AT a meeting of the Executive Council held in the Executive Council Chambers, at Perth, this 3rd day of November, 1971, the following Orders in Council were authorised to be issued:—

Land Act, 1933-1969.
ORDER IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by section 33 of the Land Act, 1933-1969, it is *inter alia*, made lawful for the Governor by Order in Council, to direct that any land reserved pursuant to the provisions of this Act shall be granted in fee simple to any person (as defined in the said section) subject to the condition that the person shall not lease or mortgage the whole or any part of the land without the consent of the Governor and subject to such other conditions and limitations as the Governor shall deem necessary to ensure that the land is used for the purpose for which the land is reserved as aforesaid; and whereas it is deemed expedient, as follows:—

Corres. 10493/97.—That Reserve No. 30648 (Kalgoorlie Lot 3517) should, subject as aforesaid be granted in fee simple to The Western Australian Institute of Technology to be held in trust for "Use and Requirements of The Western Australian Institute of Technology".

Corres. 3128/60.—That Reserve No. 31082 (Wyndham Lot 812) should, subject as aforesaid be granted in fee simple to The Country Women's Association of Western Australia (Inc.) to be held in trust for "Rest Room Site (C.W.A.)."

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council doth hereby direct that the before-mentioned reserves shall be granted in fee simple to the aforesaid bodies, to be held in trust for the aforesaid purposes, subject to the condition that the land shall not be leased or mortgaged in whole or in part without the consent of the Governor.

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby direct that the before-mentioned Reserves shall vest in and be held by the above-mentioned bodies, in trust for the purposes aforesaid, subject nevertheless to the powers reserved to him by section 37 of the said Act.

PURSUANT to the powers vested in me by virtue of sections 14 and 17B of the Fauna Conservation Act, 1950-1970, I hereby declare as follows:—

- (1) That the period from six o'clock in the afternoon of Saturday, December 18, 1971 to 12 o'clock midnight Sunday, February 13, 1972 shall be an open season in respect of those species of wild duck in the Second Schedule hereto in those parts of the State which lie within the boundaries of the South-West Division and Eucla Division as defined in section 28 of the Land Act 1933, with the exception of those areas defined in the First Schedule hereto.

- (2) That the species of wild duck in the Second Schedule hereto are game species in all parts of the State in respect of which an open season on those species is declared by paragraph (1) of this notice.
- (3) That a person shall not take any wild duck of a species declared to be a game species under the Second Schedule hereto unless he has been granted a license under Regulation 21 of the Fauna Conservation Regulations.
- (4) That a person shall not take any wild duck or the egg of any wild duck for the purpose of keeping it in captivity, or for the purpose of aviculture or for the purpose of sale.
- (5) That a person shall not sell any wild duck.
- (6) That a person shall not take any wild duck by any means other than a shotgun licensed pursuant to the Firearms and Guns Act 1931, and having a calibre less than thirty-one-fortieths of an inch in internal diameter (ten gauge) provided that this restriction shall not prohibit a person who is a native within the meaning of the Native Welfare Act 1905 from using any nature artifact in the taking of wild ducks.
- (7) That a person shall not take or attempt to take wild ducks from any boat, raft, launch or other type of boat which is powered by any type of motor or engine or which is propelled or towed by any means other than by hand.
- (8) That a person may take—
 - (a) six wild ducks of a species mentioned in Part I of the Second Schedule hereto in any one day;
 - (b) ten wild ducks of a species mentioned in Part II of the Second Schedule hereto in any one day;
 but in no case shall a person take more than—
 - (c) six wild ducks of the species mentioned in Part I of the Second Schedule hereto in any one day;
 - (d) ten wild ducks in any one day.
- (9) That a person shall not have under his control or in his possession or keep in any cool store or any freezing chamber or other premises at any one time—
 - (a) on opening day—
 - (i) six wild ducks of the species mentioned in Part I of the Second Schedule hereto;
 - (ii) ten wild ducks;
 - (b) on any other day than opening day of the open season more than—
 - (i) twelve wild ducks of the species mentioned in Part I of the Second Schedule hereto;
 - (ii) twenty wild ducks.

RESOLVED that the Canning Town Council, in pursuance of section 7 of the Town Planning and Development Act, 1928-1965, prepare the above Town Planning Scheme with reference to an area situated wholly within the Canning Town and enclosed within the inner edge of the broken black border on the maps produced to the Canning Town Council and marked and designated as Land Use Map, Scheme Map and Supplementary Map "A" and certified by the Mayor and the Town Clerk of the Council under their hands dated 14th day of June, 1971.

Town Planning Scheme No. 23.

SCHEME TEXT.

Citation.

1. This Town Planning Scheme may be cited as Town of Canning Town Planning Scheme No. 23—Lynwood/Ferndale Guided Development Scheme (hereinafter referred to as "the Scheme").

