Supreme Court Act, 1935-1950. RULES OF THE SUPREME COURT, 1909.

WE, the Honourable Sir John Patrick Dwyer, K.C.M.G., Chief Justice of Western Australia, the Honourable James Leonard Walker, the Honourable Lawrence Walter Jackson and the Honourable John Evendon Virtue, Puisne Judges of the Supreme Court of Western Australia, acting in pursuance of the powers contained in the Supreme Court Act, 1935-1950, and of every other power enabling us in this behalf, do hereby amend the Rules of the Supreme Court, 1909, in the manner hereinafter mentioned, and make the undermentioned Rule of Court prescribing the fees which Commissioners for taking Affidavits for use in the Supreme Court shall be entitled to charge, and declare that such amendments and such Rule of Court shall come into operation upon publication thereof in the Government Gazette.

#### 1.—Order XXXV.

Rule 43 of Order XXXV is deleted and the following rule is inserted in lieu thereof:—

- 43. The examiners shall be entitled to charge the fees hereafter mentioned in substitution for the fees heretofore allowed—
  - (1) Upon giving an appointment to take an examination  $\begin{pmatrix} f & s. d \\ 1 & 1 & 0 \end{pmatrix}$
  - (2) For the examination (including the taking down and certifying of the evidence) or for any work of a like nature, if the time occupied in the examination is two hours or less
  - (3) If more than two hours, for every hour in excess of two hours .... .... .... ....
  - (4) If the examination is continued after six o'clock in the evening at the request of the parties, the hourly allowance of the examiner for time occupied after that hour shall be increased by fifty per cent.

The party prosecuting the order or his solicitor shall also pay all reasonable travelling and other expenses including charges for the room (other than the examiner's office) where the examination is taken and an allowance of £1 1s. an hour for the time occupied by the examiner in travelling.

The fee on appointment may be retained by the examiner whether the examination is taken or not.

The other fees and the travelling or other expenses shall be paid as soon as the examination has been concluded.

In special circumstances the Master, before the commencement of the examination, may authorise higher fees than the fees (2), (3) and (4). If a dispute arises as to the amount of fees or expenses payable under this rule it shall be referred to the Master for his decision, which shall be final.

# 2.-Appendix N.

(1) The item relating to the allowance of mileage being the second item under the heading "Services and Notices" in Appendix N is deleted and in lieu thereof the following items are inserted:—

If served at a distance of more than two miles from the nearest place of business or office of the solicitor (whether principal or agent) serving the same, such allowance is to be made as the taxing officer thinks fit.

If served by the nearest Sheriff's officer, the amount properly paid in accordance with the scale of fees authorised to be taken by the sheriff.

#### HEALTH ACT, 1911-1950. Health By-laws.

P.H.D. 87/50.

WHEREAS under the provisions of the Health Act, 1911-1950, a local authority may make by-laws and may amend, repeal or alter any by-laws so made:
Now, therefore, the Perth Road Board being a local health authority doth hereby make the following by-laws:-

#### Poultry.

- 1. The occupier of every premises upon which poultry intended for sale as food is killed, plucked, hung, dressed or cleaned shall—
  - (a) maintain such premises and all drains, fittings, apparatus, machinery, utensils, receptacles, tools and appliances used thereon in a clean condition and in good repair:
  - (b) provide upon such premises an supply of clean water together with such fittings as may be required for the purpose of making the water supply readily available for use;
  - (c) provide a sufficient supply of ablutionary appliances and fittings for the use of persons engaged in the killing, hanging, plucking, dressing and cleaning of poultry intended for sale as food and shall main-tain such ablutionary appliances clean and in good working order and condition.

- 2. No person shall kill, pluck, hang, clean or dress any poultry intended for sale as food except in a room constructed and situated and drained as follows:
  - (a) It shall measure not less than 6ft, x 6ft. x 8ft.
  - (b) It shall be flyproof and well ventilated and adequately lit.
  - (c) It shall have a floor constructed of imperrt shall have a noor constructed of impervious material with a smooth surface having a fall to a surface gutter in such a way that all liquid falling upon such floor shall be conducted by means of the surface gutter to a drain inlet situated outside the building wherein the room is situated.
  - (d) The drain shall conduct all liquids from the floor of the room directly either to a sewer or to a gully-trap and thence to a soak well.
  - (e) The room shall not be situated within 20ft. of a privy.
- The occupier of every premises upon which poultry intended for sale as food is killed, plucked, hung, cleaned or dressed shall-
  - (a) provide impervious receptacles with airtight coverings ready for use and sufficient in size and number to receive all feathers, offal, offensive and decomposable material produced upon the premises; and
  - (b) immediately place or cause to be placed in such receptacles all feathers, offal, offensive and decomposable material produced upon the premises; and
  - (c) remove from the premises the contents of such receptacles not less frequently than once in each working day.
- 4. Every person killing or preparing poultry for sale as food shall—  $\,$ 
  - (a) immediately after killing hang the bird for a period of not less than 15 minutes;
  - (b) thoroughly pluck and clean the bird within
  - 1 hour after it has been killed;(c) place the bird in cool storage immediately after it has been plucked and cleaned.
- No person shall pluck or prepare for human consumption or offer for sale or dispose of for human consumption any bird which was not at the time of killing in a healthy condition.

  6. Every person guilty of an offence against any
- of these by-laws shall be liable upon conviction-
  - (a) for a first offence to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds (£20); and
  - (b) for every subsequent offence to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds (£50) or imprisonment with or without hard labour for not exceeding six months.

  - (b) "Continuous service" means service in the employment of the Board during which an employee has not been absent from the service of the Board for a continuous period of more than two days or an aggregate period of more than 10 days without leave of absence being granted by the Board.
- 2. All employees of the Board shall, after each period of 10 years' continuous service as permanent full-time employees thereof, commencing from the 1st day of January, 1947, be entitled to three months' long service leave. Long service leave is to be taken at the convenience of the Board, which will, as far as possible, meet with the wishes of the employee, but the Board may require the employee to take his leave by giving not less than three months' notice.

- 4. (a) Employees due to take long service leave shall be paid their salary or wage for the period thereof at the rate equivalent to the salary or wage paid in the week immediately preceding the taking of long service leave.

#### INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT.

#### No. 22 of 1951 (Registered 17/10/51.)

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1950, this Twelfth Day of October, 1951, between the Federated Clerks' Union of Australia, Industrial Union of Workers (W.A. Branch) (hereinafter called the Union) of the one part and the Management of the Charcoal Iron and Steel Industry, Wundowie (hereinafter called the Management) of the other part witnesseth as follows: nesseth as follows:-

#### 1.—Scope.

This Agreement shall apply to all male employees of the Charcoal Iron and Steel Industry, Wundowie, engaged on clerical work with the exception of the Accountant.

#### 2.—Definition.

"Manager" shall mean the Manager of Charcoal Iron and Steel Industry, Wundowie.

#### 3.-Hours of Duty.

The ordinary hours of duty shall be  $37\frac{1}{2}$  hours per week to be worked in five days from Mondays to Fridays inclusive with the exception of the Weighbridge Attendant and Storeman whose hours of duty shall be forty (40) per week.

# 4.—Basic Wage.

The basic wage hereinafter referred to shall be as determined from time to time by the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia and at the date of operation of this Agreement was:—

- (i) an employee aged 22 years at the date of engagement shall be paid not less than the second year of adult service rate;
- (ii) an employee aged 23 years or over at the date of engagement shall be paid not less than the third year of service rate.
- (b) A male clerk who is a married man or who is the support of those related to him, on the approval of the manager, shall be paid an allowance equivalent to the next higher grade than the rate of pay according to age or year of adult service with a maximum margin, inclusive of such allowance, of £185 per annum over the basic rate: Provided that the employee concerned has served continuously with the management for a period of at least two years in a clerical capacity.
- (c) An employee retained on the maximum margin of £185 per annum over the basic rate for five years shall be paid an allowance of £15 per annum: Provided that such employee is eligible and would be recommended for promotion on the grounds of efficiency and good conduct; such allowance to cease on promotion to a higher position or on an employee refusing to accept promotion

# 7.—Payment.

The rate of pay which will operate on and from the 18th December, 1950, for each employee on the staff at that date shall be as shown in the Schedule attached to this Agreement: Provided that nothing in this Agreement shall lower the rate of pay that any employee was receiving immediately prior to the 1st October, 1950.

# 8.-Variations of Rates of Pay.

The various rates of pay set out in this Agreement shall be varied automatically to conform with any variations which may be made from time to time in the equivalent salary rates applying to officers under the Public Service Act 1904-1948. Any such variations shall apply from the date that the variations have effect in respect of officers employed under the Public Service Act, 1904-1948.

# 9.—Annual Increments.

Subject to the certification of the manager as to good conduct, diligence and efficiency, employees occupying the positions referred to in clause 6 of this Agreement shall proceed from the minimum to the maximum of respective gradings by annual increments. In the case of all other employees progression from year to year shall be subject to a similar certification.

# 10.—Overtime.

- (a) The following work, when carried out by direction of the manager shall be classed as over-time:—
  - (i) All work performed on Saturdays, Sundays and Public Holidays.
  - (ii) All work performed before or after customary working hours on week days.
- (b) No claim for payment shall be allowed in respect of any day on which the additional time worked amounts to less than one hour or less than a quarter of an hour after the first hour, provided that if the total additional time worked in any week exceeds  $2\frac{1}{2}$  hours then such periods of less than one hour on any day shall be counted towards the completion of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  hours in a week.

(c) When overtime is paid for it shall be at the rate per hour ascertained by applying the following formula:—

Weeks Days:

For the first 5 hours in any week—
Normal hourly rate x five fourths.
For excess of 5 hours in any week—
Normal hourly rate x three halves.
Saturday Mornings:

Normal hourly rate x three halves. Saturday Afternoons and Sundays: Normal hourly rate x two.

Payment for all work performed on a public holiday shall be computed on the basis of ordinary time and shall be paid in addition to the day's pay which the employee would ordinarily receive in respect of such holiday.

(d) A break of at least thirty minutes must be made for meals between 12 noon and 2 p.m. when overtime is worked on a Saturday, Sunday or public holiday, and between 5 p.m. and 7 p.m. on any day on which overtime is worked. Such breaks shall not be recognised as overtime.

#### 11.—Higher Duties Allowance.

- (a) An employee when acting for a continuous period exceeding three weeks in a position higher than that in which he himself is graded, shall be paid higher duties allowance to the minimum of such higher position for the whole time he is acting: Provided that an allowance under this clause shall not be payable to an employee under the age of 21 years.
- (b) An employee acting in a higher position shall be entitled to receive an increased allowance equivalent to the annual increments he would have received had he been appointed to such higher position for the whole time he is acting.
- (c) An allowance granted under this clause shall continue to be paid during periods of annual leave and sick leave not exceeding three weeks, provided that the employee had qualified for payment of the allowance by serving the required continuous period before taking such leave, and further that he resumes after such leave in the position in respect of which he was paid higher duties allowance. No payment of higher duties allowance shall be made for any period of long service leave or for any part of a period of annual leave or sick leave exceeding three weeks.

# 12.—Public Holidays and Annual Leave.

- (a) All statutory and gazetted State Public Service holidays within the locality to which the holidays apply shall be observed.
- (b) A period of two weeks' annual leave with pay shall be granted for each year of continuous service. Where the continuous service is over one month but less than twelve months pro rata leave shall be granted.
- (c) Should any of the holidays referred to in subclause (a) occur during the period an employee is on annual leave, a day in lieu of any such holiday shall be added to the period of annual leave.

#### 13.—Long Service Leave.

- (a) An employee who has completed ten years' continuous service shall be entitled to three calendar months' long service leave on full pay or six calendar months' on half pay.
- (b) For each subsequent period of seven years' continuous service an employee shall be entitled to an additional three calendar months' long service leave on full pay or six calendar months' on half pay.
- (c) Continuous service shall not include the period during which an employee is on long service leave, or any period exceeding two weeks an employee is absent on leave without pay or any service an employee may have had before reaching the age of 18 years.
- (d) An employee who resigns or is dismissed, shall not be entitled to long service leave or payment for long service leave other than that leave that had actually accrued to him prior to the date on which he resigned or the date of the offence for which he was dismissed.

