His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Excentive Council, hereby appropriate of the construction and extension by the hereby approves of the construction and extension by the Minister for Water Supply, Sewerage, and Drainage of

the following works under the said Act, and does hereby exempt such works from the operations of Sections 20, 21, 22, and 23 of the said Act:--

Description and Location of Reticulation Works approved and exempted.-The construction, as a reticula-tion work, of a 6-inch diameter stoneware pipe sewer tion work, of a 6-inch diameter stoneware pipe sewer with manholes and all other apparatus connected there-with:--Commencing at manhole No. 4093 and proceed-ing North for a distance of 208 feet to manhole No. 4094 situated in Lot No. 318, The Boulevarde; thence North for a distance of 230 feet to manhole No. 4095 situated in Council property; thence North for a dis-tance of 248 feet to manhole No. 4096 situated in Lot No. 306, The Boulevarde; thence North for a distance of 272 feet to manhole No. 4097 situated in Ashby Street; thence North for a distance of 326 feet to man-hole No. 4008 situated in Lot No. 201 The Boulevarde; hole No. 4098 situated in Lot No. 291, The Boulevarde; thence North for a distance of 238 feet to manhole No. 4099 situated in Lot No. 285, The Boulevarde; thence North for a distance of 230 feet to manhole No. 4100 situated in Berryman Street; thence Northerly for a distance of 354 feet to manhole No. 4101 situated in Lot No. 173, North Beach Road, in lieu of the 6-inch diameter sewer between manhole No. 4093 and manhole No. 4101, which were portions of the works as adver-tised in the *Government Gazette* on the 28th day of, February, 1930, and as detailed in the plans and speci-fications therein referred to.

Leonora-Malcolm, Black Range, and Mt. Margaret Road Districts-Alteration of Boundaries. ORDER IN COUNCIL.



IT is hereby notified, for general information, that His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council has ap-proved of the following Regulations, numbered 1 to 9, under the provisions of "The Dog Act, 1903–28," to come into operation in every Municipal and Road District through-out the State on and from the 1st day of July, 1930 :---

The Dog Act, 1903-28.

1. All regulations previously made under the Act shall be and are hereby repealed as from the 30th day of June, 1930.

These Regulations shall come into operation and have $\mathbf{2}$. the force of law in every District throughout the State on and from the 1st day of July, 1930.

3. The registration label for the financial year ended the 30th June, 1931, required by Section 9 of "The Dog Act, 1903-28," is hereby prescribed to be a flat piece of brass, of the size and shape depicted hereunder, inscribed with the name of the District, the year of registration, and the registration number on the obverse side and the emblem of the State flag upon the reverse side :



4. The registration label, as prescribed to these Regu-lations, shall be securely affixed to a collar and continually worn round the dog's neek.

Registration shall be effected on or within 21 days from the 1st day of July, 1930.

The registration fees for dogs shall be as set forth in 6. the Third Schedule to the principal Act, as amended by Sections 5 and 16 of the amending Act, 1923, namely :---

- (a) Dogs, 7s. 6d.; bitches, 10s. (except those used for tending cattle and sheep).
- tename cattle and sneep).
 (b) When any person makes use of any dog or dogs in or about the droving or tending of not less than five head of "Great cattle" or twenty head of "Small cattle," he shall, on making application in the prescribed form, be entitled to register any such dog at half the prescribed rate are arealy. such dog at half the prescribed rate, namely : Dogs, 3s. 9d. ; bitches, 5s.

7. The doscription of cattle shall be as set out in the Second Schedule of "The Cattle Trespass, Fencing, and Impounding Act, 1882," namely :--Horse, mare, gelding, colt, filly, ass, mule, bull, ox, cow, heifer, calf, camel, deer, and foal---"Great cattle"; Ram ewe, sheep, wether, and lamb, goat, kid, and pig--"Small cattle."

8. The form for application is hereby prescribed as Form "A" in the Fourth Schedule to "The Dog Act, 1903," as issued by the Department of Works and Labour. It must be stated definitely in the last column of the form the number of cattle or sheep for which the dog is used for tending.

Any person or persons who contravene any provisions 9. of these Regulations, whether by act of omission, shall, on conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5 for every such offence.

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of "The Indus-trial Arbitration Act, 1912-1925," this Twelfth day of March, One thousand nine hundred and thirty, between the W.A. Midland Railway Employees' Industrial Union of Workers (hereinafter referred to as the "Union"), of the one part and the Midland Railway Company of of the one part, and the Midland Railway Company of Western Australia, Limited (hereinafter referred to as the "Company"), of the other part, whereby it is mutually agreed by and between the parties hereto as follows. follows:-

Part (1)-General Section. This part of the Agreement applies to all workers covered by this Agreement.

1.—Term of Agreement. The currency of this Agreement shall be three years from the First day of July, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-eight.

2.—Area and Scope of Agreement. This Agreement shall apply only to workers employed by the General Manager in and about the working and maintenance of the Midland Railway Company and shall be binding upon the abovenamed parties and shall op-erate over the whole of the Midland Railway and the workshops used in connection therewith.

3.—Interpretation. "General Manager" shall mean the General Manager of the Midland Railway Company of Western Australia, Limited.

"Lifter" is a worker employed at workshops in lifting rolling stock, and, in the case of all vehicles other than locomotives, in changing wheels and axle-boxes, changing springs and spring gear including buffers, changing worn parts of vacuum and other brake gear and attending to bolts and nuts generally as required. "Wireman" is a worker engaged in installing electric

light bells, or telephones, or running wires for heating

nght bens, of tetephones, of running when for heating or power purposes, or repairing them. "Lineman" is a worker engaged in erecting poles for electric wires or erecting electric wires or cables on poles or over buildings, or tieing it or them to insu-lators, or joining or insulating it or them, or doing any work on electric poles off the ground, but no lineman health as electric and to most an observe a correliant shall be allowed to work on electric light wires carrying

a pressure of over 110 volts, without an assistant. "Line and Signal Maintainer" is a worker per-forming the duties of lineman and interlocking adjuster

separately or in conjunction. "Casual Hand" means a worker employed for less than one week continuously, but does not include a worker who, when work is available, leaves his employ-ment before the expiration of one week. "Attended Barracks' means any building attended

to by a whole or part-time caretaker appointed for that purpose, which is provided with bed, clean bedding, cooking utensils and light and lighting facilities, water

"Unattended Barracks" means any van used as a barracks provided with the accommodation mentioned in the previous definition, and any building which, whilst provided with the accommodation mentioned therein, is

wholly unattended. "Married Man" includes a single man who has a parent or child solely dependent on him and resident in the State of Western Australia, but does not include a married man whose wife and family are neither resident with nor dependent upon him. "'Market Towns'': The following shall be the ap-

proved market towns: Midland Junction, Moora, Walkaway.

4 .--- Workers Performing Higher Duties.

(a) Any worker called upon to perform work carry-ing a higher minimum than his regular rate of pay shall be paid such higher minimum for the time actually engaged upon such higher work, and the conditions applicable to such work shall apply; provided that acting time less than 20 minutes in any one shift shall not be counted.

(b) Should any worker be required to perform work in a lower grade, his wage shall not be reduced whilst employed in such capacity.

5.-Promotion.

(a) A worker promoted to a higher position, the mini-mum pay for which is less than he receives in the posi-tion vacated, shall be paid his former rate,

(b) A junior worker on attaining the age of twenty-one years, provide he has passed the prescribed examination, if any, shall be entitled to preference of employment as a senior in the branch in which he has been working should a vacancy exist in such branch.

(c) Before any promotion to a vacancy is made other than by selection of the senior man, applications for the vacancy shall, in the case of vacancies in the work-shops or in the stores branch, be invited by notices posted on the recognised notice boards, and in the case of other vacancies by notification either by wire or circular to all stations: provided that this explanate circular to all stations; provided that this subclause shall not apply in any case where it is necessary to fill a position without the delay involved by the calling of applications.

(d) In the case of promotion, the selection of a worker for the higher position shall be governed by rela-tive ability, suitability, record, and experience. All other qualifications being equal, the senior man shall be selected.

(e) In the case of a married worker refusing promo-tion owing to lack of accommodation of the place where the vacancy exists, he shall not be penalised because of his refusal to accept such promotion.

6.-Retirement.

(a) No worker, after six months' continuous service, shall leave the Company until the expiration of fourteen days' written notice of his intention so to do, without the approval of the General Manager.

(b) Except in case of summary dismissal for misconduct, fourteen days' written notice shall be given by the General Manager to any such worker whose services are no longer required, and the reason for dismissal shall be stated in such notice.

7.-Transfers and Transfer Allowances.

(a) When any transfer is ordered by the Company, the worker transferred shall not lose his right of appeal against the transfer, and if on inquiry it is found that a transfer can be arranged with another worker to suit the convenience of the Company, then he shall be retransferred. A worker transferred from one station to another over one mile distant involving a change of residence shall

- (i) be paid not less than £4 for a married man and 5s. for a single man; a married man who does not transfer his family shall be paid as a single man until he does transfer his family;
- (ii) be paid such further out-of-pocket expenses (if any) as the General Manager in his discretion shall decide to have been reasonably incurred;
- (iii) be granted free passes for himself and family (including those dependents mentioned in the interpretation of "married man," and also the mother of a married man permanently residing with and wholly dependent upon him) and free railway transport of his fur-niture and effects including one accurate niture and effects, including one cow and not more that the one of the second second and how available;
- (iv) be paid actual travelling and waiting time up to a maximum of eight hours per day; no overtime or Sunday time rates shall apply;
- (v) married workers (if necessary) shall be allowed one day for packing and one day for unpacking.

(b) The granting of an allowance in excess of that provided above to meet special cases shall be at the discretion of the General Manager.

(c) Any worker who is transferred from one place to another to suit himself, or who is transferred by way of punishment, shall be entitled to the provisions of Subclause (iii) only.

(d) At least 10 days' notice shall be given to a worker required to transfer permanently from one station to another.

(e) A worker shall not be transferred for a less period than three rouths. If required to work temporarily at any depot for relief or other purposes for a less period he shall be paid away-from-home or lodging allowance, provided for in his section of this Agreement.

8.-Water Allowance.

To a married man 30 gallons per day. To a single man 10 gallons per day. This shall not apply to stations where a public water scheme is available.

9.-Payment for Travelling Time.

(a) A worker travelling as a passenger going to work (a) A worker traveling as a passenger going to work away from or returning to his home station shall be paid at ordinary rates for the actual travelling or waiting time up to a maximum of 16 hours in one day.
(b) Where the waiting time exceeds four hours the worker shall be deemed to be booked off duty and shall not be entitled to payment for the time he is booked off.
(a) Sundar, travelling time chell be paid at the same

(c) Sunday travelling time shall be paid at the same

rates and on the same conditions as on week days.

(d) Workers on the permanent way when starting from camp shall travel in Company's time and return in their own time, unless they are required to propel the trolley on which they ride, when they shall travel both ways in the Company's time.

(e) In respect of a worker who is provided with a sleeping berth in a passenger train, travelling time shall not count between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m., provided this shall not operate to reduce the travelling time to be paid for below eight hours in any one day.

10.-Travelling by Sea.

A worker when travelling by sea. A worker when travelling by coastal boat shall be entitled to first class accommodation on the boat and to one-fourth only of the usual away-from-home allow-ance, and travelling time shall be paid at ordinary rates; provided that not more than eight hours shall be paid for as travelling time in any one period of traverse. twenty-four hours.

11.-Absence from Duty.

(a) Any member of the running staff being unable to attend to his duty through sickness shall notify his foreman or other officer in charge at least three hours before the time he is booked for duty, and he shall also satisfy such foreman or officer that he is unfit to attend to his duties.

(b) Any worker so absent shall not again be booked up for duty unless he notifies such foreman or officer not later than noon on any day that he is fit to resume.

Any worker losing time through sickness or special leave shall be reduced in wages only to the extent of the time actually lost through sickness or actually granted as special leave.

12.—Free Passes, Privilege Tickets, and Season Tickets. (a) After twelve months' continuous services a worker

shall be allowed three passes per annum as under:-One second-class station to station pass on the occasion of the annual or long service leave, to cover the full term of leave due;

Two first-class privilege passes from one given station to another and return, except during the Christmas and Easter Holidays, when, at the option of the General Manager, the passes may be issued as second-class. In addition to the worker the pases shall be available for his wife and members of his family under 18 years

of age, unmarried, unmarried daughters over 18 years of age, and his parents, provided they are resident with and dependent upon him for support. The station to station passes may be changed to first-class on payment by the worker of half the additional fare at ordinary rates.

For the purpose of this clause a member of the family shall be deemed to be dependent provided such member's income does not exceed 15s. per week, exclusive of old age or invalid pension, but a member of the family temporarily out of employment shall not be deemed to be dependent.

