### STATE GARDENS BOARD BY-LAWS.

CONSOLIDATION of the By-laws and amendments made by the State Gardens Board under the provisions of "The Parks and Reserves Act, 1895," and "The Cemeteries Act, 1897," for the control of the following Reserves and published in the *Government Gazette* of the 2nd October, 1931, pages 2188-2190; the 29th November, 1935, page 2229; the 7th August, 1936, pages 1187-1188; and the 25th September, 1936, page 1600:—

The term "Board" in these By-laws shall mean the Board appointed under the provisions of "The Parks and Reserves Act, 1895," to control these reserves.

The term "Reserves" shall mean and include the whole of the areas above enumerated, including the "Gardens" mentioned herein.

The term "Gardens" shall mean and include only those reserves or portions thereof which have been enclosed by a fence for the purpose of utilising the land for gardens, parks, or recreation.

The term "Employee" shall mean and include any officer, caretaker, guide, gardener, keeper, labourer, workman, or other person employed in any connection therewith, and shall include the members of the Board.

"Permission" shall mean the permission of the Board first obtained and expressed in writing.

**Control of Vehicles.**

1. No person shall drive, ride, convey, impel or have any motor car, motor cycle, bicycle, carriage, cart, boat, aeroplane, or other vehicle within the reserves except upon a place provided for the purpose.

**Class of Vehicle.**

2. No vehicle, team, cart, or wagon used for carrying any goods, bricks, stone, wood, iron, or merchandise of any kind (whether laden or not), nor any charabanc or other mechanically propelled vehicle capable of carrying more than seven passengers, hearse, mourning coach, camel, packhorse, or other beast of burden shall enter or pass through the reserves without permission.

**Mooring Boats.**

3. No boat shall be moored or anchored, or kept or left moored or anchored or unattended opposite or near any part of any beaches which may be set aside from time to time, unless such boat is and remains at least one chain below low water mark, except as hereinafter provided.

**Landing Passengers.**

4. If it is necessary to bring any boat nearer to the said beaches than is mentioned in the preceding Regulation, for the purpose of passengers or any of the crew embarking or disembarking, the purpose shall be effected as speedily as possible, and the boat shall then be immediately removed to and kept at a distance of at least one chain below low water mark.

**Beaching Boats.**

5. No person shall beach a boat upon the reserves at any place other than that set apart for the purpose, and no boat thus beached shall be moved, handled, or interfered with in any way by any unauthorised person, but the Board or its employees, at the discretion of the Board, may remove or require the owner to remove at any time any boat wherever placed. The Board shall not accept any responsibility for the care of nor liability for damage to any boat wherever beached.

**Destruction of Abandoned Boats.**

6. Any boat which may be beached at a place not set apart for the purpose, or which may be drifting, or sunk, or, in the opinion of the Board or its employees, has been abandoned, may be taken into the possession of the Board and/or removed to such place as it may think fit, and forthwith sold or otherwise disposed of at the discretion of the Board, without redress to the owner for any loss or inconvenience to which he may be subjected thereby.

**Damaging Growth.**

7. No person shall injure, cut, break, deface, pull up, pick, remove, or destroy any tree, shrub, plant, flower, or grass growing on the reserves, or remove or damage stakes or labels therein, nor hand, nor attach clothing or other articles thereto.

**Injury to Property.**

8. No person shall cut up, damage, disfigure or interfere with the soil, rocks, turf or surface of the gardens, caves, pleasure grounds, and appurtenances, or of any part of the reserves, or the roads or footways across, around or over the same, or with any part of the fences, buildings, electrical equipment, machinery, rockwork, watercocks, or seats around or upon the same, or pollute or interfere with any water upon the same.

**Animals, Birds, and Fish.**

9. No person shall disturb, interfere with, catch or destroy any bird, animal or fish, nor their nests, spawning grounds or other habitat within the reserves, nor enter any portion set apart or enclosed for their sole use for breeding or otherwise.

**Timber and Firewood.**

10. No person shall cut or remove any tree or sapling, or any part thereof, either living or dead, for any purpose whatever from any part of the reserves without permission.

**Stone.**

11. No person shall remove stone, gravel, or earth from any part of the reserves.

**Rubbish.**

12. No person shall deposit or leave any rubbish, refuse, paper, broken glass, china, or litter of any kind whatsoever within the reserves, except in the receptacles provided, nor break bottles, china, or other similar substances therein.

**Behaviour.**

13. No person shall misconduct himself or herself, or indulge in riotous or indecent conduct, or use any indecent or improper language, or offend against decency as regards dress on the reserves.

**Intoxicating Liquor.**

14. No person shall bring into or consume within the reserves any intoxicating liquor, nor enter thereon when visibly under the influence of liquor.

**Expectorating.**

15. No person shall spit or expectorate upon any path, grass, structure, or erection in the reserves.

**Betting.**

16. No person shall bet or offer to bet publicly on any part of the reserves.

**Bill Sticking.**

17. No person shall post, stick, stamp, stencil, paint, or otherwise affix, distribute, or give out any placard, handbill notice, advertisement, or any document whatsoever upon any tree, fence, post, gate, wall, flagging, road, path, or any place whatever on the reserves, and no person shall cause to be done any of the acts herein prohibited.

**Fires and Shooting.**

18. No person or persons shall carry or discharge any firearms, or throw or discharge any stone or other missile, or set off any fire balloon, or throw or set fire to any fireworks, or kindle or make any fire on any portion of the reserves without permission, and no person using a lighted match in any portion of the reserves shall throw away the same without first making sure it is effectively extinguished.

**Sails.**

19. No person shall spread or dry sails or other similar material upon the reserves.

**Camping.**

20. No person shall camp, lodge, or tarry overnight, or frequent the reserves for the purpose of camping, lodging, or tarrying overnight, nor lie or sleep during the day on the reserves.

## Meetings.

21. No person shall organise, arrange, advertise, or take part in any fete, picnic, or concert, or engage in public worship, preaching, or public speaking of any kind, or any meeting of like character on the reserves without permission.

## Trespass.

22. No person, except workmen employed in the reserves, shall enter any place enclosed for trees, flowers, or shrubs, or plantations of young trees, nor step, nor walk upon, or jump across any plot therein which may be set apart for shrubs, plants, or flowers.

## Seats for Ladies.

23. No man shall occupy a seat which is set apart for the use of ladies.

## Straying Stock.

24. No person shall cause, allow, or suffer any horse, cattle, sheep, dog, goat, camel, donkey, mule, pig, or other animal, or fowl or other bird to enter, stray, or feed upon the said reserves unless permission is first obtained and such fees paid as the Board may direct, and no person shall cause, allow, or suffer any dog to enter any swimming area, nor throw sticks or other missiles therein.

## Games and Animals.

25. No person shall, upon the said reserves, without permission, play, practise, or indulge in any game, sport, or gymnastic exercise, or exercise horses, dogs, or other animals for racing, or ride or drive any horse on any portion of the reserves, except upon a declared public highway or road.

## Flying of Sky Signs, etc.

26. No person, without permission, shall fly or attempt to fly any sky sign, kite, or aerial advertisement on or above any portion of the reserves, and no person shall cause the same to be done or attempted.

## Obstruction and Annoyance.

27. No person shall in any part of the reserves wilfully obstruct, disturb, interrupt or annoy any other person in the proper use or enjoyment of the reserves, or wilfully obstruct in the execution of his duty, or insult, or neglect to obey the lawful directions of, or refuse or neglect to give his name and address, or give a wrong name or address, to any employee.

## Trading.

28. No person shall sell or expose for sale any goods, wares, refreshments, fruits, nuts, confectionery, fish, or other merchandise or things, or solicit or offer to purchase bottles on any portion of the reserves, unless permission is first obtained and upon payment of such fees as the Board may direct in each case.

## Levying of Fees.

29. The Board may from time to time, at its discretion, levy and collect an admission fee, not exceeding 1s., for each and every vehicle or person entering the reserves or any portions or enclosures thereof. The Board may also levy and collect by itself or its agents such charges as it may determine for the use of tennis courts, swimming pools, buildings, and/or other conveniences in the reserves.

## Permits for Camping.

30. Notwithstanding the provisions of By-law No. 20, camping may be permitted in areas set apart for the purpose, but not elsewhere, upon the issue of a permit from the Camp Controller and subject to the following conditions:—

(a) For the purpose of this By-law, the term "Camp Controller" shall mean the superintendent, caretaker, or person in charge of the reserve for the time being.

(b) The permit will indicate the site to be occupied, and the controller's decision in any dispute shall be final. Fees are payable prior to the issue of permits on the following scale:—

For permits to camp for a period not exceeding 24 hours—2s. 6d.

For permits to camp for a period not exceeding 3 days—5s.

For permits to camp for a period not exceeding 7 days—10s.

Notwithstanding the provisions of the preceding scale of charges, the scale of charges at Reserve A4813 (Point Walter) shall be as follows:—

For a period of one week or part thereof—5s.

Extensions of permits may be secured upon the payment of a further fee upon the above scale.

(c) No person shall sublet any camp, or sell, give or otherwise dispose of any permit to any person.

(d) Except by the permission of the Camp Controller, no person shall bring into or keep within the camping area any animals or birds whatever.

(e) No person shall misconduct himself or indulge in any riotous or indecent conduct, or use any indecent or improper language, or offend against decency as regards dress in the camping area.

(f) No person shall bring into or keep or consume in the camping area any intoxicating liquor, nor enter nor remain thereon when visibly under the influence of liquor.

(g) Campers must keep the area, covered by their permit, in a clean and sanitary condition at all times. All rubbish capable of destruction by fire shall be burned by the occupier in the approved fireplace.

(h) All campers must use the sanitary conveniences provided, and in no circumstances will improvised conveniences or individual camping sites be permitted.

(i) No person shall cause or permit any damage to trees, shrubs, or grass, whether naturally or artificially planted within or surrounding the camping area. The presence of green timber or foliage on the area covered by any camping permits shall be *prima facie* evidence that the holder of the permit has caused or permitted damage, unless the permit holder has pointed out the damage before taking over the camping site.

