#### PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS by Sections 222 and 227 of "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1906" (6 Edwardi, No. 32), it shall be lawful for the Governor, on request of the Council, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to declare any land reserved, used, or by purchase or exchange acquired for a street or way, or any place, bridge, or thoroughfare, to be a public highway, and such land shall thereupon and thenceforth, from the date of such Proclamation, become and be absolutely dedicated to the public as a public highway within the meaning of any law now or hereafter in force: And whereas the Albany Municipal Council has requested that certain land, named and described in the Schedule hereunder, which has been acquired for a street or way within the Municipality of Albany, be declared a public highway: Now therefore I, the said Administrator, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation declare the said land to be a public highway, and such land shall, from the date of this Proclamation, be absolutely dedicated to the public as a highway, within the meaning of any law now or hereafter in force.

#### General Order.

#### THE LEGAL PRACTITIONERS ACT, 1893. (Consolidation 1927.)

We, The Honourable John Alfred Northmore, Chief Justice of Western Australia, The Honourable Thomas Percy Draper and The Honourable John Patrick Dwyer, Puisne Judges of the Supreme Court of Western Australia, and we the undersigned, being a majority of members of the Barristers' Board constituted and appointed under and in pursuance of "The Legal Practitioners Act, 1893" (Consolidated 1927), hereby amend the General Order made the 21st day of September, 1920, and gazetted on the 24th day of September, 1920 (whereby the totals of certain bills of costs for the remuneration of practitioners of the Supreme Court of Western Australia in relation to the several matters therein mentioned were increased by twenty-five per centum) by adding the following proviso at the end thereof:—

Provided that the total of such bills of costs as increased by this General Order shall be reduced by fifteen per centum. This proviso shall have effect from and after the publication of the same in the *Government Gazette* for a period of one calendar month, and shall continue in force until the first day of January, 1933, on which date the aforesaid increase of twenty-five per centum shall again become operative.

#### SUPREME COURT RULES, 1920.

#### Amendment of Rule 8a, Order LXV.

The Honourable John Alfred Northmore, Chief Justice of Western Australia, The Honourable Thomas Percy Draper and The Honourable John Patrick Dwyer, Puisne Judges of the Supreme Court of Western Australia, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers contained in "The Supreme Court Act, 1880," and every other

power enabling them in this behalf, amend Rule 8a of Order LXV. of the Supreme Court Rules, 1920, by adding the following proviso at the end thereof:—

Provided further, that the total of bills of costs of fees as increased by this rule shall be reduced by fifteen per centum as from the first day of December, 1931, until the first day of January, 1933, on which date the aforesaid increase of twenty-five per centum shall again become operative.

#### FARMERS' DEBTS ADJUSTMENT ACT, 1930.

NOTICE is hereby given that the following Stay Orders have been issued in accordance with Section 7, Subsection 1, of "The Farmers' Debts Adjustment Act, 1930," and Amendment Act, 1931, which reads as follows:—

A Stay Order shall direct that no action, execution, distress for rent, proceedings on default or breach of covenant under any mortgage or other security for money, or under an agreement of sale and purchase of land or other process or proceeding, shall be commenced or proceeded with or put in force against the farmer or his estate or effects during the operation of such Stay Order. Provided that, by leave of a judge, any action may, notwithstanding the Stay Order, be instituted and/or carried on against the farmer, but not beyond judgment.

## IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 19 of 1931.

The proprietors of the "West Australian," "Western Mail," "Daily News," and "Sunday Times," Applicants, and the Western Australian Branch of the Printing Industry Employees' Union of Australia Industrial Union of Workers, Perth, Respondent.

THE Court of Arbitration, in pursuance of the powers conferred by Section 145 of the Act and of all other powers and authorities thereto enabling it, doth hereby make the following Award in settlement of the industrial dispute between the abovenamed parties:—

## 1.—Scope.

The Award shall apply to work done on newspapers.

## 2.—Term of Award.

The Award shall be for a period of one year from the date hereof.

## 3.—Area.

The Award shall operate over the area comprised within a radius of 15 miles from the General Post Office, Perth.

## 4.—Hours: Time Workers.

The maximum number of hours to be worked each week shall be:—

Stereotypers: 36 hours, day or night. Provided the hours in the "Daily News" shall be 38 day work.

Linotype operators: 42 hours day; 40 hours night. Provided that for all operators (other than six full shift workers) there shall be a reduction of two hours weekly, with reservations relating to overtime on special occasions, as agreed to between the employers and employees of the respective offices, to be ratified by the parties to this Award. Provided further, that for operators working abnormal shifts there shall be a further two hours' reduction.

All other employees: 44 hours day work, 42 hours night work. Provided that, for all such employees (other than six full shift workers) there shall be a reduction of two hours weekly, with reservations relating to overtime on special occasions, as agreed to between the employees and employers of the respective offices, to be ratified by the parties to this Award. Provided further, that for all employees embraced by this clause working abnormal shifts there shall be a further two hours' reduction.

Time off: All employees working six full shifts per week day or night (i.e., employees who do not get two days or a day and a half off consecutively) shall be allowed one full shift off every two weeks, to be paid for. In the week in which the day or night off is taken, the weekly hours shall be reduced by one-sixth of the weekly hours agreed to respectively for each section.

In the event of a permanent employee not being provided with work for the maximum number of hours in each week, he shall receive not less than the minimum wage for his grade provided in the schedule.

Day work shall mean work done between 8 a.m. and 6.30 p.m., and night work shall mean work done between 6.30 p.m. and 8 a.m.

It shall not be necessary for all sections to commence work at the same time, but where individual employees are called in before the usual starting time they shall be paid overtime.

In offices where a regular shift is worked between the hours set down in this Award for day work and night work, the wages shall be a rate proportionate to the number of hours day work and night work and the hours shall be those for night work. Provided that one half-day off per month or its equivalent in hours shall be given.

In offices where a weekly as well as a daily paper is issued, time worked on the ordinary weekly issue to be counted as part of the week's work.

Provided always, that in the case of papers other than dailies, special arrangements may be made between the Union and the employer regarding the distribution of the weekly working hours.

The head machinist shall have the right to temporarily change his men from one position to another as often as he thinks fit, without any change in the pay. Provided that such change (or changes) do not exceed two hours in any one shift.

##### Basic Wage.

If during the period of one year mentioned in Clause 2 hereof the Arbitration Court of Western Australia should prescribe a basic wage differing in amount from that now prescribed, viz., £3 13s. 6d. per week, within the district covered by this Award, then the marginal differences between the present basic wage and the minimum rates herein prescribed shall be deemed to be increased or decreased as the case may be to the same extent as the present basic wage may be decreased or increased by the said Arbitration Court as aforesaid to the intent that the rates herein prescribed shall remain constant during the said period of one year.

##### Emergency Legislation.

The employers undertake that they will not make application under "The Financial Emergency Act, 1931," for any reduction of wages during the said period of one year, nor will they during that period exercise any right which they may otherwise acquire to reduce wages under the said Act.

##### General.

Where an employee in the following grades has not had twelve months' continuous experience in the work in which he is engaged, he shall be paid 4s. 3d. per week less than the rates set out above: General hands in Machine Room, and general hands in Publishing Room.

##### Casuals.

Casuals shall be guaranteed a full shift at night and four hours in the day time. Provided that, in cases of emergency, arrangements may be made between the Union and the Newspaper Office for a lesser guarantee.

Casuals who are sent for and whose services are not availed of shall be paid a "call" at the rate of two hours' pay at casual rates.

Casuals engaged in publishing on weekly papers, and in the rotary machine section as general hands when the machines are not running, shall be paid 2s. 5d. per hour day work, 3s. per hour night work. Provided that special arrangements be made for publishing on the "Sunday Times."

All other casual workers shall be paid 1s. 9d. per shift extra day work, 2s. 5d. extra per shift night work.

Casuals working day work, if employed for a full week, shall be paid the prescribed weekly wage, with no extra allowance per shift.

If employed for a full week at night, casuals shall be paid the prescribed weekly wage, plus 4s. 3d., with no extra allowance per shift.

A casual working for 11 consecutive shifts shall be allowed one full shift off on full pay. Provided that, where such time is allowed off and paid for the extra allowance for casuals of 1s. 9d. for day work and 2s. 5d. for night work shall not apply.

Casuals working mixed shifts, i.e., shifts commencing before 6.30 p.m. and ending after 6.30 p.m., shall be paid day rates, provided the work after 6.30 p.m. does not exceed one hour. If it does, then night rates are to be paid throughout, and the guarantee to be four hours.

#### General Conditions.

The method to be adopted for payment for piece-work or by weekly wages shall be settled by agreement between employer and the Union, or, failing such agreement, by direction of the Court of Arbitration on application being made thereto by either party.

Employees regularly employed on night work, if called on to work during the day, shall be paid night work rates, and employees regularly employed on day work, if called on to work at night, shall be paid night work rates.

Employees shall be paid at the rate for the classification at which they are usually employed, and when put to work of a higher grade for more than two hours during a day or night shift, shall receive while so employed the difference in pay between their ordinary rate and higher rate. An employee put to work on a lower grade shall be paid his ordinary rate. Provided that an employee relieving one of a higher grade, during the illness or leave other than annual leave of an employee who is being paid his ordinary wages, shall not be entitled to the higher rate.

#### Sick Pay.

Permanent employees absent through sickness shall be paid full wages for the first week of absence, after which the legal liability of employer shall cease.

#### Call.

An employee called to work otherwise than in his usual working hours shall, if he attends, be paid two hours at ordinary rates as a "call" in addition to his ordinary wage.

