THEREAS by a Commission dated the 22nd day of April, 1903, I, Admiral Sir FREDERICK GEORGE DENHAM BEDFORD, G.C.B., Governor as aforesaid, did appoint you, CHARLES HARPER, Esquire, M.L.A.; ROBERT HASTIE, Esquire, M.L.A.; WILLIAM ATKINS, Esquire, M.L.A.; WILLIAM VINCENT FITZGERALD, Esquire; and NEWTON MOORE, Esquire, Commissioners to inquire into and report upon the world's supplies of timber which come into competition with those of this State, and more particularly the hardwood timbers of the Eastern States of the Commonwealth, and upon other matters therein set forth: AND WHEREAS it is desirable to extend the purpose of the said Commission as hereinafter appearing :

Now, THEREFORE, I do hereby appoint you to inquire into and report upon as well the matters set forth in the said Commission as also upon the following matters, namely :-

- (1.) To make inquiry and take evidence as to the methods of cutting, carrying, and distributing timber by all persons engaged in the timber trade of this State, and to make recommendations thereon ;
- (2.) To make inquiry and to take evidence as to the efficacy of the existing regulations for the protection of the forests in all senses, and to make recommendations thereon ;
- (3.) To take evidence and make recommendations for the future development of State Forestry, inclusive of the training of officers, the raising and planting of desirable exotic timber trees, as well as the indigenous species, and the suitable localities for such operations;
- (4.) To make recommendations as to the advisability or otherwise of establishing State Forests under Statute;

(5.) And to inquire into any other subjects in connection with the forests and the timber trade which may, in the opinion of the Commission, be desirable in the public interest;

and I do hereby extend the purpose of the said Commission accordingly, and in all other respects I confirm the said Commission.

# PROCLAMATION

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WESTERN AUSTRALIA TO WIT. FRED. G. D. BEDFORD. [L.S.]

By His Excellency Admiral Sir FREDERICK GRORGE DENHAM BEDFORD, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor in and over the State of Western Australia and its Dependencies, etc., etc., etc.

WHEREAS by "The Land Act Amendment Act, 1902" (1 and 2 Edwardi VII., No. 20), the Governor may by Proclamation in the Government Gazette, after the opinion of the Road Board of the District has been requested, close any road or reservation for a road which may have been surveyed or shown as a road on any plan published by the Department of Lands and Surveys: Provided such road is not within the limit of a Municipality or Townsite, and has not been declared a Government road or a road under the Roads Act, or any Act amending the same : AND WHEREAS the roads hereinafter described have been surveyed and shown as roads on the plan of the survey of Koojan Agri-cultural Area, as published by the Department of Lands and Surveys: AND it is desirable to close such roads: AND

WHEREAS the opinion of the Victoria Plains Road Board has been requested: Now THEREFORE I, Admiral Sir Frederick George Denham Bedford, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor as aforesaid, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby declare the said surveyed roads to be closed.

# BY-LAWS OF THE GERALDTON LOCAL BOARD OF HEALTH.

BY-LAW No. 1.

# Cesspools to be cleansed and filled up.

All existing cesspools within the area under the jurisdiction of the Local Board shall be cleansed and filled up to the satis-faction of the Inspector within a calendar month of notice to that effect being given to the owner or occupier.

# BY-LAW No. 2.

Regulating the position and manner of construction of privies.

No person shall erect within the district of the Local Board 1. No person shall erect within the district of the Local Board any earth-closet, privy, or urinal the walls of which are not of stone, wood, wood and iron, or brick, and every closet shall be equipped with the sealed pan adopted by the Local Board. The doors of every closet shall be properly fitted, and shall at all times be kept in a state of thorough repair. The trap-door shall be so constructed as to readily admit the pan, and shall be placed frainer the wight of way. facing the right-of-way.

2. All closets, privies, or urinals shall be erected in such position and in such manner as shall be approved of by the Local Board; and all such closets, privies, and urinals shall be erected as near the right-of-way as conveniently can be, and every such structure shall be ventilated to the satisfaction of the Local Board.

3. The occupier of every house or premises, whether public or private, shall cause to be kept in every closet or privy belong-ing thereto a box containing either ashes, lime, sawdust, car-bolic powder, or other disinfectant approved by the Local Board, and shall cause all nightsoil or other matter which may be de-posited in such pan or receptacle in such closet or privy to be immediately deodorised or disinfected with a sufficient quantity of the disinfectant kept in such box.

# BY-LAW No. 3.

# Concerning closets and closet pans.

Each closet shall be supplied with a sufficient number of recep-tacles for excrementitious matter, which shall be interchange-able with others in the same district, and shall be supplied by the Local Board of Health.

# BY-LAW No. 4.

The air-tight closet pans, as provided by the Local Board of Health, shall be used by all persons within the town of Geraldton.

BY-LAW No. 5.

Any householder or occupier who shall knowingly permit any other kind of pan to be used on his or her premises shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$5 for each offence.

#### BY-LAW No. 6.

Every house or tenement shall be provided with a separate closet.

