IN pursuance of the provisions of section 9 of the Fisheries Act, 1905-1947, I, the Governor of the State of Western Australia, do hereby prohibit all persons

from taking any fish (except prawns, *vide* separate Proclamation) whatsoever by means of fishing nets, in any of the portions of Western Australian waters specified in the Schedule hereto, for a period of three years as from 1st January, 1949.

Schedule.

1. The waters of the Swan River and of its tributaries from the Perth Causeway upwards to the Railway Bridge at Guildford.

2. The waters of the Swan River and of its tributaries from the Middle Swan Bridge connecting the Middle Swan Road upwards to its source.

3. The waters of the Swan River and of its tributaries from a line drawn from the South-Western extremity of Point Resolution to the South-Western extremity of the Point Walter Jetty (situated at Point Walter), downwards to a line drawn from the Western extremity of the South Mole to the Western extremity of the North Mole, at Fremantle.

4. The waters of the Canning River and of its tributaries upwards to its source, from a line drawn from a point on the right bank and situate 8 chains North-Westerly from Salter Point, and extending 242 degrees 21 minutes 22 chains 3 6/10th links across the said river, the extremities of such line being marked on the ground with steel rails.

5. All that area of Western Australian waters bounded by a line drawn 150 chains due West from the Southern extremity of the Fish Market breakwater at Fremantle; thence 50 chains due North; thence in an Easterly direction to Rous Head.

6. All that area of Western Australian waters from the Southerly extremity of Mudurup Rocks (South of Cottesloe Jetty) and extending in a Northerly direction to the South-Western extremity of North Street, Cottesloe, with a width of a quarter of a mile from the foreshore.

Land Company's Location 401 and extending generally Northerly, North-Easterly and Southerly along the District boundary to the North-Western side of road No. 8395 near Mettler Lake, thence generally South-Westerly along that side passing through reserves 814 and 813 to join a surveyed road at the 18-Mile post; thence continuing generally South-Westerly along the North-Western side of that road to the Southermost boundary of Plantagenet Location 2222; thence Westerly along that boundary and to and along the Southern boundaries of locations 2391 and 3338 to the North-Eastern corner of location 4589; thence Southerly along the Eastern boundary of that location to a point situate in prolongation Easterly of the Northern boundary of location 3111; thence Westerly and Southerly to and along boundaries of that location to the Northern boundary of late W.A. Land Company's Location 401; thence Westerly along that boundary to join the Eastern boundary of the King Ward; and thence Westerly and Northerly along boundaries of that Ward to the starting point. (One member.)

Warring Ward.

All that portion of the District bounded by lines starting from the intersection of the Southern boundary of the Napier Ward with the Eastern boundary of the King Ward, and extending generally Easterly and generally North-Easterly along the Southern and South-Eastern boundaries of the Napier Ward to the District boundary; thence generally Southerly and generally South-Westerly along the District boundaries to the South-Easternmost corner of late W.A. Land Company's Location 416; thence Northerly and Westerly along boundaries of that location to the Eastern boundary of Plantagenet Location 2113; thence Southerly and Westerly along boundaries of that location and continuing Westerly along the Northern boundaries of locations 3078, 1968 and 5 crossing the Kalgan River to the South-Eastern corner of location 4; thence generally South-Westerly along boundaries of locations 4 and 3 (the right bank of the Kalgan River) to the latter's South-

ernmost boundary; thence Westerly along that boundary; thence Southerly along boundaries of locations 469 and 241; thence Westerly along part of the Northern boundary of location 21 to join the Eastern boundary of the King Ward; and thence generally Westerly and Northerly along boundaries of that ward to the starting point. (One member.)

Lower Kalgan Ward.

All that portion of the District bounded on the Northward by part of the Southern boundaries of the Warriup Ward; on the Eastward, Southward and South-Westward by part of the District boundaries; and on the Westward by part of the Eastern boundaries of the Suburban and King Wards. (One member.)

THE ROAD DISTRICTS ACT, 1919-1947.

Collie Road Board—Building By-laws.

P.W. 712/28.

WHEREAS by the Road Districts Act, 1919-1947, the Road Board of any District is empowered to make by-laws for all or any of the purposes mentioned in the said Act; And whereas the Collie Road Board, in pursuance of the powers vested in the said Board, under and by virtue of the said Act and of every other authority enabling it in that behalf, doth hereby make and publish the following by-laws:—

Buildings.

Application.

These by-laws shall apply to all townsites within the Collie Road District.

Commencement.

These by-laws shall commence operation immediately upon confirmation and approval by the Governor and publication in the *Government Gazette*.

Interpretation.

“Act” means the Road Districts Act, 1919-1947.

“Basement” means a storey or a portion of a storey partly below the level of the ground, the ceiling of which is not less than five feet above the adjoining ground (irrespective of any excavation made to comply with these by-laws).

“Board” means the Collie Road Board.

“Build” means and includes erect, build, or construct or cause to be erected, built, or constructed.

“Building” means and includes erection, structure, detached room, outbuilding, hoarding, and every structure of whatever kind capable of affording protection or shelter, either roofed or intended or adapted to be roofed, and whether enclosed by a roof or not, and every part of such structure and any addition or alteration thereto.

“Cellar” means a storey or portion of a storey below the ground level, the ceiling of which is less than five feet above the adjoining ground.

“Cement mortar” means a mortar composed of one part of cement to three or fewer than three parts of sand.

“Commercial buildings” means a building used or constructed or adapted to be used wholly or in part for commercial purposes.

“Dwelling-house” means a building used, constructed, or adapted to be used wholly or in part for human habitation, but does not include other than dwelling-house portion (if any) of a commercial building.

“Habitable room” means any living room, and includes all rooms intended or adapted to be used for the purpose of sleeping or eating or the cooking of food.

“Surveyor” means the person appointed by the Board for the time being as building surveyor or acting building surveyor for the Collie Road Board.

“Wall.”

“Divisional wall” means a wall (other than an external or party wall) which subdivides any floor or building and which carries any load in addition to its dead weight.

“External wall” means an outer wall of a building, not being a party wall, even though adjoining a wall of another building.

“Partition wall” means a wall subdividing any floor and not carrying any load other than its dead weight.

“Flat” means a room or suite or rooms occupied or designed, intended or adapted to be occupied as a separate domicile, or rented or let as such.

“Residential flat building” means a building containing two or more flats, but does not include a row of two or more dwellings attached to each other, such as are commonly known as semi-detached or terrace buildings.

“Hoarding” includes any erection or structure erected, built, constructed, or used or that may be used for the purpose of writing, painting, pasting, or posting thereon notices, advertisements, placards, or other printed, painted, or written matter, or any erection or structure being of a height greater than six feet from the level of the adjoining street, but shall not apply to a hoarding erected in a street for the purpose of carrying on building operations only, or to any dwelling-house or shop, or any fence seven feet or under in height, or “To Let” or “For Sale” boards not exceeding 20 square feet in area.

By-law No. 1.—Applications, Plans, and Notices.

(a) Any person intending to erect any building or alter or add to any building shall, before commencing to erect, alter, or add to the same, make application in the form prescribed in Schedule A of these by-laws and deposit with the Board two copies of the plans and specifications of such proposed building, addition or alteration. One copy of such plans and specifications shall remain in the office of the Board as a permanent record:

Provided that the Board may if it sees fit dispense with the necessity for the submission of plans and specifications and reduce or dispense with the payment of a fee with an application for approval to make minor alterations in an existing building:

Provided that any building (other than a verandah or aviary) used or intended to be used for the keeping of domestic animals shall be wholly detached from any dwelling-house:

Provided also that where it is desired to make some minor alterations to a building not materially affecting its stability, lighting, ventilation, or the size of rooms, the application may in the first place be made without submitting plans or specifications, which shall however be submitted if the Board so requires.

(b) All plans shall be in ink on drawing paper, tracing cloth, or sunprint of at least 15in. x 22in. in size, and specifications shall be typewriting or ink manuscript, clearly written, and on strong paper.

The Board will accept plans properly drawn on paper obtainable at the office of the Board, or, alternately, an architect's plan, subject to the provisions of the by-laws.

(c) The plans shall consist of a general plan and elevation and a locality plan.

(d) The general plan shall be drawn to a scale of 8 feet to 1 inch (or any larger scale).

(e) The locality plan shall be drawn to a scale of 20 feet to 1 inch (or any larger scale) on the same sheet as the general plan or on a separate sheet.

(f) The locality plan shall show the relation of the buildings to the boundary of the site and to the other buildings or structures thereon.

(g) The specifications shall describe the construction and materials of which the building is to be built, and the method of drainage, sewerage, and water supply, and state whether the material will be new or second-hand, and, if second-hand materials are to be used, shall give particulars.

(h) All plans and specifications must be signed by the building owner or his duly authorised agent.

(i) When giving approval the Board shall impose a condition that forty-eight hours' notice shall be given prior to the covering of any or all of the following works, in order that they may be inspected, that is to say—trenches before foundations are laid, foundations before trenches are filled in, and drains before they are filled in.

By-law No. 2.—Fees and Permits.

No person shall commence any building, erection, or structure, or any alteration or addition to any building, erection, or structure, without first having obtained from the surveyor a building permit in the form prescribed in Schedule B of these by-laws, and without first having paid to the Board the fees set forth herein,

Each building, erection, or structure must be completed within the undermentioned specified time from the date of issue by the Board of the permit therefor:—

- (a) Brick, stone or concrete—six months.
- (b) All other buildings—three months.

Fees calculated according to the following scale shall be paid by the owner or builder to the Board in respect of all buildings to be erected or altered, or any matter required or permitted under these by-laws, Health Act, or Road Districts Act:—

(1) For a license for a new building—	s. d.
Where the building with its appurtenances has a total floor area not exceeding 400 square feet	5 0
For every additional 200 square feet or part thereof	2 6
(2) For alterations or additions to an existing building—	
Where the cost of alteration does not exceed £50	2 6
For every additional £100 or part thereof	2 6

By-law No. 3.—General Provisions.

(a) Every building shall be provided with one or more proper manholes in the ceiling, so as to give access for electrical or other fittings.

(b) Every dwelling-house shall be provided with a water storage capacity of at least 1,000 gallons, properly connected up with gutters of roof or a suitable water supply approved by the Board.

By-law No. 4.—Site—Healthiness of.

(a) Every person who shall erect a building shall cause the subsoil of the site of such building to be effectually drained, wherever in the opinion of the Board the dampness of the site renders such a precaution necessary.