A widower with his child or children resident with A widdower with his child or children resident with him and who regularly employs a housekeeper may, at the discretion of the General Manager, be granted passes for such housekeeper; in like manner an ufmarried worker supporting younger brothers and/or sisters may be granted passes for such housekeeper. (b) Upon request a worker may be granted a separate station to station pass for his wife and dependents, as mentioned in Subschusse (a) hereof, where it is incom-

station to station pass for its where and dependents, as mentioned in Subsclause (a) hereof, where it is inconvenient for both to travel together.
(c) Should any worker through illness be unable to use his station to station pass on the occasion of his annual leave, he shall be entitled to the use of such pass on the occasion of taking leave without pay during the user in which some is due. year in which same is due.

(d) After six months' continuous service a worker shall be entitled to the passes mentioned in Subclause

(a) in proportion to length of service.
(e) Workers who have not had an opportunity of allowing their holidays to accrue owing to having taken leave on individual public holidays shall be granted their station to station pass when on special leave up to fourteen down on special leave up to fourteen days.

(f) A worker who resigns or is retired from the ser-(f) A worker who resigns or is retired from the service and has leave due, shall be granted a free pass, station to station, for the term of such holidays; provided that, should a worker not have given the requisite notice or obtained the consent of the General Manager to leave the service as provided for in Clause 6, he shall forfeit all claim to any passes he would otherwise have been entitled to under the provisions of this clause. (g) Workers in isolated parts may be issued free passes, at the discretion of the Head of the Branch, for the purpose of obtaining medical attention.

the purpose of obtaining medical attention. (h) Market Passes: Workers shall be issued market (h) Market Passes: Workers shall be issued market passes once per month to the market town most con-venient to the General Manager and the worker. The passes may be issued in favour of the worker, his wife, or his housekeeper, and children between the ages of 5 and 14 years. A worker's wife or housekeeper may be manufally market more area are forthight if more work to be the second s granted a market pass once per fortnight if required; provided that the maximum number of passes granted under this subclause shall be two per month.

(i) Free Freight: Domestic supplies up to a maxi-mum weight fortnightly of 2 cwt, for married and 1 cwt. for single men, shall be carried free by rail to home station from the market town most convenient to the General Manager and the worker, and, in addition, meat, bread, vegetables, when not obtainable locally, shall be carried free from the market town most convenient to the General Manager and the worker where same are procurable. All such supplies shall be for the sole use of the worker, and his family. Provided that this con-cession shall not apply when any member of the work-er's family conducts a boarding-house or store at the home station.

(j) Free passes shall not apply to Race or Hired Special, Guaranteed Special, or Special Excursion trains within a fifty-mile radius, or when in the opinion of the Station-master at the station where the worker desires to commence his journey there is not ample room in the train.

(k) Workers working away from home station shall be entitled to a free pass to enable them to visit their home station at intervals of not less than once per fortnight; provided that the work upon which they are engaged will permit of their doing so. No travelling time shell be read. time shall be paid. Provided also, that this clause shall not operate to increase or decrease the rate of expenses the worker would otherwise be entitled to.

(1) Privilege tickets: After six months' continuous service a worker shall be allowed privilege return tickets (first or second class) for himself, wife, and members of his family under 18 years of age, also unmar-ried daughters over 18 years of age, provided they are resident with and dependent upon the worker's earn-ings. The charge for privilege tickets to be half the single fare for the return journey, with a minimum of 1s. for adults and 6d. for children. (m) Season tickets: Second-class season tickets at

half the ordinary season ticket rates, available between the station on the Company's railway nearest his resi-dence and his place of work, shall, on application, be issued to any worker. To any worker in receipt of 38s. 3d. or under per week, one quarter of the ordinary season ticket rate shall be charged.

13 .--- Holidays.

(a) Every worker shall, after twelve months' con-tinuous service, be entitled to two weeks' leave on full pay each year, the whole of which shall, except by agree-ment between the General Manager and the Union to the contrary, be taken at one time in each year; pro-vided always, that with the consent of the General Manager holidays may be allowed to accumulate for two years.

(b) Guards, signalmen, and shunters after twelve months' service shall be allowed an additional four days' holidays in each year on full pay.
(c) Workers shall be paid for holidays at the rate of pay they are drawing at or immediately before the time when such holidays are taken.

(d) Every worker, after one month's continuous service, shall be entitled to the foregoing two weeks' holidays in proportion as the length of service is to the full number of holidays for the twelve months.

(e) No deduction shall be made from annual holidays for the period any worker is off duty through sickness unless the absence exceeds three calendar months.

(f) At depots and stations, where it can be conveni-ently done, a roster shall be posted showing the approximate dates on which each worker will go on his annual leave and resume duty. Such roster will be subject to alteration to meet the exigencies of the service. Provided always that, with the approval of the Head of the Branch, any worker may change dates with another.

(g) Any worker may change dates with another. (g) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause other than for pecula-tion or theft, shall be entitled to receive payment for any holidays which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service; provided always, that if the worker has been dismissed for peculation or theft, no claim for holidays shall be recognised. Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated holidays

or payment therefor. (h) Unless at his own request no employee shall be booked off for a holiday at a foreign or at his tem-

(i) If an employee is booked off for annual leave when away from his permanent home station he shall be allowed travelling time to and from the place he is working at and such home station; the leave to count as starting and fininshing at his permanent home station.

(j) When work is closed down over Christmas and New Year for the purpose of annual holidays, workers with less than a full year's holidays due will only be entitled to payment during such period for the number of days' holidays due to them.

14.—Uniforms.

The following uniforms shall be supplied by the General Manager :-

Guards (Passenger, Mail and Express): One cap and two suits per annum and one mackintosh or overcoat every two years.

Guards (Mixed and Goods): One cap and waterproof cover and two suits per annum; one three-quarter oilskin coat every three years; one pair leather leggings every six years.

Shunters and Head-Shunters: One waterproof cap cover, one cap and one felt hat and two suits per annum; one three-quarter oilskin coat every two years;

one pair leather leggings every six years. Porters (other than those engaged solely on goods work): One cap and two suits per annum. "Sheeters' working outside: One oilskin coat every

two years; one pair leather leggings every six years.

Ticket Collector: One cap and two suits per annum. Lavatory Attendants (Traffic Branch only): One cap and two suits per annum.

Gatekeepers: One cap and two suits per annum. Crossing-keepers: One cap and two suits per annum. Watchmen (Traffic): One cap and two suits per an-num; one oilskin jacket and oilskin leggings every two

years.

Numbertakers: One cap and two suits per annum; one oilskin jacket and oilskin leggings every two years.

Ticket Examiners on Traius. One cap and two suits per annum; one mackintosh or overcoat every two years.

Conductors: One cap and two suits per annum; one mackintosh or overcoat every three years. Signalmen: One cap per annum.

Checkers: One cap per annum. Weighbridge Checkers: One oilskin jacket and oilskin leggings every two years.

Lampmen and Car Cleaners, and Examiners in pits: One cap without badge and two dungaree suits per an num.

Workers hosing out stock trucks at Midland Junction: One oilskin suit every two years for use of workers acting in this capacity.

Watchman (Loco): One oilskin coat every two years. Electric Battery Hand and Assistant, Acid Room Attendants: Two suits woollen overalls per annum.

Raker-out and Tuber: Two dungaree suits per annum. Fuelmen (on Coal Stages): One oilskin coat every

two years; one pair leather leggings every six years.

Car and Wagon Examiners and Oilers: One oilskin suit every two years.

Men employed at Oil Stores, Midland Junction: One suit dungaree overalls per annum.

Chainmen: One long oilskin coat every three years; one pair leather leggings every six years. Watchmen, Way and Works: Two suits per annum.

Gangers and Repairers: One long oilskin coat every two years; one pair leather leggings every six years. Length Runners: One oilskin suit every two years.

General.

Note .--- The uniforms shall be held by the worker and worn on duty only, and shall not be sold or disposed of.

Uniforms need not be supplied to casual hands. Where two suits are provided, delivery to be made at the beginning of the summer and winter seasons.

(a) The employment of apprentices shall be governed by the provisions of the schedule attached hereto.

(b) Apprentices shall be allowed to the following trades:—1, blacksmith; 2, electroplater; 3, fitter; 4, iron machinist; 5, painter; 6, carpenter; 7, car and wagon builder; 8, plumber; 9, saw doctor; 10, turner; 11, tinsmith; 12, trimmer; 13, watch and clock repairer; 14, conversmith 14, coppersmith.

16.-No new designation.

No new designation shall be introduced during the currency of this agreement so as to reduce the status of any worker covered thereby.

17.—No reduction. This agreement shall not in itself operate to reduce the wages of any worker who is at present receiving above the minimum rates prescribed for his class of work.

18.-Under-rate Workers.

A worker who is unable to earn the minimum rate hereby prescribed may be employed at a lower rate, which shall be agreed upon in writing between the worker and the Secretary of the worker's Union. If within seven days after being notified of the worker's desire to work at a lower rate of wage than that prescribed, the said Secretary and worker are unable to agree upon the said Secretary and worker are unable to agree upon a lower rate, then the worker may apply in writing to the nearest Resident or Police Magistrate to fix such lower rate of wage. The worker shall give such Secre-tary two days' notice in writing of his intention to apply to the Magistrate, and the said Secretary or his agent may attend and oppose the application. The Magistrate may fix the rate of wage, and his decision shall be final. shall be final.

Any worker whose wage shall have been so fixed may work for and be employed by an employer for such wage for the period of six calendar months thereafter, and, after the expiration of the said period, until fourteen days' notice in writing shall have been given him by the Secretary of the Union requiring his wage to be again fixed in the manner prescribed by this clause.

19.—Secretary's pass. The General Manager shall grant leave, without pay, for a continuous period or otherwise of thirty days in each year to the Secretary of the Union (should such each year to the Secretary of the Onion (Should such Secretary be a railway worker) to enable him to attend exclusively to the union work, and a free pass will be issued to the said Secretary, whether he be an employee or not, for that period, but the pass may be withdrawn at the General Manager's discretion. Such pass shall be used exclusively for Railway Union work, and not for political numbers political purposes.

20.-Charges against workers.

(a) Each worker shall himself provide, when called upon, with the least possible delay, any report or state-ment which may be required by the officer in charge. (b) When a worker against whom a charge is pend

which statement the officer in charge has taken down in writing, such worker shall either be furnished with a copy of such statement or be allowed to take a copy of it.

(c) If a final decision in any case in which a charge has been made against a worker be not given within three calendar months from the time when the offence comes to the knowledge of the Company, the charge in question shall lapse.

21.-Preference to Unionists.

Preference shall be given to unionists with regard to Preference shall be given to unions with regard to employment, where the work for which they are to be employed is estimated to exceed one week; provided that, in connection with casual construction and casual maintenance work, this period may be extended to three weeks. This clause shall not apply to juniors and apprentices.

22 .- Shop Stewards.

Subject to the recognition of properly constituted authority shop stewards to be appointed by the Union, shall be recognised by the General Manager.

23.-Boards of Reference.

(a) The Arbitration Court appoints for the purposes of the agreement Boards of Reference. The Boards shall each consist of a chairman and two other representa-tives nominated by the parties. There are assigned to such Boards, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the agreement, the functions of:

(i) Classifying and fixing wages, rates and conditions for any machine, occupation, or calling not specifically mentioned in the agreement;

(ii) Adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the agree

as involve interpretations of the provisions of the agreement or any of them.
(iii) Deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to the Board from time to time.
(b) Separate Boards may be appointed for different sections corresponding to the occupations, callings or vocations referred to in this Agreement, and/or for different district. ferent districts.

24.-Alterations and Additions.

If during the currency of an award or agreement between the Company and the Union or Unions represent-ing its employees any alteration or addition to an existing award or agreement between the Commissioner of Railways and a Union or Unions representing his employees is agreed upon, the Union shall notify the Com-pany within ten days after any alteration or addition has been agreed to, and such alteration or addition shall automatically apply to the employees of the Company from the same date as it applies to the employees of the Commissioner, provided, that should the Company, within twenty-one days of any such alteration or addition being made, notify in writing the Union or Unions concerned that the Company objects to being bound by such alteration or addition, and within the same period of twenty-one days submits the question or questions involved for the decision of the Court of Arbitration, the question of whether the Company shall be bound by the said alteration or addition shall be subject to the determination of the Court, whose decision, if in the affirmative shall operate as from the date the alteration or addition here are consting in the Garayment Service or addition became operative in the Government service.

Part II.—Traffic, Running Sheds (other than Trades-men and their Assistants), and Advertising Section.

25.-Hours of Duty.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided, forty-four hours exclusive of Sunday work, shall constitute a week's work. In the case of special class signalmen thirty-six hours (exclusive of Sunday work) shall constitute a week's work. The week's work may be extended over

five or six days at the option of the General Manager. (b) The General Manager shall arrange as far as practicable, that shifts shall not exceed eight hours, and, except in cases of emergency where relief cannot be provided a worker shall not be required to remain on duty at his home or temporary home station for more then how than ten hours.

