AT a meeting of the Executive Council, held in the Executive Council Chamber, at Perth, the 13th day of October, 1955, the following Orders in Council were authorised to be issued:—

Child Welfare Act, 1947-1954.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by section 19 of the Child Welfare Act, 1947-1954, it is provided that the Governor may by Order in Council establish special courts to be called Children's Courts, and may by Order in Council from time to time determine the area in and for which each Court shall exercise jurisdiction; and whereas by section 19 (2) (a) of the Child Welfare Act, 1947-1954, it is provided that the Governor may appoint such persons, male or female, as he may think fit, to be members of any particular Children's Court, and may determine the respective seniorities of such members: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby establish a Children's Court at Shark Bay to exercise jurisdiction over the area constituting the Shark Bay Police District, and doth hereby appoint the persons named in the schedule hereto to be members of the Children's Courts at the places mentioned.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

Corres. No. 1336/36.

WHEREAS by section 33 of the Land Act, 1933-1954, it is, *inter alia*, made lawful for the Governor by Order in Council to direct that any land reserved pursuant to the provisions of this Act shall be granted in fee simple to any person (as defined in the said section) subject to the condition that the person shall not lease or mortgage the whole or any part of the land without the consent of the Governor and subject to such other conditions

and limitations as the Governor shall deem necessary to ensure that the land is used for the purpose for which the land is reserved as aforesaid; and whereas it is deemed expedient that reserve No. 21727 (Ninghan Location 3769) should be granted in fee simple to the Mollerin Sports & Recreation Association to be held in trust for the purpose of Hallsite and Recreation: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby direct that the beforementioned reserve shall be granted in fee simple to the Mollerin Sports & Recreation Association to be held in trust for the purpose of Hallsite and Recreation, subject to the condition that the land shall not be leased or mortgaged in whole or in part without the consent of the Governor.

Alteration of Common Boundary.

No. 36 of 1952.

Between the Metropolitan and South-Western Federated Engine Drivers and Firemen's Union of Workers of Western Australia, Applicant, and Bell Bros. Pty. Ltd., Wakelam Bros., and Australian Blue Metal Ltd., Respondents.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties; and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination; and whereas the said reference of industrial dispute was remitted by the Court to the Conciliation Commissioner; and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference; and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Conciliation Commissioner by their respective representatives and requested the Conciliation Commissioner to make the said agreement an Award of the Court: Now, therefore, the Conciliation Commissioner, pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, and all other powers therein enabling him, hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court.

Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note.—Wherever the word "Award" occurs herein, it shall be taken to mean and include "Agreement.")

1.—Title.

This Award shall be known as the "Engine Drivers' (Excavators) Award."

2.—Arrangement.

3.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be one (1) year from the beginning of the first pay period commencing after the date hereof.

4.—Area.

This Award shall have effect over the whole of the South-West Land Division.

5.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to certificated workers employed by the respondents operating navvies and dragline or dredge type excavators for which a certificate to drive is required under the provisions of the Inspection of Machinery Act.

6.—Hours.

(a) The hours of duty shall be forty (40) per week.

(b) In any week in which there are one or more holidays the hours shall be reduced by the number of ordinary working hours the worker would have been required to work on the holiday or holidays had such day or days not been holidays.

(c) Any hours worked on any day or days to make up the hours of duty in any week shall be worked in a continuous shift.

(d) Subject to agreement between the parties to this Award, the ordinary hours of work may be extended on any one day during the week preceding Christmas Day.

7.—Overtime.

(a) All time worked outside the normal hours of duty on any day shall stand alone and be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

(b) In the calculation of overtime each day's work shall stand alone.

(c) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Award—

- (i) an employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement;
- (ii) no organisation, party to this Award or worker or workers covered by this Award, shall in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation, or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

8.—Sunday Work.

For all time of duty on Sundays, payment in addition to the weekly wage, shall be made at the rate of double time.

9.—Holidays.

(a) The following days or the days observed in lieu shall be granted as holidays to the workers without deduction of pay, namely:—New Year's Day, Anniversary Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Foundation Day, Anzac Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

(b) All time of duty on such holidays shall be paid for at the rate of double time. Any worker required to work on a holiday shall be paid at least half a day's pay at holiday rates,

10.—Annual Leave.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.

(b) If any Award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(c) If after one (1) month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period a worker lawfully leaves his employment or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-sixth of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service.

(d) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this Award shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to annual leave.

(e) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under the Award the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rates of pay shall apply.

(f) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled subject to subclause (c) of this section, to such leave on full pay as is proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer, and if such leave is not equal to the leave given to the other workers he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on leave on full pay.

(g) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

(h) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

11.—Casual Workers.

"Casual worker" means a worker who is employed for less than one week.

Casual workers shall be paid ten per cent. (10%) in addition to the prescribed rates.

12.—Contract of Service.

The contract of service of workers other than casuals shall be by the week.

