IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 10 of 1943.

Between Australian Workers' Union, Westralian Branch, Industrial Union of Workers, Applicant, and Michelides, Ltd., and O. Felstead, Respondents.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties; and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination; and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters

in difference; and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective representatives and requested the Court to declare the said Agreement an Award: Now, therefore the Court, pursuant to section 63 of the Act and all other powers therein enabling it, hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court:—

Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note:—Wherever the word “Award” occurs herein it shall be taken to mean and include “Agreement.”)

(1) Area and Scope.

This Award shall, except as provided hereunder, apply to all workers employed in the growing and grading of tobacco in the South-West Land Division in the State of Western Australia excluding that portion comprised within a radius of fifteen (15) miles from the General Post Office, Perth: Provided that it shall not apply to workers who are at present provided for in any Award of the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia or in any Industrial Agreement registered in accordance with the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941: Provided further that nothing in this Award shall apply to managers.

(2) Term.

The term of this Award shall be twelve (12) months from the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and forty-four.

(3) Representative Interviewing Workers.

In case of a disagreement existing or anticipated concerning any of the provisions of this Award, an accredited representative of the union shall be permitted to interview the workers during the recognised meal hour, on the business premises of the employer, but this permission shall not be exercised without the consent of the employer more than once in any one (1) week.

(4) Contract of Service.

(a) Except in the case of casual workers, one (1) week's notice on either side shall be necessary to terminate the engagement. Provided that an employer may at any time dismiss a worker for refusal or neglect to obey orders or for misconduct and wages in such a case shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only.

(b) The services of a casual worker, namely a worker who is employed for less than one (1) week, may be terminated by giving one (1) hours' notice: Provided that any worker other than a worker who is notified at the end of the day that his services are no longer required, who presents himself for work, shall be paid a minimum of two (2) hours.

(c) Casual workers shall be paid ten per cent. (10%) in addition to the rates prescribed in clause 26.

(5) Time and Wages Record.

The employer shall keep or cause to be kept a record containing the following particulars:—(a) The name of each worker; (b) The class of work performed; (c) The hours worked each day; (d) The wages (and overtime if any) paid; (e) The age of each junior worker. Such record shall be open to the inspection of an accredited representative of the union.

(6) Aged and Infirm Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the union and the employer. (b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination. (c) After application has been made to the Board and pending the Board's decision the worker shall be entitled to work for the employer at the proposed lesser rate.

(7) Junior Worker's Certificate.

Junior workers upon being engaged shall if required furnish the employer with a certificate containing the following particulars:—(a) Name in full; (b) Age and date of birth; (c) Name of each previous employer and length of service with each such employer; (d) Class of work performed for each previous employer.

Such of the foregoing particulars as are within the knowledge of the employer shall be endorsed on the certificate and signed by the employer upon the request of the worker. No worker shall have any claim upon an employer for additional wages in the event of the age or length of service of the worker being wrongly stated in the certificate. If any worker shall wilfully misstate his age or length of service in the above certificate, he alone shall be guilty of a breach of this Award.

(8) No Reduction.

Nothing herein contained shall entitle an employer to reduce the wage of any worker who at the date of

this Award was being paid a higher rate of wage than the minimum prescribed for his or her class of work.

(9) Board of Reference.

The Court hereby appoints for the purpose of this Award a Board or Boards of Reference. Each such Board shall consist of a Chairman and two other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties as prescribed by regulations.

There are assigned to each such Board, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to this Award, the functions of:—(a) Adjusting any matters of difference which may arise from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Award or any of them; (b) Classifying and fixing wages, rates and conditions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Award. (c) Deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time.

An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, which for the purpose are embodied in this Award.

(10) Absence through Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the grounds of personal ill-health for one-half (½) day for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to six (6) days (one week's pay) in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply when the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(b) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of any accident wherever sustained arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(11) Hours.

(a) The ordinary working hours shall not exceed forty-eight (48) per week to be worked at the option of the employer in five (5) or five and one half (5½) days between Monday and Saturday inclusive. (b) The starting time shall not be earlier than 5.30 a.m. (c) No day's work shall exceed nine (9) hours forty (40) minutes for five (5) days in the week, excluding Sunday, and four (4) hours forty (40) minutes on the day, other than a Sunday, upon which the half day is taken. (d) A worker shall not be compelled to work for more than six (6) hours without a break for a meal. (e) No break for a meal shall exceed one (1) hour.

