Plant Diseases Act 1914

Plant Diseases Amendment Regulations 2002

Made by the Lieutenant-Governor and deputy of the Governor in Executive Council.

1. Citation

These regulations may be cited as the *Plant Diseases Amendment Regulations 2002*.

2. The regulations amended

The amendments in these regulations are to the *Plant Diseases Regulations 1989**.

[* Reprinted as at 17 March 2000.

For amendments to 14 March 2002 see 2000 Index to Legislation of Western Australia, Table 4, p. 257-8, and Gazette 13 February, 8 June, 17 July and 7 December 2001 and 8 January 2002.]

3. Schedule 1 amended

(1) Schedule 1 Part A is amended as follows:

(a) by deleting the item commencing "Citrus" and inserting the following item instead —

“

Citrus (other than Mandarin)...	13, 17, 29, 31, 41, 45, 50A, 52, 55	29, 31, 41, 50A, 52, 55	16	4D/7/9C, 31, 41, 52, 55

(b) by deleting the item commencing "Mandarin" and inserting the following item instead —

Mandarin....	13, 17, 29, 31, 41, 45, 50A, 52, 55	29, 31, 41, 50A, 52, 55	16	4/7/9C, 31, 41, 52, 55
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”.

- (2) Schedule 1 Part B is amended by inserting the following item after item 4C —

“

4D. Citrus — Fruit Fly (*B. tryoni*, *B. cucumis*, *B. musae*, *B. frauenfeldi*, *B. neohumeralis*, *B. papayae* and *B. philippinensis*)

From all States and Territories —

(a) to be certified as —

- (i) having been immersed in a dip containing 400 mg/L of fenthion for 1 minute;
- (ii) having been flooded as part of a single layer of produce with 400 mg/L of fenthion at ambient temperature in a high volume application of at least 16 L/m² per minute for at least 10 seconds and as having remained wet for at least 1 minute before drying; or
- (iii) having been fumigated with methyl bromide for 2 hours at one of the following rates —
 - 24 g/m³ at 26°— 31.9°C
 - 32 g/m³ at 21°— 25.9°C
 - 40 g/m³ at 15°— 20.9°C
 - 48 g/m³ at 10°— 14.9°C;

or

- (b) to be certified as having been treated at a temperature within a range specified in the first column of the following Table for the number of days corresponding to that temperature range specified in the second column of that Table.

Environmental Protection Act 1986

Environmental Protection (Joondalup Police Academy) Exemption Order 2002

Made by the Minister with the approval of the Governor under section 6 of the Act.

1. Citation

This order may be cited as the *Environmental Protection (Joondalup Police Academy) Exemption Order 2002*.

2. Commencement and duration of order

- (1) This order comes into operation on the day of its publication in the *Gazette*, and stops being in force on a day that is 18 months from the day it came into operation, unless —
 - (a) it is revoked before that day; or
 - (b) it is continued in force under subclause (2).
- (2) If, at the time the Director receives a noise management report from the Commissioner under item 6, the Commissioner makes —
 - (a) an application for a further exemption under section 6 of the Act; or
 - (b) an application for a noise emissions approval under regulation 17 of the *Environmental Protection (Noise) Regulations 1997*,

in relation to excessive noise generated by activities conducted in the Scenario Village, then this order continues in force until the Minister either grants or refuses to grant that application.

- (3) This clause does not affect the Minister's ability to review the order whenever the Minister considers it appropriate to do so.

3. Definitions

In this order —

“**activities**” mean training activities;

“**Commissioner of Police**” means the Commissioner of Police or a delegate of the Commissioner of Police;

- “**Director**” means Director of the Environmental Regulation Division of the Department;
- “**excessive noise**” means noise that exceeds or varies from the standards prescribed in the *Environmental Protection (Noise) Regulations 1997*;
- “**impulsiveness**” has the meaning given in regulation 9(1) of the *Environmental Protection (Noise) Regulations 1997*;
- “**item**” means item in Schedule 1;
- “**Joondalup Police Academy**” means Swan Location 13620 (Reserve No. 46211) on Land Administration Plan 20771, shown, for illustration purposes, on the site plan in Schedule 2;
- “**modulation**” has the meaning given in regulation 9(1) of the *Environmental Protection (Noise) Regulations 1997*;
- “**noise-sensitive premises**” has the meaning given in regulation 2(1) of the *Environmental Protection (Noise) Regulations 1997*;
- “**the Scenario Village**” means the area described as the Scenario Village within the Joondalup Police Academy, as shown on the site plan in Schedule 3;
- “**tonality**” has the meaning given in regulation 9(1) of the *Environmental Protection (Noise) Regulations 1997*.