# BY-LAW No. 7.

Closets, how built.

Every closet shall be built as follows, viz. :---

1. Seats to be hinged so as to lift up for inspection and cleansing.

2. Risers to be removeable, and not to come within two or three inches of the floor.

3. The top of pans or receptacles not to be, under any circum-stances, more than one inch from the under surface of the seat.

4. Guide bars to be inserted so as to ensure pan being placed in exact position by the nightman.

5. Arrangements to be made so that all pans or receptacles may be removed from the outside, except with the consent of the Local Board of Health.

6. When the privy walls are constructed of stone or brick, the whole of the internal wall surfaces should be properly plastered or smoothly rendered in cement mortar.

7. Ventilating outlets should be constructed in each wall, as near the ceiling as practicable, each such outlet to be not less than 50 square inclusion area, and the door of the privy should be hung so that its bottom edge is at least three inches above the privy floor.

#### BY-LAW No. 8.

### Alter existing closets.

Ine owner or occupier of any house shall, on written notice from the Local Board, and within the time limited by such notice, make such alterations to existing closets as are required for the carrying out of the sanitary arrangements of the Local Board of Health.

BY-LAW No. 9.

#### Other person than servant of Board removing refuse or nightsoil.

Any person other than the servants of the Local Board of Health who shall remove and take away any refuse or nightsoil from any premises, closets, or closet pans, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than 5s., and not exceeding  $\pounds 5$ , for each offence.

# BY-LAW No. 10.

# Mode and times of removal of pans.

Mode and times of removal of pans. 1. The mode of removal of each receptacle in each closet shall be as follows:—The nightman shall remove each recep-tacle and at once cover the same with a suitable tight-fitting lid, and upon every such removal shall carefully place a cleansed pan of the pattern supplied by the Local Board in lieu of every pan so removed, and the charge for this service shall be as mentioned in Schedule A.

2. The said receptacles shall be emptied once a week at the least, or so much more frequently as the Local Board may from time to time direct.

# BY-LAW No. 11.

No person to remove nightsoil without permission.

1. No person shall remove nightsoil from any house or premises within the area under the jurisdiction of the Local Board unless he shall have first obtained from the Local Board permission authorising him to do so.

2.No permit shall be issued to any person not approved of by the Local Board.

# BY-LAW No. 12.

For the mode of carriage of and precautions, etc., to be observed—Meat, bread, fruit, etc. No person or persons shall bring or cause to be brought

or carried through any street or lane, in any cart or vehicle, any butcher's meat, bread, or fruit, unless such meat, bread, or fruit be protected from the sun and dust.

2. Every cart or other vehicle, and every construction or covering for carrying and protecting meat, bread, or fruit shall be kept in a clean and sanitary state.

# BY-LAW No. 13.

For the registration of cowkeepers, dairymen, or purveyors of milk.

purveyors of milk. All persons carrying on the trade of cowkeepers, dairymen, or purveyors of milk within the district of the Local Board shall annually register their names and addresses at the office of the Local Board, and shall pay a registration fee for such registra-tion, and shall receive a certificate thereof in the form of Schedule "B."

#### BY-LAW No. 14.

The occupier of any premises shall not keep cattle or deposit the dung of any cattle in such a situation or in such a manner as to pollute any water supplied for use, or used, or likely to be used by man for domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of men, or any water used or likely to be used in any dairy.

#### BY-LAW No. 15.

# For securing the cleanliness of bakeries.

1. In the construction of this By-law the expression " bakery " means any place in which is baked bread, biscuits, or confec-tionery, from the baking or selling of which a profit is derived.

tionery, from the baking or selling of which a profit is derived. 2. Every owner or occupier of a bakery shall cause all the inside walls of the rooms of such bakery and all the ceilings or tops of such rooms (whether such walls, ceilings, or tops be plastered or not) and all the passages and staircases of such bakery to be either painted with oil or varnished, or to be limewashed or to be partly painted or varnished and partly limewashed. Where painted with oil or varnished there shall be three coats of paint or varnish, and the paint or varnish shall be renewed once at least in every three years, and shall be washed with hot water and soap once at least in every six months. Where lime-washed, the limewashing shall be renewed once at least in every six months. six months

3. No person shall let or suffer to be occupied as a bakery or occupy as a bakery any room or place which has-

- (a.) A water-closet, earth-closet, privy, urinal, or ashpit within or communicating directly with such room or place.
- (b.) Any cistern for supplying water to such room or place
- also supplying water to a water-closet or urinal.
  (c.) A drain or pipe for carrying off fœcal or sewage matter having an opening within any such room or place.

4. Every occupier of a bakery shall cause the whole of hate. premises wherein he carries on his trade to be swept and thoroughly cleansed at the close of every working day. He shall, at least once in every week, cause the floors and every accessible woodwork of the internal parts of the bakery to be thoroughly scrubbed and washed with hot water.

#### BY-LAW No. 16.

For prescribing the time of and the precautions to be taken on the removal of pigwash, etc.
1. No person shall remove any pigwash or other filthy matter, unless such pigwash or filthy matter be carried in water-tight barrels or tanks, securely covered to prevent the escape of any of the contents thereof, or any offensive smell therefrom.