- (e) Any public holidays occurring during the period in which an employee is on long service leave will be treated as part of the long service leave and extra days in lieu thereof shall not be granted.
- (f) Long service leave shall be taken as it falls due at the convenience of the manager but the management may approve the accumulation of long service leave not exceeding six months in any particular case.
- (g) A lump sum payment for long service leave accrued in accordance with this clause and for pro rata long service leave shall be made in the following cases:—
  - (i) To an employee who retires at or over the age of sixty years or who is retired on the ground of ill-health, provided that no payment shall be made for pro rata long service leave unless the employee has completed not less than twelve months' continuous service.
  - (ii) To an employee who is retired for any other cause, provided that no payment shall be made for pro rata long service leave unless the employee had completed not less than three years' continuous service before the date of his retirement.
  - (iii) To the widow of an employee or to such other person as may be approved by the management in the event of the death of an employee, provided that no payment shall be made for pro rata long service leave unless the employee had completed not less than twelve months' continuous service prior to the date of his death.
- (h) The calculation of the amount due for long service leave accrued and for pro rata long service leave shall be made at the rate of salary of an employee at the date of retirement, resignation or death whichever applies and no such payment shall exceed the equivalent of twelve months' salary.

# 14.—Sick Leave.

- (a) This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.
- (b) Workers employed for a continuous period of less than three (3) years may be granted sick leave as follows:—
  - (i) Where continuous service does not exceed six months—three working days on full pay.
  - (ii) Where continuous service exceeds six months but does not exceed eighteen months—ten working days on full pay less any leave granted under subparagraph (i).
  - (iii) Where continuous service exceeds eighteen months but is less than three years—ten working days on full pay and ten working days on half pay less any leave granted under subparagraph (i) and (ii).
- (c) Workers employed for a continuous period of not less than three (3) years may be granted sick leave on full pay on the basis of a cumulative credit of fifteen working days for the first three years of service and ten working days for each year of service after the expiration of the first three years provided:
  - (i) That the maximum credit allowable at the 1st July, 1951, and for the first year thereafter shall be fifteen working days.
  - (ii) That the maximum period of sick leave allowable with pay in respect of any continuous absence shall not exceed six months.
- (d) Where a worker has been granted six months' continuous sick leave with pay he shall not be entitled to receive further sick leave with pay until he has completed a period of duty of not less than four weeks.
- (e) Debits for sick leave granted shall include any public holidays occurring during the period of leave, provided that where duty is resumed on

- a day immediately succeeding a public holiday the leave shall be regarded as expiring on the working day preceding such holiday.
- (f) Any period during which a worker is absent on leave without pay shall not be included as part of such worker's period of service for the purposes of this clause.
- (g) A worker who is absent on approved annual leave, long service leave or leave without pay shall not be eligible for leave under this clause during the currency of such approved leave: Provided that if a worker with over three years of continuous service falls sick while on annual leave and produces at the time satisfactory medical evidence that he is unable to leave the house, he may, with the approval of the permanent head, be granted at a time convenient to the department additional leave equivalent to the period of sickness falling within the scheduled period of annual leave: Provided that the period of sickness is at least one week.
- (h) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer, or his representative, of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three consecutive working days or more. No payment will be made for any absence due to the worker's own fault, neglect or misconduct.
- (i) Notwithstanding anything contained elsewhere in this clause, conditions of sick leave applicable immediately prior to the issue of this Award shall continue until the 1st July, 1951, when the conditions prescribed in subclauses (a) to (h) of this clause inclusive, shall commence to operate.

# 15.—Contract of Service.

The engagement of any employee shall be terminated by one week's notice on either side, such notice to expire on the usual pay day, excepting that an employee deemed guilty of gross misconduct or neglect of duty may be instantly dismissed or suspended and shall not be entitled to any such notice or payment in lieu.

#### -16.-Accrued Rights.

No privilege or concession enjoyed by employees prior to the date of operation of this Agreement shall, unless expressly provided herein, be varied or cancelled solely by reason of the provisions of this Agreement.

#### 17.—Recognition of the Union.

All employees bound by this Agreement shall be members of the Union: Provided that any employee appointed, who at the time of engagement is not a member of the Union, shall become a member within fourteen days.

#### 18.—Record Book.

A record shall be kept showing the name of each employee bound by this Agreement, the hours worked each day and the amount of salary received each pay. The said record shall be open to inspection by an accredited representative of the Union during working hours.

#### 19.—References.

A reference shall be given to an employee of not less than three months' service containing all necessary information in regard to length of service and duties performed.

#### 20.—Term of Agreement.

This Agreement shall be for a term of three years commencing from the 18th December, 1950. Provided that either party to this Agreement may, after the 18th day of December, 1951, negotiate with the other party to amend or add to this Agreement or approach the Court of Arbitration for an amendment to this Agreement.

THIS Agreement made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1950, this twenty-eighth day of August, 1951, between the Minister for Lands of the one part, and the Federated Clerks' Union of Australia Industrial Union of Workers, W.A. #### 3.—Area and Scope.

This Agreement shall apply throughout the State to clerical workers who are employed by the Land Settlement Board in the field, on the jobs, or elsewhere away from head office, and who are not covered by industrial awards or other registered industrial agreements.

#### 4.--Hours.

- 4.—Hours.

  (a) The ordinary hours of work shall not exceed eighty (30) hours per fortnight in the case of a job with a fortnightly pay, and forty (40) hours per week in the case of a job with a weekly pay: Provided, however, the officer in charge of any particular work or undertaking may permit the officer or officers regulated hereunder to perform their duties under a regulation of thirty-eight (38) hours per week or seventy-six (76) hours per fortnight, if he is of opinion that the work necessary and incidental to the duties of such officer or officers may be performed within these lesser hours.

  (b) (i) The employer may require any worker
- (b) (i) The employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.
- (ii) The Union or worker or workers covered by this Agreement shall not in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be party to or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.
- (iii) This subclause shall remain in operation until otherwise determined by the Court.

# 5.—Overtime.

Overtime shall be approved by the permanent head or sub-head of the department concerned or the senior supervisor of the district concerned before being worked.