(b) If the Board so direct in any particular case the whole part of the ground surface or site of the dwelling shall be covered with a layer of good cement concrete or tared metal, rammed solid, and at least four inches thick.

(c) The Board may refuse or postpone approval to build upon a site which is unhealthy by reason of its liability to dampness, unless and until the site has been rendered dry, sound, and well drained to the satisfaction of the Board.

By-law No. 5.—Position of Buildings on Site.

(a) No building which is intended to be used, or which shall be used as a dwelling-house, and no addition to any such building, shall be built, constructed, or erected within a distance of 25 feet, measured horizontally, from the building line of the street or road the building is intended to or shall front.

Except as hereinafter provided, no building which is intended to be used or which shall be used as a dwelling-house, and no addition to any building which is intended to be used or which shall be used as a dwelling-house, shall be built, constructed, or erected—if of wood, within a distance of four feet six inches; if of brick, stone, concrete or cement blocks within a distance of three feet, measured horizontally, off any street, road, lane, or right-of-way and the side of any such building.

(b) Not more than one building intended to be used as a dwelling shall be erected on any one allotment.

(c) The Board may at any time by resolution waive any of the provisions or restrictions of this by-law, where the levels of the allotment or other exceptional conditions of the site make it necessary or expedient to do so in respect of any building or part of a building.

By-law No. 6.—Access to Rear.

Where there is no public or convenient access to the rear of the site of any building for the removal of night-soil, the building shall be so designed as to leave outside the building a way of access, at least four feet wide, from the public road to the privy closet, and for the removal of garbage and refuse.

By-law No. 7.—Outbuildings.

In case of an application to erect (as appurtenant to any building) any outbuilding from the use of which unpleasant noises, unpleasant odours, or unusual risk of fire may reasonably be expected to rise, the Board may determine in which position upon the allotment such outbuilding may be erected.

By-law No. 8.—Materials and Workmanship.

Materials which have been used in the construction of any cesspit, drain, or sewer, or which for any other reason are dangerous to health, shall not be used in the erection of any buildings. Faulty or unsuitable materials shall not be used in any building.

Every part of a building shall be erected and finished off in a good and workmanlike manner.

Bricks used in any building shall be good, hard, and well burnt, and, if old or second-hand, shall be thoroughly cleaned and approved by the Board in writing before being used.

All brick or stone chimneys shall be constructed of ample flue, to be well plastered or pargetted inside for the full height, and no timber of any description shall be allowed to be built in the brickwork. The Board may give authority to build iron chimneys, but in erection they shall be laid on either stone or concrete base, and lined three feet high with brickwork, and free from all woodwork.

Hearths of stone, brick, or cement, of approved dimensions, shall be placed in front of all fireplaces.

By-law No. 9.—Testing Materials.

The Board may test any building materials, and prohibit the use of such materials as are proved unfitted for the purpose for which they are intended to be used.

By-law No. 10.—Timber Construction.

All timbers used in any buildings are to be perfectly sound, free from rot, shakes, large or loose knots, or any other imperfection whereby the strength may be impaired.

The following conditions shall apply as to the spacings and scantlings of timber:—

(1) Stumps shall not be used less than 4in. x 4in. jarrah or other approved timber, spaced 5ft. centre to centre and fixed on 6in x 6in. x 1½in sole plates.

Stumps shall be tarred and sunk at least half their exposed length in the ground; provided that no stump shall be less than 18in. in the ground. Tarring is to extend for 6in. above the ground surface. Ant stops are to be provided projecting at least 2in. over the stumps.

(2) Studs and ceiling joists shall not be less than 3in. x 2in. spaced not more than 2ft. apart, centre to centre, properly braced and secured.

Where studs of 3in. x 2in. are used, the angle or corner studs shall be 3in. x 3in.; where 4in. x 2in. studs are used the angle studs shall be 4in. x 4in.

(3) Rafters shall not be less than 3in. x 2in.; spaced not more than 2ft. 6in., centre to centre, in case of iron roofs, and 18in., centre to centre, in case of slate, tile, or other similar roofs.

Rafters of 4in. x 2in. shall be spaced not more than 3ft., centre to centre, in the case of iron roofs, and 2ft., centre to centre, in the case of slate, tile, or other similar roofs.

When rafter exceeds 12ft. in length, an under purlin of 3in. x 2in. shall be required, placed underneath rafters and strutted to wall plates. All rafters must be securely braced with purlins and collar ties.

(4) Floor joists shall not be less than 4in. x 2in., spaced 18in. apart, centre to centre.

(5) Floor bearers shall not be less than 4in. x 3in., spaced not more than 5ft. apart.

In addition to the bearers required for the spacing, an additional bearer of 4in. x 3in. must be placed under each partition. No framing timber in any building shall be notched or checked out to receive bracing or otherwise so as to reduce its cross-sectional area more than one-sixth.

By-law No. 11.—Awnings and Verandahs.

Any or all awnings or verandahs proposed to be erected over a public space shall be of the cantilever type, to an approved design.

By-law No. 12.—Footings.

Every person who shall erect a building of brick, stone or the like shall construct every wall of such building, unless built upon a hard rock foundation, to rest upon proper footings, or upon a sufficient beam. He shall cause the projection of the bottom of the footings on each side of such wall to be at least equal to one-half the thickness of the wall at its base, unless an adjoining wall interferes, or unless the wall is upon the boundary of the land, in which case the projection may be omitted on the side of the boundary, or where the wall adjoins.

He shall also cause the diminution of the footings to be in regular offsets, unless the footings be of concrete.

The height from the bottom of such footings to the base of the wall shall be at least equal to two-thirds of the thickness of the wall at its base: Provided that, when the footings are of reinforced concrete the Board may permit the height to be less, and, provided further, that it shall not in any case be less than twelve inches.

Footings to the wall of brick in cement mortar (3 to 1) shall be the same width and height as those to walls of the same thickness and not built in cement mortar.

Vermin plates shall be provided to all walls other than brick, stone, or concrete.

By-law No. 13.—Damp Course.

Every person who shall erect a building shall provide and insert damp-proof courses of lead, slate bedded in cement, or natural asphalt: Provided that the Board may permit the omission of damp-proof courses from closets, outbuildings, or like structures.

Where material which is not slate, natural asphalt, or lead of a minimum weight of two pounds per square foot under walls not exceeding 40ft. in height, or three pounds per square foot for walls exceeding 40ft. in height is desired to be used, the applicant shall submit to the Board evidence that the material to be used has been approved of by the Board of Health, or failing such evidence, that the material is a good and effective damp-proof course.

Damp-proof courses shall be inserted in walls to their full width and in such manner that there shall be no open spaces, cracks, or gaps in the damp-proof courses along the full length of the walls; or

Damp-proof courses shall be inserted in walls in such positions and in such manner that—

(a) moisture from the earth shall be prevented from reaching the lowest floor timbers, or the walls above the underside of the lowest floor joists, or, where solid floors are laid, shall be prevented from reaching higher than $3\frac{1}{2}$ in. above such floors;

(b) where floors are below ground level, moisture shall be prevented from reaching inner face of outer walls;

(c) where cavity walls are used, moisture penetrating outer portion of walls shall be prevented from reaching the floor timbers, or the inner portion of the face of all walls above the underside of lowest floor timbers, or, where solid floors are laid, shall be prevented from reaching higher than $3\frac{1}{2}$ in. above such floors;

(d) moisture penetrating the chimney, parapet, or other walls above the roof shall be prevented from reaching any part of the inner walls or the inner portion of inner face of outside walls below the upper-side of the ceiling joists in either case;

(e) moisture penetrating the outer portions of cavity walls shall be prevented from reaching the inner portion of inner face of such walls above or about window, door, and other frames or openings. In cavity walls the cavity shall extend not less than $4\frac{1}{2}$ in. below damp-proof course.

This clause shall apply to all walls constructed of brick, stone, or concrete, and to walls of any material readily permeable by water.

By-law No. 14.—External Walls—Structure.

(a) Every person who shall erect a building shall cause the external walls thereof to be constructed of brick, stone, concrete, timber, or other material approved by the Board.

(b) If built of brick, stone, concrete or the like the external walls shall, except where herein provided to the contrary, be not less than nine inches in thickness:

Provided that the walls of sheds, laundries, outhouses and the like may, if the Board permit, be of $4\frac{1}{2}$ in in thickness for walls not exceeding 8ft. in height and 6in. for walls not exceeding 10ft. in height.

(c) Cavity walls may be built, provided that the two sections are securely tied together by a sufficient number of wire ties or other effective method, and, when used, the combined thickness of inner and outer part shall be deemed to be the thickness of the wall.

(d) Bottoms of all cavities shall be carefully raked out before the completion of the building, and all ties kept free from all mortar droppings.

(e) Where cavity walls are used, weep-holes shall be left at the foot of cavity not more than 6ft. apart and over all damp-proof courses inserted to protect walls weep-holes shall be left not more than 3ft. apart.

(f) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this by-law, the Board may permit the erection of dwellings not more than two storeys in height on concrete with walls of less than the prescribed thickness, if satisfied that such proposed buildings will be hygienic and structurally sound.

By-law No. 15.—Party Walls.

Two, but not more, residences may be erected together on one block: Provided that they shall be separated from each other by a wall of concrete or of brick or stone at least 6in. in thickness, properly reinforced to the satisfaction of the surveyor, projecting, in the case of a wooden house, at least 1in. through the woodwork front and back, and in all cases projecting 1ft. 6in. at least through the roof covering or gutter adjoining the same, whether belonging to the same owner or not. Each building or dwelling-house on a block shall be subject to the provisions of the by-laws applicable to its class, save that the site or curtilage of each of such buildings shall have a superficial area of at least 4,000 square feet and a frontage of at least 33 lineal feet to a street or road.

By-law No. 16.—Rooms—Size, Cubic Space.

Every person who shall erect a building shall provide that—

(a) The areas of the floor of all the habitable rooms in such building shall, taken together, average not less than 120 square feet per habitable room;

(b) a habitable room shall not in any case have a floor area of less than 80 square feet, and;

(c) a habitable room shall not in any case have a cubic space of less than 800 cubic feet; provided that, in each dwelling-house and in each flat of a residential flat building, there shall be at least one habitable room, the cubic space of which shall not be less than 1,296 cubic feet;

(d) no main room in any building shall be less than 10ft. in height from floor to ceiling;

(e) where a skillion is erected, height at lowest side shall not be less than eight feet;

(f) all shops shall have a clear space of 12ft. 6in. from floor to ceiling.

