PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency John Stephen Hampton, Esquire, Governor and Commander-un-Chirf in and over the Territory of Western Australia and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same.

HEREAS the undermentioned Ordinances were passed by me the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council of the said Colony in the 27th year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, entituled:—

No. 14. — "An Ordinance to facilitate the Sale of Colonial Wine."

No. 16. — "An Ordinance to encourage the Cultivation of the Vine by permitting Distillation of the produce thereof, under certain restrictions."

NOW THEREFORE I the said Governor do hereby proclaim and make known to all to whom it may concern that Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to confirm and allow the Ordinance No. 14 of the 27th Victoria "To facilitate the sale of Colonial Wine," and to disallow the Ordinance No. 16 of the 27th Victoria "To encourage the cultivation of the Vine by permitting Distillation of the produce thereof under certain restrictions."

WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

Downing Street, 28th February, 1865.

SIR,-

I transmit to you a copy of a Letter from the Royal Horticultural Society, with a copy of a statement showing their intention to offer a Prize for the oest Representative Collection of Fruit and Vegetables from any of the Colonies, to be exhibited at the Society's International Fruit Show, in 1865.

You will perceive that the Exhibition is fixed for the month of December in the present year.

I should be glad if the Colonists of Western Australia shall be able to avail themselves of the invitation of the Society, by which I understand them to desire the exhibition of such Fruit and Vegetables (being capable of transmission to this country) as may either be characteristic of the colony, and not equally produceable in many other parts of the world, or which, from local advantages, may be produced with peculiar success in the Colony under your Government.

- 4 First Banksian Gold Medal for the best and most complete representative collection from the Presidencies of India.
- 5 Certificates will be awarded for separate exhibitions of Fruits and Vegetables, either tresh or preserved, from all parts of the world.
- 6. The first Gold Knightian Medal of the Society to the exhibitor who shall obtain the greatest number of first-class certificates.
- 7. The second Gold Knightian Medal to the exhibitor who shall obtain the greatest number of second-class certificates.
- 8. The second Gold Banksian Medal to the exhibitor who shall obtain the greatest number of third-class certificates.
- 9. The first Gold Banksian Medal to the exhibitor who shall gain the greatest number of marks, counting first, second, and third certificates as three, two, and one marks respectively.

New Road between Pinjarra, and the Perth-Albany Road.

T is hereby notified for general information that a new road has recently been laid out, and opened for traffic between the Townsite of Pinjarra, and the present line between the River Hotham, and Albany.

The said road is one chain in width, and commencing at the Murray bridge at Pinjarra extends south-easterly through locations 16 and 1 to location 54, thence more easterly to locations 72 and 71, and crosses the River Hotham about $8\frac{1}{2}$ miles above its junction with the William. It then passes nearly east; and joins the high road between Perth and Albany, about 5 miles south-eastward from where that road crosses the Hotham.
