INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT NO. 4 OF 1945. (Registered 16/5/45.)

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, this 15th day of May, 1945, between the Federated Clerks' Union of Australia, Industrial Union of Workers, W.A. Branch (hereinafter called the "Union") of the one part, and the Lotteries Commission of Western Australia (hereinafter referred to as the "Commission") of the other part, whereby the parties hereto mutually government. part, whereby the parties hereto mutually covenant and agree as follows:-

1.-Area and Scope.

This agreement shall apply to the clerical staff of the Lotteries Commission occupying the positions enumerated in the Salaries Schedule employed within radius of fifteen (15) miles of the G.P.O., Perth.

2.-Hours.

Thirty-eight hours shall constitute a week's work, to be worked between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Mondays to Fridays, inclusive, and from 9 a.m. and 12 noon on Saturdays.

3.—Overtime.

(a) All time worked outside the ordinary hours shall be deemed overtime and shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half. All time worked on Sundays and holidays as prescribed herein shall be paid for at double time.

(b) Only overtime duly authorised by the Secretary to the Commission prior to its being worked will be

paid for.

4.-Meal Allowance.

When a clerk is required to work after 6 p.m. any night Mondays to Fridays inclusive, and after 1 p.m. on Saturdays, he or she shall be paid 2s. for each meal, in addition to the overtime referred to above.

5.-Holidays.

The following days shall be observed as holidays and be paid for, namely:—New Year's Day, Anniversary Day, Anzac Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Foundation Day, Labour Day, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, and Show Day (after 12 noon).

6.—Annual Leave

(a) Employees shall be entitled to two weeks' leave on completion of twelve months' continuous service.

(b) Should an employee's services be terminated after one month's continuous service and before the completion of twelve months he shall be granted holiday pay in proportion to the length of service rendered.

7.-Long Service Leave.

Long service leave shall be granted in accordance with the conditions applying to Government full time wages employees current at the time such leave is granted under this Agreement: Provided, however, that should the Commission cease to exist before the accruing rights in regard to long service leave come to fruition then the Commission shall be under no liability at all in the matter of long service leave.

8.—Sick Leave.

On production of adequate medical certificate, or other evidence accepted as satisfactory by the Commission, sick leave with pay as under shall be granted:-

(a) To employees with over six months' continuous service and up to eighteen months—a total of two weeks' full pay.

(b) To employees with over eighteen months' con-

(b) To employees with over eighteen months continuous service but under three years—two weeks on full pay and two weeks on half pay.

(c) To employees with three years' continuous service and for each subsequent triennial period after the expiration of the first three years—one month on full pay.

9.—Contract of Service.

Engagement shall be terminable by one month's notice on either side, such notice to expire on the usual pay day, excepting that an employee deemed guilty of gross misconduct or neglect of duty may be instantly dismissed and shall not be entitled to any notice or payment in lieu: Provided also that during the first month's service the engagement shall be on a weakly basis a weekly basis.

10.—Reference.

On leaving the employ of the Commission, all clerks shall be given a reference setting out length of service and duties performed.

11.—Preference.

Preference of employment shall be given to members of the Federated Clerks' Union of Australia, W.A. Branch, provided that any person in the employ of the Commission who is not already a member shall become a member within fourteen days.

12.—Board of Reference.

It is agreed that a Board of Reference be appointed. Such Board shall consist of a Chairman and one representative nominated by the Commission and one representative nominated by the Union. The Chairman shall be the Industrial Registrar or some other person nominated by the Court of Arbitration.

There are assigned to such Board, in the event of disputes arising and no agreement being arrived at between the parties to this Agreement, the functions

(a) Adjusting any matters of difference which may arise out of this Agreement between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of any of the provisions of the Agreement.

(b) Deciding any other matter that the Commission may refer to the Board.

The decisions of the Board shall be recorded in writing, and such decisions shall be conclusive. A signed copy of the decisions shall be forwarded to each of the parties. The decision of the Board shall be the decision of the majority.

13 .- Under Rate Workers.

Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum rate of wage herein prescribed may be employed at a lesser rate of wage, to be agreed upon in writing between the worker and the secretary of the Union, or in default in such agreement within twenty-four hours after such worker shall have applied in writing to such secretary stating his desire that such wage be agreed upon, such wage shall be fixed by the most convenient Industrial Magistrate, upon application of such worker, after twenty-four hours' notice in writing shall have been given by him to the said secretary, who shall, if he so desires, be heard by the Magistrate upon such application.

After having made application to the secretary, and after lodging the application to the Magistrate, and pending the decision therein in either case, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed by the

employer at the proposed reduced wage.

The determination of the Magistrate shall have effect for six calendar months from the date thereof and after the expiration of the said period until the and after the expiration of the said period that the wage shall be again fixed in the manner prescribed at the instance of the said secretary.

The secretary may by writing under his hand appoint an agent or substitute to represent the Union

at the hearing of any such application before the

Magistrate.

14.-Time and Wages Record.

A record shall be kept showing the name of each worker under the Agreement, the nature of the work performed, the hours worked each day, and the amount of wages received each pay. The said record shall be open to the inspection of an accredited representative of the Union during working hours.

15.—Salaries.

Basic wage—Males £4 19s. 11d., Females £2 13s. 11d.

(a) The classifications and salaries payable shall be in accordance with the "Schedule A" annexed hereto.

(b) When an officer is not receiving the prescribed maximum, such maximum shall be reached by annual increments in accordance with the grades indicated within the salary ranges.

(c) Advancement within the prescribed ranges, however, shall in all cases be subject to the approval of the Commission and to the receipt of satisfactory reports regarding the officer's conduct, diligence and efficiency during the previous twelve

16.—Higher Duties.

When an employee is called upon to perform the duties of a position carrying a higher minimum value than his own position for a period exceeding one week, he shall be paid the difference between his own salary and the minimum of the higher position for the whole time he is acting in such position.

17.—No Reductions.

The wage of any employee who is paid at a higher rate than that prescribed at the date of this Agreement shall not be reduced solely by reason of this Agreement.

18.—Term.

This Agreement shall operate from the 14th day of May, 1945, to the 28th day of February, 1946.

19.—Cancellation of Previous Agreement.

This Agreement supersedes Industrial Agreement No. 4 of 1943, which is hereby cancelled.

INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT.

No. 5 of 1945. (Registered 23/5/45.)

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, this 7th day of May, one thousand nine hundred and forty-five, between The West thousand nine hundred and forty-five, between The West Australian Shop Assistants and Warehouse Employees' Industrial Union of Workers, Perth (hereinafter called "The Union"), of the one part, and Dalgety & Co. Ltd., Elder, Smith & Co. Ltd., The Westralian Farmers Limited, Goldsbrough Mort & Co. Ltd., Wm. Haughton & Co. Pty. Ltd. and Alan B. Rex & Co. (hereinafter called "the employers") of the other part, witnesseth that for the considerations hereinafter appearing the part is a covernment and agree the one with the other parties hereto covenant and agree the one with the other as follows:-

Wool Store Section.

1.—Definitions.

(1) "Casual hand" shall mean a worker engaged by the hour and who may be put off or leave his employer's service at any moment without notice: Provided that-(a) a casual hand shall be employed for not less than

four (4) hours in any one day;
(b) where a casual hand is dismissed, the wages due to him shall be paid in cash on the termination of his employment, but where a casual hand is dismissed for cause, the wages due to him shall be paid not later than the next pay day;
(c) any worker who is taken on between the 1st

(c) any worker who is taken on between the 1st March and the 31st August, inclusive, and who is not kept on for four (4) consecutive weeks, shall be regarded as a casual hand and shall be paid the casual rate

prescribed herein.