Responsible Authority.

2. The Authority responsible for enforcing the observance of this Scheme is the Town of Canning (hereinafter referred to as "the Council").

Maps.

3. The following maps are attached to this Text and form part of the Scheme:—

- Land Use Map.
- Scheme Map.
- Supplementary Map "A".

Scheme Area.

4. The Scheme shall apply to the land contained within a broken black line on the Land Use Map. The said land is hereinafter referred to as "the Scheme Area".

General Objects.

5. The general objects of the Scheme are—
- (a) To facilitate and encourage the subdivision and development of land within the Scheme Area.
 - (b) To control the amount and the nature of multi-residential development within the Scheme Area.
 - (c) To make suitable provision for roads and access ways within the Scheme Area.
 - (d) To provide proper drainage of those parts of the Scheme Area which require drainage.
 - (e) To make provision for the creation of drainage reserves and easements.
 - (f) To require the provision of sewerage facilities within the Scheme Area and ensure the provision of sewerage works and facilities outside the Scheme Area where these are necessary to the proper sewerage of the Scheme Area.
 - (g) To make provision for sewerage and drainage reserves and easements.

(h) To make provision for reserves and easements for electric power mains and electric sub-stations and for other public utility services.

(i) To ensure the provision of reticulated water to and throughout the Scheme Area.

(j) To make provision for Public Open Space within the Scheme Area.

(k) To make provision for other matters which are necessary or incidental to town planning or housing.

Method of Carrying out Objects.

6. It is intended that as and when owners of land within the Scheme Area subdivide or develop their land such subdivision or development shall not only be according to a plan which is capable of forming part of an overall plan of subdivision for the Scheme Area but shall also comply with the conditions of development for the Scheme Area contained in or imposed by the authority of the Scheme.

7. The Scheme Map forms a basis for the location of roads and the development of the Scheme Area but the Council may permit alterations or variations to the Scheme Map where circumstances justify such action provided that no such alteration or variation shall be permitted if in the opinion of the Council it shall impede the development of the Scheme Area as a whole.

Subdivision

8. An owner of land within the Scheme Area who desires to subdivide his land either alone or in conjunction with other owners shall submit a plan of the proposed subdivision to the Town Planning Board as required by the Town Planning and Development Act of Western Australia.

Roads and Footways.

9. Subject to the following clauses all new roads and footways within the Scheme Area shall be constructed and drained at the expense of the owners of land therein and each owner shall when subdividing his land make the land available for the roads and footways and pay the costs of the construction and drainage of the roads and footways within the land owned by him.

10. In cases where the situation of a new road or footway within the Scheme Area is such that in the opinion of the Council it would be fair and equitable that the owners of land served or capable of being served by the road or footway share the responsibility for providing the necessary land and should share the cost of constructing and draining the road or footway thereon and such owners are unable to agree upon the equitable division of such responsibility and costs the amount (if any) payable by each such owner and any incidental matters shall be determined by arbitration in the manner hereinafter provided.

11. Although the roads coloured red on the Scheme Map have been designed as roads with dual carriageways the owners who under the preceding clauses would have been liable to pay for the construction and drainage of those roads shall be required only to pay so much of the cost of construction and drainage of those roads as would have been payable if the roads had been of single carriageway in addition to the amount payable by him under clause 43 hereof.

12. The Council may from time to time as and when it deems fit acquire by purchase or resumption the whole or any portion of the land required for the roads coloured red on the Scheme Map and proceed with the construction and drainage of one or two carriageways thereon.

13. If an owner when subdividing his land shall make land available for a road coloured red on the Scheme Map in excess of the amount of land which would have been required if such road had been a one chain single carriageway road he shall be compensated by the Council in respect of the value of such excess.

14. If a single carriageway shall in the first instance be constructed on a road coloured red on the Scheme Map it shall be in such position as shall be determined by the Council.

15. The Council shall pay one-half of the cost of the construction and drainage of the roads hatched brown on the Scheme Map and the owner's liability in respect thereof shall be reduced accordingly.

16. The Council may construct and drain any new road within the scheme area and acquire the land to be used for such road. If the Council shall do so prior to the subdivision of the land abutting such road the costs of the construction and drainage of the said road and all compensation and other costs consequent upon the acquisition of the land shall be paid to the Council by the respective owners of land in accordance with the foregoing provisions as and when they subdivide their land or prior to that time if a mutually acceptable arrangement can be agreed to by both the landowners and the Council. Subject to clause 10 the owners of the land abutting the road shall be liable for the payment to the Council.

17. If an owner shall claim compensation for the resumption from him of land to be used as a road there shall be set off against the amount of compensation payable to him the amount by which the value of the remainder of his land has been or will be increased by the construction of the roads within the Scheme Area and by the operation of the Scheme.