4. **Application**

- (1) This order applies while the W.A. Police Service occupies the Joondalup Police Academy.
- (2) This order applies to excessive noise generated by activities conducted in the Scenario Village under the direct or indirect control of the W.A. Police Service.

5. **Declaration of exemption and requirement to comply**

- (1) Part V of the Act (except for sections 76, 77, 78 and 84) and, subject to item 5(3) of the Schedule, the *Environmental Protection (Noise) Regulations 1997* do not apply to the emission of excessive noise from the Scenario Village.
- (2) The exemption under subclause (1) is subject to the conditions specified in Schedule 1.
- (3) The Commissioner of Police is required to comply, or ensure compliance, with the conditions specified in Schedule 1.

Schedule 1 — Conditions of exemption

[cl. 5]

1. **Excessive noise to be reduced where practical**

All reasonable and practical measures must be implemented to reduce the impulsiveness, modulation, tonality, level and number of occurrences of excessive noise generated by activities conducted in the Scenario Village.

2. Noise complaint response programme

- (1) Before commencing any activities in the Scenario Village that could result in excessive noise, a noise complaint response programme must be developed and implemented.
- (2) A noise complaint response programme must include provision for a telephone service that is attended by an operator while, and immediately after, those activities are carried out at the Scenario Village.

3. Community consultation

There must be consultation with the occupiers (or their representatives) of noise-sensitive premises that are subject to excessive noise generated by activities conducted in the Scenario Village.

4. Indirect control of noise and activities

- (1) Subject to subitem (2), activities are not to be permitted to be carried out in the Scenario Village under the control of an agency other than the W.A. Police Service unless —
 - (a) the agency submits a noise management plan to the Commissioner of Police; and
 - (b) the Commissioner is satisfied that the plan is adequate for the purposes of this order.
- (2) Despite a breach of the condition in subitem (1), an agency may comply with this item if —
 - (a) the Director considers that exceptional circumstances exist or existed that made it impractical for the agency to submit a noise management plan in accordance with subitem (1); and
 - (b) the agency has provided satisfactory details of the activities and possible noise emissions to the Director within 30 days of the commencement of the activities.
- (3) Noise emissions from activities conducted by an agency that has submitted a satisfactory noise management plan under subitem (1) or provided details under subitem (2) are taken, for the purposes of this order, to be noise emissions under the indirect control of the W.A. Police Service.

5. Noise to be monitored

- (1) A noise monitoring programme must be developed and implemented to provide a representative assessment of noise levels at noise-sensitive premises when activities at the Scenario Village are likely to result in excessive noise.
- (2) Noise monitoring under subitem (1) must be undertaken by —
 - (a) a corporate member of the Australian Acoustical Society (A.B.N. 28 000 712 658);
 - (b) an authorised person or inspector; or
 - (c) a person who is approved by the Director for the purposes of this order.

- (3) An instrument used to measure levels of noise emissions for the purposes of this order must be calibrated in accordance with, and otherwise comply with, Schedule 4 to the *Environmental Protection (Noise) Regulations 1997*.

