Perth Market Act 1926

### Perth Market Amendment By-laws 2004

Made by the Perth Market Authority and approved and confirmed by the Governor in Executive Council.

**1. Citation**

These by-laws may be cited as the *Perth Market Amendment By-laws 2004*.

**2. The by-laws amended**

The amendments in these by-laws are to the *Perth Market By-laws 1990\**.

**3. By-law 32K amended**

By-law 32K(1)(a) is amended by deleting “(including de facto spouse)” and inserting instead —

“ , de facto partner ”.

**4. By-law 42 replaced by by-laws 42, 42A and 42B**

By-law 42 is repealed and the following by-laws are inserted instead —

“

**42. Identification plates for registered forklifts**

The Authority may on the receipt of a fee of \$50 issue an identification plate in relation to a forklift registered by the Authority.

**42A. Licensing of forklift drivers**

- (1) The Authority may issue a licence to a person to drive and operate a registered forklift in the public market if the Authority is of the opinion that the person is competent to drive and operate a forklift in the public market.
- (2) The Authority shall —
  - (a) maintain a record of licenses issued under sub-bylaw (1); and
  - (b) issue licensed forklift drivers with a forklift driver's identification badge.
- (3) If the holder of a forklift drivers' licence —
  - (a) has been —
    - (i) convicted of an offence against by-law 42B; or
    - (ii) given 2 or more infringement notices under section 13B of the Act, in respect of offences against by-law 42B within a 12 month period, none of which have been withdrawn;
  - (b) has been given notice by the Authority that the Authority proposes to suspend the licence for the period of time, not exceeding 3 months, specified in the notice if the holder does not show cause to the Authority why the licence should not be suspended within the time specified in the notice, being at least 14 days after the notice is given; and
  - (c) does not show cause to the Authority why the licence should not be suspended within the time specified in the notice,

then the Authority may suspend the licence by giving to the holder of the licence a suspension of licence notice specifying the period of time for which the licence is suspended.

- (5) A forklift drivers' licence is of no effect while it is suspended.
- (6) The period of time for which a licence is suspended is not to exceed the time proposed by the notice given under sub-bylaw (3)(b).
- (7) A person whose forklift drivers' licence is suspended is to return the forklift driver's identification badge issued under sub-bylaw (2)(b) to the Authority within 7 days of being given the suspension of licence notice.

**42B. Control of forklifts**

- (1) A person shall not operate a forklift or cause or permit a forklift to be operated in the public market, unless —
  - (a) the forklift is registered by the Authority and approved for operation within the public market;
  - (b) the person operating the forklift is competent to do so and is the holder of a forklift drivers' licence issued by the Authority under by-law 42A;
  - (c) the identification plate issued by the Authority under by-law 42 is at all times affixed to and displayed on the roof of the roll cage of the forklift in a conspicuous place; and
  - (d) the forklift is mechanically sound and operated in a safe and proper manner.
- (2) A person shall not drive or operate a forklift in the public market unless the person —
  - (a) is the holder of a current appropriate Class driver's licence as issued under the *Road Traffic Act 1974*;
  - (b) is the holder of a forklift drivers' licence issued by the Authority under by-law 42A;
  - (c) displays in a conspicuous place on his or her person or in the forklift cab, the forklift driver's identification badge issued under by-law 42A(2)(b);
  - (d) operates the forklift in a safe and proper manner;
  - (e) obeys all traffic signs erected by the Authority in the market; and
  - (f) has the lights of the forklift illuminated at all times.
- (3) A person who contravenes sub-by-law (1) or (2) commits an offence.  
Penalty: \$200.

”.

## **Plant Diseases Amendment Regulations (No. 3) 2004**

Made by the Governor in Executive Council.

### **1. Citation**

These regulations may be cited as the *Plant Diseases Amendment Regulations (No. 3) 2004*.

## 2. The regulations amended

The amendments in these regulations are to the *Plant Diseases Regulations 1989\**.