(c) Except at country stations where the train arrangements render it impracticable, each day's work of eight hours shall be completed within ten hours from

the time of starting. (d) Except in cases of emergency, unless due to regular rotation of shifts, no Head Shunter, Shunter or Signalman shall be called upon to work more than ten hours continuously, or shall be called on duty until he has had at least twelve hours off. In this subclause the word "emergency" shall not be construed to cover a unere increase of traffic which could have been foreseen, and might reasonably have been provided for without

encroaching on the twelve-hour rule. (c) The present practice of calling Shunters when rostered for duty outside their ordinary shifts shall be continued.

(f) No member of the Running Staff, including a Shunter, shall be rostered for less than four hours in any one day.

(g) Except in cases of emergency, juniors shall not be employed (except to act as Call-boys) between the hours of midnight and 6 a.m., but may be required, whilst not calling; to attend to telephone and to sweep, dust, and clean.

(h) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to office cleaners (female), whose hours of duty and con-ditions shall remain as they are at present.

26.—Guaranteed Week. (a) The General Manager shall guarantee to each (a) The General Manager shall guarantee to each worker, other than a casual, a full week's work, exclu-sive of Sunday work, except during such period as by reason of any action on the part of any section of his employees, or for any other cause beyond his control, he is unable, wholly or partially to carry on the run-ning of the trains or Workshops. Each week shall stand by itself by itself.

(b) The guaranteed period may be reduced as follows

(i) In respect of Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Labour Day, one day for each in the weekly period in which the holiday occurs;

(ii) In respect of workers in or about a goods shed, one day for each goods shed holiday, not to exceed three days in any period of twelve months, in addition to Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Labour Day, in the weekly period in which the holiday occurs; (iii) In respect of any worker under suspension, pro-vided that any worker suspended on a charge which is

not sustained shall be entitled to the benefit of the guarantee during the period of his suspension;

(iv) In respect to office cleaners (female), the guar-antee period may be reduced by such time as is necessary to maintain the hours of work as at present.

27.—Overtime, Sunday Time, and Holiday Time. (a) All time, exclusive of Sunday time, worked over the hours fixed for a week's work shall be paid for at

(b) (i) All time worked in excess of ten hours (and in the case of special class signalmen eight hcurs) in any one shift shall be paid for at the rate of time and a-half for the first two hours, and thereafter double time. This paragraph shall not apply to conductors.

(ii) The time on which the penalty rate has been paid for on a daily basis will not be subject to the penalty rate on a weekly basis. (iii) The overtime rate shall be computed on the rate

(ii) The overtime rate shall be computed on the rate applicable to the day on which the time is worked.
(iv) This subclause shall not apply to conductors, whose overtime shall remain as at present.
(c) Subject to Subclause (b) (iii) the time worked on Sundays, Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Labour Day shall be paid for at the rate of time and a-half.
(d) The mericine of the characterial not apple to the subclause of the rate of the part of the part of the part of the subclause.

(d) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to office cleaners (female) whose hours of duty and conditions shall remain as they are at present.

(e) Any worker brought on to work outside his ordinary hours shall, except when such work, exclusive of meal times, is continuous with his ordinary shift, be paid a minimum of two hours' pay at ordinary rates, provided that the worker shall not be obliged to work for the two hours if the job for which he has been brought on has been completed in less time.

(f) An employee brought on duty on Sunday shall be paid a minimum of four hours' pay at the rate applicable to that day.

(g) Goods, shed employees, when called on to do duty on any holiday shall be paid for not less than four hours, provided that the worker shall not be obliged to work for the four hours if the job for which he was brought on has been completed in less time; provided further, that in the case of Good Friday, Christmas Day, and Labour Day the said employee shall be paid when called on for duty, for not less than eight hours, at ordinary rates, and shall not be obliged to work for

(h) The provisions of Subclauses (b) to (g), both inclusive, shall not apply to watchmen or waiting-room attendants, who shall be paid at the rate of time and a-quarter for all time worked in excess of ten hours in any one shift and for all time worked on Sundays.

-Allowances and Arrangements for Guards.

(a) Any guard rostered for duty and being informed that he is not required shall, unless he has been notified as provided in Subclause (e), be paid two hours' pay at ordinary rates, but may be called for further duty without any further period of rest.

(b) Any guard going out on traffic shall be paid not less than four hours' pay at ordinary rates, and no guard shall be called to work more than twice in one day.

(c) A guard attending at a depot with a hamper for a trip for which he is booked and which is cancelled, or who shall have received less than two hours'

notice of the cancellation of a trip requiring a hamper, shall be allowed five shillings in respect of such hamper.

(d) Any guard having to proceed on any away-from-home job with less than four hours' notice shall be paid an amount of five shillings in addition to ordinary ex-penses. A guard notified between 6 p.m. and 8 a.m. of a ''book-off'' job requiring him to come on duty between these hours shall receive an allowance of five

or a "book-off" job requiring him to come on duty between these hours shall receive an allowance of five shillings in addition to ordinary expenses. (e) No guard rostered for duty shall be entitled to any pay or allowance when notice that he is not required has been left at his place of residence at least two' hours before his rostered time. (f) Guards of goods and mixed trains shall be allowed thirty minutes before departure time to prove for

(1) Guards of goods and mixed trains shall be anowed thirty minutes before departure time to prepare for their trip, and where the distance between the place where they sign on and where they commence duty' exceeds a quarter of a mile, they shall be allowed an extra five minutes for each quarter of a mile in excess thereof.

Other guards shall be allowed fifteen minutes to prepare before starting on a trip. All guards shall be allowed fifteen minutes at the close

of each shift.

In cases where guards take over trains en route, fifteen minutes allowance only will be made.

The time under this subclause may be increased where the work to be performed warrants such increase.

Save as herein provided nothing in this subclause shall operate to reduce the time at present allowed to any guard so long as present conditions remain unaltered.

(g) Any guard booked off shall come on duty at such time as he may be directed before leaving the station by the responsible person in charge or by the roster posted at the station. Except in cases of emergency, or unless in special cases by agreement between the Union and the General Manager, the minimum time a guard shall be off duty at home station shall be twelve hours, and at foreign stations eight hours for the first time he is booked off after leaving the home station, and ten hours for every subsequent time that he is booked off before returning to the home station. In In cases of emergency, unless for good reason to the contrary, the guard who has been off duty the longest shall 'emergency' shall not be called on. In this subclause the word 'emergency' shall not be construed to cover a mere increase of traffic which could have been foreseen and might reasonably have been provided for without en-croaching on the twelve-hour rule.

(h) The present practice in regard to the calling of guards shall be continued.

(i) At home stations, should a guard not be able to ascertain when booking off, from the responsible person as derived when booking on, from the responsible person in charge or from the roster, when he will be required for further work, he shall be free to assume that he will not be required for twelve hours, but at the expiration of that time shall make personal inquiries at the depot as to when he will be required. If not then informed when he will be required, written notice shall be left at his place of residence at least two hours before he is required to go on dury, provided that if the twelve required to go on duty: provided that, if the twelve hours expire after 5 p.m. and before 7 a.m. he shall not be required to make such inquiries until 8 a.m. fol-

lowing. (j) Any guard standing by at a foreign station shall be allowed full time when not booked off and half time when booked off, up to five hours, if not required for active duty until the expiration of five hours, he shall be booked off.

(k) Where practicable all guards shall be worked on a weekly roster. When there is no weekly roster a roster shall, when practicable, be posted daily not later than 2 p.m., except on Saturdays, when it shall be posted not later than 12 noon. The roster posted on Saturday shall show both Sunday's and Monday's working.

(1) Six shifts will constitute a week's work, except in special cases of unavoidable short runs, such special cases to be arranged between the General Manager and the Union.

(m) If less than forty-four hours have been worked in the six shifts, the time for the six shifts will be made up to forty-four hours, and the seventh shift will be paid for at-

(i) ordinary rate for time equivalent to time made up; (ii) overtime rate for balance.

29.-Time-table Conferences.

An employee of the General Manager (such employee to be a member of and to be nominated by the Union) shall be permitted to attend the half-yearly time-table

Conferences as representative of the Union, and may take part in any discussion as to whether any particular piece of night work involved in the proposed time-table could be avoided. The employee so acting shall be paid by the General Manager his ordinary wages, travelling time, and expenses as provided in this agreement.

30.-Knowledge of Roads.

Except in the case of new lines opened for traffic, and so far as the requirements of the service will per-mit, a guard, before being required to take a train over a road with which he is not acquainted, shall be allowed to travel over it at least twice with a guard familiar with the road, without loss of pay. Should the exigen-cies of the service require a guard to be sent over a road with which he is not acquainted, the Station-master shall report the circumstances to the Head of the Branch.

31.-Away from Home and Meal Allowances.

(a) The following allowances shall be granted to workers specified in this section of the agreement who are booked off or temporarily lodging away from their home station:-

(i) For the first thirty hours or part thereof: Where attended barracks are provided—five shillings. Where unattended barracks are provided—six shillings. Where there are no barracks—seven shillings.
(ii) After the first thirty hours and up to seven

days the sum of four pence per hour, and thereafter three pence per hour; provided that the reduction from four pence to three pence shall only be made in cases where the worker shall be stationed for over seven days in one place; provided that a deduction of one shilling per day or night, with a maximum of five shillings per week, shall be made where attended barracks are provided, and a deduction of six pence per day or night, with a maximum of two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per week, shall be made where un-attended barracks are provided. No such deduction shall be made if the worker returns to his home station within forty-four hours.

(b) The allowance shall be calculated from the time of booking on to the time of booking off at home station.

(c) In addition to the allowance provided for in Subclause (a), a worker booked off or temporarily lodging in a district carrying an allowance shall be granted such allowance, or, if already in receipt of a district allowance, shall be granted the difference between such allowance and any higher allowance applicable to the district in which he is booked off or lodging. A day's allowance to be granted for the first thirty hours or any part thereof and each subsequent twentyfour hours or part thereof; time to be calculated from time of departure from home station to time of departure from foreign station.

(d) The General Manager may in his discretion make any allowance in addition to those provided in the foregoing subclauses, and the Head of the Branch shall also have discretion to make any such additional allowance as may under the circumstances be justified. (e) Any worker other than a guard who is not tem-

porarily lodging away from his home station, and who two shillings (2s.) for his second and each succeeding meal: Provided that any worker who in fact incurs expense in procuring his first meal shall be entitled to be paid two shillings (2s.) in provided that any to be paid two shillings (2s.) in respect thereof.

(f) Workers shall not be booked off away from their home station for two Sundays in succession where it can be avoided by any reasonable arrangement.

(g) Married workers temporarily transferred for a period exceeding three months, but which is not expected to exceed six months, for the purpose of meet-ing seasonal or exceptional or temporary traffic, and not moving their permanent homes will be paid a weekly allowance of twenty-five shillings (25s.) in lieu of transfer or lodging allowance to cover the excess cost of living away from their homes.

Provided that, should any other lodging allowance become due to a worker whilst transferred, such allowance together with the allowance provided for in the foregoing paragraph, shall in no case exceed the allow-ance payable under subclause (a).

(h) Where workers are employed on a series of works up and down the line, and are provided with sleeping accommodation in tents or vans, the removal of tents or vans from one place to another will not for the purpose of subclause (\hat{g}) be deemed to have altered their headquarters.

(i) The foregoing allowances will not be paid:-

(i) during any period of absence from duty without pay unless such absence is due to sickness of the worker and does not exceed one week;

(ii) during any period of annual leave.

Part III .- Way and Works Section.

32.—Hours of Duty. (a) Forty-four hours, exclusive of Sunday time, shall constitute a week's work. No day's work shall exceed eight hours forty-eight minutes without payment of over-time. The week's work may be extended over five cr six days at the option of the General Manager. (b) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to

office cleaners (female), whose hours of duty and con-ditions shall remain as they are at present.

33 .- Guaranteed week.

(a) The General Manager shall guarantee to each worker, other than a casual, a full week's work, exclusive of Sunday work, except during such period as by reason of any action on the part of any section of his employees or for any other cause beyond his control, he is unable to wholly or partially to carry on the running of the trains or workshops. Each week shall stand by itself.

(b) The guaranteed period may be reduced as follows:

(i) In respect to Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Labour Day, one day for each in the weekly period in which the holiday occurs; (ii) In respect of any worker under suspension;

provided that any worker suspended on a charge which is not sustained shall be entitled to the benefit of the guarantee during the period of his suspension

(iii) In respect of office cleaners (female) the guarantee period may be reduced by such time as is necessary to maintain the hours of work as at present.

34.-Overtime, Sunday Time, and Holiday Time.

