Workers' Compensation Act, 1912-1949. ORDER IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is enacted by section 13 of the Workers' Compensation Act, 1912-1949, that it shall be obligatory for every employer to obtain from an incorporated insurance office approved by the Minister a policy of insurance for the full amount of the liability to pay compensation under this Act to all workers employed by him but that if

an employer has established a fund for insurance against such liability and has deposited at the Treasury securities charged with all payments to become due under such liability, the Governor may, by Order in Council, exempt such employer from the operation of the said section; and whereas Millars' Timber and Trading Company Limited, of St. George's House, Perth, Western Australia, being an employer within the meaning of the said section, has, in accordance with the regulations, duly made application that it be exempted from the operation of the said section and has proved to the satisfaction of the Minister that it has established a fund for insurance against the liability to pay compensation under the said Act to all workers employed by it and has deposited at the Treasury securities (to wit, the sum of £5,000 charged with all payments to become due from the said Company under the said liability: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Administrator, the officer for the time being administering the Government of the State, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council and in exercise of the powers conferred by the said Act doth hereby exempt the said Millars' Timber and Trading Company Limited, as such employer aforesaid from the operation of section 13 of the Workers' Compensation Act, 1912-1949 for a period expiring on the 15th day of September, 1953.

Regulation No. 206, Part (C) "Special Provisions with respect to Tank

- Ships", is amended as follows:—

 1. By inserting after the word "than" where appearing in the fourth line of subparagraph (a) of paragraph (5) the words "of approved ship's boilers."
- 2. By inserting after the word "furnace" where appearing in the first line of subparagraph (c) of paragraph (5) the words and brackets "(other than that required to produce steam for pumping)", and by deleting the last sentence of the said subparagraph and inserting in lieu thereof the words "No ballasting shall be permitted unless all tanks are sealed down as required by the Harbour Master. The rate of ballasting any tank ship shall be so reduced as required by the Harbour Master, and any directions given by him for other safety measures to be taken in such ballasting shall be strictly observed. No ballasting shall be allowed by the master until he is so permitted in writing by the Harbour Master, who shall lay down such further conditions under which this work shall be carried out as he may in the circumstances deem necessary.'
 - 3. By adding the following subparagraphs to paragraph (8):-
 - (g) Pipelines and hoses shall not be coupled or uncoupled or otherwise interfered with until-
 - (i) permission so to do has been given by the Harbour Trust;
 - (ii) a representative of the Harbour Trust is present;
 - (iii) a satisfactory electrical connection has been made between the tank ship and the shore pipelines by means of a suitable continuous bonding cable, which connection shall remain intact until all hoses have been disconnected from the tank ship at the completion of discharging or loading. The shipboard connection always to be made first and disconnected last:
 - (iv) approved equipment and tools for the purpose are available:
 - (v) a drain cock as well as a test cock has been fitted in the pipelines where required by the Harbour Master so as to enable controlled draining of hoses and pipes before they are disconnected, and to ensure that only water is in the hoses and pipes prior to such disconnection;
 - (vi) all inflammable liquid therein is cleared by pumping water as provided in subparagraph (c) of paragraph (8)

All coupling and uncoupling or other work on hoses, pipes and fittings shall be carried out under approved supervision as required by the Harbour Trust representative,

- (h) The rate of loading infiammable liquid shall be so reduced as required by the Harbour Master, and any directions given by him for other safety measures to be taken for such loading shall be strictly observed.
- (i) Arrangements shall be made by the Master of the Tank ship to ensure that there shall be a sufficient staff of officers and men available at all times, day and night, to ensure the efficient carrying on of the work, or to remove the vessel if so required.
- 4. By deleting paragraph (9) and inserting in lieu thereof the following:-
- (9) Loading or unloading of Inflammable Liquid in Bulk at Night—Subject to the approval in writing of the Harbour Master, inflammable liquid in bulk may, after sunset, be unloaded into shore tanks, and in special circumstances only, loaded into tank ships, provided that the following conditions and such other conditions as may be prescribed by the Harbour Master in special cases, are complied with—
 - (a) unless circumstances render it unavoidable pipelines and hoses shall not be coupled, uncoupled or otherwise interfered with except in daylight:
 - (b) sufficient electric floodlighting of approved type shall be provided to give ample light for all operations.
 - 5. By deleting paragraph (12) and inserting in lieu thereof the following:—
- (12) Bunkering of Infiammable Liquid Tank Ships.—Should it be necessary for an infiammable liquid tank ship to replenish bunker supplies, such operation shall only be allowed within the Inner Harbour upon permission in writing so to do being obtained from the Harbour Master.

THE Armadale-Kelmscott Road Board under and by virtue of the powers conferred on it by the Road Districts Act, 1919-1948, and of every other power enabling it in that behalf does hereby make and publish the following by-laws:

By-laws made and published in the Government Gazette on the 6th November, 1936, for the management and regulation of the Armadale Recreation Ground are hereby repealed.