All time worked outside the ordinary hours of duty per week or per fortnight, in the case of a job with fortnightly pay, shall be deemed as overtime, and paid for at the rate of time and a half on Mondays to Fridays, inclusive. All time worked on Sundays shall be paid for at the rate of double time. Time worked on Saturdays shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

# 6.—Annual Leave and Public Holidays.

# 1.—Annual Leave.

- (a) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of 12 months' continuous service with such employer.
- (b) If any public holiday as prescribed in this Agreement falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

- (c) A worker may be rostered off and granted annual leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed prior to his having completed a period of 12 months' continuous service, in which case should the services of such worker terminate or be terminated prior to the completion of 12 months' continuous service, the said worker shall refund to the Minister the difference between the amount received by him for wages in respect of the period of his annual leave and the amount which would have accrued to him by reason of the length of his service up to the date of the termination of his services.
- (d) (i) Subject to paragraph (ii) when computing the annual leave due under this clause no deduction shall be made from such leave in respect of the period that a worker is on annual leave and/or holidays: Provided that no deductions shall be made for any approved period a worker is absent from duty through sickness with or without pay unless the absence exceeds three (3) calendar months, in which case deduction may be made for such excess only.
- (ii) Approved periods of absence from work caused through accident sustained in the course of employment shall not be considered breaks in continuity of service, but the first six months only of any such period shall count as service for the purpose of computing annual leave.
- (e) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for a portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer.
- (f) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause, other than for peculation or theft, shall be entitled to receive payment for any annual leave which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service: Provided always that if the worker has been dismissed for peculation or theft no claims for annual leave shall be recognised. Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated annual leave or payment thereof
- (g) When work is closed down for the purpose of allowing annual leave to be taken, workers with less than a full year's service shall only be entitled to payment during such period for the number of days' leave due to them, provided that nothing herein contained shall deprive the Minister of his right to retain such workers at work during the close-down period as may be essential.
- (h) Workers regularly working for the Government north of south latitude 26 shall be allowed to accumulate annual leave for two years, subject to the convenience of the department. Such workers who proceed to Fremantle and Geraldton during the period of such leave shall be allowed once in each two years reasonable travelling time on the forward and return journeys between the place of their employment and either of the said ports.
- (i) "Ordinary wages" for the purpose of subclause (a) hereof shall mean the rate of wage the worker has received for the greatest proportion of the calendar month prior to his taking the leave.
- (j) At the discretion of the officer in charge and if such officer is satisfied that no detriment to the work may result the officer or officers may be allowed other public service holidays or any one or more of them as and when they occur.

# 2.—Public Holidays.

- (a) Except as hereinafter provided, each of the following days, or the day observed in lieu thereof, shall be allowed as a holiday to all workers and be paid for, namely: New Year's Day, Australia Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.
- (b) Whenever any holiday falls on an employee's ordinary working day and the employee is not required to work on such days he shall be raid for the ordinary hours he would have worked

- on such day if it had not been a holiday. If he is required to work on a holiday he shall be paid for the time worked as if it was an ordinary working day and shall, in addition, be allowed a day's leave with pay to be added to the annual leave or to be taken at some subsequent date if the worker so agrees.
- (c) In the case of workers working a five day week, no payment or a day in lieu shall be granted for any public holiday falling on a Saturday.
- (d) Payment for holidays shall be in accorddance with the usual hours of work.
- (e) When a worker is off duty owing to leave without pay or sickness, including accidents on or off duty except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay, any holiday falling during such absence shall not be treated as a paid holiday. Where the worker is on duty or available on the working day immediately preceding a holiday, or resumes duty or is available on the working day immediately following a holiday, as prescribed in this clause, the worker shall be entitled to a paid holiday on all such holidays.

#### 7.—Travelling Allowance.

The amount of 18s. per day, made up of 4s. 6d. per item for meals and bed (excluding lunch on the first day where the workers receive reasonable notice in which to have lunch prepared, except where the expenditure is actually incurred) shall be recouped him in connection with travelling undertaken on instructions of the officer in charge of the job.

#### 8.—District Allowance.

District allowance, as applying to the general wages employees on the respective jobs, shall be paid.

#### 9.—Camp Allowance.

Employees who are required to camp at or near the work shall, except as hereinafter provided, receive an allowance of twenty shillings (20s.) per week, where a cook is not provided at the department's expense. Where a cook is so provided, the camp allowance shall be reduced to ten shillings (10s.) per week. For broken periods this particular allowance shall be calculated at one-fifth (1/5th) i.e., four shillings (4s.) and two shillings (2s.) respectively: Provided that in districts five and six as shown in Award No. 24 of 1947 (A.W.U. construction) the allowance paid shall be seven shillings (7s.) per week where no cook is provided. For broken periods this particular allowance shall be calculated at one-fifth (1/5th). The above allowance covers a week of five, six or seven days.

# 10.-Accommodation.

Stretcher, mattress, and requisite crockery, and cooking utensils shall be provided by the department for employees who are required to live at or near the works.

# 11.—Engagement.

- (i) The engagement of a worker shall be terminated by two (2) weeks' notice by either party, such notice to take effect only at the place of engagement.
- (ii) A worker may be summarily dismissed for misconduct or dereliction of duty.
- (iii) Prior to the termination of an officer's service for any cause other than that mentioned in subclause (ii) the departmental head shall inquire whether such officer may not be employed within the same or some other department within the scope of this Award.

#### 12.—Reference.

The department shall give to each worker, on termination of services, a reference containing full information in regard to period of service and the nature of the duties performed.

#### 13.—Preference.

Preference of employment shall be given to members of the Federated Clerks' Union of Australia Industrial Union of Workers, W.A. Branch: Provided that any worker or applicant for employment who is a member of another recognised industrial union, and who produces proof of such membership, shall be entitled to equal preference: Provided that such worker or applicant shall, within fourteen (14) days of the expiry of his current ticket with the other union, make and complete an application for membership with the Federated Clerks' Union.

# $14. \\ \hbox{--Office Accommodation}.$

Suitable office accommodation and furniture shall be provided having due regard to longevity of the job, health regulations, hygienic and climatic conditions. Any dispute under this clause may be decided by a board of reference.

#### 15.—Higher Duties.

Where a worker is called upon to perform the duties of a position carrying a wage higher than his ordinary wage for a period exceeding one (1) week, he shall be paid the difference whilst carrying out such higher duties.

#### 16.—Rates of Pay (Basic Wage).

The basic wage hereinafter referred to shall be as determined from time to time by the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia but at the date of the operation of this agreement was:—

#### Provided that-

- (i) A worker aged 22 years at the date of engagement shall be paid not less than the second year of adult service rate.
- (ii) A worker aged 23 years or over at the date of engagement shall be paid not less than the third year of adult service rate.
- (b) Progression from year to year in the scale set out in subclause (a) hereof shall be subject to the certification of the officer in charge as to the good conduct, diligence and efficiency of the worker concerned.

