CEMETERIES AMENDMENT LOCAL LAW 2018

Under the powers conferred by the *Cemeteries Act 1986* and by all other powers enabling it, the Council of the *Shire of Bridgetown-Greenbushes* resolved on 30 August 2018 to make the following Local Law.

PART 1—PRELIMINARY

1. Citation

This Local Law may be cited as the *Shire of Bridgetown-Greenbushes Cemeteries Amendment Local Law 2018*.

2. Commencement

This local law comes into operation 14 days after the date of its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. Principal Local Law

The *Shire of Bridgetown-Greenbushes Cemeteries Local Law* as published in the *Government Gazette* on 2 June 2000 is referred to as the principal local law. The principal local law was amended and published in the *Government Gazette* on 23 February 2001, amended and published in the *Government Gazette* on 12 December 2008, amended and published in the *Government Gazette* on 1 July 2011 and amended and published in the *Government Gazette* on 6 January 2015. The principal local law is amended as follows—

3.1 Clause 1.2 Interpretation

3.1.1 For consistency, change the first letter of interpretations commencing in ‘lower case’ to ‘upper case’.

3.1.2 Delete interpretation of “**Application as to assistance animals**”

3.1.3 After interpretation of “**Ashes**”, insert new interpretation to read—

“**Assistance animals**” has the same meaning as in the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992*;

3.1.4 After interpretation of “**CEO**”, insert the following interpretations to read—

“**Coffin**” means a coffin or other receptacle used for the transportation of a dead body to the grave site;

“**Cremation urn**” means a container used for holding the remains of a dead body after the due processes of cremation;

“**Disability**” has the same meaning as in the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992*;

3.1.5 After interpretation of “**Funeral Director**”, insert the following interpretations to read—

“**Headstone**” means a memorial designed for placement at the head of a grave in the lawn section of a cemetery, commemorating a grave or the placement of ashes;

“**Memorial**” has the meaning set out in the Act and includes a headstone, memorial plaque and monument;

“**Memorial plaque**” means a panel, plate or tablet designed or used for purposes of bearing commemorative inscription;

“**Monument**” means a tombstone, sculpture, statute or other form of memorial approved by the Board commemorating a grave or the placement of ashes, other than a headstone;

3.1.6 After interpretation of “**single funeral permit**”, delete the “.” and insert a “;” and insert the following interpretation to read—

“**Vehicle**” includes every conveyance and every object capable of being propelled or drawn on wheels, tracks or otherwise (and includes a bicycle and a skateboard).

PART 2—ADMINISTRATION

3.2 Clause 2.1 Powers and Functions of CEO

3.2.1 Change the word “cemetery” in the last line to “cemeteries within the Shire of Bridgetown-Greenbushes”.

3.2.2 After clause 2.1, insert new clause to read—

2.2 Plans and Registers

(1) The Board shall establish and maintain—

- (a) A plan of each cemetery showing the location of areas set aside for burials and placement of ashes;
- (b) a register containing the identification numbers of graves and the names and description of the persons buried;
- (c) a register of grants made with respect to each cemetery; and
- (d) a register of persons cremated whose ashes have been buried or disposed in each cemetery.

(2) The plans and registers referred to in sub-clause (1) shall be open for inspection by members of the public during normal office hours of the Board.

PART 3—APPLICATION FOR FUNERALS

3.3 Clause 3.3 Certificate of Identification, Part (2)

Delete part (2) and replace with—

A Funeral Director shall complete a certificate in the form determined by the Board from time to time, where—

- (a) in the opinion of the funeral director, the dead body is not in a fit state to be viewed; or
- (b) after reasonable effort the Funeral Director is unable to arrange for a person to identify the dead body.

3.4 Clause 3.4 Minimum Notice Required

3.4.1 Delete wording of clause 3.4 and replace with—

All bookings to hold a funeral shall be made with the Board not less than two (2) working days prior to the time proposed for burial on the application otherwise an extra charge may be made.

3.4.2 After clause 3.4, insert the following new clauses—

3.5 Fixing Times for Funerals

On receipt of a properly completed application form and the satisfaction of all other requirements of the Act and this local law the Board may fix the time for a funeral.

The time fixed for a funeral is at the discretion of the Board but subject to this local law will be as near as possible to the time requested by the applicant.

