the 23rd day of November, 1929, until the 23rd day of December, 1929, inclusive, throughout the State of Western Australia.

WHEREAS by "The Factories and Shops Act, 1920," it is enacted that the Governor may by Proclamation temporarily suspend the operations of the said Act, in so far as it applies to the closing time fixed or appointed for any shop or shops: And whereas it is expedient to exercise such power in manner hereafter appearing: Now, therefore I, the said Lieut.-Governor, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby by this Proclamation suspend the operations of the said Act between the hours of six o'clock and nine o'clock in the evening of Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday in every week during the period commencing on the First day of January, 1930, and ending on the Thirty-first day of December, 1930, in so far as it applies to the closing time of shops conducted in open markets, which are kept open for the conduct of business therein between the times aforesaid, and on the days aforesaid, and in which shops home-made jams and preserves, honey, butter (other than factory butter), and eggs, hams and bacon, not being factory hams or bacon, are sold or offered for sale; provided that, only the said goods shall be sold or offered for sale between the said times by virtue of this Proclamation, and the said shops shall

not be kept open for the sale or offering for sale of any other goods which cannot otherwise be lawfully sold or offered for sale between the times aforesaid.

PARKS AND RESERVES ACT, 1895.

By-laws for the Control of National Park, Greenmount.

HIS Excellency the Governor in Executive Council has been pleased to approve, under the provisions of "The Parks and Reserves Act, 1895," of the following By-laws for the control and management of Reserve No. 47537, National Park, Greenmount:—

The term "Board" in these By-laws shall mean the Board appointed under the provisions of "The Parks and Reserves Act, 1895," to control the Reserve.

"Permission" shall mean the permission of the Board first obtained and expressed in writing.

Control of Vehicles.

1. No person shall drive, ride, convey, impel, or have any motor car, motor cycle, bicycle, carriage, cart, boat, aeroplane, or other vehicle within the reserve except upon a place provided for the purpose.

Class of Vehicles.

2. No vehicle, team, cart, or wagon used for carrying any goods, bricks, stone, wood, iron, or merchandise of any kind (whether laden or not), nor any hearse, mourning coach, camel, packhorse, or other beast of burden shall enter or pass through the Reserve.

Timber and Firewood.

3. No person shall cut or remove any tree or sapling, or any part thereof, either living or dead, for any purpose whatever without permission.

Damaging Growth.

4. No person shall injure, cut, break, deface, pull up, pick, remove, or destroy any tree, shrub, plant, flower, or grass growing on the Reserve, or remove or damage stakes or labels therein.

Soils, Fences, and Grass.

5. No person shall cut up, damage, disfigure, or interfere with the soil, turf, or surface of any part of the Reserve, or the roads or footways across, around, or over the same, or with any part of the fences, buildings, electrical equipment, rockwork, watercocks, or seats upon the same, or pollute or interfere with any ornamental or natural water therein.

Stone.

6. No person shall remove stone, gravel, or earth from any part of the Reserve.

Animals, Birds, and Fish.

7. No person shall disturb, interfere with, catch or destroy any bird, animal or fish, nor their nests, spawning grounds or other habitat within the Reserve, nor enter any portion set apart or enclosed for their sole use for breeding or otherwise.

Rubbish.

8. No person shall deposit or leave any rubbish, refuse, paper, broken glass, china, or litter of any kind whatsoever within the Reserve except in the receptacles provided, nor break bottles, china, or other similar substances therein.

Behaviour.

9. No person shall misconduct himself or herself, or indulge in any riotous or indecent conduct, or use any indecent or improper language, or offend against decency as regards dress on the Reserve.

Intoxicating Liquor.

10. No person shall bring into or consume within the Reserve any intoxicating liquor, nor enter thereon when visibly under the influence of liquor.

Expectoration.

11. No person shall spit or expectorate upon any path, grass, structure, or erection in this Reserve.

Camping.

12. No person shall camp, lodge, or tarry overnight, or frequent the Reserve for the purpose of camping, lodging, or tarrying overnight, nor lie or sleep during the day on the Reserve.

Seats for Ladies.

13. No man shall occupy a seat which is set apart for the use of ladies.

Bill Sticking.

14. No person shall post, stick, stamp, stencil, paint, or otherwise affix, distribute, or give out any placard, handbill notice, advertisement, or any document whatsoever upon any tree, fence, post, gate, wall, flagging, road, path, or any place whatever on the Reserve, and no person shall cause to be done any of the acts herein prohibited.

Fires and Matches.

15. No fires shall be lighted, except in places approved by the Board, and no person shall kindle a fire in any place whatever without first clearing a sufficient surrounding area to afford reasonable protection from the danger of igniting the bush.

No person, having kindled or made use of a fire, shall leave it burning, but shall effectively extinguish it.

No person using a lighted match in any portion of the Reserve shall throw away the same without first making sure it is effectively extinguished.

Firearms and Explosives.

16. No person or persons shall carry or discharge any firearms, or throw or discharge any stone or other missile, or set off any fire balloon, or throw or set fire to any fireworks on any portion of the Reserve without permission.

Trading.

17. No person shall, without permission, sell or expose for sale any goods, wares, refreshments, fruits, nuts, confectionery, fish or other merchandise or things, or solicit or offer to purchase bottles on any portion of the Reserve.

Games and Animals.

18. No person shall, upon the said Reserve without permission, play, practise, or indulge in any game, sport, or gymnastic exercise, or exercise horses, dogs, or other animals for racing.

Straying Stock.

19. No person shall cause, allow, or suffer any horse, cattle, sheep, dog, goat, camel, donkey, mule, pig, or other animal or fowl or other bird to enter, stray, or feed upon the said Reserve without permission.

Meetings.

20. No person shall organise, arrange, advertise, or take part in any fete or concert, or engage in public worship, preaching, or public speaking of any kind, or any meeting of like character on the Reserve without permission.

Betting.

21. No person shall bet or offer to bet publicly on any part of the Reserve.

Trespass.

22. No person, except workmen employed in the Reserve, shall enter any place enclosed for trees, flowers, or shrubs, or plantations of young trees, nor step, or walk upon, or jump across any plot therein which may be set apart for shrubs, plants, or flowers.

Obstructing Employees.

23. No person shall in any part of the Reserve wilfully obstruct, disturb, interrupt, or annoy any other person in the proper use or enjoyment of the gardens, or wilfully obstruct in the execution of his duty, or insult, or neglect to obey the lawful directions of, or refuse or neglect to give his correct name and address to any officer, gardener, keeper, labourer, workman, or other person employed in any connection therewith.

Traffic.

24. The traffic requirements in force for the time being under "The Traffic Act, 1919," and its amendments, shall be observed on the said Reserve, but always with the limitation that no person shall at any time drive, ride, or impel any carriage, motor car, motor cycle, bicycle, tricycle, or other vehicle at a speed exceeding 15 miles an hour.

Boundaries.

25. In any prosecution under these By-laws it shall not be necessary for the Board or its officer to prove the boundaries of the Reserve, but at the hearing of the complaint the averment contained in the complaint that the offence was committed within the boundaries of this Reserve shall be deemed to be proved in the absence of proof to the contrary.

Penalty.

26. Any person offending against any of the provisions of these By-laws shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding £20, in addition to being immediately removed from the Reserve.

BY-LAWS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE HARRISMITH PUBLIC CEMETERY.

Reserve 16750.

Department of Lands and Surveys,
Corr. 816/17. Perth, 12th November, 1929.

HIS Excellency the Governor in Executive Council has been pleased to approve under "The Cemeteries Act, 1897," and amending Acts, of the By-laws set out hereunder for the Harrismith Public Cemetery, Reserve 16750.

C. G. MORRIS,

Under Secretary for Lands.

By virtue of all powers in that behalf in the Trustees of the Harrismith Public Cemetery, the said Trustees make the following By-laws:—

1. All fees and charges payable to the Trustees, as set forth in Schedule A, shall be paid at the times and manner therein mentioned, unless otherwise ordered.
2. Any person desiring to inter any dead body in the Cemetery shall make an application in the form contained in Schedule B. Upon such application being approved by the Trustees, and upon payment of the prescribed fees, they shall cause to be issued to the person so applying an "Order for Burial," in the form contained in Schedule C.
3. All applications for interment shall be made at the office of the Trustees in such time as to allow of at least eight working hours' notice to be given to the Secretary prior to the time fixed for burial. An extra charge shall be made for applications within such time. No free interment shall be allowed unless the application, together with the Magistrate's order therefor, be handed in at the office in such time to allow of at least eight working hours' notice being given as stated above.
4. The Trustees shall cause all graves to be dug, and vaults, brick graves, or graves, be re-opened as and when required.
5. Before any interment is allowed, the "Order for Burial" shall be handed to and retained by the Secretary.
6. Every coffin shall have upon the lid an approved metal plate bearing the name of the deceased stamped or otherwise indelibly inscribed in legible characters thereon. No coffin not complying with this By-law shall be admitted to, or be interred in, the Cemetery.
7. Every grave shall be at least six feet deep, and no interment shall be allowed in any grave with a less depth than three feet from the top of the coffin to the original surface of the surrounding ground.
8. In the case of an application for interment in any private grave or vault to which the deceased had no

claim during life, the written and verified consent of the grantee shall be handed in with the application.

9. No burial shall be allowed to take place in the Cemetery, nor shall any coffin be allowed to enter the Cemetery, unless a certificate from the District Registrar of Deaths that the death has been registered, or a Coroner's order for burial is handed to the Secretary, at the latest, upon the funeral entering the Cemetery. The Certificate shall be retained, but the Coroner's order shall be returned to the person producing the same.

10. Unless otherwise ordered the principal entrance to the Cemetery shall be opened between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. daily.

11. The hours for burial shall be as follows:—

Week-days, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.,

Sundays, 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.,

and no burial shall be allowed to take place, nor any coffin allowed to enter the Cemetery, at any other hour except by written permission of the Trustees.

12. The time fixed for any burial shall be the time at which the funeral is to arrive at the Cemetery gates, and if not punctually observed, the undertaker responsible shall be liable to a fine of 10s. 6d.

13. Every funeral shall enter the Cemetery by the principal gate, and no vehicle, except the hearse and mourning coaches, shall be permitted to enter the Cemetery or stand opposite the entrance gates. Horses shall not be allowed to proceed faster than at a walking pace within the Cemetery, and shall proceed by such roads as directed by the Trustees or any of their officers. Any driver or other person neglecting to observe such directions may be forthwith expelled from the Cemetery. No bicycle shall be ridden within the Cemetery.

14. Children under the age of 10 years entering the Cemetery must be under the charge of some responsible person.

15. Smoking shall not be allowed within the Cemetery, nor any fireworks discharged therein.

16. No dogs shall be allowed in the Cemetery, and and found there shall be liable to be destroyed.

17. Any person violating the rules of propriety and decorum, or committing any nuisance or trespass, or injuring any tree, shrub, flower, border, grave, or any erection, or in any way infringing these By-laws, shall be expelled from the Cemetery.

18. No person shall promote or advertise, or carry on within the Cemetery any trade, business, or calling by any means whatsoever, without the written consent of the Trustees. Any person infringing this By-law shall be expelled from the Cemetery.

19. No person employed by the Trustees shall be permitted to accept any gratuity whatever, other than the remuneration he receives from the Trustees, and any such person found guilty of accepting such gratuity shall be liable to summary dismissal.