(j) Camping permits may at any time be withdrawn by the Camp Controller, if in his opinion a breach of these By-laws has been committed, or if in his opinion it is desirable that the permit shall be terminated. In the event of termination hereunder, the rental paid shall be forfeited to the Board, and no compensation shall be claimed or paid for loss, damage, or inconvenience suffered through the withdrawal of the permit.

(k) Subject to the right of the Camp Controller and the officers and employees of the Board, or any person acting under their instructions, or any police constable, to enter any camping site at any time, no person shall enter into or remain within such camping site, except with the permission of the holder of the permit.

(l) No fires shall be lighted on any camping area, except in places approved by the Camp Controller.

(m) Except so far as they may be inconsistent with this By-law, the whole of the By-laws now or hereafter made by the Executive Council to apply to areas under control of the Board shall apply to Camping Areas.

## Gardens Open.

31. The gardens shall be open to the public from 8 a.m. to sunset, except upon such occasions as the Board may determine otherwise.

#### Improper Entry.

32. No person shall be nor remain in the gardens after the gates have been closed, nor be nor remain in any portion of the gardens which may be closed to the public for the time being, or enter the gardens by any manner than through the gates rightfully opened by an authorised person, nor shall climb or jump over or through the gates or fences in or around the gardens.

33. No children under five years of age shall be allowed in the gardens, unless in the charge of an adult person.

#### Visitors to Caves.

34. No person or persons shall enter any cave, unless accompanied by the authorised guide or caretaker.

#### Admission Fees.

35. Every person entering a cave shall pay to the caretaker or authorised guide, before entering, such admission fees as may be approved by the State Gardens Board from time to time.

#### Injuring or Disfiguring Caves.

36. No person shall break, remove, injure or deface by writing or by marking, or in any way damage any rock, stalactite, or stalagmite, or remove any rock, stalactite, or stalagmite, or in any way injure, damage, or disfigure the stairways, ladders, cave gates, railings, seats, fences, buildings, machinery, lighting appliances, or other structures or improvements, or gardens, or pleasure grounds and appurtenances within any cave or upon the reserves.

#### Lights to be Used.

37. No person shall use in any cave any artificial light or lights, except those provided by the Board or its servants.

#### Smoking in Caves.

38. No person shall smoke within any cave.

#### Taking Photographs.

39. No person shall take photographs in any cave without permission and after payment of any or such fees as the Board may direct in each case.

#### Swimming.

40. Notwithstanding the provisions of any other By-law, areas may be set apart for bathing and swimming, and no boat of any description shall be permitted to enter or remain in such area. Such areas may be defined from time to time by the placing of posts at intervals along the river side of such area and the posting of a notice indicating the purpose of the area thus set apart.

#### Traffic.

41. The traffic requirements in force for the time being under "The Traffic Act, 1919," and its amendments, shall be observed on the said reserves, but always with the limitation that no person shall at any time drive, ride, or impel any carriage, motor car, motor cycle, bicycle, tricycle, or other vehicle at a speed exceeding 15 miles per hour.

#### Lost Property.

42. No person shall frequent the gardens or reserves for the purpose of collecting lost or abandoned articles, and no person, other than an employee of the Board acting in the course of his duty, shall gather lost or abandoned property. In every case all property of whatever description apparently lost or abandoned must be handed by the finder to the Government Gardener, superintendent, caretaker, or person in charge of the reserve for the time being, or, in his absence, to the Board, to be returned by him or the Board to the owner on satisfactory proof of ownership, or disposed of as directed by the Board, if unclaimed.

#### Boundaries.

43. In any prosecution under these By-laws it shall not be necessary for the Board or its officers to prove the boundaries of the reserve, but at the hearing of the complaint the averment contained in the complaint that the offence was committed within the boundaries of the reserve shall be deemed to be proved, in the absence of proof to the contrary.

#### Penalty.

44. Any person offending against any of the provisions of these By-laws shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding £20, in addition to being immediately removed from the Reserve.

#### ADDITIONAL BY-LAWS APPLYING TO THE EAST PERTH CEMETERY ONLY (RESERVE A21054).

1. Any person who wantonly or wilfully destroys or injures, or causes to be destroyed or injured, any building, vault, monument, tombstone, enclosure, fence, tree, shrub, or other thing affixed to or growing in the reserve, or who wilfully defaces or obliterates, or attempts to deface or obliterate, any monumental device or inscription in the reserve, shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding £20, or to imprisonment for not more than three months, with or without hard labour, and the Board may prosecute for any such offence. (Sec. 35, 61 Vic., No. 23.)

2. Every person who, whether wantonly or wilfully or not, does or causes to be done any injury such as is mentioned in the last preceding Regulation, whether convicted of the same or not, shall be liable in damages, which may be recovered by the Board or by the person who has suffered the injury. (Sec. 36, 61 Vic., No. 23.)

3. No person shall remove any article from any grave, vault, monument, tombstone, or other erection without permission. And every application for permission shall be accompanied by a fee based upon the following schedule:—

For each tombstone or monument or other ornamentation—£1 1s.

For each vault, including tombstone or monument (if any)—£5.

4. The following schedule of charges is to apply to exhumations:—

For each adult exhumation ..	1	5	0
For each child exhumation ..	0	15	0

The fees for exhumations shall be payable in advance.

5. All work in connection with exhumations is to be carried out by the undertaker. All waste material is to be removed and all excavations filled by the undertaker at his expense, and the ground left in a condition satisfactory to the Board.

6. If application be made to the Board to exhume any corpse for the purpose of examination or identification, or for the purpose of its being buried elsewhere in accordance with the wishes of the deceased, or of his family, an order from the Governor authorising the Board to permit the exhumation must be attached to the application.

7. No wooden fence, railing, cross or other wooden erection shall be allowed to be erected on or around any grave or vault in the reserves without permission.

8. No trees or shrubs shall be planted on any grave in the reserves, except such as shall be approved by the Board.

9. Any person taking part in dressing or attending to any grave in the reserves shall comply with the following rules:—

- (a) No rubbish, soil, sand, or other material removed in dressing a grave shall be placed on any other grave, and, if placed on any adjoining ground, shall be removed immediately the work is completed;
- (b) No sand, soil, or loam shall be taken from any portion of the reserve for the purpose of dressing any grave, except with the permission of the superintendent;
- (c) The dressing of all graves and the wheeling and carting of any material shall be subject to the supervision of the superintendent;
- (d) Work in all cases shall be carried on with due despatch, and only during regulation hours.

10. The Board may decorate graves in the reserves from time to time when desired by the grantee so to do. If the grantees do not desire the Board to carry out this work, the grantees may either do it themselves or employ any person approved of by the Board for that purpose.

11. No person, except the relatives of the deceased, the Board, or those authorised by the Board, shall be permitted to decorate any grave in the reserves.

## FARMERS' DEBTS ADJUSTMENT ACT, 1930-1934.

NOTICE is hereby given that the following Stay Orders have been issued in accordance with Section 7, Subsection 1, of "The Farmers' Debts Adjustment Act, 1930-1934," which reads as follows:—

A Stay Order shall direct that no action, execution, distress for rent, proceedings on default for breach of covenant under any mortgage or other security for money, or under an agreement for sale and purchase of land, or other process or proceeding, shall be commenced or proceeded with or put in force against the farmer or any of the farmer's assets, whether utilised in connection with or forming portion of the assets comprised in his farming business or not, during the operation of such Stay Order: Provided that, by leave of a Judge, any action may, notwithstanding the Stay Order, be instituted and/or carried on against the farmer, but not beyond judgment.

Manjimup Water Board.

By-laws.

WHEREAS by "The Water Boards Act, 1904," and amendments, the Water Board of any District is empowered to make By-laws for all or any purposes in the said Act mentioned, the Manjimup Water Board, in pursuance of the powers vested in the said Board, under and by virtue of the said Act and of every other authority enabling it in that behalf, doth hereby make and publish the following By-laws, to operate and have effect in the Manjimup Water Area:—

Division I.

Interpretations.

1. (a) In the construction and for the purposes of these By-laws, unless the context otherwise requires, the terms "Cesspool," "Drain," "Earth closet," "Public house," "Piggery," and "Slaughter-house," shall have the meanings severally attached to them in Section 3 of "The Health Act, 1911."

(b) The words "Authorised," "By-laws," "District," "Fittings," "Local Authority," "Minister," "Occupier," "Owner," "Pipe," "Prescribed," "Ratepayer," "Rateable land," "Road," "Reservoir," "Stream," "Water area," "Waterworks," "Watercourse," and "Works" shall have meanings severally attached to them in "The Water Boards Act, 1904," hereinafter referred to as the principal Act, or any amending Act, and the By-laws made thereunder.

(c) "Catchment area" shall mean all land over, through, or under which any water flows, runs, percolates directly or indirectly into any reservoir erected or used by the Board in connection with any water supply prescribed in or proclaimed under any Act.

(d) "Feeder" shall mean any watercourse, creek, stream, or other channel with either permanent or intermittent flow whereby water can be conveyed to any reservoir.

(e) "High water mark" shall mean the level of full supply, of any reservoir or feeder thereto.

(f) "Minister" shall mean the Minister for Water Supply, Sewerage, and Drainage acting in pursuance of "The Water Boards Act, 1904," and "The Water Supply, Sewerage, and Drainage Act, 1912."

(g) "Board" shall mean the Manjimup Water Board.

(h) "Secretary" and "Inspector" respectively shall mean a person appointed by the Board for the purpose of these By-laws or to administer the said By-laws.

(i) "Domestic supply": A supply of water for domestic purposes shall not include a supply for cattle or for horses, or for any steam engine, or for washing carriages or motor vehicles where such horses, carriages, or motor vehicles are kept for hire or are the property of any dealer, or for any hotel, inn, trade, manufacturer, or business whatever, or for watering gardens, or for fountains, or for any ornamental purpose.

(j) "Private service": For the purpose of these By-laws "Private service" includes all the pipes and fittings, and all connections and apparatus of whatsoever nature or kind, and whether used temporarily or otherwise on any part of the premises of the owner or occupier of any premises supplied with pipes or fittings, the property of the consumer, which are used for conveying water from the mains of the Board, whether situated on the premises of the consumer or otherwise.

