WHEREAS by section 17, subsection (1) of the Charitable Collections Act, 1946, it is provided that the Governor may by proclamation vest in the Minister the moneys, securities for money, and goods collected by a War Fund or held for any charitable purpose by any person, society, body or association on being satisfied— (a) that a majority of at least three-fourths in number of the persons who are trustees or who have the control of the moneys or securities for money or articles in such fund has consented thereto: And whereas such a majority of the Civilian Welfare Committee, Air Training Corps, R.A.A.F., has so consented; and whereas by subsection (2) of section 17 of the Act the Governor may by proclamation vary such trusts and authorise the Minister to apply the said moneys and securities and articles or any part thereof to such charitable purposes as he may direct: Now, therefore, I, the said Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council and in exercise of the powers conferred on me by section 17 of the Charitable Collections Act, 1946, hereby proclaim that the said trusts are hereby varied and that the Minister is authorised to apply the said moneys, to wit, five hundred and fifty-four pounds and fourpence (£554 0s. 4d.), to the support of activities of a social welfare character and for that purpose to deliver the said moneys to the Perth Legacy Club and the W.A. Squadron, A.T.C. Welfare Fund.

Closure of St. Mary's Churchyard Burial Ground at Busselton.

WHEREAS by the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage Act, 1909, it is provided that, subject to the provisions of the Act, the Minister for Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage shall, with the approval of the Governor, have power to construct and extend Water Works, Sewerage Works and Stormwater Drainage Works; and whereas the preliminary requirements of the said Act have been complied with, and plans, sections and estimates in respect of the works herein-after mentioned have been submitted to and approved by the Governor-in-Council: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council does hereby empower the Minister for Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage to undertake the construction of the following works under the said Act, namely:—

Metropolitan Sewerage.

South Perth District.

Retention Area No. 18.

Twelve inch, 9 inch, 6 inch and 4 inch diameter reticulation pipe sewers together with all manholes and other apparatus connected therewith between Edgecumbe and "L" Street, and Davilak Street and Hope Avenue and within the boundaries as shown in green on Plan M.W.S.S. & D.D., W.A. No. 7272.

This Order-in-Council shall take effect from the 3rd day of June, 1949.

3. Delete the words "the Defence Act, 1903-1918" in line 3 of paragraph 3, subparagraph (a) and insert in lieu thereof the words "the Defence Act, 1903-1941."

Prices Control Order No. 79.
Second-hand Bags and Sacks.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Control Act, 1948, and the regulations for the time being in force thereunder, I, Constantin Paul Mathea, Prices Control Commissioner under the said Act, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Control Order No. 79.

Revocation.

2. Commonwealth Prices Regulation Order No. 2967 published in the *Commonwealth Gazette* on the 23rd May, 1947, as amended by Commonwealth Prices Regulation Orders Nos. 3009 published in the *Commonwealth Gazette* on the 25th July, 1947, and 3248 published in the *Commonwealth Gazette* on the 9th February, 1948, and 3323 published in the *Commonwealth Gazette* on the 7th June, 1948, is hereby revoked.

Definitions and Interpretation.

3. (i) In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—

“Cost of transport” means, in relation to any sale of second-hand bags or sacks, the cost of transport (if any) by rail or by boat incurred by the seller in transporting the goods from the point of delivery to him, to his store, and recorded on an invoice or docket delivered in relation thereto;

“The Perth Metropolitan Area” means all that area of Western Australia comprised within a radius of twelve miles from the General Post Office, Perth;

“Once used” means, in relation to any sugar sack, wheat sack, barley sack or rice sack, a sack which has been only once previously used as a container for sugar, wheat, barley or rice, as the case may be, and has not been used for any other purpose;

“Second-hand” means used;

“‘A’ licensee” means a person who was, prior to the 7th day of February, 1946, the holder of an “A” license issued pursuant to the Commonwealth Control of Second-hand Jute Goods Order dated 26th September, 1942, and published in the *Commonwealth of Australia Gazette* dated 9th October, 1942;

“‘B’ licensee” means a person who was, prior to the 7th day of February, 1946, the holder of a “B” license issued pursuant to the Commonwealth Control of Second-hand Jute Goods Order dated 26th September, 1942, and published in the *Commonwealth of Australia Gazette* dated 9th October, 1942;

(ii) Any bag or sack sold by any person, other than an “A” licensee, which when reconditioned would conform to any of the descriptions of bags or sacks specified in the Schedule, shall for the purpose of this Order, be deemed to be of that description at the time of such sale.

Maximum Prices.

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which any second-hand bag or sack of a description specified in the Schedule to this Order may be sold to be—

(a) for sales by any person whose place of business is in the Perth Metropolitan Area, the price specified opposite that description of bag or sack in the Schedule to this Order;

(b) for sales by any person whose place of business is outside the Perth Metropolitan Area, the sum of—

- (i) the price paid or payable by that person for that bag or sack, or the maximum price specified in the fourth column of the Schedule to this Order for the sale of that description of bag or sack by an “A” licensee, whichever is the lesser;
- (ii) margin at the rate of 6d. per dozen; and
- (iii) cost of transport.

Fixation of Maximum Prices by Notice.

5. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which any second-hand bags or sacks specified in a notice in pursuance of this paragraph may be sold by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by Notice in Writing to that person.

Delivery of Invoices.

6. Every person who sells second-hand bags or sacks shall deliver with those goods an invoice or docket specifying the following particulars:—

- (a) date of sale;
- (b) name of purchaser;
- (c) address of purchaser;
- (d) quantity of bags or sacks sold;
- (e) full description of bags or sacks sold;
- (f) price at which those goods are sold.

THE HEALTH ACT, 1911-1944.

Melville Road Board—Resolution.

P.H.D. 849/48.

WHEREAS under the provisions of the Health Act, 1911-1944, a local authority may make or adopt by-laws and may amend, repeal, or alter any by-laws so made or adopted: Now, therefore, the Melville Road Board, being a local health authority, and having adopted the Model By-laws published in the *Government Gazette* dated the 4th December, 1944, hereby amends its by-laws as follows:—

1. After by-law 1A Part 1 insert a new by-law to stand as by-law 1B as follows:—

1B. In relation to temporary earth closets and privies to be provided for the use of workmen employed on any works.

(a) The internal fittings shall be in accordance with the dimensions in Schedule A of the board's aforesaid by-laws.

(b) An earth closet or privy shall not be within 20 feet of any house or tank nor within 50 feet of any milking shed or milk room of any dairy and shall be so constructed that the pan may be withdrawn from within the convenience.

(c) The walls shall be of timber and galvanised iron or other approved material.

(d) There shall be at least two ventilating openings, of 50 square inches in area, one in each of two opposite walls, and situated six feet above the ground level.

(e) The roof shall be constructed of galvanised iron or other approved impervious material.

(f) The entrance shall be screened to the satisfaction of the inspector.

(g) The under surface of the seat shall be at least 15½ inches above the level of the ground.

(h) A hinged aperture cover shall be provided to the seat.

(i) A hinged riser shall be provided to the panstead.

(j) The panstead shall be constructed as a separate unit and not incorporated in the walls.

2. After paragraph (b) of by-law 3 Part 1 insert a new paragraph to stand as paragraph (c) as follows:—

(c) The owner, contractor or builder of any premises or any place or lot where work is being carried out shall maintain the panstead within the earth closet or privy in a fly proof condition.

DENTISTS ACT, 1939-1947.

The Dental Board of Western Australia—Resolution.

WHEREAS under the provisions of the Dentists Act, 1939-1947, the Dental Board may make rules and may amend, repeal, and add to such rules; and whereas rules were made, under and for purposes of the said Act, and published in the *Government Gazette* on the 9th and 16th days of February, 1940; the 13th day of February, 1942, and the 9th day of April, 1943, and cited as The Dental Board of Western Australia Rules 1940: Now, therefore, The Dental Board of Western Australia doth amend the said rules in the manner set forth in the Schedule hereunder.

The Schedule.

(1) A new rule to stand as 17a is inserted after rule 17 as follows:—

17a. The Degree of Dental Surgery, Dental Science or Dental Medicine of The Witwatersrand University, Johannesburg, South Africa, is prescribed by the Board for the purposes of section 44 (d) (ii) of the Act without any prescribed examination in the State of Western Australia.

PHARMACY AND POISONS ACT, 1910-1948.

Department of Public Health,

HIS Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, acting pursuant to section 53 of the Pharmacy and Poisons Act, 1910-1948, has been pleased to amend, in the manner set forth in the Schedule hereunder, the Pharmacy and Poisons Act Regulations made under and for the purposes of the said Act and published in the *Government Gazette* on the 8th September, 1939, and amended from time to time thereafter by notices published in the *Government Gazette*.

Schedule.