13.—Absence Through Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-twelfth (1/12th) of a week's pay for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to one (1) week in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(b) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment, or for any accident, wherever sustained arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

14.—Time and Wages Record.

(a) The employer shall keep or cause to be kept a time and wages record in which shall be entered—

- (i) the name of each worker;
- (ii) the nature of work performed;
- (iii) the hours worked each day; and
- (iv) the wages (and overtime, if any) paid each week.

(b) The said record shall be open to the inspection of an accredited representative of the Union during ordinary office hours, and he shall be allowed to take necessary extracts therefrom.

15.—Board of Reference.

(a) The Court may appoint for the purpose of the Award a Board of Reference. Such Board shall consist of a chairman and two other representatives one to be nominated by each of the parties, as prescribed by the regulations. There are assigned to such Board, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the Award the functions of—

- (i) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Award or any of them;
- (ii) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time.

(b) An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board, in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, which for this purpose are embodied in this Award.

16.—No Reduction.

Nothing herein shall in itself operate to reduce the wage of any worker below the rate actually received by him at the date of this Award.

17.—Breakdowns, etc.

The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day on which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the Union or Unions affiliated with it, or by any other Association or Union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

18.—Wages.

The minimum weekly wage to be paid to and received by all workers shall be as follows:—

19.—Meal Money.

When a worker without being notified on the previous day is required to continue working after the usual knock-off time for more than one (1) hour or after 6 p.m., whichever is the later, he shall be provided with any meal required or shall be paid three shilling (3s.) in lieu thereof.

20.—Travelling Expenses.

Workers engaged in work from which they are unable to return to their homes at night shall be paid such personal expenses as they reasonably incur, but they shall be paid at the rate of fifteen shillings (15s.) per night at least.

7.—Overtime.

(a) All time worked before the usual starting or after the usual finishing time shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter.

(b) In the calculation of overtime each day shall stand alone.

(c) All time worked on the Sunday shift by shift workers within their normal working hours shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half. For the purposes of this subclause the Sunday shift shall be deemed to be any shift which commences between midnight Saturday and midnight Sunday, irrespective of the number of hours worked on the Sunday.

(d) (i) All time worked on Sundays which is outside the normal working hours shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter.

(ii) A worker called upon to perform work on Sundays shall be paid for at least two (2) hours at overtime rates.

(e) When a worker is recalled to work after leaving the job he shall be paid for at least one (1) hour at overtime rates.

(f) For day workers a meal interval of not more than one hour shall be allowed each day. Any such worker called upon to work during such meal interval shall be paid at overtime rates for any portion worked.

(g) When a worker without being notified on the previous day is required to continue working after his usual knock off time for more than one (1) hour or after 6 p.m. which ever is the later

he shall be provided with any meal required or shall be paid two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) in lieu thereof. Provided that such payment need not be made to a worker living in the same locality as his place of employment, who can reasonably return home to a meal.

(h) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Award—

- (i) An employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.
- (ii) No organisation, party to this Award, or worker or workers covered by this Award, shall in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 199 of 1955.

Between Western Australian Municipal, Road Boards, Parks and Race Course Employees' Union of Workers, Perth, Applicant, and City of Perth and others, Respondents.

HAVING heard Mr. V. Ulrich on behalf of the applicant and Mr. D. Scott on behalf of the respondents, and in pursuance of a remission to me by the Court of Arbitration and in pursuance of the powers contained in section 92 of the

Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, I hereby order and declare that Award No. 1 of 1948, as amended be, and the same is hereby further amended in the manner following:—

Clause 23.—Conditions and Extra Rates.

1. Delete this clause and insert in lieu thereof the following:—

23.—Conditions and Extra Rates.

(a) One shilling (1s.) per day or portion thereof in addition to the prescribed rate shall be paid to:—

- (i) Any worker working on wet ground.
- (ii) Any worker using slag in building or repairing roads.
- (iii) Workers required to throw up metal or other material with a shovel more than six (6) feet above the level from which they are working.
- (iv) Sanitary pan tarrers when tarring pans.
- (v) Workers engaged in drying or screening metal.
- (vi) Machine drivers and motor vehicle drivers who in the performance of their duties actually come into physical contact with tar or bitumen.
- (vii) Gully hole and sump cleaners (payment hereunder shall not apply to gully hole eductor operators or their assistants classified in clause 24 (b) (iv) hereof).
- (viii) Motor vehicle drivers who actually handle rubbish.
- (ix) Any worker handling filler, excluding workers feeding bituminous mixer (filler) classified in clause 24 (b) (ix) hereof.
- (x) Motor vehicle drivers who are called upon to assist the sprayer or fumigator to mix and/or spray with poisonous mixtures.

(b) Two shillings and sixpence per day or portion thereof in addition to the prescribed rate shall be paid to—

- (i) Casual workers.
- (ii) Wood block and cube layers.

(c) Five shillings per day extra shall be paid to—

- (i) Workers operating a tar spraying pressure machine or a bitumen emulsion spraying machine. This shall include the man operating the pump.