18. If an owner shall subdivide his land and if he or his predecessor in title shall have claimed or shall have been paid compensation by reason of the resumption by the Council of the land for a new road within the Scheme Area he shall before the approval of his plan of subdivision release the Council from the payment of compensation or repay to the Council the compensation paid by it to him or his predecessor in title as the case may be.

Relocation of Roads.

19. Surveyed roads within the Scheme Area that are not shown as roads on the Scheme Map or are shown thereon as roads to be closed shall be deemed to have been relocated in accordance with the Scheme Map.

Sewerage.

20. No land shall be subdivided unless there is a sewer to which all new lots in the proposed subdivision may be connected.

21. Subject to the next following clause no building shall be occupied unless the building is connected to a sewer.

22. The Council may upon such conditions as it thinks fit approve the construction and occupation of a detached dwelling-house on an existing lot if in the opinion of the Council the ground is sufficiently absorptive to permit the satisfactory functioning of an apparatus for the bacteriolytic treatment of sewage.

23. (1) For the purpose of enabling the subdivision of their land by its connection to a sewer, a group of owners have formed a Consortium and have entered into an arrangement with the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage Board to construct at their cost the first module of Sewage Treatment Plant and Sewerage Works with a limited capacity to cater for a population of approximately 20,000 persons.

(2) Where an application for consent to subdivide land is submitted and the subdivider is not a member of the Consortium, the Town Planning Board prior to approving the subdivision shall require that the subdivider pay if so required by the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage Board, an amount as part of the establishment cost of a sewage treatment plant and sewerage works on terms acceptable to that Board.

(3) Where an application for consent to develop land for residential purposes is submitted by a landowner, not being a member of the Consortium, and the Council and/or the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage Board is of the

opinion that the connection of such land to the sewerage works may impede or restrict the programme of development by one or more of the members of the Consortium, the Council shall refuse to permit the development.

Provided that should the applicant agree to pay an amount as part of the establishment cost of the additional Sewage Treatment Plant capacity and Sewerage Works over and above that required by the Consortium on terms acceptable to the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage Board, and the Council is satisfied that the land to be developed can be connected to a sewer, it may, subject to the provisions of the Scheme, approve the application.

Drainage.

24. (1) The main drainage lines shown on the Scheme Map are required to provide proper drainage within the Scheme Area.

(2) The main drainage lines are shown in an approximate position only and may be varied to integrate with the final subdivisional and drainage design.

(3) The main drains will be constructed by the Council and the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage Board and will be piped unless the Board and the Council shall decide otherwise.

(4) An owner of land shall prior to the subdivision and development of his land pay to the Council the cost of any drainage installations (other than main drains) that may be necessary for the proper drainage of his land.

Population Density.

25. It is intended that development be so controlled that the population of the Scheme Area does not exceed 32 persons per net residential acre. A figure representing the number of persons per net residential acre is obtained by dividing the estimated population capable of being satisfactorily accommodated in the Scheme Area (population) by the total area of land in acres available for development for residential purposes (residential land). The estimated population is 35,264 persons and the residential land is approximately 1,102 acres resulting in 32 persons per net residential acre.

26. For the purposes of the Scheme it is accepted that the average number of persons accommodated by a detached house on its own lot is 3.8 persons and by a dwelling unit other than a detached house (hereinafter referred to as a "multiple dwelling" is 2.5 persons.

27. Upon receipt of an application for consent to develop land for residential purposes the Council shall calculate on the basis shown in clause 26, the number of persons per net residential acre in respect of the proposed development and subject to the next following clause if the resultant figure exceeds 32 persons per net residential acre the Council shall refuse the application.

28. (1) The Council may refuse to permit development of more than one dwelling unit on a lot which has been created by the amalgamation of two or more lots if it is of the opinion that the approval of such development would be contrary to the provisions of the Scheme generally and clause 25 in particular.

(2) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the Scheme in cases where the Council is satisfied that an owner will not use his density allowance to the maximum it may permit another owner to exceed his density allowance provided that—

- (a) all other requirements of the Scheme are complied with; and
- (b) the overall Scheme population density allowance is not likely to be exceeded.

Nature of Development.

29. No person shall develop any land in such manner as to impede or prevent the implementation of the Scheme.

Building Requirements.

30. (1) No person shall construct a building for residential purposes except in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Scheme.

(2) No person shall construct a building for residential purposes except in accordance with the standards shown in Part 1 of the table shown in Appendix "A" hereto, unless Council approval as hereinafter provided for in Clause 30 (3) has been obtained.