1. Regulation 6 is amended by numbering the existing paragraph as paragraph (1) and by inserting thereafter new paragraphs (2) to (6) as follows:—

(2) Of the seven members elected to office on the Council on the 31st day of March, 1949—

(a) two shall retire on the 31st March, 1950;

(b) two shall retire on the 31st March, 1951;

(c) three shall retire on the 31st March, 1952.

(3) The priority in order of retirement shall be determined by the number of votes cast, the first due to retire being the member in whose favour the lowest number of votes was cast, other retirements being in sequence accordingly.

(4) Any vacancy the result of retirement as prescribed in paragraph (2) of this regulation shall be filled by election and the person so elected shall hold office for a term of three years.

(5) Any member who retires from the Council or whose term of office on the Council expires under this regulation shall, subject to the Act, be eligible for re-election to the Council.

(6) At the first meeting of the Council after the 31st March, 1949, and thereafter at the first meeting after the election of each Council, the members thereof shall elect one of their number to the office of president, who shall hold office for the period of 12 months next ensuing his election as president.

2. Regulation 7 is amended by deleting in line one of subparagraph (b) of paragraph (2) thereof the figures "21" and inserting in lieu thereof the figures "28."

3. Regulation 47 is amended by deleting the word "three" in line two and inserting in lieu thereof the word "one."

4. Insert after regulation 66 a new regulation to stand as regulation 66A, as follows:—

66A. Every pharmaceutical chemist, on changing his place of residence, business, or employment, shall within seven days of so doing intimate in writing, either personally or by registered letter, such change of address, giving particulars of both the old and new addresses.

5. Regulation 73 is amended by deleting the words "or renewal of a license" in lines three and four.

6. Regulation 74 is amended by deleting the words "Seventh Schedule to the Act" in lines three and four, and inserting in lieu thereof the words "Form 15 in Appendix A to these regulations."

7. Regulation 75 is amended by deleting the words "form prescribed in the Sixth Schedule to the Act" in lines two and three, and inserting in lieu thereof the words "Form 16 or 16A in Appendix A to these regulations, as the case may be."

8. Regulation 76 is amended—

(1) by deleting the words "or renewal of a license" in line one;

(2) by deleting the words and figures "subsections (2) and (3) of section 42 of the Act" in line six, and inserting in lieu thereof the words "these regulations."

9. Regulation 77 is deleted and the following inserted in lieu thereof as regulation 77:—

77. Application for renewal of a license shall be in writing, signed by the applicant, and lodged with the Registrar. The fee for renewal of a license shall be the same as the fee for an original license.

10. Regulation 79 is amended by inserting after the figures "76" in line two, the following:—"or regulation 77, as the case may require."

11. Regulation 80 is amended by deleting the figures "76" in line one and inserting in lieu thereof the figures "77."

12. Regulation 81 is amended by adding at the end thereof a proviso as follows:—
Provided that a license in the name of a person on behalf of a firm may be transferred in the name of another person on behalf of the firm.

13. Regulation 82 is amended as follows:—

(1) Delete the words "being the holder of a license to sell poison or poisonous substances" in lines one and two of paragraph (1).

(2) Delete the words "to any person by a registered pharmaceutical chemist on the prescription or order of a registered medical practitioner" in lines three, four and five of paragraph (2), and insert in lieu thereof the words "in a medicine supplied by a pharmaceutical chemist carrying on business as a pharmaceutical chemist."

(3) By adding a new paragraph (3) after paragraph (2), as follows:—

(3) No person shall sell any poison or poisonous substance unless the container immediately containing it bears thereon—

(a) the word "poison" printed conspicuously in letters not less in depth than $\frac{1}{32}$ of the depth of such container, and in any case not less than $\frac{1}{10}$ of an inch in depth;

(b) the name of the poison or poisons and the percentage of that poison, or those poisons, as the case may be, in the contents;

(c) the name and address of the vendor: Provided that a medicine for human use containing any poison dispensed by a pharmaceutical chemist and intended for internal use only shall comply with the requirements of subparagraph (c) only, and a medicine containing any poison dispensed and intended for external use shall comply with the requirements of subparagraphs (a) and (c) only.

14. Regulation 83 is amended as follows:—

(1) Delete the words "The holder of a license to sell" in line one, and insert in lieu thereof the words "Any person who sells."

(2) Delete paragraphs (a), (b), (h), (j), (l) and (m).

(3) Delete the word "or" before the word "cask" in line two of paragraph (c) and insert after the word "cask" the words "or other container approved by the Council."

(4) Delete, in lines three and four of paragraph (d), the expression "Poison—not to be taken," and in lieu thereof insert the following:—"Poison" or "Not to be taken."

(5) Delete, in lines one and two of subparagraph (i) of paragraph (f), the expression "Poison—not to be taken," and insert in lieu thereof the following:—"Poison," or "Not to be taken."

(6) Delete the expressions "Poison—not to be taken" and "Poisonous—not to be taken," in line three of paragraph (g), and insert in lieu thereof the following:—"Poison," or "Not to be taken," and "Poisonous" or "Not to be taken," respectively.

(7) Delete the words "cardboard containers" in line three of paragraph (k).

15. Forms 11, 12 and 13 in Appendix A to these regulations are deleted, and in lieu thereof new forms 11, 12 and 13 inserted as set forth in the Appendix hereto.

16. Re-number regulations 84 and 85 as regulations 93 and 94, and insert after regulation 83 new regulations to stand as regulations 84 to 92, as follows:—

84. Subject to section 43C of the Act, any of the drugs or preparations referred to in the Tenth Schedule shall not be sold except by—

- (a) a medical practitioner;
- (b) a registered pharmaceutical chemist holding a license under section 26 of the Act;
- (c) a registered pharmaceutical chemist holding a license under section 16 of the Act and employed in dispensing medicine at any public hospital or other Government institution;

and the sale of any of such drugs or preparations shall be subject to the following conditions:—

- (1) Sale shall be made only on the prescription of a medical practitioner or of a dentist as defined in the Dentists Act, 1939-1947:

Provided that a dentist shall not prescribe any drug or preparation referred to in the Tenth Schedule other than any of the following, namely:—Penicillin, Sulphonamides, Barbiturates (not more than six tablets or capsules), and in any case shall not prescribe any such drug or preparation except for purposes of dental treatment only.

- (2) Such prescription shall contain the date on which it was written, the name and address of the person for whom prescribed, and the signature of the prescriber.
- (3) The prescription shall be marked or stamped by the dispenser with the name and address of the pharmacy which dispenses it, and with the date and the number of the prescription.
- (4) The prescription shall not be dispensed more than once unless the prescriber has indicated on the face of the prescription that it is to be repeated and the maximum number of times it may be dispensed, or that it may be repeated at a specific interval or intervals within a specified period which shall not exceed six months:

Provided that a prescription written by a dentist shall be dispensed once only.

- (5) The person who dispenses the prescription on the last occasion permitted by the provisions of the next preceding condition shall also stamp, write, or mark in legible letters across such prescription the word "Cancelled."
- (6) A prescription which is marked "Cancelled" or which is more than six months old shall not be dispensed.

85. Conditions (1), (2) and (3) only of the conditions in the next preceding regulation shall apply in respect of the following preparations:—

- (a) Preparations containing not more than $\frac{1}{2}$ gr. per dose of Barbituric Acid or any derivative of Barbituric Acid and not less than 5 grs. of Theobromine.
- (b) Preparations containing not more than $\frac{1}{2}$ gr. per dose of Barbituric Acid or any derivative of Barbituric Acid, and not less than $\frac{1}{4}$ gr. of Ephedrine.
- (c) Preparations containing not more than $\frac{1}{2}$ gr. per dose of Barbituric Acid or any derivative of Barbituric Acid and not less than $1\frac{1}{2}$ grs. of Aminophyllin.
- (d) Preparations containing not more than $\frac{1}{2}$ gr. per dose of Barbituric Acid or any derivative of Barbituric Acid and not less than $\frac{1}{300}$ gr. of Atropin.

86. Except in respect of the preparations referred to in the next preceding regulation, every person who sells any of the drugs and preparations referred to in the Tenth Schedule shall keep and maintain a record showing the quantities of such drugs and preparations received from time to time, and details of the sales of such drugs and preparations, and such record shall be available at all reasonable times for inspection by an inspector of the Council or other person duly authorised by the Council in writing.

87. Subject to section 43D of the Act, any of the drugs or preparations referred to in the Eleventh Schedule to the Act shall not be sold except by a pharmaceutical chemist holding a license under section 26 of the Act and subject to the following conditions:—

- (1) Before delivering to a purchaser any such drug or preparation, the vendor shall receive from the purchaser a prescription prescribing such drug or preparation certifying that it is required for veterinary use and signed by either a medical practitioner, veterinary surgeon or veterinary practitioner: Provided that when in the opinion of the vendor it is not reasonably practicable in the circumstances for the purchaser to obtain such a prescription, the vendor may, on recording the circumstances, sell any drug or preparation for veterinary use referred to in the Eleventh Schedule without a prescription.
- (2) The vendor shall clearly mark the container of any drug or preparation referred to in the Eleventh Schedule with the words "unsuitable for human use" and with the vendor's name and address:

Provided that Penicillin Suspension (in tubes) for the treatment of bovine mastitis may be obtained and sold by a person holding a license under section 16 of the Act, or by a person holding a permit from the Council.