(d) Three shillings (3s.) per day extra shall be paid to—

- (i) Workers cleaning a bitumen tank or boiler.

(e) Workers removing or burying liquid or solid offensive matter or swill shall be paid at the appropriate sanitary rate.

(f) Workers engaged on fire-fighting shall be paid at the rate of two shillings (2s.) per hour in addition to their prescribed rate, for the time so employed.

(g) (i) Leading hands placed in charge of not less than three (3) or more than ten (10) other workers shall be paid one pound three shillings and sixpence (£1 3s. 6d.) per week above the rate of wage of the workers whose work they direct.

(ii) Leading hands placed in charge of more than ten (10) other workers shall be paid one pound eleven shillings and sixpence (£1 11s. 6d.) per week above the rate of wage of the workers whose work they direct.

(h) The wage of any worker temporarily taking over the duties of another worker shall not be reduced whilst he is so employed.

(i) Drivers who in addition to the hours of which the week is comprised are required to feed horses shall be paid as under in addition to their ordinary wage:—

(i) Monday to Friday inclusive, per horse, per day, 1s. 3d.

(ii) Saturday, Sunday and prescribed holidays, for one horse, 5s.; for each additional horse, 3s.

(j) A horse driver who is required to harness or groom a horse or horses outside his ordinary hours shall be paid for such work at overtime rates.

(k) Any worker using explosives shall be paid whilst using such explosives not less than the rate prescribed for a powder monkey.

(l) (i) Except in the case of night watchmen, night stableman and male attendants at public latrines, workers working shift work outside the ordinary hours of duty shall be paid five per cent. (5%) in addition to their ordinary rates.

(ii) Work other than day shift shall not be recognised as afternoon or night shift unless in either case five (5) consecutive afternoons or nights are worked but shall be deemed overtime. On completion of the fifth (5th) consecutive afternoon's or night's work the worker shall be deemed to have been employed on afternoon or night shift as the case may be during the preceding four (4) afternoons or nights and thereafter any subsequent consecutive afternoons or nights he is so required. The sequence of shift work shall not be deemed to be broken under the preceding paragraphs by reason of the fact that work is not performed on a Saturday, Sunday or a holiday.

(m) Any worker who is called upon to clean out a septic tank and who is required to enter a septic tank to perform such work shall receive not less than the rate prescribed for pan removers plus two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per hour whilst so engaged: Provided that if such work is performed by mechanical means such worker shall be paid the rate prescribed for pan removers. Gum boots, masks and overalls shall be supplied by the employer to workers engaged on such work.

(n) Any worker handling wet sewerage sludge shall be paid the rate prescribed for pan removers.

Provided that such payment need not be made to a worker living in the same locality as his place of employment, who can reasonably return home to a meal.

(g) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Award—

- (i) an employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement;
- (ii) no organisation, party to this Award, or worker or workers covered by this Award, shall in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

Provided further that at the option of the employer, the foregoing provision shall be deemed to have been complied with if all work performed on the holidays prescribed in subclause (a) hereof is paid for at the rate of double time.

(c) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under this Award the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rates of pay shall apply.

(d) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve months' continuous service with such employer.

(e) If any Award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(f) If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-sixth of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service.

(i) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

(j) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

(k) This clause shall operate as from the 1st day of January, 1956. The quantum of annual leave to be allowed to a worker shall, for service prior to 1st January, 1956, be calculated in accordance with the provisions of the Award applicable before that date.

3.—Area.

This Award shall operate over the area comprised within a radius of twenty-five (25) miles from the General Post Office, Perth.

4.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be for a period of three (3) years from the beginning of the first pay period commencing after the date hereof.

5.—Definition.

"Casual worker" means a worker employed for less than one week at one time. A casual worker shall be paid at the rate of ten per cent. (10%) in addition to the rates prescribed herein for the time so employed.

6.—Hours.

The week's work shall consist of forty (40) hours, which shall be worked in five (5) days.

7.—Wages.

The minimum rates of wages payable to workers covered by this Award shall be as follows:—

(d) Leading Hands.—Any worker placed in charge of three (3) or more adult workers covered by this Award shall be paid the rate of three shillings (3s.) per day extra.

8.—Overtime.

(a) All time worked on any day after the regular working hours and all time worked on Saturday shall be deemed overtime and paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

(b) Any worker required to continue working after the usual knock-off time for more than two hours without having been notified on the previous day shall be supplied with any meal required or shall be paid the sum of three shillings (3s.) in lieu thereof.

(c) Where a worker is recalled to work after leaving the job, he shall be paid for at least two (2) hours at overtime rates.

(d) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Award—

- (i) an employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement;
- (ii) no organisation party to this Award, or worker or workers covered by this Award, shall in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation, or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

9.—Payment of Wages.

All wages shall be paid on or before Friday in each week and shall be paid within fifteen (15) minutes of the usual time for finishing work.

10.—Termination of Employment.

