WHEREAS it is provided by "The Plant Diseases Act, 1914," that the said Act shall come into operation on a day to be fixed by proclamation: Now therefore I, the said Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and de-clare that the said Act shall come into operation on the 29th day of December, 1914.

of the Royal Victorian Order, Governor
in and over the State of Western
Australia and its Dependencies, in
the Commonwealth of Australia.

WHEREAS it is provided by "The Plant Diseases Act, 1914," that the Governor may, by proclamation, prohibit, either absolutely or except in accordance with regulations, the bringing into the State from any specified State, country, or place of all or any of the things following, that is to say—

- (a) any specified kind of plant, fruit, or other thing which would in his opinion be likely to introduce any disease into the State or into the specified portion thereof, as the case may be;
- (b) all or any coverings or goods in or with which any plant, fruit, or thing of the kind specified has been contained or packed or come in contact;
- (c) anything which is infected, or anything which is infected with any specified disease:

And whereas the plants, fruits, and things hereinafter mentioned would, in my opinion and the opinion of the Executive Council be likely to introduce disease into Western Australia: Now therefore I, the said Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby in exercise of the powers conferred by the said Act-

(1.) Prohibit the bringing into the State from any other State of the Commonwealth of rooted grape vines or of any rooted plant of the genus "vitis."

- (2.) Prohibit the bringing into the State from any other State of the Commonwealth (except South Australia) of grapes or of cuttings of grape vines or of cuttings of plants of the genus "vitis";
- (3.) Prohibit the bringing into the State from South Australia of grapes or cuttings of grape vines or cuttings of plants of the genus "vitis," except in accordance with "The Plant Diseases Regulations, 1914;
- (4.) Prohibit generally the bringing into Western Australia of any plant or fruit otherwise than as cargo or as goods on which freight has been paid, except in accordance with the said regulations;
- (5.) Prohibit generally the bringing into Western Australia of any plant or fruit which is infected with any of the following diseases (in any of their stages), that is to say-

Codlin Moth, Phylloxera, Fruit Flies, Woolly Aphis, Mytilaspis spp., Aspidiotus spp., Lecanium spp., Chionaspis spp., Ceroplastes spp., Diaspis spp., Phoma Citricarpa, Melanose, Nematodes. Any Bacterial Disease;

(6.) Prohibit the bringing into Western Australia of any covering which is infected with any of the diseases aforesaid.

This Proclamation shall have effect from the commencement of "The Plant Diseases Act, 1914."

WHEREAS it is provided by "The Plant Diseases Act, 1914," that the Governor may, by proclamation, prohibit absolutely the bringing into any specified portion of the State from the rest of the State generally or from any specified portion thereof of any specified kind of plant, fruit, or thing which would, in his opinion, be likely to introduce disease into such portion of the State: And whereas, in the opinion of the said Governor and of the Executive Council, the bringing into those portions of the State of Western Australia re-spectively, defined in the first and second schedules herespectively, defined in the first and second schedules hereto, of tomatoes, or any of the kinds of fruit specified
in the third schedule, from any portion of the State,
except the Warren Road District, is likely to introduce
disease into such portions of the State: Now therefore
I, the said Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby prohibit absolutely the bringing into the portion of the State defined
in the first schedule, and the portion of the State defined in the first schedule, and the portion of the State defined in the second schedule from any part of the State, ex-cept the Warren Road District, of tomatoes or of any of the fruits specified in the third schedule hereto.

First Schedule.

That portion of Western Australia situated within a radius of thirty miles of the Post Office, Mount Barker, except the area comprised within a radius of three miles of the Town Hall at Albany, and the area comprised within the Denmark Estate to the West of the Hay Siding, on the Denmark Railway Line.

Second Schedule.

That portion of Western Australia sixteen miles in width, running along and including the Government Railway Line from Kirupp to Big Brook Timber Mill, comprising a strip of land of a width of eight miles on each side of the centre of such line.