(3) Where comprehensive plans of subdivision and development designs involving an area of not less than 10 acres are submitted and such plans include provision for flats, patio, row, terrace, town or cluster housing or any other form of multiple development, the Council may permit the development if—

- (a) The consent of the Town Planning Board to the subdivision has been obtained, and
- (b) The Council considers the proposals to be socially and aesthetically desirable, and
- (c) The proposals conform with the standards shown in Part 2 of the table shown in Appendix "A" hereto, and
- (d) The land has been suitably classified under the District Zoning Scheme to permit the particular class of multiple development.

Public Open Space.

31. The lands coloured dark green on the Scheme Map are lands reserved for the purpose of parks and recreation areas by the Metropolitan Region Scheme. Such reservations are strictly diagrammatic.

32. It is intended that the land coloured light green on the Scheme Map shall be reserved for Public Recreation and Local Authority purposes.

33. Subject to Clause 34 the Council may as and when it deems fit acquire the said lands coloured light green or any parts thereof either by purchase or resumption or partly by one method and partly by the other.

34. (1) Subject to subclause (2) hereof each owner when subdividing his land shall contribute towards Public Open Space in the following manner:—

- (a) He shall transfer to the Council so much of his land as is coloured light green on the Scheme Map.
- (b) If there be no such land coloured light green on the Scheme Map within the said land he shall pay to the Council 10% of the value of the land the subject of the subdivision.
- (c) If the value of the land to be transferred to the Council under paragraph (a) hereof is greater or less than 10% of the value of his land the subject of the subdivision he shall receive from or pay to the Council the difference in such value as the case may be.

(2) For the purposes of the application of this clause any portion of an owner's land provided by him for schools, local centres, public utilities or the portion of roads coloured red for which compensation is payable under Clause 13 hereof, and land reserved for regional open space shall be excluded from the area of land the subject of subdivision in making the calculation of 10%.

(3) For the purpose of this clause the values shall be assessed as at a date immediately before the date of granting by the Town Planning Board of its final approval to the subdivision.

(4) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to the lands shown within the brown border on Supplementary Map "A".

35. Where development is proposed on a parcel of land not less than 2 acres in area and no public open space contribution has been made in respect thereof as a condition of its subdivision from a larger area of land the Council shall require as a condition of planning consent that

the developer pay to it a sum equal to 10% of the value of the parcel of land as at the date of the granting of the approval to develop.

36. Single Residential development on 27 perch building lots produces according to accepted statistics a population density of approximately 23 persons per net residential acre, and for the purpose of this Scheme it will be accepted that a public open space contribution made under Clause 34 or 35 hereof will provide sufficient open space for 23 persons per net residential acre.

37. (1) Provision has been made on the Scheme Map for public open space, coloured light green thereon, sufficient for the needs of a population in the Scheme Area of 28 persons per net residential acre, which is 5 persons per net residential acre in excess of that produced by single residential development.

(2) The net residential area within the Scheme is approximately 1,082 acres and this multiplied by 5 persons per net residential acre produces 5,410 population in excess of that resulting from single residential development.

(3) The average number of persons which will be accommodated by a multiple dwelling, as stated in Clause 26, is 2.5 persons, will be divided into the excess population of 5,410 and the quotient of 2,164 will be assumed to be the number of multiple dwellings necessary to accommodate the excess population.

(4) To provide additional public open space to meet the needs of this excess population the Council will acquire 21.75 acres of the land coloured light green on the Scheme Map (hereinafter referred to as "Supplementary open space").

(5) The cost of this land will be recovered from the developers of multiple dwelling units within the Scheme Area in the following manner. The cost of acquiring 21.75 acres of supplementary open space will be equally shared between the 2,164 multiple dwelling units and each share shall be an amount equal to 21.75 times the value of an acre of land (as assessed under Clause 47) set aside for public open space, divided by 2,164.

(6) When an application to develop more than one dwelling unit on a lot is received the Council in granting approval shall require the developer to pay in respect of each dwelling unit in excess of one on a lot, one share of the cost of acquiring the 21.75 acres of supplementary open space.

38. Wherever in the Scheme, the term "Public Open Space Trust Fund" is used it shall refer to a special Public Open Space Trust Fund established solely for the purposes of the Scheme.

All moneys received by the Council pursuant to Clauses 34, 35 and 37 shall be paid into its Public Open Space Trust Fund. The Council shall apply moneys standing to the credit of the Public Open Space Trust Fund in repaying any loan moneys or finance made available by it and interest on such moneys expended on the acquisition and development of Public Open Space. In the event of the moneys standing to the credit of the Public Open Space Trust Fund being insufficient to repay the said loans and interest and other moneys the Council shall repay the balance thereof from its General Fund. In the event of the moneys in the Public Open Space Trust Fund being greater than the amount necessary to repay the said loans and interest and other moneys the balance thereof shall be applied by the Council in further improvements and facilities in the Scheme Area or in making contributions towards the acquisition by the Metropolitan Region Planning Authority of Public Open Space coloured dark green within the Scheme Area.

