CONVEYANCE OF MAILS.

*Colonial Secretary's Office, Perth,

TENDERS (in duplicate) endorsed "Tenders for Conveyance of Mails," will be received at this Office up to noon on Friday the 25th November next, for the conveyance of the following Mails from the 1st January to the 31st December, 1860.

A tender may embrace the whole or any portion of the undermentioned lines.

Between Fremantle and the half-way tree on the Perth road, twice daily.

Between Perth and the half-way tree on the Fremantle road, twice daily.

Guildford and Perth, once daily.

Guildford and Northam, once a week.

Northam and York, once a week.

Northam and Toodyay, once a week.

Guildford and Upper Swan, once a week.

Perth and Vasse, *vid* Canning, Serpentine, Pinjarrah, Australind, and Bunbury, once a week.

Gingin and Victoria Plains, once a month.

Perth and Albany, once a month; to be conveyed in a spring cart, subject to the following terms.

The Contractor must convey a monthly mail between Perth and Albany, and all foreign mails between the two places on such day in each month as may be fixed by the Post Master General.

He must also convey to Perth by express at any time during the month (on being called upon to do so by the Post Master, King George's Sound,) that is to say before or after the departure of the regular monthly mail for Perth, any English mails whatsoever that may be landed by the Contract Packets at Albany either on their outward or homeward route.

The journey from Perth to Albany, and *vice versa*, to be accomplished in seven clear days from the time of leaving the Post Office of either place.

The mails each trip not to exceed 800lbs if above that weight the contractor to be paid at the rate of 4d. per lb. over and above that amount

The arrival and departure of mails will be subject to instructions from the Post Master General, and liable to alteration at any time during the year.

Two approved sureties will be required to join the contractors in a guarantee for the due fulfilment of the duties respectively contracted to be performed.

No payment will be made on account of any mail contract until the bond shall have been respectively signed by the contractor and his sureties, and any breach of contract in the wilful or negligent departure or delivery of the mails at the appointed days and hours will subject the contractor to the loss of a proportionate part of his monthly pay, or the cancellation of his contract

The contractors are to convey and deliver all mails which may be entrusted to them under the authority of the Post Master General or any of the Post Masters and to provide secure and water tight lockers for mails in carts, and coverings for the bags on horseback; the contractors moreover will be bound not to convey themselves or permit their servants to convey any letter or packet to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue under a penalty of Three Pounds for each offence which penalty will be deducted from their monthly pay.

The whole of the mails (excepting those for Albany) may be conveyed either in spring carts or on horseback at the option of the contractor.

The persons employed by any of the contractors to convey mails are to be subject to the approval of the Post Master General both as to age and character.

Further particulars may be obtained on reference to the Post Master General at whose office forms of tender may be had as well as from the Resident Magistrates.

Renewal of Pastoral and Tillage Leases.

*Colonial Secretary's Office, Perth,
14th October, 1859.*

AS numerous Pastoral and Tillage Leases of Crown land, issued under authority of Her Majesty's Order in Coun-

cil dated 22nd March, 1850, will expire with the present year, 1859; and, unless renewed for a further term, such leases will revert unconditionally to the Crown, without compensation to the Lessees for any improvements that may have been effected thereon; the following Rules and Regulations, for the guidance of persons desirous of renewing their leases, are hereby published for general information:—

1. Application for the renewal of a Pastoral lease in class B, or of a Tillage lease, must be addressed to the Surveyor-General in a certain printed form, which is procurable without charge, at the Survey Office in Perth, or from any Resident Magistrate.

2. Such application must be accompanied by a deposit of £5, or by the receipt of any Collector of Revenue for that amount. The deposit will be returned if the application is not granted.

3. All applications for renewals must be sent in to the Survey Office before the 31st day of December on which the lease expires; or before the 1st day of that month should any alteration be required in the boundaries previous to renewal.

4. No alteration of boundaries will be admissible except such as may be necessary for making good a deficiency in the acreage of a run, arising out of any grants, sales, leases, licenses or reserves, made during the currency of the lease, in terms of the Order in Council and Depasturing Regulations, under which the said leases may have been issued.

5. Any alteration of boundaries previous to renewal, except as last aforesaid, can only be effected by taking out a fresh lease under the new Pastoral Regulations.

6. An application for renewal must be duly filled up with all the particulars required on the face of it, and should fully state the grounds in which the renewal is claimed, as set forth in the conditions of the lease, which are as follows:—

1st. Purchases by a Pastoral Lessee, of any portion of his run, to the extent of one acre out of every hundred chargeable with rent.

