# Buoys, Port of Fremantle, Western Australia.

NOTICE is hereby given, that a small Red Cask Buoy has been laid on the Western edge of the Empress Rocks (9 feet least water), in Owen's Anchorage.

A small White Cask Buoy has also been laid on a small patch of Coral rocks (14 feet least water), situated on the Eastern point of the Middle Ground in Owen's Anchorage, bearing S.W. 3 W., distant 1-mile from Empress Rock Buoy.

As these Buoys are lightly moored, and likely to be easily shifted from their positions, the attention of Fishermen, Boatmen, and others is called to the 16th section of 18th Vic., No. 15, which provides against boats, rafts, &c., being made fast to any Buoy, Beacon, or Sea Mark.

#### BUOY MARKING GINDURAH ROCK.

TOTICE is hereby given, that an Iron Buoy, painted Red, is laid in 11 fathoms water, about 2 cables length South of the Gindurah Rock. It is laid at this distance from the Rock on account of the foul ground in its more immediate vicinity.

As the Light-house at Point-de-Galle can be seen before the Buoy which marks this rock, and its position can always be depended on, Commanders of Vessels should take it as the best mark to determine their position in making this port.

Vessels making the port from the Westward or Northward will, by keeping the Light-house on the bearing of E. by N. ½ N., pass about 2 miles South of the Gindurah Rock, and clear the Whales. All is clear and open to the Southward of this bearing, which will also give vessels a good fair-way to the Pilot grounds.

Vessels wanting a Pilot should heave to with the Light-house about N.E. to N.N.E. distant about 1 mile, which will keep them well clear of the Cadda Rocks, off the entrance to the

A SHOAL, the least water on which does not exceed 3 feet at low-water springs, is reported by Captain Phillips, of the "Florence Irving," as lying in the following position, viz :-

#### ALTERATION OF LIGHT, BURNETT RIVER HEADS.

HEADS.

N and after this date the Temporary Light at the South Head of the Burnett River will be replaced by a Fixed Catoptric Light of the 5th Order, which will be seen from seaward between the bearings of N.W. by W. and S.E. by E. The lense is placed at an elevation of 37 feet above the mean sea level, and will be visible from a distance of 10 or 11 miles. The tower from which the light is exhibited is hexagonal and painted white, and stands near the extreme point of the South Head.

The Leading Lights for crossing the Bar will also, after this date, be exhibited every night between sunset and sunrise.

Vessels from the Northward, intending to enter the Burnett, should not approach within three miles of the shore abreast the Burnett Banks until the light bears W.S.W., when they should steer for it and bring the leading lights into line for crossing the Bar.

NON-EXISTENCE OF SQUIRREL ROCK.

With reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 2, of 12th January, 1876, on the reported existence of a sunken danger (Squirrel rock), bearing N.E. by N. from Sea Elephant rock, distant about 4 miles; and on which the barque Flying Squirrel was stated to have been wrecked:—

The following particulars, resulting from a survey by Staff Commander H. J. Stanley, R.N., have been received:—

After a careful examination of the locality, in January, 1877, no indication of a sunken rock near the position assigned, nor any trace of shoal water could be found at a greater distance than was known to exist, viz.:—1½ miles in a northerly direction from Sea Elephant rock.

This danger has consequently been expunged from the Admiralty Charts.

The following information relating chiefly to sunken dangers searched for in the vicinity of the south-western approaches to the Fiji islands from Australia, has been received from Lieutenant W. U. Moore, commanding H.M. Surveying Schooner Alacrity, 1870.\*

METEOR SHOAL.—The position of this danger, reported to be situated in latitude 18° 22° S. and longitude 178° 53′ E., was passed at a distance of 4 miles on the morning of October 27th, 1876, but no signs of shoal water could be seen. A fresh trade wind was blowing at the time of passing, with considerable swell, and the weather was bright and clear.

TUI LAU BREAKER, reported by a small schooner of that name to have been seen 42½ miles S. ½ W. of Mount Washington, Kandavu island (thus placing it in latitude 19° 46′ S., and longitude 17° 42′ 30″ E.), was searched for in vain by H.M.S. Nymphe in October, and Alacrity in November 1876. Lieutenant Moore states that the latter vessel "spent two days working backwards and forwards, looking for breakers or discoloured "water. The weather was bright and clear. Swell sufficient "to cause a heavy break on anything with less than 2 fathoms, "but not enough to prevent good observations. Nothing was "seen from the topsail yard (60 feet above the sea level").

This danger has therefore been expunged from the Admiralty charts.

