N pursuance of the authority in me vested by a certain Act of the Imperial Parliament, passed in the 5th and 6th years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for regulating the sale of Waste Lands belonging to the crown in the Australian Colonies," I do hereby notify and proclaim that the following portions of land will be offered for Sale by Public Auction, by the Collector and Sub-Collector of Revenue, at the places and on the days hereinafter mentioned, at one o'clock at the upset price affixed to each lot respectively, on the terms and conditions set forth in certain Land Regulations, dated June, 1843:-

Proclamation.

By His Excellency Charles FitzGerald, Esquire, Commander in the Royal Navy, Governor and Commander-in-Chief, in and over the Territory of Western Australia and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same.

BY virtue and in exercise of the powers and authorities in me vested by the 'Public Slaughter House Ordinance, 1852.' I, the said Governor, do hereby notify and proclaim that the following Regulations for the management of the Perth Public Slaughter House are and shall be maintained and observed after the date of this

my proclamation:-

1. Stalls may be let by the Colonial Treasurer for one month, or for any number of integral months not exceeding twelve, at the rent of Ten Shillings for each month, payable in advance, but no stall shall be let for any time less than one month or for any time in-

cluding a broken period of a month.

2. The lessee of any stall shall not use it for any other purposes than those immediately connected with the slaughter of stock, and the sale of the meat thereof, and the care of the implements used in such business; nor shall he sublet the premises or assign his interest therein, without the written consent of the Governor first had, nor shall he allow any person to sleep in the premises.

3. No person, except as hereinafter provided for, to light, or cause to be lighted, a fire, ueu ior, to light, or cause to be lighted, a fire, pipe, or cigar, or to make use of the same if lighted upon or within the Slaughter House premises. No lamp or candle to be used therein without a secure lantern, of the security of which the Caretaker is to be the judge.

4. Certain stalls will be open for the use of the Public without charge but proven is an

the Public without charge, but no person is per-

mitted to make use thereof without the sanction

of, or for a longer period than may be sanction of, or for a longer period than may be sanctioned by, the Caretaker.

5. The following charges are to be made by and paid to the Caretaker (who shall give a receipt for the same), for each animal slaughtened whether in a restal attall and the longer than the sanction of the same of the sanction of the tered, whether in a rented stall or otherwise, -For each-

6. The Public Slaughter House is to be open between the hours of 2 and 10 p. m. each day, except Sunday, Christmas Day, and Good Friday, for the slaughter of all animals except pigs, and (upon the erection of the necessary boilers, &c.) for the slaughter of pigs upon Wednesday in each week, from 6 a. m. to 4 p. m., except during the meal times of the Caretaker; no animals to be slaughtered except between the said hours.

7. No bull, cow, ox, heifer, or steer, to be admitted while living within the Slaughter House, whether for the purpose of slaughter

or otherwise.

8. All stock intended for slaughter to be driven into such yard or yards as the Caretaker may direct, and no stock to be removed there-from without the knowledge and sanction of the Caretaker; the Caretaker, if required, to give a receipt for all stock left in such yard or yards, and if he give such receipt not to deliver such stock to any person without an order from, or receipt of, the person to whom the Caretaker may have given such receipt as aforesaid, but neither the Caretaker or Go-vernment to be answerable or liable to make any compensation for loss or escape of any such stock, or of any stock left on the slaugh-

ter house premises.

9. The Caretaker shall never be absent from the Slaughter House premises without leave.

He shall at all reasonable hours and times receive and deliver stock. either left for slaughter or lawfully to be removed from the premises, and shall make all necessary arrangements for the proper reception and deli-very, and also for the safe keeping thereof

while on the premises.

II. He shall be present at the slaughter of all animals and collect all fees payable for the same, and shall enter daily in a book to be kept by him for that purpose, an accurate account of all animals so killed and of all fees so received by him as aforesaid in respect of

the same.

 He shall examine all cattle slaughtered and enter in a book to be kept by him for that purpose, a particular description of all such cattle, with the color, mark or marks, brand or brands, sex and apparent age, together with the name of the owner and time of slaughter thereof respectively.

13. He shall carefully keep and preserve such books, and produce the same at all reasonable times, if demanded, on the premises to all persons authorized by the Government to inspect the same, and to all Justices of the Peace and Constables requiring their production as aforesaid.

I4. He shall furnish weekly to the Colonial Treasurer an accurate statement of all animals slaughtered during the preceding week, and of the fees paid to him in respect of the same as aforesaid, and shall at the same time pay over to such officer the full weekly amount of such fees.

He shall afford all persons making use

of the Slaughter House all reasonable assis-

tance and facilities.

16. He shall take all possible care of the Slaughter House premises, and to the utmost extent of his power preserve the same from mjury.

17. He shall superintend the general management of the Slaughter House premises, and cause to be kept or keep the same at all

times properly cleansed.

18. All manner of offal and other offensive matter to be removed by the owner thereof within twenty-four hours after the receipt of notice to that effect from the Caretaker, or within forty-eight hours after notice in writing to that effect may have been affixed by the Caretaker on some conspicuous part of the Slaughter House, and if not so removed to become and to be the property of the Government absolutely, who may dispose of the same in such manner as may be deemed advisable.

19. No person shall remain on any part of the Slaughter House premises after having been directed by the Caretaker to depart

therefrom.

20. No person shall use insolent, abusive, or threatening language to the Caretaker, or interrupt or interfere with or obstruct him in

the performance of his duties.

21. Lessees of Stalls to repair all damage done by them or their servants during their term, and to keep the same well and properly

cleansed as directed by the Caretaker.

22. Each person making use of any Public Stall to repair any damage done by him or his servants, and to cleanse the same as directed by the Caretaker.

The Caretaker to have a right to enter and inspect all Stalls whether let or otherwise at all hours, and if considered necessary to be furnished with duplicate keys of all locks on the doors thereof at the expense of the lessee if such locks be private property.

24. The Caretaker to have the power to

light fires in such place or places as may be set apart for that purpose in connection with

the slaughter of pigs and to see that they are properly extinguished.

25. All persons slaughtering animals in the Slaughter House to have, under the direction of the Caretaker and in places to be appointed for such purposes, the privilege of cutting the same up and, if they think proper so to do, of selling the meat on the premises.

26. All the animals slaughtered except by the Lessees of Stalls to be completely removed from the premises (if required) within twentyfour hours from the time of slaughter thereof

respectively.
