By His Excellency John Stephen Hampton, Esquire, Governor and Commander-in-Chief, in and over the Territory of Western Australia, and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same.

HEREAS the undermentioned Ordinance was passed by me the said Governor with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council of the said Colony, in the 28th year of the Reign of Her Majesty, Queen Victoria, and entituled :--

No. 2.—" An Ordinance to establish Courts of Inquiry into the causes of Wrecks and other Casualties."

Now THEREFORE, I, the said Governor do hereby proclaim and make known to all to whom it may concern that Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to confirm and allow the same.

### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency John Stephen Hampton, Esquire, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Western Australia, and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same. HEREAS by "the Customs Ordinance, 1860," it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor to establish a New Port or Ports as to him may seem meet by Proclamation, to be published in the Government Gazette.

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And Whereas a settlement has been formed at Camden Sound, on the North West Coast of the Territory of the said Colony, and it is expedient to establish a Port thereat, Now therefore I, the said Governor by virtue and in exercise of the authority aforesaid, do hereby proclaim that I have established Camden Sound and other the waters and places adjacent thereto comprised within the limits next hereinafter described to be a Port of the said Colony for all the purposes of the said Ordinance. And I further proclaim that the said Port shall be bounded on the West by a line from the West end of the Champagny Isles to Point Hall, on the South and East by the Sea shore from Point Hall to the East corner of Camden Harbor, then by an Easterly line thence to the South end of Augustus Water and by the East shore of the said water northwards to Point Augustus, and on the North by a Westerly line to Point Frederick, then by the Seacoast Northwesterly to Point Adieu, and thence by a Westerly line to Red Island, and by a Southwesterly line to West end of the Champagny Isles aforesaid.

Lighthouse, Tiri Tiri Matangi, Houraki Gulf.

The Lighthouse in course of construction on the S. E. end of Tiri Tiri, in latitude 36° 36' 30'' S., longitude 174° 55' 15'' E., will be lit from sun set to sun rise, from and after the 1st January, 1865.

1865. The Tower is of iron 48 feet high, painted light red colour, and the focal plane of the lantern is 300 feet above high water mark. The illuminating apparatus is Dioptric of the 2nd order, showing a fixed white light all round the horizon, which may be seen from the deck of a vessel in clear weather at a distance of  $23\frac{1}{2}$ nautical miles.

It will be elevated about 150 feet above the level of the sea, and will be visible in clear weather about eighteen nautical miles, allowing fif-teen feet for the height of the observer's eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere

The Tower is built of native stone of a grey colour, and will be 118 feet in height from the ground to the top of the lantern. This light is expected to be ready for perma-nent exhibition not later than April, 1865.