This clause shall only apply when an employee is not notified before he leaves work that he will be required for special duty. Provided that any man so called shall be paid at least two hours at overtime rates.

If no work is available to an employee when called, two hours shall be paid for.

#### 6.—Piece-work.

The rate of pay for linotype operators on piece-work shall be 5 7-12d. less 15 per cent. per thousand ems night, with 11s. per week added, and 5 1-3d. less 15 per cent. per thousand ems day work, with 3s. per week added for matter actually set and corrected. Operators to be guaranteed 30 hours' work per week. Standing time shall be paid for any shortage at the rate of 5s. per hour night, and 4s. per hour day.

Any time worked in excess of eight hours in any one day or night shall be paid for at overtime rates.

The cast-up shall be according to the point system, provided that the minimum multiplier for any line shall be 40.

Operators shall be paid on the "flat" system, and shall not charge for white lines, leads, or other matter added by the "house."

Time off: Piece operators working six full shifts per week, day or night, shall be allowed one full shift off every two weeks, to be paid for at a sixth of the time operating weekly wage. In the week in which the day or night off is taken the weekly guarantee to the operator taking the day or night off shall be reduced by five hours.

Piece-workers working other than six full shifts per week shall be allowed one half-day off per month, and during the week the half-day is taken off, time worked short of the guarantee shall be paid for.

#### 7.—Overtime.

Overtime shall be charged at the rate of time and one-third for the first two hours, time and one-half for the next two hours, double-time thereafter. Special Sunday work shall be paid for at double rates.

For the purpose of computing time or overtime the following periods to operate: Eight minutes or over to be charged quarter hour; twenty-three minutes or over, half hour; thirty-eight minutes or over, three-quarter hour; fifty-three minutes or over, one hour.

#### 8.—Holidays.

Every employee (including piece-workers) shall receive eighteen consecutive working days' holiday in each year on full pay, at times convenient to the employer.

Provided always, that should the services be brought to a termination after the expiration of three calendar months, but before the expiration of twelve calendar months, the said eighteen days' holiday shall be commuted to a holiday for one day and a half for each calendar month's service. Provided further, that in case a worker is dismissed for serious and wilful misconduct the provision of this clause shall not apply.

Permanent part-time employees working three or more regular shifts per week shall receive proportionate holidays. Other permanent part-time employees shall receive only such proportionate holidays as may be agreed to between employer and employee.

One day at Christmas, one day at Easter, and Labour Day shall be paid holidays, and should an employee be required to work on those days he shall receive double pay for the time worked in addition to the holiday pay.

Piece operators shall be paid the time rate for time operators while on holidays and on leave.

#### 9.—Termination of Employment.

Any worker having been employed for three consecutive months in any office shall be entitled to one week's notice that his services are to be dispensed with, and any such worker leaving his employment shall likewise give one week's notice.

#### 10.—Lower Rate.

A worker who is unable to earn the minimum rate of wage herein prescribed may be employed at a lesser rate, which shall be agreed upon in writing between the worker and secretary of the Union. If within seven days after being notified in writing of the worker's desire to work at a lower rate of wage than that prescribed, the said secretary and the worker are unable to agree upon a lower rate, then the worker may apply in writing to the Resident or Police Magistrate within whose magisterial district the proposed employment shall take place to fix such lower rate of wages. The worker shall give such secretary two days' notice in writing of his intention to apply to the Magistrate, and the said secretary or his agent may attend and oppose the application. The Magistrate may fix the rate of wage, and his decision shall be final. Any worker whose wage shall have been so fixed may work for and be employed by any employer within the district to which this Award applies for such less wage for the period of six calendar months thereafter, and after the expiration of the said period until fourteen days' notice in writing shall have been given him by the secretary of the Union requiring his wage to be again fixed in the manner prescribed in this clause. Provided that no employer shall be at liberty to employ more than one such person at a time for every ten fully-paid journeymen employed.

#### 11.—Record Book.

Each employer shall keep at his office, or at each of them if more than one, a book containing a record of—

(a) The names of all workers employed by him at such office, and to whom this agreement applies;

(b) The class of work performed, the hours during which the worker is employed, and the wages paid to each such worker.

The employer and the worker shall be severally responsible for the proper posting up daily of such book. Such book may be inspected at any time during the ordinary business hours by the secretary for the time being of the workers' and employers' unions (if any), and also by any person thereunto authorised by the President of the Court of Arbitration.

#### 12.—Machine Operating.

No person other than an apprentice, compositor, or duly qualified operator shall be employed to operate a linotype or other type-setting machine.

Compositors learning machine operating shall be paid the compositor's time rate of wages, and shall serve a probationary period of twelve months. Such compositor must be able at the end of the first three months of the probationary period to set and correct at a speed of at least 4,000 ems an hour; at the end of six months at least 5,000 ems an hour; at the end of nine months at least 6,000 ems an hour; and at the end of twelve months at least 7,000 ems an hour; which shall be the limit of the probationary period. When a compositor shall be able to set and correct an average of 7,000 ems per hour based on minion matrices, 13 ems measure, the matter to be solid, he shall be deemed a proficient operator. The test of the operator's proficiency to be his ability to set any of the above numbers at the

period stated as tests for a full day on fair copy, and to approximately maintain those averages. Each employer may adopt the usual means of accurately testing the proficiency of a probationer.

Except in cases of emergency proficient linotype operators shall not be required to work together on time and piece work. Provided that, where a machine is used only for setting headings or display lines for advertisements, such machine shall be worked on time. Provided further, that time operators may set lines for display advertisements and for blocks, etc., that cannot reasonably be given out to piece operators, the printer and the father of the chapel being in agreement as to the class of matter covered by this clause before it shall become operative.

An operator shall not be required to do engineer's or attendant's work, except when he is being paid extra for looking after his machine. Provided in all cases operators shall assist in changing their machines when called upon to do so.

An operator having to look after his own machine shall be paid 10s. per week extra; where a machine is worked more than one shift the 10s. extra shall be paid to the operator on each shift.

An operator employed on piece required to go on hand work shall be paid the machine time rate. No operator shall be permanently changed from machine to hand work without one week's notice.

### 13.—Extra Charges, etc.

Instruction shall be written on the first slip of copy. Indentation and divisions in two-bar matter to be marked.

Corrections if not on ordinary galley-proof or if on scraps to be pasted on proof paper.

No undue advantage shall be permitted to one operator over another.

All lines cast shall be charged full lines.

All catchlines shall be charged by the operator.

Not less than twelve lines shall constitute a "take" of copy. Provided that the copy given out at any one time, whether referring to different articles or not, shall constitute one "take." In the case of editions, thirty minutes before the closing of the formes, six lines shall constitute a "take."

Matter requiring two bars or more of the ordinary measure of the paper to complete one measure (not being tabular matter) shall be charged one-third extra; three or more bars, one-half extra.

Figure matter set solid, land, wool and produce sales show prize lists, cargoes, catalogues, run-on balance-sheets and subscription lists, cricket, rifle and quoit scores, examination lists, and similar matter, shall be charged one-third extra.

Other matter carrying one-third extra: Church notices (if 10 lines run on); shipping (arrivals, departures, where run on); mail timetables; all half-measure (except racing weights and similar matter); wireless reports and programmes; auction sales if indented 2 and 3 ems and all capitals.

Matter of and exceeding four lines composed in other than ordinary English (e.g., dialects) shall be charged one-half extra, and foreign languages double for each line.

All matter with a border round, whether formed of rules, letters, or otherwise, shall be charged one-half extra.

Tabular matter cast on one bar shall be charged: Two columns, one-third extra; three columns, one-half extra; four or more columns, double. These charges are to be made whether the matter is with or without headings or rules.

Introductory lines or footnotes not exceeding four lines shall be charged with the table.

Run-out lists with one column of figures, common matter; but if £s.d., tons cwt. qrs., and similar matter, one-third.

University lists containing mostly figures, and similar all figure matter, one-half.

Correcting quarter-page proofs, three lines in addition to ordinary charge; correcting half-page (if full page in width), six lines; full page corrections, twelve lines in addition to other charges; all if done as house-marks.

Matter having to be transposed by the operator (i.e., which is not set up in the order in which it appears in copy) shall be paid for at the rate of one-third extra for all lines so transposed.

Matter set from copy that will not go on the copy tray shall be charged at the rate of one third extra.

Matter which is classed by the printer and the father of the chapel as illegible or indistinct, or not properly sub-edited, shall be charged one-third extra.

One line extra shall be charged for each word of small caps, italics, black, etc., fed in by hand, but where such words are set on the keyboard one line extra shall be charged for each line containing such words (excepting small caps, which shall be charged one line extra for each word) and for each single line of such type; but where there is more than one line of continuous black or italics, the extra charge shall be double for the first four, single thereafter.

One line extra shall be charged for every two-line letters, except when set from auxiliary magazine, when the charge shall be one for every three.

One line extra shall be charged for each hand-fed matrix other than two-line letters. Repeat lines not to be charged.

Indented matter, single column, showing 10 ems pica and under on the face, one-third extra; under half-measure, one-half extra.

All matter which is not phrased, such as passenger lists and similar matter, one-third extra. Racing results, excluding description, one-third extra.

Slugs of 22-ems measure and over shall be charged one-third extra.

Any other matter which may be specially difficult to compose shall be paid at an increased rate, to be determined by the printer and the father of the chapel.

The operator shall charge two lines for every line of house-mark corrections done by him. Alterations in standing advertisements, constituting less than twelve consecutive lines, when given out on piece-work shall be charged as house-marks.