(12) Shift Work.

(a) When shift work is worked, the starting and finishing times may be fixed from time to time by agreement in writing between the employer and the union, or failing agreement, by the Board of Reference. (b) No worker under sixteen (16) years of age shall be employed as a shift worker on afternoon or night shift.

(13) Overtime.

(a) Except as provided in subclause (e) of this clause, all work performed before the usual starting time or after the usual finishing time or beyond the spread of hours referred to in clause 11 (c) or beyond forty-eight (48) hours in any one week shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half. (b) Except as provided in subclause (e) of this clause all work performed on Sunday shall be paid for at the rate of double time. (c) Except as provided in subclause (e) of this clause, work performed on New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day in establishments which adopt the system of holidays prescribed in clause 14 (a) (i) shall be paid for at the rate of double time. (d) Except as provided in sub-

clause (e) of this clause, work performed on Good Friday and Christmas Day in establishments which adopt the system of holidays prescribed in clause 14 (a) (ii) shall be paid for at the rate of double time. (e) Any worker who is required by his employer to attend to horses shall do so in his own time, and shall be paid the following rates in addition to the weekly wage:—One or two horses—one shilling (1/-) per day and one shilling (1/-) for Sunday; more than two horses—two shillings (2/-) per day and two shillings (2/-) for Sunday.

(14) Holidays.

(a) The employer shall have the option of granting paid holidays in the manner set out in subclause (i) or (ii) of this subclause:—(i) Twelve (12) paid holidays shall be granted to each worker after twelve (12) months continuous service: Provided always that New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day, or the days observed as such shall be taken as they come as portion of the holidays. The balance of six (6) days shall be granted as annual leave at the convenience of the employer, but shall in any event be taken within three (3) months after becoming due. On any other public holiday the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed in which case a worker need not present himself for work, and payment for that day may be deducted, but if work be done, ordinary rates shall apply. (ii) Each worker shall be entitled to two (2) weeks' leave on full pay on completion of each year of service; such leave shall be taken within three (3) months after becoming due. On any public holiday an employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for work and payment for that day may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rates, except as provided in clause 13 (d), shall apply.

(b) In the event of a worker being employed by the employer for portion only of a year he shall only be entitled to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer and if such holidays are not equal to the holidays given to the other workers of such employer, he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on holidays on full pay.

(c) Holiday pay shall not accrue during a worker's absence from his employment for any cause whatsoever.

(d) Any worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall lose all rights under this clause.

(15) Rations.

When a worker is employed at a greater distance than five (5) miles from a main store or other place of business where he could reasonably be expected to obtain supplies, the employer shall arrange for the free delivery of such supplies or pay carriage on same from the nearest store.

(16) Sanitary Arrangements, etc.

Employers shall provide proper sanitary arrangements and a full supply of hot water on the job for the use of workers at meal times. Cool drinking water in suitable containers with proper covers shall be supplied by the employer for the use of workers at their place of work.

(17) Scales.

On all farms where pieceworkers are employed, scales shall be provided by the employer to weigh tobacco leaf handled by such workers.

(18) Junior Female Workers.

No junior female worker shall be employed on any farm unless under the care and protection of an adult female worker or the wife of the employer or his manager.

(19) Payment of Wages.

Wages shall be paid fortnightly within fifteen (15) minutes of the time for ceasing work.

(20) First Aid Kit.

The employer shall supply a first aid kit for the use of workers in the event of an accident or sickness.

(21) Transport to Hospital.

If a worker is injured seriously or falls seriously ill, the employer shall provide means of getting him to the nearest hospital or pay the cost of transporting such worker to the nearest hospital.

(22) Higher Duties.

Any worker engaged for more than half of one day or shift on other duties carrying a higher rate than his ordinary classification shall be paid the higher rate for the day.

(23) Piecework.

(a) An employer may make a contract with a worker or group of workers for payment by results by piecework. (b) A worker working under any system of payment by results shall be paid at least the time rate of pay apportioned if necessary. (c) Where a worker works part of a week at piecework rates and part at time rates he shall be paid so much as he is entitled to receive under piecework rates for the amount of work done, and in addition thereto such proportionate amount at time rates as prescribed in this Award for the portion of the week worked at time rates.

(24) Board and Lodging.

Where the employer provides board and lodging the following provisions shall apply:—

(a) The employer shall be permitted to make the following deductions from the wages of a worker where satisfactory board and lodging is provided:—

The amounts of the deductions for board and lodging set out above shall be subject to adjustment in accordance with the basic wage as declared by the Court from time to time.

