CIRCULAR.

SIR,  
Downing Street,  
12th March, 1875.

1. I have the honor to inform you that Her Majesty's Government have accepted the invitation of the President of The United States to take part in the International Exhibition to be held at Philadelphia in 1876, and have entrusted the interests of the British Section to the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council on Education.

2. Her Majesty's Government attach special importance to the worthy representation of Colonial Productions and Manufactures at this Exhibition, which will be opened on the 19th of April, 1876, and I request that you will bring the matter under the consideration of your Executive Council, and that you will give the widest publicity to it in the Colony under your Government.

3. Mr. Owen, C. B., the Director of the South Kensington Museum, who has been appointed by the Lord President of Her Majesty's Privy Council Executive Commissioner for the British Section, has been informed by the General Director of the Exhibition that in May next it will be necessary that he should know approximately the amount of space required by Great Britain and the Colonies, and that the fullest details must be furnished before the 1st of December next.

4. I hope to be able to transmit to you by the next mail the General Regulations of the Exhibition.

5. It will be desirable that you should inform me by Telegraph, as soon as it can be ascertained, of the probable amount of space that will be required by the Colony under your Government.

6. I propose that, as in the case of the Vienna Exhibition of 1872, a London Committee of Colonial Representatives should be formed to advise upon matters connected with the Exhibition of Articles from the Colonies.

#### NOTICE.

#### HONGKONG.

#### *Cape d'Aguilar Light.*

Notice is hereby given that a light will be exhibited on *Cape d'Aguilar* on and after the 16th of April next. The illuminating apparatus is fixed *Dioptric* of the *First Order*, showing a *White Light* on the following bearings, which are *Magnetic* and taken from *Seaward*.

1. From S. 45° ½ W. to N. 53° ½ W. Between these bearings the light is obscured by the islets of the *Nine Pins*, and the islet just *South of Waglan*.

The light is then obscured by *Soonkong Island*.

2. From N. 21° ½ W. to N. 42° W.

The Light is then obscured by the *Lema Islands*, and the *Islands to the Southward of them*.

3. From N. 33° E. to N. 69° E. Between these bearings the light is obscured to vessels to the *South Westward of Ling Ting Island*, and the *Islands of the Samoun Groupe*.

4. The *Tathong Channel* with the exception of a small portion obscured by *Shicko Head*.

The focal plane of the light is 200 feet above mean sea level, and in clear weather it should be seen at a distance of 23 Nautical Miles.

The Tower is round, of stone, 30 feet high, with a total height from its base to the lantern vane of 57 feet.

The dwellings and boundary walls are painted white. The Lighthouse is in Latitude 22° 12' 14" N. Longitude 114° 15' 44" E.

**NOTICE TO MARINERS.**

Direction for the Kurrachee Harbor.  
Light-house.

Latitude of Light-house on Manora Point... 24deg. 47m. 21s. N.  
Longitude ..... 66deg. 58m. 15s. E.  
The Light is a fixed one, 120 feet above the sea-level, visible in clear weather..... 16 miles.  
In hazy weather, prevalent during the South-west Monsoon, about ..... 7 miles  
Present Light very inferior. A Dioptric Light of the 2nd Order recommended.

*Tides.*

High Water, full and change ..... 10h. 30m.  
Average rise and fall, Spring Tides ..... 9ft. 6in.  
Ditto ditto Neap Tides..... 3 to 4 feet.  
Depth of Water in Entrance Channel at High Water—  
Spring Tides..... 29 feet.  
Neap Tides ..... 24 to 26 feet.

*Draught of Vessels Entering or Leaving Port.*

Vessels with a draught not exceeding 21½ feet can now enter and leave the Port without difficulty or delay during all seasons of the year.

During the fair season, from October to 15th May, vessels with a draught not exceeding 24 feet can now enter and leave the Harbor. Fixed moorings are placed for such vessels.

*Time of Tide for Entering Port.*

Sailing vessels should enter Port on the ebb-tide. Steamers can enter either flood or ebb, and stand at once into Port.

Masters of ships should not, under any circumstances, attempt to enter the Harbor without a Pilot.

*Harbor Improvements.*

Among the extensive works executed, a Breakwater [a red light is exhibited at the outer extremity of the Breakwater] has been built, running out from Manora Point in a South-by-East direction to a distance of 1,500 feet, into 6 fathoms of water, this affords complete shelter to the Entrance Channel during the South-west Monsoon; also a channel has been opened through the Bar with a depth of 20 feet at low water spring-tides 500 feet in breadth; the Channel is marked by buoys, and these on entering should be kept on the Port side about 150 feet.

Note.—A Mail Steamer arriving off the Port at night and requiring a Pilot should fire two guns.

**Approaching the Port.—Coast of Sind.**  
*Indus Banks.*

The Coast of Sind below the parallel of 24deg. North Latitude should be approached with great caution; too much attention cannot be paid to the lead, more especially in passing the Banks of the Indus. [Banks of the Indus have extended about 10 miles to the Southward since 1856.]

No sailing vessel should come nearer this Coast than 20 fathoms by night, or in rough weather, or under 12 fathoms by day in fine weather.

The tides during the Springs are strong, the flood sets South-east and ebbs to the North-west.

From February to the end of the Monsoon a strong South-easterly current is experienced, running at a rate of from 15 to 40 miles a day.

During the South-west Monsoon, sailing vessels should make Ras Muari (Cape Monze), which is 18 miles West-half-north from Manora Light-house, and keep to windward of the Port, if the weather is thick, or if the tide does not suit for entering the Harbor. Allowance must also be made for a strong-set to the South-east, which prevails more or less during the South-west Monsoon.

Do not bring Manora Point to the Southward-of-east, or go under 15 fathoms near Cape Monze.

Masters of ships should endeavour to make the Port at daylight, and can with safety approach into 8 fathoms to about 2 miles distance from the Light-house, keeping it, in any bearing, from North-east to North, and heave-to for a Pilot.

*Anchorage in the Roads.*

From June to the middle of September, ships should not on any account anchor, but stand off and on, keeping the Light-house bearing from North-by-east to North-east, 1 to 2 miles distant, until boarded by a Pilot or directed by Signal.

September to end of March.

Anchorage Light-house North-by-east to North-north-east, distant 1 mile, 7 fathoms.

April and May.

Light-house North-north-east to North-east, distant half-a-mile, 8 fathoms.