Local Centres.

39. (1) The lands bordered orange on the Scheme Map (hereinafter referred to as "Local Centres") or so much thereof as is required for the purposes hereinafter mentioned shall be resumed or otherwise acquired by the Council and any buildings or improvements thereon may be demolished by the Council.

The Council may use the land so acquired for Civic, Cultural, Community or Recreational purposes, or for facilities for the operation of public utilities, and trading undertakings of any authorized public body or public utility.

(2) Each owner when subdividing his land shall pay to the Council an amount equal to six tenths of one per cent of the value of the land the subject of the subdivision.

(3) For the purpose of this clause the values of land shall be assessed as at a date immediately before the date of the granting by the Town Planning Board of its final approval to the subdivision.

(4) The moneys received by the Council pursuant to this clause shall be applied in meeting the costs incurred by the Council in the acquisition of the said lands and the payment of all compensation in respect thereof. If there should be any surplus it shall be applied by the Council in improvements to the Local Centres.

Shopping Centres.

40. (1) It is intended that the land coloured blue on the Scheme Map (hereinafter referred to as "Shopping Centres") shall be used for commercial development which may include Shopping Centres, Offices, Service Station Site, Hotel Site. The said lands are not zoned for those purposes by this Scheme.

(2) When an owner of a Shopping Centre submits a proposition for the development of the Shopping Centre or any part thereof and enters into an agreement with the Council to develop the land within a time and in a manner specified in the agreement the Council may apply to alter its District Zoning Scheme so that the zoning of the Shopping Centre may be changed to permit the use of the Shopping Centre for the purposes mentioned in the agreement. The said agreement may contain clauses dealing with the detail of the development, the future uses of the land, provisions in the event of default and such other provisions as the Council may require including provisions to ensure that the agreement by the owner and the developer shall be carried out.

School Sites.

41. The parcels of land shown on the Scheme Map as School Sites are reserved for that purpose by the Scheme for the Minister of Education, who will be responsible for their acquisition.

Scheme Costs.

42. The following costs are herein referred to as "Scheme Costs"—

- (a) The administrative costs of the Scheme including an amount to reimburse the Council for such overhead and supervision costs as may be incurred in the implementation of the Scheme.
- (b) All fees and costs paid or payable to the Council's planning and other consultants.
- (c) The cost of the acquisition of so much of the land necessary for the roads coloured red on the Scheme Map as exceeds the amount of land which would have been necessary had those roads been only one chain in width and the payment of any compensation in respect thereof.
- (d) The cost of the construction of one carriageway including all necessary drainage and earthworks on the roads coloured red on the Scheme Map.
- (e) One-half of the cost of construction and drainage of the roads hatched brown on the Scheme Map.
- (f) So much of the cost of the construction of a crossing over an open drain as exceeds the cost of the construction of similar crossing over a pipe drain.
- (g) The cost of the construction and laying of the main drain lines shown on the Scheme Map and of all necessary earthworks relating thereto.

(h) Any costs incurred by the Council in conducting an arbitration.

(i) Any costs or expenses incurred by the Council in the preparation, conduct and management of the Scheme which are not reimbursed to the Council by the terms of Clauses 9, 16, 24, 34, 35 and 37.

Payment of Scheme Costs.

43. Each owner shall prior to the final approval by the Town Planning Board to the subdivision of his land or after having received not less than three calendar months' notice from the Council whichever shall first happen pay to the Council an amount which bears the same proportion to the total Scheme Costs as the area of the owner's land being subdivided bears to the whole of the land that is privately owned within the Scheme Area. For the purpose of this clause privately owned land means the land within the Scheme Area excluding the land shown as roads, road widening drainage reserves parks and recreation areas public open space school sites and local centres on the Scheme Map, and excluding the lands shown within the brown border on Supplementary Map "A".

Estimate of Scheme Costs.

44. If any of the items of Scheme Costs have not been paid or ascertained at the time of subdivision of a parcel of land or at the time of the giving of a notice by the Council as aforesaid they may be estimated by the Council. An estimate may be revised from time to time.

Land Owned by Council.

45. All or any of the land now owned or subsequently acquired by the Council within or near the Scheme Area may be used by the Council for any purpose appropriate to the Scheme and if such purpose is one for which an owner is required to make land available or for which land may be acquired by the Council hereunder the Council shall be compensated for the value of the land so used by the Council.

Valuations.

46. Where it is necessary to ascertain the value of any land for the purpose of the Scheme the value shall be determined by the Chief Valuer of the Taxation Department of Western Australia or such other Valuer being a member of the Commonwealth Institute of Valuers and shall be approved by the Council. The valuation shall be made on the basis of the fair net expectancy inclusive of subdividers profit from the sale of the land in its optimum subdivided form for detached houses.