88. Any person desiring to obtain a permit from the Council to obtain and supply Penicillin Suspension (in tubes) for the treatment of bovine mastitis shall comply with the following conditions:—

- (a) Apply to the Council in writing for the grant of such permit; the application shall be in form 17 in Appendix A to these regulations and shall be accompanied by a statutory declaration that the applicant possesses satisfactory storage facilities for the storage of the Penicillin Suspension, including refrigeration, and an undertaking that he will keep it so stored whilst in his possession.
- (b) That he will supply the Penicillin Suspension only to a stock owner for the treatment of bovine mastitis on the written request, signed before delivery of the penicillin, by such stock owner or his representative.
- (c) That he will keep and maintain a proper record in a book kept for the purpose showing particulars of all supplies of Penicillin Suspension received by him, together with the date of receipt thereof by him, and also with the name and address of the manufacturer and wholesale supplier and the name and address of each person to whom such Penicillin Suspension is supplied, together with the date of sale and the quantity sold.
- (d) That he will preserve the records required to be kept by the next preceding paragraph for a period of at least two years, and shall produce them on demand to any inspector or other person authorised in writing by the Council for inspection at all reasonable times.

89. Upon the application referred to in the next preceding regulation being approved by the Council, the Council may grant to the applicant a permit in form 18 in Appendix A to those regulations. A permit shall be valid for a period of 12 calendar months from the date of issue, and may be renewed by application made in writing. The fee for the issue or renewal of a permit shall be £1 ls. per annum.

90. Subject to section 43C of the Act, any of the drugs or preparations referred to in the Twelfth Schedule to the Act shall not be sold except by a pharmaceutical chemist holding a license under section 26 of the Act and subject to the following conditions:—

- (1) Before delivering to a purchaser any such drug or preparation, the vendor shall receive from the purchaser a prescription prescribing such drug or preparation certifying that it is required for veterinary use and signed by either a medical practitioner, veterinary surgeon or veterinary practitioner:
 Provided that when in the opinion of the vendor it is not reasonably practicable in the circumstances for the purchaser to obtain such a prescription, the vendor may, on recording the circumstances, sell any drug or preparation for veterinary use referred to in the Eleventh Schedule without a prescription.
- (2) The vendor shall clearly mark the container of any drug or preparation referred to in the Eleventh Schedule with the words "unsuitable for human use" and with the vendor's name and address.

91. Nothing in these regulations shall operate to prevent the sale by persons licensed under section 26 of the Act of proprietary preparations in original containers of—

- (a) Sulphamethozine or Sulphamerazine prepared for the treatment of Coccidiosis;
- (b) Sulphanilamide for Mastitis;
- (c) Sulphaguanadine for scours in calves and pigs.

92. Nothing in these regulations shall operate to prevent—

- (1) (a) a dentist registered under the Dentists Act, 1939-1947;
- (b) a matron of a hospital registered under the Hospitals Act, 1927, from acquiring any drug or preparation specified in the Tenth Schedule to the Act for use in connection with his profession;
- (2) a veterinary surgeon or veterinary practitioner from acquiring any drug or preparation specified in the Eleventh and Twelfth Schedules to the Act for use in connection with his profession.

The master or owner of any vessel shall affix and keep affixed an effective rat-guard disc or screen of such size and pattern as has been approved by the Commonwealth Department of Health, not less than one foot or more than three feet from the side of the vessel, to every rope or hawser connecting the vessel with the wharf, or lighter or other vessel.

Where, in the opinion of the Harbour Master or the Berthing Master, it is impracticable to affix an effective rat-guard disc or screen to a rope or hawser, three feet of such rope or hawser, commencing from the ship's side, must be covered with freshly tarred canvas.

By-laws Governing Long Service Leave to be Granted to Employees of the Esperance Road Board.

THE Esperance Road Board under and by virtue of the powers conferred on it in that behalf by the Road Districts Act, 1919-1948, and all other powers enab-

ling it doth hereby make and publish the following by-laws:—

1. In the interpretation of these by-laws the following words shall have the meanings assigned to them hereunder:—

“Board” means the Esperance Road Board.

“Continuous service” means service in the employment of this Board during which an employee has not been absent from the service of the Board for a continuous period of more than two days or an aggregate period of more than ten days without leave of absence being granted by the Board.

2. The Board may grant to an employee of the Board who has since the 1st July, 1946, completed 10 years' continuous service, long service leave on full pay for a period not exceeding three months.

3. (a) The Board may grant long service leave to an employee of the Board who has been granted long service leave and has completed not less than five years' continuous service since the completion of the service which qualified him for the previous long service leave, except where the worker retires through reaching retiring age, in which case the long service leave shall be adjusted pro rata.

(b) Long service leave which may be granted under this by-law shall be for a period not exceeding one and three-tenths weeks for every completed year of service since the conclusion of the period of service which qualified the employee for his previous long service leave and shall be on full pay.

4. In the event of the resignation, retirement or death of an employee the Board may pay to such employee (or in the case of death, to his personal representatives or if there be none to his dependants) a sum of money equal to his wages or salary for the period of long service leave which the Board was empowered under these by-laws to grant to such employee at the date of his resignation, retirement or death or if the Board after consideration of all the circumstances direct that the death of an employee be presumed the Board may authorise the payment to the dependants of the employee a sum equivalent to the amount of wages or salary which would under this by-law have been granted the employee immediately prior to the date of his death, such date to be determined by the Board.

5. An employee dismissed by the Board except in the matter of retrenchment shall not be paid any sum in pursuance of the preceding by-law.

6. The Board may at its discretion either pay to an employee his wages or salary during long service leave or pay to an employee in advance a sum representing the amount of his salary or wages for the period of this long service leave.

7. All annual leave to which an employee is entitled or will become entitled before the expiration of his long service leave shall be taken by the employee in conjunction with his long service leave and the period of long service leave granted to an employee shall be reduced by the period of annual leave taken in conjunction therewith.

8. (a) A grant of long service leave in pursuance of these by-laws shall be deemed to be made on the condition that the employee does not accept employment for reward during the period of the long service leave.

(b) If an employee shall accept employment for reward during the long service leave he shall not thereafter during such leave receive any payment on account of wages or salary from the Board.

(c) If the Board shall have paid to an employee a sum of money representing salary or wages for a period after such employee shall have engaged in employment for reward such sum of money may be recovered by the Board from such employee.

By-laws Governing Long Service Leave to be Granted to Employees of the Mosman Park Road Board.

THE Mosman Park Road Board under and by virtue of the powers conferred on it in that behalf by the Road Districts Act, 1919-1948, and all other powers enabling it doth hereby make and publish the following by-laws:—

1. In the interpretation of these by-laws the following words shall have the meanings assigned to them hereunder:—

(a) "Board" means the Mosman Park Road Board.

(b) "Continuous service" means service in the employment of this Board during which an employee has not been absent from the service of the Board for a continuous period of more than two days or an aggregate period of more than ten days without leave of absence being granted by the Board, provided that an employee who was employed by the Board on a permanent basis immediately prior to entering continuous full-time service with the Armed Forces of the Commonwealth of Australia, or who was directed by the manpower directorate to serve elsewhere, between the 3rd day of September, 1939, and the 3rd day of March, 1947, shall have such service counted as continuous service with this Board, provided the requisite proof is produced.

2. All employees of the Board shall after each period of ten years' continuous service as permanent full-time employees thereof commencing from 30th June, 1938, be entitled to three months' long service leave. Long service leave to be taken at the convenience of the Board, who will, as far as possible, meet with the wishes of the employee, but the Board may require the employee to take leave by giving not less than three months' notice.

3. Absence on account of sickness shall not be deemed to be a break in continuity of service, providing the period of absence shall not exceed three months in any year, unless otherwise decided by the Board.

4. Employees due to take long service leave shall be paid (a) their salary or wage for the period thereof at the rate equivalent to the salary paid in the week immediately preceding the taking of long service leave; (b) the Board may at its discretion either (1) pay to an employee his wages or salary periodically during long service leave, or (2) pay to the employee in advance a sum representing the amount of his wages or salary for the period of his long service leave.

5. Employees shall not be entitled to long service leave until the completion of ten years' service. After the completion of the first ten years, employees will then be entitled to a pro rata payment if they leave the service of the Board before the next period is completed.

