Bit, - I have the houor to tranmit my frot Quarterly Report Sor he year 1844.

It is gratitying to be anabled to inform Lis Exeellency the Governor of the conmunnce of those friendy feelings which bave now go long maxked the relations beween the sethers and the aborigines. Duming the late fruit season some petty thents luve as asual occurred, but their reo petition has been prompty checked by the armany puntakment or the delinquents.
On the 26 h ultimo, in consequence of an express having roached Perth hom Jinjinup, a farm belongingeto W. L. Drockman, Esq., situated abont 50 miles to the M. E., Proceeded on the following morning To that station, accompanied by the proprietor, the acting Colonial Surgeon, and the Native Interpreter Mr. Brockman and myself there entered into a judicial examio nation of the circcmstances connerted with the death of the natuve Wabbamara, who had died shorty after haviag been struck on the head by a person named Stoodley, bailifi on the farm at Jinjinup. Trom the depositions of witnesses it would appear that the blows had been inficted in the heat of passion, and under the tmpulse of selfdefence, the native having assumed athreatoning athtude with his "towath' (or heavy (hrowing suck), after recciving come slight strokes with the thong of a whip, for his refusal io guit the cooking fre of the whites. On the post mortem examination by the acing Colonal Surgeon, a discoloration of the occipital bone rendered it presumable that concnesion of the brain bad been the canse of death; the dreadin state of de. composition of the body rendering a very minute examination impracticable
The result of our inguiry was, the com. mittal of the aceused James Stoodley to take bis trial on the charge of manslaughter at the ensuing Quarter Scssions.

Deeply as this unfortunate event is to be deplored, it is most mratifying to rontion, that so antire was the conviction on the minds of the exasperated natives of our intention to see them righted, so implicity did they rely on our good Gait, they rigidly refrined, during a period of seven days, from the alightest agmression or hostile dem anonstration, but nwaited patiently the arrival of the anthorities. This self thenal is the more conspiunous when we consider that the injured tribe consisted of many daring and reckless characters; that the deceased was their leading man; together with the numerical weakness of the whites (iwo men and iwo bogs), the temptation of the plunder of a large mock of sheep and herd of catle, and the totally isolated pom sition of the station.

The native schools are satisfactorily pro. grossing, and althouth difficukies, tho netural consequences of the endeavor to civi. ha a body of youthful savages, are cona gtanly beceting w, ther late hitherto been
grappled with and nuccesorilly ovarcome. The most hazardotis, and pet whe most inm teresting previod of this ninf experiment $x$ fast apponchinge, sow that many of the pupile havse attarned the agre when the pae. sions ge mawe fully developed, and the desife of cmancipation from control begins to assume the mastory

To cndeavor to obriate this dimiculty, it in proposed Sorlhwith to manry the eldest or the pupils, making the best arrangemeate our positun will permit to onsure them a comfortable subsistence, and thas deprive them as much as possible of any inclmation to retum to their brethren of the bueh; while on much as are of a somewhot less While on anch as are of a somewhat less
advanced age, we expect that the ceremony of betrothing them to each other will nct not only as a check to misconduch, but as a stimmbus to future well-toing.

The resnlts of the only marrage hitherto solemnized between two papilg of the establishment (mention of which was made in my report for the ycar 1842 ), have been extremely gratiymg. The gim, who had been redamed from the bush at an age more adranced than the rest of her compa. nions, theroby greaty enhancing the diffo culties of her civilization, and whose natural disposition was wayward and untractable, now cheerfuly coniorms to all the wegula. tions of the "nstitation: and the recent birth of a child has evidently tended to oporate a still greater and most beneficial change on her feelings and character.

The friendly understanding between the settlers and the aborigines having now been so long uninterupted, the offce of Native Constable has been for some time part neanly a sinecure, and I have, therefore, with the concurrence of His Excellency, temporarily abolished that appomment in the more settled digticts, giving the dismissed functionaries to understand that in lieu of their hitherto daily ration of four, an ample remuneration will be given hem on each occasion when their gervices may be required.

1 am not aware that by this arrangement any pecuniary saving to Government will be entectcd, but I feel confident that it will be the meang of ensuring a more zealous coopperacion and increased activity in cir cwmstances of difinculty.

The guestion baving been frequenty mooted as to the numerical increase or deerease of the population since the settlement of this Colony by Europeans, 1 have lately endeavored to procure such authentic infomation on the subject as circumstances and the senticred nature of the aboriginal popalation rould permit.

From the result of these enguinies 1 am induced to believe, that, whatever numemerical tuctwations may have occurred in certain districts, yet that the aggregate numbers are much as they were fiteen Years since. Prom the salabrity of the climate, the absence of all contagious disorders, and the now rare ocourrence of fatal horthties among themselves, it might reasonably be inferred that a population mder such favorable cirenmatances must rapidly fncrease. Such, however, is cer" taximy not the cose. But shall not attempt to analyze this seeming anomaly furber than by remarking, that the wromen celdom rear (even if they produce) more than one or two children: a fuct possibly to be atnibuted to their ever roving habits, and consequent fatigue, their exposure to the hardships of the bush, and to the circum. stance that the ceremony of weaimg is usnally postponed mint the child has attained 4 or 5 years of age.

Such being some of the marmot checise to
a rapid therease of population, it may bo eaty to infer that the montality occasioned by old ace, cagnalties, or the ravages (as ins 184(3) of the infuenza, or oher local diseases must naiumury tovi in strmalize the propes's must natuzsty whu*......