(2) "Weekly hand" shall mean a worker engaged by the week and whose employment shall be terminable by not less than one (1) week's notice on either side: Provided that-

(a) any worker who is taken on between the 1st September and the 28th February in the following year, inclusive, shall be regarded as a casual hand and paid the rate prescribed for a casual hand;

(1)

Within the

(b) if a worker is engaged prior to the 1st September and his engagement is terminated by his employer on or before the 28th February in the following year, he shall be regarded as a casual hand and paid the rate prescribed for a casual hand from the 1st September;

(c) any worker who is in the employ of the employer prior to the 1st September and who is kept in his employment up to and including the 28th February in the following year, shall be regarded as a weekly hand and paid the rate prescribed for a weekly hand for any work performed prior to the 1st September and after the 28th February in the year following (such worker shall, however, receive five per cent. (5%) in addition to the prescribed rate for the period between the 1st September and the 28th February in the year following).

ing).

(d) casual rates shall not be paid to any worker who, being in the employ of the employer prior to the 1st September is transferred from his employer's wool store to do work in his hide and skin store, or vice versa, during the period between the 1st September and the 28th February in the year following, inclusive, unless such worker's services are terminated by his employer on or before the 28th February, in which case the worker shall be paid the prescribed casual rate only for the time he has been employed in the wool store: Provided that if the total time worked in the wool store and the hide and skin store be less than four (4) consecutive weeks, the worker shall be paid the rate prescribed for a casual hand for the work performed in both stores.

(3) "Head classer" shall mean a worker in charge of other workers who classes wool for export or packs for appraisement, auction sales or shipment and takes over country consignments.

- (4) "Assistant classer" shall mean a worker who classes for export, auction sales, appraisements or shipments, which work shall not include the work usually performed by a piece picker as defined in subclause 6 of this clause.
- (5) "Assistant storeman" shall mean a storeman in charge of a branch store separated from the main place of business, or a storeman who is working in a similar capacity in the main store under the man in charge of the wool store.
- (6) "Piece picker" shall mean a worker—(a) separating the clean from the dirty; (b) separating the large and longer staple pieces and bellies from the short; (c) taking the rough and stains from cleaner pieces and separating for colour.
- (7) "Leader of gang" shall mean a worker who is placed in supervision over other storemen, notwithstanding that he may himself be under the supervision of the head classer or man in charge. If he be so employed, he shall be paid one shilling (1s.) in addition to his ordinary wage for that day. When working overtime as leader of gang he shall be paid overtime rates as prescribed, plus threepence (3d.) per hour for being leader of gang.

2.—Hours.

Forty-four (44) hours shall constitute a week's work, to be worked between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Monday to Friday, inclusive, and between 8 a.m. and 12 o'clock noon on Saturday.

3.-Meal Hours and Meal Money.

One (1) hour shall be allowed for each meal: Provided that where the distance or any other unavoidable circumstance does not permit a worker obtaining a meal in that time he shall on notifying the employer prior to the taking of the meal period be allowed up to one and one half (1½) hours for a meal, otherwise meal hours shall be as under:—12 noon to 1 p.m., 5 p.m. to 6 p.m., 12 midnight to 1 a.m., 7 a.m. to 8 a.m.

If any worker is required to return to work after 6 p.m., Monday to Friday inclusive, or after 12 noon on Saturday, he shall be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) meal money. A worker shall also be entitled to one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) meal money, if he is required to work after 12 o'clock midnight.

Should a worker who has worked during the night up to breakfast time in the morning be required to continue working after 8 a.m., he shall be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) meal money: Provided that such payment shall not be made in the case of a worker who starts work at 7 a.m.

Meal money shall be paid to the worker not later than 5 p.m. on the day that he is required to return to work overtime.

4.—Overtime.

- (a) All time worked prior to the usual starting time or after the usual finishing time shall be paid for a overtime rates.
- (b) Overtime rates shall be:—(i) for work performed up to 10 p.m., Monday to Friday, inclusive—time and a half; (ii) for work performed after 10 p.m. and unti the starting time next day, Monday to Friday, in clusive—double time; (iii) for work performed during a meal hour, or on Saturday after 12 o'clock noon, o on Sunday, or on any of the holidays prescribed by this Agreement—double time.

5.—Smoke-ohs.

If any worker is required to work beyond 9 p.m and/or 3 a.m., he shall be allowed an interval of fifteer (15) minutes for smoke-oh.