6. Long service leave shall be considered as a special period of recuperation after a lengthy term of service with a view to fitting the employee for a further term, and during such leave no employee shall undertake any form of employment for hire or reward, unless by special permission of the Board. Any contravention of this subclause shall entitle the Board to dismiss the employee from its service, and to cease paying or to recover any amounts paid in advance on account of long service leave.

MILK ACT, 1946-1948.

HIS Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, acting pursuant to the powers conferred by section 76 of the Milk Act, 1946-1948, has been pleased to approve of the amendment of the regulations made under and for the purposes of the said Act, as set forth in the Schedule hereunder.

Schedule.

These regulations may be cited as the Milk Act, 1946-1948, Regulations No. 6, and shall be read as one with the Milk Act, 1946, Regulations No. 1, as published in the *Government Gazette* on the 21st February, 1947, and numbered 1 to 11, inclusive, and the Milk Act, 1946, Regulations No. 2, as published in the *Government Gazette* on the 18th day of July, 1947, and numbered 12 to 33, inclusive, as amended by notice published in the *Government Gazette* on the 28th November, 1947, and the Milk Act, 1946, Regulations No. 3, as published in the *Government Gazette* on the 12th December, 1947, and numbered 34 to 60, inclusive, and the Milk Act, 1946-1947, Regulations No. 4, as published in the *Government Gazette* on the 15th October, 1948, and numbered 61 to 64, inclusive, and the Milk Act, 1946-1948, Regulation No. 35, as published in the *Government Gazette* on the 18th March, 1949.

Regulations 63 and 64 of Part 6 of the Milk Act, 1946-1947 Regulations, as published in the *Government Gazette* of the 15th October, 1948, are hereby repealed.

The following regulations are inserted in lieu thereof:—

63. Members of the Board other than the Chairman shall be paid a fee of £160 per calendar year. The fee payable to the Chairman for attendance at Board meetings shall be £2 2s. per sitting.

64. In addition to the fees payable under regulation 63, members of the Board shall be paid an allowance of 10s. 6d. per day when attending any meeting of the Board held in the metropolitan area, and an allowance of £1 1s. per day when attending a meeting of the Board, or when engaged on the business of the Board outside the metropolitan area, and shall also be paid transport expenses at the rate of 5½d. per mile when travelling to and from Board meetings or on the business of the Board other than attendance at a Board meeting.

Provided that the sanction of the Board and of the Minister shall be obtained before a member engages on any business of the Board, other than attendance at a Board meeting, for which any allowance or transport expenses are payable.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 7 of 1948.

Between The Australian Workers' Union, Westralian Branch, Industrial Union of Workers, Applicant, and The Hon. Minister for Industrial Development, Western Australia, Respondent.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties; and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination; and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference; and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective representatives and requested the Court to declare the said Agreement an Award of the Court: Now, therefore, the Court, pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, and all other powers therein enabling it, hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court:—

Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note.—Wherever the word "Award" occurs hereunder, it shall be taken to mean and include "Agreement.")

1.—Area and Scope.

This Award shall apply to all workers engaged in the occupations mentioned herein and employed in or in connection with the Wood Distillation, Charcoal Iron and Steel Industry at Wundowie, as carried on by the Minister for Industrial Development: Provided it shall not apply to workers in this industry who are covered by the Timber Workers' General Award No. 17 of 1947.

2.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be one year from the date hereof.

3.—Hours for Day Workers.

The week's work for day workers shall consist of forty (40) hours, to be worked in five (5) shifts of eight (8) hours each, exclusive of crib time, or in such other manner as shall be mutually agreed upon between the Management and the Union.

4.—Overtime for Day Workers.

(i) All time worked in excess of the daily rostered hours shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter.

(ii) Work performed on Sunday shall be at the rate of double time, except in connection with repairs to the employer's machinery which has broken down and caused a stoppage of operations, in which case the rate of time and a half shall apply.

(iii) When called upon to work without a break of eight (8) hours from the end of the preceding shift, a worker shall be paid at the rate of time and a half until he is allowed a break of at least eight (8) hours, and then to the commencement of such break only.

5.—Hours for Continuous Process and other Continuous Shift Workers.

The normal hours of work, including work performed on Sunday, shall be forty (40) hours per week, to be worked in five (5) days of the week. Such shifts to be of eight (8) hours each, including crib time.

6.—Overtime and Penalty Rates for Continuous Process and other Continuous Shift Workers.

(a) All time worked in excess of the normal hours of eight (8) per shift shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter: Provided that a worker called back to perform another shift on Sunday, after having completed his five shifts of eight hours, shall be paid at the rate of double time for the time so worked.

(b) Subject to paragraph (a) hereof, work performed on Sunday shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for the first eight (8) hours and double time thereafter.

(c) Overtime and shift work rates shall not be cumulative on Sunday penalty rates.

(d) Overtime rates shall not apply when excess time is worked due to private arrangements between the workers themselves, or where the overtime is caused owing to a relief man not coming on at his appointed time, or where an extra shift is necessary to effect the customary periodical rotation of shifts.

(e) If a man is called upon to work without a break of eight (8) hours from the end of his preceding shift, he shall be paid at the rate of time and a half until he is allowed a break of at least eight hours, and then to the commencement of such break only.

(f) Shift workers other than day shift workers shall be paid five per cent (5%) in addition to their ordinary rates for afternoon shift, and seven and a half per cent. (7½%) for night shift.

(g) In the event of the Court delivering a decision on penalty rates for week-end work, liberty is reserved to the parties to apply for amendment of this clause.

7.—Annual Leave.

(a) (i) Except as hereinafter provided, a period of two consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve months' continuous service with such employer.

(ii) Seven-day shift workers, i.e., a shift worker who is rostered to work regularly on Sundays and holidays, shall be allowed, in addition to the leave to which he is entitled under clause (a) (i) hereof, seven consecutive days' leave, including non-working days.

Where an employee with twelve months' continuous service is engaged for part of the twelve-monthly period as a seven-day shift worker, he shall be entitled to have the part of two consecutive weeks' annual leave prescribed in subclause (a) (i) hereof increased by half a day for each completed month he is continuously engaged as aforesaid.

(b) If any holiday under this Agreement falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day, there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(c) (i) Subject to paragraph (ii), when computing the annual leave due under this clause, no deduction shall be made from such leave in respect of the period that a worker is on annual leave and/or holidays: Provided that no deductions shall be made for any approved period a worker is absent from duty through sickness, with or without pay, unless the absence exceeds three (3) calendar months, in which case deduction may be made for such excess only.

(ii) Approved periods of absence from work caused through accident sustained in the course of employment shall not be considered breaks in continuity of service, but the first six months only of any such period shall count as service for the purpose of computing annual leave.

(d) In the event of a worker being employed for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period.

(e) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause, other than for pecculation or theft, shall be entitled to receive payment for any annual leave which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service: Provided always that if the worker has been dismissed for pecculation or theft, no claim for annual leave shall be recognised. Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated annual leave or payment therefor.

(f) When work is closed down for the purpose of allowing annual leave to be taken, workers with less than a full year's service shall only be entitled to payment during such period for the number of days' leave due to them. Provided that nothing herein contained shall deprive the Department of its right to retain such workers at work during the close-down period as may be essential.

(g) "Ordinary wages," for the purpose of subclause (a) hereof, shall mean the rate of wage the worker has received for the greatest proportion of the calendar month prior to his taking the leave.

(h) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

8.—Public Holidays.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided, each of the following days, or the day observed in lieu thereof, shall be allowed as a holiday to all workers and be paid for, namely:—New Year's Day, Australia Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

(b) Whenever any holiday falls on an employee's ordinary working day and the employee is not required to work on such day, he shall be paid for the ordinary hours he would have worked on such day if it had not been a holiday. If he is required to work on a holiday, he shall be paid for the time worked as if it was an ordinary working day and shall, in addition, be allowed a day's leave with pay to be added to the annual leave or to be taken at some subsequent date, if the worker so agrees.

(c) In the case of workers working a five-day week, no payment or a day in lieu shall be granted for any public holiday falling on a Saturday.

(d) Payment for holidays shall be in accordance with the usual hours of work.

(e) When a worker is off duty owing to leave without pay or sickness, including accidents on or off duty, except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay, any holiday falling during such absence shall not be treated as a paid holiday. Where the worker is on duty or available on the working day immediately preceding a holiday, or resumes duty, or is available on the working day immediately following a holiday, as prescribed in this clause, the worker shall be entitled to a paid holiday on all such holidays.

(f) A casual worker shall not be entitled to payment for any holiday referred to in this clause.

9.—Contract of Service.

(a) Except in the case of a casual worker, whose engagement shall be by the hour, the contract of service of every worker shall be on a weekly contract, terminable on either side by giving one week's notice given on any day, or by payment on any day of one week's wages in lieu of such notice.