2. Every tank or barrel, and every receptacle used for the storage and reception of any pigwash or filthy matter, and every conveyance or vehicle used for the carriage or removal of any matter as above, shall be kept in a clean and sanitary condition, and kept covered.

3. No pigwash or filthy matter shall be removed from any place or premises between the hours of eight o'clock in the morning and six o'clock in the evening, except by permission of the Local Board.

# BY-LAW No. 17.

For the prevention of the sale of diseased fruit, etc. No person shall sell or expose for sale in any market, ware-house, or shop, or other place, any fruit which is diseased or unwholesome, and any fruit which, in the opinion of any officer appointed by the Local or Central Board, is diseased or unwholesome shall be destroyed, and all cases or packing material which surrounded such fruit shall also be destroyed as such officer may direct.

# BY-LAW No. 18.

For the restriction of the storage and keeping of bonedust, etc. No person shall store or keep any bonedust or artificial or other manure so as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

# BY-LAW No. 19.

Regulating and keeping of cattle or other animals. 1. Every occupier or owner of a building wherein or whereon any horses, cattle, swine, or other animals may be kept, shall provide in connection with such building or other premises a suitable receptacle for dung, soil, filth, or other offensive or noxious matter which may be produced from time to time in the keeping of such animals.

2. Such receptacle shall be constructed in such a manner and of such material, and shall be maintained in such a manner so as to prevent the escape of any of the contents thereof or any leakage therefrom.

3. The owner or occupier of such premises shall, at least once a month, or oftener if so directed by the Local Board, re-move, or cause to be removed, all dung or other offensive matter from such receptacle, and shall convey or cause to be conveyed such dung or offensive matter to the depot or place set apart for that purpose by the Local Board.

4. The walls, floors, and yards of such buildings or premises shall be kept in a thoroughly clean state to the satisfaction of the Inspector.

# BY-LAW No. 20.

Defining an area within which swine may not be kept, etc. 1. No person shall keep any swine within 100 feet of any house.

2. No person shall keep any swine in any part of the district under the control of the Local Board, unless and until such premises or places to be used as a piggery have been examined and approved by the Inspector and licensed by the Local Board.

# BY-LAW No. 21.

For the prevention of danger to the public from manufactories or places for the storage of inflammable materials.
1. No person shall permit on any premises owned or occupied by him any accumulation of straw, paper, shavings, empty cases, or other inflammable material.

2. Any person who, after two hours' notice from the Inspector, shall neglect to remove such inflammable material shall be guilty of an offence against this By-law, and, on conviction, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding  $\pounds 5$  for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued committed or continued.

# BY-LAW No. 22.

For the prevention of nuisance or injury to health from poultry yards, rags, or other materials used or stored in marine stores.
1. No person shall keep any premises as a poultry yard at a less distance than 25 feet from any dwelling.

Every poultry yard shall be kept in a clean condition, and disinfected at least once a week with lime, ashes, or other suit-able disinfectant.

3. No rags or other materials used or stored in marine stores, flock, or bedding or furniture manufactories, shall be kept so as to cause a nuisance or to be injurious to health.

#### BY-LAW No. 23.

#### For the regulation of noxious or offensive trades.

1. The owner or occupier of any place, building, or premises used for the purpose of carrying on any offensive or noxious trade, business or manufactory, as set forth in Section 146 of the Act, whether established before or after the passing of the said Act, shall register the same at the office of the Local Board during the first week in January in each year, and shall pay to the Local Board an annual registration fee, as set forth in Schedule "C" hereto, of the amount of which fee the Local Board shall give notice to such owner or occupier, and if such owner or occupier fails to comply, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding  $\pounds 2$  per day for each day during which such pro-visions shall not be complied with. 2 All premises or places so registered shall be kept in a clean The owner or occupier of any place, building, or premises 1.

2. All premises or places so registered shall be kept in a clean and sanitary state, and shall be limewashed as often as may be required by the Local Board or its officers.

# BY-LAW No. 24.

Specifying the time which may elapse between the giving of a notice and the doing of a thing.

Unless otherwise provided for, the time which may elapse between the giving of a notice and the doing of a thing required to be done by any Inspector or officer shall be determined by the Local Board according to the nature of the case.

# BY-LAW No. 25.

For preventing offensive matter running out of premises.

1. It shall not be lawful for the owner or occupier or person L. It shall not be tawnin for the owner of octifier of person having the care of, or any employee of or in any manufactory, brewery, slaughterhouse, knacker's yard, butcher's or fish-monger's shops, laundry, or dunghill, to allow any offensive matter to escape and flow upon any street, lane, way, or thoroughfare, or land within the district of the Local Board.

2. All such offensive matter shall be placed in a suitable receptacle, and emptied as often as necessary, to the satisfaction of the Inspector.