- 1. In these by-laws, unless the contrary intention appears, the following words shall have the meanings assigned to them hereunder—
 - "Board" means the Armadale-Kelmscott Road
 - Board;
 "building" means and includes any building,
 erection, stall, fence, barrier, hoarding or
 other construction and includes tents and
 - caravans;
 "caretaker" shall mean a person appointed by
 the Board to take care of a recreation ground;
 - "function" means any gathering, show, sport, gymkhana, or exhibtion;
 - "license" means a license to hold a function on a recreation ground or for the training of persons or animals;
 - "person" means any person, body corporate or group of persons;
 - "recreation ground" means the grounds as set out in the Schedule of Recreation Grounds hereto.
- The Board may grant a license in the form of the Schedule hereto to a person to hold or organise a function on a recreation ground and may authorise a charge to be made for admission to the function and subject to such conditions or restrictions as may be imposed may grant a license to a person to carry out training operations for sports and/or for training and exercising animals.
- A license to hold a function on a recreation ground shall specify-
 - (a) the purpose for which such license is granted;
 - (b) the dates and times during which the function may be held and/or in the case of a license to train or exercise persons or animals the times and days on which such training or exercising shall be carried on and the conditions imposed in respect thereof;
 - (c) whether or not a charge is to be made for admission thereto.
- 4. No license shall be granted for a continuous period of more than $14\,$ days.
- 5. A license may be granted upon such terms and conditions as the Board may think fit and the person to whom a license is granted shall pay such fees as are set out in the Schedule hereto.
- 6. Any person desirous of obtaining a license shall make application to the Board in the form in the Schedule hereto.
- 7. No persons to whom a license has granted shall make a charge for admission to the function unless authorised to do so by the Board, and no higher charge for admission than that authorised by the Board shall be made.
- 8. No person under the influence of alcohol or acting in a riotous or disorderly manner shall attend a function.
- A person to whom a license has been granted shall prevent persons under the influence of alcohol or persons acting in a riotous or disorderly manner from attending a function.

- 10. Any person to whom a license has been granted who commits or permits the commission of a breach of any of the terms or conditions of the license shall be guilty of an offence.
- 11. The Board if satisfied that the person to whom a license has been granted has committed or permitted or authorised the commission of a breach of any of the terms or conditions of the license or has committed a breach of any of these by-laws may by notice in writing to such person cancel the license and thereupon the license shall be cancelled.
- 12. No person shall erect or permit or authorise the erection of a building on a recreation ground without the consent in writing of the Board.
- 13. Any person desirous of erecting a building on a recreation ground shall make application to the Board in the form in the Schedule hereto.
- 14. The Board may refuse to grant such consent unconditionally or may grant its consent upon such terms and conditions as it may think fit.
- 15. The consent of the Board to the erection of a building may specify—
 - (a) the purpose for which such building may be used:
 - (b) the time during which such building may be permitted to remain on the recreation ground; and
 - (c) the times when such building may be used;
 - (d) the nature of the building which may be erected;
 - (e) the position in which such building may be erected.
- 16. Any person who shall erect or use or permit or authorise the erection or use of any building on a recreation ground without the written consent of the Board or otherwise than in accordance with the terms of the written consent of the Board shall be guilty of an offence.
- 17. The Board may after having given to the person to whom a consent to erect a building on a recreation ground has been granted one calendar month's notice of its intention so to do withdraw such consent.
- 18. The Board may by notice in writing to the owner, or to the person whom it believes to be the owner of a building on a recreation ground, direct that a building erected or used on a recreation ground without the consent of the Board or erected or used otherwise than in accordance with the terms of the consent of the Board or any building in respect of which the consent to erect the sam? has been withdrawn be removed within a period of 14 days after the date of the service of the said notice.
- 19. Any person who fails to comply with a notice given by the Board to remove a building on a recreation ground shall be guilty of an offence.
- 20. No person shall cause any damage to a building on a recreation ground.
- 21. No person other than the owner or a person duly authorised in that behalf by the owner of a building on a recreation ground shall use such building.
- 22. No person shall, without the consent in writing of the Board, use a building on a recreation ground as a dwelling or for sleeping purposes.
- 23. No person who is the owner of or is a person authorised in that behalf by the owner of a building on a recreation ground shall use such building during the course of a function without the permission of the person to whom a license to hold such function has been granted.
- 24. No person shall assign or transfer his ownership of or his interest in a building on a recreation ground without having first delivered to the Board a notice of transfer duly completed in the form in the Schedule hereto.
- 25. In the event of the non-compliance with a notice given in pursuance of by-law 18 hereof the Board may sell the building in respect of which the notice has been given or may by its servants and workmen take down and remove the said building and may sell the materials of which it is constructed and shall hold the balance of the purchase money received by it after deducting all

