CIRCULAR.

Downing Street, 7th June, 1869.

SIR.

I have the honor to transmit to you the copy of an Act of the Imperial Parliament, authorizing the removal of Prisoners from one Colony to another for the purpose of punishment.

You will see that, by the 4th Section, any two Colonies may, with the sanction of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, agree for the removal of any Prisoners from one of such Colonies to the other, for the purpose of their undergoing their sentences in the colony to which they are removed.

It was not thought necessary to exclude any Colonies by name from the operation of this Act; but I am anxious to remove any ground for apprehension that this Act might be used to revive the system of Transportation to Western Australia.

It has been observed to me, and is, no doubt, true, that under this Act Her Majesty would have legal power to sanction Transportation from any British Colony to Western Australia. But it is also true that Her Majesty has legal power to order Transportation from this country to the last mentioned Colony, or, by Order in Council, under the 4th Section of 6 Geo. 4th, c. 69, to appoint Western Australia as a place to which Colonial Convicts may be removed. And the Colonists may be

assured that Her Majesty will not be advised to sanction, under this Act, a mode of proceeding in respect to Colonial Convicts which, at the wish of the Australian Colonies, has been abandoned in respect to British Convicts.

Her Majesty's Government are of opinion that, as a general rule, it is desirable that each Colony should deal with its own convicts within the Colony; but it has been found difficult in some of the smaller West India Colonies to exercise a proper system of prison discipline and control; and one of the objects of this Act is to facilitate the erection of Central Prisons in one or more of the larger Islands, should the Colonists desire it, where a more effectual, and at the same time more economical, supervision of the Prisoners could be carried out.

I trust that this assurance and explanation will effectually obviate any misapprehension which might arise as to the intended operation of this Act.

3.—That the locality or localities of such discovery be clearly and accurately defined and published in the Government Gazette of the said Colony of Western Australia on or before the 31st day of December, 1869.

CONVEYANCE OF ALBANY MAIL.

Colonial Secretary's Office, Perth, 17th August, 1869.

"TENDERS (in duplicate) endorsed "Tenders for Albany Mail," will be received at this Office until noon of Wednesday, the 24th November, 1869, for the conveyance of Colonial and Foreign mails from Perth to Albany and vice versa, twice a month for three years, commencing on the 1st January, 1870.

The contractor will be required to convey the mails at such dates in each month as the Postmaster General shall fix.

Parties tendering must state the time in which they will undertake to convey the mails from Perth to Albany and vice versa.

The tender stipulating to convey the mails in the shortest time will be preferably considered.

In case the contractor should fail to deliver the mails at either Perth or Albany within his contract time, in consequence of the overloading of the mail cart with passengers or luggage, &c., he will be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20—exclusive of any sum recoverable by his bond.

In the event of the mail packet discontinuing to touch at King George's during the period of the contract, the unexpired portion of it will be cancelled.

The arrival and departure of mails will be subject to instructions from the Postmaster General, and liable to alteration at any time during the contract.

The contractor will be required to provide an officer of the Post Office with a free passage to and from Albany, if called upon to do so at any time by the Postmaster General.

Two approved sureties will be required to join the contractor in a guarantee for the due fulfilment of the contract.

No payment will be made on account of the contract until a bond shall have been signed by the contractor and his sureties, and any breach of contract will subject the contractor to the loss of a proportionate part of his monthly pay, or the cancellation of his contract.

The contractor will be required to convey and deliver all mails which may be entrusted to him under the authority of the Postmaster General, and to provide secure and water-tight lockers for the mails, and coverings for the same. He will, moreover, be bound not to convey, or permit his servants to convey any letter or packet to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue, under a penalty of £3 for every offence, which penalty will be deducted from his monthly pay.

The persons employed by the contractor to convey the mails are to be subject to the approval of the Postmaster General both as to age and character.

Further particulars may be obtained on reference to the Postmaster General, at whose office forms of tender may be obtained, as well as from the Resident Magistrates of the various districts.