The contract of service shall be by the day and shall be terminable by one day's notice on either side.

11.—Piecework.

A worker undertaking piecework shall be paid at least the minimum rate prescribed by this Award plus ten per cent. (10%).

12.—Higher Duties.

A worker engaged for more than two (2) hours in any one day on duties carrying a higher rate than his ordinary classification shall be paid the higher rate for that day.

13.—Spray Painting.

Spray painting operations shall be carried on under the conditions and restrictions imposed by orders or regulations for the time being in force made by the Department of Public Health, in pursuance of the Factories and Shops Act and amendments thereof, and for such purpose such orders and regulations are hereby embodied in and form part of this Award, with the intent that a breach thereof may be enforceable as a breach of the Award.

14.—Special Conditions.

(a) No worker shall be permitted to have a meal in any paint shop or in such close proximity to any place where painting operations are being carried on as is likely to cause injury to his health.

(b) Washing of Hands.—The employer shall provide for workers washing facilities and soap suitable as a solvent for paint mixtures in some convenient place for the use of workers before meals and after knocking off work for the day.

(c) Workers shall be allowed five (5) minutes each day before ceasing work for the purpose of washing and cleaning up.

15.—Access to Jobs.

The secretary or any authorised officer of the Union shall be allowed free access to any job at any time during the luncheon hour, and, with the consent of the employer or foreman at any other time to interview any of the workers, if he desires to do so.

16.—Absence through Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health at the rate of 1/12th of a week's pay for

each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to one week's pay in each calendar year.

(b) Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred.

(c) This clause shall not apply when the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(d) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through any accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment, or for any accident wherever sustained, arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(e) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(f) Notwithstanding the provisions of subclause (e) hereof, a worker, who in any calendar year, has already been allowed paid sick leave on one occasion for one day only shall not be entitled to payment for any further absence of one day only unless he produces to the employer a medical certificate stating that he was unable to attend for duty on account of personal ill-health.

17. Holidays.

(a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu, shall, subject to clause 8 (Overtime) hereof, be allowed as holidays without deduction of pay, namely, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, State Foundation Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

(b) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under this Award, the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done, ordinary rates of pay shall apply.

(c) Except as hereinafter provided, a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.

(d) If any Award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day, there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(e) If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-sixth of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service.

(f) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay, or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this Award, shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to annual leave.

(g) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled, subject to subclause (e) of this clause, to such leave on full pay as is proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer, and if such leave is not equal to the leave given to the other workers, he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on leave on full pay.

(h) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

(i) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

18.—Aged and Infirm Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for or be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

19.—Record.

(a) Each employer shall keep a time and wages book, showing the name of each worker, and the nature of his work, the hours worked each day, and the wages and allowances paid each week. Any system of automatic recording by means of machines shall be deemed a compliance with this provision to the extent of the information recorded.

(b) The time and wages record shall be open for inspection to a duly accredited official of the Union during the usual office hours, at the employers' office or other convenient place, and he shall be allowed to take extracts therefrom.

20.—Junior Workers.

(a) Male junior workers shall be allowed in the proportion of one junior to each adult worker. The proprietor and/or his manager shall be counted as a worker for the purpose of this clause, if engaged in the actual working in the shop or factory. Where no adult worker is employed, one junior may be employed.

(b) Female juniors shall not be employed.

21.—Junior Workers' Certificate.

Junior workers upon being engaged shall, if practicable, furnish the employer with a certificate containing the following particulars:—

(i) Name in full.

(ii) Age and date of birth.

No worker shall have any claim upon an employer for additional pay in the event of the age of the worker being wrongly stated either on the certificate or, if no such certificate is furnished, verbally to the employer. If any junior worker shall wilfully mis-state his age either verbally to the employer or in the certificate, he alone shall be guilty of a breach of this Award.

22.—Board of Reference.

(a) The Court hereby appoints, for the purpose of this Award, a Board of Reference.

(b) The Board shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties.

(c) There are appointed to such Board, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the Award, the functions of—

(i) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Award or any of them;

(ii) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time.

(d) An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, which for this purpose are embodied in this Award.

23.—Breakdowns, Etc.

The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the Union or unions affiliated with it, or by any other association or union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery, or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

(d) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of 12 months' continuous service with such employer.

(e) If any Award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, this 6th day of October, 1955, between the Chief Secretary for the State of Western Australia (hereinafter referred

to as the "Minister") of the one part, and the Western Australian Gaol Officers' Union of Workers, Fremantle (hereinafter referred to as the "Union") of the other part, witnesseth:—

1.—Title.

This Agreement shall be known as the Gaol Officers' Agreement, 1955, and supersedes Agreement No. 7 of 1952.

3.—Term.

The term of this Agreement shall be for a period of one (1) year from the beginning of the first pay period commencing after the date hereof.

4.—Area and Scope.

This Agreement shall operate throughout the State of Western Australia and shall apply to all members of the West Australian Prison Service enumerated in clause 22 hereof.