- costs and expenses consequent upon such failure to comply with the notice and such taking down and removal and sale upon trust for the person entitled thereto.
- 26. Any notice to be given under any of these by-laws may be signed by the secretary of the Board and may be served on the person to whom it is addressed by post in a registered letter addressed to such person. A notice so served shall for the purposes of these by-laws be deemed to be served and given on the date on which in the ordinary course of post it would reach the address to which it is sent.
- 27. No person shall damage or interfere with any property or thing placed or used in or belonging to the Board or authorised by the Board to be placed on a recreation ground, or throw stones, or other missiles or commit any nuisance therein, or leave any bottles, orange peel, paper, cast-off clothing, or any litter, rubbish, or waste matter of any kind.
- 28. No person shall stand on or climb or jump over the seats, trees, or fences of a recreation ground or cut letters, names, or marks on or otherwise damage the structures, trees, seats, gates, posts, or fences therein, or otherwise deface the same or write thereon.
- 29. No person, except those authorised by the Board shall bring into a recreation ground any horse, dog or other animal.
- 30. No person shall light any fire within a recreation ground without the permission of the Board except for cooking or other reasonable purpose and within a fireplace or other area provided for that purpose.
- 31. No person, except the officers or servants of the Board acting in the discharge of their duty, shall enter a recreation ground on such days as a license has been granted for the holding of a function except through the proper entrance for that purpose, and on payment of the fee chargeable for admission at the time.
- 32. No person shall enter a recreation ground for the purpose of playing of any games or sports or for horseracing or trotting therein, until he has first obtained a license so to do from the Board, unless he is a bona fide member of any club or sporting body authorised in that behalf.
- 33. No person or authorised club having obtained any license as aforesaid shall practice, play at, or carry on any game, sport, amusement or exercise or race any animal except upon such portions of a recreation ground as may be specified by the Board for that purpose.
- 34. No person shall enter a recreation ground without being duly authorised by the Board, nor enter any of the dressing or training rooms on a recreation ground or use any of the lockers without having first obtained an authority or license from the Board for that purpose and every person holding such authority or license shall produce and exhibit the same when required by the caretaker or person acting under the authority of the Board. Any person committing a breach of this by-law may be removed forthwith by the caretaker or any other officer or servant of the Board or of the Police Force, and such person shall also be liable to prosecution for a breach of this by-law.
- 35. No person shall address an audience or public meeting on a recreation ground without having first obtained permission so to do from the Board.
- 36. No person shall camp, lodge or tarry overnight or frequent for the purpose of camping, lodging or tarrying overnight on a recreation ground.
- 37. No person shall sell or expose for sale any food, drink, goods, wares, merchandise, or things on any portion of a recreation ground unless the consent of the Board shall have been previously obtained in writing; provided that the consent of the Board shall not be required when such person sells or exposes for sale anything with the consent of a person to whom a license has been granted to hold a function and during the period of such license.

- Any person found in a state of intoxication in a recreation ground or behaving in a disorderly manner, or creating or taking part in any distribution or using any profane, indecent or obscene language, or committing any act of indecency or misconducting himself or committing any breach of these by-laws may be removed forthwith from such recreation ground by the caretaker or by any officer or servant of the Board or by any member of the Police Force, without affecting such person's liability to prosecution for an offence person's liability to prosecution for an offence against these by-laws.
- 39. No person shall sub-let any portion of a recreation ground, the use of which may be granted to any such person, nor permit the same to be used by any other person or persons whatsoever without the written consent of the Board.
- 40. Any person who commits a breach of any of these by-laws shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

EDUCATION ACT, 1928-1943.

Education Department, Perth, 1st October, 1951.

HIS Excellency the Administrator in Executive Council, has been pleased to approve of the amendments as set out in the Schedule hereto made by the Minister for Education pursuant to the powers conferred by section 28 of the Education Act, 1928-1943, of the Education Act Regulations 1949, published in the Government Gazette on the 26th day of July, 1949, and amended from time to time thereafter by notices published in the Government Gazette.

Schedule.

1. Regulation 41 of the abovementioned regulations is amended by inserting after the word "service" in line 10 of paragraph (1) the following proviso:—

"Provided that any resignation purporting to take effect during the first or second school vacations or within seven days after the end of any such vacation may at the option of the Minister be deemed to be effective as from the last school day prior to such vacation and any resignation tendered during the Christmas vacation may at the option of the Minister be deemed to be effective from the 31st day of December of that Christmas vacation."

