THE following description, in conformity with the 5th clause of Ordinance No 19, of the 10th Victoria, is published for general information, of a line of public road it is intended shortly to adopt and open between the east end of the Perth Causeway and a bridge recently erected by Mr Vincent across the upper part of the Canning River:—

The road to be one chain wide, commencing at S.E. end of the Perth Causeway and extending about 27 chains along the present road to Guildford as far as the turning off from the same opposite the gravel pits, then diverging to the East and South Eastward as laid out by Assistant surveyor R. Austin, through unimproved parts of Swan Location No 36, and of Canning Locations Nos. 2, 3, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, along the N.E. side of the fence recently erected across No 3, through locations 12 and 13, and along N.E. side of the newly erected fence across No 14 A, and from the E. end of said fence by the marked road now in use through location 14, to the bridge lately thrown across the Canning River by Mr Vincent from location 14 to 16.

New Road between Albany and Wilson's Inlet.

IT is hereby notified, for general information, that a New Road has recently been laid out and marked between the Townsite of Albany and Wilson's Inlet, according to the following description, and that measures will shortly be adopted for

declaring the same a public line of communication in terms of the Ordinance No. 19 of Victoria 10:—

The above mentioned Road to be 33 feet wide, commencing at the North corner of Albany Townsite, and extending in an average direction of West half North for $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles to a running stream which flows into Torbay at Hamilton. Leaving that stream below the forks $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles above its mouth, the Road extends $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles in the same average direction and then turns to West 20 degrees South, and to West for 12 miles farther, when it passes through an unimproved portion of Hugh MacDonald's location No. 37, and branches thence to SW corner of L. Moonie's Location No. 34, and to a ford across Wilson's Inlet to the SE of Nonalup Point, the total length of the road to Nonalup ford being about 26 miles.

The arrivals and departures of mails will be subject to instructions from the General Post Office, and liable to altera-

Two approved sureties will be required to join the contractor in a bond for the due fulfilment of the duties respectively contracted to be performed.

No payments will be made on account of any Mail contract until such Bond shall have been respectively signed by the contractor and his sureties; and any breach of contract, in the wilful or negligent departure or delivery of mails at the appointed days and hours will subject the contractor to the loss of a proportionate part of his month's pay.

Tenders to be inscribed, "Tenders for conveyance of Mails," and each Tender to bear the signatures of the proposed securities.

Parties tendering to attend on the day appointed for the opening of these Tenders, when those parties whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the amount of security they will respectively be required to give.

THE following Address and Reply are published for general information :

To His Excellency CHARLES FITZGERALD, ESQUIRE, *Commander in the Royal Navy, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Territory of Western Australia and its dependencies.*

THE occasion of your Excellency's visit to York, previous to your expected departure from the Colony, affords us a welcome opportunity for the public expression of the prevailing sentiments of respect, cordiality and regard entertained towards your Excellency throughout the York district.

Many of us as Members of the York Agricultural Society bear gratefully in mind the countenance and support your Excellency has on more than one occasion personally accorded to our proceedings ; nor shall we soon or easily forget the liberal proposal which accompanied your most useful and effective address to the Society last year.

It is often found a matter of difficulty for the inhabitants of a district distant from the seat of Government to secure for their interest that immediate and equable consideration to which they are as justly entitled as any others who for such purposes may happen to be more advantageously located.

We have on this account the better reason to appreciate your Excellency's readiness of access to all without distinction, your prompt and courteous attention to every opinion, and your zealous determination to encourage with impartiality the interests of every district of Western Australia.

To your Excellency no less than to ourselves it must (we feel convinced) afford matter for more than ordinary gratification to contrast the present aspect of affairs, promising as it does a rapid increase of prosperity with the gloom and depression which everywhere prevailed, at the time of your Excellency's arrival in the Colony. GENTLEMEN,—It affords me much gratification to find my endeavors to advance the prosperity of the colony without prejudice to any particular interest or district, have been so highly appreciated by the inhabitants of the York and Avon districts, but had not the energy of the settlers seconded those endeavors, they must have been fruitless.

I can with great pride, and much regard for the inhabitants of the colony, look back to my communion with them both with regard to the public measures in which I have been engaged, and the private friendship I and my family have experienced.

I feel I have left an increased bond of union between the mother country and Western Australia in the prosperity which has attended the large introduction of capital and labor since this colony has become a Penal Settlement, and I cannot refer to the peaceable and orderly conduct of all classes of the community otherwise than as a proof that Her Majesty does not possess a more loyal or better affected portion of her dominions than the colony of Western Australia.