(b) Any worker not attending for duty shall lose his pay for the actual time of such non-attendance, subject to the provisions of clause 7, or such absence is on account of holidays to which the worker is entitled under the provisions of this Award. This clause does not affect the right of dismissal for misconduct, in which case wages shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only.

(c) The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed, because of any strike by the Union or Unions affiliated with it, or by any other Association or Union, or through any breakdown of the employer's machinery, or from any other cause for which the employer is not responsible. The decision as to whether it is too wet to work shall rest with the officer in charge, if available, and in his absence, the foreman.

10.—Sick Leave.

(a) (i) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-twelfth (1/12th) of a week's pay for each completed month of service.

(ii) The liability of the employer shall in no case exceed one (1) week's wages during each calendar year in respect of each worker, but the sick leave herein provided shall be allowed to accumulate, and any portion unused in any year may be availed of in the next or any succeeding year.

(iii) Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred.

(b) The clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act, 1912-1944.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefit of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer or his representative of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) consecutive working days or more.

(d) No payment shall be made for any absence due to the worker's own fault, neglect, or misconduct.

(e) (i) Periods of service of less than one (1) month shall not be included as service for the computation of sick leave.

(ii) Periods of one (1) month and over shall be totalled and payment for sick leave computed on the total of such service during the year.

11.—Time and Wages Record.

The employer shall keep, or cause to be kept, a time and wages record, wherein shall be entered the name of each worker, the nature of his work each day, the hours worked each day, and the wages and other allowance paid each week. Such book shall be open for inspection by an accredited representative of the Union at the plant office during working hours.

12.—Casual Workers.

Workers employed for less than one week shall be paid ten per cent. (10%) above the rate specified for the work.

13.—Board of Reference.

A Board of Reference shall be appointed for the purpose of this Award. The Board shall consist of a chairman who shall be a person selected by the representatives of the parties, and two other representatives, one to be appointed by the employer and one by the Union. There shall be assigned to such Board the functions of—

HAVING heard Mr. R. C. Cole on behalf of the applicant, Mr. J. G. White on behalf of The Operative Painters and Decorators' Industrial Union of Workers, Perth, and Mr. F. S. Cross on behalf of the respondents, the Court, in pursuance of the powers contained in section 92 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1948, doth hereby order and declare that Award No. 15A of 1946 be and the same is hereby amended in the manner following:—

Clause 1.—Definition.

Delete from this clause the words "Liberty is reserved to apply in respect of a definition," and insert in lieu thereof the following:—

"Leadlight drawer and/or designer" shall mean a worker substantially engaged in the preparation in any manner of—

(a) designs for leadlight and/or zinlight and/or copperlight panels, windows or other glass work; or
(b) designs for panels, windows or other glass work (including any of its kindred products) which is to be sandblasted,

and who may be called upon to prepare masks and sandblast in connection with any of the foregoing, but shall not apply to any work performed by a signwriter as defined by Award No. 65 of 1947.

Between No. 65 of 1947: The Operative Bricklayers and Rubble Wallers' Industrial Union of Workers, Perth, W.A. No. 16 of 1947: The Builders' Labourers' Union of Workers of Perth, Western Australia. No. 28 of 1946: The Operative Painters and Decorators' Industrial Union of Workers, Perth. No. 68 of 1947: Western Australia Society of Operative Plasterers' Industrial Union of Workers, Perth. No. 73 of 1947: The West Australian Plumbers and Sheet Metal Workers' Industrial Union of Workers, Perth; The West Australian Plumbers and Sheet Metal Workers' Industrial Union of Workers (Fremantle Branch). No. 15 of 1948: The Operative Stonemasons' Union of Workers of Western Australia. No. 25 of 1947: Western Australian Amalgamated Society of Carpenters and Joiners' Association of Workers; Fremantle Amalgamated Society of Carpenters and Joiners' of Australia Industrial Union of Workers; Kalgoorlie Amalgamated Society of Carpenters and Joiners' Industrial Union of Workers, Applicants, and Master Builders' Association of Western Australia (Union of Employers) and others, Respondents.

The Court of Arbitration of Western Australia doth hereby make the following Award in connection with the Industrial dispute between the abovenamed parties:—

Supplementary Award.

This Award shall be read in conjunction with, and so as to form part thereof, of the abovementioned Award.

Clause 1.—Definitions.

Subclause (b) "Builders' labourers."

Delete paragraph (1) (c) of this subclause and insert in lieu thereof the following:—

(c) A worker engaged in the finishing of granolithic surfaces which can be completed by him in sixteen (16) hours' working time or less.

Subclause (d) "Painting."

Delete paragraphs (i) and (ii) of this subclause and insert in lieu thereof the following:—

(i) "Painter" means a worker engaged in any manner whatsoever in connection with—

(a) the painting of buildings of any nature, fences, petrol or oil containers of over fifty (50) gallons capacity, bridges (whether constructed of iron or wood, or partly of iron and partly of wood), wireless masts or flagpoles when erected; or

(b) graining, paperhanging, decorating, glazing, marbling, gilding, putty-glazing, kalsomining, distemper, colour washing (but not lime washing, except where the lime wash is mixed with colour), staining, varnishing, plastic relief, stripping off of old papers, removing of old paint or varnish; and

(c) the preparation of all work connected with any of the above branches of the trade, and of all materials required for any of the above branches of the trade;

but the term shall not include one worker, who is employed for the purpose of mixing plastic material with its necessary vehicle and cleaning up floors and wood work after the application of plastic relief, and such worker shall be classed as a builders' labourer.

"Lime washing" means the application to surfaces by means of a spray or brush of lime which has been slacked down with water or binder.

(ii) "Glazier" means a worker who—

(a) fits and fixes leadlights and stained windows into prepared positions; or

(b) cuts glass or any of its kindred products, including vitralite, and/or fits and fixes it either with putty or beads (either nailed or screwed) into any place prepared for its reception by a tradesman;

(c) masks and/or cuts and/or sandblasts, but does not include a worker engaged as a designer, who also performs the work hereinbefore referred to in this paragraph;

Provided that nothing in this definition shall apply to work done by shop salesmen, picture frame or furniture makers, or to any other worker who is at the date of this Award bound by any Industrial Award of the Court of Arbitration or Industrial Agreement made under the provisions of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1948, and registered in the Court of Arbitration. Subclause (g) Stonemasonry.

Delete the whole of subclause (g) and insert the following in lieu thereof:—

"Stonemason" means a worker who cuts by hand and/or fixes all classes of natural stone that has to be cut to a mould or template, or which has to be proven by a square or straight edge or set to a level or line.

The term "stonemason" shall also include a worker who fixes manufactured stone to the facade of a building.

"Natural stone" includes granite, trachite, slate, bluestone, limestone, marble and sandstone.

Between Australian Workers' Union, Westralian Branch, Industrial Union of Workers, Applicant, and The State (W.A.) Alumite Industry, Respondent.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties, and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination, and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference, and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective representatives and requested the Court to make the said Agreement an Award of the Court: Now, therefore, the Court, pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, and all other powers therein enabling it, hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court.

Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note.—Wherever the word "Award" occurs herein, it shall be taken to mean and include "Agreement.")

Clause 1.—Term.

The term shall be for a period of one (1) year from the agreed date of coming into force of this Award.

Clause 2.—Scope.

The Award shall cover all workers specified hereunder employed by the Respondent throughout the State.

Clause 3.—Rates of Wages.

Clause 4.—Hours.

(a) Day Workers.

The week's work for a day worker shall consist of forty (40) hours, to be worked in five (5) days of eight (8) hours each, Monday to Friday inclusive. Overtime shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter. Work carried out on Sundays shall be at the rate of double time, except in connection with repairs to the employer's machinery which has broken down and caused a stoppage of operations, when the rate of time and a half shall apply. If a worker is called upon to work without a break after eight (8) hours from the end of the preceding shift, he shall be paid at the rate of time and a half until he is allowed a break of at least eight (8) hours.

(b) Continuous Process and other Continuous Shift Workers.

(i) The normal hours of work, excluding work performed on Sundays, shall be eighty (80) per fortnight, to be worked in ten (10) shifts of eight (8) hours each, including crib time.

(ii) All time worked in excess of or outside of the normal hours of eight (8) per shift shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter. Work done on Sundays shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for a shift of eight (8) hours and double time for any time over eight (8) hours: Provided that a worker who has worked his ten (10) shifts of eight (8) hours, excluding Sunday, and is called upon to perform another shift other than a Sunday shall be paid at overtime rates. Time worked on Sunday shall stand alone and shall not be included in the weekly hours for the purpose of calculating overtime.

(iii) Overtime rates shall not apply to excess time due to private arrangements between the workers themselves, or for one hour where the overtime is caused owing to a relieving man not coming on at the appointed time, or where overtime is necessary for effecting periodical rotation of shifts.

