T is hereby notified, for general information, that His Excellency The Governor has received a Despatch from Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, informing him that Her Majesty will not be advised to exercise her power of disallowance with respect to the following Acts passed during the last Session of the Legislative Council of Western Australia:—

- No. 1.—"An Act to confirm the Expenditure for the services of the year One thousand eight hundred and seventy, beyond the grant for that year."
- No. 2.—"An Act for the Naturalization of Aliens within the Colony of Western Australia."
- No. 3.—"An Act to empower the Chief Justice to grant commissions for taking affidavits to be made use of in the Supreme Court, and for taking the acknowledgments of Deeds executed by married women."
- No. 4.—"An Act to make further provision for the Maintenance of Bastard Children by their Putative Fathers."
- No. 5.—"An Act for the Carriage and Safekeeping of Explosive and Dangerous Goods."
- No. 6.—"An Act to regulate the distillation rectifying and compounding of Spirits, to grant a duty upon spirits distilled in Western Australia, and to regulate the sale of fermented and spirituous Liquors in certain cases."
- No. 7.—"An Act to regulate Superannuations and other Allowances to persons having held Civil Offices in the Public Service under the Colonial Government."
- No. 8.—"An Act to amend the Laws relative to Juries."
- No. 9.—"An Act to prohibit the Export of Arms, and Munitions of War."
- No. 10.—"An Act to provide for the Registration of Brands for Sheep."

- No. 11.—"An Act to amend the Ordinance intituled The Inquiries into Wreeks Ordinance, 1864.""
- No. 12.—"An Act to repeal an Ordinance passed in the Twenty-third year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled 'An Ordinance to consolidate and amend the laws prohibiting the Distillation of Ardent Spirits in Western Australia, and for repealing a certain Ordinance relating thereto.'"
- No. 13.—"An Act to repeal the Twenty-seventh Victoria No. 18, intituled 'An Ordinance to regulate the Pensioners' Benevolent Society.'"
- No. 15.—"An Act to appropriate the sum of Ninety-eight Thousand and Thirty-six Pounds, Fourteen Shillings, and Twopence, out of the General Revenue of the Colony, for the Service of the year One thousand eight hundred and seventy-two."

"THE JURY ACT, 1871."

REGULÆ GENERALES.

MADE IN PURSUANCE OF THE ACT 35 V., No. 8.

HEREAS, by "The Jury Act, 1871," Jurors are entitled to the following remuneration, that is to say,-Every Common Juror who shall attend the Supreme Court, or the Court for Divorce and Matrimonial Causes, or any other legally constituted Court, to try civil issues, in pursuance of any summons, shall receive compensation for his loss of time and expenses at and after the following rate, that is to say:—For every Jury upon which such Juror shall be summoned, the sum of 10s. per day, and the sum of 8d. per mile of distance between the place of residence of such Juror and the said Court. Every Special Juror who shall attend pursuant to Summons for the trial of every issue shall be allowed the sum of £1 1s., together with the sum for mileage provided in the case of Common Jurors.

And whereas such remuneration is to be paid by the parties to the Causes to be tried, and for that purpose the party demanding the Jury is required to deposit such sum of money as may be determined by any Rule of Court or Order of the Judge, and such deposit is to be made in such manner, at such time, and with such Officer as the Court or Judge may prescribe, And the Chief Justice is by the said Act empowered and required, by General Orders to make rules for the purpose of carrying out the several provisions of the said Act,

It is ordered,

1. A Juror summoned to attend for the trial of Common or Special Jury causes, not having had notice on a previous day not to attend, who appears in obedience to his summons and continues ready to serve during the day if required, shall be considered as having been within the meaning of "The Jury Act, 1871," in attendance, and as being entitled to be paid according to the provisions of the said Act.

2. The sum of £13 10s. shall be deposited with the Sheriff upon the entry of every Common Law Cause, and before the issuing of the writ of venire facias or precept to the Sheriff, requiring him to summon a Common Jury for the trial of a Cause, by the party requiring the same.

Whenever a Special Jury shall be awarded for the trial of any issue, the sum of £20 6s. shall be deposited by the party with the Sheriff before the Registrar proceeds to appoint a time and place for the striking of such special Jury; and such deposit will be irrespective of the fee of £2 2s. payable under the provisions of the 30th section of the said Jury Act to the Sheriff on the striking of such Jury. In default of such deposit the said Order shall be of no avail, and the said Cause shall be tried in the same way as if no such Order had been made.

