HIS Excellency the Governor has been pleased to direct the publication of the following Report, which has been received from Charles Symmons, Esquire, Protector of Aborigines, relative to the establishment on the Island of Rottnest, dated the 6th instant—

"I have the honor to report to His Excellency my return on Saturday last from a visit to the establishment at Rottnest. I found the prisoners (to the number of twenty-three) all in health, nor had any casualty or sickness occurred in the period (nearly six months) during which, owing to the tempestuousness of the weather, I had been foiled in several attempts to visit the Island.

"The Superintendent reports favorably of the general conduct and tractability of his charges, and no stronger evidence of their industry needs be adduced than the buildings constructed, and numerous farming improvements effected subsequent to my last visit. An excellent stock-yard, with stables, sheds, and capacious barn, all built of stone, form a second quadrangle in the rear of the dwelling-house and apartments for the Prisoners, comprising on a small scale probably as convenient an establishment as any in the Colony.

"Twenty acres of land are cleared, fourteen of which are at present under grain crops, and substantially fenced.

"The produce of last year's harvest, consisting of about fifty bushels of wheat, and a like quantity of barley, is, I should pronounce, unsurpassed in quality by any grown on the mainland.

"About seventy tons of salt are now housed, which it would be desirable for the Government to bring over to the mainland, as in the event of an increase in the number of prisoners, the salt must be unhoused, and consequently deteriorated by exposure to the weather.

"This salt, contrary I believe, to the conceived opinion, Mr. Vincent states from experience as possessing sufficient strength for the thorough curing of meat, a fact which, when once known, must considerably enhance its value."