The insertion of all corrected slugs shall be done by the "house." The "house" may at its discretion correct on time the errors in first proofs due to the operator, and deduct two lines from the operator for every line requiring alteration.

All first proof and revise correction marks left undone by the operator in the first proofs shall be done by the operator. All fresh errors imported into corrected matter by the operator shall, if not corrected by him, be charged against him at the rate of house-marks.

If a machine be changed by order to a different type the operator shall not be required to change it again to make correction, which shall be done by the "house," and the cost of correcting every line requiring correction shall be charged to the operator.

All machine errors—to be countersigned by the mechanic—shall be charged as house-marks. Provided that where an operator has obviously continued setting without drawing the attention of the mechanic to the faulty working of the machine the charges shall be disallowed.

Standing time of five minutes and over at any one time shall be charged at the rate specified in Clause 6. In cases where hands are brought in at a special hour and they are required to wait for work to come in, such waiting time shall be charged as from the specified hour of commencement. No standing time to be charged until fifteen minutes have accumulated in any one week. Standing time for machine delays to be countersigned by the mechanic. Standing time for copy to be signed by the printer. When an operator is being paid standing time he may be called upon to perform other work.

Changing.—From machine to machine in middle of take, or where there is any other disability in changing, 12 lines.

### 14.—Disputes.

Any dispute arising out of this Award which cannot be satisfactorily settled between the father of the chapel and the printer, shall be referred to the Union and the "house." If not then settled it shall be referred to the Court of Arbitration in accordance with the Act.

### 15.—Board of Reference.

1. For the purposes of this Award a Board of Reference is hereby appointed consisting of a chairman and two representatives of the employers and two representatives of the Union nominated by the parties.

2. The parties shall submit the name or names of persons from whom the chairman may be chosen by the Court of Arbitration, but the Court may appoint any other person as chairman.

3. The Board shall hold its deliberations in private, unless the majority of the representatives of the parties or the chairman otherwise decides.



4. A majority of the members, one of whom must be the chairman, shall constitute a quorum.

5. The Board may sit at such times and places as the majority may decide, and may adjourn from time to time and from place to place.

6. A member may resign at any time by certification in writing, signed by him and served upon the Registrar of the Court. Either party may at any time vary its representatives and fill any vacancy.

7. All meetings of the Board shall be convened by the chairman by notice served upon the members thereof.

8. The decision of the Board shall be the decision of the majority of the members and shall be signed by the chairman and forwarded to the Clerk of the Court, who shall forthwith notify the parties.

9. The decision of the Board may be reviewed and altered by the Court on the application of any of the parties. Provided that notice of an application to the Court to review such decision shall be given within seven days from the date thereof to the chairman and the opposite party and the application lodged with the Registrar asking for such review within fourteen days of such decision. Provided further, that all parties shall abide by the decision unless and until the same is altered by the Court.

10. The functions of the Board shall be:—

- (1) To settle and/or determine any matters left to the decision of the Board by this Award.
- (2) To settle, allow, determine, and deal with any matter or thing which the Court may from time to time refer to the Board.
- (3) Subject to the jurisdiction of the Court of Arbitration, generally to settle and/or determine any dispute or question arising out of this Agreement, except a matter involving the interpretation of any of the terms thereof or any variation in the rates of wages or any other term hereof.

#### 16.—Preference to Unionists.

Members of the Printing Industry Employees' Union of Australia shall, all other things being equal, have preference of employment.

#### 17. Apprentices to Composing and Machining.

Apprentices shall be engaged under the terms and regulations herein set forth:—

1. An employer shall be deemed to undertake the duty which he agrees to perform as a duty enforceable under this Award.

2. The employer of every apprentice shall keep him constantly at work and teach such apprentice, or cause him to be taught the industry, craft, occupation, or calling in relation to which he is bound apprentice, by competent instruction in a gradual and complete manner, and he shall give such apprentice a reasonable opportunity to learn the same, and receive during the term of his apprenticeship, such technical trade and general instruction and training as may be necessary. And every apprentice shall during the period of his apprenticeship faithfully serve his employer for the purpose of being taught the industry, craft, occupation, or calling in relation to which he is bound, and shall also conscientiously and regularly accept such technical, trade, and general instruction and training as aforesaid, in addition to the teaching that may be provided by his employer.

3. The Board of Reference constituted under Award of Industrial Board No. 6 of 1928 and governing apprentices in the job printing industry shall function in regard to apprentices covered in this Award, provided that two representatives of the Perth Newspaper Proprietors' Association and two representatives of the Union shall be added to the Board.

4. The functions of the Apprenticeship Board shall be as follow:—

(i) To advise the Court as regards apprenticeship matters in the Printing Industry within the area covered by the agreement, and in particular on the following heads:—

- (a) The appointment or re-appointment of examiners.
- (b) The preparation of a syllabus for the course of instruction from time to time.
- (c) The methods of instruction to be followed.
- (d) The conduct of examinations of apprentices.
- (e) Schemes for the institution of scholarships and prizes.

To receive monthly or other periodical reports from the instructors for the purpose of amending or correcting any laxity in attendance or conduct of apprentices at classes of instruction.

To assist in selecting the best type of apprentice and to advise upon ability of any person, firm, or company to effectively train an apprentice or apprentices and to encourage and foster the study of subjects bearing upon the trade or occupation in the evening classes or other classes instituted for the purpose.

To advise the Court and parties interested as to what additional plant is required from time to time for the effective training of the apprentice.

To assist in the promotion of classes for instruction in branches of the industry not already provided for.

To formulate and submit to the Court a scheme for the instruction of country apprentices.

To consider and recommend improvements in the training of apprentices from time to time.

(ii) The Apprenticeship Board shall hold its deliberations in private, unless a majority of the representatives of the parties or the chairman otherwise directs.

(iii) A majority of the members, one of whom must be the chairman, shall constitute a quorum; providing that in the case of differences of opinion between members representing the said Union of workers and members representing the said Union of employers, the decision of the chairman shall be accepted and taken as the decision of the Apprenticeship Board.

(iv) The Apprenticeship Board may sit at such times and places as the majority may decide and arrange from time to time and place to place.

(v) The decision of the Apprenticeship Board may be reviewed and altered by the Court on the application of any of the parties; provided that notice of an application to the Court to review such decision shall be given within seven days from the date thereof to the chairman and the opposite parties and the application lodged with the Registrar asking for such review, within fourteen days of such decision; provided further that all parties abide by the decision unless and until the same is altered by the Court.

(vi) With the consent of the Court either party may at any time vary its nomination of representative member.

5. Every office covered by this agreement shall be entitled to an apprentice for every four journeymen compositors and operators permanently employed, and one apprentice for every four or fraction of four flat-bed machinists; but no office shall be entitled to more than four apprentices to each section at one time. Apprentices shall not be allowed to work at night. The usual working hours of apprentices shall be the same as provided in Clause 4 of this Award.

The term "permanently employed," in this clause, shall mean having been fully employed for a period of three months previously.

6. The employer shall undertake to teach or cause to be taught to compositor apprentices the trade of a newspaper compositor.

An apprentice to letterpress machining shall be taught and instructed in all phases of letterpress machining, and all things incidental thereto, including make-ready and mixing and use of inks, black and colour printing, the class of paper and stock used, and the care of cylinder letterpress machines, including the mechanism of such machines. For this purpose the employer shall have and use in his business at least one cylinder machine. An attendance at the Technical College shall be a sufficient compliance with this clause as to colour printing.

The term of apprenticeship shall be six years, provided that when an apprentice is over sixteen years of age at the date of indenture, the period shall be five years; but such apprentice's wages shall be as if he had already served 12 months' apprenticeship.

A probationary period of three months previous to being bound shall be allowed, such probationary period to be deemed portion of the term of apprenticeship. On completion of probationary period application for registration shall be made to the Clerk of the Court of Arbitration.

7. A probationer shall submit himself to a suitable test prescribed by the Government Psychologist; the cost (if any) of such test shall be borne by the employer. Failure to satisfactorily pass such a test shall entitle the employer to terminate the proposed apprenticeship.

8. Before being indentured the apprentice shall prove to the satisfaction of his employer that he is physically capable of carrying out the duties of the section he intends being apprenticed to.

The apprentice shall submit to an eyesight test, and obtain a certificate of his fitness to be apprenticed to the trade, and a copy of such certificate shall be attached to the notice of registration of the apprenticeship.

An apprentice to composing shall be required to prove that he has passed the seventh standard or an

equivalent examination, or to produce a certificate that he has obtained that standard before being registered.

9. The minimum weekly wage payable to an apprentice shall be—

No deduction shall be made from the wages provided in the above scale, except as provided in Clauses 44 and 45 hereof.

The above rates shall be paid to all apprentices notwithstanding anything contained in their indentures.

10. An apprentice shall not be allowed to operate a linotype machine until he has passed the third year's test as a hand compositor and has reached the age of 18 years. Should he be put on a machine during the fourth and/or fifth year he shall be given at least four hours' practice a day, and shall receive 10s. per week in addition to the wages above prescribed. An apprentice shall not be fully employed on a machine to the exclusion of a permanent operator.

11. Any employer taking an apprentice on probation shall within fourteen days thereafter register such probationer by giving notice thereof to the Registrar in the prescribed form (1 (a) in Appendix), and if at the date of coming into operation of this Award an employer is employing an apprentice or probationer who has not been duly registered as such, he shall forthwith apply for the due registration of such apprentice or probationer.