NUGU ONGEA reef (Nuka Ongea of the chart), has been reported by Captain Caverly of the Pacific Mail Company's steam ship City of New York to be in longitude 178° 20' W.; or 10 miles eastward of its position on the Admiralty chart.

CONWAY REEF, which lies in latitude 21° 45′ S. and longitude 174° 37′ E., was visited by a boat from the Alacrity, on that vessel's passage to Sydney from Fiji, November 1876, but no signs of any persons having been upon the reef were

The cay was about 6 feet above water, with two bushes of scrub visible; it was about 180 yards in length by 80 yards in breadth, and the sea was seen breaking on it from a distance of

LA BRILLANTE SHOAL.—The position assigned to this danger by M. Le Comte Dubouzet in latitude 23° 13′ 59″ S., longitude 169° 55′ 38″ E., and in which it has been placed upon the Admiralty charts, was passed over by the Alacrity on the afternoon of November 26th, 1876, and no signs of shoal water were seen. Upon sounding 320 fathoms of line failed to find bottom.

This shoal was unsuccessfully sought after by Captain Denham in H.M.S. Herald in 1854, and therefore expunged from the Admiralty charts. It was subsequently, however, reported to have been seen from the British merchant ship Creote, in almost the same position as that assigned to it by M. Le Comte Dubouzet, and again placed upon the charts in latitude 23° 14′ S., longitude 169° 55′ E.

Two other vessels have reported having seen this danger, which appears to be of very small extent, and it seems from the various accounts, that the longitude hitherto assigned to it (169° 55′ E.) is about 9 miles westward of its proper position, which probably should be in latitude 23° 14′ S., longitude 170° 4′ E.

#### NEW GUINEA SOUTH-EAST COAST.\*

The following information relative to a portion of the south-east coast of New Guinea, is derived from the journals of the Reverend Messrs. Macfarlane and Lawes, of the mission steam vessel Ellangowan (1876).

[All Bearings are Magnetic. Variation 62° Easterly in 1877.]

Hood Lagoon, situated in latitude 10° 4′ S., longitude 147° 52′ E., is about 15 miles in circumference, with a clear entrance, and anchorage inside; Dundee river empties itself at its head, and is about 300 yards wide at its mouth, narrowing to 80 yards at a mile's distance. The river was shallow at the entrance, but just inside, the depth was found to be 9 feet; it appeared to have its rise in a range in the interior, behind mount Astrolabe.

Among the natives, food did not seem very plentiful, with the exception of cocoanuts.

Coutance Island, 18 miles eastward of Hood Lagoon, is about half a mile long, and a quarter of a mile wide, close inside the barrier reef, and about 7 miles from the mainland; it is well wooded, and has a sandy beach.

Marshall Lagoon, to the northward of Coutance island, is about 150 yards wide at its mouth, with a bar stretching nearly across, inside which, it opens out to about 5 miles in circumference, and is deepest on its western side, on which is situated the village of Aloma. The lagoon then narrows to about half a mile, after which it opens out to a finer sheet of water about 4 miles long and 2 miles wide, with a village on its eastern side (probable name Vanike). This second part of the lagoon is shallow in the centre, and narrows at its head into a river about 120 yards wide, which again widens to 200 yards, after which it narrows. The course of this river, to which the name of Devitt was given, was followed for a mile and a half, where it opened into a small lagoon, from which two branches ran, one N.N.W. and the other S.E. The S.E. branch was followed for a short distance; its width was 100 yards and depth 2 fathoms.

The natives of the village in the large part of the largoon

The natives of the village in the large part of the lagoon bartered freely, but appeared frightened; their houses are situated on a sand-bank, surrounded by water, and thus the village has the appearance of being built in the water.

Robinson Harbour, found in the north-east part of Cloudy Bay, is about 5 miles long in a north-east direction, by about three-quarters of a mile wide; it was about 200 yards wide at its entrance, with from 2½ to 3 fathoms water. A succession of small hills run along one side, covered with trees to the water's edge, and small creeks were numerous.

Sewell and Percy Islands are situated eastward of Eugenia islet, about 3 miles from the head of Cloudy Bay. Sewell island, the western of the two, is about a mile and a half in

circumference, and 100 feet in height. Percy island is low and wooded, about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles in length, and separated from Sewell island by a channel, with 3 fathoms in it, and 150 yards wide.

Mullens Harbour, situated in the eastern part of Orangerie bay, eastward of Dufaure island, is about 8 miles long east and west by about 4 miles wide, and has depths of from 9 to 11 fathoms. The entrance, which is on the western side of the harbour, is about 2 miles wide and appeared free from obstruction.