(b) (i) The employer shall provide suitable separate sanitary, dining and sleeping quarters for each sex. (ii) Sleeping quarters shall consist of wooden frame structures with board floors, subdivided into divisions to accommodate not more than two persons. (iii) Sleeping quarters shall be furnished with wire beds or canvas stretchers with suitable mattresses and pillows and supplied with adequate artificial lighting appliances. For the purpose of this subclause, candle light shall not be deemed adequate. All utensils and lamps shall be given up by the workers clean and in good condition, reasonable wear and tear excepted and any deficiency, breakage or other damage may be charged against the earnings of the worker or workers concerned.

(c) The employer shall provide an adequate supply of suitable water to meet all domestic requirements. Such water supply shall be available at the place where the worker is lodged.

(d) Any dispute arising in respect of the words "satisfactory," "suitable," or "adequate" in this clause, shall be determined by the Board of Reference.

(25) Deductions from Wages.

Where the employer does not provide the worker with Board, the following provisions shall apply:—

(a) Where a worker elects to secure from his employer supplies of milk and vegetables in sufficient quantity to meet the average domestic requirements in respect of these commodities, the employer shall be allowed to deduct from the wages of such worker the sum of eight shillings and sixpence (8s. 6d.) per week.

(b) Where a worker voluntarily utilises quarters made available by the employer to live in (such quarters to be furnished with wire beds or canvas stretchers, with suitable mattresses and pillows), kerosene for lighting pur-

poses, firewood and an adequate domestic water supply (situated at the quarters above referred to), the employer shall be allowed to deduct from the wages of such worker the sum of ten shillings (10s.) per week.

(c) The amounts of the deductions set out in (a) and (b) of this clause shall be subject to adjustment in accordance with the basic wage as declared by the Court from time to time.

(d) Any dispute arising in respect of the words "sufficient" or "adequate" in this clause, shall be determined by the Board of Reference.

(26) Wages.

INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT No. 13 of 1943.

(Reg. 23/12/43.)

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, this thirteenth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and forty-three, between Paterson & Co., Limited, The Westralian Farmers, Ltd., A. G. Watt, Plaistowe & Co., Ltd., and Mount Barker Co-Operative Limited (hereinafter called "the employers") on the one part and the Australian Workers' Union, Westralian Branch, Industrial Union of Workers (hereinafter called "the union") of the other part, witnesseth that, for the consideration hereinafter appearing, the parties hereto mutually covenant and agree the one with the other as follows:—

Clause (1)—Scope.

This Agreement shall apply to all workers employed by the employers in the Vegetable, Offal, or Fruit Dehydration and Canning Industry: Provided that it shall not apply to workers who are at present provided for in any Award of the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia or in any Industrial Agreement

registered in accordance with the provisions of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941.

Clause (2)—Area.

This Agreement shall have effect over that portion of the State of Western Australia comprised within the South-West Land Division thereof.

Clause (3)—Term.

The term of this Agreement shall be twelve months from its date.

Clause (4)—Contract of Service.

(a) Except in the case of casual workers one (1) week's notice on either side shall be necessary to terminate the engagement; provided that an employer may at any time dismiss a worker for refusal or neglect to obey orders or for misconduct, and wages in such a case shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only. (b) The services of a casual worker, namely a worker who is employed for less than one week may be terminated by giving one hour's notice, provided that any worker other than a worker who is notified at the end of the day that his services are no longer required, who presents himself for work, shall be paid a minimum of two (2) hours. (c) Casual worker shall be paid ten per cent. (10%) in addition to the rates prescribed in clause 19.

Clause (5)—Representative Interviewing Workers.

In the case of a disagreement existing or anticipated concerning any of the provisions of this Agreement, an accredited representative of the Union shall be permitted to interview the workers during the recognised meal hour, on the business premises of the employer, but this permission shall not be exercised without the consent of the employer, more than once in any one (1) week.

Clause (6)—Posting Agreement and Union Notices.

The shop steward shall not be prevented from posting a copy of this Agreement or any notice of the Union, not exceeding fourteen (14) inches by nine (9) inches in a suitable place agreed upon between the employer and the Union. Failing agreement in this connection the Board of Reference shall decide where the copy of the Agreement or the said notice shall be posted.

Clause (7)—Time and Wages Record.