## 3. Schedule 1 amended

Schedule 1 Part B is amended by deleting conditions 23 and 23A and inserting instead the following conditions —

“

23. Sorghum seed — sorghum midge (*Contarinia sorghicola*)
- (1) Sorghum seed is to be —
- (a) certified as fumigated with phosphine in a sealed enclosure at 1.5 g/m<sup>3</sup> —
- (i) for 7 days at above 25°C; or
- (ii) for 10 days at 15°C — 25°C;
- or
- (b) certified as fumigated with methyl bromide for 2 hours in a sealed enclosure at one of the following rates —
- (i) 24 g/m<sup>3</sup> at 26°C — 31.9°C;
- (ii) 32 g/m<sup>3</sup> at 21°C — 25.9°C;
- (iii) 40 g/m<sup>3</sup> at 15°C — 20.9°C;
- (iv) 48 g/m<sup>3</sup> at 10°C — 14.9°C.
- (2) Sorghum seed is to contain less than 1% by weight of chaff consisting of vegetative parts of plants other than seed or seed fragments.
- 23A. Sorghum seed — ergot (*Claviceps* spp.)
- Seed for sowing is to be certified as —
- (a) dipped in a solution of 2% available chlorine for 5 minutes; or
- (b) dusted with Thiram at the rate of 200 g/100 kg of seed.

”.

28. Poaceae (Gramineae) — Wheat streak mosaic virus
- (1) In this item —  
“**WSMV**” means wheat streak mosaic virus.
  - (2) Subitems (4) and (5) apply to the genera of Poaceae (Gramineae) plants specified in Schedule 9.
  - (3) Subitem (6) applies to *Zea mays* seed.
  - (4) From a State or Territory in which WSMV is known to occur —
    - (a) to be certified by an officer of the Department of Agriculture in the State or Territory in which the plants originated or a person nominated under a quality assurance system that the plants have been ELISA (enzyme linked immuno-sorbent assay) or PCR (polymerase chain reaction) tested and found free from WSMV; or
    - (b) to be ELISA (enzyme linked immuno-sorbent assay) or PCR (polymerase chain reaction) tested on arrival in Western Australia and found free from WSMV.
  - (5) From a State or Territory in which WSMV is known to occur to be certified, as defined in regulation 3, as having been treated —
    - (a) with abamectin applied at the rate of 50 ml per 100 L of water;
    - (b) with propargite applied at the rate of 100 gm per 100 L of water; or
    - (c) with an approved miticide at an approved rate.
  - (6) From a State or Territory in which WSMV is known to occur, entry into this State is prohibited except with the prior approval of the Director General.

**ANNUAL FIREBREAK NOTICE 2004/2005**

Important information to owners and/or occupiers of land in the Shire of Plantagenet

Pursuant to the powers contained in Section 33 of the Bush Fires Act 1954 you are hereby required, on all land owned or occupied by you, as a measure for preventing the spread and extension of a bush fire, to plough, cultivate, scarify, burn, chemically spray or otherwise clear upon the land firebreaks in such manner as set out in this notice.

**GLOSSARY**

**Building Protection Zone:** is a low fuel area immediately surrounding a building and is designed to minimise the likelihood of flame contact with buildings. It must fulfil the following conditions—

- A minimum width of 20 metres around all homesteads and buildings in all Rural Land.
- A minimum width of 20 metres around all habitable buildings in Townsites.
- Bush Fire fuels to be maintained below 100mm in height.
- Trees and branches which overhang a building must be removed.
- Lower branches of any remaining trees must be trimmed.

**Hazard Separation Zone:** is a low fuel area which must be provided to create a minimum separation distance of 100 metres between buildings and the hazards and must be maintained in a hazard reduced state (ie: below 8 tonne per hectare for jarrah/marri; below 12-15 tonne per hectare in mallee heath and below 15 tonne per hectare in karri forests).

