W A R R A N T.

By His Excellency ANDREW CLARKE, Esquire, K.H. Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Territory of Western Australia and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same.

TO all whom these Presents shall come, I, ANDREW CLARKE, Esquire, K.H., Governor and Commander in Chief in and over the Territory of Western Australia, and Vice Admiral of the same, send Greeting: Whereas at the last General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, holden at Perth, in the said Colony, on the 1st day of this present month of April, "Watterl" an aboriginal inhabitant of the said Colony, was tried and convicted of the wilful murder of "Boorinan," an aboriginal inhabitant of the Serpentine River, in the year 1846, and sentence of Death was Recorded against him; and whereas, it appears to me, that, although it is necessary to impress upon the Aboriginal inhabitants of this Colony, a due deference for the Laws, it is nevertheless not expedient at present to enforce the extreme penalty of those Laws, in cases of offences committed by them against each other, NOW therefore, Know ye, that by virtue and in exercise of a power and authority in me vested, I have extended to the said "Watterl" the benefit of Her Most Gracious Majesty's Royal Prerogative hereby granting to him a Pardon, on condition of his being transported to the Island of Rottnest for the term of his natural life.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my Hand and the Public Seal

of the said Colony, this seventeenth day of April, One thousand eight hundred and forty six.

W A R R A N T.

By His Excellency, Andrew Clarke, Esq., K.H. Governor and Commander in Chief, in and over the Territory of Western Australia and its Dependencies and Vice-Admiral of the same.

TO all to whom these Presents shall come, I, ANDREW CLARKE, Esquire, Governor and Commander in Chief in and over the Territory of Western Australia, and Vice Admiral of the same, send greeting: Whereas, at the last General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, holden at Perth, in the said Colony, on the 1st day of this present month of April: "Yundeen," an aboriginal inhabitant of the said Colony, was tried and convicted of the Wilful murder of "Ngummaning" an aboriginal inhabitant of Pinjarra, in the year 1846, and sentence of death was recorded against him; and whereas it appears to me, that although it is necessary to impress upon the aboriginal inhabitants of this Colony a due reverence for the Laws, it is nevertheless not expedient to enforce the extreme penalty of these Laws in cases of offences committed by them against each other: NOW know ye, that by virtue of a power and authority in me vested, I have extended to the said "Yundeen" the benefit of Her Most Gracious Majesty's Royal Prerogative, hereby granting to him a Pardon on condition of his being transported to the Island of Rottnest for the term of his natural life.

In Witness whereof, I have hereunto set my Hand and the Public Seal of the said Colony, this seventeenth day of April, One thousand eight hundred, and forty six.

P R O C L A M A T I O N.

By His Excellency ANDREW CLARKE, Esq. K.H. Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Territory of Western Australia, and Vice-Admiral of the same.

WHEREAS the under-mentioned Ordinances, enacted by the Governor of Western Australia, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, were passed in the Seventh and Eighth Years of Her Majesty's

Reign:-

- Vii. Vict. No.1. "An Act to impose certain Duties on Imported Spirituous Liquors, and on Wine and Tobacco."
Viii. No.5. "An Act to Repeal the Duties on certain Goods imported into Western Australia and to impose other duties in lieu thereof."

NOW therefore, I, the Governor, do hereby proclaim and make known to all whom it may concern, that Her Majesty has been pleased to disallow the same.

ACTS OF COUNCIL.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

ANNO DOMINI,

VICTORIAE REGINAE.

By His Excellency, ANDREW CLARKE, Esquire, K.H. Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Western Australia and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof.

No. VII.

An Ordinance to repeal certain Acts imposing Duties on Goods Imported into Western Australia, and to impose other Duties in lieu thereof.

Whereas an Ordinance of the Legislative Council of this Colony, was passed in the Seventh Year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to impose certain duties on imported Spirituous Liquors and on Wine and Tobacco:" and whereas also, an Ordinance of the said Council, was passed in the Eighth Year of the Reign of Her Majesty, intituled "An Act to repeal the duties on certain Goods imported into Western Australia, and to impose other duties in lieu thereof;" and, whereas it is expedient to establish a different and more uniform rate of duty on the several kinds of goods imported into this Colony: Be it therefore enacted, by His Excellency the Governor of Western Australia, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, that the said recited Ordinances, shall be, and the same are hereby repealed; except so far as any prior acts, or part of any prior acts are thereby respectively repealed, and except so far as the continuance of the same, or any of the provisions of the same, may be necessary for the recovery of any duties charged or chargeable under either of the said Ordinances, and that from and after the passing of this Ordinance, there shall be charged, raised, collected, levied and paid, upon all goods, wares, and

merchandise, and upon all live stock, imported into this Colony, the duties respectively specified in the schedule hereunto annexed.

ii. And be it enacted, that the duties herein mentioned, shall be collected and levied in the manner pointed out by the provisions of any Ordinance or Ordinances for the time being in force for the general regulation of the Customs of the Colony: Provided always nevertheless, that the said duties shall be charged upon the value of the articles at the place of importation, which value shall for the purposes of this present Ordinance, be deemed and taken to be, the invoice price of the said articles with the addition of Twenty per cent. thereon.

iii. And be it enacted, that this Ordinance may be amended or repealed by any Ordinance to be passed during the present session.

SCHEDULE REFERRED TO.

Table of Duties.

1. On Spirits, the production and manufacture of any part of the British Empire a duty of 6/- for each and every Imperial Gallon not exceeding the strength of Hydrometer proof, and in the same proportion for the like Spirits of greater strength.
2. On Spirits of Foreign production and manufacture, imported into the said colony from any part of the British Empire, a duty of 8/- for each and every Imperial Gallon not exceeding the strength of Hydrometer proof, and in the same proportion for Spirits of greater strength.
3. On Spirits of Foreign production and manufacture, imported into the said colony from any Foreign place, a duty of 10/- for each and every Imperial gallon not exceeding the strength of Hydrometer proof, and in the same proportion for like Spirits of greater strength.
4. On each and every Imperial gallon of Wine the produce of any part of the British Empire, 6d.
5. On each and every Imperial gallon of Wine, the produce of any other place, 1s. and 6d.
6. On each and every pound weight of Cigars and Snuff, 2s. and 6d.
7. On each and every pound weight of other Tobacco, 1s.
8. On all Live Stock from any part of the British Empire, 25 for every £100, according to their value.
9. On all Live Stock from any other place, £10 for every £100, according to their value.
10. On all Goods and Merchandise, imported into this Colony, and not otherwise charged with a specific duty, and not hereinafter set forth as Free of duty, being the growth, produce, or manufacture of any part of the British Empire, a duty of £5 for every £100 in value thereof, and so in proportion for every greater or less value.
11. On all Goods, Wares, and Merchandise, imported into this Colony, and not otherwise charged with a specific duty and not hereinafter set forth as Free of duty, being the growth, produce, or manufacture of any Foreign State, a duty of £10 for every £100 in value thereof, and so on in proportion for every greater or less value.

GOODS FREE OF DUTY.

1. All Military or Naval Stores or Provisions required for Her Majesty's Service.
2. All Bottles of Common Glass, imported full.
3. All Bullion and Coin.
4. All Staves and Hoops for Casks.
5. All Trees and Rooted Plants.
