Proclamation.

By His Excellency, CHARLES FITZGERALD, Esquire, Commander in the Royal Navy, Governor and Commander-in-Chief, in and over the territory of Western Australia, and its Dependencies and Vice-Admiral of the same.

IN pursuance of the authority in me vested by a certain Act of the Imperial Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, passed in the 5th and 6th years of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for Regulating the sale of waste Lands belonging to the Crown in the Australian Colonies," I do hereby notify and proclaim, that the following portion of Land will be offered for Sale by Public Auction, by the Sub-Collector of Revenue at Albany on the 11th day of October 1854 at one o'clock, at the upset price affixed thereto, on the terms and conditions set forth in certain Land Regulations, dated 14th June, 1843:—

Proclamation.

By His Excellency CHARLES FITZGERALD, Esq., Commander in the Royal Navy, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Territory of Western Australia and its Dependencies and Vice-Admiral of the same.

WHEREAS by the first section of an Ordinance to provide for the establishment of proper places for the burial of the dead, passed the 12th day of August, 1847, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council from time to time to appoint by Proclamation such place or places in each district as shall be deemed expedient to be reserved for the burial of the Dead; now, therefore, I, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council do by this my Proclamation, appoint the undermentioned places as Reserves for Public Cemeteries in the following towns respectively but subject always to such regulations as may be published from time to time for the proper management of the same, that is to say:—

Fremantle C 1, for Church of England and Ireland.

Ditto C 2, Wesleyans.

Ditto C 3, Independents.

Ditto C 4, Roman Catholics.

Ditto C 5, Promiscuous not otherwise provided for.

Cockburn Sound, No. 54, for Serpentine District.

Perth T 39, Independents

Ditto T 40, Wesleyans.

Toodyay C, general use.

Northam No 24, ditto.

Guildford B, Roman Catholics.

DESCRIPTION of Buoys placed to mark the position of Eleanor Rocks, Beagle Rock, Minden Reef, and Scott's Ledge, for the convenience of Shipping frequenting Gage's Roads, Western Australia.

1. ELEANOR ROCKS. A chequered buoy is placed in 5 fathoms about 120 feet W.S.W. from the shoalest rock, which has 15 feet on it at low water, and lies $\frac{2}{3}$ of a mile N.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. from the nearest part of Rous Head, and 1 mile N.W. from the Light-house on Arthur's Head. This danger is not more than 100 yards in diameter, and has a clear channel of 4 to 5 fathoms in shore of it, and 8 fathoms $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile outside.

2. BEAGLE ROCK. A small narrow ridge, with 16 feet least water, has a black buoy on its western side, in 3 fathoms, $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile West 15 degrees South from Arthur's Head Light-house, and nearly one mile South from Eleanor Buoy. It lies $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile outside the edge of a 3 fathom bank which fronts Arthur's Head; but although 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 4 fathoms are found in the intermediate space, a similar rocky patch of 3 fathoms, one-sixth of a mile E.S.E. from Beagle Buoy, renders the passage unsafe for strangers.

3. MINDEN REEF is marked by a black buoy with a white vane, placed on the northern edge of the rock, which is small, and has 15 feet water on it. The buoy is nearly one mile S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. from Arthur's Head Light-house, and a short half mile South from Beagle buoy; the three buoys here described being in a line with each other. Minden Reef lies about a cable's length N.N.W. from a projecting part of the 3 fathom bank which extends from Arthur's Head, and there is a clear but narrow passage of 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms between, with 5 and 6 fathoms close on the reef's Western side.

4. SCOTT'S LEDGE, situated near the Northern edge of Success Bank, which forms the South side of Gage's Road, is more extensive than either of the foregoing, being $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile in diameter, with least water 9 feet on a rocky bottom near its centre. A black buoy is placed in 3 fathoms water $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile N.N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. from this shoal part, and is distant 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles E.N.E. from the large rock called the Mewstone, in a direct line from that rock towards the mouth of Swan River. The deepest channel over the Success Bank is formed by keeping the N.W. extremity of Garden Island just touching the S.E. extremity of the small island close to Carnac. These marks will lead a vessel in 4 to 3 fathoms water, $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile Westward of Scott's buoy, but a ship drawing 18 feet water should not attempt the passage.

5. HALL'S BANK, a rocky patch of 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms about 100 yards in diameter, lies nearly 2 miles from the nearest sandy

shore to the Eastward, and $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles from Eleanor Buoy, in the line of direction to it from the outer extremity of Arthur's Head. There are 8 and 9 fathoms water close around this danger, and a red and white buoy will shortly be placed to mark its position.

In all the foregoing descriptions, the depths of water are at Low Tide and the bearings by compass.

THE reception of tenders for the masonry and brickwork for the intended new gaol at Perth is further postponed to Tuesday the 3rd October next.

Tenders (in duplicate) will be received at this office and opened at noon of that day, for the erection and entire completion of the said building.

The Government will supply the contractor with the whole of the stone re-

quired for the work at Kingsford Mill Jetty, at six shillings (6s) per yard, and no stone will be allowed to be used in any part of the works, except that supplied by the Government.

Persons tendering may include the whole of the work in one tender, or they may tender for masonry and brickwork, carpentry, joinery and ironmongery, plumbing, painting and glazing, separately; or otherwise, for such work or works as belong to their respective trades; but it must be distinctly understood, that any tender for the whole work, will be considered as an whole, and that no portion of it will be accepted together with any other tender, or portion thereof.

Samples for the performance of the masonry can be seen, and such samples will be most rigidly adhered to in the execution of all and every part of the works.

Parties whose tenders shall have been accepted will be required, immediately after such acceptance, to furnish the Clerk of Works with a true and an attested copy of the bills of quantities of his estimate, with the prices attached to the various items of which his estimate is made up, respectively.

Tenders must bear the names of two respectable and approved householders who are willing to enter into bond with the contractor for the due performance of his contract, and no payments will be made until such bond shall have been fully executed.

The Government do not bind themselves to accept the lowest or any tender.