**Boundary Line Between Zone 4 Western & Eastern**

The Shire of Plantagenet is divided into two bush fire control areas, Zone 4 Western and Zone 4 Eastern. The boundary between these two bush fire control areas is described as follows. The boundary line between zones starts at—

- \* the northern end of Martagallup Road along Martagallup Road to Albany Highway;
- \* south on Albany Highway to Hobbs Road;
- \* east on Hobbs Road to the T-Junction of Jutland Road;
- \* south on Jutland Road to Fisher Road;
- \* east on Fisher Road to T-Junction on Williams Road;
- \* north on Williams Road and East on Williams Road to Carbarup Road;
- \* south on Carbarup Road to Barrow Road;
- \* east on Barrow Road to T-Junction of Tingellup Road;
- \* south on Barrow Road to Porongurup Road;
- \* east on Porongurup Road to Chester Pass Road; and
- \* east on Takalarup Road to south east corner of boundary.

A more formal description of the boundary between Zone 4 (West) and Zone 4 (East) is available from the Shire of Plantagenet.

**RURAL LAND FIRE PROTECTION REQUIREMENTS**

**SEED PRODUCING CROPS**

A three (3) metre wide fire break shall be maintained adjacent to the perimeter of all seed producing crops. The fire break is to be maintained free of all inflammable material. Alternatively, a three (3) metre wide fire break within 100 metres of the perimeter boundary of the property shall be installed.

**FUEL & CHEMICAL STORAGE**

Where fuel or chemical will be stored (including empty storage facilities) a firebreak of at least three (3) metres wide around such a facility **MUST** be maintained.

**HARVESTED OR ABANDONED PLANTATIONS**

Plantation fire breaks shall remain in place until the removal of all stumps is completed.

**VEHICLE MOVEMENT BAN DEFINITIONS**

**Harvest Ban**

Any operation of machinery involved in harvesting seed crops/timber and/or any other produce **MUST** come to a complete stop when a ban is in place.



**Vehicle Movement Ban & Operation of Combustion Engines**

No vehicles to be driven in paddocks when the ban is in place and no combustion engines are to be operated.

The following minimum requirements apply in the Shire of Plantagenet during the Restricted & Prohibited Burning Times

**LAND AREA LESS THAN 40 HECTARES****BUILDING PROTECTION ZONE**

A **building protection zone** is required as defined in the **glossary**.

**HAZARD SEPARATION ZONE**

Where habitable buildings are located in close proximity to native vegetation, a **hazard separation zone** as defined in the **glossary** is to be maintained in addition to the building protection zone.

**BUILDING/ASSET PROTECTION**

Further, a fire break not less than three (3) metres wide must be installed around and within 100 metres of all homesteads, buildings and fuel ramps/bulk fuel and hay.

Owners/Occupiers must also establish a low fuel (mowed) buffer at least twenty (20) metres wide around all homesteads and buildings. Hay stored beyond 100 metres of homesteads and buildings does not require a firebreak.

All of the remainder of the lot to be maintained to a low fuel state.

**TOWNSITES—KENDENUP, MOUNT BARKER, NARRIKUP & ROCKY GULLY****BUILDING PROTECTION ZONE**

A **building protection zone** is required as defined in the **glossary**.

In addition, owners/occupiers of townsite lots shall—

- i. Clear all inflammable material from around all buildings to a minimum width of twenty (20) metres or to the property boundary (building protection zone);
- ii. Hazard reduce the remainder of the lot or lots to a maximum vegetation height of 100 mm including native vegetation within cleared areas;
- iii. Owners of bush lots shall install a fire break to a minimum of two (2) metres wide around and within 10 metres of the boundary of the bush lot or lots; and
- iv. All bush or re-vegetated areas are to be maintained in a hazard reduced state.

**MOUNT BARKER HILL SUBDIVISION****BUILDING PROTECTION ZONE**

A **building protection zone** is required as defined in the **glossary**.

Land in the Mount Barker Hill subdivision to be maintained to a low fuel state. Grass to be maintained at a maximum height of 100mm. Bush or re-vegetation areas to be maintained in a hazard reduced state.