12. The Court may in any case where it seems expedient to do so order that the probationary period of employment be extended for a further period not exceeding three months.

13. The apprenticeship agreement shall be completed within fourteen days of the termination of the probationary period.

14. All agreements of apprenticeship shall be drawn up on Form 6 in Appendix and signed by the employer, the legal guardian of the apprentice, and the apprentice. No employer, guardian, or apprentice shall enter into any agreement or undertaking purporting to add to, vary, alter or amend any such agreement without the approval of the Court.

15. The agreement shall be executed in triplicate; one part shall be held by the employer, one shall be held by the legal guardian of the apprentice, and one shall be retained by the Registrar.

16. Every agreement of apprenticeship shall be subject to the provision of any industrial Agreement or Award in force for the time being applicable to apprenticeship in the industry.

17. Every agreement of apprenticeship entered into shall contain—

- (a) the names and addresses of the parties to the agreement;
- (b) the date of birth of the apprentice;
- (c) a description of the industry, craft, occupation, or calling or combination thereof to which the apprentice is to be bound;
- (d) the date on which the apprenticeship is to commence and the period of apprenticeship;
- (e) a condition requiring the apprentice to obey all reasonable directions of the employer and requiring the employer and the apprentice to comply with the terms of the industrial Award so far as they concern the apprentice;
- (f) a condition that technical instruction, when available, shall be at the employer's expense and shall be in the employer's time;
- (g) a condition that, in the event of any apprentice in the opinion of the examiners not progressing satisfactorily, increased time for technical instruction shall be allowed at the employer's expense during the fifth year of such apprenticeship to enable such apprentice to reach the necessary standard;

(h) the general conditions of apprenticeship.

18. The Court may order the transfer of an apprentice from one employer to another, either temporarily or permanently,—

(a) if the employer does not provide the necessary facilities for the apprentice to become proficient in his trade; or

(b) upon the application of the employer or the apprentice for good cause shown.

19. The transfer of every apprentice shall be on Form 2 in Appendix, and shall be made out in quadruplicate, and shall, unless the Court otherwise directs, be signed by the late employer or his assigns, the legal guardian of the apprentice, the apprentice and the new employer. The transfer form shall be completed within one month of the date upon which the transfer is ordered to be effected.

20. The document of transfer shall be held, one part by the late employer, one by the new employer, one by the legal guardian of the apprentice, and one shall be supplied by the employer to and be retained by the Registrar.

21. Should an employer at any time before the determination of the period of apprenticeship desire to dispense with the service of the apprentice he may, with the consent of the apprentice and guardian, transfer him to another employer carrying on business within a reasonable distance of the original employer's place of business, qualified and willing to continue to teach the apprentice and pay the rate of wages prescribed by the Award or otherwise, according to the total length of time served, and generally to perform the obligations of the original employer.

22. Every agreement shall include a provision that it may be cancelled, by mutual consent, by the employer and the legal guardian of the apprentice, giving one month's notice in writing to the Court and to the parties concerned that such apprenticeship shall be terminated.

23. On the transfer or termination of any apprenticeship from whatever cause, the employer shall give the apprentice a certificate stating what time he has served, full particulars of the branches of the trade or industry in which he has received instruction, the proficiency attained, and shall also notify the Clerk of the Court of the cause thereof.

24. When an apprentice is discharged for cause the employer shall send notice in writing of the discharge and the cause thereof to the Clerk of Court in Form 3 in the Appendix.

(a) No apprentice employed under an Award shall be discharged by the employer for alleged misconduct until the registration of the agreement of apprenticeship has been cancelled by order of the Court, on the application of the employer.

(b) It shall not be obligatory to find the apprentice another employer if he shall so misconduct himself as to entitle the employer to discharge him.

Provided, however, that the apprentice may be suspended by the employer for misconduct, but in any such case, the employer shall forthwith make an application for cancellation of the agreement of apprenticeship, and in the event of the Court refusing same, the wages of the apprentice or such portion thereof as the Court may order shall be paid as from the date of such suspension and, in the event of the application being granted, such order may take effect from the date when the apprentice was suspended.

25. When an apprentice cannot be usefully employed because of a strike, the employer shall be relieved of his obligations under the apprenticeship agreement during the period of the strike.

26. Subject to regulation 41, time lost by the apprentice through sickness or any other cause whatsoever, may, with the consent of the Court, on the application of any party, be added to the original term in the apprenticeship agreement.

27. In the event of an employer being unable to provide the work for the apprentice, or to mutually agree with the legal guardian of the apprentice to cancel the agreement or arrange a transfer, application may be made to the Court to arrange for such transfer or to have such agreement cancelled.

28. When in any case an employer is temporarily unable to provide work to employ an apprentice for his full time, application may be made by the employer to the Court for permission to employ the apprentice on other work in the factory or establishment.

29. Every apprentice shall attend a Government Technical School, vocational classes, or classes of instruction where provided, for instructions in such subjects as are deemed necessary for his branch of the trade. He shall be allowed the necessary time off during his ordinary working hours to attend such classes. Any apprentice failing to attend such classes when given time off for that purpose shall be deemed to have unlawfully absented himself from his employment and may have his wages reduced accordingly.

30. The fees for the classes attended by the apprentice shall be paid for by the employer.

31. The period during which apprentices are to attend such technical school or classes shall be four hours per week.

32. Where instruction is provided for any branch of the trade, the method of training shall be as follows:—

(a) The name of each applicant for apprenticeship, as soon as he is registered as such, shall be forwarded by the Clerk of Court to the Apprenticeship Board, which shall keep a waiting list of such enrolments.

(b) The full course of instruction shall be designed to cover the whole period of the apprenticeship term. Provided that, in the event of failure to satisfactorily complete such course by the end of the period of instruction, the term may be extended.

(c) Each year's instruction shall be divided into two terms, ending June and November respectively.

(d) Each session of instruction shall consist of four hours weekly.

(e) The syllabus covering the whole period of apprenticeship shall be drawn up by the instructors in collaboration with the Apprenticeship Board.

(f) The instructors shall complete the course set down by the syllabus for each term in time to hold the terminal and annual examinations.

(g) All practical work given out by the instructors shall be entered upon a "Work Docket," and this, with the student's first proof and final proof, shall be examined by the instructor, allotted the deserved number of marks, and carefully preserved in a "Dossier" for reference during and at the completion of his student course. These practical tests shall be recorded on a special form, which may be inspected from time to time by members of the Apprenticeship Board, who shall have the right to make periodical visits of inspection during class hours.

(h) The instructors shall forward to the Apprenticeship Board a monthly report of the attendance and conduct of students, and such report to be in the hands of the secretary of the Board by the seventh day of the following month.

33. Every apprentice shall be bound to submit himself to examination by the examiners hereinafter provided for.

34. The Clerk of the Court shall notify examiners of the names and addresses of the apprentices required to submit themselves to examination.

35. The examiners shall be persons skilled in the industry, one shall be nominated by the employers and one by the workers, for each particular branch of the trade. Failing such nomination or nominations, the Court may appoint such person or persons as it may deem fit. In the event of a disagreement between the examiners, the matter in dispute shall be referred to the Apprenticeship Board, at the request of any one of the examiners, and the decision of such Apprenticeship Board shall be final and conclusive.

36. It shall be the duty of the examiners to examine the work, inquire into the diligence of each apprentice, and, where any apprentice fails to show progress, to inquire as to the opportunities provided by the employer for such apprentice to learn, and to submit a report to the Court in writing as to the result of the examination within fourteen days from the date of holding the examination.

37. Such examination shall include theory and practice as applied to the trade, industry, craft, occupation, or calling to which the apprentice is indentured.

38. The method of conducting the examination of apprentices in those branches of the trade where technical instruction is provided shall be as follows:—

(a) Except in the case of the first examination, no apprentice shall be examined unless he has gained a pass in the previous examination.

(b) The whole of the practical work of the examination shall be performed at the Technical College class room. (In those branches of the trade where no technical instruction is provided, the examination shall be held at the factory where the apprentice is employed, and it shall then be the duty of the employer to provide

such necessary material and machinery as may be required, and in all ways facilitate the conduct of such examination.)

(c) The terminal (June) examination shall be for theory only, and shall be conducted by the instructors during the last week but one preceding the end of the term. The questions shall also be set by the instructors, and the written answers checked, and the deserved marks allotted. Those, with each student's practical work for the term under review, shall be handed to the examiners, who shall approve, or otherwise, of the instructor's decisions. Any divergence of opinion that cannot be agreed upon mutually shall be referred to the Apprenticeship Board, whose decision shall be final.

(d) The examiners shall, during the month of June, make their annual visit of inspection to each factory where apprentices are employed, and personally interview the employer (or foreman), and also the apprentice, and shall satisfy themselves as to the assiduity of the apprentice in his daily work, and especially as to the facilities afforded him to enable him to make the required progress in his particular branch of the trade.

(e) The examiners shall present a report to the Court as to the progress made by the students during the term, and at the same time forward a copy to the Apprenticeship Board. The terminal report shall also cover their inspection of factories.

(f) The annual examination shall take place in November. The test papers shall be set by the examiners in collaboration with the instructors. The practical tests set during the term shall be checked by the examiners, who shall also set each student a special practical test, which shall be performed under their direct supervision at the Technical School class room during the second week of the examination. With these three results before them, viz., the written answers of the theory examination, the term's progressive tests already marked by the instructors, and the special tests judged by themselves, the examiners shall draw up their annual report and submit same to the Court at least three days before the date fixed for the final day of the term. A copy of such report shall be forwarded to the secretary of the Apprenticeship Board.