- 2. Insert after regulation 47 a new regulation 47A as follows:—
 - 47A. Teachers appointed to schools in remote areas of the State shall be paid allowances subject to the following conditions:—
 - (1) Places within a radius of 50 miles from the G.P.O., Perth, are excluded from the proposed allowances.
 - (2) In the remainder of the State, allowances shall be paid in respect of schools which qualify under categories E, F, G and H (see below), subject to the following provisions:—
 - (a) No allowance is payable in respect of centres having schools of Class II or higher classifications, i.e., Country High School towns and Katanning, Narrogin, Merredin, Harvey, Busselton, Manjimup, Mt. Barker and such other towns when the school rises to a Class II status.
 - (b) Schools on the Trans-Australian Railway and in the Northern and North-Western Divisions of the State shall continue to receive their present allowances under Regulation 47.
 - (c) Schools, other than those mentioned in paragraph 2 (b) above, which are at present receiving allowances under regulation 47 shall receive either their present allowances or a remote area allowance whichever is the greater.
 - (3) A complete school year's work in a school in respect of which a remote allowance is payable shall entitle a teacher to a complete year's allowance.
 - (4) In cases where a teacher in receipt of a remote allowance is absent on sick leave for more than a fortnight, the continued payment of the allowance shall be at the discretion of the Minister. The allowance shall not be paid to teachers on long service leave.
 - (5) A single teacher, on satisfactory proof being supplied that he is the sole support of relatives who reside in this State, may for the purpose of these allowances be considered a married man.
 - (6) For the purpose of calculating remote allowances, schools shall be classified as follows:—

Grade E Schools.

Those in towns with reasonably adequate shopping and other facilities which are situated on a main trunk railway more than 150 miles from Perth.

For the purposes of this regulation the following are regarded as main trunk lines:-

Perth-Kalgoorlie

Perth-Albany.

Perth-Busselton and to Pemberton.

Perth-Geraldton.

Grade E schools shall be classified as E, E2, E3, etc., acording to their distance from Perth.

E1 151—250 miles from Perth. E2 251—350 miles from Perth.

E3 351-450 miles from Perth.

E4 451-550 miles from Perth. E5 551-650 miles from Perth.

E6 over 650 miles from Perth.

Grade F Schools.

Those in towns with reasonably adequate shopping and other facilities, which are situated more than 100 miles from Perth on a railway that is not designated a main trunk railway and/or on a railway bus route.

Grade F schools shall be classified as F1, F2, F3, etc., according to their distance from Perth.

F1 101—200 miles from Perth. F2 201—300 miles from Perth. F3 301—400 miles from Perth. F4 401—500 miles from Perth.

F5 501-600 miles from Perth.

F6 over 600 miles from Perth.

Grade G Schools.

Those which are situated either on a railway line or on a railway bus route more than 100 miles from Perth, and are more than 10 miles from the nearest shopping

Grade G schools shall be classified as G1, G2, G3, etc., according to their distance from the nearest shopping centre.

G1 11—20 miles from nearest shopping centre. G2 21—30 miles from nearest shopping centre. G3 31—40 miles from nearest shopping centre. G4 41—50 miles from nearest shopping centre.

G5 51—60 miles from nearest shopping centre. G6 over 60 miles from nearest shopping centre.

Teachers holding appointments in Grade G schools shall receive the allowance, if any, payable in respect of the nearest "E" or "F" centre, in addition to an allowance in accordance with the above table.

Grade H Schools

Those which are not situated on a railway line or on a railway bus route, which are more than 50 miles from Perth, and more than 5 miles from the nearest shopping centre.

Grade H schools shall be classified as H1, H2, H3, etc., according to their distance from the nearest shopping

6—15 miles from nearest shopping centre.

H2 16—25 miles from nearest shopping centre.

H3 26—35 miles from nearest shopping centre. H4 36—45 miles from nearest shopping centre. H5 46—55 miles from nearest shopping centre.

H6 over 55 miles from nearest shopping centre.

Allowances if any for centre shall be payable in addition as in the case of ${\bf G}$ rade ${\bf G}$ schools.

- (7) In cases where a school graded E, F or G is situated on both a railway line and a railway bus route, the distance from Perth for the purpose of determining a remote allowance shall be by the shortest route.
- (8) Any school that has been denied an allowance under the foregoing conditions may, in the light of peculiar circumstances, be placed in a category to receive an allowance at the discretion of the Minister.
- (9) The scale of allowances payable in respect of the above categories shall be as follows:-

No. 257 of 1951.

Between Coastal and E.G. Government Water, Sewerage and Drainage Employees' Industrial Union of Workers, Applicant, and Hon. Minister for Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage, Respondent.

HAVING heard Mr. E. A. Hodges on behalf of the applicant and Mr. C. A. Reeve on behalf of the respondent, and by consent, the Court, in pursuance of the powers contained in Section 92 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1950, doth hereby order and declare that Award No. 461 of 1948, be and the same is hereby amended in the terms of the attached schedule, such amendments to operate as and from the commencement of the next pay period after this date.

Schedule.

Part I.

Add to subclause 21 the following:—Typical conditions under which sewerage maintenance men work on main sewers are contained in Appendix "A" of this Award.

Part II.

8.—Special Rates and Provisions, Other Monetary Allowances.

Delete Subclause 1 to 23 and insert in lieu thereof the following:—

- (1) Higher Duties.—Any worker carrying out work classified at a higher minimum than his ordinary rate for two (2) hours in any shift shall be paid at such higher minimum rate for such work for the whole of that shift. If he be employed for less than two (2) hours at work classified at a higher minimum than his ordinary rate, he shall be paid his ordinary rate for the whole shift.
- his ordinary rate for the whole shift.