By-law No. 17.—Lighting and Ventilation—Under Floors.

For the purpose of ventilation, every building shall be so erected that there shall be between the underside of every joist upon which the lowest floor of such building is laid and the ground surface or upper surface of the asphalt or concrete with which the ground or site of the building may be covered, a clear space of 12in. at least in every part, and such space shall be thoroughly ventilated and cross-ventilated by means of suitable and sufficient air bricks or other effectual method: Provided that, where the lowest floor is so constructed (by filling with concrete, asphalt, or other approved material) as not to permit the harbouring of rats, this provision shall not apply.

By-law No. 18.—Air Bricks, Louvres, etc.

Every room of a building shall be so constructed that for every 1,000 cubic feet or part thereof of air space in the room there shall be 24 square inches at least of unobstructed ventilation to the outer air by means of air bricks situated at or near the level of the ceiling or any other efficient means.

By-law No. 19.—Rooms, Windows.

Every habitable room or room or alcove in which food is intended or likely to be stored or prepared, and every bathroom, enclosed laundry, and privy closet shall have at least one vertical window opening directly to the outside air. One half at least of such window shall be constructed to open to its full extent and so that the opening shall extend to the top of the window: Provided that in a pantry any other system of ventilation may be substituted for windows, if the Board be satisfied that such system is equally efficient.

By-law No. 20.—Size of Windows.

The window or windows of any room shall have a superficial area clear of the sash frame of not less than one-tenth of the floor area of the room.

By-law No. 21.—Laundries and Kitchens.

A dwelling of any kind shall not be erected with the kitchen and laundry combined in the one room.

By-law No. 22.—Windows.

Any window the top of which is more than 12ft. above either the ground of an external flat surface, or slightly sloping roof sufficient for safety, shall be so constructed that it can be cleaned from the interior of the building.

By-law No. 23.—Drainage Levels.

(a) Every person who shall erect a building shall construct the lowest storey of such building at such a level that in the opinion of the Board it may be practicable to construct a drain sufficient for the effectual drainage of such building.

(b) No person shall build or erect, or cause or permit to be built or erected, any building, erection, or tent on any land unless the Board is satisfied that the proposed building can be properly drained, and the Board may refuse permission to build or erect any building, erection, or tent, or addition unless and until it is satisfied that the proposed building, erection, tent, or addition, and the site and curtilage can be properly drained.

(c) No water is to be discharged on to the surface of any footpath.

(d) The plans for a building shall include provision for carrying off rainwater from the roof thereof without causing dampness in the walls or foundations.

By-law No. 24.—Miscellaneous.

The Board may permit the enclosure and use of any public place in connection with the building or taking down of a building, or the alteration or the repair of a building.

By-law No. 25.—Skylights.

The Board may order the alteration or repair or both of any skylight in any building, if such skylight be in the opinion of the Board in such condition as to be detrimental to health or dangerous.

By-law No. 26.—Existing Buildings.

If in the opinion of the Board any building has been allowed to fall into an unsafe or an insanitary condition, either by faulty construction or any other cause, the Board may give notice in writing to the owner or occupier to repair said building, and, in the event of no action being taken within seven days by the said owner or occupier to repair said building and remedy any defect complained of in the said notice, the said owner or occupier shall be liable to a fine, as hereinafter provided, until such time as the building shall be placed in a safe and sanitary condition, and the owner or occupier shall be liable for all charges incurred in doing the necessary works, and, moreover, if in the opinion of the Board any building does not warrant the expense of repairing, the owner, after receiving notice, shall remove the building within seven days failing this he will be liable to a fine, as hereinafter mentioned, for not removing building after receiving notice. The Board may remove same and charge the owners with the cost of so doing, and recover the same in any court of competent jurisdiction, and/or sell the material to cover the cost of taking down.

By-law No. 27.—Signboard, Hanging Lamp, etc.

No signboard, hanging lamp, or other fixture shall be erected on or attached to any building or verandah projecting over any road unless the permission in writing of the Board be first obtained. Each such signboard, hanging lamp, or other fixture shall be of material, construction, and design approved by the surveyor, and shall be in no part less than 8ft. 6in. above the level of the footpath or road.

By-law No. 28.—Removal of Buildings.

No building or erection shall be removed into and erected or re-erected in the Road District, or removed from one part of the district to and erected or re-erected in another part thereof, unless the owner or person carrying out the removal first obtain written permission from the Board to do so. Before such permission shall be granted, not less than seven clear days' notice in writing shall be given to the Board or surveyor of the desire to remove and erect or re-erect such building or erection, such notice shall contain or be accompanied by the following:—

(a) Particulars of the situation of building at which it is proposed to remove.

(b) Particulars of the situation of and plan of the land upon which it is proposed to erect or re-erect or place such building thereon, and a tracing copy of such plan, to be retained by the Board.

(c) A plan giving the dimensions of the building, and any proposed alterations or additions thereto, and a tracing copy of such plan, to be retained by the Board.

(d) A specification giving the particulars of the construction of the existing building, and of the alterations and additions (if any) which it is intended to make when the building is erected or re-erected.

(e) Evidence satisfactory to the Board that such house has not been condemned as dilapidated, insanitary, or unfit for human habitation, and a certificate from the health officer of the road district from which the building is proposed to be removed that, within a reasonable time prior to the date of removal, no case of disease of an infectious or contagious nature has occurred therein.

(f) Such further particulars in writing regarding the same as shall be sufficient to enable the Board or its surveyor to determine if all the provisions of any Act of Parliament, by-law or regulation applicable thereto are or will be complied with.

No written permission shall be given unless such removed building, when erected or re-erected, shall comply with the provisions of the by-law as applicable to new buildings. No building or erection that has been condemned as dilapidated, insanitary, or unfit for human habitation shall be removed into or re-erected within the district. No removed building shall be occupied until the surveyor shall have certified in writing that all of the provisions of the by-law have been observed and complied with in respect to such building. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the alteration of the position of any building within the boundaries of the land on which the same stands: Provided that, in its altered position, it shall comply in all respects with this by-law, and in the progress of such removal the building be not taken on to any street, road or public place.

By-law No. 29.—Proportion of Site which may be Covered.

At least one-half of the area of any allotment on which a dwelling-house is erected shall be left open and unbuilt upon and for the exclusive use of the occupiers of the buildings erected upon such allotment.

At least one-third of the area of any allotment on which a commercial building is erected shall be left open and unbuilt on, and for the exclusive use of the occupiers of the buildings erected upon such allotment.

After the adoption of this by-law, all subdivisions or re-subdivisions of allotments must be such as to have a frontage to a street or road of not less than 66 lineal feet and a depth of not less than 165 lineal feet, or with such measurements, to equal one quarter of an acre in area. Such subdivisions or re-subdivisions must be lodged with the Board for approval before commencing to build. A shop shall not be built on land having a frontage of less than 18ft. to a street or road and an average depth of 130ft.; there shall be back access from right-of-way 10ft. at least.

Permission may be given for the erection of a shop where a dwelling is not attached, and where no person resides at such shop, on land having a frontage of 18ft. to a road and a depth of not less than 50ft. and a superficial area of not less than 900 square feet: Provided that no portion of such shop or building shall be erected within 15ft. of the rear boundary of such land, and only if the Board shall approve of the site of the proposed building.

For the purpose of this by-law the Board may agree to a subdivision with frontage less than 66ft., but notwithstanding any such approval, no dwelling shall be erected upon the subdivided land except in accordance with these by-laws. No land upon which any dwelling-house has been erected shall hereafter be reduced in area below the minimum area prescribed in this by-law. Provided always, that notwithstanding anything hereinbefore provided to the contrary, the Board may, on application in writing setting forth the grounds of the application, under special circumstances, and for special causes, and at a meeting of which due notice has been given to each member, declare that the provisions of the by-law, either in whole or in part, shall not apply to any particular area of land.

No building shall be erected in such a position that it shall lie between another building or any part thereof and street, unless such other building has a direct and unobstructed access to some other street at least 16ft. wide.

By-law No. 30.—Space Outside Windows on Side Land.

If there be any side wall of a dwelling-house in which it is proposed to provide a window or door opening, that wall shall be setback (throughout its whole length) from the side line of the allotment to a distance of 3ft. in the case of a dwelling-house of one or two storeys, or to a distance of 5ft. in the case of a dwelling of more than two storeys.

By-law No. 31.—Kitchen, Laundry and Bathroom Fittings.

Every dwelling-house shall be provided with a completely enclosed bathroom, or a combined bathroom and laundry, and with wash-tubs and copper or other means of washing clothes, and the water laid thereto. The floor surfaces of the bathroom on any floor, and of laundries, when above the ground floor, shall be of impervious material, properly graded and drained. The wash-tubs, copper, and bath shall not be placed in the kitchen. One bathroom in each dwelling-house shall have at least 30 square feet of floor area: Provided that the Board may in any case where it considers that a bathroom and laundry could be dispensed with, exempt any building from the above provision; but such exemption shall be given by resolution of the Board.

By-law No. 32.—Inspection Before Occupation.

Before permitting any person to use or occupy any uncompleted building, and forthwith upon completion of any unoccupied building, the person by or in consequence of whose order the building is being erected shall give notice to the Board. Forthwith upon receipt of notice as aforesaid, the Board shall instruct the building surveyor to make an inspection, and such surveyor shall inspect and report to the Board whether or not the building has been erected in accordance with these by-laws and without material deviation from the approved plan and specifications, but this shall not be read to

permit any alterations whatever in the position of the building on the site. Such report shall not be deemed to be evidence (in the event of any prosecution hereunder) that these by-laws are being complied with.

By-law No. 33.—Penalties.

Any person who erects a building in contravention of these by-laws or any person who neglects to comply with any provision set forth herein, shall on conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds (£10).

 108. The driver of any vehicle and the rider of any cycle or animal, when driving or riding, as the case may be, into or across any other road, shall slow down and take all necessary precautions to ensure that such road is sufficiently clear from traffic to allow him to enter with safety into or across such road.
3. Regulation 118A is amended by deleting from lines 11 and 12 of paragraph 2 thereof, the words "he has satisfied himself from his view thereof, and of the traffic thereon, that".
4. Regulation 123 is deleted and a new regulation inserted in lieu thereof as follows:—

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF
WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 62 of 1947.