20. Subject to the By-laws, and to the direction of the Trustees, the Secretary and Superintendent shall exercise a general supervision and control over all matters pertaining to the Cemetery, including the conduct of all funerals and interments within the Cemetery. For such service he shall receive from the Trustees a prescribed salary per annum.

21. Any person requiring an "Exclusive Right of Burial" in any part of the Cemetery shall apply to the Trustees, in writing, specifying the location of the grave, and whether it is proposed to erect a brick grave or vault, and in such case submitting plans and specifications of the proposed work. Such application shall also state the name of any deceased person or persons whose remains it is proposed to inter therein.

22. Upon being satisfied of the matters aforesaid, and of the suitability of the said work, plans, and specifications, the Trustees may authorise the construction and erection thereof, or if no work is to be done, may issue a "Grant" in the form Schedule E.

23. Upon completion of the work aforesaid, the Trustees may, if and when such work is done to their complete satisfaction, issue a "Grant" in the form Schedule E.

24. Every such Grant shall be subject to By-laws for the time being, and no interment in any such grave or vault shall be allowed unless upon the production of the Order of Burial aforesaid, nor shall any such grave or vault be opened, unless with the written consent of the Trustees.

25. Every coffin placed in any such brick grave or vault shall be bricked in, cemented, and covered with a slab of stone, slate, or iron, unless special written exemption be obtained from the Trustees.

26. If application be made for an "Order for Burial" in any grave or vault of the remains of any person other than the person to whom the "Grant" was issued or his registered assign, the written and verified consent of such grantee or assignee shall be produced.

27. Any person desiring to place or erect or to alter or add to any monument, tombstone, or enclosure in any part of the Cemetery must first obtain the written consent of the Trustees, and otherwise comply with Section 23 of the principal Act (61 Vict., 23).

28. Every tombstone, monument, or enclosure shall be removed on proper and substantial foundations, which if required by the Trustees or their officers shall extend to the bottom of the grave.

29. The materials used in any such erection shall be subject to the approval of the Trustees, and any material rejected shall be immediately removed from the Cemetery by the contractor for the erection. All refuse or any material remaining after any work is completed shall be immediately removed from the Cemetery by the person causing the same.

30. Should any work by masons or others be not completed before a Sunday they shall be required to leave the work in a neat and safe condition, to the satisfaction of the Superintendent.

31. Masons and other tradesmen shall before commencing any work within the Cemetery, deposit with the Secretary and Superintendent the sum of 10s. which shall be forfeited if either the conditions of the two preceding By-laws be not complied with.

32. All material required in the erection and completion of any work shall, as far as possible, be prepared before being taken to the Cemetery, and all materials required by tradesmen shall be admitted at such entrance as shall be directed, and no vehicle conveying such material with wheels less than 4in. broad shall be permitted to enter the Cemetery.

33. No catacomb shall be allowed.

34. Subject to the approval of the Trustees, each applicant for an "Order for Burial" shall within three months from the date of the application cause to be placed thereon and thereby at least a number plate of the number of the grave.

35. No wooden fence, railing, cross, or other wooden erection shall be allowed on or around any grave or vault.

36. No trees or shrubs shall be planted on any grave except such as shall be approved by the Trustees.

37. All workmen, whether employed by the Trustees or any other person, shall whilst in the Cemetery be under the supervision of the Superintendent and Secretary.

38. Licenses for grave dressing or decorating may be issued by the Trustees. Such licenses to be renewed annually in January.

39. Any person taking part in dressing or attending to any grave shall comply with the following rules:—

- (a) No rubbish or other material removed in dressing a grave shall be placed on any grave, but must be removed from the Cemetery as soon as the work is completed.
- (b) No soil shall be taken from any portion of the Cemetery for dressing a grave except with the permission of the Superintendent.
- (c) The dressing of all graves and the wheeling and carting of any material shall be subject to the supervision of the Superintendent.
- (d) Work in all cases to be carried on with due despatch and during working hours.

40. Prior to conducting any interment within the Cemetery or making use of the Cemetery for purpose connected with interment, every undertaker shall pay to the Trustees an annual fee of £2 2s., and shall at the time of making such payment give his assent in writing to such conditions as the Trustees may deem fit to impose. Upon such assent being given and payment of the fee made, he shall receive a "Permit," to hold good during good behaviour and until the 1st day of January following, and unless in possession of such "Permit" no undertaker shall be allowed to engage in or carry out any duty or work within the Cemetery.

41. Any person committing any breach of these By-laws made under any Act relating to cemeteries shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5, and in case of continuing a further breach, a further sum not exceeding £1 for every day during which such breach continues, and shall be forthwith removed from the Cemetery, be treated as a trespasser, and may be proceeded against accordingly.

42. A plan of the Cemetery showing the distribution of the land, sections, situation and number of graves, and a register of all certificates of "Rights of Burial" shall be kept at the office of the Board.

KOORDA DISTRICT VERMIN BOARD.

Schedule referred to.

1.—Area.

This Agreement shall be limited in its effect to the area comprised within a radius of five miles from the Post Office, Wagin.

2.—Term.

This Agreement shall run concurrently with the existing Award, No. 3 of 1929, operating from date hereof and alter therewith.

3.—Definitions.

In this Agreement, unless the context otherwise indicates—

The term "Shop assistant" includes employees in Country Order Departments, cashiers, and carpet and linoleum layers and planners.

The term "Packer" means a person who packs goods for transport by rail or ship.

The term "Head storeman" means a person performing the duties of a storeman, and who is in charge of two or more men.

The term "Storeman," working singly, shall mean a storeman working where no other storeman is employed in the establishment.

The term "Despatch hand" shall mean an employee who may handle goods or receive goods from departments and passes them over to the packing room, or prepares and hands over packages to carters for delivery, and who shall be responsible for the proper checking off of such packages, and for the proper branding and marking thereof, and keeping the necessary records, such as rail notes and cart notes.

The term "Casual hand" shall mean an employee engaged by the hour, and who may be put off or leave the employer's service at any moment without notice; Provided that a casual hand shall be employed for not less than four hours in any one day.

The term "Weekly hand" shall mean an employee engaged by the week, and whose employment shall be terminable by not less than one week's notice on either side. Such week's notice cannot be continued from week to week: Provided that any worker employed for a period of four consecutive weeks or less shall be classed as a casual hand, and paid not less than the minimum rate of wages herein prescribed for a casual hand, but this proviso shall not apply in cases where a worker employed as a "Weekly hand" has been dispensed with for incompetence or unsuitableness, or any cause referred to in paragraph 11 hereof.

4.—Hours.

The ordinary working hours for shop assistants shall be in conformity with "The Factories and Shops Act, 1920," insofar as the provisions of that Act limit the

number of hours which shop assistants may be employed during any one day or during any week, but the time for commencing work on any day shall be not earlier than 8.10 a.m. and the time for finishing work shall be not later than 5.30 p.m. on every Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, 9 o'clock p.m. on every Friday, and 12 o'clock noon on every Saturday.

5.—Overtime.

(i) For all time worked on Saturday afternoon, and for all time worked on Sundays or holidays, double time shall be paid. For all other overtime the rate shall be time and a half for the first four hours, thereafter double time.

(ii) In the computation of overtime, each day's work shall stand by itself.

(iii) When Christmas Day falls on any week day other than Monday, and the preceding day is worked as the late night for that week, then for the purpose of computing the overtime of casual hands (but for no other purpose) 6 o'clock shall be regarded as the usual finishing time.

6.—Holidays.

(a) The following days shall be observed as holidays and paid for, namely: New Year's Day, Anniversary Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Foundation Day, Labour Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

(b) A holiday of one week on full pay shall be granted to each employee on completion of each year of service. An employee not completing one year of service shall be granted pay in lieu of holidays in the proportion to the length of his or her service: Provided that, when an employee is entitled to holidays under this clause, he shall receive at least two weeks' notice from the employer of the date when it will be convenient to the employer that such employee shall take his holidays: Provided further, that this clause shall not apply in the case of any employee summarily dismissed for misconduct or dereliction of duty.

7.—Wages.

Adults: The Minimum weekly rate of wage payable to any male worker employed as a shop assistant who is of the age of twenty-one years or upwards, or to any female worker employed as a shop assistant and who is of the age of twenty-one years or upwards, shall be as follows:—

8. Nothing herein contained shall entitle the employer to reduce the wage of any worker who at the date of this Agreement was being paid a higher rate of wage than the minimum prescribed for his or her class of work.

9.—Higher Duties.

A worker who is required to do work which is entitled to a higher rate under this Agreement than that which he or she actually performs, shall be entitled to payment at the higher rate whilst so employed.

10.—Proportion of Juniors.

(a) The number of junior male assistants shall not exceed the proportion of one to one for the five first male seniors, and thereafter one junior to every two male seniors or fraction thereof.

(b) Where no female assistant is employed, one junior female assistant may be employed.

Where one senior assistant is employed two junior female assistants may be employed.

Where two senior female assistants are employed three junior female assistants may be employed.

Where three senior female assistants are employed four junior females may be employed.

Where four senior female assistants are employed five junior female assistants may be employed.

And thereafter the proportion shall not exceed five junior female assistants to four senior female assistants.

(c) In this clause the word "senior" shall mean a person of twenty-one years or over.

11.—Engagement.

One week's notice on either side shall be necessary to terminate the engagement: Provided that, an employer may at any time dismiss an employee for refusal or neglect to obey orders or for misconduct, or, if, after receiving one week's notice, such employee does not carry out his (or her) duties as he (or she) did prior to such notice.

12.—Time and Wages Book.

The employer shall keep and enter up, or cause to be kept and entered up, a book containing the names of each of his workers to whom this Agreement applies, the class of work performed by, and the wages paid to each such worker, and the time during which he or she had been employed. 13.—Under-rate Workers.

Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum adult wage prescribed by this Agreement may be employed at such lesser wage (if any) as may be agreed upon in writing between the worker and the Secretary of the applicant Union. If within twenty-four hours after the worker has notified the Secretary of his or her desire to work at a lesser rate than the said minimum, the Secretary and the worker do not agree as aforesaid, then the worker may apply to the most convenient Resident or Police Magistrate for a permit to work at such lesser wage. The worker shall give to the said Secretary at least twenty-four hours' notice in writing of his or her intention to make such application to the Magistrate, and the Secretary or his agent shall be entitled to attend before such Magistrate, and pending his decision in either case the worker shall be entitled to work and be employed by an employer at the proposed lesser rate. The Magistrate may grant to such worker a permit to work at such wage, and for such period not exceeding six calendar months, as he thinks fit, and his decision in the matter shall be final. 2.—Term.

This Agreement shall operate as from the day of the date hereof, and shall continue in force for a period of three years, subject to the right of either party to apply to the Court of Arbitration at any time after the expiration of twelve months from such date, and at the end of any succeeding twelve months from the date of any such application, to amend this Agreement.

3.—Definitions.

In this Agreement, unless the context otherwise indicates—

The term "Shop assistant" includes employees in Country Order Departments, cashiers, and carpet and linoleum layers and planners.

The term "Casual hand" shall mean an employee engaged by the hour and who may be put off or leave the employer's service at any moment without notice: Provided, a casual hand shall be employed for not less than four hours in any one day.