# BY-LAW No. 26.

#### Regulating the deposit of rubbish, etc.

1. The occupier of every house or premises shall, on written notice from the Inspector, and within the time specified in such notice, provide such and so many receptacles or boxes of the material and of the dimensions as may be required by the Local Board for the temporary deposit of house refuse.

2. The occupier of such house, or if there be no occupier, then the owner, shall regularly collect all refuse or rubbish from such premises and place the same in the receptacles; and he shall not permit or suffer such receptacle to overflow or become offensive, and shall, when necessary or directed by the Inspector, or officer of the Local Board, thoroughly disinfect the same forthwith forthwith.

3. Every receptacle as aforesaid shall be kept in such place or position as the Inspector may point out, and so as to be con-venient for the removal of the contents thereof.

4. Every owner or occupier, or if there be no occupier, then the owner, of every house or premises to which a receptacle as aforesaid is attached or used, shall cause the same to be emptied at least once a fortnight, or as often as the Inspector may direct.

5. The owner or occupier of such premises shall, after notice from the Inspector, and within the time limited in such notice, replace by a new and approved receptacle any receptacle that the Inspector may deem worn out or unfit for use.

# BY-LAW No. 27.

# Owner liable in same manner as occupier.

Notwithstanding any thing to the contrary herein contained, where any house is unoccupied or is occupied by numerous tenants, or where, for any other cause, the Local Board of Health thinks it desirable, the said Local Board of Health may give written notice to the owner, either personally or by leaving the same on the premises, requiring such owner to observe and carry out these By-laws in the same manner as if he were the occupier thereof and in such case such owner shall be reprovided in the thereof, and in such case such owner shall be responsible in the same manner and to the same extent as if he were the occupier of such premises, and be liable to the same penalties.

# Receptacles to be kept in an inoffensive condition.

All receptacles required by "The Health Act, 1898," or under these By-laws, shall be kept in an inoffensive condition by the householder or occupier.

# Regulating the removal of offensive matter.

Regulating the removal of offensive matter. Every person who shall convey any dust, mud, ashes, rubbish, filth, blood, offal, manure, dung, or soil collected, placed, or found in or about any house, stable, cowhouse, pigsty, lane, yard, street, or place whatsoever, through or along any street or lane, shall previous to and during the whole time of such convey-ance, cause such dust, mud, ashes, rubbish, filth, blood, offal, manure, dung, or soil collected to be covered with lime or suit-able substance, or shall adopt such other precautions as respectively may be necessary to prevent the emission of noxious or offensive odour or effluvia therefrom; and the same shall not be deposited in any place within the district other than the place be deposited in any place within the district other than the place set apart by the Local Board for that purpose.

# Regulating the disposal of the carcases of dead animals.

# BY-LAW No. 31.

# Regulating the burning of offal, etc.

No person shall burn any offal, rags, clippings or parings of leather, or any offensive matter so as to be offensive to any person or resident in the neighbourhood of such burning.

# BY-LAW No. 32.

# Regulating the removal of slops.

1. Any person who shall be ordered by the Local Board or its Inspectors shall provide and maintain proper water-tight vehicles or receptacles fitted with close-fitting covers or lids for the purpose of carting or receiving any slops or suds, house refuse, waste, or other matter or substance used in any laundry which is likely to become a nuisance or offensive by reason of əxposure

2. All such vehicles or receptacles shall be kept in such con-venient places so as to be readily removed, as may be directed by the Inspector, so as not to be a nuisance to any person, and shall be kept in a thoroughly sanitary condition and removed at least once a week and cleansed and disinfected both inside and out. Such receptacle will be emptied by the Board at the charge mentioned in Sabadula A mentioned in Schedule A.

# BY-LAW No. 33.

# Regulating the deposit of offensive liquid, etc.

No foul or offensive water, or other offensive liquid, and no No foul or offensive water, or other offensive induit, and no garbage, sweepings, or other offensive matter or thing shall be pumped, emptied, swept, thrown, or otherwise discharged, or deposited into or upon any street, lane, yard, vacant land, or other place, whether public or private, within the district other than the place set apart by the Local Board for that purpose.

#### BY-LAW No. 34.

Regulating the carrying off of storm or rain water. Every owner shall cause all buildings to be provided with spoutings, downpipes, and drains sufficient to carry off all storm or rain water.

### BY-LAW No. 35.

Any servant of the Local Board of Health who shall ask or demand, or receive from any person or persons for work done by him, any sum greater than that fixed by the Schedule hereto shall be guilty of an offence against these By-laws, and shall, upon conviction, pay a penalty of not less than 5s. and not ex-ceeding £5, and shall also be dismissed from the service of the Board Board.

