AUSTRALIA-NORTH-EAST COAST, AND TORRES STRAIT.

1.-ESTABLISHMENT OF BEACONS ON REEFS AND ISLANDS.

With reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 17, dated 31st January, 1875, on the establishment of beacons to facilitate the navigation of the Inner route leading to Torres Strait:—

The Colonial Government of Queensland has given further office, that the following additional beacons have been erceted a the Inner route, and in Prince of Wales Channel, Torrestreat.

Vessels bound north and west must leave those beacons which are red and triangular on the port hand, and those that are black and square on the starboard hand.

Port side, bound north and Starboard side, bound north and west, red and triangular. Starboard side, bound north and west, black and square.

EASTERN ARCHIPELAGO-FLORES SEA. 2.-SUNKEN REEF OFF LIBAN OR BABI.

Also, that the Commander of the mail steamer Normanby reports having struck upon a reef extending about three quarters of a mile from the south end of Liban or Babi island. The following bearings were taken from the vessel when aground, viz.:—

Detatched rock off south end of Liban ... N.E. by E. Western point of the island, just open of the S.W. point N. 2 W.

The reef did not dry at low water but appeared to extend to some distance from the western side of the island, it is steep-to, there being 20 fathoms within half a cable.

A break was also observed on what appeared to be a sunken rock lying about three miles to the eastward of the south point of Liban island.

[No. 78.] NEW ZEALAND-MIDDLE ISLAND. LIGHTS AT NELSON.

The following information respecting the lights at Nelson, New Zealand, has been received from Commodore J. Goodenough, Senior Officer, Australia.

The Boulder bank lighthouse is situated on the bank or island, 3 to 6 feet above high water, $1\frac{1}{2}$ cables E. by N. of the previously assigned position.

The light shows red between the bearing of E. by N. (the south limit of the white light), and N.E. by N., over the approximate position of the outer white buoy.

The two beacons on the east shore for entering Nelson haven

UPPER BEACON .- white, showing a white light at night. LOWER BEACON .- red, showing a red light at night.

The light on the Pilot house is discon inued.

When a vessel is known to be approaching Nelson haven at night, a light is exhibited on the beacon off Haul-ashore island.

The clump of trees hitherto used as a mark for crossing Nelson bar has disappeared, but a large white house on the site of the clump may be used in its stead; it is, however, a difficult mark for

a stranger.

The Waimea river is reported to be rapidly closing, the south bank silting up to the northward.

NEW ZEALAND PILOT. NOTICE No. 1.

The following information relating to a shoal recently found in New Plymouth or Taranaki Road, New Zealand, has been received through the Customs Department at Wellington, N.Z., 1875.*

[All Bearings are Magnetic. Variation 15deg. 10min. Easterly in 1875.]

The chief harbor master at Taranaki reports the existence, off the landing place in the eastern part of that roadstead, of a shoal, upon which there is a depth of 17 feet at low water spring tides. The shoal, consisting of large flat-topped stones, is about 20 yards across, with 4½ fathoms around it.

From the centre of the shoal, the flagstaff distant half a-mile, is in line with a farmhouse in the centre of a clump of trees, bearing S. 1 E.; and the two white beacons on the sand hills westward of the landing place are in line bearing S.W. by S.

These beacons in line, lead over the shoal, and kept open will lead clear on either side.

SOUTH WESTERN PART. FIJI ISLANDS.

The following information relating to Kandavn Island, is from a recent survey by the officers of H.M.S. Challenger; and a report by Navigating Lieutenant H. Hosken, H.M.S. Peurl, received from Commodore J. G. Goodenough, Senior Officer, Australia, 1874.

KANDAVU (KADAVU) is the south-western island of the Fiji group, and forms the southern shore of Kandavu passage. From the eastern part of Ngaloa bay, on the south-east side of Kandavu island, a fringing reef extends to the north-eastward about 4 miles when is stretches off in a long prong abruptly to the southward, from off the outer end of which the high peak of Ngaloa island bears S. Sideg. W. distant \$\frac{3}{2}\$ miles; thence after a break one mile wide, the reef trends north-easterly towards Koro Levu harbor, which is situated about 10 miles to the castward of Ngaloa bay. Thus it will be seen that an E. by N. course from off the entrance to Ngaloa harbor will lead clear of all reefs on the south side of Kandavu island.

From the east extreme of Kandavu island the reef takes a more northerly direction for about 9 miles, to abreast the north-cast point of Ono island, from which a reef stretches off to the eastward nearly 5 miles; thence it continues to abreast of North rock nearly 13 miles to the northward, where a prong of Astrolabe reef forms a prominent elbow, 13 miles to the eastward of North rock; between this elbow and the north extreme of Astrolabe reef, the distance is about 23 miles in a north-westerly direction.

During the visit of the *Pearl* the sea broke heavily over the eastern edge of Astrolabe reef, but over the long north part there was only a slight ripple, and that was not seen until the ship was within a mile from it, thus rendering this part of the Astrolabe reef dangerous to approach at night.

North rock, about 8 feet high, is situated in a lagoon about 12 miles within the north extremity of Astrolabe reef. The northern portion of the rock is white.

NGALOA HARBOR, on the south-cast side of Kandavu, is protected from seaward by the reefs fringing that part of the island. Ngaloa island, about 13 miles in extent, is situated in the north-west part of the harbor; forming to the north-eastward, North bay, to the westward, Inner harbor; and to the south-west side, Outer anchorage.