The employer shall keep or cause to be kept a record containing the following particulars:—(a) The name of each worker, (b) The class of work performed, (c) The hours worked each day, (d) The wage (and overtime, if any) paid, (e) The age of each Junior Worker. Such record shall be open to the inspection of an accredited representative of the Union.

Clause (8)—Aged and Infirm Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the employer. (b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination. (c) After application has been made to the Board and pending the Board's decision the worker shall be entitled to work for the employer at the proposed lesser rate.

Clause (9)—Higher Duties.

A worker who is required to do work which is entitled to a higher rate under this Agreement than that which he or she usually performs shall be entitled to the higher rate whilst so employed.

Clause (10)—Junior Workers Certificate.

Junior workers upon being engaged shall if required furnish the employer with a certificate containing the following particulars:—(a) Name in full, (b) Age and date of birth, (c) Name of each previous employer and length of service with each such employer, (d) Class of work performed for each previous employer. Such of the foregoing particulars as are within the knowledge of the employer shall be endorsed on the certificate and signed by the employer upon request of the worker. No worker shall have any claim upon an employer for additional pay in the event of the age or length of service of the worker being wrongly stated on the certificate. If any worker

shall wilfully misstate his age or length of service in the above certificate, he alone shall be guilty of a breach of this Agreement.

Clause (11)—Breakdowns, etc.

The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the Union or Unions affiliated with it or by any other Association or Union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

Clause (12)—No Reduction.

Nothing herein contained shall entitle an employer to reduce the wage of any worker who at the date of this Agreement was being paid a higher rate of wage than the minimum prescribed for his or her class of work.

Clause (13)—Board of Reference.

The Court may appoint for the purpose of this Agreement a Board or Boards of Reference. Each such Board shall consist of a chairman and two other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties as prescribed by regulations.

There are assigned to each such Board in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to this Agreement, the functions of:—(a) Adjusting any matters of difference which may arise from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Agreement or any of them; (b) Classifying and fixing wages, rates and conditions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Agreement; (c) Deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time. An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the Regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, which for the purpose are embodied in this Agreement.

Clause (14)—Absence Through Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one half ($\frac{1}{2}$) day for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to six (6) days (one week's pay) in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply when the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act. (b) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through any accident wherever sustained arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default. (c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

Clause (15)—Hours.

(a) The ordinary working hours shall not exceed forty-four (44) per week to be worked at the option of the employer in five (5) or five and one-half ($5\frac{1}{2}$) days between Monday and Saturday inclusive. For the sake of convenience in rostering an eighty-eight (88) hour fortnight may be worked by agreement between the employer and the Union. (b) A worker shall not be compelled to work for more than six (6) hours without a break for a meal. (c) (i) Where a five and one-half ($5\frac{1}{2}$) day week is worked, no day's work shall exceed eight (8) hours, to be worked between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m., Monday to Friday inclusive, and 7 a.m. and 12 noon on Saturday. (ii) Where a five (5) day week is worked no day's work shall exceed eight (8) hours forty-eight (48) minutes to be worked from Monday to Friday inclusive between 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. Provided that in the case of cleaners the ordinary hours of work may be performed outside the hours set out above.

Clause (16)—Shift Work.

(a) When shift work is worked, the starting and finishing times may be fixed from time to time by

agreement in writing between the employer and the Union, or failing agreement, by the Board of Reference. (b) No worker under sixteen (16) years of age shall be employed as a shift worker.

Clause (17)—Overtime.

(a) All work performed before the usual starting time or after the usual finishing time or beyond eight (8) hours in establishments working a five and one-half ($5\frac{1}{2}$) day week, or beyond eight (8) hours forty-eight (48) minutes in establishments working a five (5) day week, shall be paid for at the rate of time and a-half. (b) All work performed on Sunday shall be paid for at the rate of double time. (c) Work performed on New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day in establishments which adopt the system of holidays prescribed in clause 18 (a) (i) shall be paid for at the rate of double time. (d) Work performed on Good Friday and Christmas Day in establishments which adopt the system of holidays prescribed in clause 18 (a) (ii) shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

Clause (18)—Holidays.