2nd. Permanent improvements effected on any part of such run (not being comprised within a Tillage Lease, or within purchased land) to the extent of £1 for every 100 acres chargeable with rent, either in substantial buildings, or in obtaining or securing a permanent supply of good water available for the use of live-stock or any part of the run.

3rd. Purchases and improvements as aforesaid to the joint amount of one acre, or of £1, for every hundred acres chargeable with rent

4th. Any expenditure in purchases or improvements as aforesaid, and the balance in an increased rent, at the rate of 50 per cent, for the acreage not so covered.

5th. An increased rent for the entire acreage chargeable, at the aforesaid rate of 50 per cent. beyond the rent previously paid, in lieu of any such expenditure as before mentioned.

6th. Purchases by a Tillage Lessee to the extent of at least one-fourth part of his holding, provided such holding be beyond the limits of a class B lease.

7th. The renewal of a class B lease within which a tillage lease may be comprised;—

the lessee of such tillage lease being thereupon entitled to a corresponding renewal without proving any expenditure whatever.

7. For the purpose of making any valuation of improvements which may be made the foundation of a claim to renewal, one competent authority will be appointed by the Governor, and another by the lessee. Any difference of opinion between such valuers must be determined by an umpire to be appointed by themselves, or in case they shall not agree in such appointment, by the Governor.

8. Class B leases claimed on renewal by the payment of an increased rent, will be chargeable for such amount of acreage as may be arranged under sections 11 and 12.

9. Portions of class B runs which may be thrown into class A by the operation of section 9 chapter 4 of the Order in Council, dated 22nd March, 1850, will be duly Gazetted early in January, and a proportionate abatement of rent will be made for all leases thus or otherwise reduced in quantity to the extent of 1000 acres and upwards.

10. The Lessees of class B runs thus reduced in quantity, will be entitled to a preference in obtaining Depasturing licenses for the next year of the class A land created out of their runs, provided they apply for the same in the prescribed form within two months next after such new Class A land shall have been proclaimed in the Government Gazette.

11. Claimants for the renewal of class B leases, the annual rent for which has been partly abated on account of land said to be unavailable for pastoral purposes, must forward with their applications for renewal, full particulars as to the nature, quantity, position and limits, of the unavailable land for which the abatement of rent is claimed; in order that each case may be dealt with under the sections 3, 4, 5 and 6, chapter 4, of the Regulations dated 1st November, 1851. Forms of application will be procurable at the Survey Office, or from any Resident Magistrate, without charge.

12. In claiming abatement of rent as hereinbefore provided, it is to be distinctly understood that no such abatement will be made except for portions of land within a pastoral lease which may be found *wholly* unfit for pastoral uses. No allowance can be claimed for less than one-tenth nor more than one-fourth of any run;—and none whatever out of any run which may not exceed 4000 acres.

13. On the Governor's approval of an application, a renewal or new lease will be prepared in the Survey Office, and will be deliverable as usual at the Revenue Office in Perth, or by the Resident Magistrate of the District in which the land may be situated, on payment of any balance of rent which may be due in advance.

14. Lists of such renewals and new Leases will be duly Gazetted as soon as possible after approval; and any which may not be taken up or fully paid for within two calendar months after such Gazette notice as aforesaid, will be considered forfeited, together with all deposits, and the land will be open to fresh selection.

15. Renewals will carry with them the

same rights and privileges, and will be subject to the same conditions in every respect as the original lease, except as regards any claim to further renewal.

 NOTICE TO MARINERS.

FOUR NEW HARBOR LIGHTHOUSES, VICTORIA.

In accordance with the intimations contained in two notices to mariners issued from this office, dated respectively 7th May, 1858, and 28th May, 1859: Notice is hereby given that lights were last night exhibited from the undermentioned new lighthouses.

These lights are fourth class catadioptric, and will continue to be exhibited every night hereafter from sunset to sunrise.

1. PORTLAND BAY HARBOR LIGHT.

The lighthouse at Portland Bay is situated on Battery Hill; its approximate position is lat. 38° 22' S., long. 141° 39' E.

The light is a *fixed red light*, elevated one hundred and sixteen (116) feet above the mean level of the sea, and may be seen in clear weather at the distance of about thirteen (13) nautical miles, allowing (10) feet for the height of the eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

The light will be visible to seaward from N by W. round easterly to S.E.

The lighthouse is built of stone and colored *grey*.

The light hitherto shown at the seaward end of the jetty was also last night altered in color from *red to green*.