Between The West Australian Locomotive Engine Drivers', Firemen's and Cleaners' Union of Workers, Applicant, and The Commissioner of Railways, for the State of Western Australia, Respondent.

The Court of Arbitration of Western Australia doth hereby make the following Award in connection with the industrial dispute between the abovesaid parties:—

Award.

1.—Term of Award.

This Award shall remain in force for three (3) years. That portion of the Award the subject of Interim Award dated the 11th day of May, 1948, shall be deemed to operate as from the said 11th day of May, 1948, aforesaid, and the balance shall operate from the 2nd day of January, 1949. At any time after the expiration of the first twelve (12) months from either commencing date aforesaid either party shall have the right to approach the Court of Arbitration to amend or vary the appropriate portion of this Award.

2.—Area and Scope of Award.

This Award shall apply only to workers employed by the Commissioner in and about the working of the State Railways, and, subject to necessary adjustments to be agreed upon between the Commissioner and the Union, to any other railway over which the Commissioner may work traffic under an agreement giving him running powers: Provided that, in the event of the parties being unable to arrive at an agreement, the matter may be referred to the Court for decision.

If electric or other power is installed as a substitute for steam haulage, members of the Union shall be employed to operate under the new power.

3.—Interpretation.

“Worker” means a member of the Union employed as driver, fireman, cleaner, washout-man, washout-man's assistant, packer, or trimmer.

“Attended barracks” means any building attended to by a whole or part-time caretaker appointed for that purpose, which is provided with bed, clean bedding, cooking utensils, and light, and lighting facilities, water and fuel. This shall include a van used to supplement the building accommodation, when such is not sufficient to accommodate the workers.

“Unattended barracks” means any van used as a barracks provided with the accommodation mentioned in the previous definition, and any building which, whilst provided with the accommodation mentioned therein is wholly unattended.

“Main depot” means a depot where six (6) or more locomotives are stationed.

“Married man” includes a single man who has a parent or child solely dependent on him and resident in the State of Western Australia, but does not include a married man whose wife and family are neither resident with nor dependent upon him.

“The Union” means The West Australian Locomotive Engine Drivers', Firemen's and Cleaners' Industrial Union of Workers.

“Suburban area” means Fremantle to Bellevue; East Perth to Maddington, and Kalgoorlie-Kamballie, if sub-urban train service exists.

4.—Promotion.

Promotion from cleaner to fireman and from fireman to driver shall be made—(a) automatically by reason of acting work, in accordance with the next succeeding clause; and (b) independently of acting work, as vacancies arise, according to seniority combined with proficiency and good conduct; provided that the necessary examinations have been passed.

5.—Acting Work.

(1) (a) A fireman or cleaner who has acted in the capacity of a driver or fireman, respectively, for three hundred and thirteen (313) days shall be appointed to the higher grade, and the date of such appointment shall, notwithstanding subsequent regression, be taken for the purpose of determining when advancements from class to class become due. To ascertain the number of days acting work performed by a worker, all acting work heretofore or hereafter shall be counted, and the total number of hours worked by him in the higher capacity up to 31st December, 1925, shall be divided by eight (8). From 1st January, 1926, to 3rd January, 1948, the total number of hours to be divided by seven and one-third (7 1/3rd) and from 4th January, 1948, the total number of hours to be divided by six and two-thirds (6 2/3rds).

(b) For the purpose of promotion all time worked on Sundays by locomotive drivers and firemen over and above the ordinary timetable trains shall be calculated as acting work.

(2) For the purpose of maintaining the present order of seniority amongst the workers, the following provisions shall obtain:—(a) The Commissioner shall, as far as practicable, arrange that firemen and cleaners shall have the benefit of acting work, according to seniority, and to that end shall transfer them from one depot to another, as may be necessary.

(b) Subject as hereinafter provided, when a fireman or cleaner has qualified by acting work and is appointed to a higher grade under subclause (1) of this clause, each fireman or cleaner, as the case may be, above him on the classification shall be deemed to have similarly qualified, and shall also be appointed to the higher grade: Provided, however, that the foregoing provision shall not apply to any fireman or cleaner who, during the preceding twelve (12) months, has lost the opportunity of himself getting the benefit of acting work by reason of his failure to accept a transfer from one depot to another.

(3) A driver or fireman may, when traffic conditions so require, be temporarily employed as fireman or cleaner respectively, but whilst acting in the lower grade shall be paid the rate which he was receiving as driver or fireman respectively.

(4) A review of the work performed in advanced capacity during the previous three (3) months shall be made after the close of the last period in the months of March, June, September, and December. Any adjustment of the staff to date from the fifteenth day after the close of each review period.

(5) When the average of all the advanced capacity work performed is found to be more than equal to full time for twenty (20) firemen as drivers and/or forty (40) cleaners as firemen during the quarter ending March, and more than equal to fifteen (15) firemen as drivers and/or thirty (30) cleaners as firemen during the quarters ending June, September, and December, cleaners or firemen equal to the number in excess of that specified shall be promoted to firemen and drivers respectively.

(6) When the average of all the advanced capacity work performed is found to be less than equal to full time for twenty (20) firemen as drivers and/or forty (40) cleaners as firemen during the quarter ending March, and less than equal to full time for fifteen (15) firemen as drivers and/or thirty (30) cleaners as firemen during the quarters ending June, September, and December, drivers and firemen equal to the number less than that specified shall be regressed to firemen and cleaners respectively.

(7) In the event of an abnormal decrease in the traffic to be handled in any one year, the margins provided for in paragraphs (5) and (6) may be referred to a Board of Reference for review, and the Board shall have power to amend those margins in such manner as it may deem fit.

(8) Each fortnight a return, showing all the acting work performed during the previous two (2) weeks, shall be supplied to the secretary of the Union.

(9) Workers appointed under subclause (1) may be regressed; provided that the total amount of advanced capacity work performed during the two (2) weeks preceding that in which such appointments became due is less than the margin stipulated in subclauses (5), (6) and (7); should the advanced capacity work performed for the same period be in excess of the margin provided in subclauses (5), (6) and (7), appointments equal to such excess shall be retained. Regressions under this subclause to be made within a fortnight of such appointments becoming due.

(10) No driver or fireman in any class shall be regressed until all the drivers and firemen respectively in the classes (if any) below him shall have been similarly regressed. After such regression, and whilst doing work in the lower grade, the drivers and firemen so regressed shall be paid the maximum rates provided for firemen and cleaners respectively. Notice of intention to regress to be served on the Union.

6.—Retirement and Dismissal.

(a) No worker after six (6) months' continuous service shall leave the service of the Commissioner until the expiration of fourteen (14) days' written notice of his intention so to do, without the approval of the Commissioner.

(b) Except in the case of summary dismissal for misconduct, fourteen (14) days' written notice shall be given by the Commissioner to any worker whose services are no longer required, and the reason for his dismissal shall be included in such notice.

7.—Qualifications.

(1) Engine Drivers: No person shall be employed as a driver on the State Railways without the approval of the head of the branch. Such driver shall pass a satisfactory examination and hold a certificate from the head of the branch that he is competent. He must also have served as a fireman on the State Railways, or been employed as a driver or acting driver on other railways, either within or outside the service of the State Railways, unless in the opinion of the head of the branch there is no fully qualified worker available in the employ of the State Railways, when he shall report to the Commissioner, who may thereupon authorise the appointment of such person or persons, as may be deemed necessary; always provided that the Union shall receive due notice of any such proposed appointments.

(2) (a) Firemen: No person shall be employed as a fireman on the State Railways without the approval of the head of the branch. Such fireman must pass a satisfactory examination and hold a certificate from the head of the branch that he is competent; he must also have served as a cleaner on the State Railways, or have been employed as a driver, fireman, or cleaner on other railways within or outside the State of Western Australia; provided always that no person from outside the service of the State Railways shall be employed as fireman unless, in the opinion of the head of the branch, there is no worker in the employ of the State Railways fully qualified and available, when he shall report to the Commissioner, who may thereupon authorise the appointment of such person or persons as may be deemed necessary; always provided that the Union shall receive due notice of any such proposed appointments.

(b) No worker shall be permitted to act as fireman until he is twenty-one (21) years of age, unless, in the opinion of the head of the branch, the requirements of the service otherwise demand it.

(3) Cleaners: (a) No candidate for the position of cleaner shall be admitted under seventeen and a half (17½) years of age, or over nineteen (19) last birthday.

(b) Each candidate for the position of cleaner shall require—

- (i) To pass departmental education test.
- (ii) To pass an examination by the medical officer of the department that he is free from bodily or mental infirmity, the cost of such examination to be borne by the candidate.
- (iii) To pass the departmental test for vision, hearing, and colour-sense.
- (iv) To supply three (3) testimonials of character from persons of good repute, Registrar's certificate of birth, or extract of birth entry.

(b) (i) A driver, whilst acting as driver-in-charge of an out-depot where six (6) or more workers are stationed shall be paid the highest ordinary margin prescribed for engine drivers, and in addition shall be paid eighteen shillings (18s.) per week.

(ii) A driver, whilst acting as driver-in-charge of an out-depot where less than six (6) workers are stationed shall be paid the highest ordinary margin prescribed for engine drivers and, in addition, fifteen shillings (15s.) per week.

(iii) Provided that, on relinquishing the duties of a driver-in-charge, a driver shall revert to the wage margin he would have received had he not acted as driver-in-charge.

(c) No driver shall be entitled to promotion from one class to another unless he satisfactorily passes any examination or test required by the head of the branch.

(d) A driver whilst acting as sub-foreman shall be paid in accordance with current Award of the Railways Classification Board: Provided that he shall not be paid a lesser rate than prescribed in this Award for a driver-in-charge.

(e) Enginemen employed on shunting engines handling sulphur in transit from ship's side to the chemical works shall be paid 1s. per day extra whilst so employed, and shall also be supplied with goggles.

(f) Rail motor drivers shall also receive a bonus of 25s. per month, contingent upon no delays due to the driver occurring which exceed fifteen (15) minutes.

(6) Nothing in this Award shall affect the payment of war loadings which shall continue to be paid as at present until further order.

(7) Washout-men and washout-men's assistants appointed as such shall each be supplied with a pair of rubber boots and workers operating the steam cleaner shall be provided with suitable protective clothing.

9.—Workers Performing Higher Duties.

