#### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency John Stephen Hampton, Esquire, Governor and Commander-in-Chief, in and over the Territory of Western Australia and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same.

HEREAS the undermentioned Ordinances were passed by me the said Governor with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council of the said Colony in the 27th year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria and respectively intituled:—

No. 3.—"An Ordinance to amend an Ordinance intituled "An Ordinance to Organize and Establish a Volunteer Military Force in Western Australia."

No. 15.—"An Ordinance to appropriate and apply the sum of £70,140 out of the General Revenue of the Colony for the service of the year 1864."

Now therefore I the said Governor do hereby proclaim and make known to all whom it may concern that Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to confirm and allow the same.

Given under my hand and the Public Seal of the Colony at Government House, Perth, this 12th day of February, 1864.

SIR,

I have received your Despatch No. 119 of the 21st of October apprizing me that considerable anxiety has arisen in the Colony regarding the opinions which had been expressed against the continuance of Transportation to Western Australia, and reporting your conference with a large and influential Deputation which sought an interview with you upon this subject. I need scarcely say to you that this important matter has not failed to engage the serious attention of Her Majesty's Government. I expect to convey to you the next opportunity a statement of the course which they propose to follow in reference to the report of the Commissioners appointed by Her Majesty to inquire into Secondary punishments, and to the various representations which have since been received from the Colonies upon the subject.

#### BUSSELTON COMMONAGE,

T is hereby notified for general information, that His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to appropriate, until further notice, for the use and benefit of the resident inhabitants on the Townsite of Busselton, under such Regulations as may from time to time be proposed in that behalf by the Busselton Town Trust and approved by the Governor, two thousand acres, more or less of land, according to the following boundaries; that is to say, on the North by a due west line of  $162\frac{3}{4}$  chains from an inner south angle of Colonel Molloy's Sussex location No. 5, situate about 81 chains south from the southwest corner of Busselton Townsite; on the East by a due south line of  $123\frac{1}{2}$  chains from angle aforesaid; on the South and on the West by lines parallel and equal to the north and east boundaries; and on the inner part by James Coppin's location b of 10 acres.

CONDITIONS.

Every Book packet must be sent either without a cover, or in a cover open at the ends or sides.

No Book packet must exceed 2 feet in length breadth or depth, or 3 pounds in

weight.

A Book packet may contain any number of separate Books, Almanacs, Maps or Prints, and any quantity of paper, vellum or parchment (to the exclusion of letters whether sealed or open), and the Books, Maps, Papers, &c., may be either printed, written or plain, or any mixture of the three.

On the cover or outside of the packet, in addition to the name and address of the person to whom the same is to be delivered, the sender thereof shall be at liberty to subscribe a statement of the contents thereof, together with his name or address.

The Books, &c., may be in any binding, mounting or covering, whether such binding be loose or attached. In the case of prints or maps, rollers may accompany them; and markers, whether of paper or otherwise, may be sent with books or

other printed papers.

If a Book packet be found to contain any enclosure which is sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any letter whether sealed or not, the letter or other enclosure will be taken out and forwarded to the address on the packet, charged with the full postage as an unpaid letter, together with an additional rate equal to the amount chargeable on a book not exceeding half a pound in weight. The remainder of the packet, if fully prepaid, will be forwarded without any extra charge.

In the event of a book packet addressed to any place being posted altogether unpaid, or prepaid less than a single rate, it will be detained, and sent to the Dead

Letter Office.

Book packets correctly posted will be delivered according to their addresses without further charge.

## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Light Houses have been erected on Foul Point and Round Island in the entrance of Trin-comalie Harbour. The lights are of the following description, and will be exhibited from sun set to sun-rise every night, after the 1st February 1864.

FOUL POINT.—A flash light showing a brilliant flash every half minute, which is plainly visible 17 miles in clear weather, from a vessel's deck elevated 18 feet above the sea; a faint light is shown between the flashes, which is not visi-

ble beyond a distance of 7 miles.
ROUND ISLAND.—A fixed bright light, which is plainly visible 10 miles in clear weather, from a vessel's deck, elevated 18 feet above the sea;

it shows a red light when brought to bear between the points W. by S.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S., and S. W.,  $\frac{1}{2}$  S., which is not visible beyond a distance of 6 or 7 miles. Approaching between these bearings the bright light is not seen.

The following directions are for the guidance of vessels entering the inner harbour. Approaching from the Southward bring Foul Point Light to bear West, distant 2 miles; then steer N. W. until Round Island light hears W. S. W. then

bear West, distant 2 miles; then steer N. W. until Round Island light bears W. S. W.; then steer direct for it until the extreme point of \*Chapel Hill bears North; then steer W. by N. until Round Island light bears S. by E. ½ E.; then steer N. by W. ¼ W., passing miaway between Ostenberg Point and Sober Island, and keeping Round Island light bearing S. by E. ½ E.; anchor immediately when the water is shoaled to †12 fathoms.

Approaching from the Northward when Foul

Approaching from the Northward when Foul Point light is made, bring it to bear S. by E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E., and steer direct for it until Round Island light bears S W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W.; then steer direct for it until the extreme point of Chapel Hill bears N. by E.  $\frac{1}{3}$  E.; and then follow the directions already given for approaching from the Southward after Chapel Hill bears N.

The Red light is intended to direct vessels clear of the dangers off Foul Point, and Chapel Rock; therefore vessels working into the harbour should be careful to keep within its limits.

- \* Chapel Hill being a high bluff headland may be easily distinguished in the darkest night, as when brought to bear N. or N. by E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E., it will be only  $l\frac{1}{4}$  mile distant, and will be the extreme point of land visible in that direction.
- $\dot{+}$  The lead should be kept going after passing Ostenberg Point, as the water shoals rapidly from 25 to 12 fathoms.