(a) (i) All time worked in excess of the usual working hours in any one day shall be paid at the rate of time and a-quarter for the first two hours and time and a-half for the next two hours and thereafter double time; provided that double time shall be paid for overtime on all work other than work for any department (ii) Extra rates shall be computed on the rate ap-

plicable to the day on which the time is worked; provided that double time shall be the maximum.

viaced that double time shall be the maximum.
(b) Subject to Subclause (a) (ii) time worked on Sundays, Christmas Day, Good Friday, or Labour Day shall be paid for at the rate of time and a-half.
(c) All time worked during the usual meal time by any worker at his home station shall be paid for at overtime rates, and such rates shall continue until the worker knocks off for his meal.
(d) Any worker brought on to work outside his or-

(d) Any worker brought on to work outside his ordinary working hours shall except when such work ex-clusive of meal times is continuous with his ordinary shift, be paid a minimum of two hours' pay at ordin-ary rates, and provided that the worker shall not be obliged to work for the two hours if the job for which he has been brought on has been completed in less time.

(e) Any worker brought on duty on Sunday shall be paid a minimum of four hours at the rate applicable to that day, and shall not be required to work for the four hours if the work for which he is brought on duty does not last that period. Any worker brought on duty on Christmas Day, Good Friday, or Labour Day shall be paid a minimum of eight hours' pay at ordinary rates, and should the work for which he is brought on duty not last the full eight hours, he shall

brought on duty not last the full eight hours, he shall not be required to work for the full eight hours. (f) The provisions of Subclauses (a) to (e) (both inclusive) shall not apply to watchmen, who shall be paid at rate of time and a-quarter for all time worked in excess of ten hours in any one shift, and for all time worked on Sundays.

35 .- Away-from-home and Meal Allowance.

(a) The following allowances shall be granted to workers temporarily lodging away from their home station:

Where unattended barracks are used-6s. 6d. Where barracks are not used-8s.

(ii) After the first twenty-four hours at the rate of 4d. per hour;

(iii) After the first twenty-four hours a charge of 1s. per night with a maximum of 5s. per week shall be made where accommodation of barracks other than a van is provided, and a charge of 6d. per night with a maximum of two shillings and sixpence per week shall be made where barracks in the shape of van or tent, bed and blankets are provided.

(b) It will be optional for the workers to use the barracks and/or the General Manager to allow them to do so. If used, after the first twenty-four hours a charge of one shilling (1s.) per night, with a maximum of five shillings (5s.) per week, shall be made for attended barracks, and a charge of sixpence (6d.) per night, with a maximum of two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per week for unattended barracks.

(c) The allowance shall be calculated from the time of leaving to the time of returning to the home station.

(d) In addition to the allowance provided for in Subclause (a) a worker booked off or temporarily lodging in a district carrying an allowance shall be granted such allowance, or if already in receipt of a district allowance, shall be granted the difference be-tween such allowance and any higher allowance applic-able to the district in which he is backed off or lodge able to the district in which he is booked off or lodg-ing. A day's allowance to be granted for the first thirty hours or any part thereof, and each subsequent twenty-four hours or part thereof; time to be calculated from time of departure from home station to time of departure from foreign station.

(e) A worker absent from his home station on duty (not being a worker temporarily lodging away from his home station) shall be paid two shillings (2s.) for his second and each succeeding meal; provided that any worker who, in fact, incurs expense in providing his first meal shall be entitled to be paid two shillings (2s.) in respect thereof.

(f) The above subclauses shall not apply to gangers and repairers at out-camps on their own lengths, but they shall be granted one shilling and sixpence for each night during which their gang is stationed at an out-camp:

Provided that until otherwise mutually agreed between the parties the gangs attending to the present lengths embracing Bullsbrook and Bookara shall not be entitled to any away-from-home allowance when camped at those two stations.

(g) The General Manager may in his discretion make any allowance in addition to those provided in the foregoing subclauses, and the Head of the Branch shall also have discretion to make any such additional allowances, not exceeding seven shillings and sixpence (7s. 6d.) per day.

(h) Married workers temporarily transferred for a period exceeding three months but which is not expected to exceed six months, and not moving their permanent homes, will be paid a weekly allowance of twenty-five shillings (25s.) in lieu of transfer or lodging allowance to cover the excess cost of living away from their homes; provided that, should any other lodging allow-ance become due to a worker whilst transferred, such allowance, together with the allowance provided for in the foregoing paragraph, shall in no case exceed the allowance payable under Subclause (a).

(i) Where workers are employed on a series of works up and down the line, and are provided with sleeping accommodation in tents or vans, the removal of tents or vans from one place to another will not for the pur-pose of Sub-clause (h) be deemed to have altered their headquarters.

(j) The foregoing allowances will not be paid-

- (i) during any period of absence from duty with-out pay, unless such absence is due to sick-ness of the worker and does not exceed one week;
- (ii) during any period of annual leave.

36 .--- Workers in Breakdown Gangs.

Workers in breakdown gangs shall, in lieu of away-from-home allowance and travelling time, be provided with board and sleeping accommodation, and shall be paid from the time they leave until they return to their home station, except during such period as they shall be booked off duty, if such period shall exceed ten con-secutive hours. Time occupied in travelling shall be paid at bare time rates. Actual working time shall be paid at overtime rates after eight hours' work per day.

Part IV.—Workshops (including Tradesmen and their Assistants at Running Sheds) and Stores Section.

37.-Hours of Duty. Forty-four hours, exclusive of Sunday time, shall constitute a week's work. No day's work shall exceed eight hours forty-eight minutes without payment of overtime. The week's work may extend over five or six days at the option of the General Manager.

38.—Guaranteed Week.

38.—Guaranteed Week. (a) The General Manager shall guarantee to each worker, other than a casual, a full week's work, ex-clusive of Sunday work, except during such period as by reason of any action on the part of any section of his employees, or for any other cause beyond his control he is unable wholly or partially to carry on the running of the trains or workshops. Each week shall stand by itself itself.

(b) The guaranteed period may be reduced as follows:

(i) In respect to Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Labour Day, one day for each in the weekly period in which the holiday occurs;

(ii) in respect of Easter Monday and Anzac Day, one day for each in the weekly period in which the holi-day occurs, should the adult workers concerned decide by vote that a holiday shall be observed. This vote shall be taken not more than four weeks and not less than two weeks before the holiday occurs. Returned soldiers shall not be entitled to vote in respect of Anzae Day;

(iii) in respect of any worker under suspension: Provided that any worker suspended on a charge which is not sustained, shall be entitled to the benefit of the guarantee during the period of his suspension. (iv) in respect of any day when, as the result of a

vote taken by the workers concerned with the consent of the General Manager, or by agreement between the Union and the General Manager, a holiday is taken.

39 .-- Overtime, Sunday Time, and Holiday Time.

(a) (i) All time worked in excess of the usual work-ing hours in any one day shall be paid at the rate of time and a-quarter for the first two hours and time and a-half for the next two hours, and thereafter double time; provided that double time shall be paid for overtime on all work other than work for any department of the State.

(ii) Extra rates shall be computed on the rate applicable to the day on which the time is worked; provided that double time (*i.e.*, twice the ordinary rates) shall be the maximum.

(b) Subject to Subclause (a) (ii) time worked on Sundays, Christmas Day, Good Friday, or Labour Day shall be paid for at the rate of time and a-half. (c) All time worked during the usual meal time by any worker at his home station shall be paid for at superting worker and such water shall continue uptil the

overtime rates and such rates shall continue until the worker knocks off for his meal.

(d) Any worker brought on duty for any purpose outside his ordinary working hours shall be paid a minimum of two hours; provided such work, exclusive of meal time, is not continuous with his shift, and pro-vided that the worker shall not be obliged to work for two hours if the job for which he has been brought on has been completed in less time.

has been completed in less time. (c) Any worker brought on duty on a Sunday or holiday shall be paid a minimum of four hours' pay at the rate applicable to that day, and he shall not be required to work for the four hours, if the work for which he is brought on does not last that time. Any worker brought on duty on Christmas Day, Good Fri-day, or Labour Day shall be paid a minimum of eight hours' pay at ordinary rates, and he shall not be re-quired to work for that period if the work for which he is brought on is completed before that time.

(f) The provisions of Subclauses (a) to (e) (both inclusive) shall not apply to watchmen, who shall be paid at rate of time and a-quarter for all time worked in excess of ten hours in any one shift, and for all time worked on Sundays.

40.-Shift Work.

(a) Whenever shift work is required all shifts except the day shift shall be paid for at the rate of time and a-quarter.

(b) Work other than day shift shall not be recognised as night shift, unless five consecutive nights are worked, but shall be deemed to be overtime; provided that where a shift is not worked on account of a holiday, such shift shall, for the purpose of this clause, be counted as if it had been worked.

(c) Overtime or night shift shall be calculated on the basis of the rate paid for night shift.

41.—Away-from-home and Meal Allowances.

(a) The following allowances shall be granted to orkers temporarily lodging away from their home workers station:-

(i) For the first twenty-four hours or part thereof:-Where attended barracks are used ... 6s. 0d. Where unattended barracks are used 6s. 6d.

Time occupied in travelling shall be paid at bare time rates. Actual working time shall be paid at overtime rates after eight hours' work per day.

SCHEDULE.

Apprentices.

1. (a) Applicants for apprenticeship to the General Manager who comply with the Company's regulations as to educational qualifications shall be invited to appear before an Apprentices' Selection Board, free passes over the Company's railway being issued for the purpose. No alteration shall be made to the aforesaid regulation without the concurrence of the Union concerned; failing agreement, the matter to be referred to the Court of Arbitration for settlement. (b) The Apprentices' Selection Board shall consist of

- A Chairman appointed by the General Manager.
 The Workshops Foreman of the trade or calling concerned.
- (3) A representative Tradesman from each trade to be appointed by the Unions concerned, to be selected from and by the Tradesman in each trade employed by the General Manager.

(c) The Board shall orally examine each applicant who appears before it, but if required by the Board the candidate shall submit himself to a written examination. The Board shall select the required number from those whom it considers the most suitable and place them in the order for engagement.

(d) As vacancies for apprentices occur, the selected applicants shall be called up in the order in which they have been placed by the Board, provided that selected applicants attaining the age of seventeen years before engagement shall be written off the list.

(e) The employment of any selected candidate will be subject to his passing the Company's medical exam-ination, the cost of which not to exceed five shillings shall be borne by the applicant.

2. (a) An apprentice shall serve a probationary period of three months. At the end of the first and period of three months. At the end of the first and third months the Workshops Foreman of the trade con-cerned shall report as to the probationer's suitability or otherwise, and at the end of the third month, if mutually agreed upon by the General Manager and the legal guardian of the boy he shall be indentured for five years, the probationary period to form part of the term of a unpruliaching term of apprenticeship. (b) An apprentice taken on probation shall, within

fourteen days thereafter be registered by the General Manager by means of notice thereof to the Registrar in the form prescribed.

(c) The Court may in any case where it seems expedient to do so, order that the probationary period be extended for a further term not exceeding three months.

(d) A probationer shall work for such hours per day and for such remuneration as is prescribed by this agreement. 3. Ever

Every agreement of apprenticeship shall be subject to the provisions of the agreement in force for the

time being applicable to apprenticeship in the industry. 4. (a) Each apprentice shall during each year of his apprenticeship attend the Technical School classes as arranged by the Company. Separate classes appro-priate to each trade or calling shall be provided, viz., Grade 1, Grade 2, Grade 3, and Advanced Classes. When directed the apprentice shall report to the Technical School Instructor, who will decide in what class he shall be placed.

(b) The Director of Education, shall, at the begin-(b) The Director of Education, shall, at the begin-ning of each year, draw up a syllabus showing the course from the various classes for the year. Such syllabus shall, where possible, include theory as applied to the trade, craft, ocupation or calling to which the appreu-tices are indentured. A copy of such syllabus shall be furnished to each Union concerned, and shall be subject to review by the Court of Arbitration.

(c) At the end of the first and second terms in each year the Director of Technical Education shall report to the Head of the Branch in which the apprentice is employed on the attendance, conduct, attention, aptitude, and progress of each apprentice and upon any other matter calling for attention.

(d) An apprentice joining after the third term has commenced shall not sit for that year's annual examination, but shall commence his technical education when the school re-opens after the Christmas vacation.

(e) Every apprentice shall be bound to submit him-self to examination at the places and time fixed by the Director of Technical Education.

(f) Every apprentice shall, prior to submitting him-self to examination, produce to the Examiners a certificate that he has made at least 70 per centum of attend-ances at the Technical School or other place of instruction, unless he is exempted from such attendance under the provisions hereof or for other good cause. (g) If the General Manager or the industrial Union

concerned make representations to the Court that the facilities provided by the Technical School, or other place of vocational training for the teaching of appren-tices, are inadequate, the Court may make such investi-gations and such reports to the Minister controlling such Technical School or such other place, as it deems

(h) Where in any case it is shown to the satisfaction of the Court that any apprentice, by reason of his engagement on country work or other good cause cannot conveniently attend a Technical School or other prescribed classes, such of these provisions as relate to at-tendance at a Technical School or other prescribed classes, and to examinations, shall not apply to such apprentice, but he shall be subject to such conditions as the Court may direct.