(a) A worker engaged for more than one-half of one day or shift on duties carrying a higher rate than his ordinary classification shall be paid the higher rate for such day or shift; if employed for one-half or less than one-half of one day or shift he shall be paid the higher rate for the time actually worked: Provided, however, that acting time of less than twenty (20) minutes in any one day or shift shall not be counted: Provided further, that the conditions applicable to such higher duties shall apply.

(b) Should any worker be required to perform work in a lower grade, his wage shall not be reduced whilst employed in such capacity.

(c) At main depots cleaners shall not be employed on fueling or labouring work, except in cases of emergency. The raking-out of ashpans of engines going on traffic on Sundays at main depots other than Perth and Fremantle may be performed by cleaners: Provided that the work of raking-out and tubing shall be done by the shed staff where such labour is now available.

(d) Should a cleaner at a running shed be called upon to assist in washing-out engines he shall be paid the minimum rate prescribed for a fireman under the conditions in subclause (a) and all time so worked shall be classed as acting firing.

(e) A cleaner employed at an out depot who is regularly required to do raking-out and tubing for fifty per cent. (50%) or more of his working time in any one year shall be supplied with one suit of overalls per annum. "Any one year" shall mean twelve (12) months from date of transfer to any out depot where this condition would apply.

10.—Award not to Affect Present Wage.

Nothing in this Award shall be construed to reduce the wage of any worker below the rate actually received by him on the date this Award is issued: Provided that this clause shall not apply to cleaners under 18 years of age, shunting firemen and shunting drivers provided for in clause 8, subclauses (1), (2) (d) and (3) (a), respectively.

11.—Lodging Allowance.

1. The following allowance shall be paid to workers covered by this Award booked off or temporarily lodging away from their home station:—

(a) For the first thirty (30) hours or part thereof, the sum of five shillings (5s.) where attended, and six shillings (6s.) where unattended barracks are provided, and seven shillings (7s.) where there are no barracks.

(b) After the first thirty (30) hours and up to seven (7) days, the sum of sixpence (6d.) per hour and thereafter fivepence (5d.) per hour: Provided that the reduction from sixpence (6d.) to fivepence (5d.) shall only be made in cases where the worker shall be stationed for over seven (7) days in one place.

Provided that a deduction of one shilling (1s.) per day or night, with a maximum of five shillings (5s.) per week, shall be made where attended barracks are provided, and a deduction of sixpence (6d.) per day or night, with a maximum of two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per week, shall be made where unattended barracks are provided. No such deduction shall be made if the worker returns to his home station within forty-four (44) hours.

(c) The allowance shall be calculated from the time of booking on to the time of booking off at home station.

(d) A worker booked off or temporarily lodging in a district carrying an allowance shall be granted such allowance, or, if already in receipt of a district allowance, shall be granted the difference between such allowance and any higher allowance applicable to the district in which he is booked off or lodging. A day's allowance to be granted for the first thirty (30) hours or any part thereof, and each subsequent twenty-four (24) hours or part thereof; time to be calculated from time of departure from home station to time of departure from foreign station.

(e) No away-from-home allowance shall be granted to any worker stationed in the suburban area in respect of any absence from his home station within the suburban area, unless he is unable to return by passenger train to his home station for the night, or unless approved by the head of the branch.

(f) Married workers temporarily transferred for a period exceeding three (3) months, but which is not expected to exceed six (6) months, for the purpose of meeting seasonal or exceptional or temporary traffic and not moving their permanent homes, will be paid a weekly allowance of thirty shillings (30s.) in lieu of transfer or lodging allowance to cover the excess cost of living away from their homes.

Provided that should any other lodging allowance be due to a worker whilst transferred, such allowance, together with the allowance provided for in the foregoing paragraph, shall in no case exceed the allowance payable under subclauses (a), (b) and (d).

(g) Where workers under the preceding subclause are employed on a series of works up and down the line and are provided with sleeping accommodation in vans, the removal of vans from one place to another will not be deemed to have altered their headquarters.

(h) The Commissioner may in his discretion make any allowance in addition to those provided in the foregoing subclauses, and the head of the branch shall also have discretion to make any such additional allowance as may under the circumstances be justified.

(i) The foregoing allowances will not be paid—

(i) during any period of absence from duty without pay, unless such absence is due to sickness of the worker and does not exceed one (1) week;

(ii) during any period of annual leave.

Transfer Accommodation Allowance.

2. (a) Where married men are transferred from one station to another to suit the convenience of the employer and at which no suitable accommodation is available, they shall be paid the sum of thirty shillings (30s.) per week until such time as suitable accommodation is available or for a period of six (6) months, whichever shall be the shorter.

The term "married men" shall for this purpose also include widowers with dependants and also others with dependants.

(b) Any unmarried worker transferred from one station to another to suit the convenience of the employer shall be paid actual reasonable out-of-pocket expenses, but in each case details of the expenses shall be submitted and all items in excess of five shillings (5s.) must be supported by receipted vouchers.

Provided, however, that such payment shall be limited to a period of six (6) months and shall not exceed thirty shillings (30s.) per week.

Liberty is reserved to either party to apply on this subclause.

12.—Hamper Allowance.

(a) A driver or fireman attending at a depot with a hamper for a trip for which he is booked and which is cancelled, or who shall have received less than two (2) hours' notice of the cancellation of a trip requiring a hamper, shall be allowed three shillings (3s.) in respect of such hamper.

(b) Any worker having to proceed on an "away-from-home" job with less than four (4) hours' notice shall be paid an amount of three shillings (3s.) in addition to ordinary expenses.

(c) Any worker notified between 6 p.m. and 10 a.m. of a "book off" job requiring him to come on duty between those hours shall receive an allowance of three shillings (3s.) in addition to ordinary expenses. This provision shall also apply to any worker notified of a "book off" job between 6 p.m. on the day preceding and 10 a.m. on the day following any public holiday on which grocery and butchers' shops are closed, if required to come on duty between those hours. The provision shall also apply to any worker required to come on duty on a "book off" job between 12 noon Saturday and 10 a.m. Monday, unless the worker is notified or word left at his place of residence before 11 a.m. on the Saturday.

(d) When any worker is rostered for a local shift and such shift is extended by not less than one hour beyond the time rostered when booking on duty, such worker shall be paid two shillings (2s.) for meal allowance.

13.—Sunday Away-from-home-Station.

Workers shall not be booked away from their home station for two (2) Sundays in succession, where it can be avoided by any reasonable arrangement.

14.—Payment for Travelling Time.

(a) A worker travelling as a passenger going to work away from or returning to his home station shall be paid at ordinary rates for actual travelling or waiting time for the first eight (8) hours and thereafter at half the ordinary rates in any one period of twenty-four (24) hours.

(b) Any fireman travelling as a passenger going out to act as a driver, or returning after having acted as a driver, and any cleaner going out to act as a fireman, or returning after having acted as a fireman, shall receive payment for travelling time or waiting time at the minimum rate for the higher grade.

(c) Any worker who travels as a passenger from home depot to another depot, or vice versa, and is then booked off duty, and who has not been on duty prior to travelling, shall be allowed a minimum of two (2) hours from the time of booking on to the time of booking off duty.

(d) Sunday travelling time shall be paid at the same rates and on the same conditions as on week days.

(e) In respect of a worker who is provided with a sleeping berth in a passenger train, travelling time shall not count between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.: provided this shall not operate to reduce the travelling time to be paid for below four (4) hours in any one day.

(f) A worker when travelling by sea shall be entitled to a first-class accommodation on the boat, and one-fourth only of the usual away-from-home allowance; travelling time shall be paid at ordinary rates; provided that not more than eight (8) hours shall be paid for his travelling time in any one period of twenty-four (24) hours.

15.—Payment When Booked on Duty and Not Required.

(a) Any driver or fireman booked on duty but informed before leaving the shed with his engine that he is not required for work, and who is only called upon to attend to his engine, shall be paid two (2) hours' pay at the rate applicable to that day, but

may be called upon for further duty without any further prescribed period of rest as provided for in Clause 16 of this Award. Any driver or fireman who is booked on duty and is called upon to perform work other than attending to his engine, or who has to go out on traffic, shall be allowed not less than four (4) hours' pay at the rate applicable to that day.

(b) Any driver or fireman booked up for duty shall not be entitled to any allowance when at least two (2) hours' notice that he is not required has been left at his place of residence or barracks, as the case may be. Written notice left with person in charge of worker's place of residence will be deemed to be notice under this subclause.

(c) If a cleaner is brought on duty and it is found necessary before he has worked two (2) hours to book him off so that he may be available to take up duty as a fireman, he shall be paid a minimum of two (2) hours at the rate applicable to that day, but may be called upon for duty as fireman without the period of rest prescribed in subclause (f) of Clause 16.

(d) Any worker brought on duty shall receive four (4) hours' pay at the rate applicable to that day, except as provided for in subclauses (a), (b) and (c) hereof.

(e) No worker shall be brought on duty on a Sunday for less than four (4) hours' work.

(f) Any worker rostered for duty on Sunday and informed he is not required shall be paid two (2) hours at ordinary rates: provided, however, this provision shall not apply when notice that he is not required has been left at the worker's place of residence at least two (2) hours before his rostered time of duty.

16.—Minimum Time Off Duty.

(a) Each driver and fireman shall be allowed off duty at home station for a minimum of twelve (12) hours, and at foreign stations for a minimum of eight (8) hours, except as provided hereunder.

(b) Enginemmen leaving home station for a foreign station which may entail booking off at a number of other stations before returning to home depot, shall be booked off for twelve (12) and eight (8) hours alternatively; provided that the first booking-off may be for a minimum of eight (8) or twelve (12) hours as the department may require: Provided further, that unless the worker is notified to the contrary prior to leaving his home station, the first booking-off shall be for a period of twelve (12) hours.

(c) When enginemmen are required to do anything apart from their rostered run, the department to apply the alternating rest period.

(d) In the event of a crew having been booked-off at a foreign station for eight (8) hours and the department finds it necessary to again book the same crew off on the return journey, the rest period on the second occasion to be twelve (12) hours, so that no crew will be booked-off eight (8) hours twice in succession.

(e) When relieving at a foreign station or temporarily transferred, the temporary station will for the purpose of this clause be treated as the home station for the first and each subsequent booking-off thereat.