(k) "Farm supply" shall include domestic supply, but not industrial manufacturing supply.

Division II.

By-laws for the Preventing of Pollution of the  
Catchment Area.

2. The By-laws in this Part apply to all water reserves and catchment areas constituted for the purpose of the principal or any amending Act.

Cleaning and Filling up of Cesspools.

3. All existing cesspools within the catchment area shall be cleansed and filled up to the satisfaction of the inspector, within one calendar month after notice in writing to that effect has been given to the occupier or owner of the premises concerned.

Situation of Closets.

4. Closets shall not be constructed within fifty yards of high water mark, and any closet situated within fifty yards of high water mark shall within one calendar month of notice to that effect being given to the owner or occupier by the Board or by the inspector be taken down, and the cesspit, if such exists, cleansed and a fire made therein, after which the cesspit shall be filled up to the satisfaction of the inspector by the owner or occupier of the house to which such closet or cesspit is appurtenant.

Provision for Sufficient Number of Pans shall be made.

5. The owner or occupier of every house within the catchment area shall provide, for the use of the occupants of such house, an earth closet, with a sufficient number of pans approved by the inspector.

Construction of Closets.

6. (a) Every closet within the catchment area shall be of stone, iron, wood, brick, concrete, or combination of two or more of such materials. Each closet shall be supplied with a sufficient number of receptacles, which shall be interchangeable with others in the same district, and which shall be of approved size, shape, and style, and every pan shall be emptied and cleansed once every week, or as often as may be required by the inspector.

(b) Each dwelling on the catchment area shall be provided with a closet and urinal erected in such a position as directed by the inspector.

(c) The floor and seat of every closet shall be so constructed that the top of the receptacles shall not be more than one inch below the underside of the seat.

Removal and Re-erection of Closets.

7. Closets or urinals already in existence shall, wherever considered necessary by the inspector, be removed, and such removal or re-erection shall be at the cost of the owner, who shall have the work completed within one calendar month from delivery by inspector of written notice to owner requiring this to be done.

Nuisance shall not be caused.

8. The owner or occupier of any house within the catchment area shall not permit the contents of any pan used in any closet or urinal to overflow from any cause whatever.

The owner or occupier of any house within the catchment area shall not permit any closet or urinal or pan appertaining thereto, or used by the occupants of such house to become offensive or a nuisance, and every such owner or occupier, whenever directed, either verbally or in writing by the inspector, shall properly and effectively empty and cleanse such closet, urinal, or pan to the satisfaction of the inspector.

Disposal of Nightsoil, etc.

9. Nightsoil, refuse, and garbage shall be disposed of from time to time, as the Board or inspector may direct.

Nightsoil, faecal matter, or refuse shall not be buried within the catchment area.

Nightsoil or human urine, whether mixed with any other substance, or any solution of nightsoil, unless the same has been thoroughly deodorised, shall not be placed, deposited, spread, or permitted to be placed, deposited, or spread in or upon any land or garden within the catchment area: unless written consent thereto has been obtained from the Board.

Disposal of Manure, etc.

10. Refuse, dung, manure, or other offensive matter shall not be deposited or permitted to be deposited within three hundred yards of high water mark, or in any place where, in the opinion of the inspector, such matter may be washed into any reservoir or any feeder.

Situation, etc., of Outbuildings.

11. Buildings of any description shall not be used as or constructed for a stable, cowshed, goatshed, sheep-pen, or fowlhouse, and any animal or bird shall not be housed or yarded within three hundred yards of high water mark, or in such positions that stormwaters may wash any manure or refuse therefrom into any reservoir or feeder. Every such structure within the catchment area shall have attached thereto, for containing liquid and solid manure, a watertight receptacle approved by

the inspector. Land sloping to a feeder on which any such structure stands shall be excavated to a depth of at least twelve inches, and the soil so obtained shall be used as an embankment around the area so excavated. Such work shall be done and at the expense of the owner or occupier of such premises.

#### Cleaning of Outbuildings.

12. The owner or occupier of any stable, cowshed, goatshed, sheeppen, or fowlhouse, situated within the catchment area, shall not allow any dung, manure, or other refuse to accumulate in or near any such premises, but shall immediately dispose of same in such manner that it cannot pollute any water flowing or which may flow into any reservoir or any feeder, and the inspector may by written notice to the owner or occupier order the immediate removal and disposal of any dung, manure, or other refuse from such premises, and any person omitting to comply with such notice to the satisfaction of the inspector shall be guilty of an offence against these By-laws and liable to penalties for breach thereof.

#### Deodorant shall be used.

13. The occupier of every house or premises, whether public or private, shall cause to be kept in every closet or privy belonging thereto a box containing either ashes, dry earth, lime, sawdust, carbolic powder, or other disinfectant approved by the Board or the inspector, and shall cause all nightsoil or other matter deposited in such pan or receptacle in such closet or privy to be immediately deodorised or disinfected with a sufficient quantity of the disinfectant kept in such box.

#### Treatment of Nightsoil.

14. Every nightman or contractor shall cause the nightsoil removed from any premises to be either rendered inoffensive or treated in a destructor, desiccator, or incinerator, or buried in trenches outside the catchment area, or disposed of in a manner approved by the inspector.

#### Mode of Removal of Receptacles.

15. The mode of removal of each receptacle in each closet shall be as follows:—The nightman shall remove each receptacle and at once cover the same with a suitable tight-fitting lid, and upon every such removal shall carefully place a cleansed pan, of the pattern approved by the Board or the inspector, in lieu of every pan so removed, and each pan shall be dealt with as prescribed in the next following clause hereof, that is to say—

Each receptacle which shall have been removed from a closet and sealed with a lid, as prescribed in the foregoing clause, shall be removed by the nightman in a cart or vehicle of a pattern to be approved by the inspector, and the contents of all such receptacles shall be deposited in such place or places as shall from time to time be fixed by the Board or inspector.

The said receptacle shall be emptied and perfectly cleansed once a week at the least, or so much more frequently as the Board or the inspector may from time to time direct.

#### Charges for Removal.

16. Every nightman shall be entitled to charge, unless other arrangements be made, and to receive from the occupier of any premises from which any nightsoil, trade, or house refuse shall have been removed, such sum or sums of money as are specified in the contract or approved by the Board, and shall not ask, demand, or receive more than the sums approved.

#### Licensing of Nightmen.

17. Nightsoil shall not be removed from any closet, house, or premises within the area under the jurisdiction of the Board, except by nightmen duly licensed by the Board.

#### Private Contracts for Removal of Nightsoil.

18. Individual householders shall not contract for the removal of nightsoil or any other refuse or offensive matter, whatever, except with the person licensed by the Board and in accordance with these By-laws.

#### Keeping of Pigs

19. Pigs shall not be kept or be allowed to stray on any portion of the catchment area.

#### Straying of Animals.

20. Horse, cattle, sheep, goats, ducks, geese, fowl, or other species of live stock shall not be allowed to stray or depasture over any portion of the catchment area, except with the permission of the Board.

#### Keeping of Poultry.

21. Poultry yards or premises for housing of poultry shall be kept at least 25 feet from any dwelling, and shall be kept in clean condition and disinfected at least once a week with lime, ashes, or other suitable disinfectant.

#### Abattoirs and Slaughterhouses.

22. Abattoirs or slaughterhouses shall not be established or conducted in any part of the catchment area.

#### Removal and Destruction of Carcasses.

23. In the event of the death or of an accident necessitating the slaughter of any horse, cattle, or sheep, or other animal, the carcass of the animal shall be removed by the owner thereof to a safe distance from high water mark, or any feeder, to such place that the inspector may direct, and the owner shall immediately thereafter dispose of same by burning to the satisfaction of the inspector, or, if the owner cannot be found, the inspector shall destroy it.

#### Receptacles for Refuse.

24. (a) The occupier of every house or premises shall provide and keep in a position approved by the inspector such and so many receptacles or boxes of the material and of the dimensions as may be required by the Board or the inspector for the temporary deposit of solid house refuse.

(b) The owner or occupier of such house shall regularly collect all refuse and rubbish from such premises, and place the same in receptacles, and he shall not permit or suffer such receptacles to overflow or become offensive, and shall, when necessary or directed by the inspector, thoroughly disinfect the same forthwith.

(c) The owner or occupier of every house or premises in which a receptacle as aforesaid is attached or used shall cause same to be emptied at least once a week, or as often as the inspector may direct. The owner or occupier of such premises shall keep such receptacle in good repair, and upon notice from the inspector immediately replace by a new and improved receptacle any receptacle that the inspector may deem worn out or unfit for use.

#### Disposal of and Receptacles for Noisome Things.

25. Rubbish, filth, blood, offal, or manure or any slops, soapsuds, urine, water containing urine, or other refuse, noisome thing, or matter shall not be deposited or permitted to be deposited in any part of the catchment area, where it may, in the opinion of the inspector, be carried by stormwater into any feeder, but every occupier or owner shall provide and maintain proper water-tight vehicles or receptacles fitted with close fitting covers or lids for the purpose of carting or receiving same.

#### Location of Vehicles or Receptacles.

26. All such vehicles or receptacles shall be kept in such convenient place to allow of ready removal as may be directed by the inspector, so as not to be a nuisance to any person, and shall be kept in a thoroughly sanitary condition, and removed at least once every week, and cleansed and disinfected both inside and outside.

#### Reserve for Rubbish, etc.

27. Foul or offensive water or other offensive liquid or refuse, garbage, sweepings, or other offensive matter or things shall not be pumped, emptied, or swept, thrown, or otherwise discharged or disposed into or upon any street, lane, yard, vacant land, or other place, whether public or private, within the district other than the place set aside by the Board or the inspector for that purpose.

#### Pollution of Streams, etc.

28. Bathing or washing of clothes or other articles in any stream, reservoir, aqueduct, or other waterworks within the catchment area is prohibited, and no person shall wash, throw, or cause to enter therein any dog, or other animal, or throw or convey, or permit to be thrown or conveyed therein any rubbish, dirt, filth, dead animal, or other noisome thing.