 (2) Leading Hand Tradesman.—Any tradesman placed in charge of 3 or more tradesmen shall be classified as a leading hand tradesman and be paid

3s. per day i.e. 15s. per week above the tradesman rate.

- (3) Leading Hand.—When less than four men are working together away from the foreman or ganger and instructions for them are given to one of them, such worker shall be paid 2s. per day i.e. 10s. per week as a leading hand in addition to the rate prescribed for the work being performed by such worker.
- (4) Concretors Packing Around Reinforcements.—Where, in the opinion of the Engineer, the concretor packing around reinforcements is called upon to exercise greater skill than is ordinarily entailed in such work, the concretor shall receive 1s. per day above the normal rate. In case of dispute as to whether the concretor is entitled to the allowance under this subclause, the same may be determined by a Board of Reference.
- (5) Labourers Doing Lining or Marking Out.— Labourers lining or marking out shall be paid one shilling per day above their ordinary rate: Provided that this shall not apply when the foreman or ganger takes part in the operation.
- (6) License for Motor Lorry Drivers.—A worker definitely employed as a motor lorry driver shall pay his own license fee, except where the driving of the truck is incidental to other duties, in which case the Minister shall pay the license fee.
- (7) Trailer Allowance.—Motor lorry drivers, while driving a truck with trailer attached or any compressor, pump or machinery that is trailed on wheels shall be paid an allowance of 1s. per day. (Liberty is reserved in respect of this subclause.)
- (8) Attending Horses.—Workers attending to and feeding horses in addition to their other work shall be paid an allowance for so doing at the rate of 7s. 6d. per week for one horse and 3s. 9d. per week for each additional horse up to 18s. 9d. per week.
- (9) Platelayers (Light Tram Tracks).—Workers, when employed on this class of work (irrespective of the weight of the rail) shall be entitled to be paid 1s. 6d. per day over the basic wage.
- (10) Watchmen Controlling Traffic.—Watchmen or other workers who regulate and control vehicular traffic in busy thoroughfares shall receive an allowance of 2s. per shift above their usual rate.
- (11) Offensive Allowance.—(a) An allowance of 5s. per day shall be paid to all workers other than treatment works attendants, who come into con-

tact with the filth during the operation of cleaning out septic tanks, sand pits, ripple chambers, suction chambers of sewerage pumping stations and in the de-ragging of sewerage pumps.

- (b) Workers other than sewerage maintenance men employed on offensive work in connection with old sewers, or excavating in ground where fumes arise from decomposed material to be paid at the rate of time and a quarter during ordinary working hours.
- (c) When working in excavation trenches an allowance up to 1s. 3d. per day shall be granted to workers in water from which in the opinion of the engineer, obnoxious fumes or odours arise, and in the case of a dispute, a Board of Reference to be appointed.
- (12) Wet Places.—Any worker working in "wet places" shall be paid an allowance of 1s. 4d. per day or part of a day: Provided that—
 - (a) this allowance shall not be payable to treatment works attendants;
 - (b) this allowance shall not be payable to workers working on natural surfaces made wet by rain;
 - (c) where water tight boots are provided by the Minister no claim shall be allowed under this provision for wet feet;
 - (d) where a worker attending a burst is compelled to work in water to the thighs, he shall receive the allowance, notwithstanding the previous subparagraph (c) of this proviso.
- (13) Workers on Staging, etc.—Wet Pay.—Workers on staging when shovelling wet material shall be paid 1s. per day if and when the bottom men are being paid 1s. 4d. per day for wet work. Such workers shall not be entitled to any allowance under subclause (12) of this clause.
- (14) Dismantling Timber in Wet Ground.—Workers engaged in dismantling wet timber or handling wet timber in and around wet trenches shall receive an allowance of 1s. 4d. per day and in dry ground below a depth of 10 ft. from the natural surface an allowance of 9d. per day above the basic wage.
- (15) Handling Cement, Lime or Flyash.—(a) All workers (other than treatment works attendants, concretors or other workers receiving a margin for work which involves the use or handling of lime, cement or flyash) who are engaged—
 - (i) tipping dry cement, lime or fiyash into trucks or handling cement, lime or fiyash in machine mixing shall be paid 1s. 4d. per day allowance;
 - (ii) handling dry cement, lime or fiyash in bags shall be paid an allowance of 8d. per day;
 - (iii) opening and emptying dry cement, lime or fiyash on mixing board shall be paid an allowance of 1s. 4d. per day which shall include the allowance of 8d. per day referred to above;
 - (iv) handling ten (10) or more bags of cement, lime or flyash in the day solely within the confines of a building, shall be paid an allowance of 1s. 4d. per day which shall include the allowance of 8d. referred to in subparagraph (ii).
- (b) Olive oil shall be provided for the use of concrete, cement or flyash workers.
- (16) Concrete Drippings.—Where in the opinion of the engineer a worker is unduly exposed to concrete drippings, such worker shall receive an allowance of 8d. per day.
- (17) Tarring.—Workers engaged on tarring, except when employed on tarring pipes under subclause 18 of this clause, shall be paid an allowance of 2s. per day in addition to the ordinary wage.
- (18) Tarring, Scraping or Brushing Pipes.—
 (a) Workers engaged on one or more of the operations of tarring, scraping, brushing or cleaning cast iron or steel pipes, other than pipes laid in position and connected, shall—
 - (i) if required to work wholly within the pipe be paid an allowance of 4s. per day;
 - (ii) if actually employed operating a mechanical rumbler, be paid an allowance of 4s. per day;