3.6 Times for Burials

A person shall not carry out a burial—

- (a) on a Saturday, a Sunday or a public holiday; or
- (b) at any time other than between the hours 9.00am to 3.00pm;

except with the permission of the Board.

PART 4—FUNERAL DIRECTORS

3.5 Clause 4.1 Funeral Director’s Licence Expiry

Delete “30th day of” and replace with “30”.

PART 5—FUNERALS

Division 1—General

3.6 Clause 5.3 Vehicle Entry Restricted

Delete wording for clause 5.3 and replace with—

(1) Subject to clause 5.3(2), a funeral procession shall enter by the principal entrance of the cemetery and no vehicle shall enter the cemetery except—

- (a) the hearse;
- (b) official mourning coaches;
- (c) a vehicle carrying or transporting a person with a disability;
- (d) a device or equipment used to transport, carry or handle a coffin; and
- (e) a pram, baby carriage, stroller or a similar device.

(2) This clause does not apply to a vehicle approved by the CEO or authorised person.

*Division 2—Placement of Ashes***3.7 Clause 5.7 Disposal of Ashes**

In Part (1), after the word “Scattering” delete “to the Winds” and replace with “in an area approved by the Board”

PART 7—MEMORIALS AND OTHER WORK*Division 1—General***3.8 Clause 7.1 Application for Monumental Work**

Delete wording for clause 7.1 and replace with—

(1) Upon the written application of a person on the prescribed form and payment of the set fee, the Board may issue to that person a permit to carry out monumental work on a grave specified in an application on the days, at the times and subject to the conditions specified by the Board.

(2) An application referred to in sub-clause (1) shall be accompanied by—

- (a) plans and specifications of the proposed monumental work, including precise details of all words, designs and pictures intended to be inscribed on or attached to the monumental work;
- (b) If the applicant is not a holder of a grant in respect of a grave on which the work is to be carried out, the written consent of the holder or authorised representative.

3.9 Clause 7.2 Placement of Monumental Work

After the word “foundations” delete the full stop and include “as determined by the Board.”.

3.10 Division 2—Lawn Section

Delete the words “Lawn Section” and replace with “Specifications and Materials for Memorials”.

3.11 Clause 7.14 Specification of Monuments

3.11.1 In Part (1) delete the words “in the lawn section of”.

3.11.2 After sub-clause (c)(iii), insert a new sub-clause to read—

- (iv) the length of the base of the monument shall not exceed 2.4m; and

3.11.3 Renumber current sub-clause (iv) to (v)

3.11.4 Delete sub-clauses (2) and (3).

3.12 Clause 7.15 Headstones

Delete clause 7.15 and replace with—

7.15 Specification of a Headstone

(1) A headstone shall—

- (a) be made of natural stone;
- (b) be placed on a base of natural stone;
- (c) comply with the following specifications—
 - (i) the height of the base of the headstone above the highest point of the original surface of the grave shall not be less than 150mm nor more than 200mm;
 - (ii) the overall height of the headstone, including the base, shall not exceed 1.2m;
 - (iii) the length of the base of the headstone measured across the width of the grave shall not exceed 1m;
 - (iv) the width of the base of the headstone shall not exceed 300mm; and
 - (v) that part of a headstone above its base shall not extend horizontally beyond that base.

(2) Subject to sub-clause (3) a memorial plaque may be attached to a headstone erected or being erected within a cemetery.

(3) The provisions of clause 7.16 apply to a memorial plaque that is attached to a headstone.

3.13 Division 3—Memorial Plaque Section

Delete this sub-heading.

3.14 7.16 Requirements of a Memorial Plaque

3.14.1 Delete the word “Requirements” and insert the word “Specification”.

3.14.2 In sub-clause (1)(b), delete the words “380mm x 280mm” and insert the words “140mm x 110mm”.

3.15 Division 4—Licensing of Monumental Masons

Change “4” to “3”.

3.16 After sub-clause 7.17, insert new Clause to read—

7.18 Display of Trade Names on Memorials Not Allowed

A person shall not display any trade names or marks on a memorial.

3.17 Re-number existing clauses 7.18, 7.19, 7.20 and 7.21 accordingly.

3.18 7.18 Expiry Date, Non-Transferability

Delete “30th day of” and replace with “30”.