*Entry Private Premises by Officers of Board.*

29. It shall be lawful for the inspector or any assistants acting under the directions of the inspector or other authorised officer, at his discretion, at any reasonable hour, with or without notice, to enter any land, house, or premises for the purpose of ascertaining whether any act or thing is being done or permitted within such land, house, or premises in breach of these By-laws, and to move or cause to be removed anything therein or thereon in breach of these By-laws, or to take such steps as he may deem necessary for carrying out these provisions. The cost of such removal or such other necessary act shall be borne by the owner or occupier of the premises upon which such breach shall occur.

*Period for compliance with Notices.*

30. Unless otherwise provided for, the time which may elapse between the giving of a notice and the doing of a thing required to be done by the inspector or other authorised officer shall be determined by the Board according to the nature of each case.

*Cutting of Timber.*

31. No person, whether in possession of a timber cutter's license or not, shall cut or hew timber on any catchment area unless authorised so to do by the Board.

*Shooting, Hunting, and Fishing Prohibited.*

32. Shooting or hunting any game or angling for or catching of fish within the catchment area is prohibited.

*Division III.**By-laws for Protecting the Water, Grounds, Works, etc., from Trespass and Injury.*

33. No person shall without proper authority enter any machinery house, valve house, or other portion of the works not open to the public, or enter any enclosure within the water area containing a tank, reservoir, meter, house, store, office or other waterworks, or trespass within the fenced off ground adjacent to or reserved for Water Supply Works.

*Camping and Lighting of Fires.*

34. Camping and lighting of fires within the vicinity of any reservoir, except on land set apart for such purposes, is prohibited. The lighting of fires on any other reserves or fenced off land is prohibited.

*Protection of Flora, Shrubs, etc.*

35. The removal, plucking, or damaging of any wild flower, shrub, bush, tree, or other plant growing on any land or reserve vested in the Board within half a mile of any reservoir shall not be permitted.

*Dogs Prohibited.*

36. All dogs are prohibited on any portion of the grounds in the vicinity of any waterworks.

*Disposal of Refuse, etc.*

37. Loose paper or other refuse shall not be left on any portion of the grounds in the vicinity of any reservoir or works, except in the receptacles provided therefor.

*Posting or Distribution of Bills, etc.*

38. Bills, advertisements, or other notices shall not be posted or distributed on any portion of any reservoir or works, or any portion of the works or grounds in the vicinity thereof.

*Nuisances.*

39. Nuisances shall not be committed on any portion of the grounds in the vicinity of any reservoir or works.

*Protection of Pipes.*

40. Vehicles, conveyances, or animals shall not be driven, taken, or ridden in such a manner as to endanger the main conduit or any branch, and are prohibited from crossing the same, except where crossing places have been provided as indicated by sign-boards.

*Division IV.**Plumbing Work shall be done by Licensed Plumbers.*

41. No person shall do or cause to be done any work within the water supply of any premises, or in connection with any fitting or apparatus connected therewith, unless he shall have first been duly admitted by the Board as a "Licensed Water Supply Plumber."

*Description and Scope of Licenses.*

42. The conditions upon which licenses will be issued by the Board are:—

(a) The Board will supply water supply plumbers' licenses, operative only in the area to which these By-laws apply, to water supply plumbers, upon the applicants satisfying the Board that they are competent water supply plumbers, and that they are fit and proper persons to hold such licenses, and the applicants may be required to submit to an examination in the theory and practice of plumbing work.

(b) On condition that the certificate of the Department's Board of Examiners has been obtained, the prescribed payments made, and provided the Board is satisfied that the applicant is a fit and proper person to hold such license, the Board will grant water supply plumbers' licenses, operative in all areas administered by the Board, excepting areas open for sewerage connections, and will also grant water supply and sanitary plumbers' licenses, operative in all areas by the Board.

*Annual Fee for License.*

43. A fee of ten shillings shall be payable for every license, except when a license is granted after the tenth day of April in any year, in which case the fee shall be five shillings.

*Renewal of License.*

44. Licenses issued by the Board under the By-laws and Regulations shall be current only from the 1st October to the 30th September of the year of issue, and water supply plumbers shall apply for a renewal and pay the necessary fee before the expiry of the year for which their existing license is current.

*List of Licensed Plumbers shall be Published.*

45. A list of licensed water supply plumbers shall from time to time be published at the Office of the Board.

*Breaches of By-laws by Plumbers.*

46. Any licensed water supply plumbers offending against any By-law or Regulation of the Board, or who shall refuse to give any needful or proper information required by an officer of the Board, either by himself or those employed by him, or fails to complete any contract with the Board or with a private owner within the time specified, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Twenty pounds, and he shall also show cause why his license shall not be suspended or cancelled. Any person who has been removed from the list shall not be re-admitted as a licensed water supply plumber until he shall have served the suspension order or paid such fine, not exceeding Twenty pounds, as the Board may determine.

*Delay in Work.*

47. Plumbers shall execute any work they undertake with reasonable despatch; and any inconvenience to the public caused by licensed water supply plumbers by unnecessary delay in carrying out work will be rigorously dealt with by the Board.

*Accidents to Pipes shall be Reported.*

48. Accidents caused by water supply plumbers to water, gas, or other pipes shall be at once reported, and immediate steps taken to have repairs effected, and the cost of same shall be defrayed by such.

*Deposit and Declaration.*

49. Prior to issue of the license, the person to whom the same is to be issued shall deposit with the Board a sum of Five pounds, which shall be retained during the currency of the license as a security for the proper performance of all work done by him, and shall sign a declaration that he accepts such license subject to and in conformity with the conditions thereof and with the By-laws of the Board, and that he will conform thereto and comply therewith.



## Deductions from Deposit.

50. The Board may deduct from such deposit any fine inflicted or the expense of making good any bad work of the licensed water supply plumber or his workmen, and as often as any amount is so deducted the licensed water supply plumber shall make good the deposit to the sum of Five pounds, and in default his license will be cancelled.

## Change of Address to be Notified.

51. Every licensed water supply plumber shall within forty-eight hours of any change in his address give notice in writing to the Board.

## Division V.

## Water Supply Plumbing.

## Specification of Pipes and Fittings for Private Services.

52. In connection with the laying down, maintenance, alteration, or repair of every private service, the following Regulations shall be observed by the owner or occupier of the premises whereon such service is:—

(a) All pipes and fittings shall be of lead or galvanized wrought or malleable iron.

(b) Where lead pipes are used, they shall be of drawn lead of equal thickness throughout, and of at least the respective weights following, viz:—

(c) Where wrought iron tubes are used they shall be butt welded or solid drawn or regular section, with British standard thread, and of the following weights:—

(d) The minimum weight of wrought and malleable iron fittings shall be fixed from time to time by the Board, and no malleable fittings, unless of approved brand, shall be used.

(e) Tees, thimbles, bends, reducing couplets, plugs, etc., shall be of the best manufacture, true in section, regular, and of equal thickness, properly and truly cut with the British standard thread, perfectly sound and new, and free from all defects. The tees, bends, tubes, etc., shall be capable of withstanding a hydrostatic pressure equal to a column of water 400 feet in height.

(f) All joints between pipes, tees, bends, thimbles, couplings, elbows, and cocks, etc., shall be made with red lead and flax, or other approved jointing material. All joints on lead pipes of the kind known as "wiped joints," and all connections between lead and iron water pipes, shall be made with brass couplings and wiped joints.

(g) No pipe or other apparatus shall be laid through any sewer, drain, ashpit, cistern, or manure, bin, or through, in, or into any place where in the event of the pipe becoming unsound, the water conveyed through such pipe would be liable to be polluted or to escape without observation, unless such pipe or apparatus be laid through an exterior castiron pipe or box of sufficient length and strength to afford due protection to the same and to bring any leakage or waste within easy detection.

(h) All taps, stopcocks, ballcocks, valves, service boxes, waste-not regulators, bath taps, or valves or other fittings used in connection with the supply of water shall be of approved types and capable of withstanding a pressure of 300 lbs. per square inch, and shall be tested and stamped by the duly authorised officer of the Board before being affixed.

The Board will stamp and test the same and charge the following fees for stamping and testing same:—

(i) Every cistern and tank shall be provided with an equilibrium ball valve, and the overflow shall be laid and fixed in a suitable manner so as to discharge in some conspicuous place open to inspection, and in a position approved by the Board.

(j) No service pipe shall communicate directly with any cistern, tank, or vessel intended or used for the reception of rainwater or made or used below the surface of the ground.

(k) No part of any service shall communicate directly with the water in any steam boiler or other apparatus used for the generation of steam, but the feed water shall be supplied in such a manner that none of the water in the boiler or such other apparatus can return into the main or service pipe.

(l) Every water closet fitting shall be approved of by the Board, and shall be supplied from the service pertaining to the tenement, through a proper cistern or service box, fitted with approved waste-preventing apparatus. No service pipe shall communicate directly with a basin or tap, or otherwise than with the cistern of a water closet.

(m) In every bath the outlet shall be distinct from and unconnected with the inlet or inlets, and the inlets or inlet shall be placed at least one inch above the highest water level of the bath. The outlet of every bath shall be provided with a perfectly water-tight plug. The Board will not supply any bath unless the same shall be so constructed as to prevent a waste of water.

(n) Every urinal shall be supplied only through a cistern or service box, fitted with approved waste-preventing apparatus. No service pipe shall communicate directly with any urinal.

## Maintenance of Private Services.

53. (a) The owner or occupier for the time being of any premises supplied with water shall at his own risk and expense, and, subject to the provisions of these By-laws, arrange with a licensed plumber to lay down his private service and keep it in good order and repair, and so that the same shall at all times be in accordance with the By-laws for the time being.

(b) The service pipe being the property of the owner or occupier of the land supplied by such service pipes, the occupier, if any, and, if none, the owner, shall upon receiving notice that his service pipe requires repairing, immediately arrange with a licensed plumber to repair the same, subject to the provisions of these By-laws, and he shall be responsible for any loss of water or other damage which shall be caused by reason of such service pipe being leaky or otherwise out of repair or broken, and in default be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds, and, in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after receipt of such notice, and the Board may stop the water from flowing into such premises, either by cutting off the service pipe or otherwise, as the Board may see fit, until the necessary repairs shall have been effected.