47. If an owner objects to the value so determined he may give notice of such objection to the Council within twenty-eight days after having been informed of the said value or the revised value. If the valuer does not agree to change the value to a figure acceptable to the owner the value shall be determined by arbitration.

48. If a valuation made by the valuer shall be changed as the result of an objection the valuer may reconsider the values placed on other lands and make such revaluations as he considers just and equitable. The owners affected by such revaluation shall forthwith be notified of any change in value.

49. When it becomes necessary to make a valuation by reason of an application for consent to a subdivision or development the costs of the valuation shall be paid by the person making the application.

Arbitration.

50. Any dispute or difference between the owners or between an owner and the Council as to their respective rights under the Scheme or as to the value of any land or in respect of any matter which pursuant to the Scheme may be determined by arbitration may be referred to arbitration in

accordance with the provisions of the Arbitration Act, 1895, or any statutory modification thereof for the time being in force.

Moneys Received by Council.

51. No moneys received by the Council pursuant to the provisions of Clauses 34, 35, 37 and 44 of the Scheme shall form part of the general revenue of the Council.

Powers of the Council.

52. In carrying out the provisions of this Scheme the Council shall have the following powers and authorities:—

- (a) To enter and inspect any land within the Scheme Area.
- (b) To make agreements with the owners or occupiers of land within the Scheme Area in respect of any matters affecting the Scheme.
- (c) To make agreements with the Metropolitan Region Planning Authority, the Metropolitan Water Supply Sewerage and Drainage Board, the State Electricity Commission or any other Government instrumentality concerning any matters relating to the Scheme.
- (d) To enter into agreements with purchasers or prospective purchasers or prospective occupiers of land within the Scheme Area.
- (e) If any owner of land within the Scheme Area does not proceed with the subdivision and development of his land in accordance with the terms of the Scheme and his failure to do so in the opinion of the Council will unduly delay or impede the completion of the Scheme or the subdivision and development of the Scheme Area the Council may resume or purchase the land of such owner or any part thereof and proceed with the subdivision and development of the said land in accordance with the provisions of the Scheme.
- (f) In the event of the Council exercising its powers under paragraph (e) hereof it shall have all the powers of the owner in the subdivision development and disposal of the land acquired by it. If the land shall have been resumed and the owner has not been paid compensation for the resumption of his land the Council shall before selling the land so subdivided and developed offer the new lots to the original owner upon his paying to the Council all costs and expenses consequent upon the operation of this Scheme, the resumption, subdivision and development of the said land and upon his releasing the Council from all claims for compensation in respect of such resumption. The said offer shall be made in writing and if not accepted within one calendar month of the service thereof the Council may proceed with the sale of the subdivided lots. All moneys received by it from such sale shall be applied firstly in payment of all costs consequent upon such subdivision and the operation of the Scheme and secondly in payment of all compensation in respect of the resumption of the said land. The balance (if any) of such moneys may be retained by the Council and the Council make good any deficit.
- (g) If the offer mentioned in paragraph (f) hereof be not accepted the Council may retain all or any part of the said land but if it does so it shall be responsible to pay all costs of the subdivision of the said land and compensation for its resumption not paid from the proceeds of sale.
- (h) The Council may resume any land within the Scheme Area for Public Open Space or Local Authority purposes or in order to

make it available for a particular use shown in the said plans in cases where the owner thereof will not agree to make the land available for that purpose in accordance with the provisions of the Scheme.

- (i) To dispose of any lot or lots to which it becomes entitled whether under paragraphs (e) or (h) hereof or otherwise upon such terms and conditions as it may think fit and without limiting the generality of the foregoing provisions of this paragraph may sell the lots singly or in groups and subject to or with the benefit of easements or on the condition that buildings of a specified character with specified parking and other facilities shall within a limited period be constructed thereon or that the land and buildings be used for a specified purpose.
- (j) Extend the time within which payments are to be made to the Council and agree to the securing of such payments.
- (k) Establish separate Funds for any matters appertaining to the Scheme.
- (l) Make payments on account of any of the matters referred to in clause 43 hereof.

Administration.

53. Twenty-eight (28) days written notice is hereby prescribed as the notice to be given pursuant to Section 10 of the Town Planning and Development Act. Any expenses incurred by the Council under the said section may be recovered from the person in default as a simple contract debt in such Court of Jurisdiction as is competent to deal with the amount of the claim.

54. The Council may at any time exercise the powers conferred by Section 13 of the said Act.

55. If pursuant to the provisions of the Scheme approval has been granted by the Council upon conditions no person shall fail to comply with or shall commit a breach of any such conditions.