3.19 Insert new Clause to read—

7.23 Application for Single Monumental Work Permit

(1) The Board may on receipt of an application by a person in the form prescribed and on payment of a set fee, issue to an applicant a single monumental work permit authorizing the holder to place a monument within a cemetery subject to such conditions as the Board specifies on the permit.

(2) An application for a single monumental work permit under sub-clause (1) shall include an application for a monument work in the form prescribed.

PART 8—GENERAL**3.20 Clause 8.6 Unauthorised Advertising or Conduct of Business**

In the first line, after the words “trade or profession” insert the words “within a cemetery”.

WILDLIFE CONSERVATION ACT 1950**WILDLIFE CONSERVATION (RARE FLORA) NOTICE 2018**

Made by the Minister for Environment under section 23F(2) of the Act.

1. Citation

This notice may be cited as the *Wildlife Conservation (Rare Flora) Notice 2018*.

2. Interpretation

In this notice—

“*extant*” means known to be living in a wild state;

“*protected flora*” means any flora belonging to the classes of flora declared by the Minister under section 6 of the Act to be protected flora by notice published in the *Gazette* 9 October 1987, at p. 3855;

“*taxon*” includes any taxon that is described by a genus name and any other name or description.

Note: The plural form of “*taxon*” is “*taxa*”.

3. Declaration of rare flora

Subject to clause 4, protected flora—

- (a) specified in Schedule 1, being taxa that are extant and considered likely to become extinct or rare, as critically endangered flora, and therefore in need of special protection;
- (b) specified in Schedule 2, being taxa that are extant and considered likely to become extinct or rare, as endangered flora, and therefore in need of special protection;

- (c) specified in Schedule 3, being taxa that are extant and considered likely to become extinct or rare, as vulnerable flora, and therefore in need of special protection; and
- (d) specified in Schedule 4, being taxa that are presumed to be extinct in the wild and therefore in need of special protection,

are declared to be rare flora for the purposes of section 23F of the Act throughout the State.

4. Application

Clause 3 does not apply to those plants of a taxon of protected flora specified in Schedule 1, 2, 3 or 4 that have been planted for any purpose other than such plants that have been planted for the purpose of conservation of that taxon and in accordance with approval given by the Director General.

5. Revocation

The *Wildlife Conservation (Rare Flora) Notice 2017* is revoked.

WILDLIFE CONSERVATION ACT 1950

WILDLIFE CONSERVATION (SPECIALLY PROTECTED FAUNA) NOTICE 2018

Made by the Minister for Environment under section 14(4) of the Act.

1. Citation

This notice may be cited as the *Wildlife Conservation (Specially Protected Fauna) Notice 2018*.

2. Interpretation

In this notice—

“**taxon**” includes any taxon that is described by a family name or a genus name or any other name or description.

Note: The plural form of “taxon” is “taxa”.

3. Declaration of specially protected fauna

For the purposes of the Act, all taxa of the fauna—

- (a) specified in Schedule 1, being fauna that is rare or likely to become extinct, as critically endangered fauna, are declared to be fauna that is in need of special protection;
- (b) specified in Schedule 2, being fauna that is rare or likely to become extinct, as endangered fauna, are declared to be fauna that is in need of special protection;
- (c) specified in Schedule 3, being fauna that is rare or likely to become extinct, as vulnerable fauna, are declared to be fauna that is in need of special protection;
- (d) specified in Schedule 4, being fauna that is presumed to be extinct, are declared to be fauna that is in need of special protection;
- (e) specified in Schedule 5, being birds that are subject to international agreements relating to the protection of migratory birds, are declared to be fauna that is in need of special protection;
- (f) specified in Schedule 6, being fauna that are of special conservation need being species dependent on ongoing conservation intervention, are declared to be fauna that is in need of special protection; and
- (g) specified in Schedule 7, are declared to be fauna that is in need of special protection, otherwise than for the reasons mentioned in paragraphs (a), (b), (c), (d), (e) and (f).

4. Revocation

The *Wildlife Conservation (Specially Protected Fauna) Notice 2017* is revoked.

1. Citation

This local law is the *Shire of Broome Local Government Property and Public Places Amendment Local Law 2018*.

2. Commencement

This local law comes into operation 14 days after the date of its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. Principal local law amended

This local law amends the *Shire of Broome Local Government Property and Public Places Local Law 2016* as published in the *Government Gazette* on 22 June 2017 and as amended on 13 March 2018.