(c) Without prejudice to the right of the Board to proceed for any penalty for the breach or non-observance of any of the provisions of these By-laws, the Board may cut off the supply of water to any part thereof, if not at all times laid, fixed, used, or maintained in all respects in accordance with the provisions of the said By-laws, and may keep the same cut off until such provisions have been fully observed. In the case of services to country lands, that portion of the service situated between the main and the boundary of the owner or occupier shall be maintained by the servants of the Board at the expense of the owner or occupier.

## Standard Drawings and Fittings.

54. Approved standard fittings and type drawings will be exhibited at the Board Office. Due consideration will be given by the Board to claims of any other fittings which may be presented for approval, and, if considered satisfactory, the same may be placed among and become one of the approved standard fittings. The Board may from time to time amend, alter, or cancel any or all of the standard fittings or type drawings, and replace them by such other fittings or drawings as he may approve of.



*Interference within Three Feet of Meter.*

55. Any person other than a servant of the Board shall under no circumstances disconnect the joints from the meter, or, after a meter has once been fixed on a service and water has been turned on, disconnect or interfere with any piping within three feet of such meter.

56. No licensed plumber or operative plumber, or any other person, shall interfere with any pipe or fitting belonging to the waterworks without the permission, in writing, of the secretary of the Board first obtained.

*Junction or Interference with Pipes or Fittings.*

57. Any person shall not make any connection or interference with any pipe or fitting of the Board, or with any water pipe or fitting communicating therewith, at any place than shall be approved of by the Board, and the mains shall only be tapped by the workmen of the Board.

*Inspection of Works.*

58. Work shall not be undertaken in connection with water supply, or in the extension or alteration thereof, until such time as the necessary printed permit is obtained. Two days' notice shall be in all cases given by the licensed plumber before work is intended to be commenced, unless the officer of the Board duly appointed to issue permits expressly accepts shorter notice. In no case shall any water be used until the said works have been inspected, and, if necessary tested by the said officer, and certified by him on the prescribed form. No underground or enclosed work shall be covered up or concealed until the same shall have been duly inspected and passed by the inspector, and for this purpose the person for whom the permit has been issued shall immediately report any work which is ready for inspection or test, and every facility shall be afforded to such officer for making such inspection of tests.

*Division VI.**By-laws for General Purposes.**Application for Service.*

59. Applications for water services shall be made on the printed form, procurable at the Manjimup Water Board Offices, and shall be lodged not less than seven days before the service is required. Full information, as indicated on the prescribed form, and the full amount of rates or other charges due on the premises to which service is required, together with the cost of such service from the main to the boundary in the case of country land, shall be paid on or before application and before work is commenced. Full information, as indicated on the prescribed form, shall be supplied, and the full amount of rates or other charges due on the premises to which a service is required shall be paid on or before application and before the work is commenced.

*Supply to Non-rated Premises.*

60. Any person or persons requiring a water service to any non-rated property may be supplied on payment of a minimum charge, which shall be fixed by the Board in each case. The minimum charge shall then take the place of a water rate, and the general provisions of these By-laws, as applying to ratepaying consumers, shall apply to minimum charge-paying consumers.

*Supply of Water not Compulsory.*

61. It shall be at the discretion of the Board to supply water to any individual consumer or to any land, whether rated or not.

*Separate Services Required.*

62. Except with the written permission of the Board, not more than one house or tenement shall be supplied from a single water service. The Board may, in special cases, consent to two or more tenements being supplied from one water service, but in such cases the subservices shall be so arranged that the supply to each house shall be independent of the supply to the remaining houses and controlled by a stopcock on such subservice.

*Size of Service Pipes.*

63. The size of the service pipe shall in each case be fixed at the discretion of the Board.

*Notice of Intention to Build.*

64. The owner or occupier of any land supplied with water within a water area who shall erect or make, or cause to be erected or made, any building or addition to any existing building on such land shall, before the commencement of same, give notice in writing thereof to the Board.

*Locking of Taps, etc.*

65. The occupier of any premises to which the water has been laid on, or, in the event of there being no occupier, the owner shall cause proper means to be taken by locks or otherwise, subject to the approval of the Board, to prevent the use of the water from the main by persons not connected with the said premises.

66. No service pipes shall communicate directly with any cistern, tank, or vessel intended or used for the reception of water other than water obtained from the Board's mains.

*Misuse of Water.*

67. Any person entitled to a supply of water for domestic purposes only, or entitled only to a supply of water for any other specified purpose, shall not use such water for any other purpose except that specified.

*Illegal Taking or Selling of Water.*

68. Any person, whether entitled to receive water from the Board or not, shall not, without the written permission of the Board, take, carry away, or allow to be taken or carried away such water from his premises, or sell the same to any other person.

*Turning Off when Repairing and Tapping.*

69. The Board may, from time to time, when necessary for the purpose of tapping or repairing the main, or otherwise, cut off the supply of water from any part or parts of a water area.

*Reward—Reporting Leakage.*

70. The Board may in its discretion adequately reward any person (not being the person in fault) who shall communicate timely information to the Board of any leakage or waste of water, whether the same be accidental, negligently, or wilfully occasioned or suffered, or who shall give such information as shall lead to the conviction of any person or persons who shall steal or cause to be stolen or improperly appropriated the water of the Board.

*Waste of Water.*

71. Any person supplied with water by the Board, whether by meter or otherwise, shall not allow the same to run to waste.

*Limiting Supply.*

72. The Board may at such times and for such purposes as it may deem necessary and expedient, prohibit the use of water for garden purposes and all purposes other than domestic and industrial, except with its permission in writing.

Any person contravening this By-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20, and in the event of a continuing breach, to a further penalty not exceeding £5 for each day such breach shall continue.

*Fixing of Meters.*

73. Any officer appointed by the Board for the purpose may fix a meter on any service, and shall determine the size and class of meter in each case. Meters will be supplied by the Board, and may be open or enclosed, at the discretion of the Board.

*Repairs and Maintenance of Meters.*

74. Any person supplied with water through a meter belonging to the Board shall pay the cost of making good all damage to such meter whilst on his land and in his charge. Any repairs required shall be done by the officers of the Board, and the expense incurred by the Board in so doing shall on demand be paid by the owner of the land, and if not paid on demand, shall be recoverable in the same manner as water rates.

Notice of Damage or Non-registration of Meter shall be given.

75. Any person supplied by the Board with water through a meter shall, on finding that meter is damaged or not registering, immediately give notice of the fact to the Office of the Board.

#### Interference with Meters.

76. No person shall break or in any way interfere with the seal fixed on the meter through which water is supplied by the Board, or turn or attempt to turn any screw, bolt, or nut on or attached to such meter, or use any tool or appliance on any such meter, or introduce or attempt to introduce any body or substance into such meter, or in any way interfere with any portion of such meter or any pipes or fittings attached thereto.

#### Period of Reading.

77. The quantity registered by a meter at any time between ten days before and ten days after any stated date may be taken as the reading of the meter at such stated date.

#### Averaging of Consumption.

78. During the time any meter is undergoing any repairs, or should it cease to properly register the consumption of water, the Board, or any officer appointed by the Board may at its option estimate the quantity of water consumed by taking an average of the quantity used during such previous period as the Board may determine, and the quantity so ascertained shall be paid by the consumer.

#### Testing of Meters.

79. If any consumer shall at any time be dissatisfied with any particular reading of a meter, and be desirous of having the meter tested, he shall give written notice thereof to the Board or its officer within seven days of such reading, and thereupon the said meter shall be tested by passing through it a pre-determined quantity of water, and if upon such testing it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Board or its officer that the meter registered more than five per cent. in excess of the quantity that shall actually pass through it at such testing, then the Board shall bear expense of and incidental of such testing, and shall also adjust the charge to such consumer; but if the meter upon such testing shall not register more than five per cent., in excess of the quantity that shall actually pass through it, then the consumer shall pay to the Board all the expenses of and incidentals of such testing: provided that the expense of every test shall be fixed by the Board, subject to a minimum charge of 10s. for each test: provided also, that the consumer shall not be at liberty to avail himself of the right to test the registration of the meter for any period other than the period of registration next preceding the date of reading in respect of which he shall have given notice as aforesaid.

#### Authority to enter Premises.

80. Any officer acting under the Board's authority may at all reasonable times either enter house or premises connected or intended to be connected with the water mains, in order to examine whether the waterpipes or fittings in such house or premises are in proper order. Any person refusing such admission or in any way hindering such officer in the execution of his duty shall be liable to a penalty as hereinafter prescribed.

#### Gratuities Prohibited.

81. No officer, workman, or agent of the Board shall solicit or receive any fee or gratuity whatever.

### Division VII.

#### Rates and Charges.

##### Rating.

82. (a) Within the Manjimup Water Area the water rate shall be at a rate not exceeding Three shillings in the pound per annum upon the net annual value of all

rateable land: provided that a minimum rate of not exceeding one pound per annum shall be payable on each separately assessed piece of land, and for farming land and any holding situated wholly or partly within ten chains of any pipe, at a rate not exceeding one shilling per acre, plus holding fee, not exceeding five pounds; but no such holding shall be rateable so far as regards that part of which it is more than one mile and a half from the pipe.

(b) The Board may in its discretion allow a discount of not exceeding 5 per centum upon any rates paid within three months of the date upon which such rates become payable, but such discounts shall not apply to minimum rates or fees, which shall be paid in full.

(c) In making rates a distinction may be made between occupied and vacant land, and in the event of a dispute as to whether or not the land shall be regarded as vacant, the decision of the Board shall be final in every case. This shall not apply to farming areas.

#### Rates—How payable.

83. Rates shall become due and payable yearly in advance on the first day of October; provided that in all cases where a rate is made after the first day of October in any year, the notice of the order for the making and levying of such rates, published in the *Government Gazette* and a newspaper, as provided by Section 94 of the said Act, shall specify the minimum sum payable as rate as aforesaid, and the date or dates when the rates shall be due and payable, and such rate shall become due and payable in accordance with the terms of such notice.

