Proclamation.

*By His Excellency JOHN HUTT,
Governor and Commander-in-
Chief of Western Australia, and
Vice Admiral of the same.*

Whereas on or about the eighteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and forty, a Deed of Grant from the Crown was issued in favor of Thomas Peel, of Clarence and the Murray River, in the said Colony, Esquire, granting to him in fee-simple certain land in the Murray District containing (250,000) two hundred and fifty thousand acres (more or less) and marked in the maps and books of the office of the Surveyor-General as "Location No. 16 Cockburn Sound," in which deed a power was reserved to resume any part of the land thereby granted which might be required for works of public utility and convenience: And whereas it has been found desirable to resume a certain portion of the said land for such purposes: Now therefore I the Governor, in pursuance and by virtue of such power, have resumed and do hereby resume for works of public utility and convenience, all that piece or parcel of land containing (1) one acre or thereabouts, forming a portion of "location No. 16 Cockburn Sound" above referred to, bounded on the North by a line about 4 chains 26 links in length, extending due east or thereabouts from the eastern shore of the entrance to Peel's Inlet through a spot about 21 chains north from the northern extremity of Samphire Point, said line passing through a post 4 feet high in centre of a long pile of stones one chain east from shore aforesaid, and terminating eastward at a similar post in the angle of a trench dug in the ground; bounded on the East by a line about 2 chains 50 links in length extending true south or thereabouts from post last mentioned to another post 4 feet high in the angle of a trench dug in the ground; on the South by a line about 3 chains 76 links in length true west or thereabouts from post last mentioned to the shore aforesaid, passing through a post 4 feet high in centre of a long pile of stones about 76 links east from said shore; and on the West by the eastern shore aforesaid between the north and south boundaries.