(a) The employer shall have the option of granting paid holidays in the manner set out in subclause (i) or (ii) of this subclause. (i) Twelve (12) paid holidays per annum shall be granted to each worker after twelve (12) months continuous service: Provided always that New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day or the days observed as such shall be taken as they come as portion of the holidays. The balance of six (6) days shall be granted as annual leave at the convenience of the employer, but shall in any event be taken within three (3) months after becoming due. On any other public holiday the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for work, and payment for that day may be deducted, but if work be done, ordinary rates shall apply. (ii) Each worker shall be entitled to two (2) weeks leave on full pay on completion of each year of service; such leave shall be taken within three (3) months of becoming due. On any public holiday the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case the worker need not present himself for duty and payment for that day may be deducted, but if work be done, ordinary rates shall, except as provided in clause 17 (d), apply. (b) In the event of a worker being employed by the employer for portion only of a year he shall only be entitled to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer and if such holidays are not equal to the holidays given to the other workers of such employer he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on holidays on full pay. (c) Holiday pay shall not accrue during a worker's absence from his employment for any cause whatsoever. (d) Any worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall lose all rights under this clause.

Any worker placed by his employer in charge of other workers or plant shall be paid the sum of one shilling (1s.) per day in addition to the foregoing rates. Provided that this subclause shall not apply to any worker operating any machine.

Clause (20)—Piecework.

(a) An employer may make a contract with a worker or group of workers for payment by results by piecework. (b) A worker working under any system of payment by results shall be paid at least the time rate of pay apportioned if necessary. (c) Where a worker works part of a week at piecework rates and part at time rates he shall be paid so much as he is entitled to receive under piecework rates for the amount of work done, and, in addition thereto, such proportionate amount at time rates as prescribed in this Agreement for the portion of the week worked at time rates.

Clause (21)—Meal Money.

When a worker without being notified on the previous day is required to continue working after the usual knock off time for more than one (1) hour, he shall be provided with any meal required or shall be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) in lieu thereof.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 22 of 1943.

Between The Bank Officials' Association of Western Australia Union of Workers, Perth, Applicant, and The Bank of Australasia; The Union Bank of Australia, Limited; The National Bank of Australasia, Limited; The Commercial Bank of Australia, Limited; The English, Scottish and Australian Bank, Limited, Respondents.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties; and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination; and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference; and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective representatives and requested the Court to declare the said Agreement an Award: Now, therefore the Court, pursuant to section 63 of the Act and all other powers therein enabling it, hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court:—

Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note:—Wherever the word "Award" occurs herein it shall be taken to mean and include "Agreement.")

1.—Area and Scope.

This Award shall apply to the employment of persons employed in the industry of the occupation of officers, clerks, typists, messengers and employees in Banks other than cleaners, lift attendants and persons covered by separate Awards employed by the respondents in the State of Western Australia, but excepting that portion of the State within the 20th and 26th parallels of latitude and the 125th and the 129th meridians of longitude and excluding the premises and places occupied by the Bank of New South Wales and any of its branches, and the Bank of Adelaide and any of its branches.

2.—Definitions.

"Messengers" shall mean all male employees other than the clerical staff, lift attendants, watchmen, caretakers, cleaners and persons covered by separate Awards employed by the respondents in the State of Western Australia.

3.—Rates of Pay.

(ii) of the managers of any branch (excluding officers in charge of agencies or sub-branches) shall be as follows:—

1st year as manager £471 per year.
3rd and subsequent years as manager—£481 per year.

(iii) of the manager of any branch of six hands (including the manager) and upwards shall be as follows:—
1st year as such manager—£541 per year.

3rd year and subsequent years as such manager—£571 per year.

(c) Messengers:—1. Head messengers: Head messengers (metropolitan) shall be paid a wage ranging

from a minimum of £6 2s. 4d. to a maximum of £6 12s. 4d. per week, or such higher sum as the Bank may determine. Where quarters are provided the rates shall be from £5 12s. 4d. to £6 2s. 4d. per week. Advancement from the minimum shall be at the discretion of the Bank concerned.

2. Other Messengers:—Messengers (metropolitan) where covered by a State determination or Award shall be paid at the rate prescribed by such determination or Award and, where not covered by a State determination or Award, they shall be paid at the following rates:—

If during the currency of this Award the Arbitration Court of Western Australia should prescribe a basic wage generally or in any district differing in amount from that now prescribed, then such increase or decrease, as the case may be, shall be deemed to be added to or deducted from the value of the quarters, to the intent that the abovementioned rates shall remain constant: provided that, where quarters are not provided, the provision of subclause (j) shall apply.