(iv) If a man is called upon to work without a break of eight hours from the end of his preceding shift, he shall be paid at the rate of time and a half until he is allowed a break of at least eight hours.

(v) Shift workers other than day shift workers shall be paid five per cent (5%) in addition to their ordinary rates for afternoon shift and seven and a half per cent. (7½%) for night shift.

(vi) Overtime and shift work rates shall not be cumulative on Sunday penalty rates.

(vii) (1) Subject and except as hereinafter provided, the ordinary working hours shall not exceed eight (8) hours on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

(2) (a) The employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates, and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.

(b) The Union or any worker or workers covered by this Award shall not in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be party to or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

(c) This subclause shall remain in operation until otherwise determined by the Court.

Liberty to apply is reserved to either party for amendment to subclause 4 (b).

Clause 5.—Annual Leave.

(a) (i) Except as hereinafter provided, a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.

(ii) Seven-day shift workers, i.e., shift workers who are rostered to work regularly on Sundays and holidays, shall be allowed, in addition to subclause (a) (i) hereof, seven (7) consecutive days' leave, including non-working days.

Where an employee with twelve (12) months' continuous service is engaged for part of the twelve-monthly period as a seven-day shift worker, he shall be entitled to have the part of two (2) weeks' consecutive days' annual leave described in subclause (a) (i) hereof increased by half a day for each month he is continuously engaged as aforesaid.

(b) If any Award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day, there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(c) (i) Subject to paragraph (ii), when computing the annual leave due under this clause, no deduction shall be made from such leave in respect of the period that a worker is on annual leave and/or holidays: Provided that no deductions shall be made for any approved period a worker is absent from duty through sickness with or without pay, unless the absence exceeds three (3) calendar months, in which case deduction may be made for such excess only.

(ii) Approved periods of absence from work caused through accident sustained in the course of employment shall not be considered breaks in continuity of service, but the first six (6) months only of any such period shall count as service for the purpose of computing annual leave.

(d) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer.

(e) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause, other than for peculation or theft, shall be entitled to receive payment for any annual leave which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service: Provided always that if the worker has been dismissed for peculation or theft, no claim for annual leave shall be recognised. Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated annual leave or payment therefor.

(f) When work is closed down for the purpose of allowing annual leave to be taken, workers with less than a full year's service shall only be entitled to payment during such period for the number of days' leave due to them: Provided that nothing herein contained shall deprive the Department of its right to retain such workers to work during the close-down period as may be essential.

(g) "Ordinary wages," for the purpose of subclause (a) hereof, shall mean the rate of wage the worker has received for the greatest proportion of the calendar month prior to his taking the leave.

(h) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

Clause 6.—Public Holidays.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided, each of the following days, or the day observed in lieu thereof, shall be allowed as a holiday to all workers and be paid for, namely:—New Year's Day, Australia Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

(b) Whenever any holiday falls on an employee's ordinary working day, and the employee is not required to work on such day, he shall be paid for the ordinary hours he would have worked on such day if it had not been a holiday. If he is required to work on a holiday, he shall be paid for the time worked as if it was an ordinary working day, and shall, in addition, be allowed a day's leave with pay to be added to the annual leave, or to be taken at some subsequent date, if the worker so agrees.

(c) In the case of workers working a five-day week, no payment or a day in lieu shall be granted for any public holiday falling on a Saturday.

(d) Payment for holidays shall be in accordance with the usual hours of work.

(e) When a worker is off duty owing to leave without pay, or sickness, including accidents on or off duty, except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay, any holiday falling during such absence shall not be treated as a paid holiday. Where the worker is on duty, or available on the working day immediately preceding a holiday, or resumes duty or is available on the working day immediately following a holiday, as prescribed in this clause, the worker shall be entitled to a paid holiday on all such holidays.

(f) A casual worker shall not be entitled to payment for any holiday referred to in this clause.

Clause 7.—Mixed Functions.

If a worker be employed on work classified at a higher minimum than his ordinary work for more than two hours in any shift, he should be paid the minimum rate for such work for the whole of that shift. If he is employed for less than two hours, he should be paid at his ordinary rate for the whole shift.

Clause 8.—Accident Pay.

In the event of a worker meeting with an accident during the shift, or being required to attend to one who has met with an accident, he shall be deemed to have rendered duty during the whole of the shift and be paid accordingly.

Clause 9.—Full Payment for Shift.

(a) After beginning a shift, workers shall not be paid less than for a full shift, unless they leave of their own accord, or are dismissed for misconduct. This shall not apply in matters beyond the control of the Management.

(b) If before a worker leaves the works at the end of his shift, and because he is not so informed, he attends at the next shift willing to work it, and there is no suitable work which he is allowed to perform, he shall be paid the wages he would have been entitled to if he had worked the shift he was ready and willing to work. This shall not apply in matters beyond the control of the management.

Clause 10.—Casual Workers.

Workers employed for less than one week shall be considered casual and shall receive ten per cent (10%) above the rates specified for the work.

Clause 11.—Board of Reference.

(a) A Board of Reference is to be appointed for the purpose of this Award. This Board shall consist of a chairman, who shall be a person selected by the representative of the parties, and two other representatives, one to be the manager or his nominee representing the employer, and the other a representative of the Union, which may at any time, by notification to the employer and the Registrar, change such representative.

(b) There shall be assigned to such Boards the functions of—

(i) deciding matters specifically referred to in the Award as being the subject matter of a decision of the Board;

(ii) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Award or any of them;

(iii) deciding all matters and questions referred to in the Award as being the subject of mutual agreement, if not agreed upon;

(iv) deciding any other matters that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time.

(c) An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, which for this purpose are embodied in and form part of this Award (Regulation 92).

(d) There shall be no cessation of work, pending the reference to and the settlement of any dispute by the Board.

Clause 12.—Pieceworkers.

(a) The rate of payment for any system of piecework shall be fixed on the basis that it shall be sufficient to yield to a worker of average capacity for a full week's work of the ordinary hours at least ten (10) per cent. above the minimum time rate of pay as prescribed herein for such week's work: Provided that, where a worker works part of a full week at piecework rates and part at time rates, he shall be paid so much as he is entitled to receive under such piecework rates plus the proportionate amount which he is entitled to receive under this Award at time rates of pay.

(b) As far as reasonably practicable, the provisions of this Award relating to holiday pay shall apply to pieceworkers. Holiday pay shall only be payable when the Officer-in-Charge is satisfied that the pieceworker has qualified for such payment.

(c) All disputes between the department and the union as to any matters relating to payment by results, including any question as to whether the rates or prices are properly based on the capacity of an average workman, and as to the extension of any system of payment by results by the department to workers shall, in default of agreement between the department and the union, be referred to the Board of Reference.

Clause 13.—Absence Through Sickness.

(a) (i) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-twelfth (1/12th) of a week's pay for each completed month of service.

(ii) The liability of the employer shall in no case exceed one (1) week's wages during each calendar year in respect of each worker but the sick leave herein provided shall be allowed to accumulate and any portion unused in any year may be availed of in the next or any succeeding year.

(iii) Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred.

(b) The clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act, 1912-1944.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefit of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer or his representative of sickness but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) consecutive working days or more.

(d) No payment shall be made for any absence due to the worker's own fault, neglect or misconduct.

(e) (i) Periods of service of less than one (1) month shall not be included as service for the computation of sick leave.

(ii) Periods of one (1) month and over shall be totalled and payment for sick leave computed on the total of such service during the year.

Clause 14.—Contract of Service.

(a) Contract of service shall be by the day and shall be terminable by one day's notice on either side except in the case of a casual worker when one hour's notice shall suffice.

(b) The employer shall be under no obligation to pay for any day not worked on which the worker is required to present himself for duty except such absence is due to illness and comes within the provisions of clause 13 (Absence Through Sickness) or such absence is on account of holidays to which the worker is entitled under the provisions of this Award.

(c) This clause does not affect the right to dismiss for misconduct and in such cases wages shall be paid up to time of dismissal only.

(d) The employer shall be entitled to deduct for any day or portion of a day on which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the union or unions affiliated with it or by any other association or union associated with it, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

(e) The rate of payment in the Wages clause is for the purpose of convenience expressed in the weekly amount.

Clause 15.—Inspection of Wages Sheets.

The wages sheets of the employer shall be open for inspection by the secretary or other authorised officer of the union upon reasonable notice being given of his desire to inspect same.

Clause 16.—Long Service Leave.

The conditions governing the granting of long service leave to full-time Government wages employees generally shall apply to workers covered by this Award.

Clause 17.—Preference to Unionists.

Liberty to apply is reserved to parties to this Award in regard to the provision of a Preference Clause.

This Award supersedes Award No. 16 and 17 of 1944 (as amended).

INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT.