(f) After a cleaner, washout-man, washout-man's assistant, or worker acting in that capacity has gone off duty he shall be allowed ten (10) hours before coming on duty again: Provided that if a worker has been employed during part of the shift as a fireman, he shall be allowed rest period specified for fireman.

(g) When a worker is brought on duty without the prescribed period of rest, he shall be paid continuous duty as from the time he booked on the previous shift till booking off on the shift for which he had less than the stipulated rest period, excepting where the time by which the rest period falls short of the prescribed time does not exceed sixty (60) minutes, in which case he shall be paid at the rate of double time for the time between the actual rest period and the minimum period of rest prescribed in this Award: Provided that, in either case, he shall be deemed to have been booked off duty, in so far as the computation of lodging allowance is concerned.

(h) No worker shall be called or booked up for duty without having the prescribed period of rest while there is another qualified worker available who has had the prescribed rest.

(i) Each driver and fireman booked on duty after 9 p.m. and before 7 a.m. shall be called sufficiently long before coming on duty to enable him to get to the shed at the time booked. These provisions shall apply in the case of cleaners booked on irregular shifts if a call boy is available.

(j) Drivers and firemen booked off duty at a foreign station where there is a caretaker at the barracks shall be called for duty irrespective of the hour booked on. At stations where there is no caretaker they shall be called if it can be conveniently arranged.

(k) Each driver and fireman on being booked off duty on arrival at any shed shall come on duty again at such time as provided hereinbefore, as he may be directed before leaving the shed, either verbally by the foreman or by the running sheet posted at the shed, except in cases of emergency, when drivers and firemen may be called upon to resume duty at any time.

(l) Drivers and firemen booked on rostered working between the hours of 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. shall, when time permits, be given four (4) hours' notice of any alteration in their working.

(m) Should a driver or fireman not be able to ascertain before leaving the shed at his home station, either from the foreman or from the running sheet, when he shall next be required for duty he shall be free to assume that he will not be required for twelve (12) hours, and may make his private arrangements accordingly.

(n) Between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. each driver and fireman after being booked off duty for twelve (12) hours shall make personal inquiry at the shed as to when he is next required for duty, except when booked adjusting, in which case he shall be notified. Outside these hours he shall be notified at his place of residence at least two (2) hours before being required for duty: Provided that he shall have the specified period of rest, viz., twelve (12) hours before commencing duty. Written notice left with the person in charge of worker's place of residence will be deemed to be notice under this subclause.

(o) A rail motor driver working special trips and having to return before the expiration of eight (8) hours after arrival on outward journey will, where the time between completion of outward and commencement of homeward trip exceeds three (3) hours, be paid half time rate for such interval. Such time to be treated as passive time. This provision only to apply to rail motor coaches in service at the present time. Should their number be increased the question of applying the provision to them to be then considered, and, failing agreement, to be referred to a Board of Reference.

17.—Transfers.

(a) When any transfer is ordered by the department the worker transferred shall not lose his right of appeal against the transfer, and if on inquiry it is found that a transfer can be arranged with another worker to suit the convenience of the department, then he shall be retransferred. A worker transferring from one station to another over one (1) mile distant involving a change of residence shall:—

(i) Be paid not less than four pounds (£4) for a married man and fifteen shillings (15s.) for a single man. A married man who does not transfer his family shall be paid as a single man;

(ii) Be paid such further out-of-pocket expenses (if any) as the Commissioner in his discretion shall decide to have been reasonably incurred;

(iii) Be granted free passes for himself and family (including those dependants mentioned in the interpretation of "married man" and also the mother of a married man permanently residing with and wholly dependent upon him) and free railway transport of his furniture and effects, including one (1) cow and not more than two (2) goats; where the train is provided with appropriate sleepers, and the worker's journey extends through the night, he and his family shall be supplied with sleeping berths;

(iv) Be paid actual travelling and waiting time up to a maximum of eight (8) hours per day; no overtime rates shall apply.

(v) Married workers shall be allowed one (1) day for packing and one (1) day for unpacking (if necessary). A married man who does not transfer his family shall be treated as a single man.

(b) Any worker who is transferred from one place to another to suit himself shall be entitled to the provisions of subclause (a) (iii) only.

(c) When the department is aware three months in advance of the necessity of requiring a worker to permanently transfer from one station to another at least twenty-eight (28) days' notice shall be given to the worker concerned. In all other cases ten (10) days' notice shall suffice. A worker may be transferred without such notice provided that expenses as per clause 11, subclauses (a) and (b) are paid for each day by which the period of notice is less than twenty-eight (28) days or ten (10) days as the case may be. Provided, however, the prescribed notice of transfer shall not be waived unless the worker concerned is agreeable.

(d) A worker shall not be transferred for a lesser period than three (3) months. If required to work temporarily at another depot for relief or other purposes for a lesser period, he shall be paid lodging allowance as per clause 11.

(e) Any worker who has been stationed in the Goldfields Areas for a period exceeding three (3) years shall be entitled to a transfer, with expenses, to the metropolitan or a coastal depot, and such transfer shall, upon request, be arranged as soon thereafter as the exigencies of the service will permit.

(b) District allowance shall not apply where the worker is absent without pay, unless such absence is due to sickness of worker and does not exceed three (3) months.

(c) Workers leaving the service for any cause and due for payment in lieu of holidays shall not be paid district allowance for the period of such holidays.

19.—Annual Leave and Holidays.

(1) Annual Leave:—

(a) Unless by mutual agreement between the Commissioner and the union to the contrary, workers after twelve (12) months' continuous service shall be granted annual leave on full pay as under:—

Drivers and Fireman: Three (3) weeks.

Other workers: Two (2) weeks and two (2) days.

The whole of such annual leave shall be taken at the one time in each year: Provided that with the consent of the Commissioner annual leave may be allowed to accumulate for two (2) years. Two (2) extra days' annual leave shall be granted to workers stationed at Yalgoo and Goongarie and Eastward or Northward thereof and on the Hopetoun-Ravensthorpe railway and at Norseman and Southward thereof.

(b) Workers shall be paid for annual leave at the rate of pay they were drawing at or immediately before the time when such annual leave is taken.

(c) Every worker, after one (1) month's continuous service, shall be entitled to the foregoing annual leave in proportion as the length of service is to the appropriate period of annual leave.

(d) Every year prior to the thirty-first (31st) July, a statement shall be posted in each shed showing the date on which each worker will go on his annual leave and resume duty. The annual leave for such worker shall be calculated up to the thirtieth (30th) June each year, and only leave up to that date shall be granted each year, except in cases where leave has been allowed to accumulate.

(e) Workers are not to be booked on annual leave for more than one (1) year in succession between thirtieth (30th) April and first (1st) September, except at the request of the worker. Holiday lists are not to be departed from, except for reasons of sickness, accident or traffic requirements not foreseeable at the date of preparing lists.

(f) With the approval of the head of the branch any worker may exchange dates with another.

(g) Unless at his own request, no worker shall be booked off for annual leave at a foreign station or at his temporary home station.

(h) No deduction shall be made from annual leave for the period a worker is off duty through sickness unless the absence exceeds three (3) calendar months.

(i) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause other than for stealing shall be entitled to receive payment for any annual leave which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service: Provided always that if the worker has been dismissed for stealing no claim for annual leave shall be recognised. Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated leave or payment therefor.

(2) Holidays:—

(a) In addition to their annual leave the following days shall be observed as holidays:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Labour Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Foundation Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, and any other day proclaimed as a general public holiday.

(b) Whenever any holiday falls on an employee's ordinary working day and the employee is not required to work on such day he shall be paid for the ordinary hours he would have worked on such day if it had not been a holiday. If he is required to work on a holiday he shall be paid for the time worked as if it were an ordinary working day and shall in addition be allowed a day's leave with pay to be added to the annual leave or to be taken at some subsequent date where the worker so agrees.

(c) Whenever a holiday falls on a Sunday workers shall not be granted a paid holiday except where that holiday is observed on the following Monday.

(d) A holiday which falls on a day on which a worker is on paid annual leave shall be treated as if it fell on a worker's ordinary working day.

(e) A worker who returns to his home station or finishes a shift at his home station not later than 4 a.m. on any holiday and is not again booked on duty for that day shall be treated as having had a paid holiday.

(f) Unless at his own request no worker shall be booked off for a holiday at a foreign or at his temporary home station.

(g) When a worker is off duty owing to leave without pay or sickness, including accidents on or off duty, any holiday falling during such absence shall not be treated as a paid holiday. Where the worker, however, is on or is available for duty on the working day immediately preceding a paid holiday or resumes or is available for duty on the working day immediately following a holiday the worker shall be entitled to a paid holiday on such holiday.

20.—Extended Leave of Absence.

Any worker who has been two (2) years or more in the service of the Commissioner may, on application, be granted in addition to annual leave, extended leave of absence without pay for a period not exceeding twelve (12) months. Failure on the part of a worker to return to his duty within the specified period of leave granted shall be regarded as a resignation and shall be so treated.

21.—Absence Through Sickness.

(a) Any worker, being unable to attend to his duty through sickness, shall notify the locomotive officer on duty at least three (3) hours before the time he is booked for duty, and he shall also satisfy the locomotive officer that he is unfit to attend to his duties, and, if called upon, shall provide a medical certificate that he is unable to perform his duties through sickness.

(b) Any worker so absent shall not again be booked up for duty unless he notifies the locomotive officer not later than 4 p.m. on any day that he is fit to resume, and in such case there shall be no obligation to employ him until the following working day. A worker who books off duty sick on afternoon shift who reports for duty before 10 a.m. on the following day shall be provided with work on that day.

(c) Any worker losing time through sickness or special leave shall be reduced in wages only to the extent of the time actually lost through sickness or actually granted as special leave.

22.—Payment for Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill health at the rate of one twelfth of the guaranteed week's work for each completed month of service; provided that payment for such absence through such ill health shall be limited to six (6) days in each calendar year, but the sick leave herein provided shall be allowed to accumulate and any portion unused in any year may be availed of in the next or any succeeding year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at any time the worker leaves the service, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(b) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof to the satisfaction of the Commissioner or his representative, of sickness, but the Commissioner shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(c) No payment will be made for any absence due to a worker's own fault, neglect, or misconduct.

23.—Free Passes, Privilege Tickets, Etc.

(1) Free Passes:—

(a) After twelve (12) months' continuous service workers shall be allowed annually free passes as specified hereunder:—

All drivers and any ex-driver who has been regressed (either through reduction in the number of drivers or for physical disability); firemen who hold driver's certificate; washout men; packers and trimmers:—one first class station to station pass on the occasion of the annual and/or long service leave to cover the full term of leave due; two (2) first class privilege passes from one given station to another and return.