5.—Definitions.

(a) The definitions referred to hereunder shall apply only for the purpose of this Agreement and shall not be taken to conflict in any manner whatsoever with the general orders and regulations dealing with the control and management of the Prison Service of Western Australia.

(b) "Officers" shall include all employees except probationers and temporary employees.

(c) "Probationer" shall mean an employee not permanently appointed but undergoing instruction and proving his suitability for permanent employment.

(d) "Employees" includes officers, probationers, guards and temporary employees.

(e) "Practicable" means practicable in the fair and reasonable opinion of the Comptroller General, provided that if any dispute arises as to whether in any case such opinion is fair and reasonable, the matter shall be referred to the Court of Arbitration.

(f) "Temporary employee" shall mean one appointed for an emergency and whose service does not exceed a period of three months at any one time.

6.—Allowances.

(a) All permanent employees for whom quarters are not provided shall be entitled to a lodging allowance of £40 per annum.

(b) Pardelup.—Officers employed at Pardelup shall be entitled to an allowance of £12 per annum.

(c) Employees working outside the South-West Land Division shall be paid District Allowance as prescribed in the Public Service Regulations.

7.—Relieving.

(a) An officer called upon to relieve a senior officer will not be entitled to the salary of the senior position unless the period of relief exceeds

seven days. If the period of relief continues beyond seven days, an allowance being the difference between the salary of the position relieved and the salary of the officer concerned shall be paid from the commencement of the relieving period.

(b) Outstations.—When temporarily transferred from his permanent station to an outstation for the purpose of relieving thereat, an employee shall be paid an allowance at the rate of 2s. 6d. per day extra.

8.—Clothing.

Uniforms shall be provided by the Minister on the following scale:—

One full uniform, including one pair of boots or shoes, each six months.

One cap and covers every two years.

One mackintosh and helmet every three years.

One overcoat every five years.

One extra set of uniform buttons after six months' service.

Leggings, sneaks, buttons and badge to be supplied when considered necessary by the Comptroller General.

Temporary employees shall be provided with second hand uniforms and one pair of boots or shoes.

9.—Special Allowances.

An officer rostered for disciplinary duties in the workshop or an officer engaged in truck driving shall be paid an allowance of 1s. per day whilst so employed.

10.—Duty Roster.

(a) A weekly duty board shall be posted up by 11 a.m. each Friday to cover duties for the following week—Monday to Friday—and shall be adhered to as far as possible by the Department.

(b) Any rostered day off which is granted in lieu of a public holiday shall be clearly shown on the duty board.

11.—Hours of Duty.

(a) Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work. Such hours may be construed to mean eighty (80) per fortnight.

(b) Such hours shall be worked in continuous shifts when practicable, of eight (8) hours each shift. Such hours shall include a meal break of twenty (20) minutes each shift, during which the officer shall be on call.

(c) Guards shall take such meal break whilst on duty and not leave their posts.

(d) (i) The employer (or respondents to this Agreement) may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirements.

(ii) The Union or worker or workers covered by this Agreement shall not in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

12.—Overtime.

(a) All overtime worked in excess of the ordinary daily hours as rostered for any shift shall be classed as overtime and be paid for at a rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter. If an officer is called back on a rostered day off he should be paid at overtime rates.

(b) An officer called out for duty for any purpose outside his ordinary working hours shall be paid a minimum of two (2) hours or at overtime rates, whichever is the greater, provided that such work, exclusive of meal time is not continuous with his shift.

13.—Annual Leave.

(a) Excepting employees mentioned in clause 15, three weeks' annual leave shall be granted to all officers and probationers for each year of service.

(b) An employee with more than one month's service, who may resign or be dismissed, except when the dismissal is due to misconduct, shall be entitled to the same proportion of three weeks' annual leave as his period of service bears to one calendar year.

(c) As far as practicable, one month's notice shall be given to the officer concerned, of the date of commencement of his annual leave.

14.—Public Holidays.

The following public holidays or the days observed in lieu thereof, shall be granted as paid holidays:—New Year's Day, Anniversary Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, Sovereign's Birthday, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

Any employee required to work on any of these days shall be paid at the rate of double time.

15.—Special Holiday Provisions.

Employees stationed at Pardelup or stationed North of 25 deg. South latitude, shall be granted 28 days' annual leave in addition to the public holidays prescribed in clause 14: Provided that employees stationed North of 25 deg. South latitude may, if they desire, be granted 56 days' leave biennially in lieu of annual leave, and in that event, shall also be granted full first class steamer fare to Fremantle or other port in the State for himself, wife and children under the age of 16 years.

16.—Long Service Leave.

(a) Permanent employees shall be granted long service leave under the provisions of Public Service Regulations.

(b) Prison guards shall receive long service leave in accordance with the long service leave conditions applying to Government wages employees.

(c) Any employee who has served at least 12 months continuously and who is retired through ill-health, shall be paid for long service leave *pro rata* to the date of leaving the prison service.