No. 5 of 1949.
(Registered 9/2/1949.)

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, this 5th day of January, 1949 between the Federated Clerks' Union of Australia, Industrial Union of Workers (W.A. Branch), (hereinafter called the Union) of the one part and The Minister in charge of State Engineering Works (hereinafter called the Minister) of the other part, witnesseth as follows:—

1.—Scope.

This Agreement shall apply to all employees of the State Engineering Works, male or female, engaged on clerical work or as telephonists, with the exception of permanent officers employed under the Public Service Act, 1904-1947.

2.—Definitions.

“Director” shall mean the Director of Works, Public Works Department.

“Metropolitan Area” shall be taken to include all places within a radius of fifteen miles from the Perth Railway Station.

3.—Hours of Duty.

As from the date of signature to this Agreement, the ordinary hours of duty shall be 37½ hours per week, to be worked in five days from Mondays to Fridays, inclusive, with the exception of the despatch clerk and the works clerk, whose hours of duty shall be 40 per week.

4.—Classification.

The classification of positions and employees and the fixing of salaries of employees shall be vested in the Minister, subject to the right of appeal as provided in clause 26 of this Agreement.

In making a classification under this clause, the Minister shall adhere to the salary scales provided in this Agreement.

5.—Basic Wage.

The basic wage hereinafter referred to shall be as determined from time to time by the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia, but at the date of operation of this Agreement was £5 12s. 9d. per week for males and £3 0s. 11d. per week for females.

“Basic rate” means in the case of males and females employed in the Metropolitan Area, the nearest £ to the result obtained by multiplying the male or female basic wage, respectively, for that area, as declared from time to time by the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia, by fifty-two and one-sixth (52 1/6th). At the date of operation of this Agreement the basic rate for males was £294 per annum and for females £159 per annum.

6.—Male Juniors.

(a) The rates of pay of male juniors under the age of 21 years shall be:—

(b) A junior who is a married man or who is the support of those related to him, on approval of the Director, shall be paid an allowance equivalent to the next higher grade than the rate of pay according to age.

7.—Male Adults.

(a) Male adults shall be paid the following margins over the basic rate:—

Provided that—

(i) An employee aged 22 years at the date of engagement shall be paid not less than the second year of service rate.

(ii) An employee aged 25 years or over at the date of engagement shall be paid not less than the third year of service rate.

(b) Classes and grades beyond a margin of £125 per annum over the basic rate shall be those set out in clause 11, subclause (a) of this Agreement.

(c) A male adult who is a married man or who is the support of those related to him, on the approval of the Director, shall be paid an allowance equivalent to the next higher grade than the rate of pay according

to years of adult service, with a maximum margin, inclusive of such allowance, of one hundred and twenty-five pounds (£125) per annum over the basic rate: Provided that the employee concerned has served continuously with the State Engineering Works for a period of at least two years in a clerical capacity.

(d) An employee retained on the maximum of the automatic range for five (5) years shall be paid an allowance of fourteen pounds (£14) per annum: Provided that such employee is eligible and would be recommended for promotion on the grounds of efficiency and good conduct; such allowance to cease on promotion to a higher position or an employee refusing to accept promotion.

8.—Female Junior Clerks, Typists and Machinists.

The rates of pay of female junior clerks, typists and machinists under the age of 21 years shall be:—

(a) Female adult clerks, typists and machinists shall be paid the following margins over the basic rate:—

(b) Classes and grades beyond a margin of £125 per annum over the basic rate shall be those set out in clause 11, subclause (a) of this agreement.

(c) An employee who has been in receipt of a rate of pay equivalent to a margin of one hundred and twenty-five pounds (£125) per annum over the basic rate for one year or more shall be paid an allowance of fourteen pounds (£14) per annum, provided that—

- (i) in the case of a typist or clerk-typist she passes an examination in shorthand writing at the rate of 120 words and typewriting at the rate of 50 words per minute, respectively;
- (ii) in the case of a machinist she passes an examination in bookkeeping and the operation of ledgerposting machines.

Such allowance to cease on promotion to a higher position.

(d) An employee retained on the maximum of the automatic range for five (5) years and who is not in receipt of the allowance referred to in subclause (c) hereof shall be paid an allowance of fourteen pounds (£14) per annum: Provided that such employee is eligible and would be recommended for promotion on the grounds of efficiency and good conduct; such allowance to cease on promotion to a higher position, or an employee refusing to accept promotion.

10.—Female Telephonists and Assistants.

The rates of pay of female telephonists and assistants shall be:—

Provided that in any case a female employee appointed on years of service basis shall be paid an amount at least equivalent to the basic rate upon attaining the age of 21 years.

(b) In making a classification under this clause the Minister may—

- (i) amalgamate any two (2) classes;
- (ii) fix a limit at the following places only—
within Class 6 at the minimum and intermediate grade;
within Class 5 at the intermediate grade;
within Class 2 at the intermediate grade.

12.—Variations of Classes and Grades.

The various salary rates set out in this Agreement shall be varied automatically to conform to any variations which may be made from time to time in the equivalent salary rates applying to officers under the Public Service Act, 1904-1947. Any such variations shall apply from the date that the variations have effect in respect of officers employed under the Public Service Act, 1904-1947.

13.—Annual Increments.

Subject to the certification of the Director as to good conduct, diligence and efficiency, employees classified in the classes referred to in Clause 11, subclause (a) of this Agreement shall proceed from the minimum to the maximum of respective classes by annual increments according to the grades in such classes. In the case of all other employees progression from year to year shall be subject to a similar certification.

14.—Qualifications Allowance.

(a) A male adult who obtains a Diploma of Commerce at the University of Western Australia, or passes the final examinations of a recognised Institute of Accountants, or Secretaries or Cost Accountants, or passes in five units (including English I.) of a degree course in Arts, Science or Law at the University of Western Australia, or who obtains an equal qualification approved by the Director, shall be paid, whilst in receipt of a rate of pay not exceeding a margin of two hundred and thirty-seven pounds (£237) per annum, an allowance equivalent to the difference between his rate of pay and the next higher grade in the incremental scale.

(b) A male adult who obtains a Degree at the University of Western Australia in Arts, Commerce, Science or Law, or who obtains an equal qualification approved by the Director, shall be paid:—

- (i) Whilst in receipt of a rate of pay not exceeding a margin of two hundred and sixty-five pounds (£265) per annum, an allowance equivalent to the difference between his rate of pay and the second higher grade in the incremental scale.
- (ii) Whilst in receipt of a rate of pay exceeding a margin of two hundred and sixty-five pounds (£265) per annum, but not exceeding a margin of two hundred and seventy-nine pounds (£279) per annum, an

allowance equivalent to the difference between his rate of pay and the next higher grade in the incremental scale.

(c) Provided;

(i) that an employee who obtains more than one of the above qualifications shall only be entitled to payment of the allowance prescribed in either subclause (a) or subclause (b) hereof as the case may require, and no payment shall be made for more than one of the qualifications obtained;

(ii) that a qualifications allowance will not be payable if the employee concerned has had less than two years' continuous service in a clerical capacity with the State Engineering Works.

15.—Overtime.

(a) The following work when carried out by direction of the Director shall be classed as overtime:—

(i) All work performed on Saturdays, Sundays and Public Holidays.

(ii) All work performed before or after customary working hours on week days.

(b) Payment for overtime on the basis specified in subclause (d) shall only apply to employees whose margins over the basic rate do not exceed the maximum margins prescribed by Clause 11, subclause (a) for Class 3. Employees whose margins over the basic rate exceed the maximum margin prescribed for Class 3 shall be allowed equivalent time off, such time off to be taken at the convenience of the Management.

(c) No claim for payment or time off shall be allowed in respect of any day on which the additional time worked amounts to less than one hour or less than a quarter of an hour after the first hour, provided that if the total additional time worked in any week exceeds 2½ hours then such periods of less than one hour on any day shall be counted towards the completion of 2½ hours in a week.

(d) When overtime is paid for it shall be at the rate per hour ascertained by applying the following formula:—

Week Days:

For the first 5 hours in any week—
Normal hourly rate x 5/4.

For excess of 5 hours in any week—
Normal hourly rate x 3/2.

Saturday Mornings:

Normal hourly rate x 3/2.

Saturday Afternoons and Sundays:

Normal hourly rate x 2/1.

Payment for all work performed on a Public Holiday shall be computed on the basis of ordinary time and shall be paid in addition to the day's pay which the employee would ordinarily receive in respect of such holiday.

For the purpose of this subclause "Normal Hourly Rate" shall not include any personal allowance, qualifications allowance and/or allowances for performing special duties unless otherwise approved by the Director.

(e) A break of at least thirty minutes must be made for meals between 12 noon and 2 p.m. when overtime is worked on a Saturday, Sunday or Public Holiday, and between 5 p.m. and 7 p.m. on any day on which overtime is worked. Such breaks shall not be recognised as overtime.