(i) The term of apprenticeship may be extended by the Court on the failure of an apprentice to pass any of the examinations, and for such purpose it shall be the duty of the General Manager to make any necessary recommendation to the Court. Any extension of the term of apprenticeship shall be subject to all the con-ditions and stipulations in the original agreement except as to rates of wages, which shall be such amounts as the Court may determine.

(j) Upon the failure of an apprentice to pass two consecutive examinations it shall be the duty of the General Manager to report same to the Court with a recommendation as to the cancellation of the apprenticeship agreement or such other remedial measures (*i.e.*, increased time for Technical instruction) as he may deem advisable. The Court, after notice to all parties concerned, may cancel the agreement or make such other order, as it may deem necessary. (k) A certificate shall be issued to each apprentice

showing the percentage of marks obtained in each sub-ject for which he sat at the annual Technical examination, with remarks from the Head of the Branch as to the manner in which he has carried out his practical work during the preceding year.

(1) The General Manager shall submit a report to the Court in writing, accompanied by the examiners' reports, as to the result of the annual examination with-in one month of the date thereof.

(m) Upon the completion of the period of training prescribed for apprenticeship, each apprentice shall be required to pass the final examination test to the sat-isfaction of the examiners, and upon passing this test shall be provided with a certificate to that effect.

The apprentice shall be placed under the super 4. vision of a leading hand tradesman, who will teach and instruct or cause the apprentice to be taught and in-structed in his trade or craft. Such leading tradesman shall once in every quarter, for each apprentice under his control, submit a report regarding the skill, knowledge, aptitude and industry of the apprentice and the made during the quarter. progress

5. Time lost in any one year, except as hereinatter provided, shall be without pay, and shall be made up at the conclusion of each separate period of twelve months at the rate fixed for the period during which such time was lost, and the increased rate of wages shall not apply until such lost time (if any) has been fully made Provided that this clause shall not apply to-

up. Provided that this clause snan not apply to (i) Time absent attending compulsory naval or multary training other than time imposed through failure to become efficient or while undergoing confinement for an offence under the Defence Act.

(ii) Time lost due to accidents on duty.

(iii) Time lost through holidays prescribed by this agreement.

(iv) Time lost by duly certified sickness not due to the apprentices' own misconduct or wilful default up to a maximum of four weeks in any one year.

(v) Time occupied attending Technical classes as prescribed during ordinary working hours.

6. The General Manager shall pay the apprentice in respect of time lost through compulsory naval or military training (other than the additional training mentioned in Clause 5, Subclause (i) above), the amount by which the wages prescribed by this agreement exceeds the amount received by the apprentice from the Depart-ment of Defence.

Where time lost through sickness exceeds four consecutive working days, the General Manager may demand from the apprentice the production of a medical certificate, and a further such certificate or certificates may be required if any time is lost through sickness within seven days from the date of resumption of duty, the cost, if any, of such certificate or certificates not exceeding five shillings to be borne by the General Manager.

8. No minor shall (except as a junior worker under the provisions of this agreement), be employed or engaged in the industry except subject to the conditions of apprenticeship or probationership herein contained.

9. The General Manager shall be deemed to undertake the duty which he agrees to perform as a duty enforceable under this agreement.

10. (a) The apprenticeship agreement shall be com-pleted within one month of the end of the probationary period.

(b) All agreements of apprenticeship shall be drawn up on a form approved by the Court and signed by the Head of the Branch on behalf of the General Manager, the legal guardian of the apprentice, the apprentice, and the Registrar. The General Manager, guardian, or the Registrar. apprentice shall not enter into any agreement or ander-(c) There shall be three copies of each agreement, of which one shall be held by the General Manager,

the legal guardian of the apprentice, and the Registrar.

11. Every agreement of apprenticeship cutered into shall contain— (i) The names and addresses of the parties to the

agreement.

(ii) The date of birth of the apprentice.

(iii) A description of the trade, industry, craft, oc-cupation or calling or combination thereof to which the apprentice is to be bound.

(iv) The date at which the apprenticeship is to commence and the period thereof.

(v) A condition requiring the apprentice to obey all reasonable directions of the employer and requiring the employer and apprentice to comply with the terms of the relative industrial agreement so far as they concern the apprentice.

(vi) A condition that technical instruction of the apprentice when available shall be at the employer's expense; and in the employer's time, except in places where such instruction is given after the ordinary working hours.

(vii) A condition that in the event of the apprentice, in the opinion of the examiners, not progressing satisfactorily, increased time for technical instruction shall be allowed at the employer's expense to enable such apprentice to reach the necessary standard.

(viii) The general conditions of apprenticeship.

(ix) A provision that it may be cancelled by mutual consent by the employer and the legal guardian of the apprentice, giving one month's notice in writing to the Court and to the parties concerned that such apprenticeship shall be terminated.

12. The Court shall have the power to transfer an apprentice from one employer to another either tem-

porarily or permanently:--(i) If the employer does not provide the necessary facilities for the apprentice to become proficient in his

trade, or (ii) Upon the application of the employer or the apprentice for good cause shown.

(a) The transfer of every agreement shall be 13. on a form approved by the Court and shall be made out in quadruplicate and shall, unless the Court otherwise directs, be signed by the late employer or his assigns, the legal guardian of the apprentice, the apprentice, the Registrar, and the new employer. The transfer form shall be completed within two months of the date on which the transfer is effected.

(b) One copy each of the form of transfer shall be held by the late employer, the new employer, the legal guardian of the apprentice, and the Registrar.

14. Should the General Manager at any time before the determination of the period of apprenticeship wish to dispense with the services of the apprentices in the may, with the consent of the apprentice and guardian, transfer him to another employer carrying on business within a reasonable distance of the original employer's place of business who is willing to continue to teach the apprentice and pay the rate of wages prescribed by the Court in its award or otherwise according to the total length of time served and generally to perform the obligations of the original employer.

15. In the event of an employer being unable to provide work for the apprentice or to agree with the legal guardian of the apprentice to cancel the agreement or to arrange a transfer, application may be made to the Court to arrange for such transfer or to have such agreement cancelled.

16. When an apprentice cannot be usefully em-ployed because of a strike, the General Manager shall be relieved of his obligations under the apprenticeship agreement for the period of the strike.

17. The General Manager shall keep every apprentice constantly at work and teach or cause him to be taught the industries, crafts, occupations or callings in relation to which he is bound apprentice, by competent instruction in a gradual and complete manner, and shall give him a reasonable opportunity to learn the same and receive during the period of his apprentice-ship such technical trade and general instruction and training as may be necessary. And every apprentice shall, during the period of his apprenticeship, faith-fully serve the General Manager for the purpose of being taught the industry, craft, occupation or calling in relation to which he is bound, and shall also conscientiously and regularly accept such technical trade and general instruction and training as aforesaid, in addition to the teaching that may be provided by the General Manager.

18. The number of apprentices shall not exceed the proportion of one to every two or fraction of the first two journeymen employed in shop work.

For the purpose of ascertaining the number of 19. apprentices allowed to be taken at any time, the average number of journeymen employed on all working days of the twelve months immediately preceding such time shall be deemed to be the number of journeymen employed.

20.On the transfer or termination of any apprenticeship from whatever cause, the General Manager shall give the apprentice a certificate stating what time he has served, full particulars of the branches of the trade or industry in which he has received instruc-tion, the proficiency attained, and shall also notify the Clerk of the Court and the cause thereof.

21. No apprentice employed under a registered agreement shall be discharged by the General Manager for alleged misconduct until the registration of the agreement of apprenticeship has been cancelled by Manager. Provided, however, that an apprentice may be suspended for misconduct by the General Manager, but in any such case the General Manager shall forthwith make application for cancellation of the agreement of apprenticeship and in the event of the Court refusing same the wages of the apprentice or such por-tion thereof as the Court may order shall be paid as from the date of such suspension, and in the event of the application for cancellation being granted, such order may take effect from the date when the apprentice was suspended.

22. The word "apprentice" wherever used herein means any male of any age who is apprenticed to learn or to be taught any industry, trade, craft, or calling to which this Agreement applies, and includes an apprentice on probation.

23.(a) The General Manager shall not refuse employment to any person, or dismiss any employee from his employment, or injure him in his employment or alter his position to his prejudice, by reason merely of the fact that the employee is a member of any Advisory Committee or Board or by reason merely of anything said or done or omitted to be done by any such person or employee in the course of his duty as such member.

(b) In any proceeding for any contravention of this regulation it shall lie upon the General Manager to show that any person proved to have been refused employment or any employee proved to have been dismissed or injured in his employment or prejudiced whilst acting as such member, was refused employment or dismissed or injured in his employment or prejudiced for some reason other than that mentioned in this regulation.

24. The Registrar shall prepare and keep a roll of apprentices containing-

- (a) a record of all apprentices and probationers placed with employers;
- (b) a record of the progress of each apprentice, recording the result of the examiners' reports.

25. Every industrial Inspector appointed in pursu-ance of the provisions of "The Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1925," shall have the power to enter any premises, make such inspection of the premises, plant, machinery, or work upon which any apprentice is em-ployed or could be employed, interview any apprentice. or employee, examine any books or documents of the business relating to the wages and conditions of apprentices, interrogate the employer in regard to any of

the above-mentioned matters. 26. The forms supplied by the Arbitration Court will be used in connection with all apprenticeships.

THE INDUSTRIAL ARBITRATION ACT, 1912-1925. Engine-drivers and Firemen's-Federated (Union Plaster Co., Ltd.).

(Registered 21-3-30.)

No. 1 of 1930.

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of "The Indus-trial Arbitration Act, 1912-1925," this 1st day of Februunion Plaster Company, Limited, 167 James Street. Perth (of the one part), and the Federated Enginedrivers and Firemen's Association of Australasia West Australian Branch Association of Workers (of the other part). Whereby it is mutually agreed as follows:----

Basic Wage.—This Agreement is based on a basic wage of $\pounds 4$ 5s. per week.

1.—Area.

This Agreement shall operate over the works of the Union Plaster Company, Limited, at Yellowdine, in the State of Western Australia.

2.—Term.

The currency of this Agreement shall be for a period of one year from the 1st of February, 1930, with the right of either party after the 1st of February, 1931, to apply to alter, revise, or amend, or terminate same.

3.-Hours of Labour.

Except as hereinafter provided eight hours shall con-stitute a day's work and forty-eight hours a week's work, inclusive of crib time. (a) Day Workers.—The provision that eight hours shall constitute a day's work shall be satisfied if the

time of duty be either eight and three-quarter hours on five days and four and a-quarter hours on Saturday, or eight and a-half hours on five days and five and a-half hours on Saturday in each week.

(b) Provided also, that if it is mutually agreed between employer and employee, the plant may be kept running during the crib hour on five days instead of

working the Saturday short shift. (c) For all time worked beyond the hours of duty in any day, payment shall be made at time and a half rates.

5.—District Allowance.

In addition to the above rates 1s. 6d. per day shall be paid for six days per week as a district allowance, not to be computed in calculating overtime.

6.- Overtime.

For all work doue beyond the hours of duty on any day, payment shall be at the rate of time-and-a-half.

7.---Sundays.

All work done on Sundays shall be paid for at timeand-a-half rates.

8.-Holidays.

Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Easter Monday, and Labour Day shall be observed as holidays, and all work performed on these days shall be paid for at double time rates.

9.-Full Payment for Shift.

After beginning a shift workers shall not be paid less than a full shift, unless they leave of their own accord, or are dismissed for misconduct.

10.—Rotation of Shifts. If the plant is required to work more than one shift, engine-drivers shall follow their shift around in rotation cach week.

11.—Annual Leave. Each worker shall be entitled to twelve days' annual leave each year on full pay, or should the period of em-ployment be less than one year, the workers shall be paid in proportion as his length of service is to the full year's employment.

12.--Preference of Employment. Preference of employment shall be given in respect of the tasks for which rates of wages are specified in this Agreement to members of the Federated Enginedrivers and Firemen's Association of Workers of Western Australia.

13.—Right of Access. Right of access to the works of the employer shall be granted to a duly accredited representative of the Union to investigate any complaint.

MIDLAND RAILWAY (ENGINE-DRIVERS, FIRE-MEN, AND CLEANERS).

(Registered 21-3-1930.) No. 3 of 1930:

No. 3 of 1930: THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of "The In-dustrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1925," this Twelftin day of March, One thousand nine hundred and thirty, between the W.A. Midland Railway Em-ployees' Industrial Union of Workers (hereinafter referred to as the "Union"), of the one part, and the Midland Railway Company of Western Aus-tralia, Limited (hereinafter referred to as the "Com-pany"), of the other part, whereby it is mutually agreed by and between the parties hereto as follows:—

1.-Term of Agreement.