56. In this Scheme the word "lot" has the meaning given to it by the Town Planning and Development Act, 1928 (as amended), but does not include a lot on a Strata Plan.

Claims for Compensation.

57. Claims for compensation by reason of the operation of the Scheme may be made within six months of the Scheme coming into operation.

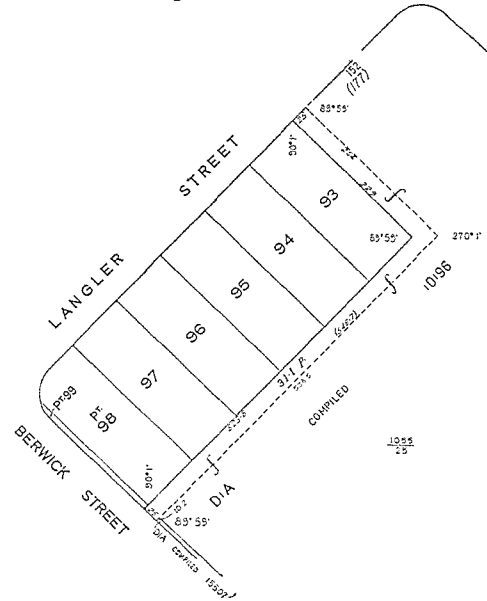

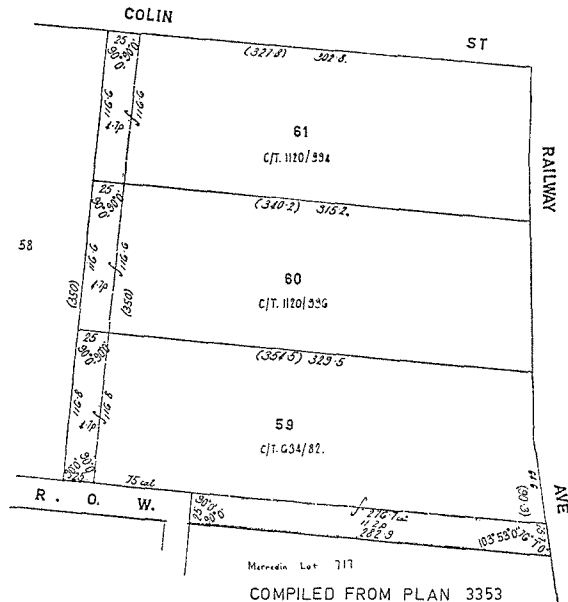

SLEEPING CARS.

1. First and economy class sleeping berths are provided for through passengers between Perth and Sydney via Broken Hill. First class sleeping berths only are provided between Adelaide and Brisbane via Albury but these are optional and first class passengers may be accommodated in reserved seat cars if they so desire.

2. Every person purchasing a ticket entitling him to travel the whole distance between Perth or Kalgoorlie and Pimba, Port Augusta, Port Pirie or points Port Pirie to Sydney via Broken Hill, or vice versa, must at the same time pay the prescribed sleeping berth or reserved seat charge for the journey (the sleeping berth or reserved seat coupon may, in certain instances, form part of the rail ticket). Passengers holding return portions of tickets may reserve sleeping berths or reserved seats before commencing the return journey.

- (a) Except as may be otherwise specially provided by the Commission, every passenger travelling the full journey between Perth or Kalgoorlie and Port Pirie or points Port Pirie to Sydney via Broken Hill or portion of the journey necessitating provision of sleeping accommodation, on a pass which does not include a sleeping berth or reserved seat, shall reserve and pay for such accommodation. The passenger shall be provided with a sleeping berth or reserved seat ticket showing the car and berth or seat number and the date of travel.
- (b) Every passenger travelling on a pass which includes sleeping accommodation shall reserve such accommodation and receive a certificate showing the car and berth or seat numbers and date of travel.
- (c) All berth or seat tickets and certificate showing berth allotments shall be shown on demand.
- (d) Limited allotments are provided for return journey bookings at Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide and Perth. Passengers holding return tickets shall secure the necessary sleeping berth, or reserved seat allotments, either at the original booking station, or before commencing the return journey.

3. Berths will be allotted in the order of application, except that passengers travelling through between Kalgoorlie and Port Pirie will be given preference over those from or to any intermediate point, on that section.

4. Passengers who desire to obtain sleeping berths should apply to the local stationmaster in good time and deposit with him at the time of booking an amount of \$5.00 per passenger.

5. (a) Separate sleeping accommodation shall not be provided for a child under four years being carried free.

(b) One child aged four and under fifteen years of age may, in addition to another child under four years of age, occupy the same berth as parent or guardian without charge for sleeping berth.

(c) Two children aged four and under fifteen years of age may occupy one berth on payment of one sleeping berth fee.