# BY-LAW No. 36.

#### For regulating common lodging-houses within the area under the control of the Geraldton Local Board of Health.

The regulating common todging-houses within the area under the control of the Geraldton Local Board of Health. 1. Every person keeping or about to keep a common lodging-house within the district shall give, at the office of the said Board, at least four days' notice, in writing, of his intention to apply for the annual registration of such house, specifying its situation and the number of lodgers accommodated or intended to be accommodated, and shall then and there deposit the sum of Ten shillings as a registration fee. Such notice shall be in the Form A in the Schedule hereto, and shall be accompanied by a certifi-cate of character, in accordance with the Fourth Schedule of the Act, and such certificate shall be signed by six habitant house-holders of the Municipality; and the Board may refuse to register any lodging house, the occupier of which fails to produce such certificate. A keeper of a common lodging-house shall not at any one time receive, or cause or suffer to be received, into such house or into any room therein, a greater number of lodgers than shall be fixed by the Board as the maximum number of lodgers authorised to be received into such house or room, ad shall be specified in a notice in writing according to Form B in the Schedule hereto, which shall be served upon such keeper, and shall continue in force until, in pursuance of the By-law in that behalf, the number so fixed and specified shall be varied by the Board. A keeper of a common lodging-house (in any case where the Board may from time to time determine that it is expedient to vary the number fixed by them as the maximum number of lodgers authorised to be received into such house or room therein, and may from time to time, for the purpose of variation, cause to be duly served upon such keeper a notice in writing, accordlodgers authorised to be received into such house or room therein, and may from time to time, for the purpose of variation, cause to be duly served upon such keeper a notice in writing, accord-ing to Form C in the Schedule) shall not, at any time after any such notice shall have been served upon him, and after the date specified in such notice, and until, in pursuance of the provisions of this By-law, the number specified in such notice shall be further varied, receive, or cause or suffer to be received, into such house or into any room therein, a greater number of lodgers than shall be specified in such notice as the maximum number of lodgers authorised to he received into such house or into such of lodgers authorised to be received into such house or into such room.

2. The keeper of any common lodging-house shall cause to be cleansed all rooms, passages, stairs, floors, and offices of every kind daily, and shall cleanse all windows, doors, walls, ceilings, privies, and drains as often as may be necessary, and shall lime-wash the walls and ceilings thereof, or so much of them as shall be necessary, in the first week of each of the months of April and October in every year. A keeper of a common lodging-house shall not, except in such cases as are hereinafter specified, cause or suffer any person of the male sex above the age of ten years to use or occupy any room which may be used or occupied as a sleeping apartment by persons of the female sex. Such keeper shall not, except in such cases as are hereinafter specified, cause or suffer any person of the female sex to use or occupy any room which may be used or occupied as a sleeping apartment by persons of the female sex. The keeper of a common lodging-house shall cause every room in his house to be properly ventilated each day. The keeper of every lodging-house shall cause the yard area, or other open space of the premises, to be kept thoroughly clean, and in good order, and free from all slopwater and rubbish, and the privy or privies to be kept clean and in sanitary con-dition, and constantly supplied with a suitable disinfectant. The privies shall be sufficient in number (no fewer than one for every eight lodgers permitted, in addition to one to be provided for the lodging-house keeper and his family), and shall provide separate privies for the different sexes, and shall cause the pans to be emptied as often as may be necessary, and shall cause all sanitary appliances and the seats, floors, and walls of every privy belong-ing to such house to be thoroughly cleansed from time to time as often as may be necessary for the keeping such sanitary appliances, seats, floors, and walls in a clean and sanitary con-dition. ### BY-LAW No. 37. Penalties.

Penalties. Any person guilty of any offence against any of these By-laws, not otherwise specially provided for, shall be liable for every such offence, besides any costs or expenses which may be incurred in the taking of proceedings against such person, as well as any costs and expenses which may be incurred in remedying such default, as provided for in "The Health Act, 1898" (Sections 35 and 242), or these By-laws, to a penalty not exceeding the sum of £10, and to a penalty not exceeding the sum of £5, for each day during which such offence shall be continued; and such penalty or penalties shall be recovered as provided in the said Act : Provided, always, that no penalty imposed hereunder shall be less than 5s. #### CIRCULAR.

Sir.

Downing Street, 7th April, 1903.

With reference to my Circular despatch of 21st April, 1902, I have the honour to state, for the information of your Ministers, that the Convention relative to Sugar, which was signed at Brussels on the 5th of March, 1902, has been duly ratified by all the Signatory Powers not coming under Article VI., as well as by Italy, and that it will accordingly come into force on the 1st of September next.

I enclose, for your Ministers' further information, and with special reference to paragraph 7 of my Circular despatch 2. Therefore, for your ministers intriner information, and with special reference to paragraph 7 of my circular despatch referred to above, copies of the accompanying Parliamentary Paper containing the terms of ratification and of a declaration by which His Majesty's Government thought it necessary to accompany His Majesty's ratification of the Convention in consequence of doubts having been expressed in some quarters as to the effect of the final Protocol to Article XI., and of the declarations made by the British Delegates in the course of the Proceedings at Brussels with regard to the obligations of His Majesty's Government in respect to the self-governing Colonies.

3. The intention to ratify subject to such a declaration was previously intimated, as will be seen, to the various Signatory Powers.