The term "Weekly hand" shall mean an employee engaged by the week and whose employment shall be terminable by not less than one week's notice on either side; such week's notice cannot be continued from week to week: Provided that, any worker employed for a period of four consecutive weeks or less, shall be classed as a casual hand and paid not less than the minimum rate of wages herein prescribed for a casual hand, but this proviso shall not apply in cases where a worker employed as a "Weekly hand" has been dispensed with for incompetence or unsuitableness, or any cause referred to in paragraph 12 hereof.

4.—Hours.

Excepting as mentioned in Subclauses (a) and (b) hereof, forty-seven hours shall constitute a week's work for males, and forty-four hours for females and males under 16 years of age, and shall be worked between 8 a.m. and 5.30 p.m. on every Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, and between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. on Fridays, and 8 a.m. and 12 noon on Saturdays. Not more than one hour shall be deducted for meals. The exceptions referred to are:—

(a) Messengers, cleaners, and employees in shops comprised in the Fourth Schedule of "The Factories and Shops Act, 1920" (excepting restaurants, coffee palaces, boarding-houses, and hotels), whose hours of work shall not exceed 47 per week for males, and forty-four per week for females and males under 16 years of age, and shall be worked to suit the convenience of the employer;

(b) On the day mutually agreed upon by the parties to be observed as Christmas Eve, for the purpose of a late shopping night, the ordinary hours of work may be extended and ordinary rates of wages shall be paid for such extended time.

5.—Overtime.

(1) In the computation of overtime each day shall stand alone, excepting in the case of workers mentioned

in Clause 4, Subsection (a), whose overtime shall commence, in the case of males, after forty-seven hours have been worked in any one week, and in the case of females and junior males under 16 years of age, after forty-four hours have been worked in any one week.

(2) Overtime shall be at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and thereafter at the rate of double time.

(3) Excepting as provided in Clause 4 (b) all work done on Saturday afternoons, Sundays, and holidays set out in Clause 6 (a) shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

6.—Holidays.

(a) The following days shall be observed as holidays and paid for, namely: New Year's Day, Anniversary Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

(b) A holiday of one week on full pay shall be granted to each employee on completion of each year of service. An employee not completing one year of service shall be granted pay in lieu of holidays in proportion of the length of his or her service. Provided that, when an employee is entitled to holidays under this clause, he shall receive at least two weeks' notice from his employer of the date when it will be convenient to the employer, and such employee should take his holidays. 7.—Wages.

Where one senior female assistant is employed two junior female assistants may be employed.

Where two senior female assistants are employed three junior female assistants may be employed.

Where four female assistants are employed five junior female assistants may be employed.

And thereafter the proportion shall not exceed five junior female assistants to four senior female assistants.

(c) In this clause the word "senior" shall mean a person of twenty-one years of age or over.

12.—Engagement.

One week's notice on either side shall be necessary to terminate the engagement: Provided that, an employer at any time may dismiss an employee for refusal or neglect to obey orders, or for misconduct, or if, after receiving one week's notice, such employee does not carry out his or her duties in the same manner as he or she did prior to such notice.

13.—Time and Wages Book.

The employer shall keep and enter up, or cause to be kept and entered up, a book containing the names of each of his workers to whom this Agreement applies, the class of work performed by and the wages paid to each such worker, and the time during which he or she has been employed. Such book shall be open to inspection by a representative of the Union at least one day in each week between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

14.—Under-rate Workers.

Any worker who, by reason of old age or infirmity, is unable to earn the minimum adult wage prescribed by this Agreement may be employed at such lesser wage (if any) as may be agreed upon in writing between the worker and the Secretary of the applicant Union. If within twenty-four hours after the worker has notified the Secretary of his or her desire to work at a lesser wage than the said minimum the Secretary and the worker do not agree as aforesaid, then the worker may apply to the most convenient Resident or Police Magistrate for a permit to work at such lesser wage. The worker shall give to the said Secretary at least twenty-four hours' notice in writing of his or her intention to make such application to the Magistrate, and the Secretary or his agent shall be entitled to attend before the Magistrate and, pending the decision thereon in either case, the worker shall be entitled to work and be employed by an employer at the proposed lesser rate. The Magistrate may grant such worker a permit to work for such wage and for such period not exceeding six calendar months, as he thinks fit, and his decision in the matter shall be final. The permit shall entitle the worker to work at the wage therein mentioned, and for the period therein stated, until the wage shall have again been settled by the Magistrate on the application of the said Secretary.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 259 of 1929.

In the matter of "The Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1925," and in the matter of an application by the Shop Assistants' and Warehouse Employees' Industrial Union of Workers, W.A., Katanning Branch (hereinafter referred to as "the Union"), under Section 90 of the said Act for variation of an Industrial Agreement declared a Common Rule.

UPON hearing the application of Mr. R. Bourke on behalf of the Union and Mr. L. L. Carter on behalf of Richardson & Company, Limited, and others, made in pursuance of the powers contained in Section 90 of "The Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1925," the Court doth hereby order that Industrial Agreement dated the Ninth day of January, 1925, and registered No. 1 of 1925, which was declared to be a Common Rule on the 28th day of April, 1925, be and the same is hereby varied in the terms of the annexed schedule.

This order is made at the request and by consent of the parties, and is without prejudice to the right of the Court at any time on the application of any party bound hereby to review the jurisdiction and authority of the Court to make such order.

Schedule referred to.

1.—Area.

This Agreement shall be limited in its effect to the area comprised within a radius of two miles from the Post Office, Katanning.

2.—Term.

The term of this Agreement shall be three years from the 1st April, 1929.

3.—Definitions.

In this Agreement, unless the context otherwise indicates, the term "Shop assistant" includes employees in Country Order Department, cashiers, carpet and linoleum layers and planners.

4.—Hours.

The ordinary working hours for shop assistants shall be in conformity with "The Factories and Shops Act, 1920," insofar as the provisions of that Act limit the number of hours which shop assistants may be employed, i.e., adult males 48 hours per week; all females and junior males under 16 years, 44 hours per week.

5.—Overtime.

For all time worked after the usual finishing time on the weekly half-holiday, and for all time worked on Sundays and holidays, double time shall be paid. For all time worked before the usual starting time and after the usual finishing time, the rate shall be time and a half throughout.

6.—Holidays.

The following shall be observed as holidays and paid for during the currency of this Agreement:—New Year's Day, Anniversary Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Foundation Day, Anzac Day, Christmas Day, Boxing Day. A holiday of one week on full pay shall be granted to each employee on completion of twelve months' service. An employee not completing one year of service shall be granted pay in lieu of holidays in proportion to the length of his or her service. When an employee is entitled to holidays under this clause, he shall receive at least two weeks' notice from his employer of the date when it will be convenient to the employer that such employee shall take his holidays. Provided that, this clause shall not apply in the case of any employee summarily dismissed for misconduct and dereliction of duty.

7.—Wages.

(a) Adults: The minimum weekly rate of wage payable to any male worker employed as a shop assistant who has had four years' experience at the trade, or who is of the age of twenty-three years or upwards, or to any female worker employed as a shop assistant and who is of the age of twenty-one or upwards, shall be as follows:—

8. Nothing herein contained shall entitle the employer to reduce the wage of any worker who at the date of this Agreement was being paid a higher rate of wage than the minimum prescribed for his or her class of work.

9.—Higher Duties.

A worker who is required to do work which is entitled to a higher rate under this Agreement than that which he or she actually performs, shall be entitled to payment at the higher rate whilst so employed.

10.—Proportion of Juniors.

(a) The number of junior male assistants shall not exceed the proportion of one to one for the first five male seniors, and thereafter one junior to every two male seniors or fraction thereof.

(b) Where no female assistant is employed one junior female assistant may be employed.

Where one senior female assistant is employed two junior female assistants may be employed.

Where two senior female assistants are employed three junior female assistants may be employed.

Where three senior female assistants are employed four junior female assistants may be employed.

And thereafter the proportion shall not exceed five junior female assistants to four senior female assistants.

(c) In this clause the word "senior" shall mean a person of twenty-one years of age or over.

11.—Engagement.

One week's notice on either side shall be necessary to terminate the engagement: Provided that, an employer may at any time dismiss an employee for refusal or neglect to obey orders, or for misconduct, or if after receiving one week's notice, he does not carry out his duty as he did prior to such notice.

12.—Time and Wages Book.

The employer shall keep and enter up, or cause to be kept and entered up, a book containing the names of each of his workers to whom this Agreement applies, the class of work performed by and the wages paid to each such worker, and the time during which he or she has been employed. Such book shall be open to inspection by a representative of the Union at least one day in each week between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

13.—Under-rate Workers.

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of "The Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1925," this First day of November, 1929, between Alfred E. Tilley and Co., of the one part, and The Seamen's Union of Western Australia Industrial Union of Workers, Fremantle, of the other part. Witnesseth as follows:—

Definitions.

IN this Agreement "Union" means "The Seamen's Union of Western Australia Industrial Union of Workers, Fremantle," "Employer" means "Alfred E. Tilley and Co."

Area.

The following wages and conditions shall apply to members of the crew of the excursion steamer "Emerald," at the Port of Perth, in the State of Western Australia.

The complement shall consist of a minimum of one fireman-greaser, one deck hand and one youth, and two youths when proceeding outside Fremantle Harbour, subject to provisions of Clause 4 (c).

2.—Engagement and Dismissal.

All employment (except that of casual employees) shall be by the week. A week's notice on either side shall be given to terminate the employment, or the employer shall pay one week's wages in lieu of such notice, subject to the right of the employer to dispense with the services of the employee for misconduct or negligence, or if unsatisfactory in the opinion of the employer, without notice at any time.

3.—Payment of Wages.

(a) All wages other than money for overtime shall be paid weekly.

(b) Money for overtime shall be payable on the pay day of the week following that on which it is earned.

4.—Hours of Labour.

(a) The number of working hours shall not exceed forty-eight (48) in any one week.

(b) Time shall be counted when the men are actually working or when the vessel is under way. If an employee absents himself from duty without reasonable cause, a sum proportionate to his time of absence may be deducted from his pay, that is to say, one-sixth of the weekly pay for each day of absence and a proportionate part of one-sixth for a shorter absence. This provision is without prejudice to the employer's right of dismissal in such case.

(c) The men to be worked at the Master's discretion, the full deck and engine room complements only necessarily to be employed when vessel proceeding on trips to Rottnest or elsewhere outside of Inner Harbour.

(d) In computing the week's work a "call out" shall be counted as four (4) hours, except in the case of work alongside the wharf, which shall count as two (2) hours.

5.—Time off Duty.

In lieu of Sundays and holidays the members of the crew to be allowed off duty for five intervals of twenty-four consecutive hours in each calendar month, or else be paid for each interval not given a full day's wages.

6.—Weekly Time off.

Each member of the crew shall be entitled to be absent from the vessel for four (4) consecutive hours each week he has been employed. This time to be given either for the first half of the working day of from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., or for the latter half, and if not given within one month shall be paid for at overtime rates. The time may be allowed to accumulate and be given in whole days or part days, but not beyond the expiration of one month.

Provided that, if the employee prevents the accumulated leave being given by determining the employment, the employer need only pay the half days not allowed at ordinary time rates.

7.—Overtime.

All time worked in excess of forty-eight (48) hours in any week shall be deemed overtime and paid for at the following rates:—

8.—Meals.