Third Schedule.

Loquats, apricots, peaches, plums, nectarines, figs, pears, apples, quinces, plantains, bananas, guavas, persimmons, citrus fruit (except lemons).

Provided that this proclamation shall not extend to tomatoes or any of such fruits as aforesaid which are in course of transit by rail to or from Albany or by rail or road from the Warren Road District.

This proclamation shall have effect from the commencement of "The Plant Diseases Act, 1914."

WHEREAS by "The Plant Diseases Act, 1914," it is provided that the Governor may by Proclamation prohibit absolutely the bringing into the State of Western Australia of anything which in his opinion is likely to introduce any disease into the said State: And whereas in the opinion of the said Governor and the Executive Council, refuse and sweepings containing vegetable matter and collected or obtained from ships coming from any place outside of the said State would, if admitted into the said State, be likely to introduce into the said State the diseases known respectively as "Irish Blight," "Scale Insect," "Codlin Moth," and "Fruit Fly": Now therefore I, the said Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby absolutely prohibit the bringing into the said State of all refuse and sweepings containing vegetable matter and collected or obtained from any ship which has arrived at any port in Western Australia from any place outside Western Australia, whether directly or after calling at

any other port or ports en route.

This Proclamation is to have effect from the commencement of "The Plant Diseases Act, 1914."

REGULATIONS.

HIS Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby (under "The Plant Diseases Act, 1914") make the Regulations set forth hereunder and declare that the said Regulations shall come into force on the commencement of "The Plant Diseases Act, 1914."

THE PLANT DISEASES ACT, 1914. Regulations.

1. Before any vine cuttings or grapes or cuttings of plants of the genus vitis are imported into Western

Australia from South Australia the proposed importer or his agent shall obtain a certificate signed by an officer of the Department of Agriculture of that State stating that the cuttings and grapes are free from phylloxera, and that they have not been grown within a distance of twenty-five miles of any place infected with or which has at any time been infected with phylloxera. It shall be the duty of any such importer or his agent to produce and hand over such certificate to an inspector on demand. All grapes or cuttings of grape vines or cuttings of plants of the genus "vitis" imported from South Australia shall be imported by sea direct and not otherwise.

2. All such cuttings as aforesaid imported from South Australia shall, after disinfection, be quarantined for not less than one growing season in quarantine grounds appointed under the Act. The following fees shall be payable in respect of quarantine under this regulation and shall be recoverable from the importer or any agent of the importer in manner hereinafter set forth: -

Fees per quarantine.
On delivery of cuttings or rooted vines in quarantine— 2s. 6d. per hundred or part of a hundred.

On receipt of rooted vines from quarantine-2s. 6d. per hundred or part of a hundred.

In these regulations vine cuttings include buds.

- (i.) All plants and fruit imported into the State shall, and all seeds so imported may, be inspected and disinfected by an inspector in such manner as he shall deem sufficient as soon as practicable after their arrival at the port or place where they are to be unloaded, and for this purpose any inspector may seize and take possession of any such plant or fruit wheresoever the same may be.
- (ii.) All such plants and fruit shall be discharged direct from the ship or lighter in which they may be into railway trucks or in such other manner as may be ordered by an inspector, and shall be immediately removed to disinfecting sheds. No such plants or fruit shall be discharged upon any wharf, quay, jetty, or other similar place without the permission of an inspector.

(iii.) All plants or fruit arriving in Western Australia by post shall be sent on arrival to the disinfecting shed at Fremantle.

(iv.) It shall be the duty of every consignee, agent, or other person engaged or concerned in the importation into Western Australia of any plant or fruit, to deliver the same or cause the same to be delivered to an inspector of such plant or fruit and to unpack and pre-pare the same for inspection and disinfection to the satisfaction of an inspector.