Caution.—Vessels from the westward bound to Portland Bay must be careful in rounding the Lawrence Rocks not to bring the light to bear to the northward of N. W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. After passing the Lawrence Rocks a course may be shaped for the light, keeping it on the port bow, and not standing in to less than six (6) fathoms. When abreast of the anchorage, the jetty light, colored green, will be visible bearing west.

Bearings taken from lighthouse and the approximate distances:—

- Lawrence Rocks, eastern point } S.E., 4 miles.
- Whalers' Bluff, extreme north point } N.W. by N., 1 m.
- Whalers' Reef Buoy .. N. by W $\frac{1}{2}$ W., 1 do.

2. PORT FAIRY HARBOR LIGHT.

The lighthouse at Port Fairy is situated on the south-eastern part of Rabbit Island, about five (5) yards from high water-mark; its approximate position is lat. 38° 24' S., long. 142° 20' E.

The light is *fixed and flashing, colored red*, showing a *bright flash* every three minutes. At a distance of six (6) miles and upwards it will appear as a *steady light* for a space of one minute and forty seconds, be suddenly *eclipsed* thirty-seconds, then exhibit a *bright flash* for twelve seconds, and be again *eclipsed* for thirty-four seconds, when the *steady light* will re-appear.

When a vessel is within about three (3) miles miles of the light the eclipses will be scarcely observable, a continued fixed light being at that distance, in clear weather, visible between the intervals of the bright flashes.

The light is elevated forty-one (41) feet above the mean level of the sea, and is visible to seaward from N. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., round by east and south to S.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W., at the distance of nine (9) nautic miles, allowing ten (10) feet for the height of the eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

The lighthouse tower is circular, built of stone, and colored *red*.

Mariners are particularly requested to note the distinctive features of the Port Fairy and Cape Otway lights, the latter being *white*, and attaining its greatest brilliancy once every minute.

Caution.—Masters of vessels working in shore to the westward of Port Fairy must be careful not to bring the light to bear to the eastward of E.N.E.

The light should not be approached nearer than one (1) mile until it bears W. by S. when a N.W. by W. course may be steered for the roads. When the light bears S. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. anchor in six and a half (6 $\frac{1}{2}$) or seven (7) fathoms.

To avoid fouling the moorings, do not bring the light to the southward of S. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.

No strangers should attempt to pick up this light in thick weather, nor enter Port Fairy at night.

Bearings taken from the lighthouse and the approximate distances:—

- South end Julia Percy Island } W. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., 13 miles.
- SSE. extremity of reef off Dusty Miller Is. } S. by W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W., $\frac{3}{4}$ do.
- N. E. extremity of Rabbit Island Reef } N.E. by E., $\frac{1}{8}$ do.
- Outer mooring anchor buoy } N. by E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E., $\frac{3}{4}$ do.

3. WARRNAMBOOL HARBOR LIGHT.

The lighthouse at Warrnambool is situated on Middle Island; its approximate position is lat. 36° 26' S., long. 142° 32' E.

The light is a *fixed white light* elevated seventy eight (78) feet above the mean level of the sea, and may be seen in clear weather at the distance of about thirteen (13) nautic miles, allowing ten (10) feet for the height of the eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

The light will be visible to seaward from all points of the compass.

Caution.—Vessels from the westward should not bring the light to bear to the southward of E. $\frac{3}{4}$ S., nor to the westward of N.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. if from the eastward.

No stranger should attempt to enter this harbor at night, nor should the light be approached within one (1) mile.

Bearings taken from the lighthouse and the approximate distances:—

- S.E. extremity of reef } S.E. by E $\frac{1}{4}$ E., 5 cables length
- Southern extremity of Hopkins Reef } E $\frac{1}{2}$ S., 2 miles.

4. PORT ALBERT HARBOR LIGHT.

The Port Albert lighthouse is situated on the eastern end of La Trobe Island; its approximate position is in lat. 38° 46' S., long. 146° 31' E.

The light is *fixed and flashing, colored red*, showing a *bright flash* every three minutes at a distance of six (6) miles and upwards; it will appear as a *steady light* for a space of one minute and forty seconds, be suddenly *eclipsed* thirty-four seconds, then exhibit a *bright flash* for twelve seconds, and be again *eclipsed* for thirty-four seconds, when the *steady light* will re-appear.

When a vessel is within about three (3) miles of the light the eclipses will be scarcely observable, a continued fixed light being at that distance visible between the intervals of the bright flashes.

The light is elevated forty (40) feet above the mean level of the sea, and will be visible to seaward from E. by N. round southerly to S.W. at the distance of nine (9) nautic miles, allowing (10) feet for the height of the eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere

The lighthouse tower is built of wood and colored *red*.

Bearings taken from the lighthouse and the approximate distances :—