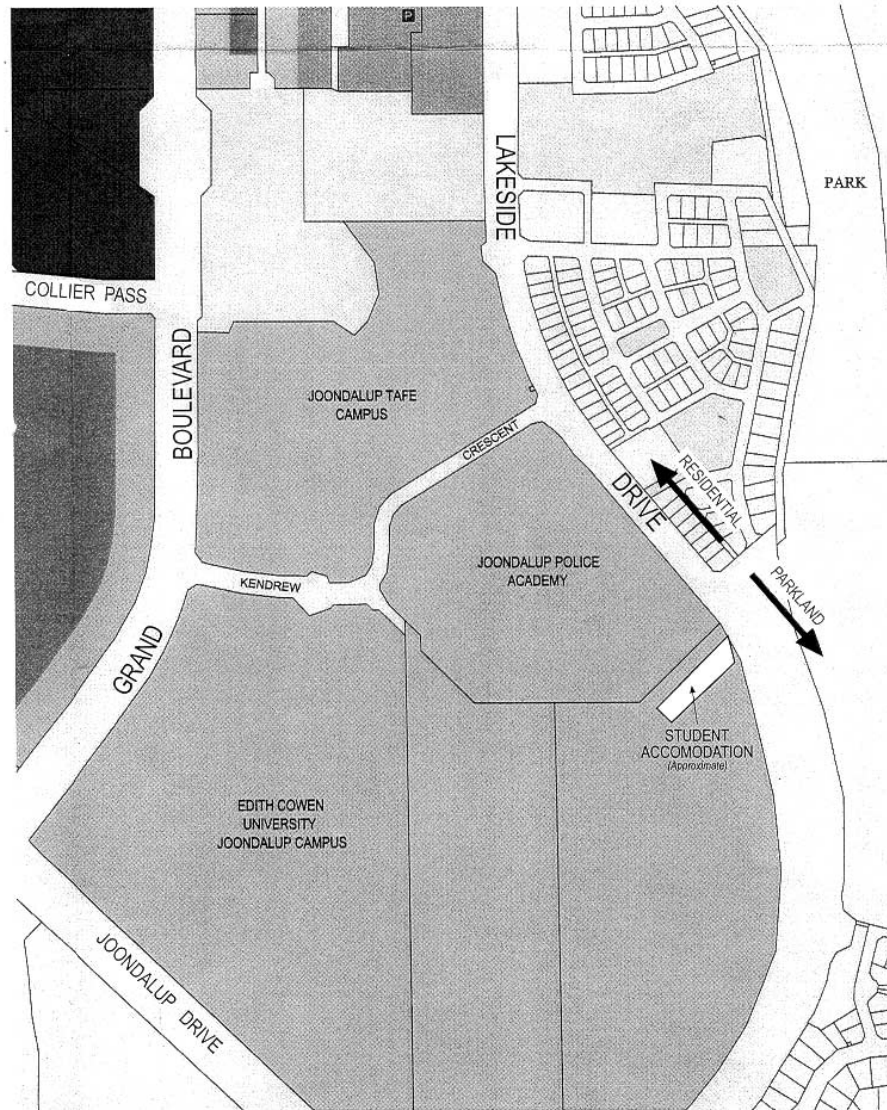
6. Annual report

- (1) Within one month after the first anniversary of the commencement of this order, the Commissioner of Police must prepare a noise management report for the period of 12 months from the commencement, in accordance with subitem (5), and must submit that report to the Director.
- (2) Within one month after the second anniversary of the commencement of this order (and for each subsequent 12 month period), the Commissioner of Police must prepare a further noise management report for the relevant 12 month period, in accordance with subitem (5), and must submit that report to the Director.
- (3) The Commissioner may request that the Director grant an extension of the time for reporting where the time for preparation and submission of a report under subitem (1) or (2) is, in the circumstances, impracticable.
- (4) A report under subitem (1) or (2) must contain sufficient detail to allow the Director to ascertain whether the Commissioner of Police has complied with the conditions set out in items 1 to 5, inclusive.
- (5) A report under subitem (1) or (2) must include, for that year —
 - (a) a summary of the training events held that include activities in the Scenario Village, with details of the frequency, duration and time of day of any activities that may have included excessive noise;
 - (b) details of noise reduction measures investigated and any measures that were implemented;
 - (c) details of noise management measures in place for activities that were likely to result in excessive noise;
 - (d) a summary of community consultation that has been undertaken;
 - (e) a summary of complaints received about noise emitted from the Scenario Village, and the responses to those complaints;
 - (f) details of noise monitoring undertaken under item 5(1);
 - (g) details of any overall noise management plan in place, together with any changes proposed for that plan;
 - (h) a copy of any noise management plan submitted to the Commissioner of Police in accordance with item 4; and
 - (i) details of any proposed changes to activities involving the use of the Scenario Village (by either the W.A. Police Service, or another agency) together with an assessment indicating whether those changes would result in a change in noise impact on the surrounding noise-sensitive premises through —
 - (i) an increase in the impulsiveness, modulation, tonality, level and number of occurrences of excessive noise from the Scenario Village; and

- (ii) a change in the time, or times, of day during which excessive noise could be emitted from the Scenario Village.