(d) Female clerks, other than typists, engaged on or before the first day of September, 1920, may be paid the rates prescribed for female typists, but any female clerks other than typists engaged after the first day of September, 1920, are to be paid the rates prescribed for male clerks. Where, however, female clerks are employed on such work as typing, shorthand, indexing, sorting, filing, recording branch remittances, current account of tellers' cash books or slips, perusal or dealing with branch returns or the working of any mechanical appliances, they may be paid the rates prescribed for female typists.

(e) Notwithstanding the provisions of subclause (d) of clause 3, if vacancies occur in any positions, due either directly or indirectly to the absence of male officers on naval, military, or air force service, then such vacancies may be filled temporarily by the employment of female employees at female rates of pay.

(f) The minimum rate at 21 years of age for adult clerks, male and female, shall be at the male rate provided for the sixth year of service, or the basic wage, whichever is the greater, and for adult female typists at the female rate provided for the fifth year of service or the basic wage, whichever is the greater.

(g) In the case of a male officer who joins the service of a Bank when over nineteen years of age, his salary on reaching the age of twenty-eight years shall be not less than that prescribed for an officer in his twelfth year of service, and shall be increased thereafter as though he had completed eleven years' service on reaching his twenty-eighth birthday, but this provision shall not affect or prejudice the established rights of any officer who at the date of this Award was entitled to the benefit of subclause (d) of clause 1 of Industrial Agreement No. 15/1925.

(h) The rates of pay and increases in pay prescribed in clause 3 (b) shall be subject to good conduct, diligence, and efficiency. The certificate of the superintendent, general manager, or chief manager of the Bank concerned, or his deputy, shall be accepted as conclusive evidence as to this.

Whenever any salary or increment provided for by this Award shall be withheld from any officer, he shall be informed within a fortnight after the date on which it is decided to withhold such salary or increase. If such officer within one month afterwards ask in writing to be furnished with the reasons for such withholding, he shall be informed in writing of such reasons within a fortnight from the receipt at head office of the request therefor.

(i) For the purpose of determining whether a branch is or is not a "branch of six hands and upwards" every two females employed to replace each male member of the staff of the Bank in question withdrawn or on leave from a branch by reason of the continuance of a state of war between the Commonwealth of Australia and any other nation or by reason of any war-time legislation or regulation of the Commonwealth of Australia shall be counted as equivalent in number to one male. This sub-

clause shall cease to operate upon the expiration of a period of twelve calendar months after the time when the Commonwealth shall cease to be in a state of war.

(j) 1. If during the currency of this Award the Arbitration Court of Western Australia should prescribe a basic wage generally or in any district differing in amount from that now prescribed, then the marginal differences between the present basic wage and the minimum rates herein prescribed shall be deemed to be increased or decreased, as the case may be, to the same extent as the present basic wage may be decreased or increased by the said Arbitration Court as aforesaid, to the intent that the rates herein prescribed shall remain constant.

2. If during the currency of this Award the Arbitration Court of Western Australia should prescribe a basic wage generally or in any district differing in amount from that now prescribed, then those minimum rates prescribed by this Award which are equal to or less than such altered basic wage shall automatically be deemed to have been increased or decreased, as the case may be, to the intent that the rates herein prescribed shall remain constant.

(k) Except as provided by subclause (c) allowances provided by this Award are not subject to variation in accordance with fluctuations in the basic wage.

4.—Travelling Expenses.

Any employee when travelling under instructions from the Bank shall be entitled to the following travelling expenses:—

- (i) First-class fares by rail or boat and any necessary car and portage expenses, to be approved of by the Bank;
- (ii) Ten shillings (10/-) per day and five shillings (5/-) per half day but no allowance for journeys completed between ordinary meal times;
- (iii) One-third of these allowances to be paid when travelling and meals are found.

5.—Relieving Allowance.

(a) Any employee sent from the metropolitan area of Perth to relieve an employee outside the metropolitan area, or an employee sent from one country town to another to relieve an employee, and who as a consequence has to reside away from his usual home, shall be paid a minimum relieving allowance at the rate of £2 2s. 0d. per week, in the case of clerks, £2 10s. 0d. per week in the case of tellers and accountants, and £3 3s. 0d. per week in the case of managers. These allowances shall be increased to cover any further actual reasonable expenses incurred while relieving. The inspector, or if there is no inspector the Perth manager, or any officer acting in that capacity of the Bank concerned shall decide what are reasonable expenses.

6.—Hours of Duty.