# 18.—Rates of Pay (Special).

(a) The following rates of pay expressed in margins over the basic wage shall apply to the positions listed hereunder:—

#### 19.—Classification.

- (a) The classification of workers into the classes detailed in clauses 17 and 18 of this Agreement shall be vested in the permanent head or subhead of the Lands Department, having regard to the nature and responsibility of the job.
- (b) As soon as practicable after the issue of this Agreement each worker then employed shall be informed of his classification under this Agreement.
- (c) In the cases where preparatory work has to be performed before proceeding to the job, the rates of pay for such job shall operate from the time of the commencement of the preparatory work and shall continue until such time as the permanent head or sub-head of the Lands Department considers the nature of the job warrants an alteration in the status of the worker. In the event of a dispute arising or an alteration in status the matter may be referred to a Board of Reference.

#### 20.-Variations of Rates of Pay.

The various rates of pay set out in this Agreement shall be varied automatically to conform with any variations which may be made from time to time in the equivalent salary rates applying to officers under the Public Service Act, 1904-1948. Any such variations shall apply from the date that the variations have effect in respect of officers employed under the Public Service Act, 1904-1948.

#### 21.—Board of Reference.

- (1) For the purpose of this Agreement a Board of Reference is hereby appointed, which shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties. The Chairman shall be the Industrial Registrar or some other person appointed by the Court of Arbitration. The said Board shall have assigned to it, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the dispute, the functions of—
  - (a) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise from time to time, except such as involve interpretation of the provisions of this Agreement or any of them;
  - (b) dealing with any other matter which the Court may refer to the Board from time to time;
  - (c) classifying and fixing wages, rates and conditions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Agreement;
  - d) determining any appeal against designation of the worker or the margin paid where a minimum and maximum is provided for. Any appeal must be lodged with the Chairman of the Board within one month of the salary being determined, in the case of the workers in the South-West Land Division and within six weeks, when employed elsewhere.
- (2) The decisions of the Board shall be recorded in writing and such decisions shall be conclusive. A signed copy of the decisions shall be forwarded to each of the parties.

#### 22.-Long Service Leave.

(a) An employee who has completed 10 years' continuous service shall be entitled to three calendar months' long service leave on full pay or six calendar months on half pay.

- (b) For each subsequent period of seven years' continuous service an employee shall be entitled to an additional three calendar months' long service leave on full pay or six calendar months on half pay.
- (c) The provisions of subclause (a) and (b) shall apply as from the 1st November, 1949, provided that previous continuous service up to that date since the date the employee's last period of long service leave became due shall only be counted in full where the conditions prescribed in relation to that previous service provide for three months' long service leave on full pay on the basis of seven years' continuous service.

Where such previous service would only entitle the employee to three months' long service leave on full pay on the basis of ten years' continuous service then the first 18 months of such previous service shall not be counted.

- (d) Continuous service shall not include the period during which an employee is on long service leave or any period exceeding two weeks an employee is absent on leave without pay or any service an employee may have had before reaching the age of 18 years.
- (e) An employee who resigned or is dismissed shall not be entitled to long service leave or payment for long service leave other than the leave that had actually accrued to him prior to the date on which he resigned or the date of the offence for which he was dismissed.
- (f) Any public holidays occurring during the period in which an employee is on long service leave will be treated as part of the long service leave, and extra days in lieu thereof shall not be granted.
- (g) Long service leave shall be taken as it falls due at the convenience of the department, but the employer may approve the accumulation of long service leave not exceeding six months in any particular case.
- (h) A lump sum payment for long service leave accrued in accordance with this clause and for pro rata long service leave shall be made in the following cases—
  - (i) to an employee who retires at, or over the age of 60 years, or who is retired on the grounds of ill health provided that no payment shall be made for pro rata long service leave unless the employee has completed not less than 12 months' continuous service;
  - (ii) to an employee who is retired for any other cause provided that no payment shall be made for pro rata long service leave unless the employee had completed not less than three years' continuous service before the date of his retirement;
  - (iii) to the widow of the employee or to such other person as may be approved by the employer in the event of the death of an employee provided that no payment shall be made for pro rata long service leave unless the employee had completed not less than 12 months' continuous service prior to the date of his death.
- (i) The calculation of the amounts due for long service leave accrued and for pro rata long service leave shall be made at the rate of salary of an employee at the time of retirement, resignation or death, whichever applies. No such payment shall exceed the equivalent of 12 months' salary.

#### 23.—Sick Leave.

- (a) This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.
- (b) Workers employed for a continuous period of less than three years may be granted sick leave as follows—
  - (i) where continous service does not exceed six months—three working days on full pay;
  - (ii) where continuous service exceeds six months but does not exceed 18 months— 10 working days on full pay less any leave granted under sub-paragraph (i);

- (iii) where continuous service exceeds 18 months but is less than three years—10 working days on full pay and 10 working days on half pay less any leave granted under sub-paragraphs (i) and (ii).
- (c) Workers employed for a continuous period of not less than three years may be granted sick leave on full pay on the basis of a cumulative credit of 15 workings days for the first three years of service and 10 working days for each year of service after the expiration of the first three years provided—
  - that the maximum credit allowable at the 1st July, 1951, and for the first year thereafter shall be 15 working days;
  - (ii) that the maximum period of sick leave allowable with pay in respect of any continuous absence shall not exceed six months.
- (d) Where a worker has been granted six months' continuous sick leave with pay he shall not be entitled to receive further sick leave with pay until he has completed a period of duty of not less than four weeks.
- (e) Debits for sick leave granted shall include any public holidays occurring during the period of leave, provided that where duty is resumed on a day immediately succeeding a public holiday the leave shall be regarded as expiring on the working day preceding such holiday.
- (f) Any period during which a worker is absent on leave without pay shall not be included as part of such workers' period of service for the purposes of this clause.
- (g) A worker who is absent on approved annual leave, long service leave or leave without pay shall not be eligible for leave under this clause during the currency of such approved leave: Provided that if a worker with over three years of continuous service falls sick while on annual leave and produces at the time satisfactory medical evidence that he is unable to leave the house, he may, with the approval of the permanent head, be granted at a time convenient to the department additional leave equivalent to the period of sickness falling within the scheduled period of annual leave: Provided that the period of sickness is at least one week.
- (h) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his empolyer, or his representative, of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three consecutive working days or more. No payment will be made for any absence due to the worker's own fault, neglect or misconduct.
- (i) Notwithstanding anything contained elsewhere in this clause, conditions of sick leave applicable immediately prior to the issue of this Award shall continue until the 1st July, 1951, when the conditions prescribed in subclauses (a) to (h) of this clause inclusive, shall commence to operate.

