IS Excellency the Governor has been pleased to appoint John Gray Murray, Esquire, to be one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, for this Territory.

VIENDERS (in duplicate), endorsed "Tenders for the conveyance of Albany Mail," will be received at this office up to noon, on Monday, the 16th of November next, for the conveyance of Colonial and Foreign Mails between Perth and Albany for one year, or three years, commencing on the 1st of January, 1864.

Tenders to embrace the following points:

1. For conveyance of a monthly mail from Perth to Albany, and vice verså, at per month.

For conveyance of Express mails from Albany to Perth, at any time during the month, (on being called upon to do so by the Postmaster, Albany,) at per trip, and,-

3. For conveyance of a bi-monthly mail from Perth to Albany, and vice versa, at per month.

It is not intended to adopt the service named in No. 3 paragraph, unless bimonthly steam communication between England and the Australian Colonies is established, but in such event, the accepted tender for a bi-monthly would then be put into operation.

The contractor to convey the mails at such dates in each month as may be fixed by the Postmaster General.

Parties tendering to state the time in

which they will undertake to convey the mails between Perth and Albany, and vice versâ.

The tender stipulating to convey the mails in the shortest time between the two places will have the preference.

In case the contractor should fail to deliver the mails at either Perth or Albany, within his contract time, in consequence of the overlading of the Mail cart, with passengers or luggage, &c, he will be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20, exclusive of any sum recoverable by his bond.

In the event of the Mail Packets discontinuing to touch at King George's Sound during the period of the contract, the unexpired portion of it to be cancelled.

The arrival and departure of the mail will be subject to instructions from the Postmaster General, and liable to alterations at any time during the contract.

Two approved sureties will be required to join the contractor in a guarantee for the due fulfilment of the duties contracted to be performed.

No payment will be made on account of the contract, until the bond shall have been signed by the contractor and his sureties, and any breach of contract in the wilful or negligent departure or delivery of the mail at the appointed days and hour will subject the contractor to the loss of a proportionate part of his monthly

pay, or the cancellation of his contract.

The contractor is to convey and deliver all mails which may be entrusted to him under the authority of the Postmaster General, or the Postmaster at Albany, and to provide secure, and watertight lockers for the mails, and covering for the same. He will moreover be bound not to himself convey, or permit his servant to convey any letter or packet to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue under a penalty of £3 for each offence, which penalty will be reducted from his monthly pay.

The persons employed by the contractor

to convey the mail are to be subject to the approval of the Postmaster General, both

as to age and character.

Further particulars may be obtained on reference to the Postmaster General at whose office forms of Tender may be had, as well as from the Resident Magistrates.

I'T is hereby notified for general information, that on and after the first day of November next all persons who may desire to cut, fell or remove Sandal wood from any waste lands of the Crown must

procure a license to do so from the Collector of Internal Revenue at Perth, or the Resident Magistrate of the District in which they propose to make use of it.

Two Shillings and sixpence will be charged for each license, which will be in force for one month from the date thereof.

All persons who may cut, fell or remove Sandal wood on and after the 1st November next without such license as aforesaid, will be liable to the penalties named in the 20th section of the Act of the Imperial Parliament 7th and 8th Geo. 4, cap. 30, a copy of which is annexed.

Copy of 20th section of the Imperial Act 7th and 8th Geo. 4, cap. 30, above referred to.

"If any person shall unlawfully and "maliciously cut, break, bark, root up, or "otherwise destroy or damage the whole " or any part of any tree, sapling, or shrub, " or any underwood, wheresoever the same "may be respectively growing, the injury "done being to the amount of one shilling "at the least, every such offender, being "convicted before a justice of the peace "shall, for the first offence forfeit and pay "over and above the amount of the injury "done, such sum of money, not exceeding "£5, as to the justice shall seem meet,
"and if any person so convicted shall
"afterwards be guilty of any of the said "offences, and shall be convicted thereof " in like manner, every such offender shall "for such second offence be committed to "the common gaol or house of correction, "there to be kept to hard labor for such "term, not exceeding 12 calendar months, "as the convicting justice shall think fit, "and if such second conviction shall take " place before two justices, they may fur-"ther order the offender, if a male, to be "once or twice publicly or privately whipped, after the expiration of four "days from the time of such conviction; "and if any person so twice convicted, "shall afterwards commit any of the said "offences, such offender shall be deemed "guilty of felony, and being convicted thereof, shall be liable to any of the " punishments which the Court may award "for the felony hereinbefore last men-"tioned."