This Agreement shall operate from the Second day of December, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-eight, and shall remain in force until the First day of December, One thousand nine hundred and thirtyone, subject to the provisions of the Industrial Arbitration Act Amendment Act, 1912-1925.

2.—Area and Scope of Agreement. This Agreement shall apply only to members of the Union employed by the General Manager in and about the working of the Midland Railway, and shall be binding upon the above-named parties, and shall operate over the whole of the Midland Railway. If electric or other power is installed as a substitute for steam haulage members of the Union shall be employed to operate under the new power.

3.—Interpretation.

"Worker" means a member of the Union employed as driver, fireman, cleaner, washoutman, washoutman's

assistant, packer or trimmer. "'Attended Barracks'' means any building attended to by a whole or part-time caretaker appointed for that purpose, which is provided with bed, clean bedding, cooking utensils and light, lighting facilities, and water and fuel.

"Unattended Barracks" means any van used as a barracks provided with the accommodation mentioned in the previous definition, and any building which, whilst provided with the accommodation mentioned therein, is wholly unattended.

"Main Depot" means a depot where six or more locomotives are stationed.

'Married Man'' includes a single man who has a parent or child solely dependent on him and resident in the State of Western Australia, but does not include a married man whose wife and family are neither resi-

dent with nor dependent upon him. "'Union'' means the W.A. Midland Railway Em-ployees' Industrial Union of Workers. "General Manager'' means the General Manager of the Midland Railway Company of Western Australia, Limited Limited.

4.—Promotion.

Promotion from cleaner to fireman and from fireman to driver shall be made-

- (a) automatically by reason of acting work in accord-dance with the next succeeding clause; and
 (b) independently of acting work, as vacancies arise,
 - according to seniority combined with proficiency and good conduct, provided that the necessary examinations have been passed.

5.—Acting Work.

(i.) A fireman or cleaner who has acted in the capacity of a driver or fireman respectively, for 313 days, shall be appointed to the higher grade, and the date of such appointment shall, notwithstanding subsequent re-gression, be taken for the purpose of determining when advancements from class to class become due. To ascer-tain the number of days' acting work performed by a worker all acting work heretofore or hereafter shall be counted, and the total number of hours worked by him in the higher capacity shall be divided by seven and one-third.

(ii.) For the purpose of maintaining the present order of seniority amongst the workers, the following provisions shall obtain :-

- (a) The General Manager shall, so far as practicable, arrange that firemen and cleaners shall have the benefit of acting work according to seniority, and to that end shall transfer them from one depot to another as may be necessary.
- (b) Subject as hereinafter provided, when a fireman or cleaner has qualified by acting work and is appointed to the higher grade under the subclause (i) of this clause, each fireman or cleaner, as the case may be, above him on the classifica-tion shall be deemed to have similarly qualified, and shall also be appointed to the higher grade: Provided, however, that the foregoing provision shall not apply to any fireman or cleaner who, during the preceding twelve months, has lost the opportunity of himself getting the benefit of acting work by reason of his failure to accept a transfer from one depot to another.

(iii.) A driver or fireman may, when traffic conditions so require, be temporarily employed as a fireman or cleaner respectively, but whilst acting in the lower grade shall be paid the rate which he was receiving as driver or fireman respectively. (iv.) (a) A review of work performed in the ad-

vanced capacity during the previous three months will be held at the close of March, June, September, and December in each year. Any adjustment of the staff December in each year. Any adjustment of the staff as provided for hereunder to date from the eighth day

as provided for hereunder to date from the eighth day after the close of each review period.
(b) The margin of acting time permissible in any quarter without involving the question of promotion for the next quarter shall be:—

(1) Half full time, viz: 312 hours per quarter for one fireman acting as driver.
(2) Full time, viz: 624 hours per quarter for one cleaner acting as fireman.

(a) The promotion of fireman to drivers and cleaners.

(c) The promotion of firemen to drivers and cleaners to fireman respectively, when the permissible margin of acting time for the previous quarter has been exceeded, shall be made at the rate of one man for every unit of 624 hours (i.e., full time) over the margin in each class: Fifty (50) per cent. or over of a broken unit to be reckoned as 624 hours; under 50 per cent. to be dropped.

(d) Regression of drivers to firemen and firemen to cleaners respectively, when the permissible margin of acting work for the previous quarter has not been reached, shall be made on the basis of—

One driver to fireman when acting time is less than 312 hours per quarter;

One fireman to cleaner when acting time is less than 624 hours per quarter,

(e) In the event of an abnormal decrease in the

(e) In the event of an abnormal decrease in the traffic to be handled in any one year, the margins provided for in paragraph (iv) (b), (1) and (2), and (c) and (d), may be referred to a Board of Reference for review, and the Board shall have power to amend those margins as it may deem fit. (f) Each fortnight a return showing the acting work performed during the previous two weeks shall be supplied to the Secretary of the Union. (v.) Workers appointed under subclause (i) and (ii) hereof may be regressed, provided the total amount of advanced capacity work performed during the two weeks preceding that in which such appointments become due is less than the margin stipulated in subclause (iv); should the advanced capacity work performed for the same period be in excess of the margin provided in subclause (iv), appointments equal to such excess shall be retained: Regressions under this subclause to be made within a fortnight of such appointments. ments becoming due.

(vi.) No driver or fireman in any class shall be re-gressed until all the drivers and firemen respectively in the classes (if any) below him shall have been similarly regressed. After such regression, and whilst doing work in the lower grade, the drivers and firemen so regressed shall be paid the maximum rates provided for firemen and cleaners respectively: Notice of intention to regress to be served on the Union.

6.-Retirement and Dismissal.

(a.) No worker ofter six months' continuous service shall leave the service of the General Manager until the expiration of fourteen days' written notice of his intention to do so, without the approval of the General Manager.

(b.) Except in the case of summary dismissal for misconduct, fourteen days' written notice shall be given by the General Manager to any worker whose services are no longer required, and the reason for his dismissal shall be included in such notice.

7.-Qualifications.

(1.) Engine-Drivers:

(1.) Engine-Drivers: No person shall be employed as a driver on the Mid-land Railway without the approval of the Head of the Branch. Such driver shall pass a satisfactory examina-tion, and hold a certificate from the Head of Branch that he is competent. He must also have served as a fireman on the Midland Railway, or been employed as a driver or acting driver on other railways either within are article. Weater a new ideal that he to have new ideal that he to have a provided that he or outside Western Australia; always provided that no or outside western Australia; always provided that no driver or fireman shall be engaged from outside the service of the Midland Railway unless, in the opinion of the Head of the Branch, there is no fully qualified worker available in the employ of the Midland Railway, when he shall report to the General Manager, who may thereupon authorise the appointment of such person or persons as may be deemed necessary: always provided that the Union shall receive due notice of any such pro-posed appointments.

(2.) Firemen:
(a) No person shall be employed as a fireman on the Midland Railway without the approval of the Head of the Branch. Such fireman must pass a satisfactory examination, and hold a certificate from the Head of chammation, and note a certificate from the Head of the Branch that he is competent; he must also have served as a cleaner on the Midland Railway, or have been employed as a driver, fireman, or cleaner on other railways within or outside the State of Western Aus-tralia: Provided always that no person from outside the service of the Midland Railway shall be employed as a fireman unlarge in the ariting of the Head of as a fireman unless, in the opinion of the Head of the Branch, there is no worker in the employ of the Midland Railway fully qualified and available, when he shall report to the General Manager, who may thereupon authorise the appointment of such person or persons as may be deemed necessary; always provided that the Union shall receive due notice of any such proposed appointments.

(b) No worker shall be permitted to act as fireman until he is twenty-one years of age, unless, in the opinion of the Head of the Branch, the requirements of the service otherwise demand it.

(3.) Cleaners:

(a) No candidate for the position of cleaner shall be admitted under the age of seventeen years. Re-trenched Midland Railways cleaners, firemen and drivers, whose previous service has been satisfactory to the General Manager, shall on application be given prefer-ence for employment, but this condition shall not debar

the General Manager from making any other appoint-

(b) Cleaners under the age of eighteen years shall not be permitted to work between the hours of 8 p.m. and 6 a.m.

9.-Workers performing Higher Duties.

(a) Workers called upon to perform higher duties shall, whilst performing such duties, be paid the mini-mum rate for the higher position, provided such mini-mum is not lower than the worker's regular rate of pay. This shall apply to cleaners employed on fueling or labouring work at main depots, and also at outside depots, provided that the work at such outside depots is for a period of twenty minutes or longer in any one day.

(b) At main depots cleaners shall not be employed on fueling or labouring work, except in case of emer-

gency. (c) Should a cleaner at a running shed be called upon to assist in washing out engines, he shall be paid the minimum rate prescribed for a fireman, and all such time shall be classed as acting firing.

10 .- Agreement not to affect Present Wage.

Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to re-duce the wage of any worker below the rate actually received by him on the date this Agreement is issued.

11.-Lodging Allowance.

The following allowance shall be paid to workers covered by this Agreement booked off or temporarily

a) For the first 30 hours or part thereof, the sum of 5s. where attended and 6s. where unattended barracks are provided, and 7s. where there are no barracks.

(b) After the first 30 hours and up to 7 days, the sum of 4d. per hour, and thereafter 3d. per hour, pro-vided that the reduction from 4d. to 3d. shall only be made in cases where the worker shall be stationed for over 7 days in one place: Provided that a deduction of 1s. per day or night, with a maximum of 5s. per week, shall be made where attended barracks are provided, and a deduction of 6d. per day or night, with a maximum of 2s. 6d. per week, shall be made where unattended barracks are provided. No such deduction shall be made if the worker returns to his home station within 44 hours.

(c) The allowance shall be calculated from the time of booking on to the time of booking off at home, station.

(d) A worker booked off or temporarily lodging in a district carrying an allowance shall be granted such allowance, or if already in receipt of a district allowance, shall be granted the difference between such allowance and any higher allowance applicable to the district in which he is booked off or lodging. A day's allow-ance to be granted for the first 30 hours er any part thereof and each subsequent 24 hours or part thereof; Time to be calculated from time of departure from home station to time of departure from foreign station.

.(e) Married workers temporarily transferred for a period exceeding three months but which is not expected to exceeding times motions but which is not ex-pected to exceed six months for the purpose of meeting seasonal or exceptional or temporary traffic and not moving their permanent homes will be paid a weekly allowance of 25s, in lieu of transfer or lodging allowance to cover the excess cost of living away from their homes.

Provided that, should any other lodging allowance become due to a worker whilst transferred, such allowance together with the allowance provided for in the foregoing paragraph, shall in no case exceed the allow-ance payable under subclauses (a), (b) and (d). (f) Where workers under the preceding sub-clause are

(f) Where workers under the preceding sub-clause are employed on a series of works up and down the line and are provided with sleeping accommodation in vans, the removal of vans from one place to another will not

he deemed to have altered their headquarters. (g) The General Manager may in his discretion, make any allowance in addition to those provided in the fore-going sub-clauses, and the Head of the Branch shall also have discretion to make any such additional allow-ance not exceeding 7s. 6d. per day.

(h) The foregoing allowances will not be paid:

(i) During any period of absence from duty without the worker and does not exceed one week;

(ii) During any period of annual leave.

12.—Hamper Allowance.

(a) A driver or fireman attending at a depot with a hamper for a trip for which he is booked and which hamper for a trip for which he is booked and which is cancelled, or who shall have received less than two hours' notice of the cancellation of a trip requiring a hamper, shall be allowed 5s. in respect of such hamper. (b) Any worker having to proceed on an "away from home" job with less than four hours' notice shall be paid an amount of 5s. in addition to crdinary expenses. (c) Any worker notified between 6 p.m. and 8 a.m. of a "book off" job requiring him to come on duty be-tween those hours shall precive an allowance of 5s in

tween those hours shall receive an allowance of 5s. in addition to ordinary expenses.

13 .- Sunday away from Home Station.

Workers shall not be booked away from their home station for two Sundays in succession where it can be avoided by any reasonable arrangement.

14.-Payment for Travelling Time.

14.—Payment for Travelling Time. (a) A worker travelling as a passenger going to work away or returning to his home station shall be paid at his ordinary rates for the actual travelling or waiting time up to a maximum of 16 hours in one day. (b) Any fireman travelling as a passenger going out to act as a driver, or returning after having acted as a driver, and any cleaner going out to act as a fireman or returning after having acted as a fireman, shall re-ceive payment for travelling time or waiting time at the minimum rate for the higher grade. the minimum rate for the higher grade.

(c) Any driver or fireman who travels as a passenger from home depot to another depot, or vice versa, and is then booked off duty, and who has not been on duty prior to travelling, shall be allowed a minimum of two hours from the time booking on to the time of booking off duty.

(d) Sunday travelling time shall be paid at the same rates and on the same conditions as on week days.

(e) In respect of a worker who is provided with a sleeping berth in a passenger train, travelling time shall not count between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m.; Provided this shall not operate to reduce the travelling time to be paid for below 8 hours in any one day.