(g) Marks shall be awarded for these examinations as follows:—A first-class certificate shall be granted to all who secure 90 per cent. and over of marks. A second-class certificate shall be awarded to those who secure 80 to 89 per cent. marks, while 70 to 79 per cent. shall entitle a student to a pass. Less than 70 per cent. marks shall necessitate a student continuing his studies another term.

(h) At the conclusion of the student's course he shall sit for his final examination, which shall be conducted entirely by the examiners. A student securing marks totalling 96 per cent. and over shall be deemed to have obtained "Honours," and shall be entitled to receive an additional "Honours" certificate. A first-class certificate shall be granted to all who secure 90 per cent. and over of marks. A second-class certificate shall be awarded to those who secure 80 to 89 per cent. marks, while 70 to 79 per cent. shall entitle a student to a pass. Less than 70 per cent. of marks shall necessitate a student continuing his studies another term.

(i) The Registrar shall, after each examination, issue a certificate to each apprentice indicating (on Form 4 in the Appendix) the result of his examination and the final certificate in Form 5 in Appendix.

(j) If the examiners report to the Court that any employer has not provided sufficient opportunity for the apprentice to learn, the employer shall be deemed *prima facie* guilty of a breach of this Award. Upon any proceedings against him in respect of such breach, the report may be received in evidence.

(k) Any apprentice claiming to have cause for complaint regarding instruction, either in Technical College or in workshop, shall have the right to appeal to the Apprenticeship Board.

39. Such fees shall be paid by the Clerk to the examiners as the Court shall allow.

40. The employer shall pay the apprentice, in respect of time lost through compulsory military or naval training, the amount (if any) by which the wages prescribed by the Award for the trade, calling, craft, occupation, or industry exceeds the amount received by the apprentice from the Department of Defence. Provided, however, that this clause shall not apply to military or naval training imposed through failure to attend compulsory parades.

41. All time lost by reason of compulsory military or naval training, other than the additional training

mentioned in the above proviso, shall count as part of the apprenticeship.

42. When an apprentice attends a Technical College during his ordinary working hours, the time so occupied shall be regarded as part of the term of his apprenticeship, and the employer shall not be entitled to make any deduction from the wages of the apprentice for such time.

43. If the Apprenticeship Board makes representations to the Court that the facilities provided by the Technical College or other place of vocational training for the teaching of apprentices, are inadequate, the Court may make such investigations and such report to the Minister controlling such Technical College or other such place as it deems necessary.

44. The term of apprenticeship may be extended by the Court on the failure of an apprentice to pass any of the examinations, and for such purpose it shall be the duty of the examiners to make any necessary recommendation to the Court. Any extension of the term of apprenticeship shall be subject to all conditions and stipulations in the original Award, except as to rates of wages, which shall be such amount as the Court may determine.

45. Upon the failure of an apprentice to pass two consecutive examinations, it shall be the duty of the examiners to report same to Court, with a recommendation as to the cancellation of the apprenticeship agreement, or such other remedial measures as they may deem advisable. The Court, after notice to all parties concerned, may cancel the agreement or make such order in the circumstances as it may deem necessary.

#### Apprentices to Stereotyping.

Every office covered by this Award shall be entitled to an apprentice for first four journeymen or fraction thereof and one for every additional four permanently employed. Apprentices shall not be allowed to work at night except in the last year of their apprenticeship. The apprenticeship shall be for a term of five years, and no apprentice shall be allowed to commence his apprenticeship until he has attained the age of 16 years. The wages of an apprentice to stereotyping shall be those set out in this Award for apprentices to the composing and letterpress sections. The general conditions covering apprentices to the composing and letterpress sections, set out herein will, as far as they are applicable, cover apprentices to stereotyping.

- (c) That technical instruction of the apprentice, if available in ordinary working hours, shall be at the expense of the employer, and shall be in the employer's time.
- (f) In the event of the apprentice, in the opinion of the examiners appointed by the Arbitration Court, not progressing satisfactorily, increased time for technical instruction shall be allowed, at the employer's expense, to enable the apprentice to reach the necessary standard.
2. And the said apprentice and the said parent covenant with the said employer that.....the said apprentice during the said term will—
- (a) well, faithfully, and honestly serve the said employer as an apprentice in his trade or business aforesaid;
- (b) willingly obey the lawful orders and commands of the said employer, or of such of his representatives as he the said apprentice shall be placed under in the said business;
- (c) not do or suffer to be done or committed any waste, damage, or other injury to the property or goods of the said employer, or any firm or company of which he may be a member, or sell or lend them to any person without the consent of the said employer;

- (e) not by word or action induce other apprentices to disobedience;
- (f) not participate or take part or be concerned in a strike or anything in the nature thereof;
- (g) duly perform and observe the covenants, conditions, and stipulations contained in the now current Award so far as the same relates to the apprenticeship.
3. It is hereby further agreed by and between the parties thereto:—
- (1) The apprentice shall not be entitled to receive any pay for any time during which he shall from any cause whatsoever be absent from the service of the said employer without leave.
- (2) Time lost by the apprentice through absence from any cause whatsoever shall be added to the term of this agreement and so that the amount of such lost time during any six monthly period shall be made up before the ensuing period of six months shall be deemed to commence.
- (3) If at any time during the said term the said employer shall die or cease to carry on his business aforesaid as now carried on by him, he or his executors, administrators, or assigns shall be at liberty within one month from the date of such death or ceasing to carry on, to assign or transfer the said apprentice to some other employer upon and subject to the same or the like conditions and stipulations as are herein contained. Provided that, if the said employer or his executors, administrators, or assigns as aforesaid shall not within the said period of one month be able to find another such employer able and willing to accept the apprentice, then the said employer or his executors, administrators, or assigns as aforesaid shall have the right to discharge the said apprentice, and to terminate this agreement by giving to the said apprentice one week's notice in writing.
- (4) That if the employer shall remove his business to some place beyond the radius of three miles from his place of business at the date hereof, the parent and the apprentice may, within one month of such removal, by notice in writing, elect to have the apprentice transferred to some other employer within the said radius, if there be one such able and willing to accept the apprentice, and on receipt of notice in writing of such election the employer will use his utmost endeavours to find such an employer and to obtain the transfer of the said apprentice, and it is further agreed, that if at the expiration of three months from the date of such election there shall not have been found another such employer able and willing forthwith to accept the apprentice, then the parent and the apprentice may by a further notice in writing claim to have this agreement terminated.

- (5) If at any time during the said term the said apprentice shall neglect or refuse to obey the lawful commands of the said employer or his representative, or shall commit a breach of any of the covenants on his part herein contained, the said employer shall have the right, subject to confirmation by the Court, to discharge the said apprentice and to terminate this agreement by giving the said apprentice one week's notice of his intention so to do.
- (6) That upon the termination of this agreement by any means before the expiration of the said term and confirmation by the Court, no proceedings shall be taken by any one party against the other or others in respect of any thing which has taken place before the date of such termination.

# IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 11 of 1929.

West Australian Branch Australasian Meat Industry Employees' Industrial Union of Workers, Kalgoorlie, Applicant, and J. Sheehan; J. Cliff & Co.; Linton & Reeves; Horan Bros.; Co-operative Butchers, T. Northwood; L. Trehwala, and others, Respondents.

THE Court of Arbitration of Western Australia doth hereby make the following Award in connection with the Industrial Dispute between the abovenamed par-

## AWARD.

### 1.—Area.

This Award shall operate over the locality comprised within a radius of ten miles from the Kalgoorlie Post Office.

### 2.—Term.

This Award shall remain in force for a period of three years from its date, with a right to apply to amend at the expiration of twelve months from its date.

### Slaughtering Section.

#### 3.—Hours.

The hours of labour for all workers in or in connection with slaughterhouse, other than stockmen, shall not exceed forty-eight hours per week; one day of ten hours, and all other days not to exceed eight hours: Provided that in case of emergency a second day of ten hours is permissible, but in such case a slaughterman only shall be employed on such second day in the capacity of a slaughterman.

#### 4.—Starting Time.

During the months of April, May, June, July, August and September starting time shall be 7 a.m.; during the months of October, November, December, January, February, and March, the starting time shall be 5 a.m. The starting and finishing time shall mean, in the case of men having charge of horses or motors, the time of entry and of leaving the stables or parking place, and in the case of other workers, at the slaughterhouse.

## 5.—Meals.

One hour off shall be allowed for each meal.

## 6.—Wages.

The minimum rate of wages payable to each worker shall be:—

## 7.—Yarding Stock.

All stock shall be yarded by some person other than slaughtermen into the yards where the watering takes place: Provided that, any employer not having sufficient work to keep his slaughterman or slaughtermen fully employed in slaughtering may employ him or them, but at the same wage, in any other capacity provided for in this Award.

## 8.—Holidays.

(a) The following days shall be observed as holidays, with no deduction of pay for that week, and no work shall be done (except as herein provided) by any workers:—Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day. When Christmas Day falls on a Sunday, the following Monday to be observed as Christmas Day, the day following to be Boxing Day.

(b) In addition to the days specially mentioned in Subclause (a), workers shall be entitled to one week's holiday at the end of each year of service, such leave to be taken at a time to be mutually agreed between the employer and the worker but not later, except with the worker's consent, than two months from the expiration of the year's service. Should the period of service be less than a year the worker shall be paid pro rata.

(c) If the business establishment is closed by mutual consent, or if the worker is absent from duty without reasonable cause on any day other than those specified in Subclause (a), the worker's wages may be reduced pro rata.