#### Allowance for Rate.

84. Subject to the provisions of these By-laws every ratepayer will be entitled to consume on each separately assessed piece of land of which he is the owner or occupier that quantity of water which, if calculated at the price specified in the Schedule 1 hereto as being in the area in which such water is supplied in return for the rate in the area in which such property is situated, would amount to the equivalent of the water rate paid on each property; provided that such water is taken during the period for which the rate is struck.

#### Payment for Excess Water.

85. Every ratepaying consumer taking water in excess of the quantity to which he is entitled in respect of the rate shall pay for the excess in accordance with prices set forth in the Schedule 1 hereto.

#### Fees—State or Commonwealth Government Departments.

86. For each water service for purposes of any State or Commonwealth Department there shall be payable, as a minimum annual fee in lieu of water rate, the sum of not less than one pound (£1) when the service is metered, and of not less than one pound ten shillings (£1 10s.) when the service is non-metered.

It shall be at the discretion of the Board whether or not a meter shall be fixed in each case.

This By-law shall not apply to water for railway purposes.

#### Fees for Additional Services.

87. In any case where the owner or occupier of any separately rated piece of land requires more than one service to be installed for supplying water to such land, such additional service shall, at the discretion of the Board, be installed on such occupier or owner paying in advance the cost of installation, and a fee of not less than one pound per annum, in addition to meter rent, for each additional service. In return for such fee an equivalent quantity of water will be given in each year, in the same way as water is given in return for water rates.

#### Meter Rents.

88. Meters will be supplied by the Board and may in the discretion of the Board be open or encased, and every person supplied with water shall pay meter rent

in advance for all meters over the size of a half-inch, according to the following scale:—

#### Reconnection Fee.

89. In every case in which the supply of water shall have been cut off by reason of non-payment of rates or other charges, or by reason of a defective service, or by request of the occupier or owner, or when in the opinion of the Board or secretary necessary to prevent waste of water, or for other reasons, a minimum fee of five shillings shall be charged for disconnection and reconnection: provided that, where the cost exceeds the minimum fee, the actual cost of the disconnection and reconnection, as determined by the Board, shall be charged, and shall be payable by the owner or occupier for the time being, on demand. The service shall not be restored until such fee has been paid.

#### Private Fire Services.

90. Private fire service will be allowed, but every such service shall be sealed, except in cases where the Board may decide sealing unnecessary. For each such service there shall be paid the actual cost of installation, and a fee equivalent to five per centum on cost per annum shall be paid in advance as rental, subject to a minimum fee for each service of Ten shillings per annum. No water shall be taken from any sealed portion, except for extinction of fire. In the event of the seal having been broken in case of fire or by accident, or otherwise, the occupier shall give notice and pay the cost of resealing.

#### Building Fees.

91. Where water is required for building purposes, the Board may permit the supply thereof at prices as set forth in Schedule I hereto and on the following terms:—

(a) The aforementioned prices shall apply only to supplies to buildings intended for use as ordinary dwellings.

(b) In the case of buildings other than the ordinary dwellings, the supply shall be on such terms as may be agreed upon by the Board, subject to a minimum fee of One pound for each service.

(c) All fees shall be paid in advance. If any work is done other than that mentioned at the time of applying to the Board, the same shall be paid for in advance, or the whole supply will forthwith be cut off.

(d) It shall be at the discretion of the Board as to whether or not in any case a supply of water shall be classed as a supply for building purposes, and as to whether or not the supply shall be measured by meter.

(e) Applications for water under this By-law shall be in writing, stating the nature of the work to be done and the purpose for which water is required.

#### When Accounts Due and Payable.

92. Where water is supplied by measure to the owner or occupier of land, whether rated under the Act or otherwise, payment for same shall become due and payable within 14 days after the due service of the account, unless otherwise agreed upon.

93. Any person committing a breach of any of the foregoing By-laws to which no specific penalty is attached, or who shall refuse or neglect to obey any injunction in any such By-law, or to comply with any requirements therein contained, shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20, and, in case of continuing offence, a further penalty not exceeding £5 for each day after notice of such offence shall have been given by the Board to such offender.

## INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT.

No. 1 of 1937.

(Registered 5/1/1937.)

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of "The Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935," this 29th day of December, 1936, between the Metropolitan Ladies Hairdressers' Industrial Union of Employers of W.A. and the Metropolitan Hairdressers' and Wigmakers Employers' Union of Workers (Female Section).

## 1.—Area.

This Agreement shall be limited to the area comprised within a radius of 15 miles of the G.P.O., Perth.

## 2.—Term.

The term of this Agreement shall be for a period of three (3) years: provided that any time after the expiration of twelve months, on the application of any person or party affected by its provisions, the Court may alter, amend, or revise it in such a manner as the Court may deem fit.

## 3.—Definitions.

Three classes of labour only shall be employed in the industry viz.: Seniors, improvers, apprentices.

(a) "Senior" shall mean a male or female hairdresser who is over the age of twenty-one (21) years.

(b) "Apprentice" shall mean a male or female worker in the industry under twenty-one (21) years of age (other than an improver) who is serving articles of apprenticeship, or is employed in the industry with a view to becoming an apprentice.

(c) "Improver" shall mean—

(1) a worker under the age of twenty-one (21) years who has already served four (4) years in the industry;

(2) a worker under the age of twenty-one (21) years who has completed his or her articles of apprenticeship;

(3) a worker who is the holder of a Certificate of Proficiency issued by the Perth Technical College, in respect of a two years course in the day classes in Ladies' Hairdressing.

(d) "Hairdresser" shall mean any person employed in a ladies' hairdressing establishment performing the following work:—

Head shaving, hair cutting, hair removing, hair dressing, hair trimming, hair curling or waving, hair singeing, shampooing, wigmaking, hair working, hair dyeing, manicuring, face, neck, or head massaging, or other similar stimulative process or treatment of the hair, head, face or neck carried on, used, or employed in Ladies' Hairdressing Salons, Beauty Parlours, or similar establishments, whether with or without the aid of any apparatus, appliance, preparation or substance.

(e) "Worker" shall mean "Worker" as defined in the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935.

## 4.—Hours.

The ordinary hours of work shall not exceed forty-four (44) per week and shall be worked between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. on the first five (5) days of the week; 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. on Saturday, and 9 a.m. and 9 p.m. on the day preceding Christmas day.

Provided always, that a hairdresser may, in order to complete the one (1) operation in relation to any one (1) customer on which he or she is engaged at the hour fixed for ceasing work, continue to work for a period not exceeding one (1) half hour after the hour so fixed for ceasing work for that day.

## 5.—Overtime.

Overtime shall not be worked except as herein provided.

## 6.—Meal Hours.

Every worker shall be entitled to one (1) hour for a meal between the hours of 11 a.m. and 3 p.m.

On the day immediately preceding Christmas Day one (1) additional hour shall be allowed for a meal between the hours of 5 p.m. and 7 p.m.

No worker shall work or be required to work so as to lose or be deprived of either such meal times or any part thereof, or work for longer than four and one-half (4½) hours without such a meal time.

## 7.—Holidays.

(a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu, shall be observed as paid holidays, namely:—New Year's Day, Anniversary Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day, and on these days no work shall be performed.

(b) A holiday of one (1) week on full pay shall be granted to each worker on the completion of each year of service.

(c) The time of granting such holiday shall be at the discretion of the employer: provided that, when a worker is entitled to holidays under this subclause, he or she shall receive at least two (2) weeks' notice from his or her employer of the date when it shall be convenient to the employer that the worker shall take his or her holidays.

(d) A worker not having completed one (1) year's service shall be granted pay in lieu of holidays in proportion to the length of time of his or her services: provided that such services shall have exceeded one month.

(e) A worker dismissed for misconduct shall lose all rights under this clause.

(e) No person carrying on the business of a ladies' hairdresser shall let any chair or cubicle in his or her shop to any other person for the purpose of the business of a hairdresser.

(f) No employer shall employ any worker on a commission basis, or in any manner other than prescribed in this Agreement.

## 9.—Apprenticeship.

The provisions of the Schedule hereto marked "Apprenticeship Regulations" are embodied in and form part of this Agreement.

(a) Female apprentices shall not be less than fifteen (15) years of age at the date of probationship or registration.

(b) A "Certificate of Proficiency" issued by the Perth Technical College to a person who has completed two (2) years in the day classes shall be accepted in lieu of apprenticeship.

(c) Persons completing two (2) years at the Perth Technical College as provided in Subclause (b) but not securing a "Certificate of Proficiency," and persons serving less than two years shall, upon production of evidence of such service, have such time deemed as time actually served as part of their four (4) years' apprenticeship.

(d) Within thirty (30) days of the date of this Agreement, every employer shall send to the Registrar of the Court a list of all workers under the age of twenty-one (21) years and furnish the undermentioned particulars:—Worker's full name, address, date of birth, length of service.

(e) All workers under the age of twenty-one (21) years employed in the industry at the date of this Agreement shall within three (3) months from such date be examined by a Board of Examiners constituted in accordance with the Apprenticeship Regulations for the purpose of classifying such workers into the year of service to which they belong, according to standard of proficiency attained.

(f) A certificate of proficiency in the form of the Form D contained in the "Apprenticeship Regulations" shall be issued, and thereafter the person concerned shall be apprenticed for such period as will complete a term of four (4) years.

(g) Any worker not so apprenticed shall be paid the rates prescribed for a male or female senior, as the case may be.

(h) The Board of Examiners referred to in the Apprenticeship Regulations above referred to shall be persons skilled in the practice of hairdressing as defined in Clause 3, Subclause (d). By agreement between the parties hereto, the examiners appointed by the Perth Technical College may constitute the Board of Examiners.

(i) Apprentices and improvers shall be provided by the employer with all tools of trade. Subject to fair wear and tear, worn tools shall be replaced. Lost or wilfully damaged tools shall be made good by the worker.