Where a Cause, after having been entered as a Common Jury Cause, has been ordered to be made a Special Jury Cause by Rule or Order, the sum of £6 16s., being the difference between the deposit of £13 10s. made at the time of entry and the sum of £20 6s., shall be forthwith deposited with the Sheriff by the party obtaining such Rule or Order; and in default the Cause shall, notwithstanding such Rule or Order, be tried by a Common Jury, unless the Judge other-

wise order. In every case in which the sum of £13 10s. only has been paid on the entry of a Cause, if the cause is afterwards tried as a Special Jury Cause, the said sum of £13 10s. paid on entry shall form part of the fund for payment of the Special Jury; and in every case in which a Cause is tried as a Common Jury Cause, the sum of £13 10s. paid on entry shall form the fund for payment of the Common Jury. Any balance remaining after payment of the Jury in either case shall be returned by the Sheriff to

the party paying in the same.
6. In all cases, whether tried by a Special Jury or by a Common Jury, the sum of £13 10s., if deposited by the successful party, shall (less any part thereof that may be returned by the Sheriff) be recoverable as costs in the Cause, if he be otherwise entitled to such

7. In Special Jury Causes, the further sum of £6 16s., if deposited by the successful party, shall, together with the fee of £2 2s. payable to the Sheriff on the striking of such Jury, be deemed to be costs of the Special Jury, and shall be recoverable as costs in the Cause if he be otherwise entitled to such costs and the Judge certify that the Cause was fit to be tried by a Special Jury.

SECTIONS 1, 2, and 3 of "The Railways and Electric Telegraph Protection Act, 1871," are published for general information.

34TH VICTORIA, No. 19.

Section 1.—"That if any person shall wilfully and maliciously remove, break, throw down, injure, destroy, or damage any Railway or Electric Telegraph, which shall be or may have been lawfully erected, or any rails, sleepers, switches, points, fences, embankments, drains, carriages, timber, matters or things, of or belonging to, or connected with any Railway; or any post, wires, insulators, standards, apparatus, implements, machinery, matters or things, of or belonging to, or connected with any Electric Telegraph, whether constructed or erected, or in process of construction or erection; or if any person shall wilfully or maliciously attempt to do or perform any act whereby accident may be occasioned, or injury sustained, in the traffic of goods or passengers on any Railway, such person shall be guilty of a misdemeanour, and being convicted thereof, shall be imprisoned, with hard labour, for any person shall wilfully or

Section 2.—"If any person shall wilfully or negligently remove, break, throw down, damage, destroy, or injure any such Railway or Electric Telegraph, or any rails, sleepers, switches, points, fences, embankments, drains, carriages, timber, matters or things, of or belonging to, or connected with, any Railway, or any post, wires, insulators, standards, apparatus, implements, machinery, matters or things of or belonging to, or connected with, any Electric Telegraph, whether constructed or erected, or in process of construction or erection, it shall be lawful for any such Railway or Electric Telegraph Company to recover such damages from the person so offending as any two Justices shall think reasonable."

Section 3.—" That any officer or servant of such Railway or Electric Telegraph Company as aforesaid, or any person along or near to whose premises the Railway, or any of the works thereof, or the Telegraph, or any of the apparatus thereof, shall or may be constructed, erected, or placed, or any constable, and all persons called by any such officer, person, or constable as aforesaid, to his assistance, shall or may seize and detain any person who shall or may, in the presence of such officer, person, or constable as aforesaid, have wilfully and maliciously or negligently removed, broken, thrown down, damaged, destroyed, or injured, or obstructed the working of any such Railway or Electric Telegraph as aforesaid, or any of the rails, sleepers, switches, points, fences, embankments, drains, carriages, timber, matters or things, of or belonging to, or connected with, any such Railway, or any of the posts, wire, insulators, standards, apparatus, implements, machinery, matters or things of or belonging to, or connected with, any such Electric Telegraph, and whose name or residence may be unknown to such officer, person, or constable; and shall and may carry such offender, with all convenient speed, before some Justice, with or without warrant or other authority than this Act; and such Justice shall proceed with all convenient speed to the hearing and disposing of the complaint preferred against such offender."