(a) The meal times allowed shall be, at the employer's option.—Breakfast, any hour between 7 a.m. and 9 a.m.; dinner, any hour between 12 noon and 2 p.m.; tea, any hour between 5 p.m. and 7 p.m.

(b) Where the exigencies of the trade render it necessary in the opinion of the master or officer in charge of the vessel, a member of the crew may be called upon to curtail his dinner or tea hour, or a portion of it, subject to the following provisions:—if the time curtailed exceeds half an hour, payment shall be made as for one hour at overtime rate and a quarter, but where the time is half an hour or less payment shall be made for half an hour.

9.—Sickness and Accident.

Accident.—The employee benefits, as provided for by the Workers' Compensation Act (W.A.) and amendments thereto.

Sick Pay.—In the case of sickness necessitating absence from work, an employee will be granted full pay up to the first following pay day, and thereafter half pay, on the production of a medical certificate on each occasion; such sick pay shall not be granted for more than twelve days in the aggregate in each year.

10.—Annual Leave.

Employees serving the employer for the period of the excursion season (from November to April, or as the case may be) will be granted in lieu of leave of absence one full day's pay for each month served.

11.—No Discrimination.

The employer shall not discriminate without just cause against any members of the Union who bear good conduct records and who agree to and continue to work on the terms of the Agreement and as there are vacancies for, and that the local Manager of the Company will consider any representations made to him by the Secretary of the Union.

12.—Disputes.

There shall be no stoppage of work for any cause or reason whatsoever. Should any dispute arise between any employee and the employer, the matter shall be referred to a Board consisting of a representative of the employer, a representative of the Union, and a chairman to be mutually agreed upon by those representatives; failing their agreement, the Registrar of the Industrial Arbitration Court of Western Australia, or his deputy shall act as chairman. The decision of the Board shall be final and binding on both parties.

13.—Casual Employees.

A casual employee is one for whom work for a period of twelve consecutive working days, not including holidays, is not provided by the employer, and such employee shall be entitled to the following wages:—

ENGINE-DRIVERS (SWAN PORTLAND CEMENT, LTD.).

(Registered 1st November, 1929.)

No. 23 of 1929.

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of "The Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1925," this First day of November, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine, between the Swan Portland Cement, Limited, for the State of Western Australia, of the one part, and the Federated Engine-drivers and Firemen's Association, West Australian Branch, of the other part, whereby it is mutually agreed as follows:—

1.—Area.

This Agreement shall operate at the Company's works, situated at Rivervale, in the State of Western Australia.

2.—Scope.

The Agreement shall apply to all workers covered in the schedule of rates and engaged by the abovenamed Company.

3.—Term.

This Agreement shall take effect from the first day of November, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine, and shall continue in force for a period of three years. Provided that, at any time after the expiration of twelve months from its date, either party may make application to the other party to amend or vary this Agreement; provided that thirty days' notice is given in writing by one to the other parties to the Agreement.

4.—Schedule of Rates.

(Basic wage—£4 7s. 0d. per week.)

The minimum rate of pay shall be, per week of forty-four hours, as follows:—

5.—Hours of Work.

(a) Employees working three shifts shall work eight hours per day for the first five days of the week, including crib time, and four hours on Saturday.

(b) Day shift workers shall work eight hours per day, exclusive of crib time, on the first five days of the week and four hours on Saturday.

(c) In all cases in reckoning the time of duty any time necessarily occupied in raising steam, in banking

fires, and attending to boilers or engines during meal hour shall be included.

(d) Drivers shall fire the boilers and maintain steam on both the shore and floating cranes.

6.—Crib Time.

Crib time for shift workers shall be taken in relays at such time as not to cause a stoppage of work, and no deduction shall be made therefor from the employee's wages.

7.—Overtime.

(a) Overtime done by day workers shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter. Overtime done by shift workers shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

(b) Time and a half shall mean one half day's wages in addition to the prescribed minimum rate, or pro rata if there is more or less than a day.

(c) Double time shall mean one day's wages in addition to the prescribed minimum rate, or pro rata if there is more or less than a day.

8.—Sunday Work.

All work done on Sundays shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

9.—Holidays.

(a) All work done by any employee on Good Friday, Labour Day (the first Monday in May, or other day appointed to be kept in place of that holiday), and Christmas Day shall be deemed overtime work, and shall be paid for at the rate of double time. All work done by any employees on the following holidays, viz.:—New Year's Day, 26th January, Easter Monday, the birthday of the Sovereign, and Boxing Day, or any day appointed to be kept in place of any said holiday shall be deemed overtime work, and shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

(b) All employees who have been employed continuously for a period of twelve months shall be entitled to one week's holiday on full pay, or a monetary pro rata equivalent. Such holiday, if reasonably practicable, to be taken out at Xmas in each year. These holidays must be taken out when they become due. If they have been engaged for a less period, they shall be entitled to a day's holiday on full pay or a monetary pro rata equivalent for each month they have worked in addition to the holidays provided in sub-clause (a) hereof.

10.—Meal Hours.

Work done in the meal hour, or any portion thereof, shall be paid for at the rate of double time. This clause shall not apply to shift workers.

11.—Men Recalled to Work.

When an employee is called out after he has completed his shift and actually left the job, he shall be paid for a minimum of four hours' work at the rate of time and a half, and at the rate of double time for the time worked after four hours.

12.—Payment of Wages.

Wages shall be paid for weekly unless otherwise mutually agreed.

13.—Mixed Functions.

All employees who may be called upon to temporarily work at a higher grade shall be paid the rates awarded for such work whilst so engaged, or, if he is so engaged for less than four hours, they shall be paid these rates for the full four hours.

14.—Notice to Cease Work.

In the event of a breakdown of machinery, or an industrial dispute, the Company shall only be called upon to give employees one day's notice to cease work. In other instances the ordinary week's notice shall apply.

In the matter of an Award made the 13th day of October, 1922, No. 15 of 1921, between the South-West District Clothing Trades Industrial Union of Workers (now known as The Western Australian Clothing and Allied Trades Industrial Union of Workers) and A. Broom, MacPherson & Co., Edwards & Co., M. Haines, I. Harrison, and P. Miller, and in the matter of an application by the above-named Union to amend the said Award in pursuance of the powers contained in Section 90 of "The Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1925."

UPON hearing Mr. L. Pitcher on behalf of the Western Australian Clothing and Allied Trades' Industrial Union of Workers and Mr. L. L. Carter on behalf of A. Broom and others, and by consent, the Court doth hereby order that Award made the 13th day of October, 1922, No. 15 of 1921, be and the same is hereby amended in the terms of the annexed Schedule.

Schedule referred to.

1.—Scope of Award.

This Award shall apply to employers and workers engaged in the Tailoring Industry in order work, amongst other items, the following work:—(a) bespoke work; (b) garments cut to individual measure; (c) garments that are fitted on; (d) garments cut to chart measure: Provided that, in the case of all uniforms tendered for by contract, where there are not less than twenty-five garments of one particular kind and description, notwithstanding they be cut to single measure, they may be made according to ready-made clothing rates and conditions, as expressed in Agreement No. 45 of 1926 as varied by Order No. 376/1928 (plain jackets to rank at sacs and plain tunics to rank as pagets), but must be given to each individual worker in quantities of not less than three garments of one particular kind and description at a time.

2.—Hours.

Forty-four hours shall constitute a week's work. Such hours shall be worked on five days of the week, between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m., and between 8 a.m. and 1 p.m. on the day usually and customarily observed by each individual employer as the half-holiday in his establishment.

3.—Mid-day Meal.

Not less than three-quarters of an hour shall be allowed to each worker for the mid-day meal.

4.—Overtime.

Within the hours fixed and worked at the employer's request:—

(a) Any worker (piece or weekly) who, within the hours fixed for beginning and ending work is employed in excess of the hours fixed for any one day, shall be paid for such excess time as follows:—

(i) Weekly hands—time and a half.

(ii) Piece-workers:—Males: 11d. per hour on time worked in addition to ordinary piece rates; Females: 7½d. per hour on time worked in addition to ordinary piece rates.

(iii) The foregoing rates, increased as under, shall be payable to piece-workers only:—

Males:—By 5.45 per cent. on rates up to and including £4 2s. 6d. per week; over £4 2s. 6d. per week add 4s. 6d. only; to the sum so obtained is then added 2.97 per cent.

Females:—By 5.45 per cent. on rates up to and including £2 4s. 7d. per week; over £2 4s. 7d. per week add 2s. 5d. only; to the sum so obtained is then added 2.50 per cent.

(b) No junior under the age of sixteen years shall be worked overtime.

5.—Overtime.

Outside the hours fixed and worked at the employer's request:—

(a) Any time worked outside the ordinary working hours shall be paid for as follows, with the addition of 1s. to provide a meal:—

(1) Weekly hands—time and a half.

(2) Piece-Workers—Males, 11d. per hour on time worked in addition to ordinary piece rates; females, 7½d. per hour on time worked in addition to ordinary piece rates.

- (3) The foregoing rates, increased as under, shall be payable to piece-workers only:—
- Males:—By 5.45 per cent. on rates up to and including £4 2s. 6d. per week, over £4 2s. 6d. add 4s. 6d. only, to the sum so obtained is then added 2.97 per cent.
- Females:—By 5.45 per cent. on rates up to and including £2 4s. 7d. per week, over £2 4s. 7d. per week add 2s. 5d. only; to the sum so obtained is then added 2.50 per cent.
- (b) No junior under the age of sixteen years shall be worked overtime, but a junior over sixteen years of age may be worked overtime with his or her consent.
- (c) No work shall be performed during the ordinary meal time.
- (d) When females or juniors are employed for a period of more than four hours continuously they shall be allowed an interval of ten minutes for refreshments, during such period, without deduction from the weekly wage, and such interval shall be computed as part of the working time.

6.—Holidays.

(a) Cutters, foremen, and forewomen will receive one week's annual leave on full pay, and, in addition, the following public holidays will be granted on full pay:—New Year's Day, Anniversary Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Foundation Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

For the purpose of this Award it is agreed that the terms "foremen" and "forewomen" shall mean the worker (one only) in charge of the employer's workroom.

(b) Other workers:—Excepting as provided in the last paragraph of this subclause, the following holidays shall be observed and paid for as they occur: New Year's Day, Anniversary Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Foundation Day, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, and three days between the twenty-sixth and thirty-first of December inclusive. Provided that, if it be considered inconvenient by the employer to grant such three days between the dates recited, he shall so notify the Union in writing on or before December the eleventh, and the employer and the Union shall thereupon mutually agree upon the dates that such three days shall be taken. Provided further, that the dates agreed upon shall be such as to enable the worker to take the three days due by the last day of February following. Provided that, where in the case of workers mentioned in both (a) and (b) hereof an employee's employment is terminated during the course of a calendar year, his employer shall pay to him one day's wages for each calendar month of his services in lieu of the holidays to which he would be entitled under this clause and has not received. When only part of a calendar month has been worked the worker shall be paid the equivalent proportion of a day's holiday pay.

In the event of an employee being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer, and if such holidays are not equal to the holidays given to the other employees, he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other employees of such employer are on holidays on full pay. Where any specified holiday falls on Sunday, the following Monday shall be observed in lieu thereof.

7.—Payment for Work on Sundays or Holidays worked at the Employer's request.

(a) Any worker who is employed on a Sunday or any holiday provided for herein shall be paid at the rate of ordinary time in addition to his weekly rate.

