SUNKEN ROCK IN WANGARI BAY, EAST COAST OF PROVINCE OF AUCKLAND.

Marine Department, Wellington, 14th January, 1870.

OTICE is hereby given that a sunken rock, now called "McGregor's Rock," having only eleven (11) feet of water on it at low water spring tides, lies in mid channel between Sail Rock and Bream Tail; it has a pinnacle formation, and has from six to thirteen fathoms of water within a boat's length of it.

The following magnetic bearings have been furnished by G. A. Woods, Esq., Chief Marine Surveyor:—

From Bream Island ... S.S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.

, Sail Rock ... S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.

,, Mangawhai ... $N.\frac{1}{2}E$.

Vessels passing within two miles of Sail Rock, or keeping Rodney and Takatau Points in line will lead clear of the danger.

COLONIAL FLAGS OF VICTORIA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Henry Thomas Viscount Canterbury, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and Baron Bottesford, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c.

IN accordance with the provisions of a Despatch received from Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, I, the Governor of Victoria, do hereby direct that all vessels belonging to, or permanently in the service of the Government of Victoria shall wear the Blue Ensign, having in the fly thereof the distinctive badge of the Colony, viz: Five white stars, representing the constellation of the Southern Cross. I also direct that, subject to the approval of Her Majesty the Queen, the red ensign having the badge of the colony similarly emblazoned in the fly may be worn by merchant vessels registered in Victoria.

Given under my Hand and Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this third day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in the thirty-third year of Her Majesty's reign.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

GASPAR STRAIT.

THE following particulars of a rock in Gaspar Strait, furnished by Captain Quayle, master of the *Francis Henty*, are published for general information.

Department of Trade and Customs, Melbourne, 7th February, 1870.

In the middle of last October, at Two a.m., the ship Pare Joie from Hong Kong to Buenos Ayres, while standing to the eastward on the starboard tack with the wind from the southward struck on a rock at the entrance of Gaspar Strait, and remained there for twenty-four hours. The Peak of Gaspar Island bore south half east, distant five (5) miles. This rock is marked "doubtful" on the Admiralty Charts, and in a position four and a half (4\frac{1}{2}) miles to the westward of where the Pare Joie struck.

The Admiralty Salling Directions for the China Seas mention that it is doubtful whether such a rock exists.

PORTS AND HARBORS OF VICTORIA,

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Henry Thomas Viscount Canterbury, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and Baron Bottesford of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commanderin-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by The Passengers, Harbors, and Navigation Statute 1865, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council, by Proclamation published in the Government Gazette, may, from time to time, define the limits and boundaries of ports in Victoria, and from rules and requisiting for the secret. the limits and boundaries of ports in Victoria, and frame rules and regulations for the governance and preservation of the said ports respectively, and for the regulation of shipping in the same; and also for the due protection and preservation and good government and management of all public wharfs, and may appoint officers to earry out and enforce such rules and regulations; and from time to time, in like manner, may alter, amend, or repeal any such limits, boundaries, rules, and regulations, and substitute others in their stead: And whereas, by a Proclamation bearing date the thirteenth by a Proclamation bearing date the thirteenth

day of May, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in pursuauce of the powers vested in him by the above recited statute, did define the limits and boundaries of ports in the said Colony, and did proclaim and declare that certain rules and regulations therein specified for the governance and preservation of the said ports, and for the regulation of shipping in the same, should be substituted for other rules and regulations formerly in force; Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby repeal rule 92 of the rules and regulations contained in the Proclamation above specified, and do declare that the following rule shall be substituted therefor (that is to say):—

92. Steamers must proceed at moderate speed

92. Steamers must proceed at moderate speed Steamers must proceed at moderate speed whilst navigating amongst the shipping in any port; and steamers navigating the river Yarra, when passing upwards, must slow their engines to less than half-speed when abreast of the Melbourne town boundary-post, and as soon as they arrive amongst the shipping must reduce their speed to not more than three nautical miles an hour.

Steamers proceeding down the river from the Melbourne wharfs must not proceed at a greater speed than three nautical miles an hour until below the wharfs and clear of the shipping, and thence to the town boundary-post must keep their engines at less than nalf-speed.

MAIL NOTICE.

General Post Office, Perth, 8th March, 1870.

T is hereby notified for general information that the present scale of progression in the Rates of Postage on all Letters forwarded out of the Colony will for the future be abolished, and a new scale having half-an-ounce as a unit throughout will be substituted.

Hitherto letters weighing more than one ounce have been charged with two rates of postage for each ounce or fraction thereof after the first ounce, but, in future they will be charged a single rate of postage for each half-ounce or fraction of the same. Thus, for example, a letter for England weighing more than one ounce but less than one ounce and a half will be charged One shilling and six pence instead of two shillings as at present:—that is to say the postage will increase Six-pence for every half ounce throughout the scale, instead of one shilling for every ounce after the first.

This alteration will not apply to Inland Letters.