4. It will be observed that one of the duties of the Permanent Commission will be to collect full information relating to legislation affecting sugar, not only in the contracting States, but in other States as well; it may therefore be desirable that the British Delegate on the permanent Commission should be supplied with a complete set of all the laws relating to sugar in the Colony under your Government, and I should be glad if I could be furnished with three sets of all such enactments, at as early a date as may be possible, and from time to time with similar sets of any further laws on the subject, as soon as possible after being passed.

# The Marquess of Lansdowne to Sir E. Monson.\*

SIR.

SIR, Foreign Office, January 13, 1903. The question of the obligations of this country under the Brussels Sugar Convention of the 5th March last, and the Final Protocol of the same date in respect of the self-governing British Colonies having recently been raised in the Legislatures of several of the Contracting States, and the discussions having shown that some divergencies of opinion exist on the subject. His Majesty's Government feel it necessary to place formally on record the view held by them on a point which they regard as of great importance as a matter of principle. The attitude of His Majesty's Government in regard to the matter has never varied. They have declined altogether to agree that Great Britain should be under any obligation to treat the British Colonies as

Britain should be under any obligation to treat the British Colonies as

foreign countries. The British Delegates at the Brussels Conference repeatedly and formally declared that the fiscal relations between Great Britain and the British Colonies and possessions must remain outside the Convention, and that in no circumstances would a penal clause be applied in the United Kingdom to British Colonial sugar. These declarations are 'recorded in the *proces-worbaux* of the 2ud, 5th, and 7th sittings, and are most explicit and categorical.

sittings, and are most explicit and categorical. It is very improbable that any appreciable amount of sugar will be imported into this country from the self-governing Colonies during the period for which the Convention is to remain in force. But His Majesty's Government attach the utmost importance to the principle of retaining, subject to the special and exceptional concessions men-tioned in the Final Protocol, perfect freedom of fiscal relations within the Empire, and in view of the doubts expressed in some quarters as to the proper interpretation of the Convention and the declarations made in the Final Protocol, they consider it necessary to place on record that they will not consent under any circumstances to be bound to penalise bounty-fed sugar imported into the United Kingdom from any of the self-governing British Colonies; and that they are not prepared to accept any reference of this question to the Permanent Commission to be established under Article VII.

In transmitting to the Belgian Government the ratification of His Majesty the King, His Majesty's Government will make a declaration to this effect, accompanied by a request that it be recorded in the Pro-tocol relating to the deposit of ratifications. They think it right at once to inform the other High Contracting Parties of this intention on their part, and you will accordingly hand to the French Minister for Foreign Affairs a copy of this despatch, and inform him that His Majesty's Government, in view of the explanation which it contains, will assume that their interpretation of the Conven-tion, so far as it affects the fiscal relations of Great Britain and her Colonies, is not disputed by the French Government, and that their adhesion is accepted by that Government upon this understanding.

His Excellency added that, as it was well known that he did not share the opinion of His Majesty's Government in this regard, he had thought it likewise best, in all the circumstances of the case, not to send an official reply to your Lordship's communication of the 13th ultimo.

It is evident that the question of bounty-fed sugar being imported into the United Kingdom from the British self-governing Colonies is here considered as one never likely to arise in practice, and that, therefore, it would be better to avoid, as far as possible, any discussion or correspondence in regard to the same which might endanger the execution of the Convention by any of the Signatory Powers.

No person shall, without the special permission, in writing, of the Minister for Lands or his agent (such permission only to be given where the timber is required for use within the boundaries of the said State Forests), fell, cut, split, or remove any timber growing or standing on the areas of Crown Land hereafter to be known and distinguished as Yerbillon, Dedari, Ghooli, Cunderdin, Merriden, Gilgai, and Edjudina State Forests, the boundaries of which are respectively described hereunder :--

#### YERBILLON.

All Crown Lands within a radius of five miles from the Yerbillon Pumping Station, No. 5.

# DEDARI.

All Crown Lands within a radius of five miles of Dedari Pumping Station No. 8.

# GHOOLI.

All Crown Lands within a radius of five miles of Ghooli Pumping Station No. 6.

# CUNDERDIN.

All Crown Lands within a radius of five miles from the Cunderdin Pumping Station No. 3.

# MERRIDEN.

All Crown Lands within a radius of five miles from the Merriden Pumping Station No. 4.

#### GILGAI.

All Crown Lands within a radius of five miles of Gilgai Pumping Station No. 7.

# EDJUDINA.

Bounded on the North and East by lines starting from a point situate East about 280 chains from Survey Mark E36 (Yabbo Hill), and extending West 800 chains and South 640 chains; the opposite boundaries being parallel and equal. (Plan 34/300.)

Any person offending against this Regulation shall, on conviction, be subject to a penalty not exceeding £20.

# REGULATIONS FOR RESIDENTIAL LEASES.

#### Repeal.

1. The Regulations of the 17th day of July, 1901, and all other regulations heretofore made relating to Residential Leases, are hereby repealed.

These Regulations, made this 27th day of May, 1903, shall come into force forthwith.

#### Applications.

2. Any person above the age of eighteen years, resident in Western Australia, and intending to actually reside on the lot applied for, may be an applicant for land set apart for Residential Leases.