**MIRA FLORES****BUILDING PROTECTION ZONE**

A **building protection zone** is required as defined in the **glossary**.

In addition—

- i. A three (3) metre wide fire break shall be maintained along the perimeter/boundary of each lot. The firebreak is to be maintained clear of inflammable material and vegetation. Overhanging branches to be cut back to a height of four (4) metres.
- ii. All private access tracks to be six (6) metres wide with a four (4) metre trafficable surface and four (4) metre vertical clearance to allow entry and exit of a heavy duty fire unit.
- iii. Sufficient room to be provided to turn a heavy duty fire unit at the end of all access tracks; i.e. a cul-de-sac or ring road to be provided.

**BUILDING PROTECTION ZONE**

A **building protection zone** is required as defined in the **glossary**.

**HAZARD SEPARATION ZONE**

Where habitable buildings are located in close proximity to native vegetation, a **hazard separation zone** as defined in the **glossary** is to be maintained in addition to the building protection zone.

**BUILDING/ASSET PROTECTION**

Further, a fire break not less than three (3) metres wide must be installed around and within 100 metres of all homesteads, buildings and fuel ramps/bulk fuel and hay.

Owners/Occupiers must also establish a low fuel (mowed) buffer at least twenty (20) metres wide around all homesteads and buildings. Hay stored beyond 100 metres from buildings does not require a fire break. A three (3) metre wide boundary fire break shall be maintained on the property, and within 100 metres of the perimeter of the property.

The fire break must be maintained free of inflammable material. To waive boundary fire breaks on land adjacent (sharing a common boundary or separated by no more than 100 metres where a road reserve or stock route is involved) to, or where the owner /occupier resides, the landowner /occupier must have a mobile fire fighting unit (self propelled, towed or slip on) in good working order with a minimum capacity of 400 litres of water situated where the owner or occupier resides.

**Owners/Occupiers who choose the fire fighting equipment option in lieu of boundary firebreaks will be Subject to the submission of a statutory declaration being received by the Council no later than 30 September annually (see attached statutory declaration).**

Notice to all owners and/or occupiers of land, within the Shire of Plantagenet, currently planted, or proposed to be planted, as a Hardwood or Softwood plantation or tree farm.

Pursuant to the powers contained in **Section 33 of the Bush Fires Act 1954** you are hereby required on all Hardwood or Softwood Plantations /Tree Farms owned or occupied by you, to plough, cultivate, scarify, burn, chemically spray or otherwise clear of all inflammable material, firebreaks of dimensions as set out in this notice.

**FIREBREAKS** shall be installed on all **PLANTATIONS—TREE FARMS** by **1 December annually** and shall be maintained and kept clear as required by this notice until **12 April each year**.

### 1. BOUNDARY FIREBREAKS

1.1 Firebreaks shall be constructed fifteen (15) metres wide on the boundaries of all Plantations, Tree Farms, or such other location as may be agreed to by the Council, in accordance with the requirements of Definition—Specification 2.2 (below).

1.2 Firebreaks shall be constructed around Plantation Compartments of approximately thirty (30) hectares, in accordance with the requirements of Definition—Specification 2.3 (below.)

### 2. DEFINITIONS—SPECIFICATIONS

2.1 Plantations—Tree Farms: A plantation tree farm is defined as an area exceeding 3 hectares within townsites or an area exceeding 10 hectares within rural areas, of trees planted for commercial purposes.

2.2 Boundary Firebreaks—Fifteen (15) metre requirement: That for external fire breaks around plantations a horizontal clearance of five (5) metres be established to a height of five (5) metres above the ground level over the trafficable portion of the firebreak.

2.3 Planting Compartments: A planting compartment is defined as an individual area of approximately thirty (30) hectares surrounded by firebreaks cleared of all inflammable material six (6) metres wide, with a vertical clearance of all overhanging branches at least four (4) metres upwards from ground level to allow unrestricted access for firebreak maintenance and fire fighting equipment.