(d) Care must be exercised in booking a child of the opposite sex with the parent or guardian, e.g., a male child of six years or over travelling with his mother must not be booked in a ladies compartment unless all the occupants are members of the one party.

6. When a berth is applied for by telephone it may be reserved for one hour, but if the ticket is not taken out and the fare paid by the expiration of that time, the berth shall be re-let to any subsequent applicant.

7. When passengers telegraph or telephone from outlying places for berths to be reserved, such reservation shall be made if practicable.

8. It must be understood that when a telegram is received for a sleeping berth that an upper berth is to be reserved if a lower is not available (although the latter may be ordered), unless the telegram specially states that this is not to be done. Telegrams must state whether berth is required for male or female.

9. The Commission does not hold itself liable to provide sleeping accommodation to meet all requirements. Berths shall be allotted up to the extent of the accommodation available.

10. Sleeping cars are intended only for the use of passengers requiring sleeping berths; passengers who are allowed to take seats therein, and who do not hold sleeping berth tickets, shall vacate them and move into another carriage or compartment when so requested by the guard or conductor.

11. Passengers who desire to cancel, or transfer to another date, sleeping berth accommodation reserved for them may do so under the conditions appearing on pages 91 and 92.

12. (a) When passengers desire to reserve the whole of a sleeping car compartment for exclusive use, arrangements will be made accordingly, provided the necessary accommodation is available and subject to the following conditions:—

- (i) In respect of two berth compartments payments must be made for two rail and sleeping berth tickets, and one dining car ticket where applicable.
- (ii) When the holder of a concession ticket desires to reserve the whole of a sleeping compartment for sole use full ordinary fares and sleeping berth charges will apply in respect of the additional berths reserved.

(b) The Commission reserves the right to decline applications for the sole use by one passenger of a two-berth sleeping compartment.

(c) When a two-berth sleeping compartment is reserved for the sole use of one person and the reservation is cancelled, the cancellation fees applicable as for two sleeping berths shall be charged.

(d) **Sole use of De-Luxe Cabin, Melbourne-Sydney.**—In addition to the de-luxe cabin fee of \$19.00 and the appropriate first class rail fare, a surcharge of the adult first class rail fare between Melbourne and Sydney shall be charged; if sole use is required in each direction, the surcharge shall be the adult first class return fare. An excess fare ticket shall be issued for the amount of the surcharge.

13. "De Luxe" Sleeping Compartment—Perth-Sydney via Broken Hill.

(a) A "De Luxe" compartment is provided in class ARM sleeping cars on The Indian Pacific passenger trains. This compartment contains sleeping berth accommodation for two passengers, toilet, shower, wardrobe, lounge chair, and other facilities.

(b) The "De Luxe" compartment is identified as Berths 5 and 6, Car 1.

(c) In addition to each occupant of the "De Luxe" compartment holding the appropriate first class inclusive rail ticket for the journey being undertaken, fees as under are to be charged for the use of the "De Luxe" compartment, according to the degree of occupancy:—

One night—\$12.00 per compartment.

Two nights—\$18.00 per compartment.

Three nights—\$24.00 per compartment.

(d) Under no circumstances is the "De Luxe" compartment to be set apart for the use of any person or persons unless the prescribed additional fee is paid.

(e) The "De Luxe" compartment is provided primarily for the accommodation of full first class fare paying passengers but bookings by concessional fare paying passengers will be permitted excepting that allotments therein to concessional fare paying passengers for travel:—

(a) During the week ending Easter Monday; and

(b) From 8th December to 31st January, inclusive,

shall not be made earlier than fourteen (14) days in advance of the day of commencement of journey.

(f) Booking of children at the appropriate fare accompanying a parent or parents, travelling at ordinary or concessional fare, will be permitted.

(g) The "De Luxe" compartment is not to be allotted in favour of holders of Gold, Book, or other free passes unless specially authorised by the Chief Traffic Manager.

Sole Use of "De Luxe" Compartment.

(h) If a passenger desires to reserve a "De Luxe" compartment for exclusive use, in addition to the prescribed fee of \$12.00, \$18.00 or \$24.00, as the case may be, payment must be made for two rail and sleeping berth tickets and one dining car ticket.

(i) The same advance booking arrangements and cancellation fees as prescribed for ordinary first class sleeping berths are to apply to the "De Luxe" compartment.

14. "Family" Compartments.

(a) Intervening doors are provided between compartments 7/8 and 9/10 and between compartments 11/12 and 13/14 in class ARM sleeping cars.

(b) These compartments are to be retained for booking as "Family" compartments until such time as no other accommodation is available, when they are to be released for general booking.

(c) The intervening door between "Family" compartments normally is to be kept locked and opened at the discretion of the Senior Conductor when a family occupies both compartments. Charges prescribed for ordinary first class twinette berths are to apply to "Family" compartments.