(v.) Any plant, fruit, or seed found to be infected with disease may be destroyed by or under the direction of an inspector, or it may, after being disinfected, be kept in quarantine for such time as an inspector may deem advisable, and may, whenever an inspector shall be satisfied that it is no longer infected, be delivered to the owner or any person entitled to receive the same: provided that if after it has been quarantined for 14 days an inspector is of opinion that the plant or fruit

is still infected, he may destroy it.
(vi.) It shall be the duty of the owner of any plant, fruit, or seed which has been inspected under these regulations, or any person entitled to receive the same, to take away and remove such plant, fruit, or seed from any place where the same may be as soon as practicable after he has been required by notice in writing under the hand of an increase.

the hand of an inspector so to do.
5. Before any plant or fruit proposed to be imported into Western Australia otherwise than as cargo, or as goods on which freight is paid, shall be so imported, the permission of an inspector shall be first had and obtained.

6. It shall be the duty of every consignee, agent, or other person engaged or concerned in the importation of fruit into the State to destroy to the satisfaction of an inspector all rotten or waste fruit.

7. The fees for inspection that shall be charged

against and paid by any person receiving any plants or fruit by post shall be sixpence per parcel, provided that no person shall be charged more than two shillings for inspection of parcels received by him by any angles and

spection of parcels received by him by any one post.
8. All soil, straw, and packing material of any description used in connection with the importation of fruit or plants shall be destroyed unless an inspector shall otherwise order. All cases, boxes, bags, or other receptacles shall be steamed or dipped, and branded as directed by an inspector; but may be destroyed if an inspector shall so order.

9. The following fees shall be charged for inspection and disinfection of fruit and plants:-

- 10. The fees aforesaid shall be payable to an inspector or authorised officer on demand, and such demand may be made before the inspection is made.
- 11. In the event of any fees payable under these regulations not being paid by any person liable to pay the same, such fees may be recovered summarily from such person by complaint made by an inspector before any Justice of the Peace in manner provided in the Justices Act, 1902, or by action brought by the Under Secretary in his official style or title in any Court of competent jurisdiction.
- 12. Before any fruit trees, vines, plants, or portions thereof are sent away from any nursery, or land used for the propagation of plants for sale, the same must be disinfected according to the schedule of treatment set forth in the regulations, providing that an inspector may, after inspection and finding citrus trees and tender plants in foliage free from disease, exempt the same from treatment.
- All coverings sent away from any nursery or land used for the propagation of plants for sale, containing trees, vines, plants or portions thereof, and which are intended for sale, distribution, or gift, must be legibly marked with the name and address of the consignor and consignee, and a descriptive invoice of the contents must accompany the same with a certificate to the effect that such contents have been disinfected according to the schedule of treatment to these regulations, and that the said trees, vines, plants, or other vegetation are free from disease.

14. The foregoing regulations do not apply to any port or part of the State of Western Australia North of the 26th Parallel of South Latitude.

15. The regulations made under "The Insect Pests Amendment Act, 1898," and published in the Government Gazette on the 14th day of June, 1907, are hereby annulled subject, however, to such and the like savings as apply in the case of the reneal of a Statute as apply in the case of the repeal of a Statute.

The regulations may be cited as the Plant Diseases Regulations, 1914, and shall operate from the commencement of "The Plant Diseases Act, 1914."

Schedule.

The fumigation and treatment of fruit, trees, plants, or portions thereof-

(a) Fruit, trees, and hardy plants in foliage: - One half (1/2) oz. avoirdupois of potassium cyanide (98 per cent.); One and one-half (11/2) fluid ozs. sulphuric acid (1.8 sp. gr.); three (3) fluid ozs. of water.
(b) Deciduous trees and plants in dormant state:

One (1) oz. avoirdupois of potassium cyanide (98 per cent.); two (2) fluid ozs. sulphuric acid (1.8 sp. gr.); three (3) fluid ozs. water.

The quantities above specified shall be used for each

hundred (100) cubic feet of space contained in the fumigation chamber. The fumigation shall be continued for a period of one (1) hour.
