim the following by-laws:—

- 1. In the construction and for the purposes of these bylaws, the following words, if not inconsistent with the context or subject matter, have the respective meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say :--
 - "Cesspit" and "Cesspan" mean any receptacle for fœcal matter.
 - "Closet" means the structure above or enclosing a cesspit or cesspan.
 - "House" has the meaning assigned to it by "The Health Act, 1898," and also means and includes huts, tents, and mills, or other buildings or premises.
 - "Water Area" means the catchment area of the water supply for any settlement.
 - "Occupier" means any person living in or being in the possession, use, or enjoyment of any house, whether paying rent for the same or not.
 - "Inspector" means an Inspector of Nuisances or Sanitary Inspector appointed by the Local Board of Health, and any Sub-Inspector appointed by the said Board.
 - "Refuse" means and includes any decomposing animal or decaying vegetable matter, house refuse, slops, soapsuds, sawdust, and ashes.
 - "High Water Mark" means the highest point on either bank of any water course to which the waters of such water course have risen, or may at any time
- The owner or occupier of every house shall, within one month after the publication of these by-laws, construct, or cause to be constructed, a closet and cess-pan for the use of the occupants of such house. Such closet and cess-pan shall be constructed in the position, mode, and manner hereinafter declared. Provided, however, that on the permission of the Inspector, one closet may be constructed and used for not more than four houses, and such permission may at any time be revoked.
- Every closet shall be so constructed as to effectually screen the persons using the same from observation, and every cesspan shall consist of a portable bucket, which shall be emptied and cleansed once every week, or as much oftener as may be directed by the Inspector.
- 4. No closet shall be constructed within fifty feet of a 4. No closet smart be constructed within into feet of a house or within fifty yards of high water mark, and any closet situated within fifty feet of a house or fifty yards of high water mark shall, within one calendar month of notice to that effect being given to the owner or occupier by the Inspector, be taken down, and the cesspan cleansed and

- a fire made therein, after which the cesspit shall be filled up to the satisfaction of the Inspector by the owner or occupier of the house to which such closet or cesspit is appurtenant.
- 5. Any owner or occupier who permits a cesspan to overflow from any cause whatever shall be guilty of an
- 6. No owner or occupier of a house shall permit any closet or cesspan appertaining to or used by the occupants of such house to become offensive or a nuisance, and every such owner or occupier shall, when required so to do by the Inspector, properly and effectually empty and cleanse such closet or cesspan to the satisfaction of the Inspector.
- 7. Nightsoil, focal matter, or refuse shall, when removed from a closet or cesspan, be buried at least two feet below the surface of the ground, but no such nightsoil shall be buried within three hundred yards of high water mark of any water-course in the said area.
- No person shall deposit or permit to be deposited any feecal matter, refuse, dung, manure, or any other offensive matter in or near any water-course, nor within three hundred yards of high water mark, nor in any place where storm water will be liable to wash such matter into any water-course.
 - 9. No swine shall be kept within the water area.
- 10. No stable, cow-shed, or sheep-pen shall be erected or 10. No stable, cow-sned, or sneep-pen shall be creeted or constructed within fifty yards of the high water mark of any water-course, nor in such a position that storm waters can wash any manure or refuse therefrom into any water-course; and each stable, cow-shed, or sheep-pen shall have attached a proper receptacle for liquid manure to the satisfaction of the Inspector. Every stable, cow-shed, and shear pear where the proper stable and a stable proper where the proper stable in the proper stable. sheep-pen, when situate upon grounds sloping to a watercourse, shall be excavated to a depth of at least 12 inches, and the soil so obtained shall be used as an embankment around the enclosure to the satisfaction of the Inspector.
- 11. Every stable, cow-shed, and sheep-pen situated within fifty yards of the high water mark of any water-course or in any such a position that storm waters may wash manure or refuse therefrom into any water-course shall, within one month after the publication of these by-laws, be cleansed by the owner or occupier, and shall no longer be used for housing animals, and shall be taken down if the Inspector so directs.
- 12. Dung or manure shall not be allowed to accumulate in or near any stable, cow-shed, or sheep-pen, but the same shall be periodically removed or disposed of to the satisfaction of the Inspector, and in such manner that it cannot pollute the water flowing or which may flow into any water-course.
- 13. Any owner or occupier of a stable, cow-shed, or sheep-pen who, within seven days after notice to do so, neglects or refuses to collect the manure and refuse therein, and to cleanse the same, shall be guilty of an offence.
- 14. No slaughter-house shall be permitted and no animals shall be slaughtered within three hundred yards of the high water mark of any water-course. or occupier of any slaughter-house shall daily collect and remove therefrom all offal, blood, manure, and filth, and shall not allow the same to flow or escape on to any ground shall be disposed of otherwise to his satisfaction.
- No sawdust shall be allowed to remain for the space of more than one day within fifty yards of any water-course, and the owner or occupier of any premises on which such sawdust shall be shall within such time remove the same to such distance, or otherwise dispose of the same to the satisfaction of the Inspector.
- 16. No person shall deposit, or cause or suffer to be deposited, any rubbish, filth, blood, offal, or manure, or any slops, soapsuds, urine, water containing urine, or other refuse water within fifty yards of a water-course, nor on any part of the water area from whence it may, in the opinion of the Inspector, be carried by storm waters into a watercourse, and pollute the water supply.
- No person shall allow any filth, rubbish, blood, offal, manure, or any slops, soapsuds, urine, water containing urine, or other refuse waters to flow from or escape from any house or premises occupied or owned by him.
- 18. Any person committing or suffering a breach of or offending against or not complying with the provisions of these by-laws shall be guilty of an offence, and upon conviction thereof before two Justices of the Peace shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding £10 for every such offence. Any person neglecting, refusing, or omitting to do any matter or thing enjoined by these by-laws, or doing any-

thing which is forbidden herein, after notice by the Inspector, shall be guilty of an offence, and shall, upon conviction as aforesaid, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding £5 for each day he refuses or neglects to comply with such notice.

19. It shall be lawful for the Inspector, in case of any breach of these by-laws, if in his discretion such course is necessary for the preservation of the public health, to enter upon any house, slaughter-house, stable, yard, closet, or other premises where such breach shall occur, and do any act or remove or cause to be removed anything thereon or therein in breach of these by-laws, or take such other steps as he may deem necessary for carrying out the provisions thereof, and that either before or after notice to the owner or occupier of such premises; and the cost of such removal or other necessary act shall be borne by the owner or occupier of the premises where such breach shall occur, and may be recovered from him in a commany manner. and may be recovered from him in a summary manner before two or more Justices of the Peace.

When a house, slaughter-house, cow-shed, or yard is occupied by two or more persons, each and every of them shall be liable to conviction for any offence against these by-laws committed or suffered by any one or more of such occupiers.