#### 10.—Premiums.

No person shall directly or indirectly request or permit any other person to pay or give, or shall receive from any other any premiums, bonus, consideration or payment for employing or teaching, or purporting to employ or teach such person, or any other person, any of the callings to which this Agreement applies.

#### 11.—Proportion.

The maximum number of apprentices and/or improvers allowed to any employer in the industry shall be in the proportion of one (1) to every one (1) fully-paid hairdresser employed by him or her. Provided that, where the employer or any partner in a business, a manager or manageress regularly works at the trade, such persons shall be counted as fully-paid hairdressers for the purpose of computing the number of apprentices and/or improvers to be allowed.

#### 12.—Engagement.

Employment shall be on a weekly basis and terminated by one (1) week's notice given by either party.

Provided that any worker may be summarily dismissed by his or her employer for misconduct or refusal to obey orders.

#### 13.—Time and Wages Book.

The employer shall keep and enter up or cause to be kept and entered up a book containing:—(a) the name of each worker; (b) the class of work performed; (c) the hours worked each day; (d) the wages paid to each worker; (e) the ages of apprentices and/or improvers.

Such book shall be open for inspection by a duly authorised representative of the Union not more than once in each week during the working hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

#### 14.—Uniforms.

In the event of a worker being required to wear a special uniform or costume, such special uniform or costume shall be provided by and laundered at the employer's expense: provided an overall shall not be regarded as special uniform or costume. Employers shall

provide apprentices and/or improvers with overalls, but the laundering of such overalls shall be the responsibility of the worker.

#### 15.—Sick Pay.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one half-day for each completed month of service.

Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to six (6) days in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred.

This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(b) Holiday pay shall not accrue during a worker's absence from duty, except on account of ill-health, in accordance with Subclause (a) hereof.

#### 16.—Staff Room.

The employer shall provide a suitable room or accommodation for workers in which to change and keep their clothes while on duty.

#### 17.—Posting Agreement.

A copy of this Agreement shall be kept in a conveniently conspicuous place in the staff room of the employer's premises.

#### SCHEDULE.

#### APPRENTICESHIP.

#### Definitions.

1. (1) "Act" means "The Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935," and any alteration or amendment thereof for the time being in force.

(2) "Apprentice" means any person of either sex who is apprenticed to learn or to be taught any industry, trade, craft, or calling to which these Regulations apply, and includes an apprentice on probation.

(3) "Award" includes Industrial Agreement.

(4) "Court" means the Court of Arbitration.

(5) "Employer" includes any firm, company or corporation.

(6) "Minor" means a person not less than fourteen years of age and not more than eighteen years of age who customarily works under the direction of or in association with an employer, master, or journeyman upon the material and with the tools or implements used in the industry.

(7) "Registrar" means the Registrar of the Court.

#### Employment—Probation.

2. No minor shall (except where provision is otherwise made in this Award) be employed or engaged in the industry, except subject to the conditions of apprenticeship or probationership herein contained.

3. (1) Every apprentice shall be employed on probation for a period of three months to determine his fitness or otherwise for apprenticeship, and shall work only for such hours per day and for such remuneration as may be prescribed by the Award. In the event of his becoming an apprentice such probationary period shall be counted as part of the term of apprenticeship.

(2) The Court may in any case where it seems expedient to do so, order that the probationary period of employment be extended for a further period not exceeding three months.

4. (a) Any employer taking an apprentice on probation shall within 14 days thereafter register such probationer by giving notice thereof to the Registrar in the prescribed form. If at the date of the coming into operation of these Regulations an employer is employing any apprentice or probationer who has not been duly registered as such, he shall forthwith apply for the due registration of such apprentice or probationer.

(b) At the end of the period of probation of each apprentice, if mutually agreed upon by the employer and the legal guardian of the boy, but not otherwise, he may become an apprentice under an agreement.

5. The employer of every apprentice shall keep him constantly at work and teach such apprentice or cause him to be taught the industry, craft, occupation, or calling in relation to which he is bound apprentice, by competent instruction in a gradual and complete manner, and shall give such apprentice a reasonable opportunity to learn the same, and receive, during the period of his apprenticeship, such technical, trade, and general instruction and training as may be necessary. And every apprentice shall, during the period of his apprenticeship, faithfully serve his employer for the purpose of being taught the industry, craft, occupation, or calling in relation to which he is bound, and shall also conscientiously and regularly accept such technical, trade, and general instruction and training as aforesaid, in addition to the teaching that may be provided by his employer.

6. An employer shall be deemed to undertake the duty which he agrees to perform as a duty enforceable under an Award of the Court.

#### Advisory Committee.

7. A Board to be called "The Advisory Committee" may be appointed by the Court to advise in regard to any apprenticeship matter. Such committee shall consist of the following:—

- (a) Some person appointed by the Court who shall act as Chairman.
- (b) Two representatives appointed by the employers.
- (c) Two representatives appointed by the industrial union or unions of workers in the trade.

The Advisory Committee shall have such powers and duties as the Court in each case may determine.

8. (i) No employer shall refuse employment to any person, or dismiss any worker from his employment, or injure him in his employment or alter his position to his prejudice, by reason merely of the fact that the worker is a member of any Advisory Committee, or by reason merely of anything said or done or omitted to be done by any such person or worker in the course of his duty as such member.

(ii) In any proceeding for any contravention of this Regulation it shall lie upon the employer to show that any person proved to have been refused employment, or any worker proved to have been dismissed or injured in his employment or prejudiced whilst acting as such member, was refused employment or dismissed or injured in his employment or prejudiced for some reason other than that mentioned in this Regulation.

#### Agreement of Apprenticeship.

9. (a) All agreements of apprenticeship shall be drawn up on a form approved by the Court, and signed by the employer, the legal guardian of the apprentice, the apprentice, and the Registrar. No employer, guardian or apprentice shall enter into any agreement or undertaking purporting to add to, vary, alter or amend any such agreement without the approval of the Court.

(b) There shall be three copies of each agreement, of which one copy shall be held by the employer, one shall be held by the legal guardian of the apprentice, and one copy shall be retained by the Registrar.

(c) The apprenticeship agreement shall be completed within one month of the termination of the probationary period.

(d) Every agreement of apprenticeship shall be subject to the provisions of the award in force for the time being applicable to apprenticeship in the industry.

10. Every agreement entered into by the employer and the legal guardian of the apprentice shall be for a period of four years, but this period may be reduced in special circumstances with the approval of the Court.

11. Every agreement of apprenticeship entered into shall contain—

- (a) The names and addresses of the parties to the agreement.
- (b) The date of birth of the apprentice.
- (c) A description of the industry, craft, occupation, or calling or combination thereof to which the apprentice is to be bound.
- (d) The date at which the apprenticeship is to commence and the period of apprenticeship.
- (e) A condition requiring the apprentice to obey all reasonable directions of the employer and requiring the employer and apprentice to comply with the terms of the industrial award so far as they concern the apprentice.
- (f) A condition that technical instruction of the apprentice, when available, shall be at the employer's expense, and shall be in the employer's time, except in places where such instruction is given after the ordinary working hours.
- (g) A condition that in the event of any apprentice, in the opinion of the examiners, not progressing satisfactorily, increased time for technical instruction shall be allowed at the employer's expense to enable such apprentice to reach the necessary standard.
- (h) The general conditions of apprenticeship.

#### Transfer of Apprentices.

12. (a) The Court shall have power to transfer an apprentice from one employer to another either temporarily or permanently—

- (i) if the employer does not provide the necessary facilities for the apprentice to become proficient in his trade; or
- (ii) upon the application of the employer or the apprentice for good cause shown.

(b) The transfer of every agreement shall be on a form approved by the Court, and shall be made out in quadruplicate, and shall, unless the Court otherwise directs, be signed by the late employer or his assigns, the legal guardian of the apprentice, the apprentice, the Registrar, and the new employer. The transfer form shall be completed within two months of the date on which the transfer is effected.

(c) One copy of the transfer agreement shall be held by the late employer, one shall be held by the new employer, one shall be held by the legal guardian of the apprentice, and one shall be retained by the Registrar.

13. Should an employer at any time before the termination of the period of apprenticeship desire to dispense with the service of the apprentice he may with the consent of the apprentice and guardian transfer him to another employer carrying on business within a reasonable distance of the original employer's place of business, willing to continue to teach the apprentice and pay the rate of wages prescribed by the Court in its award or otherwise according to the total length of time served, and generally to perform the obligations of the original employer.

14. On the transfer or termination of any apprenticeship, from whatever cause, the employer shall give the apprentice a certificate stating what time he has served, full particulars of the branches of the trade or industry in which he has received instruction, the proficiency attained, and shall also notify the Clerk of the Court, and the cause thereof.

15. In the event of an employer being unable to provide work for the apprentice or to mutually agree with the legal guardian of the apprentice to cancel the agreement or to arrange a transfer, application may be made to the Court to arrange for such transfer or to have such agreement cancelled.

16. Where a person is apprenticed to partners his agreement of apprenticeship shall upon the retirement or death of any partner be deemed to be assigned to the continuing partner or partners.

#### Cancellation of Agreement.

17. Every agreement shall include a provision that it may be cancelled, by mutual consent, by the employer and the legal guardian of the apprentice giving one month's notice in writing to the Court and to the parties concerned that such apprenticeship shall be terminated.

18. If the apprentice shall at any time be wilfully disobedient to the lawful orders of the employer, his managers, foremen or other servants having authority over the apprentice, or be slothful, or negligent, or dishonest, or shall otherwise grossly misbehave himself, or shall not conduct himself as a good and faithful apprentice should do, or shall not faithfully observe and keep his part of his agreement, then it shall be lawful for the employer, with the consent of the Court, to discharge the apprentice from his service.

19. The Court may in its discretion for any cause which it may deem sufficient on the application of any party to an apprenticeship agreement vary or cancel the agreement, either unconditionally or subject to such terms and conditions as it may deem advisable.

20. No apprentice employed under a registered agreement shall be discharged by the employer for alleged misconduct until the registration of the agreement of apprenticeship has been cancelled by order of the Court on the application of the employer.