## 9.—Record Book.

Each employer shall keep or cause to be kept in the shop a record book containing the names of all workers employed by him, the class of work performed, and the number of each kind of beast killed by him, and the wages paid to such worker. Such book shall be open for the inspection of the secretary of the Union or such person as may be appointed to attend to same on any day during working hours.

## Shop Section.

## 10.—Hours.

The hours of labour for all workers engaged in or about or in connection with the business of a butcher's shop or cutting cart, smallgoods shop or factory, or, in the handling of fresh killed or frozen meat, shall not exceed forty-eight hours per week, worked as follows:—Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday, from 6 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Saturday, 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.; Wednesday, 3 a.m. to 1 p.m. The hours of labour to be continuous, except for a break of one hour for each meal, but an additional day of ten hours in any week may be worked in any week in which a holiday occurs, except when such holiday occurs on a Monday.

## 11.

In case of emergency or in cases of breakdown of a refrigerating plant which necessitates handling the meat contained in the chambers attached thereto, overtime is permissible, at the rate of payment, time and a half.

## 12.—Wages.

The minimum rate of wages payable weekly to each worker shall be:—

"Small-goodsman" shall mean one who actually performs the work of preparing, manufacturing, or making up from meat smallgoods, except sausages known as butchers' sausages, but shall not mean or include the employer or the manager or the member of any firm, and, in shops where only one small-goodsman is employed, he shall be classed as small-goodsman.

## 13.—Holidays.

(a) The following holidays shall be observed, with no reduction of pay for that week:—Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day.

(b) In addition to the days specially mentioned in Subclause (a), workers shall be entitled to one week's holiday at the end of each year of service, such leave to be taken at a time to be mutually agreed between the employer and the worker but not later, except with the worker's consent, than two months from the expiration of the year's service. Should the period of service be less than a year the worker shall be paid pro rata.

(c) If the business establishment is closed by mutual consent, or if the worker is absent from duty without reasonable cause on any day other than those specified in Subclause (a), the worker's wages may be reduced pro rata.

## 14.—Record.

Each employer shall keep or cause to be kept at his shop, or at each of them if more than one, a record containing the names of all workers employed by him, the class of work performed, the hours between which the workers have worked, the starting time and ceasing time each day, the wages paid to each worker, and the overtime, if any. Such book shall be open to the inspection of the secretary of the Union or such other person as may be appointed to attend to same on any day during working hours. Such accredited officer may enter any shop at any reasonable hour should he have reasonable grounds to suppose that the provisions of the Award are being violated, for the purpose of making inquiries.

## General Clauses.

The following shall apply to both sections of the industry:—

## 15.—Weekly Hiring.

The employment of constant hands shall be weekly and a week's notice shall be given on either side to terminate engagement. Such notice shall be given on pay day or a week's wages paid in lieu thereof.

## 16.—Casual Hands.

A casual hand is a worker employed for less than one week.

## 17.—Under-rate Workers.

A worker, who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum rate hereby prescribed, may be employed at a lesser rate which shall be agreed upon in writing between the worker and the secretary of the Workers' Union. If within seven days after being notified in writing of the worker's desire to work at a lower rate of wages than that prescribed, the said secretary and the worker are unable to agree upon the lower rate, then the worker may apply to the Resident Magistrate to fix such lower rate of wage. The worker shall give such secretary two days' notice of his intention to apply to the Magistrate, and the said secretary or his agent may attend and oppose the application. The Magistrate may fix the rate of wage and his decision shall be final.

Any worker whose wage shall have been so fixed may work for and be employed by an employer for such wages for the period of six months thereafter, and, after the expiration of the said period, until fourteen days' notice in writing shall have been given him by the secretary of the Union requiring his wages to again be fixed in the manner prescribed by this clause: Provided always, that the employer shall not employ more than one such incompetent worker to every four fully paid workers or fraction of the first four.

## 18.—Carter.

Carters of all classes and tradesmen doing carting may be required to feed and water the horses used at the shop or slaughterhouses or in connection therewith, where no groom is kept: Provided that each such carter shall perform the work in rotation, and where only one carter is employed he shall be entitled to each alternate holiday and Sunday off this duty.



## 19.—Posting of Award.

A copy of this Award shall be posted in some position in each shop, factory, and slaughterhouse accessible to all workers.

## 20.—Apprentices.

(a) The provisions of this schedule annexed hereto and entitled "Apprenticeship Regulations" shall extend and apply to apprentices coming within the scope of this Award.

(b) The maximum number of apprentices allowed to any employer shall be in the proportion of one to every three or fraction of three fully paid workers in the slaughtering and/or shop sections, in accordance with whether the employer carries on either or both of these branches of the butchering trade: Provided that the fraction of three shall not be less than one.

(c) Apprentices may be taken to learn:—(1) slaughtering; (2) retail butchering; (3) smallgoods making; or any two of these branches.

(d) The period of apprenticeship shall be five years.

(e) The minimum wage payable to apprentices shall be:—

The above amounts shall be varied from time to time so as to conform to and be in parity with any alteration made in the basic wage from time to time.

THIS Industrial Agreement, made in pursuance of "The Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1925," of Western Australia, this twentieth day of November, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-one, between the Commissioners of the Fremantle Harbour Trust, Fremantle, of the one part, and the Coastal Dock, Rivers, and Harbour Works Union of Workers, Fremantle, of the other part, witnesseth:—

## 1.—Rates of Wages.

Subject to Clause 17 hereof the minimum rates of wages, on the basis of 56 hours per week, shall be as follows:—

Basic Wage £3 13s. 6d. per week.

(a) Deckhands £4 19s. 6d. per week (margin over basic wage £1 6s.).

(b) Firemen £5 9s. 6d. per week (margin over basic wage £1 16s.).

(c) Where a deckhand is called upon for any reason to perform the work of a fireman for a period of two hours or more in any shift, he shall be paid at firemen's rates for the whole of that shift. Where the period is less than two hours, he shall be paid his ordinary rate for the whole shift.

## 2.—Payment of Wages.

(a) All wages due shall be payable at 3 o'clock p.m. on Fridays in each week.

(b) Wages may be payable on the written order of the employee to the person named in such order, and the Commissioners by paying to such order shall be relieved of all responsibility on obtaining the signature of the person named in the said order.

## 3.—Hours of Labour.

(a) The hours of labour shall not be more than eight (8) per day, to be worked as under, or, as mutually agreed upon between the Commissioners and the employees, viz.:—

1. Night shift .. .. 11 p.m. to 7 a.m.
2. Day shift .. .. 7 a.m. to 3 p.m.
3. Afternoon shift .. .. 3 p.m. to 11 p.m.

(b) Employees shall be allowed to relieve one another to suit their convenience to catch trains or trams, so long as the full shift is maintained at all times.

## 4.—Engagement and Dismissal.

(a) Except for casual employees, all employment shall be by the week, and a week's notice on either side shall be given to terminate such employment, or the employer shall pay one week's wages in lieu of such notice.

(b) The engagement of employees may be made by the Harbour Master or his deputy at the recognised pick-up place at the Shelter Shed adjacent to the Pilot Office, between the hours of 7.45 a.m. and 9 a.m. on any week day. Should it be necessary to fill any vacancy urgently and outside of the above hours, the man or men required may be picked up at any place convenient to the Harbour Master or his deputy, provided that notification shall be sent forthwith to the secretary of the Union as to the man or men so engaged. The Harbour Master or his deputy shall at all times retain the right of free selection among members of the Union, provided same are available.

(c) The Commissioners shall not discriminate without just cause against any member of the Union who bears good conduct record, and who agrees to continue to work under the terms of this Agreement and for whom there is a vacancy, and the Commissioners shall consider any representations made to them by the secretary of the Union.

(d) In cases where an employee misconducts himself, the employer shall have the right to dismiss him instantly.

## 5.—Overtime.

(a) Subject to Clause 17 hereof the rate for overtime payment shall be 3s. per hour.

(b) Overtime shall mean and include all time worked in excess of eight (8) hours in any one shift, and shall, except as otherwise herein provided, start to count as and from the time the employee out of his ordinary working hours is ordered to attend and does report for duty in accordance with such orders until released or his turn-to time is reached, including any time he may be waiting or standing by on the job after the time he was ordered and was not released.

(c) Where a pilot vessel is ordered to attend any vessel coming into or leaving the harbour, and the shift on duty thereby works longer than the eight hours provided for that shift, the employees affected shall be paid the prescribed overtime rates for all time in excess of the eight hours over the first half hour, until the vessel returns to her berth or the shift is relieved. If the first half hour is exceeded, a whole hour shall be paid up to the first full hour and thereafter the computation shall be hourly. Provided that, in the event of any employee not being relieved on the vessel's return to her berth owing to the relief employee not being in attendance, the relief in default shall have deducted from his pay the amount of extra payment involved by his absence.

## 6.—Meals.

The Pilot Service shall operate continuously (or as directed by the Commissioners) in eight-hour shifts, without cessation for a recognised meal hour, provided that, during each shift, a period of twenty minutes shall be allowed each employee to have his meal. The working of a pilot vessel shall not be interrupted for any meal time.

Subject to Clause 17 hereof, where a meal time is not given, the employee shall receive a special payment of 5s.

## 7.—Change Room.

A change room shall be provided as heretofore by the Commissioners to allow of employees changing their clothes or taking their meals when ashore.

