Colonial Secretary's Office, Perth, August 29, 1843. CEMETERIES.

His Excellency the Governor is pleased to direct the publication for general infor-mation of the following Rules and Regulations, which have been framed by the Trustees of Church Property in this Colony for the due appropriation of the Public Cemetery in Perth; as, also, with a view to the adoption of a similar arrangement in all other places where land for this purpose may be set apart by the Government.

Rules and Regulations for observance respecting the Burial Ground at Perth.

RELATIVE TO VAULTS.

1. Each space for a vault to be $18\frac{1}{4}$ feet long, and 124 feet wide, at surface of the ground,-the same admitting of a vault measuring inside 14 feet by 8 feet, the walls 9-inch brick with good mortar,—and space of 2 feet 9 inches between the side walls, to be filled up with well rammed earth.

2. Depth of vaults 8 or 10 feet, at option of parties, but 10 feet if built by Church Trustees.

No fence or railing round vaults to 3. extend beyond their walls.

4. Entrance to a vault to be from one of the carriage roads adjoining it.

5. Tombstones or monuments or slabs may be erected, but not to project beyond walls of vault.

6. A gateway, 8 feet wide, will be opened at each end of a carriage way,entrance to be at one gate, and egress at the

opposite. 7. Vi Vaults will if possible be constructed by Church Trustees so as always to have one in readiness, with a portable flight of steps leading to the interior, and a trapdoor for entrance.

8. Bodies to be soldered up in lead previous to interment in the vaults, or to be enclosed therein in permanent brickwork.

9. Charge for each vault ready for use to be according to cost of buildings, &c., besides ground charge.

Ground charge for each space of 10. 181 by 121 feet superficial £6; charge for each interment in a vault £1 10s.

11. Vaults to be used in order as num-

bered on the plan. 12. Whole space to be cleared, fenced, and planted round, when funds will admit. 13. Names of occupants to be inserted

in a register to be kept for that purpose by

Clergyman. 14. Funds arising from above-mentioned sources to be expended in fencing, clearing, planting round, maintaining, making paths and roads, constructing vaults, and on other objects connected with the ground. 15. Tenure of ground to be on condi-

tional fee.

RELATIVE TO BRICK GRAVES.

1. Each space for a brick grave to be 12 feet long and $S_{\frac{1}{2}}^{1}$ feet wide at surface of the ground, —the same allowing for a single brick grave measuring inside $7\frac{1}{2}$ feet by 3 feet, and 10 feet deep, the walls 9-inch brick with good mortar; graves 4 feet apart.

2. Double brick graves allowed to be built within same limits, and to be $7\frac{1}{2}$ feet

by 41 feet inside. 3. Railing round tombstones not to extend beyond the limits of 11 feet by 61 feet,

5. Tombstones, monuments, or slabs, allowed, but not to project beyond the walls.

6. Brick graves will if possible be constructed by Church Trustees so as always to be one in advance.

7. Ditto to be used in order as numbered on plan. 8. Charge for each brick grave con-

structed for use to be according to cost of building, &e.

9. Ground charge for each space of 12 feet by 8 feet 6 inches, without brick grave, £3.

10. Charge for each time a brick grave is opened, £1 10s.

11. The whole space to be cleared, fenced, and planted round, when funds will admit.

12. Names of occupants to be inserted in a register to be kept for that purpose by

Clergyman. 13. Ten Tenure of ground to be on conditional fee.

14. Funds arising from the above-mentioned sources to be expended in fencing, clearing, planting round, maintaining, making paths and roads, constructing brick graves ready for use, and on other objects connected with the ground.

RELATIVE TO FREE GRAVES.

1. Space for each grave to be 7 feet long, 4 feet wide, 10 feet deep at first, in double rows.

2. Spaces to be used in the order numbered on the plan up to the number 259, then the intermediate spaces from 260 to 517, after which a second tier is to be placed over the first, commencing at No. 1 and proceeding in same order as before, completing as many tiers as super-soil will admit.

The preceding arrangement may be 3. departed from by particular desire, and more than one interment be made in same grave.

4. The intermediate pathways to be used in the order numbered on the plan, after the double rows have been occupied by as many tiers as depth of remaining soil will admit.

5. Head and foot slabs to be allowed, but no fence, railing, or bricks,
6. Head and foot slabs to be carefully

replaced after removal for temporary purposes.

7. Charge for permission to crect each head slab, to include also a foot slab if required, 10s.

8. Ditto for permitting each additional insertion on head or foot slab, 5s.

9. Names of occupants to be inserted in a register to be kept for that purpose by Clergyman. 10. The

10. The whole space to be cleared, fenced, and planted round, when funds will admit.

11. Funds arising from the above charges to be expended in fencing, clearing, planting round, maintaining, making paths, &c., for the burial ground.

12. No person, on any consideration whatever, to dig a grave without permission.