(b) Piece-workers employed on Sunday or holidays shall be paid at log rates, and, in addition, at the rate provided for weekly workers for the time worked.

8.—Distribution of Work.

Employers shall, in slack times, observe turns for weekly and piece-workers (including outdoor workers) for coat, sac, trousers, and vest hands in the respective classes of garments. Provided that journeymen and journeywomen having juniors shall be allowed on their turn extra work equivalent to the wages of the juniors during the time the turn system is in operation. The employer shall keep in the workroom a true record of every turn, which shall be open to inspection of the workers.

9.—Regulation of Outwork.

All work shall be done in the workshop provided and controlled by the employer, except where a permit shall be given by the Chief Inspector of Factories, which permit shall only be given after due notice of the application therefor shall be served on the Union. Such notice shall be given by registered letter and only in the following cases:—

- (a) Where a person to whom it is proposed to give such work is unable to work on the employer's premises by reason of infirmity, old age, or domestic ties;
- (b) Lack of accommodation on the employer's premises: Provided that in such cases the employer shall not have more than one such outdoor worker to every ten indoor workers or fraction thereof;
- (c) Persons doing outdoor work shall not employ labour, except that of members of their own family resident with them;
- (d) Persons doing outdoor work shall not work for more than one employer, except by the consent of the Chief Inspector of Factories;
- (e) Such outdoor work shall be paid for at the piece-work rates provided for by this Award;
- (f) Outdoor workers shall be provided free of charge with cotton, silk, thread, and all other sewings and trimmings used in manufacturing garments.

10.—Wages.

(a) Basic wage—Males, £4 7s. 0d. per week; females, £2 7s. 0d. per week.

(b) The minimum rate of wage payable under this Award to workers shall be ascertained according to the following schedule:—

11.—Junior Workers.

(a) In this Award "a junior worker" means a worker over the age of fifteen years and under the age of twenty-one years.

(b) For the purpose of this Award all workers in the industry shall be classified as belonging to one of the following classes:—(1) Journeymen; (2) journeywomen; (3) junior workers.

(c) Junior workers may not be employed by any employer in excess of two junior workers for every one fully paid coat maker, and one junior worker to each fully paid vest maker, and one junior worker to each fully paid trouser maker employed by such employer.

For the purpose of this subclause the number of fully paid workers employed by any employer shall be ascertained as provided for in Subclause (c).

(d) No junior worker under the age of sixteen years shall be taken to the pressing branch.

(e) For the purpose of ascertaining the number of junior workers allowed to be taken at any time, the number of fully paid workers employed shall be deemed to be the average number of fully paid workers employed for at least two-thirds on full time on all working days of the twelve months immediately preceding such time. Where an employer is himself actually working as a journeyman or journeywoman, he or she shall be allowed to count as a journeyman or journeywoman, as the case may be, for the purpose of calculating the average number of journeymen and journeywomen under this subclause.

(f) The terms for junior workers shall be as follows:—(1) to coatmaking, five years; (2) to vestmaking, three years; (3) to trousermaking, three years; (4) to skirtmaking, three years; (5) to pressing, four years; (6) to coat, trouser, and vest machining, four years; (7) to fitting up and trimming, four years.

(g) An employer shall be deemed to undertake the duty which he agrees to perform as a duty enforceable under this Award, and shall pay the junior workers the rate of wage herein provided.

(h) The provision of this Award limiting the number of junior workers who may be employed shall not operate or be so construed as to require the discharge of any person employed in the trade on the 12th April, 1929, or to prevent employment or engagement as a junior worker of any person, who, at the said 12th April, 1929, or at any time within three months prior thereto was employed in the trade.

(i) The minimum wage payable to junior workers shall be:—

12.—Under-rate workers.

Any worker who is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the employer, and in default of such agreement within twenty-four hours after such worker shall have applied in writing to the Secretary of the Union stating his desire that such wage should be agreed upon, such wage as shall be fixed by the most convenient Resident or Police Magistrate, upon the application of such worker, after twenty-four hours' notice in writing shall have been given by him to the said Secretary, who shall, if he so desires, be heard by the Magistrate upon such application. After having given notice to the Secretary, and after lodging the application mentioned, and pending the Magistrate's decision thereon, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed at the proposed lesser rate. The determination of the Magistrate shall have effect for the period of six calendar months from the date thereof, and after the expiration of the said period until the wage shall have been again fixed at the instance of the said Secretary in the manner prescribed. The Secretary of the Union may by writing under his hand appoint an agent or substitute to represent the Union at the hearing of the application before the Magistrate.

13.—Visiting Workshops.

Any person duly authorised by the Chief Inspector of Factories in writing (such authorisation shall be terminable at the will of the Chief Inspector of Factories) shall have power to inspect any part of a factory, workshop, or place where it is believed that a breach of this Award is occurring or has occurred. At least six hours' notice shall be given by such authorised person prior to his actual going on the premises, and the employer shall be notified of his arrival, and shall in person, or by his nominee, be entitled to accompany the authorised person in such inspection, and shall provide access to the wages book or time sheet of any worker bound by the Award. The necessary proof that the worker is so bound shall be supplied by the authorised person. The work and duties of the workers shall be interfered with as little as possible by the authorised person.

14.—Record Book.

Employers shall provide in each factory, workshop, or place where work is carried on for him, a time book. Such time book shall contain a correct account of the hours worked and wages received by every worker (including outdoor workers) bound by this Award, and in the case of outdoor workers doing piece-work, an itemised record of the work done by such workers. Such book shall be kept correctly entered up in ink, and shall be signed each week by the worker so bound, verifying the accuracy of the hours worked and the amount of wages received, and in the case of outdoor workers doing piece-work, the itemised details of the work done. The said book shall be open to the inspection of a duly authorised officer of the Union during working hours.

15.—Piecework.

The minimum rates to be paid for piece-work shall be calculated in accordance with the piece-work log annexed to Agreement No. 14 of 1926 and amendments thereto, as filed at the Court of Arbitration and applying to the Metropolitan Area.

16.—Board of Reference.

(a) For the purposes of this Award there shall be a Board of Reference consisting of two representatives of the employers and two representatives of the Union, and a chairman to be mutually agreed upon by such representatives, or in default of such agreement, to be nominated by the Court of Arbitration.

(b) Either party may at any time vary its representatives and fill any vacancies.

(c) If any dispute or question shall arise in the carrying out of this Award between the Union and the employers, or any of them, it may be referred by either party concerned to the Board for determination. Should either party be dissatisfied with any such determination, such party shall have the right of Appeal to the Court of Arbitration against such determination.

Either party may refer any matter arising out of the application of this Award to the Court of Arbitration.

Nothing herein contained shall empower the Board to vary or amend the rates of wages or any other term or condition set out in this Award.

(d) On any matter being referred to the Board as aforesaid, or at the request of any two members of the Board, the Chairman shall convene a meeting of the Board, to be held at such place and time as he shall appoint: Provided, that such meeting shall be held in any case not later than fourteen days from the date of such reference or request.

(e) The Chairman shall determine whether any question or dispute properly comes within the province and function of the Board.

(f) Any costs or charges attending sittings of the Board may be awarded by the Chairman against the unsuccessful party.

17.—Higher Duties.

Where any worker is engaged in any one week for more than half of such week at work in a higher class than he or she is employed to perform, he or she shall be paid for the full week at the highest rate payable for such work under this Award, but if he or she is engaged for less than half of any such week, he or she shall only be paid at the rate fixed by this Award for the work he or she actually performs.

18.—Payment of Wages.

Wages shall be paid once weekly during ordinary working hours not later than the day following the termination of the week.

19.—Waiting Time for Piece-workers.

(a) Coatmakers: The rule as to waiting for work shall be as follows:—At the first try-on when the worker has picked the coat to pieces and given to the cutter to mark up and recut, should the operative be detained for more than twenty-minutes before the cutter returns the same, the operative shall be paid for any time over the said twenty minutes as follows:—Males at the rate of 1s. 6d. per hour; females at the rate of 1s. per hour.

The foregoing rates, increased as under, shall be payable to piece-workers only:—

Males:—By 5.45 per cent. up to and including £1 2s. 6d. per week; over £4 2s. 6d. per week add 4s. 6d. only; to the sum so obtained is then added 2.97 per cent.

Females:—By 5.45 per cent. up to and including £2 4s. 7d. per week; over £2 4s. 7d. per week add 2s. 5d. only; to the sum so obtained is then added 2.50 per cent.

(b) All other piece-workers who are authorised or requested to wait for work on any one day for more than half an hour in the factory or workshop shall be paid for such waiting time at the rates as follows:—Males at the rate of 1s. per hour; females at the rate of 9d. per hour.

The foregoing rates, increased as under, shall be payable to piece-workers only:—

Males:—By 5.45 per cent. on rates up to and including £4 2s. 6d. per week; over £4 2s. 6d. per week add 4s. 6d. only; to the sum so obtained is then added 2.97 per cent.

Females:—By 5.45 per cent. on rates up to and including £2 4s. 7d. per week; over £2 4s. 7d. per week add 2s. 5d. only; to the sum so obtained is then added 2.50 per cent.

The above rates shall be payable, provided that the workers have not another job in hand.

20.—Collecting Logs.

Where piece-work is in operation the employer shall make arrangements for collecting the logs and the workers need not leave their places.

21.—Terminating Employment.

In order to terminate employment, two days' notice shall be given on any day, with payment to date of termination, or in lieu thereof, two days' pay shall be paid or deducted.

22.—Workers absenting Themselves.

No worker shall, without just cause, be absent from his or her place of employment during the prescribed hours whilst there is work ready to be done by such worker, and where the wages are fixed at per week the worker to be entitled to the same so fixed must be available and ready and willing to do the work on the days and during the hours fixed by this Award.

23.—Posting of Award.

A copy of this Award shall be available in a prominent place in the workroom in such area.

24.—Area.

This Award shall apply over the area comprised within a radius of 15 miles from the Post Office, Northam.

25.—Term.

This Award shall take effect as and from July 1st, 1929, and shall continue in force for a period of three years from the date hereof: Provided that at any time after the expiration of twelve months from such date, the Court may alter or amend the same on the application of any party or person affected by its provisions.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 1 of 1928.

Between The Coastal Master Butchers' Industrial Union of Employers, Applicant, and The West Australian Branch of the Australasian Meat Industry Employees' Union Industrial Union of Workers, Perth, Respondent.

THE Court of Arbitration of Western Australia doth hereby make the following Award in connection with the Industrial Dispute between the above-named parties:

Award.

1.—Area.

This Award shall operate over an area comprised within a radius of thirty miles from the General Post Office in the City of Perth.

2.—Term.

This Award shall operate for a period of three years from its date. Provided that, at any time after the expiration of twelve months from its date, application may be made to the Court for alteration, revision, or amendment by any party or person affected by its provisions relating to hours or wages.

3.—Copy of Award.

A copy of this Award, under glass, shall be posted by each employer in each shop, store, factory or abattoir, in some position accessible to all workers.

Shop Section.

This section of the Award deals with Retail Butchers' Shops and the manufacture of smallgoods, and includes shops selling or handling fresh, chilled, or frozen meat in less quantities than a quarter of beef or a carcass of mutton, lamb, veal or pork.

4.—Hours.