(d) Where practicable, three months' notice of the commencing date of long service leave shall be given to all employees.

(e) If a deceased employee who had served continuously for at least 12 months before his death leaves a widow or children, dependent mother or dependent invalid sister, payment *pro rata* of long service leave up to the date of such employee's death shall be granted to such widow or dependants.

17.—Sick Leave.

When an employee is bound to his house by illness arising from causes not within his control, sick leave shall be granted in accordance with the following, on production of satisfactory medical certificates.

(a) Probationers—Not exceeding two weeks on full pay in any year.

(b) Officers—In each period of three years, not exceeding a total of three months' leave on full pay, and three months on half pay.

(c) Sick leave with pay will not be granted when the illness is due to the worker's own neglect or misconduct.

18.—Medical Attention.

Officers shall receive medical attention as provided in Prison Regulations.

19.—Preference to Unionists.

Where a worker other than a member of the Union is engaged, such worker shall within fourteen (14) days of engagement, make application for membership of the Union and complete such application.

20.—Escorts.

(a) Officers on escort duty to Pardelup or elsewhere shall be paid an allowance at the rate of 4s. per meal and 3s. 6d. per bed per day. The allowance for bed shall not be paid where a sleeping berth is provided at the expense of the Department.

(b) Officers on escort duty shall be paid an allowance of 1s. 6d. per prisoner per day to cover the cost of the provision of tea.

21.—Water Rates.

Water rates shall be paid by the Minister where officers occupy quarters provided by the Department.

HAVING heard Mr. V. Ulrich on behalf of the applicant and Mr. D. Scott on behalf of the respondents, and in pursuance of a remission to me by the Court of Arbitration, and in pursuance of the powers contained in section 92 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, I hereby order and declare that Award No. 77 of 1948, as amended, be and the same is hereby further amended in the manner following:—

Clause 26.—Special Conditions and
Extra Rates.

1. Delete this clause and insert in lieu thereof the following:—

26.—Special Conditions and Extra Rates.

(a) One shillings (1s.) per day or portion thereof in addition to the prescribed rates shall be paid to—

- (i) any worker working on wet ground where waterproof boots are not provided;
- (ii) any worker using slag in building or re-paving roads;
- (iii) workers required to throw up metal or other material with a shovel more than six (6) feet above the level from which they are working;
- (iv) sanitary pan tarrers when tarring pans;
- (v) workers engaged in screening metal;
- (vi) motor vehicle drivers who in the performance of their duties actually come into physical contact with tar or bitumen;
- (vii) gully hole and sump cleaners;
- (viii) motor vehicle drivers who actually handle rubbish.

(b) Two shillings and sixpence per day or portion thereof in addition to the prescribed rate shall be paid to—

- (i) casual workers;
- (ii) wood block and cube layers.

(c) Five shillings per day extra shall be paid to—

- (i) workers operating a tar spraying pressure machine or a bitumen emulsion spraying machine. This shall include the man operating the pump.

(d) Three shillings (3s.) per day extra shall be paid to—

- (i) workers cleaning a bitumen tank or boiler.

(e) Workers removing or burying liquid or solid offensive matter or swill shall be paid at the appropriate sanitary rate.

(f) (i) Leading hands placed in charge of not less than three (3) or more than ten (10) other workers shall be paid one pound three shillings and sixpence (£1 3s. 6d.) per week above the rate of wage of the workers whose work they direct.

(ii) Leading hands placed in charge of more than ten (10) other workers shall be paid one pound eleven shillings and sixpence (£1 11s. 6d.) per week above the rate of wage of the workers whose work they direct.

(g) The wage of any worker temporarily taking over the duties of another worker shall not be reduced whilst he is so employed.

(h) Drivers who in addition to the hours of which the week is comprised are required to feed horses shall be paid as under in addition to their ordinary wage:—

(i) Monday to Friday inclusive, per horse, per day—1s. 3d.

(ii) Saturday, Sunday and prescribed holidays—for one horse, 5s.; for each additional horse, 3s.

(i) A horse driver who is required to harness or groom a horse or horses outside his ordinary hours shall be paid for such work at overtime rates.

(j) Any worker using explosives shall be paid whilst using such explosives not less than the rate prescribed for a powder monkey.

(k) (i) Except in the case of night watchmen, night stableman and male attendants at public latrines, workers working shift work outside the ordinary hours of duty shall be paid five per cent. (5%) in addition to their ordinary rates.

(ii) Work other than day shift shall not be recognised as afternoon or night shift unless in either case five (5) consecutive afternoons or nights are worked, but shall be deemed overtime. On completion of the fifth (5th) consecutive afternoon's or night's work the worker shall be deemed to have been employed on afternoon or night shift, as the case may be during the preceding four (4) afternoons or nights and thereafter any subsequent consecutive afternoons or nights he is so required. The sequence of shift work shall not be deemed to be broken under the preceding paragraphs by reason of the fact that work is not performed on a Saturday, Sunday or a holiday.