(a) The ordinary hours of duty of employees, other than messengers, shall not exceed forty-two (42) hours per week, exclusive of meal hours, except at half-yearly balancing periods, when for two (2) weeks, including balancing day, the hours shall not exceed forty-eight (48) per week. Not less than forty-five (45) minutes shall be allowed for meals on all working days, except Saturday. In weeks in which statutory or proclaimed holidays are observed the ordinary weekly hours shall be reduced by seven hours thirty-six minutes for a full holiday, four hours for a half holiday, or for Saturday.

(b) The hours of duty of head messengers and messengers shall not exceed forty-four (44) hours per week exclusive of meal hours.

7.—Overtime.

(a) Subject to the provisions of subclause (e) of this clause all time worked by employees in excess of the ordinary hours of duty prescribed in clause 6 (a) and (b) shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half ordinary rates.

(b) No overtime payment need be made to an employee for time worked looking for errors in such employee's own work.

(c) Overtime payment need only be made when the overtime shall have been worked by direction of some responsible officer deputed in that behalf by the Bank.

(d) No payment for overtime need be made to any

employee whose salary is in excess of the salary prescribed for the 18th year of service or to any manager or executive officer.

(e) Except for head messengers and messengers overtime shall be computed on fortnightly periods of eighty-four hours except at half-yearly balancing times when the fortnightly period shall be ninety-six hours.

(f) Overtime for head messengers and messengers shall be computed on weekly periods of forty-four hours.

(g) Overtime shall be paid for without the employee entitled to such payment being required to make application therefor.

(h) Time employee absent through leave or sickness or while travelling to and from branches shall be computed at 7 hours 36 minutes Monday to Friday and 4 hours a half holiday or for Saturday.

8.—Sundays and Public Holidays.

Work performed at the Bank's request on Sunday, Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Good Friday, the day after Good Friday, Easter Monday and Anzac Day, shall be paid for at double rates. Work performed on other public holidays shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

9.—Meal Money.

If any employee is required to work after 6.30 p.m. on any working days other than Saturday or after 1.30 p.m. on any Saturday such employee shall be allowed the sum of two shillings and sixpence for a meal, and a further sum of two shillings and sixpence if required to work after 6.30 p.m. on any Saturday, in addition to any overtime payment to which such employee may be entitled, provided such employee shall have been unable for sufficient reason to go to such employee's usual place of abode for such meal.

10.—Annual Leave.

(a) Subject to the provisions of subclauses (c) and (e) hereof employees (other than head messengers and messengers) of up to and including 10 years' service shall receive not less than two weeks' leave of absence in respect of each full calendar year's service either during such calendar year or in the next succeeding calendar year, and those of over 10 years' service shall receive three weeks' leave of absence in respect of each full calendar year's service either during such calendar year or in the next succeeding calendar year. Head messengers and messengers shall receive two weeks' leave of absence in respect of each full calendar year's service either during such calendar year or in the next succeeding calendar year. All such leave shall be granted on full pay and shall be in addition to all gazetted Bank holidays.

(b) A calendar year shall be the period from the 1st day of January to the succeeding 31st day of December.

(c) In the event of it being found impracticable to grant leave in any calendar year such leave which is due to be taken in that calendar year shall be granted in the following calendar year provided however that a Bank shall not at any time permit more than two leave periods as defined in subclause (a) to accrue due to any of its employees.

(d) Where practicable married officers shall be given at least a fortnight's notice of the Bank's intention to send them on annual leave.

(e) Any employee joining a Bank after the 1st day of January, 1943, shall be entitled as leave in respect of that portion of the calendar year in which he or she joins the Bank to one working day's leave in respect of each full calendar month's service.

(f) If any employee voluntarily resigns his or her employment after any annual leave shall have become due, and without such annual leave having been taken, and such resignation is accepted, such employee shall be entitled in lieu thereof to a sum equal to salary computed for such annual leave at the rate of salary which he or she was earning at the date of resignation. If any employee voluntarily resigns after a period of six months or more from the date when his or her last preceding annual leave was due, such employee shall be paid pro rata for the number of days due for annual leave computed at the rate he or she was earning at the date of such resignation.

11.—Away from Home Allowance.

Any employee who is required by a Bank to live away from his or her usual home shall receive a total remuneration of not less than at the rate of £163 per year. In the absence of any arrangement to the contrary "usual home" shall be taken to be the place at which he or she is first engaged.

12.—Engagement.

(a) All employees under this Award with the exception of messengers, shall be engaged and employed by the month, except where otherwise mutually agreed to in writing between the individual Banks and their individual employees.