7 .- Duties of Junior Weekly Hands.

If any junior weekly hand is called upon to do any work other than the following, namely:—Marking, branding, working lift, cleaning up, sweeping, sewing (other than sewing up), elementary classing, driving hoist, winch or stacking machine, or any light work ordered by the storeman, he shall be paid the minimum adult rate.

8.—Proportion of Junior Workers.

The number of junior workers shall not exceed the proportion of one (1) junior to every four (4) adult workers covered by this section of the Agreement.

9.—Engagement.

All labour required in the wool stores for the day shall be engaged between 7.30 a.m. and 8 a.m., but in the event of sufficient men not being available between these times, the employer shall have the right to engage other labour which may report later in the day: Provided that workers shall be entitled to payment only as from the time at which they are told to report for work.

Hide and Skin Store Section.

10.—Definitions.

(1) "Casual hand" shall mean a worker who is engaged by the hour and who may be put off or leave his employer's service at any moment without notice: Provided that-

(a) a casual hand shall be employed for not less

than four (4) hours in any one day;
(b) where a casual hand is dismissed the wages due to him shall be paid in cash on the termination of his employment, but where a casual hand is dismissed for

- cause, the wages due to him shall be paid not later than the next pay day.

 (2) "Weekly hand" shall mean a worker who is engaged by the week and whose employment shall be terminable by not less than one (1) week's notice on either side: Provided that any worker who is employed for less than four (4) consecutive weeks shall be classed as a casual hand and paid the rates prescribed for a casual hand.
- (3) "Head classer" shall mean a worker in charge of other workers and who classes skins and hides for export and packs for appraisement, auction sales, shipment, or takes over country consignments.
 (4) "Assistant classer" shall mean a worker who

assists in classing for export, packs for appraisement, auction sales, and takes over country consignments.

(5) "Head storeman" shall mean a worker in charge

- of other storemen and who also sorts skins and hides.

 (6) "Assistant storeman" shall mean a worker who assists the head storeman or takes charge of a branch store.
- (7) "Assistant storeman handling hides" shall mean
- a worker in charge of a hide store and/or hide floor.
 (8) "Skin sorter" shall mean a worker who merely sorts skins for auction sales or sorts country consignments.

11.—Hours.

Forty-four (44) hours shall constitute a week's work, to be worked between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Monday to Friday, inclusive, and between 8 a.m. and 12 noon on Saturday: Provided that the working days and starting and finishing times of workers employed at the abattoirs at Midland Junction or Fremantle shall be mutually arranged in writing between the employers and the union: Provided that the hours worked in each shift shall be continuous. Forty-four (44) hours shall also constitute a week's work at these abattoirs.

12.-Meal Hours and Meal Money.

One (1) hour shall be allowed for each meal. Meal hours shall be as under:—12 noon to 1 p.m., 5 p.m. to 6 p.m., 12 midnight to 1 a.m., 7 a.m. to 8 a.m.

If any worker is required to work after 6 p.m., Monday to Friday, inclusive, or after 12 noon on Saturday,

he shall be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) meal money. A worker shall also be entitled to one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) meal money if he is required to work after 12 o'clock midnight,

Should a worker who has worked during the night up to breakfast time in the morning be required to continue work after 8 a.m., he shall be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) meal money: Provided that such payment shall not be made in the case of a worker who starts work at 7 a.m.

Meal money shall be paid to the worker not later than 5 p.m. on the day that he is required to return to work overtime.

13.—Overtime.

(a) Except as provided in clause 11, all time worked prior to the usual starting time or after the

worked prior to the usual starting time or after the usual finishing time shall be paid for at overtime rates. (b) Overtime rates shall be:—(i) for work performed up to 10 p.m., Monday to Friday, inclusive—time and a half; (ii) for work performed after 10 p.m. and until the starting time next day, Monday to Friday, inclusive—double time; (iii) for work performed during a meal hour, or on Saturday after 12 o'clock noon, or on Sunday, or on any of the holidays prescribed by this Agreement—double time.