- (iii) subject to paragraph (i) when operating by hand on the inside of pipes be paid an allowance of 2s. per day.
- (b) Workers engaged in tarring, scraping, brushing or cleaning the outside of cast iron pipes shall be paid an allowance of 2s. per day.
- (c) A worker actually working inside a water main (i.e., a main laid, connected and used as such) shall be paid the following margin:—

- (19) Deep Shovelling.—Shovellers working on stages in trenches shall, from the time the timber is stood, receive 1s. per day allowance. This allowance shall also apply to shovellers in stone trenches when working more than 6 ft. from the surface.
- (20) Shovelling Wet and Sticky Clay, etc.—Workers employed shovelling clay which is wet and sticky, but which does not come within the definition of "wet ground" as contained in the Award, shall be paid 1s. 4d. per day allowance.
- (21) Dollying on Scaffolding.—Workers engaged using a dolly on scaffolding shall be paid 1s. 4d. per day above their usual rate.
- (22) Under Wharves.—Workers working under wharves at Fremantle shall be paid 2s. per day allowance.
- (23) Fares for Construction Workers.—(a) In respect of all fares of construction workers who are required to start and finish on the job the Minister shall pay the worker fares actually and reasonably incurred in excess of eightpence (8d.) per day of the return fare, provided that the Minister or his representative shall have the right to require evidence of fares actually and reasonably paid.
- (b) In the case of maintenance workers who are employed on construction work, the provision of subclause (a) hereof shall not apply.
- (c) A construction worker shall have no claim for recoup of fares under this clause when a conveyance other than a public conveyance is provided by the Minister.
- (d) This clause shall not apply to maintenance workers nor to workers who regularly start and finish at the Department's yards, or stores, nor to workers required to camp on the job.

Delete clause 8, subclause 45 and insert in lieu thereof the following:—

- (45) First Aid.—(1) Where practicable one of the employees in each gang exceeding ten (10) shall be qualified in first aid.
- (2) First aid outfits shall be provided and maintained by the employer on all jobs to which this Award applies. Such outfits shall consist of at least the following:—Boracic acid, iodine, picric acid (bottle solution), 1-inch bandages, 2½-inch bandages, 4-inch bandages, lint, cotton wool, triangle bandages, lysol, permanganate of potash, snake bite scarifier, 12-inch, 18-inch, 24-inch and 30-inch splints, and one pair of scissors.

Appendix A.

Typical conditions under which sewerage maintenance men work on main sewers:—

- (a) Entering a manhole for a short period, e.g.—placing toms, collecting samples, measuring depths, changing bottles, etc., with flow on.
- (b) Working in manhole, e.g.—waiting on sand scraper, removing debris, lifting out sand, etc., with flow on.
- (c) Entering sewer one pipe length—for scraping off corrosion product samples when flow is held back or at low flow.
- (d) Entering sewer for inspection—inspections made at low flow or with flow held back.
- (e) Entering sewer for clearing blockages for direct connections.
- (f) Entering sewer between manholes—cleaning out sand, lifting on to trucks and transporting. Cleaning down soft corrosion product by air-water jet. Assisting with installation of lighting. Carrying out temporary repair work as necessary. These operations to be carried out under flow conditions if required.
- (g) Entering sewer for reconditioning work—fixing reinforcement, plastering by hand or machine, transporting material, removing rebound and cement material, curing, removing lights, spikes, final cleaning up, etc. Walls and bottom of sewer all clean of sewerage material and flow off.
- (h) Entering sewer in clean or newly reconditioned state—for chipping corrosion product control samples. Flow held back and pipe clean. This special test section upstream and downstream of M.H. 5028A,

General.

The duties enumerated from (a) to (h) are those contemplated as that of a maintenance man under this Award and for which allowances are not paid. The Department, however, agrees to pay offensive allowances in cases as under where the work is carried out under unfavourable circumstances.

- (a) No offensive allowance.
- (b) No offensive allowance.

Reeve on behalf of the Respondent, and by consent, the Court, in pursuance of the powers contained in section 92 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1950, doth hereby order and declare that Award No. 46A of 1948 be and the same is hereby amended in the terms of the attached schedule, such amendments to operate as and from the commencement of the next pay period after this date.

Part III.—Special Rates and Provisions.

7.—Special Rates and Provisions.