North bay is about 2 miles long in an east and west direction and one mile broad, with depths of 19 to 20 fathoms near the centre, bottom sand and coral.

Inner harbor is about half a mile in extent with $4\frac{1}{2}$ to 6 fathoms, muddy bottom.

Outer anchorage has depths of 16 to 20 fathoms, muddy bottom; on the west side of Outer anchorage a mud flat fringed by a coral reef, dries 400 yards from the Kandava shore, having six inthoms close to the edge in some parts, with patches of 2 and 3 fathoms at three quarters of a cable; and 6 to 9 fathoms nearly 3 cables from the reef. Wood shoal, with rocks awash at low water, lies on the south-east side of Outer anchorage, bearing S.E. 2 S., distant 42 cables from the south point of Ngaloa Island.

Ghannels.—Main channel leading into Ngaloa harbor is formed by Esk reef on the north, and Pearl reef on the south side, the channel is about 3 cubles broad with a depth of 40 fathoms near the centre; at the inner entrance of Main channel, and bearing $N_i N_i \stackrel{1}{\sim} N_i 2$ cables distant from the north-west end of Pearl reef, lies McGregor patch, which dries at low water, and is marked by a white buoy on its south side. Between McGregor patch and the east extreme of Ngaloa island there are several spots of 2 and 3 fathoms with 6 to 8 fathoms close to; the leading mark through Main channel from seaward, is the beacon on the southern bearing $N_i \stackrel{1}{\sim} N_i$.

Boat channel, on the east side of Esk reef, is about 300 yards long and 50 yards broad, with depths of $3\frac{1}{4}$ to $4\frac{1}{4}$ fathoms.

Schooner channel is an opening in the fringing reef one quarter of a mile to the eastward of Boat channel, and is about 150 yards broad, with 10 to 12 fathoms near the centre; on the north-east side of the inner entrance of Schooner channel there is a patch of one and a half, to three fathoms. The left extreme of Anda Tavic island, bearing N.N.W. \(\frac{3}{2}\) W., leads to the westward of this patch.

Tides.—It is high water, full and change, in Ngaloa harbor, at 6h. 38m.; springs rise 5 feet 3 inches, neaps 4 feet 5 inches.

CAUTION.—The buoys in Ngaloa harbor are indifferently moored and are not to be depended on, and the beacons are only temporary structures.

ONASEUSE OR HUNTER ISLAND.

The following further information relating to the supposed position of onaseuse or Hunter island, has been received from Commodore J. G. Goodenough, Senior Ollicer, Australia, H.M.S. Pearl, 1878.

[All bearings are Magnetic. Variation 9deg. 50min. Easterly in 1875.]

ONASEUSE OR HUNTER ISLAND is said to be in latitude 15deg, 3min. S., longitude 17ddeg. 11min. E. (Findlay's South Pacific Directory, 3d edition, page 628).

H.M.S. Rosario, Commander Dupuis, R.N., passed over this supposed position of Onaseuse or Hunter island about noon on the 26th of July, 1574, without observing any indication of land or discolored water, the weather at the time being bright and clear.

H.M.S. Blanche, Captain Simpson, R.N., also passed 5 miles to the castward of the same position, on the 20th February, 1875, the weather at the time being nearly calm, and clear, without observing any indication of land.

AUSTRALIA-SOUTH COAST.

The following information respecting the currents on the south coast of Australia, and also as to cautionary measures to be adopted in approaching Bass Strait from the westward; is supplementary to that contained in Hydrographic Notice No. 24, dated 19th November, 1874: it has been derived chiefly from a report received from Staff Commander Henry J. Stanley, R.N., in charge of the Admiralty survey in the province of Victoria, 1875.*

Currents.—The current, generally running to the eastward on account of the prevailing westerly winds, and appearing to follow the configuration of the coast line, will be found on hauling up for the Australian Coast to be setting to the south-eastward out of the Great Australian Bight, and should a north-west gale be experienced on approaching the land, its strength may be accelerated to 2½ knots per hour.

Near the shore with easterly winds a current has been found setting to the westward, but this current is probably confined to the vicinity of the coast.

Winds.—Northerly or N.N.E. winds are as a general rule followed by a change to west and south-west winds.

change to west and south-west winds.

Directions.—Ships bound to Bass Strait from the westward now generally keep in about 42de, or 43deg. S. latitude until the meridian of 13deg. E. longitude is reached; they then haul up about N.E. or N.E. by N. to make Moonlight Head; this course intersects the parallel of 4deg. S. at about 120 miles west of King Island, the position named in the Australia Directory, Vol. I, p. 592.

During strong westerly winds it is advisable to maintain the 40th parallel after passing the meridian of Cape Lecuwin, and with a view of giving King Island a wider berth, to haul up for Moonlight Head on reaching the meridian of 135deg. E.;

Several vessels have been wrecked on King Island by steering a direct course for Cape Otway, undue weight having been given to the dangers on the south coast of Australia and the much greater dangers on King Island apparently neglected. It is strongly recommended, therefore, that Moonlight Head, or some point on the coast even more to the westward, should be made, as the soundings on this part of the coast are well defined and regular. The one hundred fathom line of soundings is 35 miles to the south-westward of Moonlight Head, and the depth of 40 fathoms will be found at 10 miles from that headland. When approaching Bass Stratt in thick weather, or when the navigator is uncertain of the vessel's position, the soundings should not be reduced to less than 40 fathoms.

Commanders of iron ships. especially of those newly built, are cautioned as to the necessity of ascertaining the errors of their compasses on approaching the Australian coast.