(f) A worker when travelling by sea shall be entitled to first class accommodation on the boat, and to one fourth only of the usual away from home allowance; travelling time shall be paid at ordinary rates, provided that not more than 8 hours shall be paid for his travel-ling time in any one period of 24 hours.

15-Payment when Booked on Duty and not Required.

(a) Any driver or fireman booked on duty but informed before leaving the shed with his engine that he is not required for work, and who is only called upon to attend to his engine, shall be paid one-quarter day's pay at the rate applicable to that day, but may be called upon for further duty without any further prescribed period of rest as provided for in Clause 16 of this Agreement. Any driver or fireman who is booked on duty and is called upon to perform work other than attending to his engine, or who has to go out on traffic, shall be allowed not less than 4 hours' pay at the rate applicable to that day.

(b) Any driver or fireman booked up for duty shall not be entitled to any allowance when at least 2 hours' notice that he is not required has been left at his place of residence or barracks, as the case may be. Written notice left with person in charge of a worker's place of residence will be deemed to be notice under this clause.

(c) If a cleaner is brought on duty and it is found necessary before he has worked 2 hours to book him necessary before he has worked 2 hours to book him off so that he may be available to take up duty as a fireman, he shall be paid a minimum of 2 hours at the rate applicable to that day, but may be called upon for duty as fireman without the period of rest prescribed in sub-clause (f) of Clause 16. (d) Any worker brought on duty shall receive 4 hours' pay at the rate applicable to that day, except as provided for in sub-clauses (a), (b), and (c) hereof. (e) No worker shall be brought on duty on a Sunday for less than 4 hours' work.

16.-Minimum Time Off Duty.

(a) Each driver and fireman shall be allowed off duty at home station for a minimum of 12 hours, and

duty at home station for a minimum of 12 hours, and at foreign stations for a minimum of 8 hours, except as provided hereunder. (b) Enginemen leaving home station for a foreign station which may entail booking off at a number of other stations before returning to home depot shall be booked off for twelve and 8 hours alternatively; Pro-ided that the first heating off may he for a minimum vided that the first booking off may be for a minimum of 8 hours or 12 hours, as the Company may require: Provided further that unless the worker is notified to the contrary prior to leaving his home station the first booking off shall be for a period of 12 hours. (c) When enginemen are required to do anything apart from their restered run the Company to apply the

(d) In the event of a crew having been booked off at a foreign station for 8 hours and the Company find it necessary to again book the same crew off on the return journey, the rest period on the second occasion to be 12 hours, so that no crew will be booked off 8 hours twice in succession.

(e) When relieving at a foreign station or temporarily transferred, the temporary station will for the purpose of this clause be treated as the home station for the first and each subsequent booking off thereat.

(f) After a cleaner, washoutman, washoutman's as-sistant, or worker acting in that capacity has gone off duty he shall be allowed 10 hours before coming on duty again: Provided that if a worker has been employed during part of the shift as a fireman he shall be allowed rest period specified for firemen.

(g) When a worker is brought on duty without the prescribed period of rest he shall be paid continuous preserved period of rest he shan be paid continuous duty as from the time he booked on on the previous shift till booking off on the shift for which he had less than the stipulated rest period, excepting where the time by which the rest period falls short of the prescribed time does not exceed 60 minutes, in which case he shall be paid at the rate of double time for the time hormony the actival next paid the minimum. the time between the actual rest period and the minimum period of rest prescribed in this Agreement: Provided that, in either case, he shall be deemed to have been booked off duty in so far 2° the computation of lodging allowance is concerned.

(h) The foregoing conditions shall not apply in cases of emergency when the attendance of a worker is re-quired before the prescribed rest period has elapsed.

The Shed Foreman shall determine as to the nature of such emergency and direct the worker concerned accordingly in writing. He shall also report each case to his next superior Officer.

(i) No worker shall be called or booked up for duty without having the prescribed period of rest while there is another qualified worker available who has had the prescribed rest.

(j) Each driver and fireman booked on duty after 9 p.m. and before 7 a.m. shall be called sufficiently long before coming on duty to enable him to get to the shed at the time booked.

(k) Drivers and firemen booked off duty at a foreign station where there is a caretaker at the barracks shall be called for duty irrespective of the hour booked on. At stations where there is no caretaker they shall be called if it can be conveniently arranged.

(1) Each driver and fireman on being booked off duty on arrival at any shed shall come on duty again at such time as provided hereinbefore, as he may be directed before leaving the shed, either verbally by the foreman or by the running sheet posted at the shed, except in cases of emergency, when drivers and firemen may be called upon to resume duty at any time.

(m) Drivers and firemen booked on rostered working between the hours of 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. shall, when time permits, be given four hours' notice of any alteration in their working.

(n) Should a driver or fireman not be able to ascertain before leaving the shed at his home station, either from the foreman or from the running sheet, when he shall next be required for duty he shall be free to assume that he will not be required for 12 hours, and may make his private arrangements accordingly.

(o) Between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. each driver and fireman after being booked off duty for 12 hours shall make personal inquiry at the shed as to when he is next required for duty, except when booked adjusting, in which case he shall be notified.

Outside these hours he shall be notified at his place of residence at least two hours before being required for duty, provided that he shall have the specified period of rest, viz: 12 hours, before commencing duty. Writ-ten notice left with the person in charge of worker's place of residence will be deemed to be notice under this clause.

17.-Transfers.

(a) When any transfer is ordered by the Company the worker transferred shall not lose his right of appeal against the transfer, and if on inquiry it is found that a transfer can be arranged with another worker to suit the convenience of the Company, then he shall be re-transferred. A worker transferring from one station to another over one mile distant involving a change of residence shall-

- be paid not less than £4 for a married man and 15s. for a single man. A married man who does not transfer his family shall be paid as a single man;
- (2) be paid such further out-of-pocket expenses (if any) as the General Manager in his discretion shall decide to have been reasonably incurred;
- (3) be granted free passes for himself and family (including those dependents mentioned in the interpretation of "married man" and also the mother of a married man permanently residing with and wholly dependent upon him) and free railway transport of his furniture and effects including one cow and not more than two goats. Where the train is provided with appropriate sleepers and the worker's journey extends through the night, he and his family shall be supplied with sleeping berths;
- (4) be paid actual travelling and waiting time up to a maximum of 8 hours per day; no overtime rates shall apply.
- (5) Married workers shall if necessary be allowed one day for packing and one day for unpacking. A married man who does not transfer his family shall be treated as a single man.

(b) Any worker who is transferred from one place to another to suit himself shall be entitled to the pro-visions of sub-clause (a), (3) only. (c) At least 10 days' notice shall be given to a worker

required to permanently transfer from one station to another.

(d) A worker shall not be transferred for a lesser period than three months. If required to work tem-porarily at another depot for relief or other purposes for a lesser period, he shall be paid lodging allowance as per Clause 11.

18.-Holidays.

(a) Unless by mutual agreement between the General Manager and the Union to the contrary, every worker shall, after twelve months' continuous service, be granted two weeks' leave on full pay each year, the whole of which shall be taken at the one time in each year: Provided always, that, with the consent of the General Manager, holidays may be allowed to accumulate for two years.

(b) Drivers and firemen after twelve months' service shall be allowed an additional four days' holiday in each year on full pay.

(c) Workers shall be paid for holidays at the rate of pay they are drawing at or immediately before the time when such holidays are taken.

(d) Every worker, after one month's continuous service, shall be entitled to the foregoing holidays in proportion as the length of service is to the full number of holidays for the twelve months.

(c) Every year prior to the 30th July a statement shall be posted in each shed showing the date on which each worker will go on his annual leave and resume duty. The annual leave for such worker shall be calculated up to the 30th June each year, and only leave up to that date shall be granted each year, except in cases where leave has been allowed to accumulate.

(f) Workers are not to be booked on holidays for more than one year in succession between 30th April and 1st September, except at the request of the worker. Holiday lists are not to be departed from, except for

(g) With the approval of the Head of the Branch any worker may exchange dates with another. (h) Sunday conditions shall apply to Good Friday, Christmas Day, and Labour Day (i.e., first day of May or first Monday thereafter), and one day shall be added to the annual leave for each Good Friday or Christmas Day so worked: Provided that a worker who returns Day so worked: Provided that a worker who returns to his home station or finishes a shift at his home station not later than 4 a.m. on either of those days, and is not again booked on duty that day, shall be treated as having had a paid holiday.

(i) Unless at his own request, no worker shall be booked off for a holiday at a foreign or at his temporary home station.

(j) No deduction shall be made from annual holidays for the period a worker is off duty, through sickness, unless the absence exceeds three calendar months.

(k) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause other than for pseulation shall be entitled to receive payment for any holidays which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service: Provided always that if the worker has been dismissed for peculation, no claim for holidays shall be recog-nised. Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated holidays or payment therefor.

19.-Extended Leave of Absence.

Any worker who has been two years or more in the service of the General Manager may, on application, be granted in addition to annual leave, extended leave of absence without pay for a period not exceeding twelve months. Failure on the part of a worker to return to his duty within the specified period of leave granted shall be regarded as a resignation and shall be so treated.

20.-Absence through Sickness.

(a) Any worker being unable to attend to his duty through sickness shall notify the Locomotive Officer on duty at least three hours before the time he is booked for duty and he shall also satisfy the Locomotive Officer that he is unfit to attend to his duties, and if called upon shall provide a medical certificate that he is unable to perform his duties through sickness.

(b) Any worker so absent shall not again be booked up for duty unless he notifies the Locomotive Officer not later than noon on any day that he is fit to resume.

(c) Any worker losing time through sickness or special leave shall be reduced in wages only to the extent of the time actually lost through sickness or actually granted as special leave.

21.-Free Passes, Privilege Tickets, Etc.

1. Free passes-

(a) After twelve months' continuous service workers shall be allowed annually free passes as specified hereunder:

All drivers and any ex-driver who has been regressed (either through reduction in the number of drivers or for physical disability)---

One first class station to station pass on the occasion of the annual leave and/or long service leave, to cover the full term of leave due;

Two first class privilege passes from one given station to another and return.

All other workers-

One second class station to station pass on the occa-sion of the annual and/or long service leave, to cover the full term of leave due: Provided that this pass may be changed to first class on payment by the worker of half the additional fare at ordinary rates; Two first class privilege passes from one given station

to another and return, except during the Christmas and Easter holidays, when at the option of the General Manager the passes may be issued as second class.

In addition to the worker the passes shall be available for his wife and members of his family under 18 years of age unmarried, unmarried daughters over 18 years of age, and his parents, provided they are resident

with and dependent upon him for support. A widower wirh his child or children resident with him and who regularly employs a housekeeper may, at the discretion of the General Manager, be granted passes worker supporting younger brothers and/or sisters may be granted passes for such housekeeper. (b) Upon request a worker may be granted a separate

(b) opon request a worker may be granted a separate station to station pass for his wife and dependents, as mentioned, in sub-clause (a) hereof, where it is incon-venient for both to travel together. (c) Workers who have not had an opportunity of

allowing their holidays to accrue owing to having taken leave on individual public holidays shall be granted their station to station pass when on special leave up to 14 days.

(d) After six months' continuous service a worker shall be entitled to the passes mentioned in sub-clause (a) in proportion to length of service.

Should a worker through illness be unable to use his station to station pass on the occasion of his annual leave he shall be entitled to the use of such pass on the occasion of taking leave without pay during the year in which same is due.

(e) A worker who resigns or is retired from the service and has leave due shall be granted a free pass, station to station, for the term of such holidays: Provided that, should a worker not have given the requisite notice or obtained the consent of the General Manager to leave the service as provided for in Clause 6, he shall forfeit all claims to any passes he would otherwise have been entitled to under the provisions of this clause.

(f) Workers in isolated parts may be issued free passes at the discretion of the Head of the Branch for

(g) Free passes shall not apply to Race or Hired Special, Guaranteed Specials, or Special Excursion trains within a 50 miles radius, or when in the opinion of the Station-Master at the station where the worker desires to commence his duty there is not ample room on the train.

2. Market Passes-

Workers stationed outside suburban areas will be issued market passes once per month to the market town The passes may be issued in favour of the worker, his wife or housekeeper, and children between the ages of five and fourtcer years. A worker's wife or house-keeper may be granted a market pass once per fort-night if required: Provided that the maximum number of passes granted under this sub-clause shall be two per month.

3. Free freight-

Domestic supplies up to a maximum weight fortnightly of 2 ewt. for married men and 1 ewt. for single men shall be carried free by rail to home station from the market town most convenient to the General Manager and the worker, and in addition, meat, bread and vegetables, and dairy produce, when not obtainable locally, shall be carried free from the market town most convenient to the General Manager and the worker where same are procurable. All such supplies must be for the sole use of the worker and his family: Provided that

this concession shall not apply when any member of the worker's family conducts a boarding-house or store at the home station.