The villages in the vicinity of Mullens harbours are numerous and well populated. The natives are light in colour, and are a fine looking race; hoop-iron was in great demand among them, their behaviour was friendly, but a disposition to steal was often displayed.

Between the eastern side of Dufaure island and the mainland is a good passage about three-quarters of a mile wide and from 6 to 10 fathoms deep, through which the Ellangowan steamed.

Isabel Cove affords a small but good anchorage, sheltered from all winds. It is about 11 miles south-eastward of Dufaure island, and immediately northward of Roux islands, and fresh water is easily obtained from a stream near the beach, close to one of the villages, of which there are three on the shores of the bay, called Bau, Gogohe, and one other. The houses of the natives seemed poor.

South Cape, the southern extremity of New Guinea was found to be an island, the Ellangowan steaming through the channel which divides it from the mainland. Rugged head, immediately westward of South Cape, had also the appearance of being an island, separated from the main by a similar channel.

SOUTH WESTERN PART.

FIJI ISLANDS.

The following information relating to Nandi bay in the island of Viti Levu is from a recent report and survey of Lieutenant W. U. Moore, commanding H.M. Surveying Schoner Alweyi (1876).

[All bearings are Magnetic. Variation 10° Easterly in 1877.]

### VITI LEVU.

NANDI BAY (Tomba Ko Nandi) is an extensive opening in the land upon the west side of Viti Levu, measuring about 5 miles across north and South by about 4 miles in depth.\*

The rivers Vunda, Na Soso, and Nandi emptying themselves into the bay are small, and appeared accessible only for boats and small craft.

Approaches.—Outlying islands and barrier reefs afford partial protection to Nandi, through which there are passages available in daylight only. The southernmost of these, Navula passage, about 16 miles S. by W. of the south point of Nandi bay, is about half a mile broad and clear of rocks. The prevailing south-east trade wind becomes easterly in direction and baffling between this passage and the anchorage in Nandi bay, rendering the approach of a sailing vessel tedious.

The passage between Ferry and Falmer islands, situated about 18 miles westward of Nandi bay, was taken in the Alacrity from east to west, it appeared about two miles wide in the narrowest part, and may be safely used in daylight.

The Malolo passage, about 4 miles N.W. of that of Navula, is also reported to have a good channel, and there are probably others to the northward of the Hudson islands.

Anchorage.—The depths in Nandi bay are moderate, shoaling from 11 fathoms in the north-west part, to 2½ and 3 fathoms about a mile from the shore in the south-east, the bottom being middy. Off the mouth of the Nandi river in the south portion of the bay are some low islands and detached coral patches, rendering a near approach to the shore hazardous in large sailing vessels.

The best protected anchoring ground, which however is very

ous in large sailing vessels.

The best protected anchoring ground, which however is very confined, lies between Lukuilau island and the shore of the south-west part of the bay, near the mouth of the Nandi river, in about 4 fathoms, mud, with the eastern extremity of lakuilau island bearing North, the south end of Malan islet (low and sandy) N.E. by E. \( \frac{1}{2} \) E., and the corn store at the mouth of Nandi river, East. In this position a vessel will be about 1\( \frac{1}{2} \) cables distant from the south-east point of Iakuilau island.

The holding ground throughout Nandi bay is excellent, and with the customary precautions it is considered that a well appointed vessel could with safety ride out a gale, but the south-east trade wind which is at times deflected here to the north-west, occasionally raises sufficient sea to prevent cargoes being embarked or disembarked in boats, and to render landing difficult.

Hurricane wave.—In 1869, during an unusually severe cyclone, the water in Nandi bay is said to have risen 10 feet above the ordinary high water level, inundating for a distance of several hundred yards the flat land between the mouths of the Nandi and Yunda rivers, and causing considerable damage; and again in 1871, two small schooners, the Nanova and Clyde, lying at anchor in the south-east part of the bay about a quarter of a mile from the shore, were surprised by a cyclone, during which the Nanova foundered, and the Clyde had to cut away her masts, and was washed into the Na Soso river.

Caution is therefore necessary during the months in which bad weather may be expected (November to April), should a

vessel of necessity be at anchor in Nandi bay, to be prepared for these storms, and if possible select a well-sheltered position south-eastward of Iakuilau island for anchoring in.

Fresh water cannot be obtained by means of ships boats in Nandi bay without difficulty, the river Vunda in the north-east part of the bay being alone available for the purpose, and that at a distance of 1½ miles from its mouth.