All other workers:—one second class station to station pass on the occasion of the annual and/or long service leave, to cover the full term of leave due: Provided that this pass may be changed to first class on payment by the worker of half the additional fare at ordinary rates; two (2) first class privilege passes from one given station to another and return, except during the Christmas, New Year and Easter holidays, when at the option of the Commissioner the passes may be issued as second class: Provided, however, that in the event of the worker owing to domestic arrangements desiring to return to his home, leaving his family at the holiday destination, the pass will be considered as available for return of the family, or a separate pass issued therefor. In addition to the worker the passes shall be available for his wife and members of his family under eighteen (18) years of age unmarried, unmarried daughters over eighteen (18) years of age and his parents, provided they are resident with and dependent upon him for support. A widower with his child or children resident with him and who regularly employs a housekeeper may, at the discretion of the Commissioner, be granted passes for such housekeeper; in like manner, an unmarried worker supporting younger brothers and/or sisters may be granted passes for such housekeeper.

(b) Upon request a worker may be granted a separate station to station pass for his wife and dependants as mentioned in subclause (a) hereof, where it is inconvenient for both to travel together.

(c) Workers who have not had an opportunity of allowing their holidays to accrue owing to having taken leave on individual public holidays shall be granted their station to station pass when on special leave up to fourteen (14) days.

(d) After six (6) months' continuous service, a worker shall be entitled to the passes mentioned in subclause (a) in proportion to length of service.

Should a worker, through illness, be unable to use his station to station pass on the occasion of his annual leave, he shall be entitled to the use of such pass on the occasion of taking leave without pay during the year in which same is due.

(e) A worker who resigns or is retired from the service and has leave due shall be granted a free pass, station to station, for the term of such holidays: Provided that, should a worker not have given the requisite notice or obtained the consent of the Commissioner to leave the service as provided for in clause 6, he shall forfeit all claims to any passes he would otherwise have been entitled to under the provisions of this clause.

(f) On production of a certificate from the General Secretary of the Railway Institute, passes shall be issued to a worker for the sole purpose of attending approved classes at the Railway Institute.

(g) Workers in isolated parts may be issued free passes, at the discretion of the Head of the Branch, for the purpose of obtaining medical attention.

(h) Workers working away from home station shall be entitled to a free pass to enable them to visit their home station at intervals of not less than once per fortnight: Provided that the work upon which they are engaged will permit of their doing so. No travelling time shall be paid: Provided, also, that this clause shall not operate to increase or decrease the rate of expenses the worker would otherwise be entitled to.

(i) Free passes shall not apply to race or hired special, guaranteed specials, or special excursion trains within a fifty mile radius, or when in the opinion of the station master at the station where the worker desires to commence his journey there is not ample room on the train.

(2) Market Passes:—Workers stationed outside suburban areas will be issued market passes once per month to the market town most convenient to the Commissioner and the worker. The passes may be issued in favour of the worker, his wife or housekeeper, and children between the ages of five and fourteen years. A worker's wife or housekeeper may be granted a market pass once per fortnight, if required: Provided that the maximum number of passes granted under this subclause shall be two (2) per month.

(3) Free Freight:—Domestic supplies up to a maximum weight fortnightly of two (2) cwt. for married men and one (1) cwt. for single men shall be carried free by rail to home station from the market town most convenient to the Commissioner and the worker, and, in addition, meat, bread, and vegetables and dairy produce, when not obtainable locally, shall be carried free from the market town most convenient to the Commissioner and the worker, where same are procurable. All such supplies must be for the sole use of the worker and his family: Provided that this concession shall not apply when any member of the worker's family conducts a boarding-house or store at the home station.

(4) Market Towns:

(a) (i) The following shall be approved, market towns:—

(ii) By agreement between the parties any of the towns on the list may be omitted and any other town may be added.

(b) A Board of Reference appointed pursuant to the provisions of clause 41 of the Award, may amend or vary the above list by the omission therefrom of any town mentioned, or the addition of any other town. Such amendment or variation may be made at the request of either party and upon proof to the satisfaction of the Board that it is just and reasonable, upon a consideration of the following facts and circumstances:—

(i) The price of ordinary household commodities, including clothing, ruling in the town as compared with other places conveniently situated.

(ii) The number of storekeepers operating in the town or district and the competition amongst them.

(iii) The district allowances, if any, of the workers concerned.

(iv) Any other fact or circumstances, to be specifically set forth in the decision, which, in the opinion of the Board, renders an alteration desirable or necessary.

(5) Privilege Tickets:—After six (6) months' continuous service, a worker shall be allowed privilege return tickets, first or second class, for himself, wife, and members of his family under eighteen (18) years of age, also unmarried daughters over eighteen (18) years of age, and his parents: Provided they are resident with and dependent upon the worker's earnings. The charge for privilege tickets to be half the single fare for the return journey, with a minimum of one shilling (1s.) for adults, and sixpence (6d.) for children.

(6) For the purpose of this clause a member of the family shall be deemed to be dependent, provided such member's income does not exceed one pound (£1) per week, exclusive of old age or invalid pension, but a member of the family temporarily out of employment shall not be deemed to be dependent.

24.—Season Tickets.

Second class season tickets at half the ordinary season ticket rates shall on application be issued to any worker to enable him to travel between the place of occupation and the station nearest to which he resides.

25.—Hours of Duty and Overtime Payment.

(a) All time (exclusive of Sunday time) worked in excess of forty (40) hours in any one week shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.

(b) All time worked in excess of eight (8) hours in any one shift shall be paid for as under:—

First two (2) hours—time and a quarter.

Next two (2) hours—time and a half.

Thereafter—double time.

(c) Overtime provided for in subclauses (a) and (b) of this clause shall not be paid for twice; payment shall be calculated on the daily or weekly basis, whichever of these alternatives gives the greater amount to the employees.

Note.—This subclause refers to daily overtime rates and to the time and a half provision for weekly overtime.

(d) (i) The overtime rates shall be computed on the rate applicable to the day on which the overtime is worked. Provided that double time, i.e., twice the ordinary rate, shall be the maximum.

(ii) Subject to the foregoing provision, all time worked on Sunday shall be paid at the rate of double time, and all ordinary time worked on Saturdays by shift workers shall be paid for at time and a half. For the purpose of this subclause, "shift workers" means workers other than workers who always commence and complete the ordinary hours of work during the period 7 a.m. to 5.30 p.m.

(e) The Commissioner shall arrange, as far as practicable, that shifts shall not exceed eight (8) hours, and, except in cases of emergency where relief cannot be provided, a worker shall not be required to remain on duty at his home or temporary home station for more than ten (10) hours.

(f) Workers other than enginemen shall not be required to work more than five (5) hours without being booked off for a meal or allowed a crib time.

(g) In the case of enginemen working on shunting engines, an interval of twenty (20) minutes for crib shall be arranged between the third and fifth hours of duty, without deduction of pay, except at Midland Junction, when shunters and enginemen work conflicting shifts, in which case the crib time shall be arranged to suit the department.

(h) In the case of enginemen on the road, it shall be understood that, when the running of their own train is not unduly delayed and the running of other trains which their own train may meet or cross is not interfered with, an interval of not exceeding twenty (20) minutes for crib between the third and fifth hours of duty may be taken without deduction of pay. The place at which crib may be taken, if practicable, shall be indicated on suburban rosters.

(i) A worker whose duty entails working through the Swan View tunnel on the down journey with passenger or goods train shall be paid one shilling (1s.) extra per shift, in addition to all other allowances to which he is entitled.

(j) The Commissioner shall guarantee to each worker a full week's work of forty (40) hours, exclusive of Sunday work, except during such period as by reason of any action on the part of any section of his workers, or for any cause beyond his control, he is unable wholly or partially to carry on the running of the trains. Each week shall stand by itself.

(k) Two employees of the Commissioner (such workers to be members of, and to be nominated by, the Union), shall be permitted to attend the departmental half-yearly time table conferences as representatives of the Union, and may take part in any discussion as to whether any particular piece of night work involved in the proposed time table could be avoided. The workers so acting shall be paid by the Commissioner ordinary wages, travelling time, and expenses as provided in this Award.

26.—Shift and/or Night Work.

(a) Employees when engaged in the callings named hereinafter shall be paid allowances for shift and/or night work as indicated, provided that where such allowance is at a rate per hour broken parts of an hour less than thirty (30) minutes shall be disregarded and from thirty (30) to fifty-nine (59) minutes paid for as one hour.

(b) (i) Drivers (including diesel drivers), firemen and adult cleaners—Fourpence (4d.) per hour for all work performed on week days between 8 p.m. and 6 a.m.

(ii) Junior Engine Cleaners—Twopence (2d.) per hour for all work performed on week days between 8 p.m. and 6 a.m.

(c) (i) Washout-men, packers and trimmers, and washout-men's assistants shall be paid for ordinary time worked on any afternoon or night shift 7½ per cent. more than ordinary rates, subject to a maximum of 1s. 8d. per shift.

(ii) "Afternoon shift" means any shift on which ordinary time finishes after 6 p.m. and at or before midnight.

"Night shift" means any shift on which ordinary time finishes subsequent to midnight and at or before 8 a.m.

(iii) "Ordinary time" does not include Sunday time or overtime.

(d) For the purpose of this clause, "time worked" does not include any time not treated as time worked on week days for overtime at the date of this Award.

(e) The allowance for afternoon and night shifts or night work allowances prescribed by this clause shall not be paid for any shift worked or any portion of any shift worked on a Saturday or Sunday.

27.—Overtime.

(a) The Commissioner may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at the overtime rates provided under the Award, and such workers shall work overtime in accordance with such requirements.

(b) No organisation party to the Award, worker or workers covered by this Award, shall in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation, or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements as shown in subclause (a) above.

(c) The above provisions shall remain in operation only until otherwise determined by the Court.

28.—Seventh Shifts.

(a) Six (6) shifts will constitute a week's work, except in special cases of unavoidable short runs, such special cases to be arranged between the Commissioner and the Union.

(b) If less than forty (40) hours have been worked in the six (6) shifts, the time for the six (6) shifts will be made up to forty (40) hours, and the seventh shift will be paid for at—(i) ordinary rate for time equivalent to time made up; (ii) overtime rate for balance.