## 8.—Sickness and Accident.

(a) If in the course of his employment, an employee engaged under this Agreement, whilst on duty or whilst acting under the instructions of the employer, receives an injury or contracts any sickness arising out of or in the course of his employment, he shall be entitled to receive the wages prescribed in this Agreement from the date of his said incapacity up to and including the date of his recovery, as certified by his medical attendant, provided that the maximum period of payment under this clause shall not exceed three months of thirty days each.



(b) The illness or injury which so entitles the employee to the benefits provided for in this clause shall be suffered while on duty and shall be:—

1. such as wholly to incapacitate him from performing his duty;
2. so far as can be ascertained, an illness or injury contracted or sustained whilst on duty in the service of the employer.

Provided that, if the illness or injury is due to his own wilful act or to his misbehaviour, the employee shall not be entitled to the benefits provided in this clause.

(c) In the case of an accident suffered while on duty the expenses of providing the necessary medicines, surgical and medical advice and attendances, shall be paid by the employer without any deduction from the wages on that account until the employee is certified as recovered by his medical attendant; provided, that the aggregate amount so paid shall not exceed the amount that would have been paid had such payment been made under the provisions of "The Workers' Compensation Act, 1912-1924."

(d) All wages payable under this claim to the employee while sick or injured shall be paid on Fridays of each week and as provided for in Clause 2.

#### 9.—Casual Employees.

(a) A casual employee is one who is engaged in a temporary capacity, and the contract of service in respect of such employees shall be a daily one. The services of casual employees may be terminated at any time without previous notice.

(b) Subject to Clause 17 hereof, the daily rates of pay for casual employees shall be:—

1. For the first fourteen consecutive working days—Fireman, 22s. 6d.; deckhand, 20s.
2. Thereafter, one seventh of the rates prescribed in Clause 1.

(c) A casual employee shall be entitled to annual leave in accordance with Clause 10 hereof, but shall not be entitled to room allowance prescribed in Clause 11, unless his period of employment has exceeded fourteen consecutive days, nor to any issue of uniform.

#### 10.—Annual Leave.

(a) An employee who serves the Commissioners continuously for a period of twelve months shall be allowed leave of absence on full pay, as soon thereafter as convenient to the service, for a continuous period of one calendar month of 30 days.

(b) If he serves continuously for one month or more and not for one year, he shall be entitled to payment in lieu of leave at the rate of two and a half days for each completed month of service.

(c) The Commissioners shall give at least twenty-four hours' notice to each employee of their intention to give the employee his leave of absence, and his wages for the leave period shall be paid, together with all other moneys due prior to his going on leave.

#### 11.—Room Allowance.

Subject to Clause 17 hereof the Commissioners shall allow to each married employee a house or room allowance of 12s. per week, unless the Commissioners provide living accommodation.

#### 12.—Uniforms.

The Commissioners shall provide for the use of each employee, free of cost, one cap, one serge suit, and one suit of dungarees on the completion of each eight months' continuous service, and one oilskin coat and sou'-wester hat each year.

Uniforms shall belong to the Commissioners, to be worn on service, and shall be kept clean and tidy. Should the service of any employee terminate within one month of the date of issue of uniforms or any portion of same, all the issue last made shall be returned to the Commissioners before the employee is paid any moneys which may be due to him.

#### 13.—Board of Reference.

Should any dispute arise between any employee and the Commissioners the matter shall be referred to a Board of Reference, consisting of a representative of the Commissioners, a representative of the Union, and a chairman to be mutually agreed upon by those representatives; failing their agreement, the Registrar of the Arbitration Court of Western Australia shall act as chairman. The decision of the Board shall be final and binding.

#### 14.—Definitions.

"Shift or shifts" means a period of eight (8) consecutive hours worked in reliefs of two or three, as may be required by the Commissioners.

"Employee" means any person employed under the provisions of this Agreement.

"Wages" includes overtime payment.

"Employer," "Commissioners," means the Commissioners of the Fremantle Harbour Trust, or any officer deputed by the said Commissioners.

"Harbour Master" means the Harbour Master for Fremantle appointed by the Commissioners.

#### 15.—Area.

The area covered by this Agreement is all the sea and coastline within a radius of twenty (20) miles from Arthur Head, and up the Swan River to and including Perth water, and the Canning River to the lower Canning Bridge.

#### 16.—Term.

This Agreement shall have effect as from and including the fourth day of September, 1931, and shall remain in force until the thirty-first day of December, 1932, but may continue thereafter subject to one month's notice from either party hereto.

#### 17.—Temporary Reductions.

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in this Agreement the rates of pay for wages, allowances, and overtime prescribed herein shall, during such time as "The Financial Emergency Act, 1931," shall continue and remain in operation, be reduced in accordance with the provisions of Part II. of the said Act and the scale of reductions set forth in the schedule to the said Act.

### IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 21 of 1931.

In the matter of "The Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1925," and in the matter of an Industrial Dispute between the Bank Officials' Association of Western Australia Union of Workers, Perth (hereinafter called "the Union"), of the one part, and the Bank of Australasia, the Union Bank of Australia, Limited, the Bank of New South Wales, the National Bank of Australasia, Limited, the Commercial Bank of Australia, Limited, the Bank of Adelaide, the English, Scottish, and Australian Bank, Limited (hereinafter called "the Banks"), of the other part.

THE Court of Arbitration of Western Australia doth hereby make the following Award in connection with the Industrial Dispute between the abovenamed parties:—

#### AWARD.

The minimum rates of pay and conditions of employment shall be:—

##### 1.—Rates of Pay—Clerks and Typists.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided, the minimum rates of pay of clerks and male typists and female

typists (less any deductions for guarantee, provident, and similar funds) shall be as follows:—

(b) If during the currency of this Award the Arbitration Court of Western Australia should prescribe a basic wage generally or in any district differing in amount from that now prescribed, then the marginal differences between the present basic wage and the minimum rates herein prescribed shall be deemed to be increased or decreased, as the case may be, to the same extent as the present basic wage may be decreased or increased by the said Arbitration Court as aforesaid, to the intent that the rates herein prescribed shall remain constant, subject to the provision for deduction of ten per cent. (10 per cent.) hereinafter mentioned during the said period.

(c) Female clerks, other than typists, engaged on or before the first day of September, 1920, may be paid the rates prescribed for female typists, but any female clerks other than typists engaged after the first day of September, 1920, are to be paid the rates prescribed for male clerks. Where, however, female clerks are employed on such work as typing, shorthand, indexing, sorting, filing, recording branch remittances, current account of tellers' cash books or slips, perusal or dealing with branch returns or the working of any mechanical appliances, they may be paid the rates prescribed for female typists.

(d) The minimum rate at 21 years of age for adult clerks, male and female, and adult male typists shall be at the rate of £220 per year, and for adult female typists at the rate of £145 per year irrespective of years of service.

(e) In the case of a male officer who joins the service of a bank when over nineteen years of age, his salary on reaching the age of twenty-eight years shall be not less than that prescribed for an officer in his twelfth year of service, and shall be increased thereafter as though he had completed eleven years' service on reaching his twenty-eighth birthday, but this provision shall not affect or prejudice the established rights of any officer who at the date of this Award was entitled to the benefit of Subclause (d) of Clause 1 of Industrial Agreement No. 15 of 1925.

(f) Any employee who is required by a bank to live away from his or her usual home shall receive a total remuneration of not less than at the rate of £130 per year. In the absence of any arrangement to the contrary, "Usual home" shall be taken to be the place at which he or she is first engaged.

(g) The rates of pay and increases in pay prescribed in Clause 1 (a) shall be subject to good conduct, diligence, and efficiency. The certificate of the superintendent, general manager, or chief manager of the bank concerned, or his deputy, shall be accepted as conclusive evidence as to this.

Whenever any salary or increment provided for by this Award shall be withheld from any officer, he shall be informed within a fortnight after the date on which it is decided to withhold such salary or increase.

If such officer within one month afterwards asks in writing to be furnished with the reasons for such withholding he shall be informed in writing of such reasons within a fortnight from the receipt at head office of the request therefor.

## 2.—Rates of Pay—Messengers.

(a) Head messengers, metropolitan, shall be paid a wage ranging from a minimum of £5 to a maximum of £5 10s. per week. Where quarters are provided the rates shall be from £4 10s. to £5 per week. Advancement from the minimum to the maximum shall be at the discretion of the bank concerned.

(b) Messengers, metropolitan, where covered by a State determination or Award shall be paid at the rate prescribed by such determination or Award, and, where not covered by a State determination or Award, they shall be paid at the following rates:—

## 3.—Engagement.

(a) All employees under this Award shall be engaged and employed by the month, except where otherwise mutually agreed to in writing between the individual banks and their individual employees.

(b) Messengers shall be engaged and employed by the week.

## 4.—Hours of Duty.

(a) The ordinary hours of duty of employees other than messengers shall not exceed forty-two (42) hours per week, exclusive of meal hours, except at half-yearly balancing periods, when for two weeks, including balancing day, the hours shall not exceed forty-eight (48) per week. Not less than forty-five (45) minutes shall be allowed for meals on all working days except Saturday.

(b) Messengers covered by and paid under a State determination or Award shall work the hours prescribed by such determination or Award. The hours of duty of messengers not covered by a State determination or Award shall not exceed forty-eight (48) hours per week, exclusive of meal hours.

## 5.—Overtime and Tea Money.

(a) All time worked by employees other than messengers, in excess of the hours prescribed in Clause 4 (a) shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half ordinary rates. No overtime need be paid to an employee for the time worked looking for errors in his or her own work. The superintendent or general manager or chief manager of the bank concerned, or his deputy, shall decide whether any overtime is to be paid or not. Overtime shall be computed on fortnightly periods of eighty-four (84) hours, except at half-yearly balancing time, when the period shall be ninety-six (96) hours per fortnight.