# 24.—Term.

The term of this agreement shall be for a period of one year from the date hereof.

- be paid to an employee, all service with any hospital covered by this Award shall count as qualifying service.
- (ii) Service with any other hospital, Federal or State, shall be taken into consideration and, failing agreement between the Union and the employer, shall be referred to the Board of Reference who shall determine the amount to be assessed as qualifying service.
- (iii) It is hereby expressly agreed and declared that the rates prescribed herein by this amendment for junior and adult females have been arrived at without regard for the skill involved or the nature of the work performed, and cannot be compared as between themselves or with the rates of pay prescribed in this Award for males or with the rates of pay prescribed in any other Award.
- (iv) In the event of the Court of Arbitration increasing the ratio of the female basic wage to the male basic wage, the margins herein prescribed for adult females shall be automatically reduced by the same amount as the basic wage is so increased, and, in the case of junior female workers the percentages of the female basic wage and the margins prescribed herein shall be automatically reduced by a sum and/or percentage sufficient to enable the rates to remain constant.

#### INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT.

#### No. 21 of 1951. (Registered 16/10/51.)

(Registered 16/10/51.)

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1950, this tenth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and fifty-one, between the Swan Brewery Company Limited, the Emu Brewery Limited, the Stirling Brewery Limited, D. Curtis Limited, and the West Australian Glass Manufacturers Limited, and Union Maltings Proprietary Limited, all of Perth and Fremantle (hereinafter in these presents called "the employers"), of the one part, and the Breweries and Bottle Yards Employees' Industrial Union of Workers, of Western Australia, of Perth, being an industrial union of workers registered under the provisions of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1950 (hereinafter in these presents called "the Union") of the other part; whereby it is mutually agreed by and between the parties hereto that the several stipulations, conditions, and provisions set out herein shall, in all cases, be binding upon and shall be faithfully and promptly carried out, observed, be faithfully and promptly carried out, observed, performed and complied with, according to the true intent and meaning thereof by the parties hereto and it is also hereby mutually agreed by and between the parties hereto that this Agreement shall apply to the whole of the employees embraced in the Schedule herein contained.

#### 1.—Interpretation.

For the purpose of this Agreement:-

(a) "Casual hand" shall mean any person who not employed continually for more than 40 ordinary working hours, 7.30 a.m. to 5.30 p.m.

- (b) "Cylinder man," whenever used in this Agreement, shall mean a worker who is generally employed at a majority of the undermentioned occupations, namely, filling, preparing, carbonating, and racking beer from a chilling cylinder, but shall not mean any employee who is casually employed in any one of the lastmentioned processes.
- (c) "Bottle-washer" shall mean any person employed washing bottles by hand or machinery.
- (d) "Fireman" shall mean a person employed in a stokehold attending a steam boiler or gasproducing plant.
- (e) "Nightcellermen and nightmaltsters" shall apply only to cellarmen and maltsters who are employed on night duties.
- (f) "Leading hands" are employees who are in charge of and responsible for the work of others.

#### 2.—Wages Schedule.

The parties to this Agreement mutually agree that the minimum rate of wages that shall be paid by the employers respectively to the persons employed by such employers in the capacities undermentioned is as follows:-

(a) Basic Wage.—Within a radius of 15 miles from the G.P.O., Perth, £9 16s. 8d.

Workers in cold rooms or cellars with a temperature of less than 45deg. Fah. shall be paid 5s. per week in addition to the minimum rate.

Maltsters working on night duties shall be paid an allowance of eight shillings (8s.) per week in addition to the ordinary rate of pay. Maltsters working on permanent night duties at the Swan Malt House shall be paid an allowance of sixteen shillings (16s.) per week in addition to the ordinary rate of pay.

Boiler cleaning which shall include scraping, cleaning and painting cylinders. For all time which they may be employed at this class of work, workers shall be entitled to be paid at the rate of 1s. (1/-) per hour in addition to the rates prescribed herein for their ordinary classification.

Ammonia coils.—For all time which they may Ammonia coils.—For all time which they may be employed chipping, cleaning, scraping, or painting ammonia coils workers shall be entitled to be paid at the rate of 1s. (1/-) per hour in addition to the rates prescribed herein for their ordinary classifications, and whilst so engaged shall be supplied free with goggles, pullovers and respirators and allowed reasonable time before the end of each shift to cleanse themselves.

Coal Handling.-Workers employed on breaking, crushing, and handling coal in bunkers or bins shall, for all time whilst so engaged be entitled to be paid at the rate of 6d. per hour in addition to the rates prescribed herein for their ordinary classifications.

-The employers agree to supply boots to those workers employed at bottle washing on the tanks at the tubs at the filters, at the cask-washing shed, and at the bottlers, to be worn durworking hours, same to be supplied free of cost by the employers.

Oilers and Aprons.—The employers agree to provide oilskin coats and leather aprons for carters, to be used whilst the employer's work is being done only.

#### 3 --- Hours.

Forty hours shall constitute an ordinary week's work for all workers. Such hours shall (except as to shift workers) be worked on the following basis:-

(a) All workers other than those mentioned in subclauses (b) and (c) hereunder—Five-day week,

subclauses (b) and (c) hereunder—Five-day week, Mondays to Fridays inclusive, 8 hours per day, to be worked within a spread of hours of 7.30 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. with one hour for lunch.

(b) Stablemen and Firemen.—Five day week, Wiondays to Fridays inclusive, 8 hours per day, starting time not before 5 a.m. on any day. The subclauser may require the starting time and response to the starting time and response to the starting time and response to the starting time and the starting t

employer may require any stableman or fireman to start work at any time after 5 a.m.

(c) Night cellarmen and night maltsters.—Fiveday week, Mondays to Fridays inclusive, 8 hours per day, starting time not before 4.30 p.m. nor after 2 a.m. on any ordinary working day. after 2 a.m. on any ordinary working day.