But no lease of any lot shall be applied for, granted to, or held by any Asiatic or African alien, or any person having any interest in any other Residential Lot within two miles of the Lot applied for.

3. Every application-

- (1.) Shall be in the form of Schedule A, with the declaration therein contained; and
- (2.) Shall be lodged with the Land Agent for the District; or, in case there is no Land Agent for the District, with the Warden or Resident Magistrate.

With every application the applicant shall pay a fee of Ten shillings, and the amount of rent payable in advance, in accordance with the provisions of "The Land Act, 1898," or any amendment thereof, and of the Regulations thereunder,

5. All applications shall be subject to the approval of the Minister. The Land Agent, Warden, or Resident Magistrate shall forthwith forward the application, with his recommendation thereon, and the fee and rent, to the Minister. The applicant may be granted by the Land Agent, Warden, or Resident Magistrate, respectively, per-mission to occupy the land applied for temporarily, in the form of Schedule B.

6. The granting or refusal of the application shall be in the discretion of the Minister, but priority will, where practicable, be given to married applicants where husband and wife intend to reside on the area applied for.

7. If an application is refused, the rent paid with the application shall be returned to the applicant.

8. (1.) If an application is approved, a lease shall be granted to the applicant in the form or to the effect of Schedule C, as from the first day of the quarter next preceding the date of approval of the application, upon payment by the applicant of a fee of Ten shillings for the cost of the lease.

(2.) On approval of an application, notice shall be given to the applicant by letter sent by post to his address.

(3.) If the fee of Ten shillings is not paid within thirty days after the posting to the applicant of notice of approval, such approval shall be void and the application shall be deemed to have been refused.

9. The granting of any lease shall not be a waiver of the restrictions mentioned in Regulation 2.

#### Conditions of Lease.

10. No lease or interest in a lease shall be held by any Asiatic or African alien, nor by any person under the age of eighteen years, nor by any person who is interested in any other Residential Lease within a distance of two miles.

11. Every lease shall be granted and held subject to the provisions of "The Land Act, 1898," and any amendment thereof (hereinafter referred to as the Act), and the Regu-lations thereunder in force for the time being relating to Residential Leases (hereinafter referred to as the Regulations).

Every lease shall be limited to the natural surface 12 of the land demised, and the land below the natural surface to a depth not exceeding 40 feet if situated within a goldfield or mineral district, and if not so situated, not exceeding 200 feet.

13. The term granted by any lease shall not exceed twenty-one years from the first day of January preceding the date of the application.

14. (1.) The yearly rent for the first eleven years shall be as fixed by the Minister at the date of approval of the application for the lots generally in the Residential Area within which the lot applied for is situated or for the particular lot applied for.

(2.) Until otherwise fixed by the Minister, the yearly rent for the first eleven years shall be Ten shillings.

(3.) The yearly rent for the subsequent period of ten years shall be fixed by the Minister twelve calendar months at least before the expiration of the preceding eleven years.

(4.) The rent shall be payable half-yearly in advance, in accordance with the provisions of the Act.

(5.) The yearly rent payable under any lease granted prior to these Regulations shall be Ten shillings as heretofore, and such rent shall continue payable until the termination of such lease.

(1.) Possession of the Residential Lot shall be taken by the applicant within two calendar months of the approval of the application, and thenceforth it shall be used as the habitual abode of the lessee, or some member of his fami'y, for nine months at least in every year, except as provided in paragraph (2) of this Regulation.

(2.) In case of sickness or special necessity, the Minister may, on application in the form of Schedule D, and on payment of a fee of Five shillings, grant the lessee authority in writing to absent himself for any period of such nine months.

16. The lessee shall, subject only to Regulation 15, con-tinue in actual and personal occupation of the land, and, except as hereinafter provided, shall not use the land or permit it to be used for any business, trade, or occupation, or for any purpose whatever other than the *bona fide* residence of the lessee.

17. If a lessee, or the husband or wife of a lessee, has or acquires any interest in any other Residential Lot within two miles of the lot, the lease may be forfeited.

But this Regulation shall not apply where the husband or wife of a lessee is permanently living separate and apart from the lessee.

# Transfers.

18. (1.) No transfer or under-lease shall be allowed without the consent in writing of the Minister in that behalf first obtained, on application in the form of Schedule E. No such consent shall be given within six months of the granting of the lease, except in very special

(2.) On every such application the lease shall be pro-duced, with a statutory declaration by the intended trans-feree or sub-lessee in the form of Schedule F, and the fee of Twenty shillings shall be paid.

(3.) No transfer or under-lease shall be allowed to any person not entitled to be an applicant for or to hold the lease, and the allowance of any such transfer or under-lease shall not avoid a forfeiture of the lease.

19. No portion of any Residential Lot shall be transferred or sub-let under any circumstances whatever.

### Forfeiture.

- 20. (1.) A lease may be forfeited by the Minister-
  - (a.) If the rent is not fully paid at the times and in manner provided by the Act.
  - (b.) In case of breach, non-performance, or non-observance of any of the conditions thereof or of the provisions of the Act or Regulations.