(a) Forty-eight hours shall constitute a week's work. No working day shall consist of more than eight and a quarter hours, and the working hours each day shall be consecutive, with the exception that one hour shall be allowed off for breakfast in each of the six days when work starts before seven, and one hour for dinner on the days Monday to Friday.

(b) The starting and ceasing time shall be mutually arranged between the employer and the worker. In the absence of agreement, the Registrar shall decide.

(c) Subject to Clause 5 all work shall be performed within the limits of 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday to Friday, and 5 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturday, and no worker shall be on or shall be allowed on the premises before 6 a.m. Monday to Friday, or 5 a.m. on Saturday, nor after 6.5 p.m. Monday to Friday, or 1.15 p.m. on Saturday.

(d) The hours of workers employed exclusively in smallgoods factories may be so arranged as to permit of longer hours being worked from Monday to Friday to permit of earlier cessation on Saturday.

5.—Overtime.

(1) Work shall not be allowed outside the limits of Clause 4, except in cases of urgent necessity for the purpose of:—

(a) Supplying military hospitals, military camps, military depots, and shipping;

(b) Supplying State institutions whose contracts are open to public tender; and

(c) A breakdown of the refrigerating plant, which necessitates the worker handling the meat contained in the chambers attached thereto.

(2) Overtime is permissible, within the limits set out in Clause 4, to meet with the case of the unforeseen absence of any worker owing to accident or sickness or any other cause.

(3) The rates of overtime for work done under this clause shall be—for the first two hours, time and a half; thereafter, double time. When a worker has left the premises and is recalled to work under this clause he shall be paid at least two hours at ordinary pro rata rates.

(4) In any establishment in which it is necessary to attend to the refrigerator at times not within the ordinary hours, it shall be permissible for a worker to do so on terms arranged with the employer and approved by the Secretary of the Union.

6.—Holidays.

New Year's Day, Good Friday, Labour Day, Picnic Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day shall be observed as close holidays. When any of these specified holidays is observed upon Sunday, some other day shall be substituted in lieu thereof.

Subject to Clause 5 no work shall be done on these days and no deduction made from wages in respect thereof.

An annual holiday of six days on full pay shall be granted to each worker who has completed one year of service, such holiday to be taken at the convenience of the employer within three months of the expiry of each twelve months' service.

A worker who has not completed twelve months of service shall be paid holiday pay in lieu of the annual holiday at the rate of 1/52 part of his weekly wage for every week employed.

7.—Wages.

The minimum rate of wages payable to workers under this Section of the Award shall be as follows:—

8.—Weekly Hands.

The employment shall be weekly, and a week's notice shall be given on either side to terminate engagement, or a week's wages paid in lieu of same; such notice may be given before 12 o'clock noon on any day.

9.—Casual Hands.

Casual hands may be employed, and shall be paid the rate provided for casuals until the worker has been notified by the employer that he is a weekly hand.

10.—Carters.

Carters of all classes shall feed and water horses used at or in connection with the shop or shops where no groom is kept. Provided that each carter shall perform the work in rotation, and where only one is employed he shall be entitled to each alternate holiday, Saturday afternoon and Sunday, off duty. Double time shall be allowed off duty during the week for all work done on Saturday afternoons, Sundays and holidays under this clause, or double pay for work so performed.

11.—Board or Lodging.

No employer shall board or lodge any of his workers on his business premises.

12.—Travelling Expenses.

All reasonable travelling expenses incurred by any casual worker travelling to and from work shall be refunded by the employer; the same to apply to any worker sent from one shop to another.

13.—Under-rate Workers.

A worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum rate of wage herein prescribed may be employed at a lower rate, which shall be agreed upon in writing between the worker and the Secretary of the Union. If within seven days after being notified in writing of the worker's desire to work at a lower rate of wage than that prescribed the said Secretary and worker are unable to agree upon a lower rate, then the worker may apply in writing to the Resident or Police Magistrate within whose Magisterial District the proposed employment will take place to fix such lower rate of wage. The worker shall give such

Secretary two days' notice in writing of his intention to apply to the Magistrate, and the said Secretary or his agent may attend and oppose the application. The Magistrate may fix the rate of wage, and his decision shall be final. Any worker whose wage shall have been so fixed may work for and be employed by any employer within the district to which this Award applies for such lower wage for the period of six calendar months thereafter, and after the expiration of the said period until fourteen days' notice in writing shall have been given him by the Secretary of the Union requiring his wage to be again fixed in the manner prescribed by this clause.

14.—Managers.

This Award shall not apply to managers.

For the purpose of this clause a manager shall mean:—

- (1) a person who attends to managerial duties, who is in charge of the establishment, and/or who directs and supervises operations in connection with that shop, and who may do butchering work; and
- (2) who works under a written contract of service with his employer under which, in addition to any other provisions, he is entitled to a salary of seven pounds ten shillings (£7 10s.) per week, and is also entitled to receive a month's notice before his services may be dispensed with, except in the case of misconduct. A copy of the Agreement of Service shall be lodged with the Registrar.

15.—Definitions.

“First shopman”:—In every shop where one or more shopmen are employed, one shall be classed as first shopman.

“Smallgoods-man” shall mean one who actually performs the work of preparing, manufacturing, or making up from meat smallgoods, except sausages known as butchers' sausages, but shall not mean or include the employer or the manager of any shop, or the member of any firm, and in shops where only one smallgoods-man is employed he shall be classed as first smallgoods-man.

“Cutting cart hand” shall mean one who takes out meat in bulk and cuts and sells it from the cart or motor.

“Salter” shall mean one who is employed the greater portion of his time in salting and curing meat.

“General butcher” shall mean one employed cutting up meat, serving in shop, or doing rounds and cutting meat or general work of a butcher, or who is assisting in a smallgoods factory.

16.—Mixed Functions.

Any worker (labourer or otherwise) called upon to do or performing any work that carries a higher rate of wage shall be paid such higher rate for that day.

17.—Time and Wages Book.

The employer shall provide a time book, to be kept where the worker or workers usually commence work, in which each worker shall enter his starting and finishing time each day. The employer shall enter a record in a book showing the time worked by and the wages and overtime paid to each worker. Such time and record books shall be open to inspection by the Secretary of the Union, or such other person authorised in writing by the President of the Union, during working hours on any day.

18.—First Aid.

Each employer shall keep at his shop or factory, or at each, if more than one, a first aid equipment fully stocked for the use of the workers.

19.—Apprentices.

(1) The provisions of the Schedule annexed hereto entitled “Apprenticeship Regulations,” shall extend and apply to apprentices coming within the scope of this Award.

(2) The maximum number of apprentices allowed to any employer shall be in the proportion of one apprentice to every four journeymen employed, or one apprentice to every two journeymen where a less number than four journeymen are employed by such employer.

(3) The period of apprenticeship shall be five years.

(4) Apprentices may be taken to (a) general butchering; (b) smallgoods making; but where both operations are carried on by the employer, he shall undertake to teach the apprentice both.

(5) The minimum wage payable to the apprentice shall be:—

(6) When a date has been fixed for the examination of any of his apprentices, the employer shall be notified thereof by the Registrar, and he shall also be notified of the results of the examination.

Abattoirs Section.

20.—Hours of Labour.

On Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, eight hours and forty-eight minutes.

For labourers forty-four hours shall constitute a week's work, to be worked as follows:—Monday to Friday, eight hours, and Saturday, four hours; but if not required to work on Saturday, the hours may be split up over the other days of the week, but no day shall exceed nine hours.

One hour shall be allowed for meals, at such time as may be mutually agreed.

No work shall be done on Saturday except by labourers.

21.—Starting Times.

The starting time for all workers (except beef lumpers) shall be 8 a.m. and ceasing time not later than 5.48 p.m.

For beef lumpers, on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday not later than 10 a.m., ceasing at 7.30 p.m., with two intervals for meals, and all time worked after the ceasing time shall be paid for as overtime.

22.—Wages.

The minimum rate of wage payable weekly to each worker shall be:—

Any worker working in the freezers for any portion of a day shall be paid four shillings (4s.) in addition to the ordinary day's pay.

23.—Weekly Hands.

The employment shall be weekly, and a week's notice shall be given on either side to terminate engagement, or a week's wages paid in lieu of same; such notice may be given before 12 o'clock noon on any day.

24.—Casual Hands.

All or any casual hands starting at any time during the day shall be paid the full rate for the day, and casual rates shall be paid unless the worker shall have been notified by the employer before 5 p.m. on the day of engagement that he is to be employed as a permanent hand; but in the event of any casual hand who has been engaged to start at the ordinary starting time not reporting himself for duty at the starting time, he shall be paid proportionately for the hours worked.

25.—Overtime.

Overtime rates for slaughtermen shall be five shillings and fivepence (5s. 5d.) per hour, for slaughtermen's labourers four shillings and fourpence (4s. 4d.) per hour, and for all other workers time and a half.

26.—Holidays.

The following days shall be observed as close holidays: New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Picnic Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

When any of these specified holidays shall be observed upon a Sunday, or some other day on which work is not usually carried on, some other day or days shall be substituted in lieu thereof, the same to be mutually arranged between the Union and the employers.

An annual holiday of five consecutive working days on full pay shall be granted to each worker who has completed one year of service, to be taken at the convenience of the employer, within three months of the expiry of each year of service.

A worker who has not completed twelve months of service shall be paid holiday pay in lieu of the annual holiday, at the rate of 1/32 part of his weekly wages for every week employed.

27.—Tallies.

Beef: The day's work for two slaughtermen and one labourer shall consist of killing and dressing not more than 21 bullocks on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. The day's work for one slaughterman and labourer shall consist of killing and dressing 10 bullocks on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday.

Sheep: The day's work for one slaughterman shall consist of killing and dressing (a) shorn sheep or lambs: 63 on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday; (b) woolly sheep: 48 on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday.

Pigs: Three pigs up to 80 lbs. weight per slaughterman per hour; two pigs up to 200 lbs. weight per slaughterman per hour; all pigs 200 lbs. and over, one pig per hour. Provided, the pig pen is not more than eighteen feet from the scalding pens, and provided also, that the employer shall provide all necessary assistance to handle and lift the pigs.

In the event of any class of stock, bullocks, sheep, lambs or pigs not being in the pens, or scalding water provided for men employed on pigs by 8.30 a.m., the tallies shall be decreased in proportion to the length of time the worker is kept waiting.

28.—Woolly Sheep.

All sheep to count woolly from the first July if not shorn in that year. Back-setted lambs to count as woolly and to be equally divided amongst the slaughtermen on the boards.

29.—Lambs or Sheep.

A lamb shall be considered a lamb up to two-tooth, and from thence onwards shall be considered a sheep.

30.—Slaughterman's Labourer.

A slaughterman's labourer shall cease work with the slaughterman, provided the day's tally has been done on beef, but if called upon to work after the slaughterman has done his full tally on beef, he shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.

In the event of the slaughtermen not having their full tally on beef, their labourer shall nevertheless be in attendance on them, and in the event of the slaughtermen finishing up their tallies on the mutton board, the labourer may be employed at other work on the floor, but shall cease his day's work on the slaughtermen's tallies being completed, and in the event of the slaughtermen killing over tallies at overtime rates, then their labourers shall also be paid at overtime rates.

31.—Beef Lumping.

No carcase lumping shall be done by any slaughterman or by any person who has done his day's tally. Lumpers when not engaged on lumping may be engaged on any other work but shall not suffer any deduction of pay.