4. Clause 1.5 amended

In clause 1.5 delete the definition for **local government property** and replace with—

local government property means anything—

- (a) which belongs to, is owned by or is under the care, control and management of the local government;
 - (b) which is an “otherwise unvested facility” within section 3.53 of the Act, but does not include a thoroughfare; or
 - (c) of which the local government is a management body under the *Land Administration Act 1997*;
- but does not include a thoroughfare.

5. Clause 5.1 amended

In clause 5.1 replace “3.2” with “3.5”.

6. Clause 8.3 amended

Delete clause 8.3(c)(ii) and replace with—

(ii) stone/rock-mulch treatments using—

- A. river-washed rounded stone with an average diameter less than 40 millimetres; or
- B. crushed rock or gravel with an average diameter of between 20 millimetres to 40 millimetres, limited to an area no greater than 20 square metres unless otherwise approved in accordance with a development approval;

1. Citation

This Instrument may be cited as the *Dumbleyung Land Conservation District (Appointment of Members) Instrument 2018*.

2. Appointment of members

Under Section 23(2b) of the Act and clause 5(1) of the *Soil and Land Conservation (Dumbleyung Land Conservation District) Order 1987**, the following are appointed as members of the District Committee for the Dumbleyung Land Conservation District—

- (a) On the nomination of the Shire of Dumbleyung: Cr Marilyn Hasleby of Dumbleyung;
- (b) On the nomination of the WA Farmers Federation: Mr Jonathon Adams; and
- (c) As persons actively engaged in, or affected by or associated with, landuse in the district—
 - (i) Mr Todd Gray of Dumbleyung
 - (ii) Kevin Powell of Dumbleyung

3. Term of office

BUSH FIRES ACT 1954*City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder***FIREBREAK NOTICE 2018/2019**

Notice to all owners and/or occupiers of land situated in the City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder

As a measure to assist in the control of bush fires, and to prevent the spread or extension of a bush fire, all owners and/or occupiers of land within the City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder district are required before the 1 October 2018, or within 14 days of becoming the owner or occupier of land thereafter, must clear firebreaks or take measures in accordance with this notice to maintain those firebreaks and measures up to and including the 30 April 2019.

Interpretation

“**Act**” means the *Bush Fires Act 1954*;

“**Authorised Person**” means a person authorised in accordance with S.9.10 of the *Local Government Act 1995* by the City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder;

“**City**” means the City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder;

“**Flammable Matter**” includes all form of vegetation both living and dead, and any other flammable materials and combustible matter;

“**Firebreak**” means ground which is cleared to a mineral earth standard in which all flammable material (which includes vegetation and with all overhanging branches, trees, limbs, etc. to be trimmed back clear of the Firebreak area) has been removed and on which no flammable material (which includes vegetation) is permitted during the Firebreak period and the Firebreak must be the required width;

“**Firebreak Period**” means the time from 1 October 2018 until 30 April 2019;

“**Trafficable**” means able to be driven around, unhindered, in a standard four-wheel drive vehicle.

General Requirements

All owners and/or occupiers of land within the district of the City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder must clear all flammable matter from the land in accordance with the following requirements—

Land which is 5,000 m² or less in area shall be required to follow the general fire hazard reduction measures as stated in this notice.

Land which is 5,001 m² or greater in area shall be required to have a trafficable firebreak three (3) metres in width cleared immediately inside all external boundaries of the land to mineral earth or to the satisfaction of an authorised person.

General Fire Hazard Reduction Measures

All owners/occupiers are required to reduce fire hazards on their property as far as reasonably practicable over the entire area of land. This can be achieved by clearing all “flammable matter” to a height of no more than 50mm, or to the satisfaction of an authorised person, and all clearing must be done in accordance with the Act. Fire Hazard Reduction Orders will be issued where owners/occupiers have failed to reduce fire hazards on their property to a satisfactory state in the opinion of an authorised person.

Amendments to the above requirements

If an owner or occupier of land within the district of the City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder is unable to comply with the requirements of this notice, that owner or occupier may request in writing to the City to undertake alternative measures to enable compliance with this notice in the opinion of an authorised person.

The following are the Burning Periods for Kalgoorlie-Boulder District—

Firebreaks/Reduction Measures must be installed by—1 October 2018 and remain until 30 April 2019.