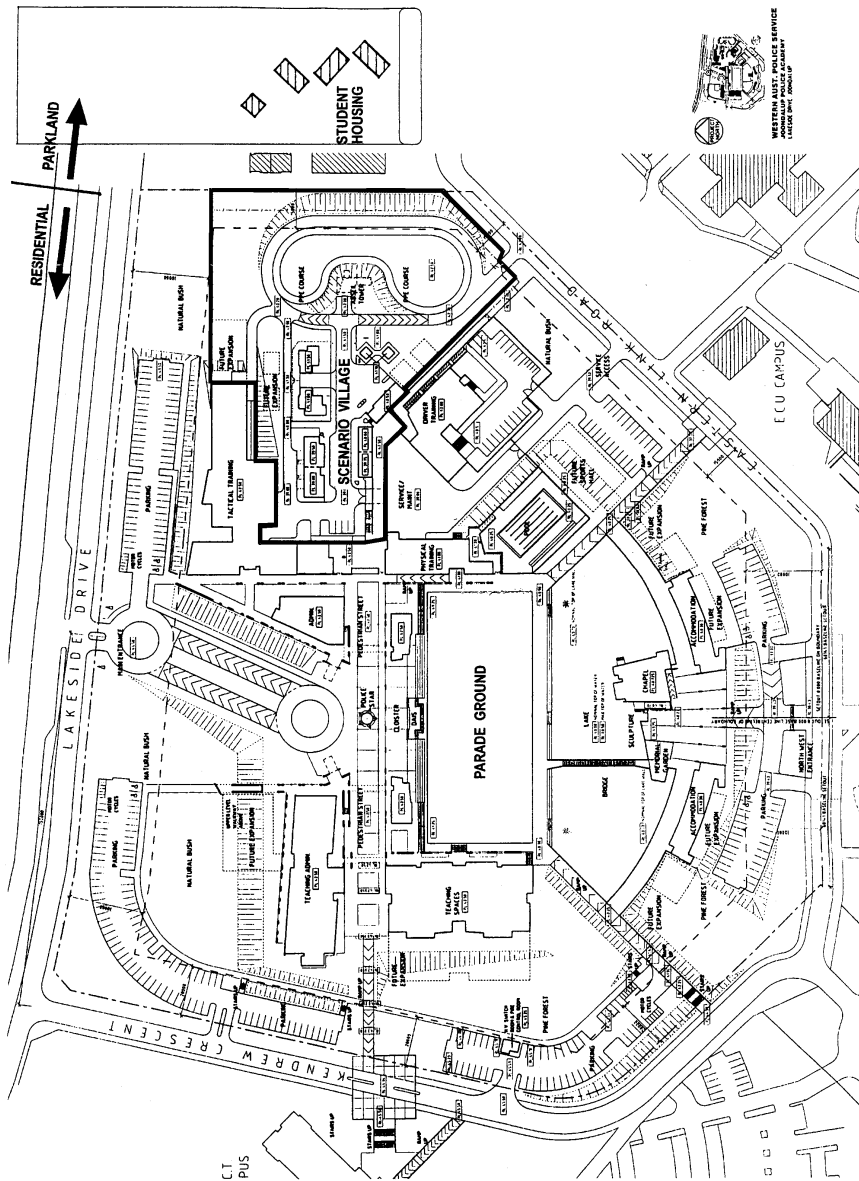
Schedule 2 — Joondalup Police Academy

Upon hearing Ms J. Tavelli, counsel to assist the Medical Board, and Mr D. Wallace of counsel for Dr Ian McGregor, and upon Dr Ian McGregor entering a plea admitting that he was guilty of gross carelessness as alleged in sub-paragraphs 1(a), (c) and (d) of the Notice of Inquiry dated 21 June 2001 the Board makes the following findings and orders—