2.4 All landowners or managers of land greater than 10,000 hectares—A 3.4HD 4x4 truck carrying 3,000 litres of water.

### 3. PRIVATE HARDWOOD AND SOFTWOOD PLANTATIONS

When harvesting is in process, harvesters must maintain a 400 litre fire fighting unit in or adjacent to where harvesting is being carried out.

### 4. FIRE PROTECTION OF PRIVATE HARDWOOD / SOFTWOOD PLANTATIONS

All hardwood and softwood plantations within the Shire must comply with the Plantation Fire Protection Guidelines unless approval to vary those conditions has been granted by the Shire.

The Plantation Fire Protection Guidelines have been adopted by the Lower Great Southern Plantation Fire Advisory Committee and copies of these Guidelines may be obtained from the Shire of Plantagenet.

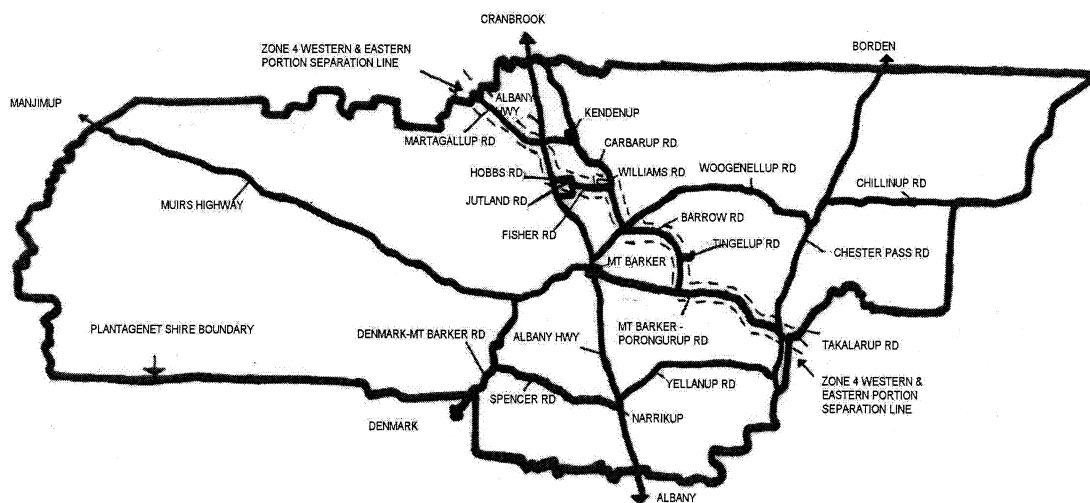

The following minimum requirements apply in the Shire of Plantagenet during the Restricted and Prohibited Burning Times.

1. Harvesting of Seed. 2. Harvesting of Timber. 3. Swathing. 4. Slashing. 5. Baling Straw / Stubble. 6. Stone Chaining. 7. Operation of a Portable Sawmill.	A mobile fire fighting unit to be stationed in, or immediately adjacent to, the paddock or area where the operation takes place.  Unit to be minimum of 400 litres.
8. All landowners or Managers of greater than 10,000 hectares.	A 3.4 HD 4x4 truck carrying 3,000 litres of water.
9. Operation of Welding / Oxy equipment in the Open Air. 10. Power-operated Abrasive Cutting Discs	A mobile fire fighting unit to be stationed immediately adjacent to the area where the operation takes place.  A fire extinguisher to be provided at the place where the welding or cutting operation is carried out.  Where a welding or cutting operation is carried out an area around the equipment shall be cleared of all inflammable material to bare earth to a 5 metre radius.  In addition, an observer shall be on hand to monitor the site at all times.
11. Operation of tractors, trucks and self-propelled harvesters in standing crop or stubble paddocks.	An operational fire extinguisher must be carried on the vehicles.