4.—Shift Work.

(a) Shift work may be done in two or three sets of working shifts not exceeding eight (8) hours each, spread over a period of sixteen (16) or twenty four (24) hours respectively on the ordinary working days in each week. The first shift of the week will begin on Sunday at 11.30 p.m. and the last shift of the week is to finish at 11.30 p.m. on Friday.

(b) Duty Rosters shall be posted on Fridays in each week showing the shifts for the following week's work. Such rosters shall show the starting and finishing times of each worker during each week. Particulars relating to starting and finishing times displayed on the roster shall be rigidly adhered to. Rosters will provide that the first shift on each day will be from 11.30 p.m. to 7.30 a.m. the second shift from 7.30 a.m. to 3.30 p.m. and, when three shifts are worked, the third shift from 3.30 p.m. to 11.30 p.m. All rostered shifts shall be made to rotate. This subclause may be varied by mutual agreement between any be varied by mutual agreement between any employer and the Union.

(c) A crib time of thirty minutes shall be allowed

to the permanent night malsters employed at the Swan Malt House and to all workers on each shift

when two or more shifts are worked. Crib time shall be included in the working time.

(d) All rostered shift workers shall be paid an

(d) All rostered shift workers shall be paid an allowance of eight shillings (8s.) per week in addition to their ordinary weekly rate of pay.

(e) Workers called on to work shifts without having been previously rostered shall be deemed "casual shift workers" and shall be paid an allowance for the first week only of fifteen shillings. (15s.) per week in addition to their ordinary rate

of pay (f) The additional allowances mentioned in subclauses (d) and (e) hereof shall be taken into consideration calculating overtime rate for any overtime for work done beyond eight (8) hours per day on Mondays to Fridays inclusive. Except as aforesaid the above allowances shall not be included for purpose of calculating any other penalty rates under this Agreement.

### 5.—Overtime.

- (a) The following overtime shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half:—All time worked over 8 hours per day on Mondays to Fridays inclusive. All time worked outside the starting and finishing times mentioned in clause 3 (a) and before the starting times of 5 a.m. and 4.30 p.m. mentioned in clauses 3 (b) and (c) respectively. All Saturday work.
- (b) All workers on day shift engaged in or about a brewery or bottling works shall, if required to work more than one hour's overtime after the usual finishing time be entitled to knock off for one hour after the usual finishing time for refreshments. Any alteration to be by mutual arrangement.

### 6.—Tea Money.

Tea money shall be paid at the rate of two shillings (2s.) where notice of overtime is not given at least twenty-four hours previously.

### 7.—Lunch Intervals.

The lunch intervals of 60 minutes shall be taken between 12 o'clock noon and 1 p.m. or between 1 p.m. and 2 p.m.

-Smoke-o.

Ten minutes shall be allowed at 10 o'clock a.m. and again at 3 o'clock p.m. This concession however, does not apply to men working on shifts.

9.—Casual Hands.

Casual hands shall be paid by the hour at the rate of ordinary pay plus two shillings (2s.) per

10.—Record.

Each employer shall keep a record of the name of each worker except stablemen, the time he starts and finishes each day, total number of hours worked, overtime worked, and wages paid to each worker, and such record shall be open to the inspection of the secretary of or any other person appointed by the Union during working hours. Each worker shall sign the record kept for all moneys received by him.

11.--Sundays.

All work performed by workers in any department on Sunday and Easter Saturday shall receive payment for same at the rate of double time. All workers required to work on Sundays shall be allowed one Sunday off per fortnight: Provided that the employer may, in an emergency, require such workers to work on consecutive Sundays.

#### 12.-Holidays.

All work performed by workers in any department on the undermentioned holidays shall be paid for on an hourly basis at a rate equal to one and one-half (1½) times the ordinary rate of pay per hour with a minimum of four (4) hours' pay and in addition such workers shall be paid one (1) day's pay for the holiday. All holidays shifts shall rotate. One ordinary day's pay shall be paid for the undermentioned holidays to workers who do not work that day.

The days to be observed as holidays according to the provisions of this Agreement are Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day, Anniversary Day (in January), Annual Pienic Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day (in June), Show Day, and Sovereign's Birthday. In case any of the above holidays fall on a Saturday or a Sunday the following Monday shall be observed in lieu thereof.

### 13.—Annual Leave.

Each employee on completion of 12 months' service shall be granted three (3) weeks annual leave, two (2) weeks on double pay, and one (1) week on single pay, such leave to be taken at times to be mutually agreed upon between the workers and the employers. The annual leave shall be in addition to the holidays mentioned in clause 12 hereof.

On termination of service of a worker who has been continuously employed for more than three months, he shall receive a pro rata payment in lieu of leave on the basis of two and one-twelfth (2 1/12th) days' pay for each completed month of service. On termination of service of a worker who has been continuously employed for more than one month, but less than three months, he shall receive a pro rata payment in lieu of leave on the basis of one and one-quarter (14) days' pay for each completed month of service.

#### 14.—Annual Bonus.

The employer shall pay such employee receiving wages under this Award, a week's pay by way of bonus in the last week in December in each year. Any employee leaving the employer's service for reasons other than misconduct, dishonesty, or neglect of duty before the payment of such bonus in any year shall, when leaving be paid a pro rata payment in lieu thereof; any employee who shall not have been in the employ of the employer for a year in the first week in December shall receive a part of his week's pay bearing the same proportion to a week's pay as the period of his service bears to a year.

### 15.—Long Service Leave.

(a) All workers who from time to time shall complete 25 years of continuous service with an employer shall be given long service leave. Such

long service leave shall be taken at the conclusion of 25 years of continuous service and shall comprise 13 weeks' leave of absence for recreational

(b) Should a worker who has completed 15 years of continuous service be retired compulsorily on medical grounds on the advice of a medical officer appointed by the employer or by reason of being over the employer's retiring age or die before completing 25 years' continuous service, there shall be paid by the employer to such worker or to his dependants as the case may require a sum of money bearing the same relation to 13 weeks' pay at his rate as his service with the employer bears to 25 years. "Dependant" shall mean the bears to 25 years. "Dependant" shall mean the widow and/or children under the age of 16 years, or any child in fact dependent on any worker and, in the case of a single worker, shall mean such dependant (if any) as such single worker may in writing notify to the employer during his life time, accompanied by proper proof of actual dependency. dependency

(c) Continuous service shall include any interval spent on service with His Majesty's Armed Forces during the duration of any war on which His Majesty may be engaged, and shall also include any interval spent during the duration of any war on which His Majesty may be engaged with any national service into which a worker is compul-

d) Unless otherwise agreed in individual cases, long service leave shall be taken at such period as shall be mutually agreed upon within two years of it becoming due. In default of agreement it shall be taken at such time within such period of two years as the employer shall determine.