(b) Overtime need only be paid for if worked by direction of some responsible officer deputed by the bank. No overtime shall be paid to any employee not working under supervision.

(c) No overtime need be paid to an employee drawing a salary in excess of £402 per year nor to any manager or executive officer.

(d) If any employee other than messengers is required to work after 6.30 p.m. on Monday to Friday inclusive, or after 1.30 p.m. on Saturday, such employee shall be allowed two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) for a meal, and a further two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) if required to work after 6.30 p.m. on Saturday in addition to any overtime payment he or she may be entitled to, provided he or she is unable for sufficient reason to go to his or her usual place of abode for such meal.

(e) Overtime shall be paid without an employee being required to make application therefor.

## 6.—Annual Leave.

(a) Employees other than messengers of up to and including ten years' service shall receive not less than two weeks' leave of absence annually on full pay, in addition to all gazetted bank holidays, and those of over ten years' service three weeks' leave of absence annually. Messengers shall receive two weeks' leave of absence annually.

(b) In the event of it being found impracticable to grant such leave in any year the employee concerned shall in the following year be granted two or three weeks' leave, as the case may be, in addition to the leave for such year. Leave shall not accumulate for more than two years.

(c) Where practicable, married officers shall be given at least a fortnight's notice of the bank's intention to send them on annual leave.

(d) Annual leave shall be in respect of each calendar year.

## 7.—Travelling Expenses.

Employees when travelling under instructions from the bank shall be entitled to the following travelling expenses:—

- (i) First class fares by rail or boat and any necessary cab and portage expenses to be approved of by the bank;
- (ii) Ten shillings (10s.) per day and five shillings (5s.) per half day. No allowance for journeys completed between ordinary meal times;
- (iii) One third of these allowances to be paid when travelling by boat and found.

## 8.—Relieving Allowance.

(a) An employee sent from the metropolitan area of Perth to relieve an employee outside the metropolitan area, or an employee sent from one country town to another to relieve an employee, and who as a consequence has to reside away from his usual home, shall be paid a minimum relieving allowance at the rate of £1 10s. per week in the case of clerks and accountants and £2 2s. per week in the case of managers. These allowances shall be increased to cover any further actual reasonable expenses incurred while relieving. The inspector of the bank concerned shall decide what are reasonable expenses.

## 9.—Dismissal, etc.

(a) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in or implied by Clause 1 hereof an officer may, subject to Sections 92 and 121 (6) of "The Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1925," be reduced for disciplinary reasons or for inefficiency or other good cause, in which event he shall be paid such rate as may be agreed upon by the bank concerned and the secretary of the Union. If the bank is unable to agree with the secretary of the Union as to the rate to be paid in such case, the matter shall be dealt with in the manner prescribed by Clause 13.

This Subclause (a) shall in no way interfere with the discretionary power referred to in Clause 1 (g).

(b) Whenever an officer is dismissed, suspended, or reduced in salary, or is informed that he is disgraced, and within one month afterwards such officer asks in writing to be furnished with the reasons for such action, he shall be informed in writing of such reasons within a fortnight from the receipt at head office of the request therefor.

## 10.—Aged and Infirm Workers.

Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum rate of wage herein prescribed may be employed at a lesser rate of wage, to be agreed upon in writing between the worker and the secretary of the Union, or, in default of such agreement, within twenty-four hours after such worker shall have applied in writing to such secretary stating his desire that such wage be agreed upon, such wage shall be fixed by the most convenient Resident or Police Magistrate, upon the application of such worker, after twenty-four hours' notice in writing shall have been given by him to the said secretary, who shall, if he so desires, be heard by the Magistrate upon such application.

After having made application to the secretary, and after lodging the application to the Magistrate, and pending the decision therein in either case, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed by the employer at the proposed reduced wage.

The determination of the Magistrate shall have effect for six calendar months from the date thereof, and, after the expiration of the said period, until the wage shall be again fixed in the manner prescribed at the instance of the said secretary.

The secretary may by writing under his hand appoint an agent or substitute to represent the Union at the hearing of any such application before the Magistrate.

## 11.—General.

(a) No employee shall, as a result of this Award, suffer any loss of wages, allowance or position to which the employee may be entitled under agreement with the bank concerned, and each bank will continue its present practice with regard to sick pay and mining, field, and other special allowances.

(b) Banks will continue their present practice of reviewing periodically the pay of employees other than those provided for by this Award.

(c) All wages shall be paid twice a month on dates most convenient to individual banks,

(d) Automatic increases shall date from the first pay day falling after the completed year of service or, at the option of the individual banks, they may date from the nearest half-yearly balance day following the completed year of service. Individual banks may select which of these methods they adopt. But if a bank decides not to adopt the first method set out in this sub-clause for fixing the date of increases and the completed year of service falls in the first three months of the half year, the increase shall date from the end of the half year preceeding the completed year of service.

(e) This Award shall be limited in its effect to the State of Western Australia.

## 12.—Definitions.

(a) For the purpose of calculating the length of service of any employee, any period of probation which such employee shall have served shall be included; also, all service, whether continuous or in broken periods (provided the break is not for more than twelve months), in any bank, and also any period for which an employee (already in the bank's service when he enlisted) had been engaged on active service in the Great War.

(b) Messengers shall mean all male employees other than the clerical staff, lift attendants, watchmen, and cleaners.

## 13.—Disputes.

In the event of any dispute arising as to any of the matters herein contained, except any question of interpretation, the matter shall be referred to a representative of the Union and a representative of the bank concerned, and, if they are unable to come to an agreement, the matter shall be referred to the Court, which may determine the matter itself or refer to a board constituted under Section 87 of the Act.

## 14.—Operation of Award.

This Award shall come into operation as from the 24th day of December, 1931, and shall remain in force for one year.

## 15.—Reduction of Salaries, etc.

The rates of pay and all other monetary allowances or payments of any nature whatsoever herein contained, save and except the meal allowances mentioned in Clause 5 (d), shall be reduced by ten per centum (10%) calculated to the nearest penny.

## IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

Nos. 525 and 529 of 1931.

In the matter of an Award made by an Industrial Board for the calling or industry of Coal Mining, in the South-West Land Division of Western Australia, on the 15th day of October, 1931, and numbered 10 of 1931, between the Amalgamated Collieries of W.A. Ltd. (hereinafter referred to as "the employer"), and the Coal Miners' Industrial Union of Workers of W.A., Collieries (hereinafter referred to as "the Union"), and in the matter of appeals by the Union and the employer against the said Award, under Section 86 of "The Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1925."

UPON hearing Mr. H. Whiteaker, on behalf of the Union, and Mr. D. J. Coleman, on behalf of the employer, the Court doth hereby order that Award dated the 15th day of October, 1931, No. 10 of 1931, be and the same is hereby amended as follows:—

## SCHEDULE OF AMENDMENTS.

## Clause 4—Day Wages:

Omit the figures "5" and "1," in the pence columns, opposite the designation "pick miner," and insert in place thereof "10" and "6" respectively.

## Clause 7—Overtime:

Omit the words "or an outbreak of fire" at end of clause.

**Clause 8—Absence from Duty:**

Omit the word "notice" in the second line and insert "leave" in place thereof.

**Clause 9—Notice of Work:**

Add the following:—

"Provided that, if wagons are ordered the previous day and if through no fault of the mine management they are not available for filling, there will be no obligation to pay the workers."

**Clause 12—Fair share of Work:**

Omit this clause and insert in lieu thereof the following:—

"(a) All workers shall have an equitable share of the work in their respective grades.

(b) Subject to the provisions as to any special circumstances herein contained, no worker irrespective of grade or class shall be sent home when the mine is working if he has not been notified at or before the time for ceasing work the previous day that he will not be employed."

**Clause 17:**

Add the following words at end of clause:—

"Subject, however, to the special provisions in Schedule A, Clause 16; Schedule B, Clause 15; Schedule E, Clause 11, and Schedule F, Clause 9, where they are applicable."

**Clause 19—Minimum Number of Days:**

Omit the following paragraph:—

"In the event of such workers being subsequently required they shall have a prior right to re-engagement in the order of their seniority."

and insert in place thereof—

"In the event of such workers being subsequently required they shall have a prior right to re-engagement as amongst themselves in the order of their seniority, but this must not be considered as giving them a claim to employment in preference or priority to workers longer in the service of the respondent."

**Clause 23—Pit-top Meetings:**

Omit the word "day" in the fourth line and insert "any" in place thereof.

**Schedule A.**

**Clause 20—Continuation of Employment:**

Omit this clause.

**Schedule D.**

**Clause 13—Minimum Wage:**

Omit this clause and insert the following in place thereof:—

"(1) The minimum daily rate payable to wheelers shall be as provided in Clause 4 of the General Conditions. In addition sixpence (6d.) per shift shall be paid for afternoon shift and one shilling (1s.) per shift for midnight shift.

(2) The wheeler shall, if instructed by the management, take his horse from the stables to the mouth of the mine travelling road before the commencement of any shift, and at the completion of the shift return the horse to the stables without extra remuneration; provided, however, that when the distance to be travelled exceeds one hundred yards and is less than one mile, the sum of sixpence (6d.) per shift in addition to his appropriate rate shall be paid. Provided further, that when instructed by the management to harness his horse before commencing the shift and feed, water, and unharness his horse on returning to the stables, the wheeler shall be paid the sum of sixpence (6d.) per shift extra."