32.—Cleaning Up, Etc.

No slaughterman shall clean up or wash down.

33.—Crippled Stock.

All crippled stock shall be delivered to the slaughtermen in the pens, and in the event of the slaughtermen having to kill and dress crippled stock after hours, or on Saturday or Sunday, or holidays, he shall be paid not less than:—For bullocks, 8s. 2d. per head, with a minimum of £1 1s. 9d.; for sheep, 1s. 1d. per head, with a minimum of 10s.

34.—Extra Counts.

All Jew cattle shall count two for one, and all rams and ram stags shall count two for one.

35.—Different Functions.

Any worker (labourer or otherwise) called upon to do or performing any work that carries a higher rate of wage shall be paid such higher rate for that day.

36.—First Aid Equipment.

Each employer shall provide a first aid equipment at the abattoir and shall keep same fully stocked.

37.—Caps and Tunics.

The employers shall supply each beef lumper with caps and tunics and replace same when worn out.

38.—Junior Labourers.

Junior labourers may be employed and shall be paid as follows:—

Not more than one junior shall be employed to every four fully paid workers.

39.—Time and Wages Book.

The employer shall provide a time book, to be kept where the employee or employees usually commence work, in which each employee shall enter his starting and finishing time each day. The employer shall enter a record in a book showing the time worked by and the wages and overtime paid to each employee. Such time and record books shall be open to inspection by the Secretary of the Union, or such other person authorised in writing by the President of the Union, during working hours on any day. Such book shall clearly state the numbers killed each day and the amount of overtime if any.

40.—Definitions.

"Slaughterman" shall mean one who kills and dresses oxen, sheep, calves, lambs, or pigs for the purpose of local consumption.

"Tallowman" shall mean one who attends to the digester, boiler, desiccator, or other means adopted to render fat, or produce dry blood or fertiliser.

"Scalder" shall mean one who scalds or dresses heads, calves' feet, tripes, cow heels, trotters, etc.

41.—Apprentices.

(1) The provisions of the Schedule annexed hereto, entitled "Apprenticeship Regulations," will extend to and apply to the apprentices coming within the scope of this Award.

(2) No apprentice to slaughtering shall be taken under the age of 16 years.

(3) The maximum number of apprentices allowed to any employer shall be in the proportion of one apprentice to every four slaughtermen employed, or one apprentice to every two slaughtermen, where a less number than four slaughtermen are employed by such employer.

(4) The period of apprenticeship shall be five years.

(5) The minimum wages payable to apprentices shall be:—

(6) Employers shall be notified by the Registrar of the date fixed for the apprenticeship examinations. They shall also be notified of the result thereof.

(7) The tallies for the apprentices shall be:—

Beef-Carting Section.

This section shall apply to all workers employed in carting or handling meat or the products from abattoirs, shops, stalls, icehouses.

42.—Hours.

The hours of labour for beef carters shall be as follows:—

(a) For carters with horses or lorries employed in or about or in delivery from shops, stalls, or ice houses situated within six miles from the General Post Office, Perth, the hours shall not exceed forty-four per week, and may be worked as follows:—

From 1st September to 31st May:—Monday—4.30 a.m. to 8.30 a.m.; Tuesday, Friday—2 a.m. to 9 a.m.; Wednesday, Thursday, Saturday—2 a.m. to 8.30 a.m.

From 1st June to 31st August:—Monday—5 a.m. to 9 a.m.; Tuesday, Friday—5 a.m. to 12 noon; Wednesday, Thursday, Saturday—5 a.m. to 11.30 a.m.

In the afternoon, where two men are employed, they shall each work on alternate afternoons as follows:—Monday to Friday—2 hours; Saturday—1 hour.

Where one man only is employed, he shall work for one hour every afternoon.

The starting and finishing time shall be at the stables for both horse and lorry drivers.

For all time worked over forty-four hours in any one week overtime at the rate of time and a half shall be paid.

Workers employed under this section shall receive, for all work done before 7 a.m., the sum of sixpence per hour from 1st September to 31st May, and ninepence per hour from 1st June to 31st August, in addition to their ordinary weekly pay. Provided, however, that it shall be optional with the employer to alter the starting and finishing times mentioned herein so as to permit in the case of any worker of a later starting hour. Any further question arising under this provision may be referred to the Court for determination, notwithstanding any provision in the Award to the contrary.

(b) The hours of labour for beef carters employed in or about or in delivering from shops, stalls, ice houses, or abattoirs situated within a radius of six miles from the Post Office, Midland Junction, or Post Office, Fremantle, shall not exceed forty-eight per week and be fixed by the employer to suit his trade.

For all work done in excess of nine hours in any one day exclusive of meal time, or in excess of forty-eight hours in any one week, overtime shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.

43.—Wages.

44.—Holidays.

The following days shall be observed as close holidays:—New Year's Day, Good Friday, Picnic Day, Labour Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

When any of these specified holidays is observed upon Sunday, some other day shall be substituted in lieu thereof.

An annual holiday of six days on full pay shall be granted to each worker who has completed one year of service, to be taken at the convenience of the employer within three months of the expiry of each year of service.

A worker who has not completed twelve months of service shall be paid holiday pay in lieu of the annual holiday, at the rate of 1/52 part of his weekly wages for every week employed.

45.—General Conditions.

Each worker shall take his turn in feeding and watering the horses where no groom is kept, unless otherwise arranged. Where only one worker is employed, the employer shall take his turn in rotation with the worker.

46.—Caps and Tunics.

The employer shall provide caps and tunics to each worker when required.

47.—Junior Labourers.

Junior labourers assisting beef carters:—No employer shall employ more than one junior hand in this section and the wages shall be:—

48.—Record Book.

Each employer shall keep, or cause to be kept at his shop, store, or factory, or at each of them if more than one, a book containing a record of the names of all workers employed by him, the class of work performed by each such worker, the wages paid to each such worker, the actual number of hours worked each day by each worker, the starting and finishing time on each day, and the amount of overtime, if any. Such book shall be open

for inspection by the Secretary or such other person, as may be appointed by the Union, on any day during working hours.

SCHEDULE.

Apprenticeship Regulations.

1. No minor shall (except as a junior worker under the provisions of this Award) be employed or engaged in the industry except subject to the conditions of apprenticeship or probationership herein contained.

2. For the purposes of these Regulations a minor means a person not less than fourteen years of age and not more than eighteen years of age who customarily works under the direction of or in association with an employer, master, or journeyman upon the material and with the tools or implements used in the industry.

3. (1.) Any person desirous of becoming an apprentice shall notify the Registrar, who shall keep a register of such persons.

(2.) Every employer desirous of obtaining an apprentice shall take as an apprentice only a person whose name is so registered.

(3.) Every apprentice shall be employed on probation for a period of three months, to determine his fitness or otherwise for apprenticeship, and shall work only for such hours per day and for such remuneration as may be prescribed by the Award. In the event of his becoming an apprentice, such probationary period shall be counted as part of the term of apprenticeship.

4. An employer shall be deemed to undertake the duty which he agrees to perform as a duty enforceable under an Award of the Court.

5. A Board to be called "The Advisory Committee" may be appointed by the Court to advise in regard to any apprenticeship matter. Such committee shall consist of the following:—

- (a) Some person appointed by the Court, who shall act as Chairman.
- (b) Two representatives appointed by the employers.
- (c) Two representatives appointed by the industrial union or unions of employees in the trade.

The Advisory Committee shall have such powers and duties as the Court in each case may determine.

6. (i.) No employer shall refuse employment to any person, or dismiss any employee from his employment, or injure him in his employment, or alter his position to his prejudice, by reason merely of the fact that the employee is a member of any Advisory Committee, or by reason merely of anything said or done or omitted to be done by any such person or employee in the course of his duty as such member.

(ii.) In any proceeding for any contravention of this Regulation it shall lie upon the employer to show that any person proved to have been refused employment, or any employee proved to have been dismissed or injured in his employment, or prejudiced while acting as such member, was refused employment or dismissed or injured in his employment or prejudiced for some reason other than that mentioned in this Regulation.

7. (a) Any employer taking an apprentice on probation shall within 14 days thereafter register such probationer by giving notice thereof to the Registrar in the prescribed form. If at the date of the coming into operation of these Regulations an employer is employing any apprentice or probationer who has not been duly registered as such, he shall forthwith apply for the due registration of such apprentice or probationer.

(b) At the end of the period of probation of each apprentice, if mutually agreed upon by the employer and the legal guardian of the boy, but not otherwise, he may become an apprentice under an agreement.

(c) The Court may in any case, where it seems expedient to do so, order that the probationary period of employment be extended for a further period not exceeding three months.

(d) The apprenticeship agreement shall be completed within one month of the termination of the probationary period.

(e) All agreements of apprenticeship shall be drawn up on a form approved by the Court, and signed by the employer, the legal guardian of the apprentice, the apprentice, and the Registrar. No employer, guardian or apprentice shall enter into any agreement or under-

taking purporting to add to, vary, alter or amend any such agreement without the approval of the Court.

(f) There shall be three copies of each agreement, of which one copy shall be held by the employer, one shall be held by the legal guardian of the apprentice, and one copy shall be retained by the Registrar.

(g) The Court shall have power to transfer an apprentice from one employer to another either temporarily or permanently—

- (i.) if the employer does not provide the necessary facilities for the apprentice to become proficient in his trade; or
- (ii.) upon the application of the employer or the apprentice for good cause shown.

(h) The transfer of every agreement shall be on a form approved by the Court, and shall be made out in quadruplicate, and shall, unless the Court otherwise directs, be signed by the late employer or his assigns, the legal guardian of the apprentice, the apprentice, the Registrar, and the new employer. The transfer form shall be completed within two months of the date on which the transfer is effected.

(i) There shall be four copies of the form of transfer, of which one copy shall be held by the late employer, one shall be held by the new employer, one shall be held by the legal guardian of the apprentice, and one shall be retained by the Registrar.

(j) Every agreement of apprenticeship shall be subject to the provisions of the Award in force for the time being applicable to apprenticeship in the industry.

8. The employer of every apprentice shall keep him constantly at work and teach such apprentice, or cause him to be taught, the industry, craft, occupation, or calling in relation to which he is bound apprentice, by competent instruction in a gradual and complete manner, and shall give such apprentice a reasonable opportunity to learn the same, and receive, during the period of his apprenticeship, such technical, trade and general instruction and training as may be necessary. And every apprentice shall, during the period of his apprenticeship, faithfully serve his employer for the purpose of being taught the industry, craft, occupation, or calling in relation to which he is bound, and shall also conscientiously and regularly accept such technical, trade, and general instruction and training as aforesaid, in addition to the teaching that may be provided by his employer.

9. Every agreement entered into by the employer and the legal guardian of the apprentice shall be for a period of five years.

10. Every agreement of apprenticeship entered into shall contain—

- (a) The names and addresses of the parties to the agreement.
- (b) The date of birth of the apprentice.
- (c) A description of the industry, craft, occupation or calling or combination thereof to which the apprentice is to be bound.
- (d) The date at which the apprenticeship is to commence and the period of apprenticeship.
- (e) A condition requiring the apprentice to obey all reasonable directions of the employer and requiring the employer and apprentice to comply with the terms of the industrial award so far as they concern the apprentice.
- (f) A condition that technical instruction of the apprentice, when available, shall be at the employer's expense, and shall be in the employer's time, except in places where such instruction is given after the ordinary working hours.
- (g) A condition that in the event of any apprentice, in the opinion of the examiners, not progressing satisfactorily, increased time for technical instruction shall be allowed at the employer's expense to enable such apprentice to reach the necessary standard.
- (h) The general conditions of apprenticeship.