(f) The provisions of this clause shall not operate until the date of signature to this Agreement.

16.—Meal Expenditure Reimbursement.

(a) Where employees are required to work on after the usual time for ceasing duty they shall, where such additional duty necessitates taking a meal away from the usual place of residence, be reimbursed for each meal at the rate of 2/6d. and shall be reimbursed the cost of each meal necessarily taken away from the usual place of residence on Saturdays, Sundays and Public Holidays at the rate of 2/6d. for each meal, provided that in each case the overtime worked before and after the meal break totals not less than two hours.

(b) Reimbursement for expenditure on meals as provided in subclause (a) shall be in addition to payment for overtime.

17.—Higher Duties Allowance.

(a) An employee, other than one classified as a relieving officer, who is performing the duties of a position higher than that in which he himself is classified shall be paid higher duties allowance on the following basis:—

(i) When acting in a higher position for a continuous period exceeding three weeks, the minimum of which exceeds his own margin over the basic rate, the minimum of such position for the whole time he is acting.

(ii) When acting in a higher position for a continuous period exceeding three weeks, the minimum of which does not exceed his own margin over the basic rate, at the rate such employee would be receiving had he been permanently appointed to such higher position for the whole time he is acting.

Provided—

(i) that an allowance under this clause shall not be payable to a male or female employee classified as a junior or to a female employee when acting in a male position classified within the male clerical automatic range;

(ii) that a female employee acting in a male position classified above the male clerical automatic range shall be granted higher duties allowance on the basis of the female basic rate plus the male margin relative to the position in which she is acting.

(b) Where an employee classified as a relieving officer, acts or relieves in a position one class higher than his own for a continuous period exceeding one month in the same position, then higher duties allowance on the basis set out in subclause (a) shall be paid for the period in excess of one month; where a relieving officer acts or relieves in a position classified two or more classes higher than his own then the full provisions of subclause (a) shall apply.

(c) An employee acting in a higher position shall be entitled to receive an increased allowance equivalent to the annual increments he would have received had he been permanently appointed to such higher position for the whole time he is acting, provided that in the case of a relieving officer acting or relieving in a position one class higher than his own, the first month of service in the higher position shall not be taken into account.

(d) An allowance granted under this clause shall continue to be paid during periods on annual leave and sick leave not exceeding three weeks, provided that the employee had qualified for payment of the allowance by serving the required continuous period before taking such leave, and further that he resumes after such leave in the position in respect of which he was paid higher duties allowance. No payment of higher duties allowance shall be made for any period of long service leave or for any part of a period of annual leave or sick leave exceeding three weeks.

18.—Public Holidays and Annual Leave.

(a) All statutory and gazetted State Public Service Holidays within the locality to which the holidays apply shall be observed.

(b) A period of two weeks' annual leave with pay shall be granted for each year of continuous service. Where the continuous service is over one month but less than twelve months pro rata leave shall be granted.

(c) Should any of the holidays referred to in subclause (a) occur during the period an employee is on annual leave, a day in lieu of any such holiday shall be added to the period of annual leave.

19.—Long Service Leave.

(a) An employee who has completed ten years' continuous service shall be entitled to three calendar months' long service leave on full pay or six calendar months on half pay.

(b) For each subsequent period of seven years' continuous service an employee shall be entitled to an additional three calendar months' long service leave on full pay or six calendar months on half pay.

(c) The provisions of subclauses (a) and (b) shall apply as from the 25th March, 1948, provided that previous continuous service up to that date since the date an employee's last period of long service leave became due

shall only be counted in full where the conditions prescribed in relation to that previous service provided for three months' long service leave on full pay on the basis of seven years' continuous service. Where such previous service would only have entitled an employee to three months' long service leave on full pay on the basis of ten years' continuous service, then the first eighteen months of such previous service shall not be counted.

(d) Continuous service shall not include the period during which an employee is on long service leave, or any period exceeding two weeks an employee is absent on leave without pay or any service an employee may have had before reaching the age of eighteen years.

(e) An employee who resigns (except a female employee who resigns because of marriage or approaching marriage) or is dismissed, shall not be entitled to long service leave or payment for long service leave other than that leave that had actually accrued to him prior to the date on which he resigned or the date of the offence for which he was dismissed.

(f) Any Public Holidays occurring during the period in which an employee is on long service leave will be treated as part of the long service leave and extra days in lieu thereof shall not be granted.

(g) Long service leave shall be taken as it falls due at the convenience of the Management but the Minister may approve the accumulation of long service leave not exceeding six months in any particular case, provided, that in the case of an employee who on the 26th March, 1948, had accumulated or within five years of such date shall accumulate at least six months' long service leave on full pay the Minister may approve the accumulation of his long service leave entitlement (inclusive of the long service leave already accumulated) up to a maximum of twelve months.

(h) A lump sum payment for long service leave accrued in accordance with this clause and for pro rata long service leave shall be made in the following cases:—

(i) To an employee who retires at or over the age of sixty years or who is retired on the grounds of ill-health, provided that no payment shall be made for pro rata long service leave unless the employee has completed not less than twelve months' continuous service.

(ii) To a female employee who resigns on marriage or approaching marriage, provided that no payment shall be made for pro rata long service leave unless the employee had completed not less than three years' continuous service before the date on which her resignation becomes effective and provided further that she produces her marriage certificate before any payment is made.

(iii) To an employee who is retired for any other cause, provided that no payment shall be made for pro rata long service leave unless the employee had completed not less than three years' continuous service before the date of his retirement.

(iv) To the widow of an employee or to such other person as may be approved by the Minister in the event of the death of an employee, provided that no payment shall be made for pro rata long service leave unless the employee had completed not less than twelve months' continuous service prior to the date of his death.

(i) The calculation of the amount due for long service leave accrued and for pro rata long service leave shall be made at the rate of salary of an employee at the date of retirement, resignation or death whichever applies and no such payment shall exceed the equivalent of twelve months' salary.

20.—Sick Leave.

(a) An employee on production of an adequate medical certificate shall be granted sick leave as follows:—

Continuous service not exceeding six months: Three working days on full pay.

Exceeding six months but not exceeding eighteen months: Ten working days on full pay.

Exceeding eighteen months but not exceeding three years: Ten working days on full pay and ten working days on half pay.

Exceeding three years and for each triennial period after the expiration of the first three years: One month on full pay.

(b) Indisposition not necessitating confinement to the house shall not be regarded as illness in respect of which leave of absence may be granted under this clause except under special circumstances as may be approved by the Director.

(c) Sick leave shall not be granted in respect of any absence due to an employee's own fault, neglect or misconduct.

21.—Contract of Service.

The engagement of any employee shall be terminated by one week's notice on either side, such notice to expire on the usual pay day, excepting that an employee deemed guilty of gross misconduct or neglect of duty may be instantly dismissed or suspended and shall not be entitled to any such notice or payment in lieu.

22.—Accrued Rights.

(a) No privilege or concession enjoyed by employees prior to the date of operation of this Agreement shall, unless expressly provided herein, be varied or cancelled solely by reason of the provisions of this Agreement.

(b) No employee shall as a result of this Agreement suffer any reduction in the total remuneration which he may have enjoyed prior to the date of the operation thereof.

23.—Recognition of Union.

All employees bound by this Agreement shall be members of the Union: Provided that any employee appointed, who at the time of engagement is not a member of the Union, shall become a member within fourteen days.

24.—Record Book.

A record shall be kept showing the name of each employee bound by this Agreement, the hours worked each day and the amount of salary received each pay. The said record shall be open to inspection by an accredited representative of the Union during working hours.

25.—References.

A reference shall be given to an employee of not less than three months' service containing all necessary information in regard to length of service and duties performed.

26.—Rights of Appeal.

(a) An Appeal Board consisting of a Chairman, mutually agreed between the parties to this Agreement and two other Representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties, shall be set up, as may be required from time to time, to hear and determine any appeal by a member of the Union against a decision of the Minister in respect of—

(i) the title, classification, reclassification or salary of such member of the Union;

(ii) the interpretation or application of the provisions of this Agreement.

(b) The times within which written notice of appeal shall be lodged with the Director shall be as follow:—

(i) In the case of an appeal in respect of title, classification or reclassification, twenty-eight days after the publication of such title, classification or reclassification.

(ii) In the case of an appeal against any other matter, twenty-eight days after the occurrence of the matter aforesaid.

(c) The decision of the Board shall be final and binding on all parties.

27.—Term of Agreement.

This Agreement shall be for a term of three years commencing from the 26th March, 1948.

Provided that either party to this Agreement may after the 26th day of March, 1949, negotiate with the other party to amend or add to this Agreement, and if both parties agree, such Agreement may be amended by a supplementary Agreement which shall be concurrent with this Agreement.