Provided, however, that an apprentice may be suspended for misconduct by the employer, but in any such case the employer shall forthwith make an application for cancellation of the agreement of apprenticeship, and in the event of the Court refusing same the wages of the apprentice or such portion thereof, if any, as the Court may order shall be paid as from the date of such suspension, and, in the event of the application for cancellation being granted, such order may take effect from the date when the apprentice was suspended.

21. Subject to the provisions of the Acts relating to Bankruptcy and Insolvency and the Winding-up of Companies, the following provisions shall apply:

(a) The Trustee or Liquidator, as the case may be, may give written notice to the apprentice and his parent or guardian of his intention to discontinue the employment of the apprentice from a date to be named in such notice, and thereupon the agreement shall be deemed to be terminated from the said date; subject, however, and without prejudice to the right of the apprentice, his parent or guardian, to compound, compromise, or agree upon or to sue for and recover such damages (if any) as he may have sustained through such rescission of the agreement as aforesaid.

(b) Any proceedings for damages hereunder must be commenced within six weeks after the service on the apprentice of the notice referred to in subclause (a) hereof, otherwise any claim for damages shall be deemed to be waived and forfeited.

#### Extension of Term.

22. Subject to Regulation 37, time lost by the apprentice through sickness or any other cause whatsoever may, with the consent of the Court on the application of any party, be added to the original term in the apprenticeship agreement at the end of the year of service in which the time has been lost or at the termination of the apprenticeship period.

23. The term of apprenticeship may be extended by the Court on the failure of an apprentice to pass any of the examinations, and for such purpose it shall be the duty of the examiners to make any necessary recommendation to the Court. Any extension of the term of apprenticeship shall be subject to all the conditions and stipulations in the original agreement, except as to rates of wages, which shall be such amount as the Court may determine.

#### Technical Education Classes.

24. (a) Every apprentice shall attend regularly and punctually a Government or other approved technical school vocational classes or classes of instruction, for instruction in such subjects as are provided for his trade. This clause shall be deemed to have been complied with if the apprentice takes a course in an approved correspondence school: Provided, however, that attendances shall not be compulsory when the apprentice is resident outside a radius of 12 miles from the place where instruction is given, or in the case of illness of the apprentice the proof whereof lies on him: Provided also that if technical instruction is not available in the locality in which the apprentice is employed and is available by correspondence, at reasonable cost to be approved by the Court, the Court may prescribe such correspondence course as the technical instruction to be taken by the apprentice and paid for by the employer.

(b) The fees for the classes attended by the apprentice shall be paid by the employer.

(c) The period during which apprentices are to attend such technical school or classes if any shall be four hours per week.

25. Where in any case it is shown to the satisfaction of the Court that any apprentice, by reason of his engagement on country work or other good cause, cannot conveniently attend a technical school or other prescribed classes, such of these Regulations as relate to attendance at a technical school or other prescribed classes, and to examinations, shall not apply to such apprentice, but he shall be subject to such conditions as the Court may direct.

26. If the examiners or the industrial union or employer concerned make representations to the Court that the facilities provided by the Technical School, or other place of vocational training for the teaching of apprentices, are inadequate, the Court may make such investigations, and such report to the Minister controlling such Technical School, or such other place, as it deems necessary.

27. When an apprentice attends a technical school, vocational classes, or other class or classes of instruction during his ordinary working hours, where such is prescribed, the time so occupied shall be regarded as part of the term of his apprenticeship, and the employer shall not be entitled to make any deduction from the wages of the apprentice for such time.

#### Examinations.

28. (a) Every apprentice shall be bound to submit himself to examination at the places and times appointed by the Registrar after consultation with the examiners.

(b) Every apprentice shall, prior to submitting himself to examination, produce to the examiners a certificate that he has made at least 70 per centum of attendances at the technical school or other place of instruction unless he is exempted from such attendance for good cause.

(c) The clerk of the Court shall notify the examiners of the names and addresses of the apprentices required to submit themselves to examination.

(d) The employer shall place at the disposal of the examiners such material and machinery on his premises as may be required by them, and shall in all ways facilitate the conduct of the examination.

29. (a) The examiners shall be persons skilled in the industry and appointed as prescribed by the award. Failing provision or appointment as aforesaid the Court may appoint such person or persons as it may deem fit. In the event of a disagreement between the examiners, the matter in dispute shall be referred to a third person agreed to by them or nominated by the Court or the President at the request of any of the examiners, and the decision of such person shall be final and conclusive.

(b) It shall be the duty of the examiners to examine the work, require the production of the certificate of attendance, inquire into the diligence of each apprentice, and as to the opportunities provided by the employer for each apprentice to learn, and to submit a report to the Court in writing as to the result of the examination within one month from the date of holding the examination, but this period may be extended by the Court.

(c) Such examination shall, where possible, include theory and practice as applied to the trade, industry, craft, occupation, or calling to which the apprentice is indentured.

30. The Registrar shall, after each examination, issue a certificate to each apprentice indicating his degree of proficiency, taking into consideration the term of apprenticeship served. A duplicate of such certificate shall be lodged by each apprentice with his employer and the secretary of the Union, each of whom shall keep the same in safe custody, and produce the same for inspection by the Industrial Inspector whenever demanded by the latter to do so. When the final examination has been passed the certificate shall also be signed by the examiners.

31. Whenever it is possible so to do, the examiners, before entering upon the examination, shall draw up a syllabus showing what, in their opinion, is the stage of proficiency which an apprentice should attain at each of the examinations prescribed. The syllabus shall be subject to review by the Court at any time, and shall be kept as a record by the Clerk of the Court and a copy handed to the examiners before each examination. The said syllabus may be subject to alteration from time to time by the examiners, who shall forthwith notify the Clerk of the Court thereof.

32. In lieu of, or in addition to, examiners above referred to the Court may appoint, wholly or partly, examiners to be appointed by the Director of Technical Education for the whole or any portion of the subjects of instruction, and at such remuneration as the Court may determine.

33. In the event of an apprentice failing to pass any of his examinations the employer may apply to the Court to disallow the increase in wages prescribed by the award, and the Court, on any such application, may make such order as the circumstances of the case may seem to require.

34. Upon the failure of an apprentice to pass two consecutive examinations, it shall be the duty of the examiners to report same to the Court with a recommendation as to the cancellation of the apprenticeship agreement, or such other remedial measures (i.e., increased time for technical instruction) as they may deem advisable. The Court, after notice to all parties concerned, may cancel the agreement or make such other order in the circumstances as it may deem necessary.

35. Upon the completion of the period of training prescribed for apprenticeship, each apprentice shall be required to pass the final examination test to the satisfaction of the examiners, and upon passing this test shall be provided with a certificate to that effect by the Registrar.

#### Lost Time.

36. The employer shall pay the apprentice for all time lost through sickness or the holidays prescribed by this award: Provided—

- (a) payment for such sickness shall not exceed a total of one month in each year;
- (b) where the time lost through sickness exceeds four consecutive working days, the employer may demand from the apprentice the production of a medical certificate, and a further certificate or certificates may be required if any time is lost through sickness within seven days from the date of resumption of duty, the cost if any of such certificate or certificates not exceeding 5s. to be borne by the employer;
- (c) An apprentice shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment, or for any accident or sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

37. The employer shall pay the apprentice, in respect of time lost through compulsory military or naval training, the amount by which the wages prescribed by the industrial award for the trade, calling, craft, occupation, or industry exceeds the amount received by the apprentice from the Department of Defence: Provided, however, that this clause shall not apply to military or naval training imposed through failure to attend compulsory parades.

All time lost by reason of compulsory military or naval training other than the additional training mentioned in the above proviso shall count as part of the apprenticeship.

38. When an apprentice is absent from work for any cause other than sickness or in pursuance of the provisions of these Regulations, the employer shall be en-

titled to deduct from the wages of the apprentice an amount proportionate to the time so lost.

39. When an apprentice cannot be usefully employed because of a strike the employer shall be relieved of his obligations under the apprenticeship agreement during the period of the strike.

#### Part-time Employment.

40. Where in any case an employer is temporarily unable to provide work to employ an apprentice for his full time, application may be made by the employer to the Court for permission to employ the apprentice for such lesser time per week or per month, and at such remuneration as the Court may determine, being not less than the proportionate amount of the rate of wages prescribed by the industrial award for the trade, calling, or industry. If the Court grants the application holidays will be reduced *pro rata*.

#### Miscellaneous.

41. (1) The Registrar shall prepare and keep a roll of apprentices containing—

- (a) a record of all apprentices and probationers placed with employers;
- (b) a record of all employers with whom apprentices are placed;
- (c) a record of the progress of each apprentice, recording the result of the examiners' reports;
- (d) any other particulars the Court may direct.

(2) These records shall be open to inspection by employers and the Union of workers interested, upon request.

42. For the purpose of ascertaining the number of apprentices allowed to be taken at any time, the average number of journeymen employed on all working days of the twelve months immediately preceding such time shall be deemed to be the number of journeymen employed. Where the employer is himself a journeyman regularly and usually working at the trade he shall be counted as a journeyman for the purpose of computing the number of apprentices allowed. Where a business is in operation for less than twelve months the method of ascertaining the number shall be as agreed by the parties to the award, or, if no agreement arrived at, as determined by the Court.

43. Every industrial inspector appointed in pursuance of the provisions of "The Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935," shall have the power to enter any premises, make such inspection of the premises, plant, machinery, or work upon which any apprentice is employed or could be employed, interview any apprentice or employee, examine any books or documents of the business relating to the wages and conditions of apprentices, interrogate the employer in regard to any of the above-mentioned matters.

44. With a view to determining whether the number of apprentices being trained is sufficient to meet the future requirements of the industry in the matter of skilled artisans, the Registrar may require any employer to furnish him with any specified information relating to the said industry, or relating to the workers engaged therein.

45. In every application under Clauses 15, 18, 19, 20, 22, 23, 33 and 40 of this Schedule the Union of Workers registered may intervene and make such representations at the hearing as it may deem necessary. The representative shall be appointed in the manner prescribed by Section 65 of the Act.