4.—Market Towns-

The following shall be approved market towns:-

(ii.) (a) By agreement between the parties any of the towns on the list may be omitted and any other towns may be added.

(b) A Board of Reference appointed pursuant to the provisions of Clause 37 of the Agreement may amend or vary the above list by the omission therefrom of any town mentioned or the addition of any other town. Such amendment or variation may be made at the request of either party and upon proof to the satisfaction of the Board that it is just and reasonable upon a consideration of the following facts and circumstances:

- (i.) The price of ordinary household commodities, ineluding clothing, ruling in the town as com-pared with other places conveniently situated;
- (ii.) The number of storekeepers operating in the town or district and the competition amongst them;
- (iii.) The district allowances, if any, of the workers concerned; (iv.) Any other fact or circumstance to be specifically
- set forth in the decision, which, in the opinion of the Board, renders an alteration desirable or necessary.
- Privilege Tickets-

After six months' continuous service a worker shall be allowed privilège return tickets, first or second class, be anowed privilege return tickets, irst or second class, for himself, wife, and members of his family under eighteen years of age, also unmarried daughters over eighteen years of age, provided they are resident with and dependent upon the worker's earnings. The charge for privilege ticket to be half the single fare for the return journey, with a minimum of 1s. for adults and 6d for children 6d. for children.

For the purpose of this clause a member of the family shall be deemed to be dependent provided such member's income does not exceed 15s. per week, ex-clusive of old age or invalid pension, but a member of the family temporarily out of employment shall not be deemed to be dependent.

22.-Season Tickets.

Second class season tickets at half the ordinary season ticket rates shall on application be issued to any worker to enable him to travel between the place of occupation and the station nearest to which he resides on the Company's Railway.

23.—Hours of Duty and Overtime Payment.

(a) All time (exclusive of Sunday time) worked in excess of 44 hours in any one week shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter.

(b) All time worked in excess of 8 hours in any one shift shall be paid for as under :-

First two hours-time and a quarter. Next two hours-time and a half.

Thereafter-double time.

(c) Time on which overtime rates as per sub-clause (b) is payable will not be subject to the extra rate provided for in sub-clause (a). (d) Time up to eight hours worked between midnight

on Saturday and midnight on Sunday shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half, and time in excess of eight hours shall be subject to Clause (b) hereof (c) The General Manager shall arrange as far as

practicable that shifts shall not exceed eight hours, and except in cases of emergency, where relief cannot be provided, a worker shall not be required to remain on duty at his home or temporary home station for more than ten hours.

(f) Workers other than enginemen shall not be re-quired to work more than five hours without being bocked off for a meal or allowed a crib time.

bocked off for a meal or allowed a crib time. (g) In the case of enginemen working on shunting engines an interval of 20 minutes for crib shall be arranged between the third and fifth hours of duty without deduction of pay except at Midland Junction when shunters and enginemen work conflicting shifts, in which case the crib time shall be arranged to suit the Company.

(h) In the case of enginemen on the road it shall be understood that when the running of their own train is not unduly delayed and the running of other trains which their own train may meet or cross is not inter-fered with, an interval of not exceeding 20 minutes for crib between the third and fifth hours of duty may be taken without deduction of pay.

(i) The General Manager shall guarantee to each worker a full week's work of 44 hours, exclusive of Sunday work, except during such period as by reason of any action on the part of any section of his employees, or for any other cause beyond his control, he is unable wholly or partially to carry on the running of the trains. Each week shall stand by itself.

(j) An employee of the Company (such employee to be a member of and to be nominated by the Union) shall be permitted to attend the Company half-yearly Timetable Conference as representative of the Union and may take part in any discussion as to whether any particular piece of night work involved in the proposed time-table could be avoided. The employee so acting shall be paid by the General Manager his ordinary wages, travelling time, and expenses, as provided in this Agreement.

24.—Seventh Shifts.

(a) Six shifts will constitute a week's work, except in special cases of unavoidable short runs, such special cases to be arranged between the General Manager and the Union.

(b) If less than 44 hours has been worked in the six shifts, the time for the six shifts will be made up to 44 hours, and the seventh shift will be paid for at—

(i.) ordinary rate for time equivalent to time made up;

(ii.) Overtime rate for balance.

(c) Where train crews (excepting those employed on shunting engines) work a continuous shift—Sunday into Monday—such shift, unless it extends into 4 hours on Monday, will not be counted as one of the six week-day shifts.

25.—Duty in Excess of Eight Hours.

Each month the Head of the Branch will on receipt of a request from the General Secretary of the Union, supply a statement showing all instances where workers have been kept on duty longer than eight hours continuously.

26.-Knowledge of Roads.

Should the requirements of the service necessitate that a driver shall run over a road with which he is not fully acquainted, he shall be provided with a pilotman. Such pilotman shall be either a district Locomotive Superintendent (provided he has been a driver in the Company's service), a Locomotive Inspector, Driver, or Fireman authorised to drive. In cases where a driver is removed from one depot to another he shall be given facilities to learn the road without loss of his driver's pay.

27.-Examination.

(a) Each driver, fireman, or cleaner who is called on for examination shall have fourteen days' notice of the date on which he will be examined and sample questions given for each subject. (b) Each candidate shall be allowed to try three times at intervals not exceeding four months. If he

does not pass, a further trial shall be allowed at the expiration of twelve months from the previous examina-tion. If then unsuccessful he shall be considered to have finally failed.

(c) All questions shall be put clearly and without ambiguity, and each candidate shall be allowed all reasonable latitude in asking the examiner to make each question clear; and a driver, a member of the Union, shall be present at all viva voce examinations, but he shall not in any way interfere with or interpose in the conduct of the proceedings. (d) The candidate who fails to pass his examination shall be furnished with a copy of the questions he failed

to answer correctly.

(e) A worker who has lost his seniority through failing to pass the examination shall, on subsequently pass-

ing, be classified next to the the worker who passed examination previously to him. (f) The examiner shall be appointed by the Head of the Branch, to whom he shall report fully the result of such examination, and the decision of the Head of the Branch shall be final.

28.—Preparing and Stabling Engines. (a) Each driver and fireman shall, if required to do the work, be granted the following allowance for pre-paring and stabling engines over and above the time required by the Traffic Branch:—

Preparing: Main line engines—45 minutes. (To apply to shunting engines prepared for running on

Shunting engines-30 minutes.

Stabling:

All engines-30 minutes.

(b) When stabling engines at out-stations (that is where less than six engines are stabled), a half-hour extra shall be allowed the fireman for banking fire, or cleaning fire, ashpan, and smokebox. (c) When a fireman has to raise steam in a boiler at

a foreign depot he shall be allowed two hours in addition to ordinary preparing time in the case of a cold boiler, and one and a half hours in the case of a warm boiler a boiler which has been out of traffic for 24 hours shall be regarded as a cold boiler.

(d) Provided that the General Manager may relieve drivers and firemen from duties of preparation and stabling and employ other workers who are qualified drivers and firemen to carry out such duties.

29.-Special Shed Duty.

(a) At Sheds where six or more engines are stabled (b) The duties of drivers and firemen where six or may be arranged and directed by the officer in charge. (b) The duties of drivers and firemen where six or

be to turn engines, examine engines over pit, take water, lock away all tools, and place engine for coal or in shed as the case may be and leave boiler and fire in a safe condition. The fireman shall keep all cab fittings, etc., on the footplate in a clean condition from the time of leaving shed until the return thereto. (c) At Sheds where less than six engines are stabled,

the duties of cleaner shall be to clean engines, light up, attend to water and steam. Cleaners may also be used for fueling or other work, subject to the conditions of

Clause 9 (a). (d) Cleaners working with shed drivers employed in marshalling engines at principal depots, shall be paid fireman's rate of pay; this duty to be called "shed firing."

(e) At Sheds where less than six engines are stabled, the duties of the fireman will be to clean out smoke-boxes and ash-pans, clean fronts, and keep all fittings, etc., on the footplate, take coal and water, bank fires. After a fireman has been on duty for more than eight hours, he shall be relieved of the duty of cleaning fires, smokeboxes and ash-pans, unless the case is one of emergency and it is not possible, in the circumstances, for other

arrangements to be made to carry out such work. (f) At Sheds where less than six engines are stabled the duties of the drivers will be to turn engines are stabiled engines over pits, put engines in position to take coal and water, and stable engines. (g) In addition to the foregoing, drivers and firemen,

when stabling engines may, provided they have not been on duty in excess of eight hours, be called upon to perform any other duty appertaining to their respective grades, and time allowance shall be made for so much of work as cannot be performed in the period allowed for stabling.

(h) The work of cleaning fires and ash-pans of engines going into locomotive depots shall be done by the shed staff where such labour is now available.

30.—Discipline.

The Head of the Branch shall have power to repri-The mean or the Branch shall have power to repri-mand, fine, suspend from duty, reduce in grade, or dismiss any worker, and to remove any driver or fireman from a locomotive footplate: Provided always that the notification to a worker of any such action shall be in writing, and shall State the reason of same being taken taken.

31.-Charges against Workers.

(a) Each worker shall himself provide, when called upon, with the least possible delay, any report or statement which may be required by the officer-in-charge.
(b) When a worker against whom a charge is pending has made a statement to an officer in charge in the statement to an officer in the statement.

ing has made a statement to an officer-in-charge and which statement the officer-in-charge has taken down in

writing, such worker shall either be furnished with a copy of such statement or be allowed to take a copy of it.

(c) If in the opinion of the foreman the action of any worker should be reported to the Head of the Branch, it shall be done:

- (i.) where a worker is stationed at a main depot, within seven days of the foreman's first know-ledge of the occurrence;
- (ii.) where the worker is stationed at a sub-depot, within ten days of the person's in charge first knowledge of the occurrence.

The worker shall at the same time be notified by the foreman that he is reported, otherwise such report shall be null and void: Provided that when a worker reports on his daily running sheet an irregularity or other oc-currence in which he is concerned to the Department, it worker that he has been reported to the bepartment, it shall not be necessary for the foreman to notify such worker that he has been reported to the Head of the Branch. When a charge has been made against any worker he shall be supplied with a copy of such charge and any reports upon which it is based.

(d) If a final decision in any case in which a charge has been made against a worker being not given within three calendar months of the occurrence first coming to the knowledge of the Head of the Branch, the charge in question shall lapse.

32.—Secretary's Leave and Pass.

32.—Secretary's Leave and Fass. The General Manager shall grant leave, without pay, for a continuous period or otherwise of thirty days in cach year to the Secretary of the Union (should such Secretary be a railway worker) to enable him to attend exclusively to the Union work, and a free pass will be issued to the said Secretary, whether he be an employee or not, for that period, but the pass may be withdrawn at the General Manager's discretion. Such pass shall be used exclusively for Railway Union work and not for political purposes.

33.-Union Notices.

Notices relating to meetings or classes in connection with the Union shall be allowed to be exhibited at such places as may be approved by the General Manager.

34.—Seniority. The seniority of the workers is in accordance with the position in which their respective names appear on the list submitted by the petitioners with their petition.

35.—Appeal.

Any worker fined, reduced to a lower class, grade, or dismissed, shall have the right of appeal, and such appeal shall be dealt with by the Appeal Board constituted as follows:—His immediate Head and an employee of his particular Branch, with the General Marager as Chairman, and at the hearing of such appeal the Union shall be represented by the General Secretary.

36.--Preference to Unionists. Preference shall be given to unionists with regard to employment except in the case of cleaners.

37.-Board of Reference.

The Arbitration Court appoints for the purposes of this Agreement a Board or Boards of Reference. Board shall consist of a Chairman and two representatives, one nominated by each party. The function of a Board of Reference shall be :-

- (a) to settle disputes as to matters under this Agreement except such as involve interpretation of the provisions of the Agreement.
 (b) classifying and fixing wages of any designation, occupation or calling not specifically provided for in the Agreement;
 (c) desiding any other matter that the Court may
- (c) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to the Board from time to time.

Separate Boards may be appointed where deemed necessary or advisable for different branches of the industry or for different districts.

38.—Alterations and Additions. If during the currency of an Award or Agreement between the Company and the Union or Unions representing its employees any alteration or addition to an existing Award or Agreement between the Commissioner of Railways and a Union or Unions representing his employees is agreed upon, the Union shall notify the Company within ten days after any alteration or addition has been agreed to, and such alterations or additions shall automatically apply to the employees of the Company from the same date as it applies to the employees of the Commissioner, provided, that should the Company, within twenty-one days of any such altera-tion or addition being made, notify in writing the Union or Unions concerned that the Company objects to being bound by such alteration or addition, and within the same period of twenty-one days submits the question or questions involved for the decision of the Court of Arbitration, the question of whether the Company shall Arbitration, the question of whether the Company shall be bound by the said alteration or addition shall be subject to the determination of the Court, whose decision, if in the affirmative, shall operate as from the date the alteration or addition became operative in the Government service.