**BUSH FIRES ACT 1954**  
**FIRE CONTROL NOTICE 2004/05**

Notice to Owners and/or Occupiers of Land in the City of Rockingham

Property owners/occupiers are required to have firebreaks constructed in accordance with this Notice by 30 November 2004 and maintained until 31 May 2005.

Pursuant to the powers contained in Section 33 of the Bush Fires Act 1954 (as amended) you are hereby required on or before the 30th day of November 2004, to remove from land owned or occupied by you all flammable material or to clear firebreaks in accordance with the following, and thereafter to maintain the land or the firebreaks clear of all flammable material up to and including the 31st day of May 2005, in such positions and to such dimensions as required by this Notice.

**1 RURAL LAND**

On or before the 30th day of November 2004 and thereafter up until and including the 31st day of May 2005.

- 1.1 have firebreaks not less than 3 metres wide immediately inside and along all boundaries of land and including that land abutting road, rail and drain reserves and all public open space reserves, with all overhanging branches, trees, limbs etc to be trimmed back clear of the firebreak area to a height of 4 metres.
- 1.2 have firebreaks not less than 3 metres wide so far as to surround all buildings, sheds and haystacks, with all overhanging branches, trees, limbs, etc to be trimmed back clear of the firebreak area to a height of 4 metres.

**2 URBAN AREAS** (Vacant land situated within the urban areas of Rockingham, Singleton, Golden Bay, Settlers Hills, Woodleigh Grove, Sherwood Estate, Secret Harbour)

On or before the 30th day of November 2004, and maintained until and including the 31st May 2005—

- 2.1 have firebreaks not less than 2m wide cleared 4 metres high immediately inside and along all boundaries of land less than 2,000m<sup>2</sup>. All material from firebreaks is to be removed from the land; or have the entire vacant land clear of all flammable material where the area of land is 2,000m<sup>2</sup> by slashing, mowing or other means to a height no greater than 50mm.
- 2.2 Burning of garden refuse on the ground or in incinerators is prohibited by Council Health Local Laws without prior written approval.

**3 ALTERNATIVE SITUATIONS**

If for any reason it is considered impractical to clear firebreaks or to remove the flammable material from the land as required by this Notice, application must be made in writing to Council's Fire Control Officer on or before the 12th day of October 2004, for approval to provide firebreaks in alternative positions or take alternative action to abate a fire hazard.

If permission is not granted by the Council Fire Control Officer you shall comply with the requirements of this Notice in its entirety.

**4 FIRE MANAGEMENT PLANS**

All properties within subdivision/developments within the City of Rockingham shall comply with the Fire Management Plans for their estates to the satisfaction of Council or its duly authorised officer.

**5 PENALTY**

The owner or occupier of land to whom a notice has been given under Section 33 subsection 1 of the Bushfire Act and who fails or neglects in any respect duly to comply with the requisitions of the notice is guilty of an offence.

**Penalty: \$1 000**

**NOTE**

- 1 If the requirements of this Notice are carried out by burning, such burning must be in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Bushfires Act 1954 (as amended) and Council's Health Local Law, and Council shall be notified in the form of an alternative firebreak request.
- 2 Owners and/or occupiers of land are hereby requested by Council for the further improvement in fire control in the district to provide firebreaks of 3 metres minimum width around all farm boundaries.
- 3 Drains do not constitute a firebreak.

**BURNING OFF AND PERMITS**

**Burning is prohibited within urban residential areas.**

(Rockingham, Singleton, Golden Bay, Settlers Hills, Woodleigh Grove, Sherwood Estate, Secret Harbour)

Burning of Garden refuse on the ground or in incinerators is prohibited in Urban areas without prior written approval of Council's Manager Health Services.

In Rural areas Permits to burn are required during the **Restricted Burning periods**. No burning is permitted on days of very high or extreme fire danger—this includes solid fuel barbecues.

**RESTRICTED BURNING PERIODS** are 1st October to 30th November and 1st April to 31st May.

**PROHIBITED BURNING PERIOD** is 1st December to 31st March.

No burning or open fires are permitted during this period.