(c) Where train crews (excepting those employed on shunting engines) work a continuous shift—Sunday into Monday—such shift, unless it extends into four (4) hours on Monday, will not be counted as one of the six (6) week-day shifts.

29.—Duty in Excess of Eight Hours.

Each month the head of the branch will, on receipt of a request from the General Secretary of the Union, supply a statement showing all instances where workers have been kept on duty longer than eight (8) hours continuously.

30.—Knowledge of Roads.

Should the requirements of the service necessitate that a driver shall run over a road with which he is not fully acquainted, he shall be provided with a pilotman. Such pilotman shall be either a district locomotive superintendent (provided he has been a driver in the Government Railways service), a locomotive inspector, driver, or fireman authorised to drive. In cases where a driver is removed from one depot to another, he shall be given facilities to learn the road without loss of his driver's pay.

31.—Examination.

(a) Each driver, fireman, or cleaner who is called on for examination shall have fourteen (14) days' notice of the date on which he will be examined and sample questions given for each subject.

(b) Each candidate shall be allowed to try three (3) times, at intervals not exceeding four (4) months. If he does not pass, a further trial shall be allowed at the expiration of twelve (12) months from the previous examination. If then unsuccessful, he shall be considered to have finally failed.

(c) All questions shall be put clearly and without ambiguity, and each candidate shall be allowed all reasonable latitude in asking the examiner to make each question clear; and a driver (a member of the Union) shall be present at all *viva voce* examinations, but shall not in any way interfere with or interpose in the conduct of the proceedings.

(d) The candidate who fails to pass his examination shall be furnished with a copy of the questions he failed to answer correctly.

(e) A worker who has lost his seniority through failing to pass the examination shall, on subsequently passing, be classified next to the worker who passed examination previously to him.

(f) The examiner shall be appointed by the head of the branch, to whom he shall report fully the result of such examination, and the decision of the head of the branch shall be final.

32.—Preparing and Stabling Engines.

(a) Each driver and fireman shall, if required to do the work, be granted the following allowance for preparing and stabling engines over and above the time required by the Traffic Branch:—

Preparing—

Garratt type engine—75 minutes.

“S” class engine—60 minutes.

Other main line engines (to apply to shunting engines prepared for running on main lines)—45 minutes.

Extra time may be allowed for coaling if in the opinion of the foreman same is warranted.

Where engines have been prepared by workers other than the enginemen who are booked to work them—15 minutes.

Shunting engines—30 minutes.

Diesel-electric rail cars—15 minutes.

Stabling—

Garratt type engines—45 minutes.

All other engines—30 minutes.

Diesel-electric rail cars—15 minutes.

(b) When stabling engines at out-stations (that is, where less than six (6) engines are stabled), an half-hour extra shall be allowed the fireman for banking fire, or cleaning fire, ash-pan and smoke-box.

(c) When a fireman has to raise steam in a boiler at a foreign depot, he shall be allowed two (2) hours in addition to ordinary preparing time, in the case of a cold boiler, and one and a half hours in the case of a warm boiler. A boiler which has been out of traffic for twenty-four (24) hours shall be regarded as a cold boiler.

(d) Provided that the Commissioner may relieve drivers and firemen from duties of preparation and stabling and employ other workers, who are qualified drivers and firemen, to carry out such duties.

33.—Special Shed Duty.

(a) At sheds where six (6) or more engines are stabled, the duties of cleaners shall be to clean engines, clean fronts, light up engines, attend to water and steam, as may be arranged and directed by the officer in charge.

(b) The duties of drivers and firemen, where six (6) or more engines are stabled, when stabling engines, shall be to turn engines, examine engines over pit, take water, lock away all tools, and place engine for coal or in shed, as the case may be, and leave boiler and fire in a safe condition. The fireman shall keep all cab fittings, etc., on the footplate in a clean condition from the time of leaving the shed until return thereto.

(c) At sheds where less than six (6) engines are stabled, the duties of cleaners shall be to clean engines, light-up, attend to water, and steam. Cleaners may also be used for fueling or other work, subject to the conditions of clause 9 (a).

(d) Cleaners working with shed drivers employed in marshalling engines at principal depots (Fremantle, Perth, Midland Junction, Northam, Merredin, Kalgoorlie, Geraldton, Bunbury, Narrogin), shall be paid firemen's rate of pay. This duty to be called “shed firing.”

(e) At sheds where less than six (6) engines are stabled, the duties of the fireman will be to clean out smokeboxes and ashpans, clean fronts, and keep all fittings, etc., on the footplate clean, take coal and water, bank fires. After a fireman has been on duty for more than eight (8) hours, he shall be relieved of the duty of cleaning fires, smokeboxes, and ashpans, unless the case is one of emergency and it is not possible, in the circumstances, for other arrangements to be made to carry out such work.

(f) At sheds where less than six (6) engines are stabled, the duties of the drivers will be to turn engines, examine engines over pits, put engines in position to take coal and water, and stable engines.

(g) In addition to the foregoing, drivers and firemen, when stabling engines, may, provided they have not been on duty in excess of eight (8) hours, be called upon to perform any other duty appertaining to their respective grades, and time allowance shall be made for so much of work as cannot be performed in the period allowed for stabling.

(h) The work of cleaning fires and ashpans of engines going into locomotive depots shall be done by the shed staff where such labour is now available.

(i) Cleaners regularly employed operating the steam cleaning plant and required to maintain steam and water in boiler shall be paid minimum rate for fireman whilst so employed. Such time shall not be regarded as acting time as fireman. For the purpose of this subclause, “regularly employed” means employed for not less than three full shifts per week, and “full shift” means a continuous shift on this work from time of signing on to signing off duty. Where a worker is taken off this work to act in a higher capacity, it shall not be regarded as a break in the shift as steam cleaner.

(j) Any cleaner who has obtained his fireman's ticket and who in the course of his shift is required to light up and attend fires in boilers shall be paid the minimum main line rate prescribed herein for firemen for the time so employed. Such time shall not be regarded as acting time for fireman.

34.—Discipline.

The head of the branch shall have power to reprimand, fine, suspend from duty, reduce in grade, or dismiss any worker, and to remove any driver or fireman from a locomotive footplate. Provided always that the notification to a worker of any such action shall be in writing, and shall state the reason for same being taken.

35.—Charges Against Workers.

(a) Each worker shall himself provide, when called upon, with the least possible delay, any report or statement which may be required by the officer in charge.

(b) When a worker against whom a charge is pending has made a statement to an officer in charge and which statement the officer in charge has taken down in writing, such worker shall either be furnished with a copy of such statement or be allowed to take a copy of it.

(c) If in the opinion of the foreman the action of any worker should be reported to the head of the branch, it shall be done—

(i) where a worker is stationed at a main depot, within seven (7) days of the foreman's first knowledge of the occurrence; for the purpose of this clause a main depot shall be any depot where a district loco. superintendent or loco. shed foreman is stationed;

(ii) where the worker is stationed at a sub depot, within ten (10) days of the first knowledge of the occurrence by the person in charge of such sub depot.

The worker shall at the same time be notified by the foreman that he is reported, otherwise such report shall be null and void; provided that, when a worker reports on his daily running sheet an irregularity or other occurrence in which he is concerned to the department, it shall not be necessary for the foreman to notify such worker that he has been reported to the head of the branch, but if the worker in such cases is to be charged, the foreman must so notify the worker within twenty-one (21) days of the receipt of the daily running sheet. When a charge has been made against any worker, he shall be supplied with a copy of such charge and any reports upon which it is based.

(d) If a final decision in any case in which a charge has been made against a worker be not given within three (3) calendar months of the occurrence first coming to the knowledge of the head of the branch, the charge in question shall lapse.

(e) A worker who is suspended from duty for any reason shall not be kept under suspension in excess of six (6) days (excluding Sundays or holidays) following the date on which he was suspended. Except in cases where dismissal follows suspension, a worker shall be paid for any time under suspension in excess of six days referred to.

(f) Where a worker exercises his right of appeal, no deduction shall be made from his wages until a final decision has been given.

(g) Where a worker has been fined an amount exceeding one day's pay, the amount to be deducted from any fortnight's pay shall not be greater than one day's pay, except with the consent of the worker concerned.

36.—Secretary's Leave and Passes.

The Commissioner will grant leave without pay for a continuous period or otherwise of thirty (30) days in each year to the secretary (should such secretary be a railway servant) to enable him to attend exclusively to the Union work, and a free pass will be issued to the secretary, whether a railway servant or not, for that period, but may be withdrawn at the Commissioner's discretion; such pass to be used exclusively for union work and not for political purposes.

37.—Union Notices.

Notices relating to meetings or classes in connection with the Union shall be allowed to be exhibited at such places as may be approved by the Commissioner.

38.—Port Hedland-Marble Bar Railway.

(a) Workers stationed on the Port Hedland-Marble Bar Railway shall be paid the maximum rate for their respective grades, together with a district allowance of one pound ten shillings (£1 10s.) per week.

(b) Such workers when booked off at foreign stations shall be allowed six shillings and sixpence (6s. 6d.) for the first thirty (30) hours where barracks are provided, and eight shillings and sixpence (8s. 6d.) where barracks are not provided, in lieu of six shillings (6s.) and seven shillings (7s.), as provided in clause 11, and sixpence (6d.) per hour for any succeeding hour or part thereof.

(c) An extra two (2) weeks' leave on full pay shall be granted to such workers when clearing annual leave, such leave to be counted from the time of booking off duty at home station.

39.—Seniority List.

Complete seniority lists shall be available for inspection by workers at depots where a foreman is stationed.

40.—Preference to Unionists.

Preference shall be given to unionists with regard to employment, except in the case of cleaners, who shall be required to make application for membership of the Union immediately on being engaged by the department.

41.—Board of Reference.

(a) The Court appoints, for the purposes of this Award, a Board or Boards of Reference. A Board shall consist of a chairman and two (2) representatives, one nominated by each party. The functions of a Board of Reference shall be—

- (i) to settle disputes as to matters under this Award, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Award;
- (ii) classifying and fixing wages of any designation, occupation, or calling not specifically provided for in the Award;
- (iii) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to the Board from time to time.

(b) Separate Boards may be appointed, where deemed necessary or advisable, for different branches of the industry or for different districts.

(c) The provisions of regulation 92 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941 (Appeal from Board) shall be deemed to apply to any Board of Reference appointed hereunder.