11. Where in any case it is reported to the Court that any employer or group of employers has not in his or their employ the number of apprentices in proportion to the journeymen employed equal to the proportion allowed or required by the Award, the Court may make such investigation and order as it may deem necessary to ensure that each employer or group of employers shall employ and train a specified minimum number of apprentices.

12. Should an employer at any time before the determination of the period of apprenticeship desire to dispense with the service of the apprentice he may with the consent of the apprentice and guardian transfer him to another employer carrying on business within a reason-

able distance of the original employer's place of business, willing to continue to teach the apprentice and pay the rate of wages prescribed by the Court in its Award or otherwise, according to the total length of time served, and generally to perform the obligations of the original employer.

13. (a) Every agreement shall include a provision that it may be cancelled, by mutual consent, by the employer and the legal guardian of the apprentice giving one month's notice in writing to the Court and to the parties concerned that such apprenticeship shall be terminated.

(b) If the apprentice shall at any time during the said term be wilfully disobedient to the lawful orders of the employer, his managers, foremen or other servants having authority over the apprentice, or be slothful, or negligent, or dishonest, or shall otherwise grossly misbehave himself, or shall not conduct himself as a good and faithful apprentice should do, or shall not faithfully observe and keep his part of his agreement, then it shall be lawful for the employer, with the consent of the Court, to discharge the apprentice from his service.

(c) The Court may in its discretion for any cause which it may deem sufficient on the application of any party to an apprenticeship agreement abrogate or cancel the agreement, either unconditionally or subject to such terms and conditions as it may deem advisable.

14. On the transfer or termination of any apprenticeship, from whatever cause, the employer shall give the apprentice a certificate stating what time he has served, full particulars of the branches of the trade or industry in which he has received instruction, the proficiency attained, and shall also notify the clerk of the Court, and the cause thereof.

15. No apprentice employed under a registered agreement shall be discharged by the employer for alleged misconduct until the registration of the agreement of apprenticeship has been cancelled by order of the Court on the application of the employer.

Provided, however, that an apprentice may be suspended for misconduct by the employer, but in any such case the employer shall forthwith make an application for cancellation of the agreement of apprenticeship, and in the event of the Court refusing same, the wages of the apprentice, or such portion thereof as the Court may order, shall be paid as from the date of such suspension, and, in the event of the application for cancellation being granted, such order may take effect from the date when the apprentice was suspended.

16. When an apprentice cannot be usefully employed because of a strike, the employer shall be relieved of his obligations under the apprenticeship agreement during the period of the strike.

17. Subject to Regulation 23, time lost by the apprentice through sickness or any other cause whatsoever may, with the consent of the Court on the application of any party, be added to the original term in the apprenticeship agreement.

18. In the event of an employer being unable to provide work for the apprentice, or to mutually agree with the legal guardian of the apprentice to cancel the agreement or to arrange a transfer, application may be made to the Court to arrange for such transfer or to have such agreement cancelled.

19. Where in any case an employer is temporarily unable to provide work to employ an apprentice for his full time, application may be made by the employer to the Court for permission to employ the apprentice for such lesser time per week or per month, and at such remuneration as the Court may determine, being not less than the proportionate amount of the rate of wages prescribed by the industrial award for the trade, calling, or industry.

20. Where in any case the Court is of opinion that the number of apprentices being trained is insufficient to meet the requirements of the industry in the matter of skilled artisans, the Court may make such investigation and order as it may be deemed necessary to permit or require any employer to employ such further number of apprentices as may be directed. Notice of such order shall be given to the parties to this Award.

21. (a) Every apprentice shall attend a Government technical school vocational classes or classes of instruction, for instruction in such subjects as are provided for his trade: Provided, however, that attendances shall not be compulsory when the apprentice is resident outside a radius of 12 miles from the place where instruction is given. Provided also, that if technical instruction is not available in the locality in which the appren-

tice is employed and is available by correspondence, at reasonable cost to be approved of by the Court, the Court may prescribe such correspondence course as the technical instruction to be taken by the apprentice and paid for by the employer.

(b) The fees for the classes attended by the apprentice shall be paid by the employer.

(c) The period during which apprentices are to attend such technical school or classes shall be four hours per week.

(d) Every apprentice shall be bound to submit himself to examination at the places and times prescribed by the Court.

(e) Every apprentice shall, prior to submitting himself to examination, produce to the examiners a certificate that he has made at least 70 per centum of attendances at the technical school or other place of instruction, unless he is exempted from such attendance for good cause.

(f) The clerk of the Court shall notify the examiners of the names and addresses of the apprentices required to submit themselves to examination.

(g) The employer shall provide such necessary material and machinery as may be required by the examiners, and shall in all ways facilitate the conduct of the examination.

(h) The Board of Examiners shall consist of persons skilled in the industry. It shall comprise equal numbers of representatives nominated by the employers and workers in the particular trade. Failing such nomination or nominations the Court may appoint such person or persons as it may deem fit. In the event of a disagreement between the examiners the matter in dispute shall be referred to a third person agreed to by them or nominated by the Court or the President at the request of any of the examiners, and the decision of such person shall be final and conclusive.

(i) It shall be the duty of the examiners to examine the work, require the production of the certificate of attendance, inquire into the diligence of each apprentice, and as to the opportunities provided by the employer for each apprentice to learn, and to submit a report to the Court in writing as to the result of the examination within one month from the date of holding the examination, but this period may be extended by the Court.

(j) Such examination shall, where possible, include theory and practice as applied to the trade, industry, craft, occupation, or calling to which the apprentice is indentured.

(k) The Registrar shall, after each examination, issue a certificate to each apprentice indicating his degree of proficiency, taking into consideration the term of apprenticeship served. A duplicate of such certificate shall be lodged by each apprentice with his employer and the secretary of the Union, each of whom shall keep the same in safe custody, and produce the same for inspection by the Industrial Inspector whenever demanded by the latter to do so. When the final examination has been passed the certificate shall also be signed by the examiners.

(l) Where in any case it is shown to the satisfaction of the Court that any apprentice, by reason of his engagement on country work or other good cause, cannot conveniently attend a technical school or other prescribed classes, such of these Regulations as relate to attendance at a technical school or other prescribed classes, and to examinations, shall not apply to such apprentice, but he shall be subject to such conditions as the Court may direct.

(m) The examiners shall each be entitled to the following fees, namely:—

For every five, or fraction of five, apprentices examined—One guinea, with a minimum fee of two guineas.

In addition to the foregoing fees, where examiners, in the performance of their duties as such, are required to travel, they will be entitled to reimbursement of all fares and necessary expenses actually incurred.

(n) Whenever it is possible so to do, the examiners, before entering upon the examination following the issue of these Regulations, shall draw up a syllabus showing what, in their opinion, is the stage of proficiency which an apprentice should attain at each of the examinations prescribed. The syllabus shall be subject to review by the Court at any time, and shall be kept as a record by the clerk of the Court and a copy handed to the examiners before each examination. The said syllabus may be subject to alteration from time to time by the examiners, who shall forthwith notify the clerk of the Court thereof.

22. The employer shall pay the apprentice for all time lost through sickness or the holidays prescribed by this Award: Provided—

- (a) payment for such sickness shall not exceed a total of one month in each year;
- (b) where the time lost through sickness exceeds four consecutive working days, the employer may demand from the apprentice the production of a medical certificate, and a further certificate or certificates may be required if any time is lost through sickness within seven days from the date of resumption of duty, the cost if any of such certificate or certificates not exceeding 5s. to be borne by the employer;
- (c) An apprentice shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment, or for any accident or sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

23. The employer shall pay the apprentice, in respect of time lost through compulsory military or naval training, the amount by which the wages prescribed by the industrial award for the trade, calling, craft, occupation, or industry exceeds the amount received by the apprentice from the Department of Defence: Provided, however, that this clause shall not apply to military or naval training imposed through failure to attend compulsory parades.

All time lost by reason of compulsory military or naval training other than the additional training mentioned in the above proviso, shall count as part of the apprenticeship.

24. When an apprentice attends a technical school, vocational classes, or other class or classes of instruction during his ordinary working hours, where such is prescribed, the time so occupied shall be regarded as part of the term of his apprenticeship, and the employer shall not be entitled to make any deduction from the wages of the apprentice for such time.

25. If the examiners or the industrial union or employer concerned make representations to the Court that the facilities provided by the Technical School, or other place of vocational training for the teaching of apprentices, are inadequate, the Court may make such investigations and such report to the Minister controlling such Technical School, or such other place, as it deems necessary.

26. (1.) The term of apprenticeship may be extended by the Court on the failure of an apprentice to pass any of the examinations, and for such purpose it shall be the duty of the examiners to make any necessary recommendation to the Court. Any extension of the term of apprenticeship shall be subject to all the conditions and stipulations in the original agreement, except as to rates of wages, which shall be such amount as the Court may determine.

(2.) Upon the failure of an apprentice to pass two consecutive examinations, it shall be the duty of the examiners to report same to the Court with a recommendation as to the cancellation of the apprenticeship agreement, or such other remedial measures (*i.e.*, increased time for technical instruction) as they may deem advisable. The Court, after notice to all parties concerned, may cancel the agreement or make such other order in the circumstances as it may deem necessary.

27. When an apprentice is absent from work for any cause other than sickness, or in pursuance of the provisions of these Regulations, the employer shall be entitled to deduct from the wages of the apprentice an amount proportionate to the time so lost.

28. Upon the completion of the period of training prescribed for apprenticeship, each apprentice shall be required to pass the final examination test to the satisfaction of the examiners, and upon passing this test shall be provided with a certificate to that effect.

29. The Registrar shall prepare and keep a roll of apprentices containing—

- (a) a complete record of all applications to become apprentices;
- (b) a record of all apprentices and probationers placed with employers;
- (c) a record of all employers with whom apprentices are placed;
- (d) a record of the progress of each apprentice, recording the result of the examiners' reports;
- (e) any other particulars the Court may direct.

30. For the purpose of ascertaining the number of apprentices allowed to be taken at any time, the average

number of journeymen employed on all working days of the twelve months immediately preceding such time shall be deemed to be the number of journeymen employed. Where the employer is himself a journeyman regularly and usually working at the trade, he shall be counted as a journeyman for the purpose of computing the number of apprentices allowed.

31. Every industrial inspector appointed in pursuance of the provisions of "The Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1925," shall have the power to enter any premises, make such inspection of the premises, plant, machinery, or work upon which any apprentice is employed or could be employed, interview any apprentice or employee, examine any books or documents of the business relating to the wages and conditions of apprentices, interrogate the employer in regard to any of the above-mentioned matters.

32. With a view to determining whether the number of apprentices being trained is sufficient to meet the future requirements of the industry in the matter of skilled artisans, the Registrar may require any employer to furnish him with any specified information relating to the said industry, or relating to the employees engaged therein.

33. "Apprentice" means any person of either sex of any age who is apprenticed to learn or to be taught any industry, trade, craft, or calling to which these Regulations apply, and includes an apprentice on probation.