**NOTE** These dates can be varied at the discretion of Council or its duly authorised Officer and permit holders are responsible to verify the current dates.

Permits to burn are required to be obtained from the Bushfire Control Officer—City of Rockingham Council Administration Offices prior to burning off during **Restricted Burning Periods**.

#### **FIREBREAK CONTRACTORS**

To assist ratepayers to install firebreaks, a list of Registered Contractors is available from the Council Rangers Department (telephone 9528 0303) from 30 August.

**IT IS PROPERTY OWNERS' RESPONSIBILITY TO ENSURE WHEN USING CONTRACTORS THAT THE FIREBREAKS ON THEIR LAND ARE COMPLETED BY 30 NOVEMBER, 2004.**

Note: Pursuant to Council's Health Local Laws, Burning of any refuse is prohibited in Urban Areas (Includes Residential, Special Residential, Commercial and Industrial areas).

Please note that all variations to firebreaks previously and currently approved by Council are cancelled as of 1st August 2004.

Any resident requiring further information regarding Applications to Vary Firebreaks can contact Council's Rangers and Fire Management Services team on 9528 0303 for further information and advice.

Please note that failure to install a firebreak or comply with Council's firebreak order may incur a penalty of \$1000 in addition to Contractor Fees incurred to install fire breaks and Council Administration costs.

#### **ROAD TRAFFIC CODE 2000**

Regulation 272 (1) (d) (ii)

Approved Apparel

The approvals of the Commissioner of Police relating to a reflective vest to be worn by accredited pilots published in the Gazette No. 183 dated 24 October 1997 at page 5913 and in the Gazette No. 191 dated 4 November 1997 at page 6096 are hereby rescinded;

and

Pursuant to the provisions of regulation 272 (1) (d) (ii) of the Road Traffic Code 2000, reflective apparel approved by the Commissioner of Police to be worn by accredited pilot vehicle drivers shall be of the type, colour and description hereunder approved.

The apparel shall comply with the Australian / New Zealand Standard AS/NZS 4602:1999 High Visibility Safety Garments, Class D/N. In accordance with the standard the apparel is a day/night garment comprising retroreflective elements on a fluorescent background material.

The garment may be either—

A vest, or

A coat

The colour of the garment shall be yellow and retroreflective bands shall be white.

The word PILOT shall appear on the front and rear of the garment in 150mm red non-fluorescent lettering

There shall be two white retroreflective bands, no less than 50mm in height, across the full width of the garment on both front and rear, one band shall be above the word PILOT and the other near the bottom of the garment.

The vest and coat shall have shoulder and sleeve retroreflective markings in accordance with the standard.

Either a vest or a coat is to be worn at all times when performing the duties of an accredited pilot vehicle driver.

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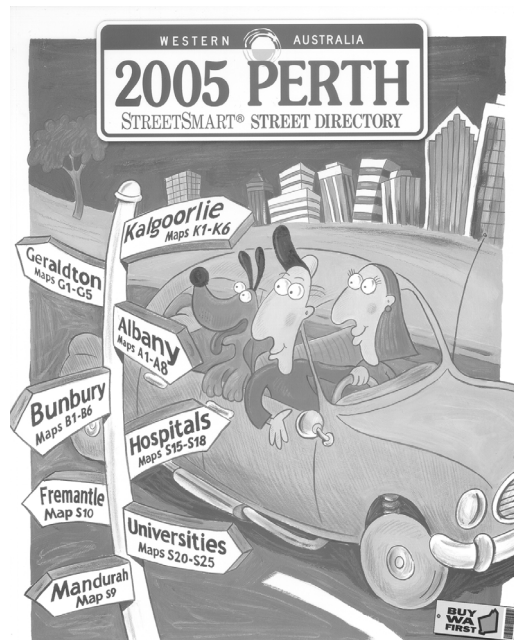
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