1. Dr Ian McGregor is guilty of gross carelessness in the care of his obstetric patient, a named patient over the period 18 September 1998 to 15 February 1999 in—
 - (i) failing to keep adequate notes of his management of the patient's pregnancy and findings of his examination of the patient;
 - (ii) monitoring the pregnancy he failed to carry out proper ultrasound examination and assessment of serial ultrasound measurements of the progress of the pregnancy, such as growth of foetal head, abdominal girth, liquor volume or breathing movements;
 - (iii) that he failed to take any or any proper consideration of serial ultrasound measurements of the progress of the pregnancy, other than foetal girth.

2. The allegation of gross carelessness or incompetence in relation to the management of the patient's pregnancy by failing to carry out a proper clinical examination and assessment of fundal height and foetal movements is dismissed.
3. Dr Ian McGregor is hereby reprimanded.
4. Pursuant to Section 13(4) of the Act, Dr Ian McGregor is required to give a written undertaking to be of good behaviour for two years and during that period to comply with the following restrictions and conditions relating to the practice of medicine and training for that practice—
 - (a) his obstetric practice shall be submitted for review at quarterly intervals by a practitioner to be approved by the Board, who shall be permitted full access to all his practice records and who shall report in writing to the Board after each review upon the nature, standard and quality of the practitioner's practice especially with regard to any perceived need for further training, re-training or further education;
 - (b) that Dr Ian McGregor shall complete, to the satisfaction of the Board, an ultrasound training program at King Edward Memorial Hospital and achieve a certification of proficiency in obstetric ultrasonography.
5. Dr Ian McGregor shall appear at a further hearing of this Board at a date to be set, in or about twelve months from now, to report the progress of compliance with these conditions and to consider whether, or to what extent, these conditions should be varied or extended.
6. The expenses of complying with these conditions shall be paid by Dr Ian McGregor.
7. The Board orders that Dr Ian McGregor shall pay the costs of this Inquiry to be agreed, or, failing agreement, to be fixed by the Board after receiving written submissions from counsel."

In this regard, it is anticipated driveways having gradient slopes of greater than 5% will be required to be constructed of sealed or other suitable hard pavement surface. Construction of such driveways will also be required to address stormwater runoff such that no drainage or scouring will occur to the proposed public road (Woodley Heights)."

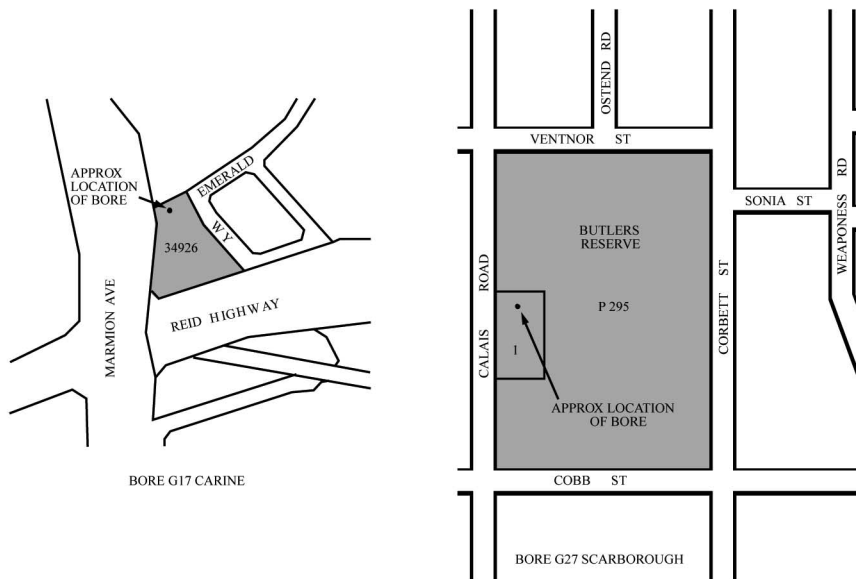