Delete subclauses (1) to (32) and insert in lieu thereof:—

Subclause (1) Higher Duties.—Any worker carrying out work classified at a higher minimum than his ordinary rate for two (2) hours in any shift shall be paid at such higher minimum rate for the whole of that shift. If he be employed for less than two (2) hours at work classified at a higher minimum than his ordinary rate, he shall be paid his ordinary rate for the whole shift.

Subclause (2) Leading Hand Tradesman.—Any tradesman placed in charge of three (3) or more tradesmen shall be classed as a leading hand tradesman, and be paid three shillings (3s.) per day i.e. fifteen shillings (15s.) per week, above the tradesman's rate.

Subclause (3) Leading Hand.—When less than four (4) men are working together away from the foreman or ganger, and instructions for them are given to one of them, such worker shall be paid two shillings (2s.) per day, i.e., ten shillings (10s.) per week as a leading hand in addition to the rate prescribed for the work being performed by such workers.

Subclause (4) Maintenance Man doing Caulking.—A maintenance man who caulks at odd times in the ordinary course of keeping joints tight shall not be entitled to caulkers' rates.

Subclause (5) Cleaning out Septic Tanks.—Workers engaged cleaning out septic tanks shall be paid double time rates.

Subclause (6) Cleaning out De-aerating Plant.—Workers working inside the de-aerating chamber at Mundaring Weir shall be paid two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per day extra.

Subclause (7) Old Pipes.—When a worker pulls out old pipes on the 30 inch main conduit from a trench, one shilling (1s.) per day extra shall be paid,

Subclause (8) Shovelling Wet and Sticky Clay.—Workers employed shovelling clay which is wet and sticky, but does not come within the definition of "wet ground" as contained in the Award, shall be paid one shilling and fourpence (1s. 4d.) per day allowance.

Subclause (9) Firemen and Greasers Dirt Allowance.—When brushing out and scraping boiler drums, when scraping soot off outside of diagonal tubes, when inside removing soot from combustion chambers and flues, they shall be paid five shillings (5s.) per day extra. This shall include the "P" boiler at No. 6 Pumping Station.

Subclause (10) Overhead Welding in Wet Places.—Oxywelders and electric welders engaged on overhead welding in wet places shall be paid two shillings (2s.) per day extra when waterproof mats are not provided.

Subclause (11) Concretors Packing around Reinforcements.—Where, in the opinion of the engineer, the concretor packing around reinforcements is called upon to exercise greater skill than is ordinarily entailed in such work, the concretor shall receive one shilling (1s.) per day above the normal rate. In cases of dispute as to whether the concretor is entitled to the allowance under this subclause, the same may be determined by a Board of Reference.

Subclause (12) Stacking Firewood.—Firewood shall be stacked as close to the boilers as the Machinery Superintendent considers practicable.

Subclause (13) Labourers doing Lining or Marking-out.—Labourers lining or marking-out shall be paid one shilling (1s.) per day above their ordinary rate: Provided that this shall not apply when the foreman or ganger takes part in the operation.

Subclause (14) License for Motor Lorry Drivers.—
The Minister shall pay the motor driver's license fee for any worker whose principal duties are other than motor driving, and who is occasionally required to drive a motor: Provided such person does not hold such a license for his private use.

Subclause (15) Trailer Allowance.—Motor Lorry Drivers.—Motor lorry drivers while driving a truck with trailer attached or any compressive pump or machinery that is trailed on wheels shall be paid an allowance of one shilling (1s.) per day. Liberty to apply is reserved in the case of this subclause.

Subclause (16) Attending Horses.—Workers attending to and feeding horses in addition to their other work shall be paid an allowance for so doing at the rate of seven shillings and sixpence (7s. 6d.) per week for one horse and three shillings and ninepence (3s. 9d.) for each additional horse up to eighteen shillings and ninepence (18s. 9d.) per week. Liberty to apply is reserved in the case of this subclause.

Subclause (17) Firemen and Greasers—Extra Payment for Work done after Mid-day on Saturday in certain cases.—A fireman or greaser required to work four (4) hours or portion of four (4) hours of his normal hours of duty after 12 midday on Saturday shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter for such time worked: Provided that if he has already completed his normal hours of duty by mid-day on Saturday all time worked after mid-day shall be at overtime rates.

Subclause (18) Platelayers (light tram tracks).—Workers when employed on this class of work (irrespective of the weight of the rail) shall be entitled to be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) per day over the basic wage.

Subclause (19) Watchmen controlling traffic.—Watchmen or other workers who regulate and control vehicular traffic in busy thoroughfares shall receive an allowance of two shillings (2s.) per shift above their usual rate.

Subclause (20) Offensive Allowance.—Workers employed on offensive work in connection with old sewers, or excavating in ground where fumes arise from decomposed material, or any other cause, shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter during ordinary working hours.

Subclause (21) Wet Places.—Any worker working in water and/or "wet places" shall be paid an allowance of one shilling and fourpence (1s. 4d.) per day, or part of a day, unless his classification expressly includes allowance for wet pay. Provided that—

- (a) the allowance shall not apply in the case of workers working on natural surfaces made wet by rain;
- (b) when water tight boots are provided by the Minister, no allowance shall be made for wet feet.