(2.) No acceptance of rent, or other act subsequent to any breach, non-performance, or non-observance as aforewaiver of the forfeiture, and no forfeiture shall be waived otherwise than by an express waiver under the hand of the Minister.

21. A lease may be determined at the option of the lessee, at the expiration of any year of the tenancy, by notice in writing, given by the lessee to the Minister three months before the expiration of such year.

22. Within one month of the expiration, or sooner determination of any lease, the lessee may remove any buildings or fixtures on the lot.

23. If, in the opinion of the Minister, a lease has been or has become liable to be forfeited, he shall give notice thereof to the lessee by letter sent by post addressed to the lot in question or by notice in the *Government Gazette*; and in a set of the set of Government Gazette, be absolutely forfeited.

# Mortgages.

24. A lessee may not mortgage his lease without the consent of the Minister. On such consent being given, a lease may be mortgaged in accordance with the provisions of "The Land Act, 1898," or any amendment thereof, and of

the Regulations thereunder, but such mortgage shall only be effected for the purpose of *bonå fide* improving the lot. This Regulation shall not apply to mortgages effected prior to the coming into force of these Regulations.

# Business Permits.

25. (i.) If, in the opinion of the Minister, it is desirable so to do, he may, in his discretion, grant to any lessee permission to carry on, upon his residential lot, any specified business or businesses.

(2.) Such permission shall be granted at such additional annual rent as the Minister may in each case determine, payable half-yearly in advance, as from the next preceding quarter day.

(3.) Such permission shall not be granted in respect of any Residential Lease granted before the publication of these Regulations, but such lease may be cancelled, and a new lease granted in lieu thereof, subject to these Regulations.

26. Application for a business permit shall be made in the form of Schedule G, and a deposit of £5 shall be paid with every application.

27. The application shall be lodged and dealt with as hereinbefore provided in the case of an application for a lease.

28. Before granting permission, the Minister shall satisfy himself, by any such personal or other inquiry as he may deem fit, of the *bona fides* of the application, and that the permission applied for is necessary in the general interest of the neighbourhood,

29. If the Minister refuses to grant the permission applied for, the deposit, after deducting the expenses of the inquiry (if any), to be fixed by the Minister, shall be returned to the applicant.

returned to the applicant. 30 If the Minister is prepared to approve of the grant of a permit, he shall give notice, by letter sent by post to the applicant, of the amount of additional rent fixed; and the applicant shall, within twenty-eight days after the posting of such letter, forward to the Minister the additional rent for the current half-year. If such rent is not received by the Minister within such time, the application shall be forthwith cancelled and the deposit forfeited. If such rent is so received the application shall be deemed granted, and the expense of any inquiry shall be deducted from the deposit, and the balance credited to the lessee on account of future rent.

31. No permission shall be granted for a longer term than five years, or extending beyond the seventh or fourteenth year of the term of the lease, but such permission may be renewed on such terms as the Minister may think fit.

32. Such permission may be granted in the form of Schedule H.

33. The additional rent shall be payable half-yearly in advance, at the times and in manner prescribed for payment of the rent reserved by the lease, and, in case of default in payment in accordance therewith, the permission may be cancelled by order of the Minister.

34. The permission may be cancelled by order of the Minister in his absolute discretion at any time if, in the opinion of the Minister, any business other than the business expressly authorised is carried on upon the residential lot.

35. The permission shall follow every approved transfer or sub-lease of the residential lot.

36. (1.) No lessee shall sell or allow or permit the sale of any liquor on his residential lot by virtue of any license under "The Wines, Beer, and Spirit Sale Act, 1880," or any amendment thereof, for consumption either on or off the premises, without the special permission, in writing, of the Governor.

(2.) No such permission shall be granted for a longer period than one year without the special consent of the Governor, but every such permission may be renewed, and shall be revocable at any time at the discretion of the Minister.

#### Resumption.

37. The whole or any part of a residential lot leased, or agreed to be leased, under these Regulations, may be resumed by the Governor for mining purposes, or for any public purpose whatever, at three months' notice to the lessee, published in the *Government Gazette*; and immediately after the expiration of such three months, all the estate and interest of the lessee therein shall cease and determine as if the lease had never been granted. But on any such resumption, the lessee shall be entitled to receive from the Minister the fair value of any improvements existing on the land resumed, to be ascertained, in the absence of agreement, by one competent person to be appointed by the lessee and one by the Minister, and any difference of opinion between the said valuers shall be determined by the Resident Magistrate of the District or Warden of the Goldfield within which the land is situate acting as umpire.

#### Transmission.

38. On the death or bankruptcy of a lessee his legal personal representative or the Official Receiver or trustee of his estate may be registered as the lessee, but a transfer to a person entitled to be an applicant for and to hold a lease shall be made by such representative, Official Receiver, or trustee, and be registered within three calendar months, otherwise the lease shall be forfeited.

### Interpretation.

39. In these Regulations the term "lessee" includes any authorised transferee or sub-lessee.