(l) Any worker who is called upon to clean out a septic tank and who is required to enter a septic tank to perform such work shall receive not less than the rate prescribed for pan removers plus two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per hour whilst so engaged: Provided that if such work is performed by mechanical means such worker shall be paid the rate prescribed for pan removers. Gum boots, masks and overalls shall be supplied by the employers to workers engaged on such work.

(m) Any worker handling wet sewerage sludge shall be paid the rate prescribed for pan removers.

(n) Pipe jointers, pipe setters, timbermen and others included in clause 28, subclause (b) (vii) or workers employed in shafts when working between six (6) feet and twenty (20) feet below the surface shall be paid one shilling (1s.) per day extra. When working over twenty (20) feet below the surface, three shillings (3s.) per day shall be paid.

(o) Nightwatchmen shall be allowed one (1) night off in each four (4) weeks.

(p) Any worker employed on any phase of road work or work on footpaths shall receive a margin of not less than thirteen shillings and sixpence (13s. 6d.) per week.

(q) Except in cases where the employer provides board and lodging, any worker who is sent by his employer or is employed by his employer to work at such a distance from headquarters that it is impracticable for him to return to his home each night, he shall be paid an allowance of four shillings (4s.) per day in addition to his prescribed rate of pay per day whilst so employed.

3.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to workers engaged in the vocations mentioned in clause 7 hereof in the confectionery manufacturing industry.

4.—Area.

This Award shall have effect over the area comprised within a radius of fifteen (15) miles from the General Post Office, Perth.

5.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be for a period of three (3) years as from the beginning of the first pay period commencing after the date hereof.

6.—Definitions.

(a) "Confectioner" means an adult male, not expressly included in the definition of a machinist or general hand employed—

- handling or dealing with confectionery in any process of manufacture from raw materials such as sugar, glucose, gelatine, gum or licorice, chocolate, or similar material to the finished article, and includes a worker who runs by hand with any kind of funnel or bag, jubes, jellies, cream fondant, snowballs, or other articles which are run into stamped or moulded starch trays or other moulded receptacles; or

- operating or controlling any of the following machines:—

Chocolate dipping or covering machine;
licorice making or shaping machine;
depositing machine;
cocoa bean roaster;
lozenge stamping machine;
lozenge cutting machine;
mogul depositing machine.

Provided that where the operator of a licorice shaping machine or the depositing machine or the lozenge stamping machine or the lozenge cutting machine or the mogul depositing machine is a worker who is neither qualified nor able to do the work of a confectioner but is merely the operator of the machine, machinists' rates only shall be paid.

- "Machinist" means an adult male employed operating any one or more of the following machines:—

Combined refiner and melanger;
melanger;
refiners;
couchers;
cocoa mill;
cocoa butter press;
neat work mill;
liquor mill;
gum refining;
icing sugar mill.

(c) "General hand" means an adult male worker engaged on one or more of the following operations:—

Grinding nuts;
stirring gum or syrup;
smoothing, emptying, sieving starch trays;
cleaning confectionery;
washing tins or bottles with a capacity of over 4 lb.;
stamping lozenges;
marking toffee on slabs;
rolling confectionery sticks or balls;
blanching nuts by machine;
cutting confectionery by hand or vertical or circular cutting machine;
grinding figs, acids, and other ingredients used in the trade;
weighing confectionery and ingredients (over 30 lb.);
straining syrup or other material used in the trade;
all handling of confectionery or ingredients in the manufacture of confectionery;
up-ending sugar or lumping sugar;
glazing confections;
cutting neat work;
coating boiled goods with such ingredients as dry sugar or cocoanut, etc.;
feeding Forgrove and similar machines (except universal type).

(d) "Casual worker" shall mean any worker employed for one week or less.

8.—Hours.

(a) Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work and shall be worked between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. Monday to Friday inclusive.

(b) Where more than one shift is worked the starting and finishing times shall be as agreed upon between the employers and the Union, and failing agreement the matter shall be referred to the Board of Reference for decision.

(c) Any adult worker, other than a shift worker, called upon to commence work between 12 mid-night and 7 a.m. on operations which must necessarily commence between those times shall be paid three shillings (3s.) per day in addition to his ordinary rate.

9.—Shift Workers.

Any worker who works on shift work other than the recognised day shift shall be paid for such shifts at the following rates:—

- (a) Five per cent. in addition to the ordinary rate for afternoon shift.
- (b) Ten per cent. in addition to the ordinary rate for night shift.

10.—Overtime.

(a) All time worked in excess of eight (8) hours per day or, subject to clause 8 (c), outside the usual starting and finishing times shall be deemed overtime and shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

(b) When a worker without being notified on the previous day is required to continue working after the usual knock off time for more than one and a half hours he shall be provided with any meal required or shall be paid three shillings (3s.) in lieu thereof. Provided that this subclause shall not apply to a worker who can conveniently return home for a meal.