(b) Junior casual hands: Any junior worker employed for less than four (4) consecutive weeks shall be paid at the rate prescribed in subclause (2) (a) of this clause plus one penny half-penny (11/2d.) per hour.

15.—Duties of Junior Weekly Hands.

If any junior weekly hand is called upon to do any work other than the following, namely:-Marking, branding, working lift or hoist, cleaning up, sweeping, sewing up, handling skins, elementary classing or sorting, or any light work ordered by the storeman or head classer, he shall be paid the minimum adult rate.

The minimum adult rate shall be paid to any junior worker who is required to handle hides or wet painted

16.—Proportion of Junior Workers.

The number of junior workers shall not exceed the proportion of one (1) junior to every four (4) adult workers covered by this section of the Agreement.

17.—Changing Time.

The employer shall provide a suitable place and shall allow time for changing of clothes.

18.—Engagement.

All labour shall be employed as required by the employer.

19.—Smoke-ohs.

If any worker is required to work beyond 9 p.m. and/or 3 a.m., he shall be allowed an interval of fifteen minutes for smoke-oh.

20.—Leggings and Aprons.

The employer shall provide leggings and/or aprons, if required.

General Clauses (applicable to both Sections).

This Agreement shall be limited in its effect to that portion of the State of Western Australia known as the South-West Land Division.

22.—Term.

The currency of this Agreement shall be for three (3) years from the date hereof: Provided that, at any time after the expiration of twelve (12) months from such date, the Court may alter or amend same on the application of any party or person affected by its provisions.

23.—Holidays.

The following days, or the days observed in lieu, shall be observed as holidays and, so far as weekly workers are concerned, paid for, namely:—New Year's Day, Anniversary Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

24.—Annual Leave.

Each weekly worker, after completion of each year's continuous employment as a weekly worker, shall be entitled to one (1) week's annual leave on full pay.

Provided that a weekly worker not completing a full year's service shall be granted pay in lieu of leave after the first month in proportion as his length of service is to the full year's employment.

25.—Higher Duties.

A worker who is required to do work for which a higher rate is prescribed in this Agreement than that which he usually performs shall be entitled to payment at the higher rate whilst so employed.

26.—Time and Wages Book.

The employer shall keep and enter up, or cause to be kept and entered up, a book containing:-(a) the name of each worker to whom this Agreement applies; (b) the class of work performed by him; (c) the hours worked each day by him; (d) the wages (and overtime, if any) paid to him; (e) the ages of junior workers.

Such book shall be open to inspection by a representative of the union between the working hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

27.—Under-rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage, may be paid such lesser wage, as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the union and the employer.

- (b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.
- (e) After application has been made to the Board and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall b entitled to work for and be employed at the propose lesser rate.

28.—Pay Day.

Wages shall be paid on any one of the first five (5 days of the week: Provided that, when overtime i worked on pay day, workers shall be paid in time t enable them to leave their work by 5 p.m.

29.—Board of Reference.

The Court may appoint, for the purpose of thi

Agreement, a Board of Reference.

The Board shall consist of a chairman and two repre sentatives, one to be nominated by each of the partie. There shall be assigned to the Board, in the event o no agreement being arrived at between the parties t this Agreement, the functions of:—(a) adjusting an matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of this Agreement or any c them; (b) classifying and fixing wages, rates, and conditions for any occupation or calling not specially mentioned in the Agreement; (c) deciding any other matter that the Court many refer to the Posel from time that the Court may refer to the Board from time t time.

An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribe in the regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Ac 1912-1941, which for the purpose are embodied in the Agreement.

30.—Gong.

The employer shall provide a gong and all work sha start and finish with the gong.

31.—Travelling Time.

When a worker is required during his ordinary worl ing hours to work outside his usual place of emplo: ment, or is transferred from one job to another, th employer shall provide the necessary means of transpoor pay the worker any reasonable expenses incurred.

32.—Basic Wage Variations.

The hourly rates set out in clauses 6 (1) (b) and 1 (1) (b) are subject to adjustment in accordance wit any variations of the basic wage which may be ordere by the Court from time to time.