(Prohibited Period) All Burning is prohibited between—1 November 2018 to 31 March 2019.

(Restricted Period) Permits are required between—1 April to 30 April and 1 October to 31 October each year.

(No permit required Period) Burning off does not require a permit however restrictions still apply—1 May to 30 September each year.

The following restrictions apply at all times throughout the year—

- No burning off on Sunday or Public Holidays.
- No burning of garden waste, refuse or offensive materials at any time.
- No burning off contrary to the provisions of the City’s Health Local Law.
- Authorised burning off is undertaken between the hours of 6:00 pm and 11:00 pm.
- All neighbouring property occupiers must be informed of the burning off before commencement.
- An Authorised Person must be informed of the burning off before commencement.
- Local Fire Station Officers must be informed of the burning off before commencement.

Compliance

(1) In addition to the requirements of this notice, further works which are considered necessary by an authorised person may be required as specified in writing in a subsequent notice addressed to the land owner as recorded by the City.

(2) Where the owner or occupier of the land fails or neglects to comply with the requirements of this notice or a subsequent notice addressed to the land owner, an authorised person may enter onto and upon the land with any workmen, contractors, vehicles and machinery as required to carry out the requisitions of the notice at the expense of the land owner. Where the City is required to act in default, the land will be cleared in accordance with this notice or at the discretion of an authorised person.

(3) Failure to comply with this notice and subsequent written notices may result in penalties being issued or court action and the liability for any costs incurred by the City in relation to works undertaken on behalf of the land owner.

ROAD TRAFFIC (VEHICLES) ACT 2012

HARVEST MASS MANAGEMENT SCHEME ORDER 2018

I, Richard Sellers, in my capacity as Commissioner of Main Roads, hereby make an Order for the modification of mass requirements and the giving of an access approval, under sections 33 and 40, respectively, of the *Road Traffic (Vehicles) Act 2012*.

1. Revocation of previous notices

The *Class 3 Vehicle Notice 2015 Harvest Mass Management Scheme*, issued by the Commissioner of Main Roads under the *Road Traffic (Vehicles) Act 2012*, is revoked.

2. Citation

This is the *Harvest Mass Management Scheme Order 2018*.

3. Commencement and duration

This Order has effect on the first day of October each year and ceases to have effect on the last day of February the following year.

4. Interpretation

In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—

Business Rules means the document, as amended from time to time, entitled “Harvest Mass Management Business Rules” published on the Main Roads website.

HMMS means the Harvest Mass Management Scheme.

Grain Receiver means a person who accepts grain deliveries, at one or more sites, for the purpose of storage and handling and who is registered with the Commissioner of Main Roads for the purposes of the HMMS.

Main Roads Website means the website maintained by the Commissioner of Main Roads.

5. Application

(1) This Order applies to a vehicle that is—

- (a) registered with a Grain Receiver for the purposes of the HMMS;
- (b) being operated in accordance with the Business Rules; and
- (c) being used to transport grain from a paddock directly to a Grain Receiver accepting the particular type of grain being transported.

(2) This Order also applies, for the purpose only of the access approval given in this Order, to a vehicle that is being used to transport a bulk commodity, used for the purposes of agriculture (for example, lime or fertiliser), on the return journey from a Grain Receiver to a paddock.

6. Modification of mass requirements

The modified mass requirement specified in the Business Rules is approved for a vehicle to which this Order applies, subject to the conditions specified in the Business Rules.

7. Access approval

(1) a vehicle to which this Order applies is approved to operate on the corresponding RAV Network applying to the vehicle under the—

- (a) *Prime Mover, Trailers Combinations Order 2017*;
- (b) *Truck, Trailers Combinations Order 2017*;
- (c) Tri Drive Prime Mover, Trailer Combinations Period Permit; or
- (d) Tri Drive Truck, Trailer Combinations Period Permit.

(2) A vehicle to which this Order applies is approved to operate on a road listed in a Main Roads endorsed HMMS Road List when travelling from the paddock to the nearest road approved for RAV Network access, subject to the conditions specified in the Business Rules; or

(3) A Category 1 RAV vehicle combination to which this Order applies that is 20 metres or less in length and 50 tonnes or less in gross mass is permitted to operate on any public road, other than a road that is prohibited under RAV Network 1, published on the Main Roads Website.