(c) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Award—

- (i) an employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement;
- (ii) no organisation, party to this Award or worker or workers, covered by this Award shall in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation, or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

11.—Mixed Functions.

A worker who is required to do work which is entitled to a higher rate under this Award than that which he or she usually performs shall be entitled to the higher rate whilst so engaged.

12.—Contract of Service.

(a) Except in the case of a casual worker who may leave or be put off by the employer at any time, the contract of hiring of every worker shall be a weekly contract terminable by one week's notice on either side, given on any working day.

(b) Subject to clause 15 hereof, any worker not attending for duty shall lose his pay for the actual time of such non-attendance.

13.—Holidays.

(a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu, shall be allowed as holidays without deduction of pay, namely:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, State Foundation Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

(b) All work performed on any of the foregoing days or Sunday shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

14.—Annual Leave.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided, a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of 12 months' continuous service with such employer.

(b) If any Award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been

an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(c) If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying 12-monthly period, a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-sixth (1/6th) of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service.

(d) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work, except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay, or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this Award, shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to annual leave.

(e) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled, subject to subclause (c) of this clause, to such leave on full pay as is proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer, and if such leave is not equal to the leave given to the other workers he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on leave on full pay.

(f) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

(g) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

15.—Absence Through Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-twelfth (1/12th) of a week for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to one week's pay in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply when the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(b) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through any accident wherever sustained arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(d) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this Award shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to payment under this clause.

16.—Junior Workers.

Junior workers upon being engaged shall, if practicable, furnish the employer with a certificate containing the following particulars:—

- (i) Name in full.
- (ii) Age and date of birth.

No worker shall have any claim upon an employer for additional pay in the event of the age of the worker being wrongly stated either on the certificate or, if no such certificate is furnished, verbally to the employer. If any junior worker shall wilfully mis-state his age either verbally to the employer or in the certificate, he alone shall be guilty of a breach of this Award, and in the event of a worker having received a higher rate than that to which he was entitled he shall make restitution to the employer.

17.—Posting of Award.

Every employer shall post a copy of this Award in a conspicuous place in the factory, easily accessible to all workers.

18.—Board of Reference.

The Court hereby appoints, for the purpose of this Award, a Board or Boards of Reference. Each such Board shall consist of a chairman and two other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties as prescribed by regulations.

There are assigned to each such Board, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to this Award, the functions of—

- (a) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise from time to time except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Award, or any of them;
- (b) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time.

An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, which for the purpose are embodied in this Award.

19.—Right of Entry.

In the case of a disagreement existing or anticipated concerning any of the provisions of this Award, an accredited representative of the Union shall be permitted to interview the workers during the recognised meal interval, on the business premises of the employer, but this permission shall not be exercised without the consent of the employer more than once in any one week.

20.—Rest Period.

Every worker shall be given a morning spell of seven (7) minutes' duration, such time to count as time worked.

21.—Piecework.

(a) An employer may make a contract with a worker or group of workers for payment by results by piecework.

(b) A worker working under any system of payment by results shall be paid at least time rate of pay apportioned if necessary.

(c) Where a worker works part of a week at piecework rates and part at time rates he shall be paid so much as he is entitled to receive under piecework rates for the amount of work done and, in addition thereto, such proportionate amount at time rates as prescribed in this Award for the portion of the week worked at time rates.

(d) In the event of any dispute regarding piecework rates occurring and remaining unsettled between the employer and the workers, the employer or the Union may refer such dispute to the Board of Reference.

22.—Payment of Wages.

Wages shall be paid at least once weekly.

23.—Time and Wages Book.

(a) The employer shall keep or cause to be kept a record or records containing the following particulars:—

- (i) Name of each worker.
- (ii) The nature of his work.
- (iii) The hours worked each day and each week.
- (iv) The wages and overtime (if any) paid each week.
- (v) The age of each junior worker.

Any system of automatic recording by machines shall be deemed to comply with this provision to the extent of the information recorded.

(b) The time and wages record shall be open for inspection by a duly accredited official of the Union, during the usual office hours at the employer's office, or other convenient place, and the representative may be allowed to take extracts therefrom.

(c) The employer shall, not more often than once in every period of three months, when requested so to do by an accredited representative of the Union, supply to the Union a list of the addresses of such workers as are members of the Union, except such as have in writing requested the employer not to supply his or her address.

24.—Meal Interval.

No female worker or junior male worker shall be employed for a longer period than five (5) hours without a break for a meal. The time allowed for each meal required shall be not less than thirty (30) minutes.

25.—General Provisions.

(a) No female under the age of eighteen (18) years shall be required to lift weights in excess of 25 lb., and no female worker over eighteen (18) years of age shall be required to lift weights in excess of 35 lb.

(b) All female workers shall, where possible, be allowed to sit to perform their duties.

26.—Breakdowns.

The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed, because of any strike by the Union or unions affiliated with it, or by any other association or union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

27.—Under-rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for the employer at the proposed lesser rate.