(b) Head messengers and messengers shall in the absence of express contract to the contrary be engaged and employed by the week.

13.—Aged and Infirm Workers.

Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum rate of wage herein prescribed may be employed at a lesser rate of wage, to be agreed upon in writing between the worker and the Secretary of the Union, or, in default of such agreement, within twenty-four hours after such worker shall have applied in writing to such secretary stating his desire that such wage be agreed upon, such wage shall be fixed by the most convenient Resident or Police Magistrate, upon the application of such worker, after twenty-four hours' notice in writing shall have been given by him to the said Secretary, who shall, if he so desires, be heard by the Magistrate upon such application. After having made application to the Secretary, and after lodging the application to the Magistrate, and pending the decision therein in either case, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed by the employer at the proposed reduced wage. The determination of the Magistrate shall have effect for six calendar months from the date thereof, and, after the expiration of the said period, until the wage shall be again fixed in the manner prescribed at the instance of the said Secretary. The Secretary may by writing under his hand appoint an agent or substitute to represent the Association at the hearing of any such application before the Magistrate.

14.—Length of Service.

For the purpose of calculating the length of service of any employee including head messenger or messenger—(a) any period of probation which shall have been served; (b) all service whether continuous or in broken periods (provided the break is not for more than twelve months) in any Bank; (c) any period for which an employee (already in the Bank's service when he or she enlisted or was called up) has been engaged during the Great War or the present War upon war service or any service with the Armed Forces or Civil Defence Works, Allied Works Council, Civil Construction Corps, or similar body; and (d) any absences on account of sickness, not exceeding twelve consecutive months in duration, or on account of annual leave, shall be included.

15.—Disputes.

In the event of any dispute arising as to any of the matters herein contained, except any question of interpretation, the matter shall be referred to a representative of the Union and a representative of the Bank concerned, and, if they are unable to come to an agreement, the matter shall be referred to the Court, which may determine the matter itself or refer to a board constituted under section 87 of the Act.

16.—Dismissal, etc.

(a) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in or implied by clause 3 hereof, an officer may, subject to sections 92 and 121 (6) of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935, be reduced for disciplinary reasons, or for inefficiency or other good cause, in which event he shall be paid such rate as may be agreed upon by the Bank concerned and the Secretary of the Union. If the Bank is unable to agree with the Secretary of the Union as to the rate to be paid in such case, the matter shall be dealt with in the manner prescribed by clause 15. This subclause (a) shall not in any way interfere with the discretionary powers referred to in clause 3 (h).

(b) Whenever an officer is dismissed, suspended, or reduced in salary, or is informed that he is disgraced, and within one month afterwards such officer asks in writing to be furnished with the reasons for such action, he shall be informed in writing of such reasons within a fortnight from the receipt at head office of the request therefor.

17.—General.

(a) Except as allowed by this Award no officer shall as a result of this Award suffer any loss of rates of pay allowance or position to which such officer is entitled under any agreement with the Bank concerned.

(b) Each Bank shall continue its established practice with regard to sick pay and mining, field and other special allowances.

(c) Banks will continue their present practice of reviewing periodically the rate of pay of officers other than those provided for by this Award.

(d) All rates of pay shall at the option of the Bank concerned be paid twice a month or fortnightly on dates most convenient to the Bank concerned.

(e) Increases in rates of pay, as provided for herein, shall at the option of the Bank concerned date either from the first pay day falling after the completed year of service or from the nearest half-yearly balance day following the completed year of service. If a Bank decides to adopt the second method set out in this subclause for fixing the date of increases and the completed year of service falls in the first three months of that Bank's half year, such increases shall date from the end of that Bank's half year preceding such completed year of service.

(f) The term "manager" when used in this Award shall be deemed to include any officer in charge of a branch office.

(g) For the purpose of this Award "branch office" and "branch" shall be deemed any branch office which is kept open for business during usual banking hours and at which cheques and bills are domiciled and/or from which drafts are issued.

(h) For the purposes of this Award an agency or sub-branch shall mean and include only such offices as shall not be kept open for business during usual banking hours on every business day and/or at which cheques and bills are not domiciled and from which drafts are not issued.

(i) Except where inconsistent with the context "officer" includes a bank officer, clerk, or typist.

18.—Operation of Award.

This Award shall take effect on and from the 1st day of November, 1943, and shall remain in force for a period of twelve months including the 31st day of October, 1944.