Subclause (22) Workers on Staging, etc.—Wet Pay.—Workers on staging when shovelling wet materials shall be paid one shilling (1s.) per day if and when the bottom men are being paid one shilling and fourpence (1s. 4d.) per day for wet work. Such workers shall not be entitled to any other allowance under subclause (22)—Wet places.

Subclause (23) Dismantling Timber in Wet Ground.—Workers engaged in dismantling wet timber or handling wet timber in or around wet trenches shall receive an allowance of one shilling and fourpence (1s. 4d.) per day, and in dry ground below a depth of ten (10) feet from the natural surface, an allowance of ninepence (9d.) per day above the basic wage.

Subclause (24) Handling Cement, Lime and Flyash.—(a) All workers (other than concretors or other workers receiving a margin for work which involves the use of handling of lime or cement) who are engaged upon—

- (i) tipping dry cement or lime or flyash into trucks or handling cement lime or flyash in machine mixing shall be paid one shilling and fourpence (1s. 4d.) per day allowance;
- (ii) handling dry cement, lime or flyash in bags shall be paid an allowance of eightpence (8d.) per day;
- (iii) opening and emptying dry cement, lime or flyash on mixing board shall be paid an allowance of one shilling and fourpence (1s. 4d.) per day which shall include the allowance of eightpence (8d.) per day referred to above;
- (iv) handling ten (10) or more bags of cement, lime or flyash in the day solely within the confines of a building, shall be paid an allowance of one shilling and fourpence (1s. 4d.) per day which shall include the allowance of eightpence (8d.) referred to in subparagraph (ii).
- (b) Olive oil shall be provided for the use of concrete, cement and flyash workers.

Subclause (25) Concrete Drippings.—Where in the opinion of the engineer any workman is unduly exposed to concrete drippings, such workers shall receive an allowance of eightpence (8d.) per day.

Subclause (26) Tarring.—Workers engaged on tarring, except when employed tarring pipes under subclause (27) of this clause shall be paid an allowance of two shillings (2s.) per day in addition to the ordinary wage.

Subclause (27) Tarring, Scraping or Brushing Pipes.—(a) Subject to the provisions of subclause (b) workers employed on one or more of the operations of tarring, scraping, brushing or cleaning cast iron or steel pipes shall be paid an allowance of—

- (i) two shillings (2s.) per day when operating by hand on the inside of pipes;
- (ii) four shillings (4s.) per day when required to work within pipes exceeding 24 inches diameter.
- (iii) two shillings (2s.) per day when employed on the outside surface of pipes.

Provided that one shilling and fourpence (1s. 4d.) per day only shall be paid when the work of cleaning and scraping is done by the hot water immersion process.

- (b) No allowance shall be made to maintenance men for tarring joints of mains on the outside when such work is part of their duties.
- (c) Workers when required to work wholly within 24 inches diameter pipes cleaning and scraping same shall be made an allowance of five shillings (5s.) per day.

Subclause (28) Deep Shovelling.—Shovellers working on stages in trenches shall, from the time the timber is stood, receive one shilling (1s.) per day allowance. This allowance shall also apply to shovellers in stone trenches when working more than six (6) feet from the surface.

Subclause (29) Dollying on Scaffolding.—Workers engaged using a dolly on scaffolding shall be paid one shilling and fourpence (1s. 4d.) per day above their usual rates.

Subclause (30) Fares when Travelling on Duty.— When instructed to travel on duty, workers shall be provided with necessary fares, except when the Minister provides the means of transport, or makes a bicycle allowance to the worker.

In Subclause (33) Travelling Time.—Alter the figures "(33)" to read "(31)".

In Subclause (34) Under-rate Workers.—Alter the figures "(34)" to read "(32)".

In Subclause (35) Junior Storeman.—Alter the figures "(35)" to read "(33)".

In Subclause (36) Pitching and Striking Temporary Camp.—Alter the figures "(36)" to read "(34)".

Delete Subclause (37) Rubber Boots and Oilskins.—And insert in lieu thereof.

Subclause (35) Rubber Boots and Oilskins.—An oilskin coat and a pair of rubber boots at the rate of one coat and one pair of boots every two (2) years shall be supplied to maintenance men.

Subclause (36) Care of Rubber Boots and Oilskins Supplied.—(a) A separate issue shall be made to each worker, who shall acknowledge receipt in writing, and be responsible for the safe-keeping and condition thereof, reasonable wear and tear excepted. When the worker leaves his employment, or when the worker's services are terminated, he shall return the issue in a condition consistent with his observance of this subclause.

(b) No worker shall lend the issue, or any part of the issue made to him to another worker, or borrow the issue made to another worker. Any breach of this clause shall be deemed to be serious and wilful misconduct, and any worker committing a breach shall be liable to summary dismissal.