(e) Except in the cases of a worker who, at the time he becomes eligible for long service leave, is

of an age exceeding 60, all long service leave shall be taken by way of actual holiday and not by way of payment in lieu thereof on retirement. A worker who at the time he becomes eligible for long service leave is beyond 60 years of age shall have the option of taking actual holiday under this scheme or of receiving payment in lieu thereof on retirement. Such option shall be exercised by a notice in writing addressed to the employer at the time of becoming eligible for long service leave.

(f) Workers on long service leave shall, while on such leave, continue to be paid at the actual rate (exclusive of overtime or other allowance) enjoyed by them at the commencement of such leave. Except in special circumstances payment shall be at the same times as during normal employment but the same times as during normal employment but

may be made by cheque by mutual arrangement.

(g) It shall be a condition of every worker's taking long service leave that he (or she)—

(i) shall not under any circumstances be engaged in any gainful employment while on such leave;

(ii) shall return to the entire results of the

(ii) shall return to the active service of the employer forthwith at the expiration of the leave; and (iii) shall not draw any sick or accident pay

simultaneously with long service leave pay. A breach of condition (i) above will result in immediate discharge from the employer's service accompanied by forfeiture of all rights (if any) to retiring allowance, or other similar payments or benefits. A breach of condition (ii) above (except as on the grounds of illness necessitating retirement or additional leave on the advice of a medical officer appointed by the employer) will result in forfeiture of all rights (if any) to retiring allowance or other similar benefits or payments.

(h) In order to avoid manning difficulties, the long service leave of workers who become entitled to the same in the first year of operation of the scheme shall be taken during such periods during the first two years of the scheme as shall be mutually agreed upon, and in default of agreement, at such times as the employer may decide.

(i) For the purpose of computation and allotment of long service leave all long service leave shall be deemed to become due on the stockober leave to the service of t

next, following the completion of the periods of 15 and 25 years' continuous service.

(j) The employer shall have the right in cases of emergency to recall any worker from Long Service Leave, in which case the unexpired leave shall be made up on some mutually convenient

- (k) In order to avoid confusion and embarrassment workers whilst on long service leave shall not, without the prior permission of the officer in charge of the particular establishment, visit any of the premises of the employer except for the purpose of collecting pay or transacting genuine business with the employer's officers. Social visits shall not be indulged in. "Establishment" means any brewery, cooperage, or workshop, but does not include hotels or annual picnics or sports or usual weekly competitive sporting activities.
- (1) The benefits of long service leave shall be in addition to all benefits at present or hereafter to be enjoyed by workers.
- (m) In the event of any Governmental or similar long service leave scheme being introduced for industry as a whole, the parties concerned shall meet to consider alterations necessary in order to adjust the scheme to such new conditions.
- (n) Notwithstanding anything in this clause contained no worker nor his legal personal representative shall be entitled to any of the benefits by this clause conferred in any of the following circumstances:
  - (i) When, in the opinion of the directors, of an employer a worker has committed fraud upon the employer or any defalcation in relation to the employer or breach of trust or similar act prejudicially affecting or likely to so affect business or interests of the employer and is dismissed.
  - (ii) If the worker shall become a bankrupt or insolvent debtor within the meaning of any Act of the Parliament of the Commonwealth of Australia or of the State of Western Australia or shall assign alienate or charge his benefits hereunder or any part thereof or attempt to do so or if through his own act or default or by operation or process of law the same shall become vested in or payable to some other person, firm or company.

#### 16.-Under-rate Workers.

- (a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage, may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the employer.
- (b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at the matter may be referred to the board of reference for determination.
- (c) After application has been made to the board, and pending the board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for or be employed at the proposed lesser rate.
- (d) The provisions of regulation 92 of the regulations made under The Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1950, shall be deemed to apply to any board of reference appointed hereunder.

#### 17.—Engagement.

The engagement between employer and worker, except casual hands, shall be weekly, and may be terminated by a week's notice from either party, except in the case of the worker absenting himself without leave, not obeying lawful commands, or being guilty of other misconduct, or of the works of the employer being stopped, through fire or tempest, when such engagement may be terminated immediately.

#### 18.—Absence Through Sickness.

- (a) A worker who is unable through sickness or accident to attend his duties, shall notify the employer not later than 10 a.m. on the day he first absents himself from duty.
- (b) A worker shall be entitled to sick pay in respect of any period of absence on account of sickness after the 1st day of January, 1948, on the basis of one half day's pay for each completed month served with the employer between the said 1st day of January, 1948, and the date of the commencement of such absence provided that in calculating the amount due to a worker in respect of any particular period of absence through sickness there shall be deducted therefrom any sum or sums previously paid to him hereunder.

- (c) The term "sickness" shall not include any case where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.
- (d) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof of his sickness satisfactory to the employer. This proof shall be in the form of a medical certificate if the absence is for three days or more. The employer shall have the right at any time to have the worker examined by a doctor on behalf of the employer.
- (e) Except as aforesaid, a worker shall not be entitled to payment for time lost through sickness or accident.

#### 19.—Contractors.

All work of any employee in the capacity as mentioned in this Agreement in or about a brewery or bottling works or in connection with the business of brewing or bottling beer shall be carried out departmentally by bona fide brewery employees engaged and paid direct by the brewery proprietors and not by agents or contractors. This clause shall not apply to contractors erecting, repairing or making alterations to buildings or machinery or to carriers being engaged for the the delivery of goods other than beer as has been the practice or custom prior to this date. But when contractors are employed delivering beer the brewery company shall undertake to see that whilst employed on such work the contractors pay to both the drivers and offsiders the same wages and work under the same conditions as is provided in this Agreement.

#### 20.—Area.

This Agreement shall apply to the area comprised within a radius of fifteen (15) miles from the General Post Office, Perth.

#### 21.—Term.

This Agreement shall be for a term of twelve (12) months from the 29th day of November, 1950.
